**THE HORNED TOAD** who is pretty well known in this county because of old Rip of the courthouse cornerstone got some consideration in the Texas Senate recently. A bill was introduced by Senator Joe Christie of El Paso to protect horned toads. And, you may already know, Senator Christie grew up in Cisco.

A chiropractor went to Senator Christie's office to talk about a bill involving chiropractors, and while the two men were talking, Christie asked about his visitor's unusual tie clasp.  
It featured a small replica of a horned toad and the chiropractor explained that he owned an interest in a lucrative frog business. He told Christie how the tie clasps are made.  
"He said they take baby frogs," Christie said, "put them in a substance to form a mold and burn them to ashes. They remove the ashes

and then just pour metal into the mold. Christie was burned up about it. He began checking on the horned toad business and found that hundreds of thousands of them are being shipped out of Texas as pets and curiosities."  
The senator explained that a toad eats more than 40,000 insects a year, and they are absolutely harmless.

If Christie's bill is passed, horned toads no longer can be considered harmless. They will be armed with potential fines up to \$200 and-or jail sentences ranging from 10 to 60 days, which can be inflicted on their tormentors. The bill would make it "unlawful for any person to capture, trap, ensnare, willfully kill or injure, take or have in his possession for the purpose of sale, barter or commercial exploitation, horned toads . . . except for propagation and scientific purposes."

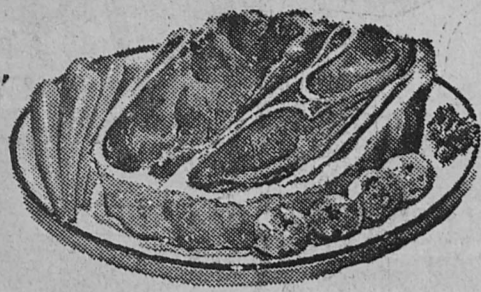

In action Tuesday night the trustees of Ranger Independent School District made three big decisions by giving the students four days for Easter holidays, reemploying all regular teachers who asked for reemployment, and purchasing about \$6,610 in band-uniforms.

Meeting with the trustees to discuss band uniforms were Band Director Sam Burnes, Tom Brittain of Ostwald Co. and Band Mothers Daisy Pounds, Billie Clark and Ruth Franklin.

Trustees present were Dr. Luther Gohlke, president, R. V. Robinson, vice-president, Gaston Dixon, Mrs. Frances Cox, Ross Hodges, J. D. Nichols. None were absent.

Previous to the board meeting, the board and their spouses, the principals and their wives and Mr. and Mrs. James Clark were served a delicious meal in the Home-making Department by the classes of Mrs. Ruby Halbert. The girls planned and prepared the meal as part of the home-making training.

The board agreed to pay \$4,000 or 60 percent of the cost of the band uniforms, whichever amount is smaller and the Band Mothers would pay the balance, depending on what extra equipment they wanted on the majorette uniforms or band uniforms. Approximately 55 uniforms will be bought and five majorette suits.

They voted to take off next Thursday, Friday, Monday and Tuesday for Easter holidays. Schools will all dismiss one hour early on Wednesday, March 22 and resume at usual time March 29, Wednesday.

Originally two days had been put into the calendar in case school had to close due to ice or snow. Since no time has been lost, the days were given back to the students and parents.

The trustees voted to participate in the County Cooperative Plan whereby O. C. Warden is employed in the Ranger Schools one half day as a Supervisor.

Mrs. Waldiene Foster of Cross Plains was employed to complete the school year as a teacher helping to fill in for Coach Gerald Cumpston who resigned earlier.

A proposed sick leave plan for teachers was tabled until the next meeting due to the late hour of the meeting.

In a proposed 1967-68 calendar Clark planned to open school September 5, Tuesday and close Friday, May 24. He allowed one day for Labor Day, two days for Thanksgiving, one day for teachers meeting in Abilene, two days for Easter, and Christmas holidays Dec. 21 through January 1. No action was taken on the calendar.

A sample band uniform will arrive in about three weeks or more, which the Band Mothers and the Board will examine and then place the order for about 55 band uniforms and five majorette suits.

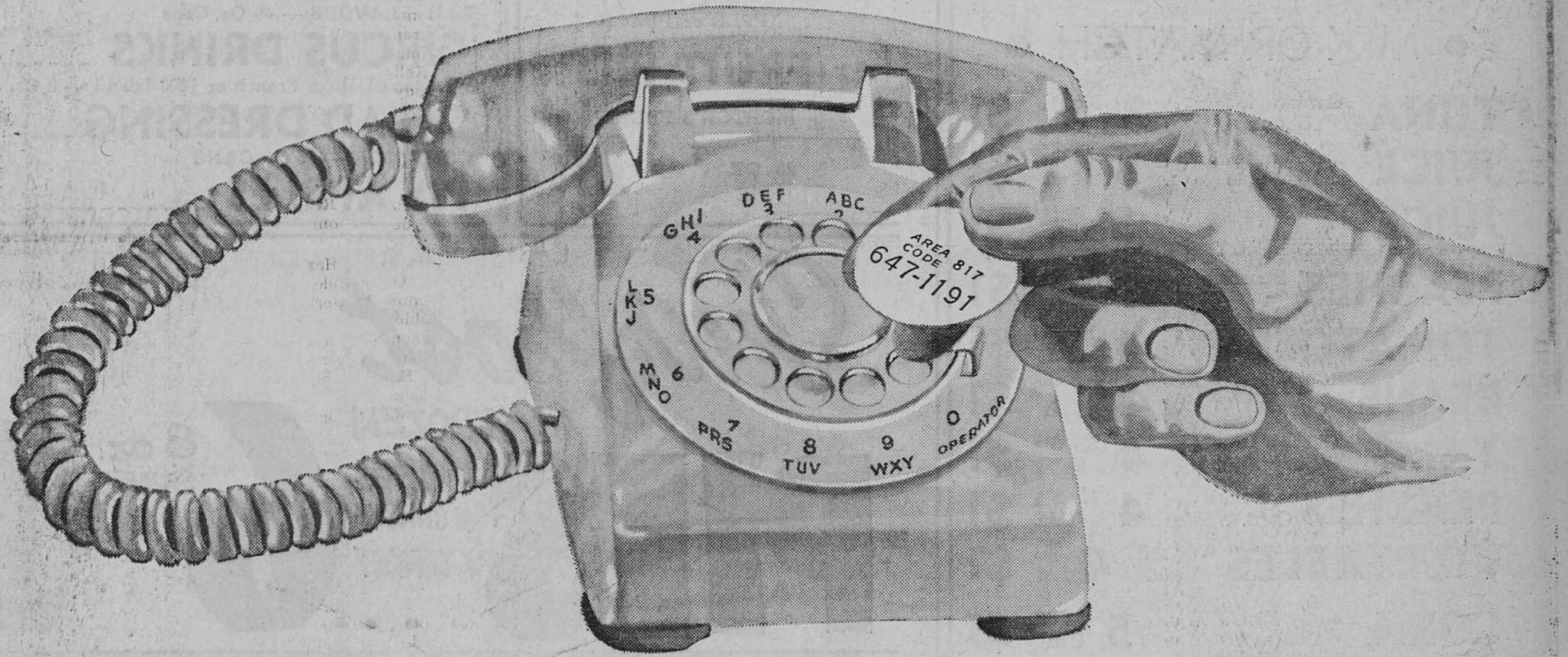
