Fresh sprigs are a must -keep them shaded and moist

if possible. The ideal sprig placement is for one end of the sprig to be 6 inches deep with the other end at or barely above the soil surface. Sprigs

should not be covered more than 6 inches deep. Plant 10 or more bushels of sprigs per acre. To get a rapid stand it's best to plant 20-30 bushels of sprigs per acre. In sandy soil you may need to roll or firm the soil after disking in the spring.

You may want to use a preemerge herbicide such as Simazine applied broadcast.
