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VOTERS TO DETERMINE EXEMPTIONS, IN CONFUSING ELECTIONS

The new County Education District and the Constitutional Amendment election Aug. 10 bring more surprises all the time. The situation is so confusing that all voters need to be informed and very careful - or they will vote for something completely opposite from what they wish.

There will actually be two elections on Aug. 10. One is a special State Election with two proposed Constitutional Amendments. The other is the School Districts Election, with three propositions on the ballot.

The State Election will be held at the usual voting Precincts in the County. A sample ballot for this Election is being published with this article.

Proposition 1 on this ballot appears at first to be simply allowing exemptions on residential homesteads. But it becomes more cloudy when the sentence ends with: "And to provide for the taxation of certain tangible property."

So it sounds confusing? It is, according to area tax officials. But they say that what this Constitutional Amendment really means is that you may vote "For" or "Against" giving Districts the right to exempt Homesteads and collect personal property taxes.

You may exercise that choice by voting at your School District Election, where the Personal Property Taxation question is split from the Homestead exemptions.

Experts say that if Proposition 1 fails state-

wide, the Homestead exemptions on a local level will be dead too, for the Constitutional Election sees the provisions for the School Election.

Proposition 2 on the State Ballot is quite different from the first one. It deals with the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students. Most comment on this is favorable, and it stands a chance to pass.

On the School District Elections Aug. 10: No official Sample ballot is available to the newspaper at this time. But here is the order of the Propositions and the general text - without Spanish translation.

Proposition No. 1 provides for the taxation of all tangible personal property, other than manufactured homes, in Eastland County Education District that is not held or used for the production of income.

Note that this provision is similar to the one entangled in Proposition 1 of the State Sample Ballot published here. But here you have the opportunity to vote on this proposal without voting on the Homestead exemption at the same time.

Proposition No. 2, School District Election, lists the exemption of \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of an individual who is disabled, and of \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of an individual who is 65 or older from ad valorem taxation in the Eastland County Education District.

Proposition 3 gives an opportunity to vote "for" or "against" an exemption of 20 percent of the market value of the residence homestead from ad valorem taxation in the Eastland County Education District.

"A 'no' vote on Proposition 1 and 'yes' on the other two proposals in the School District elections will serve to lower taxes," one official said.

Any type of personal property taxes is described as a "nightmare" to assess, render and collect. The cost of such an undertaking would be high, and it would be time consuming.

Probably some of the first items to be taxed under Personal Property taxation would be cars, boats, etc. The way the proposals read, the State would actually have the right to tax much more than that.

But consider cars - if you own two automobiles at about \$10,000 each, and the tax valuation was .80 cents per \$100, your extra tax bill could run around \$160 annually on just these items.

The County Education District was established recently by Senate Bill 351. The propositions on the School Districts ballot come from Senate Joint Resolution No. 42.

The new District is a consolidation of local school districts within its boundaries, and is supposed to exist for the limited purpose of collecting and distribute a portion of the school taxes. Its power comes from the State, although local people have been named

to serve on the Board.

A number of people have stated that they do not understand this situation or the various propositions on the State and School ballots. It is urgent that all be informed as much as possible on these very important elections.

On the proposed Constitutional Amendments (State Election) you may cast an Absentee Ballot from July 22 through August 6 in the Office of the County Clerk, First Floor of the Courthouse, Eastland.

Cases are pending in Court to throw out the whole new School Finance Plan, with which the County Education District is involved. This newspaper will keep the public informed on developments.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS: MANY IMPORTANT ITEMS ON AGENDA

Although County Commissioners spent much of their time Monday discussing Emergency Medical Services, a number of other important topics were also on the Agenda.

There were budget requests and various reports on county affairs.

Sitting in the Court for Pct. 3 Commissioner L.T. Owen was Quintin Wright of Groman, Mr. Owen's foreman. Owen, who had heart by-pass surgery last week, was reported to be improving rapidly at an Abilene hospital. 'He is getting so restless you can't find him in his room,' one visitor said.

County Judge Scott Bailey said he would like to wait on budget hearings until Owen is back at his post in the Court. The next fiscal year begins Oct. 1.

The Commissioners re-appointed Saul Pullman, Eastland attorney, as a Board member for the Central Texas MHMR Center.

Also appointed were a number of election judges to serve August 10 in voting Precincts of the county. These names will be published in the local newspapers.

Commissioner of Precinct 4 Reggie Pittman reported that last Saturday's auction at Cisco of surplus items brought in about \$10,000. The Commissioners who attended said that the crowd was not very large - but that the people who did come really meant business. Items ranging from county equipment to outmoded typewriters were sold.

On another matter, Pittman reported that 19 prisoners were currently in the County Jail. This

included one for another county, six for TDC, two on 'Blue' warrants, nine being held on pre-trial, and one inmate from the city.

Pct. 2 Commissioner Calvin Ainsworth reported to the Court that the roof over the County Courtroom had been repaired, and he didn't expect it to leak again. Work has also been completed on floors in the Tax Assessors office, as well as general cleaning and polishing on other floors.

Richard Robinson said that the Department of Agriculture sent a varied collection of surplus commodities this past month.

There were 600 cases in all, and it took two trips to haul everything. There was cheese enough for Ranger and Cisco, alternating with the part of the county receiving cheese the last time.

The court heard several requests on the 1991-92 budget. County Extension Agent David Tunmire asked for salary increases for his secretary, himself and two other agents. He also requested increases in auto mileage allowances and office expenses. The total increases requested were \$4,488.

At 1:30 p.m. the Commissioners met to consider bids for a motorcycle seized by Federal Agents from Guy Regan Kincaid. This vehicle was reportedly released to Eastland County by a Federal Magistrate in Lubbock.

There was only one bid received for the motorcycle, and the Commissioners turned it down as being far under market value. Sheriff Ronnie White was authorized to dispose of the vehicle at a private sale.

POINTS TO PONDER

The Bible says that one day Moses returned to Egypt from the Sinai peninsula. He didn't drop in just to say Hi, he was there to take them to the land of Israel. The people smiled from ear to ear as they shouted, "Whoee, Moses goin' to take us to the promise land. Quickly they packed up and left. They could have soon been in the land promised to Abraham. For some reason the Israelites forgot about 400 years of horrible slavery, suffering, and helplessness. They remembered only the food they had in Egypt, which may amaze us. Yet don't we do the same thing? When things are not going the way we want them to, it's so easy to look back on the "good old days" and suddenly the past which was not so good at all when we were going through it, becomes good. Somehow we forget the misery, the despair of the past. The thoughts of the past makes it seem so attrac-

ive. Satan blinded the Israelites to their 400 years of captivity and had them think only of their full stomachs in Egypt. They complained to Moses, "We want to go back to Egypt. At least we had food there, your going to lead us down the prime rose path to our destruction." It all looks incredible now to us, that they would doubt God's promise, but they did.

There are voices now calling us that we can go back to the "good old days" when oil was plentiful and there was a surplus in the state treasury. The voice says the answer to the state financial problem is either a state lottery, or very high tax increase. The lottery is presented as the painless way to return to the "good old days." But the question is it as easy as it seems? Legal gambling was introduced through horse racing. The state was to get 5% as it's share, this has been reduced to 1%

now that it has passed. The police force in Willow Park has had a large increase of arrests of DWI. They have to cope with the increased number of people who go to the race track and drink and drive. It costs the community to handle the problem. The managers of the track claim it's not their responsibility to control those who get drunk.

It raises the question if there is a state lottery who will pay to take care of the families of those persons who spend their entire pay check on lottery tickets? The answer is you and I will. Illinois has a state income tax, lottery, one of the highest sales tax, and legal gambling. But Illinois still can't meet its financial needs. That's something to pray about when you take your family to church, is a lottery the answer.

It was a Texas Ranger Camp, A Thriving Oil Town, that has been accredited with winning the First World War!!, the setting for a Clark Gable, Spencer Tracy movie, Boom Town. Those Ranger folks have really preserved their history."

We are a group who have begun procedures to form a new Historical

Preservation Association, and have already started the wheels turning to acquire one particular building. Thinking in a positive way, as soon as the building is acquired, it will be boarded up and minimal repairs to the roof to stop the vandalism and acts of nature that are destroying it.

Weight Loss Surprises Researchers

WASHINGTON -- A nutrition organization was hopeful that a nutritionally complete "hi-tech" food tablet would help erase world hunger problems, until a study revealed that one of the ingredients could cause significant weight loss.

Researchers in Europe found that an ingredient in the aptly named product Food Source One actually caused people to lose weight, even though specifically instructed not to alter normal eating patterns, according to one study published in the prestigious *British Journal of Nutrition*. Researchers in an earlier study had speculated that the weight loss was due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calories.

While the development of Food Source One, a project of National Dietary Research, would not be used to successfully fulfill its original goal, the formula which has since been improved with other natu-

ral colloids has been a windfall for overweight people. A Daytona Beach, Florida woman fighting a weight battle for 12 years used the product on the recommendation of her physician and lost 30 pounds. She stated, "Not only have I lost 30 pounds but my cholesterol has dropped from 232 to 143. I have two closets full of clothes which have not fit me in two years that I can now wear." In a separate report, a telephone interview revealed that a Wilmington, North Carolina pharmacist lost 14 pounds in 3 weeks on the product and was never hungry.

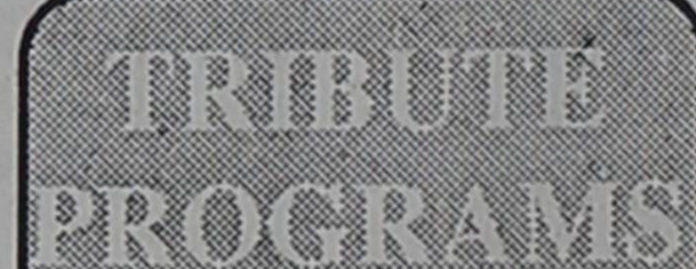

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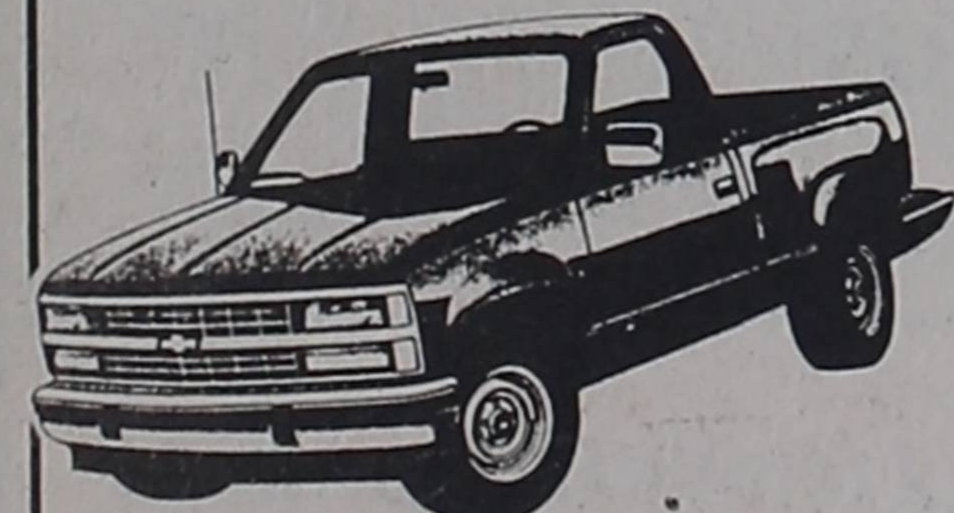

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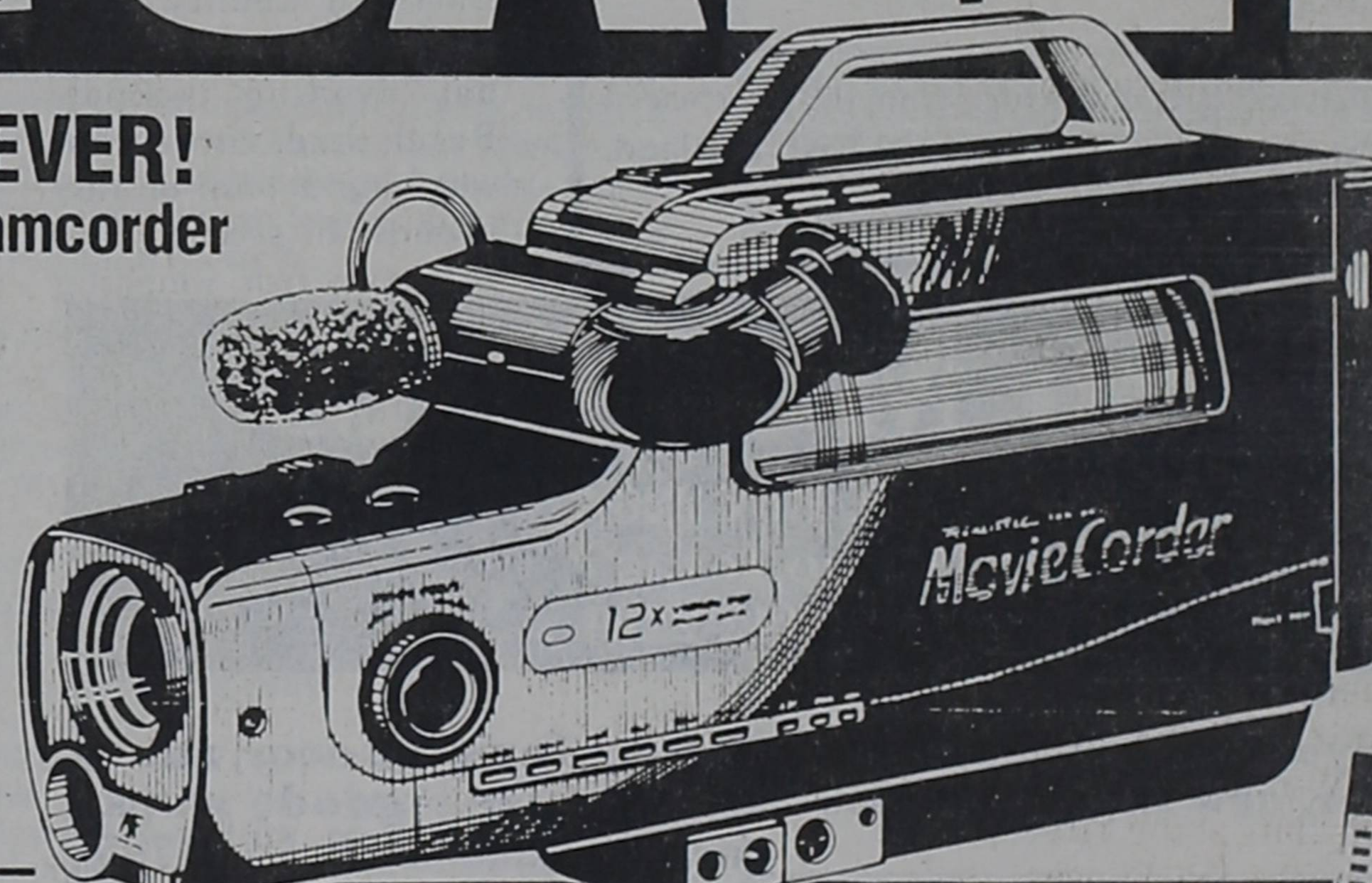

Fishing Outdoors

by Terry L. Wilson

West Texas black bass anglers have taken it on the chin once again folks. Currently the single lake in our area to receive Florida Strain fingerlings for 1991 has been O.H. Ivie, (Stacey) near Coleman. Other stockings in West Texas have included Nasworthy near San Angelo red drum, and Colorado City also red drum.

But the big stockings have been of striper and hybrid striper fingerlings as follows: Brownwood 39,600 hybrid striper; Whitney 331,827 striper; Fort Phantom Hill 64,180; Possum Kingdom 212,726; Proctor 70,080; Spence 68,644.

The striper and hybrid are an excellent sport fish and we all should be grateful to receive them. But where's the black bass? More are still heading to East Texas lakes as has been the rule. Each angler should set down

and write the TP&WD officials and request more blacks for our lakes.

Lake Leon is currently showing its potential to take a good stocking of fish and provide plenty of bait fish such as shad. Almost anywhere on the lake now huge balls of shad are present.

As schools of largemouth, hybrid and striped bass chase these balls of threadfin shad around southern impoundments, wise anglers are stocking their tackle boxes with shad replicas. Plastic models of swimming-tail minnows are numerous, but only one pre-formed shad imitation is fortified with powerful scent and flavor enhancers. The Berkley Power Shad has developed a great following by those anglers who follow the concentrations of roving largemouth, striper and hybrid.

The Power Shad is effective because the fish

tend to hold onto the lures longer due to built-in attractant. When chasing schools of baitfish on the surface, the predator fish will hit at many lures but hold onto few for any length of time. That extra time afforded by the Power Shad allows the angler to more surely set the hook. That means more fish in your liveweb.

When striper and largemouth is reservoirs such as Possum Kingdom, Hubbard, and Spence, move to deeper water, beneath the shad, they become more finicky. There the Power Shad's scent and flavor enhances mean more strikes and, of course more catches.

Most Power Shad are rigged behind jig heads or slip sinkers and fished in and around concentrations of bass and striper. Use a strong, low stretch line like Tri Max in Ultra Clear or Photo chromic, and thread a 1/0 or 2/0 jig hook down the spine of the shad and out its back for best results. Behind a slip sinker, use a 2/0 or 3/0 bait keeper style hook and bring the point out the back of the Power Shad in front of the fluttering fin-tail.

The Power Shad is also effective in heavy cover such as stick-ups or vegetation when attached to a weedless hook. A great place to toss the bait is onto submerged hilltops and creek channels, places where the injured forage may be found. The favorite prey of largemouth, hybrid striper and striped bass in the south during summer is the threadfin shad, and the most productive artificial match is Berkley's new 3" Power Shad, a bait just waiting to get bit.

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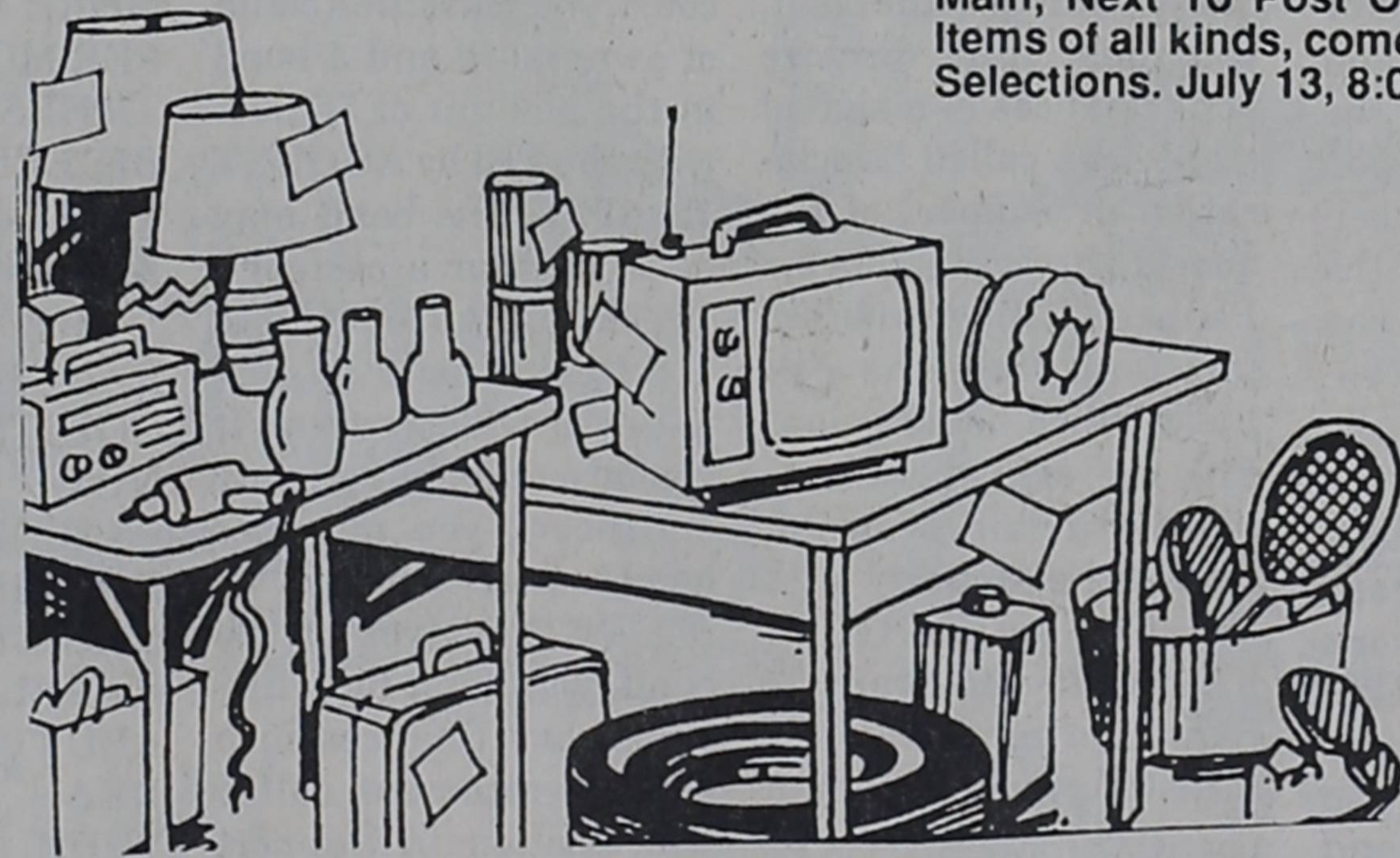

NORTH CAROLINA TAXPAYERS 1701-1786, compiled by Clarence E. Ratcliff. This work lists the names of the taxpayers resident in about half of the North Carolina counties formed before 1786. It is a list of persons paying poll taxes or prop-

erty taxes sometime between the years of 1701 and 1786. Taxpayers are listed in alphabetical order by surname, followed by the county and year in which taxes were paid. These records, like census records, identify individuals in a particular place at a given time.

The majority of the names given in this volume were copied from tax lists microfilmed at the North Carolina State Archives in Raleigh (roll numbers 155.108 and 115.49). Supplementing this basic list, and integrated throughout the text, are names which have been extracted from The North Carolinian, afterwards called the Journal of North Carolina Genealogy and then simply North Carolina Genealogy from which journal

have also been taken names of persons owning headrights and landrights.

The combined lists, with repeat entries for those people who appear in more than one tax list, contain approximately 28,000 names. 228 pp. #4760 \$20.00 + P&H.

NORTH CAROLINA TAXPAYERS 1679-1790, Vol. 2, compiled by Clarence Ratcliff. This book continues the work begun in North Carolina Taxpayers 1701-1786. It includes most of the remaining tax lists, from the earliest known to 1790, except for a few (most of

which are redundant) which were recorded shortly before or after the tax lists in this and the first volume.

Most of the names in this volume were found in the microfilmed tax lists at the North Carolina State Archives in Raleigh (roll S.50.10) or in photocopies of some records not on microfilm at NCSA, or in tax lists published on the North Carolinian, late Journal of North Carolina Genealogy, still later North Carolina Genealogy.

About 29,000 taxpayers listed, as in previous volume, alphabetically by surname, followed by the

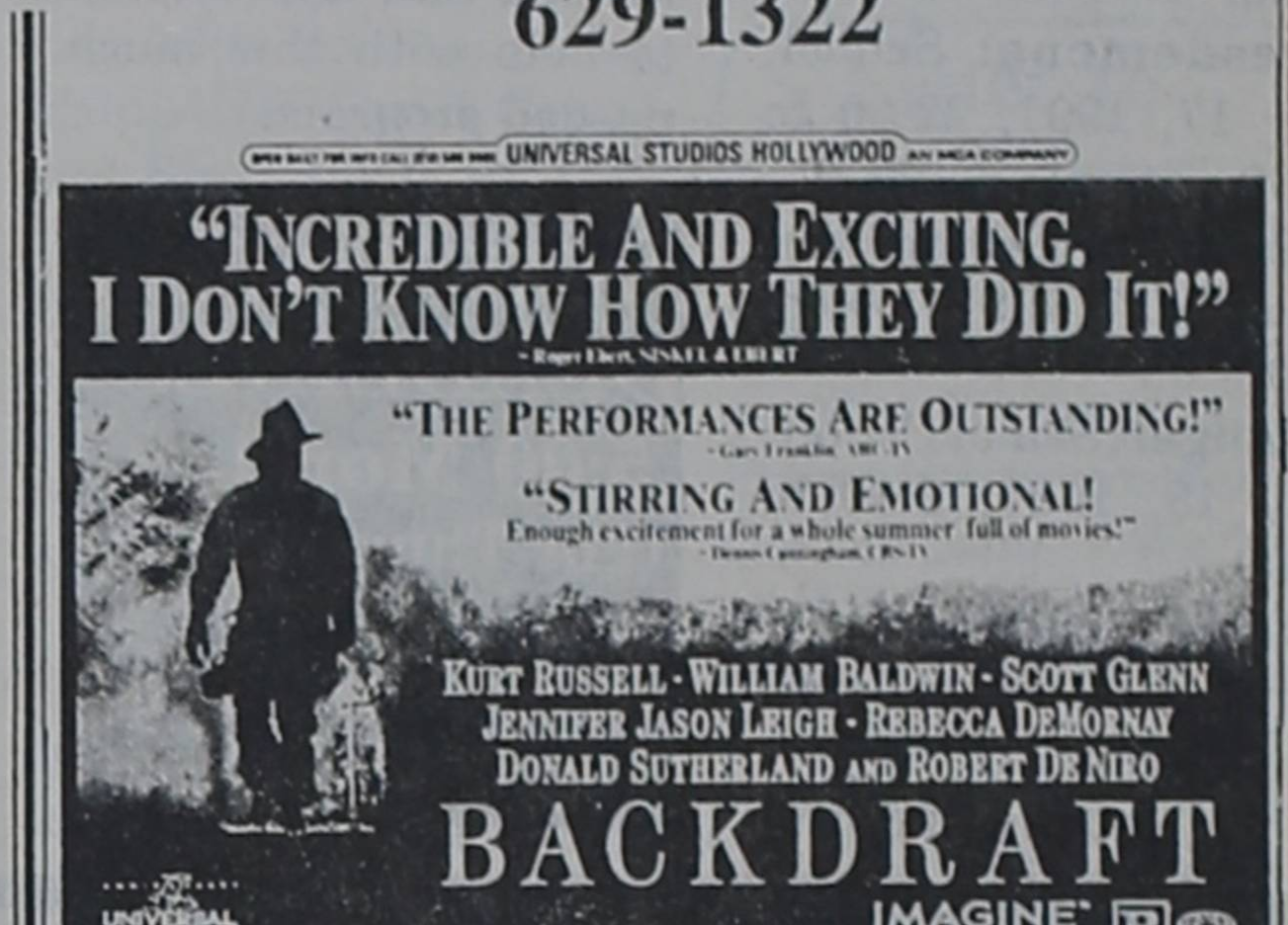
Wednesday— Beef patties, potato corn scallop, harvard beets, tossed salad, green beans with almond, tropical apples, bread, butter and milk.

1990 preliminary production was 1,721,123 barrels daily. This figure compares with preliminary March production of 1,769,614 barrels daily. Final production reports for March indicated average production at 1,793,419 barrels daily. The preliminary Texas oil production figure for April is 52,320,518 barrels, down from 54,858,047 barrels in March. April 1990 preliminary Texas oil production figure was 51,633,679 barrels.

Guerrero said the state's top producing counties, rank ordered by preliminary April production, were: Gaines, 3,525,874 barrels; Andrews, 3,010,083 barrels; Ector, 2,918,962 barrels; Yoakum, 2,634,948 barrels; Hockley, 2,506,023 barrels; Gregg, 2,199,280 barrels; Pecos, 1,972,177 barrels; Crane, 1,497,425 barrels; Frio, 1,147,035 barrels; and King, 1,063,126 barrels.

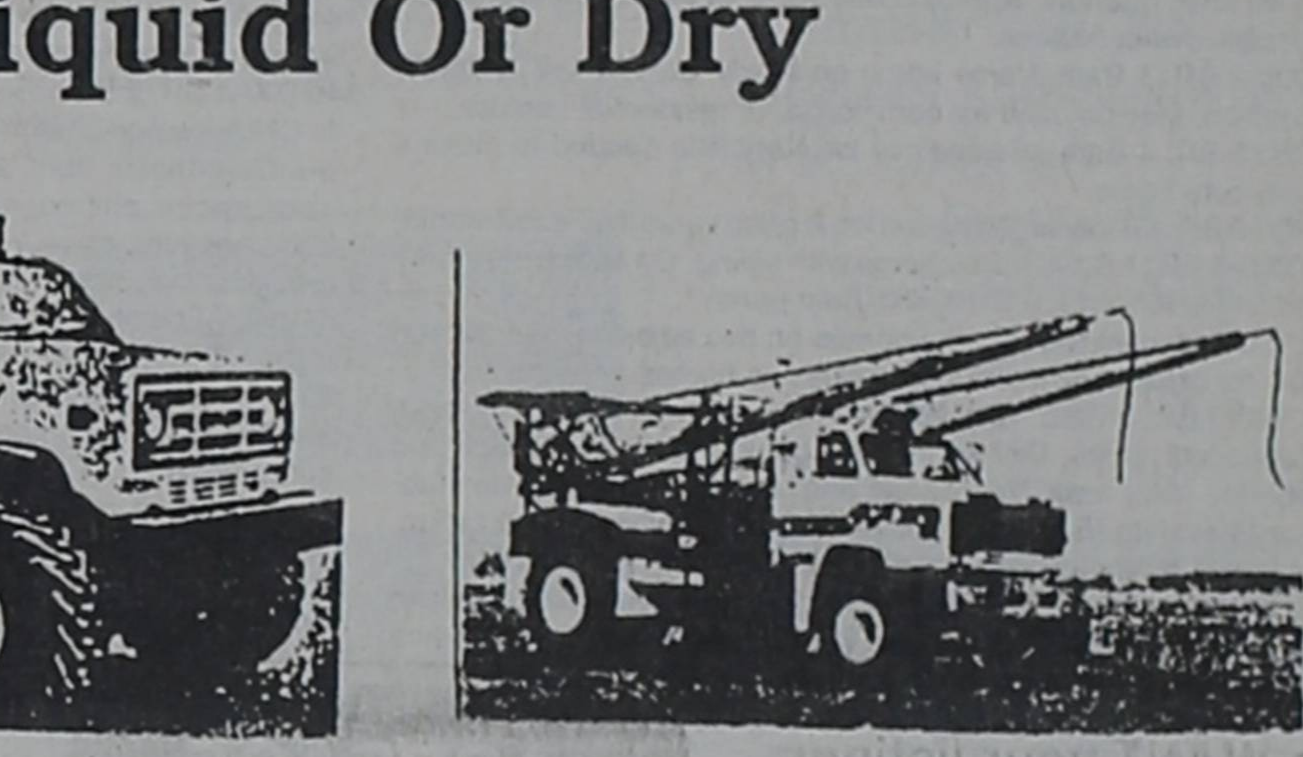

KERNELS OF WISDOM

Plain popcorn rates nutritionally as a first-class snack that provides fewer than 20 calories a cup, just a trace of fat, and no sodium whatsoever. It even has a couple of grams of fiber. In other words, for under 100 calories you can eat 5 healthful cups' worth. But much of the popcorn we consume is coated with enough oil, butter, and salt to turn an otherwise healthful "munchies" into a calorie-, fat-, and sodium-laden extravaganza. Consider that every tablespoon of oil used for popping adds about 120 calories and 13 or 14 grams of fat, or more than 20 percent of all the fat that should be eaten in a day by someone who is following a 1,800-calorie diet and wants to stay within the recommended 30 percent of calories from fat. Butter drizzled on top contributes another 100 calories per tablespoon and 11 grams of fat. And every teaspoon of salt sprinkled on it adds close to 2,400 milligrams of sodium, an amount that the National Academy of Sciences says should be the most anyone consumes during an entire 24-hour period. It's the same with prepackaged varieties that can be eaten straight from the bag or popped in the microwave. Consider one famous brand gourmet butter microwave popcorn. It might seem low in

calories, fat, and sodium at first glance because 1 cup—a handful or two—supplies 27 calories, about 2 grams of fat, and 63 milligrams of sodium. But eat the whole 12cup bag, which is easy to do, and you take in 320 calories, more than half of which come from fat, and 760 milligrams of sodium.

Fortunately, popcorn manufacturers are now offering "light" varieties of microwaveable kernels that contain fewer calories and less fat. A 14-cup bag of famous brand gourmet light butter microwave popcorn provides 233 calories and only about 5 grams of fat. For the sodium-conscious, that company and others also offer salt-free varieties (though generally they still have high amounts of fat, as the chart indicates).

Most manufacturers list a serving of popcorn as 3 to 4 cups, just a fraction of what's in an entire package. Even one famous brand lists 3 cups as its microwave popcorn marketed as "Singles" despite the fact that an entire "Singles" bag contains a full 8 cups. To cut down on any confusion, the chart provides information on whole bags or packages, the amount you're likely to eat in a sitting.

Of course, the best alternative is to pop your own kernels and thereby control the amount of "fixings", if any, you want to add. You can control

the amount of popcorn, too, and thus resist the temptation to eat every last bit in a prepackaged bag.

MAKE IT WITH WOOL

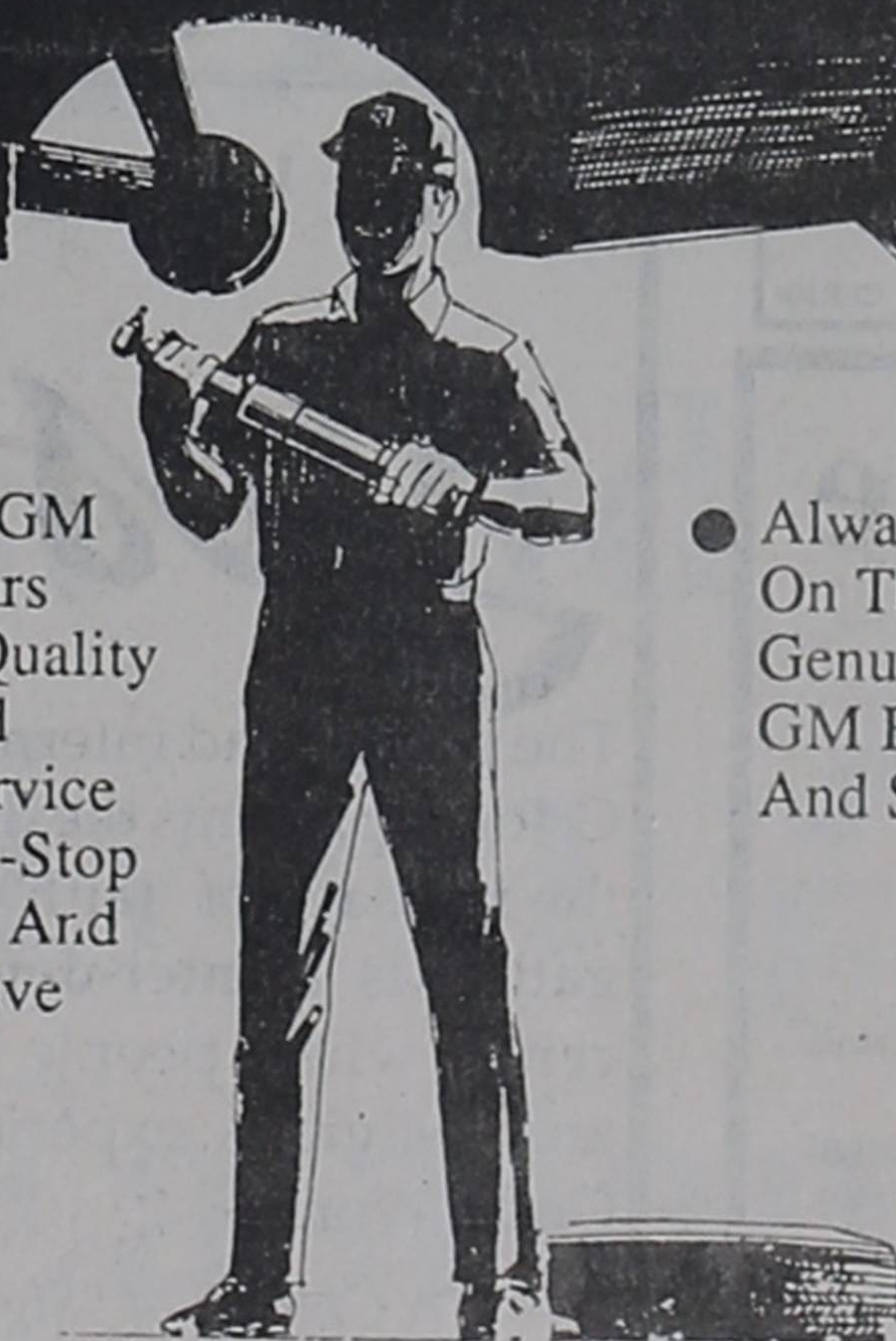

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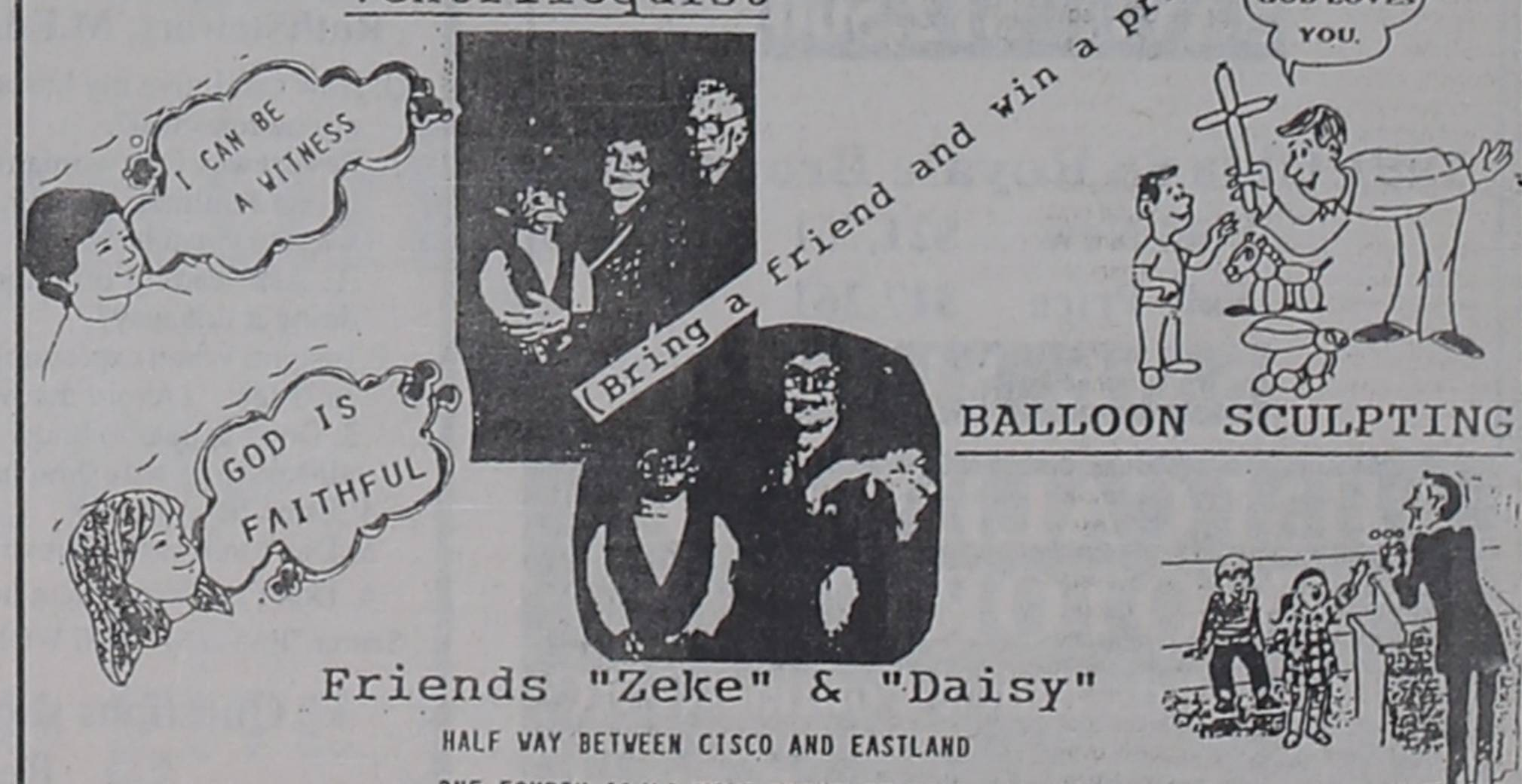

ENTHRALLED APPARENTLY with the old legend (and current popular movie), the educational powers that be in Austin came up with the splendid Robin Hood plan -- in which money would be taken from the richer and given to the poorer school districts. And new "super districts" were established, in which these takings and givings were to be accomplished.

Eastland County schools were lumped into a new county district; and of course there aren't any super rich entries, so to come up with funds to distribute "equally" some additional taxes are going to have to be levied, for this new super district. Try to pay attention, because this is going to get even more confusing as we go along. It needs to be emphasized that these shenanigans are not, repeat not, of local doings. Eight Million Dollar Tire Recycling Plant To Locate In County

Eastland County Industrial Development Corp. Board Members told the Commissioners Court Friday that an approx. \$8 million dollar tire recycling plant will be locating in the county in about 60 days.

Speaking at the called meeting were Board members Grover Hallmark, L.D. (Dick) Woolley and Don Bradshaw. They said that Industrial Bonds have already been arranged for the Plant, which will employ 30 people at first and go to 50 as it reaches capacity.

The Commissioners authorized the issuance of a letter of inducement for this industry to establish within the county. Company officials will be visiting soon to secure a location.

Each town in the county will have an opportunity to make a presentation on the location. Development Board Members said. Grover Hallmark said that the tire recycling process would

separate chrome, rubber and other components. The industry will also go into the manufacturing business with the reclaimed material. There will be no liability to the county on issuing bonds, Commissioners were told.

Don Bradshaw explained that the Company operates with a very clean, environmentally safe process. The technology is American/French, and uses liquid nitrogen.

"These people have impressed me with their ability to run a plant," Bradshaw said.

Also on the agenda was the expiring Board terms of Woolley, Hallmark and Bradshaw. The Commissioners appointed them to new terms on the Eastland County Industrial Development Corp. Board.

Judge Bailey had good words for the group. "They not only work at getting somebody new in, but they also help industry that is already here," he said.

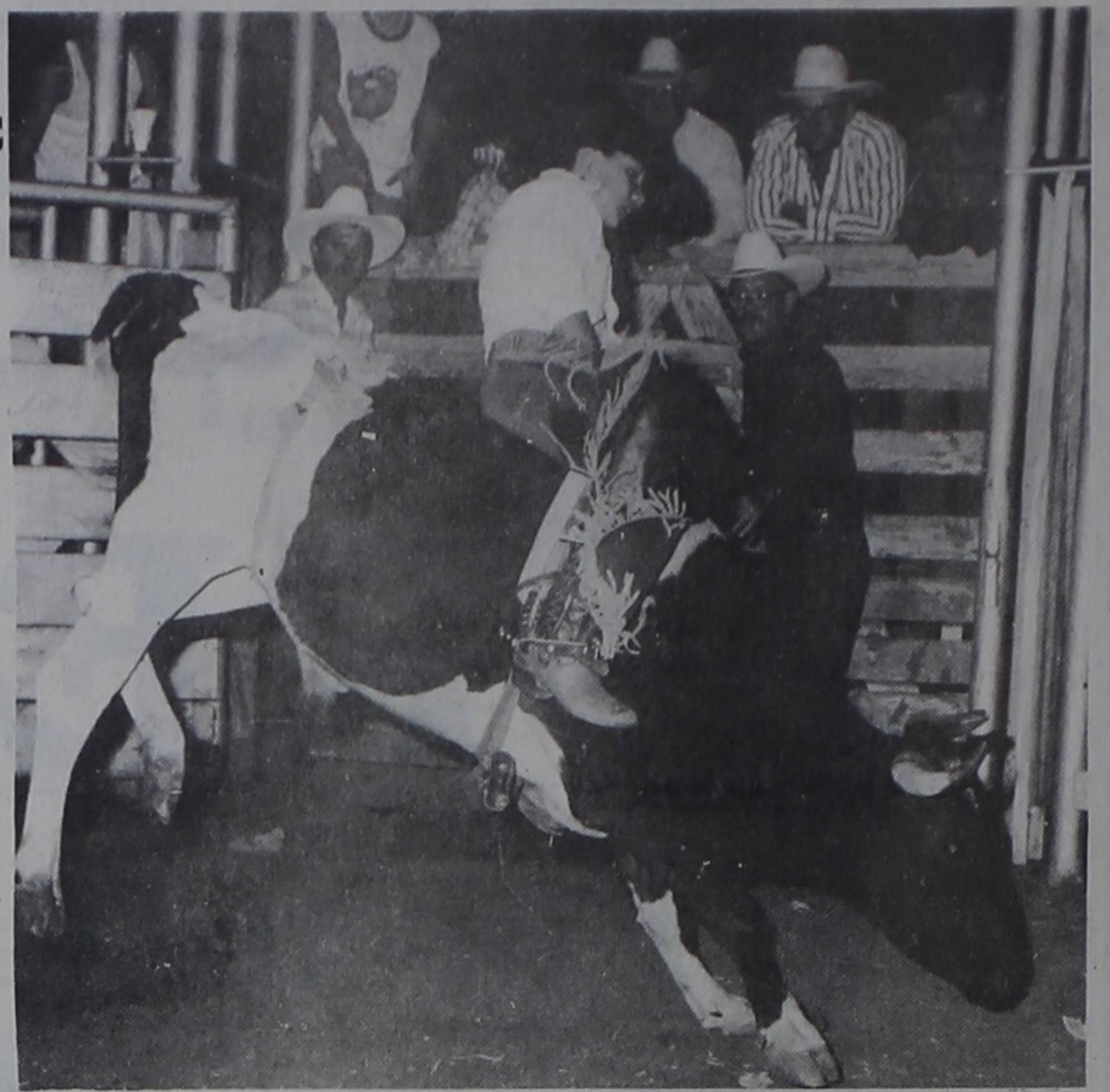
INCREASING NUMBER OF OLDER AMERICANS MAY CHOOSE SUICIDE ANTHROPOLOGIST SAYS

(FORT WORTH) — More aging Americans will opt to end their lives in the future, predicted a Texas Christian University anthropologist.

Dr. Andrew Miracle added that a deep-seated value of American culture may contribute to the trend.

"Increasingly we will see more older people who commit suicide because they realize they cannot take care of themselves," explained Miracle.

Older Americans may become despondent over losing control of their lives as they feel they don't have sufficient resources to take care of themselves in a fashion that they think promotes an acceptable

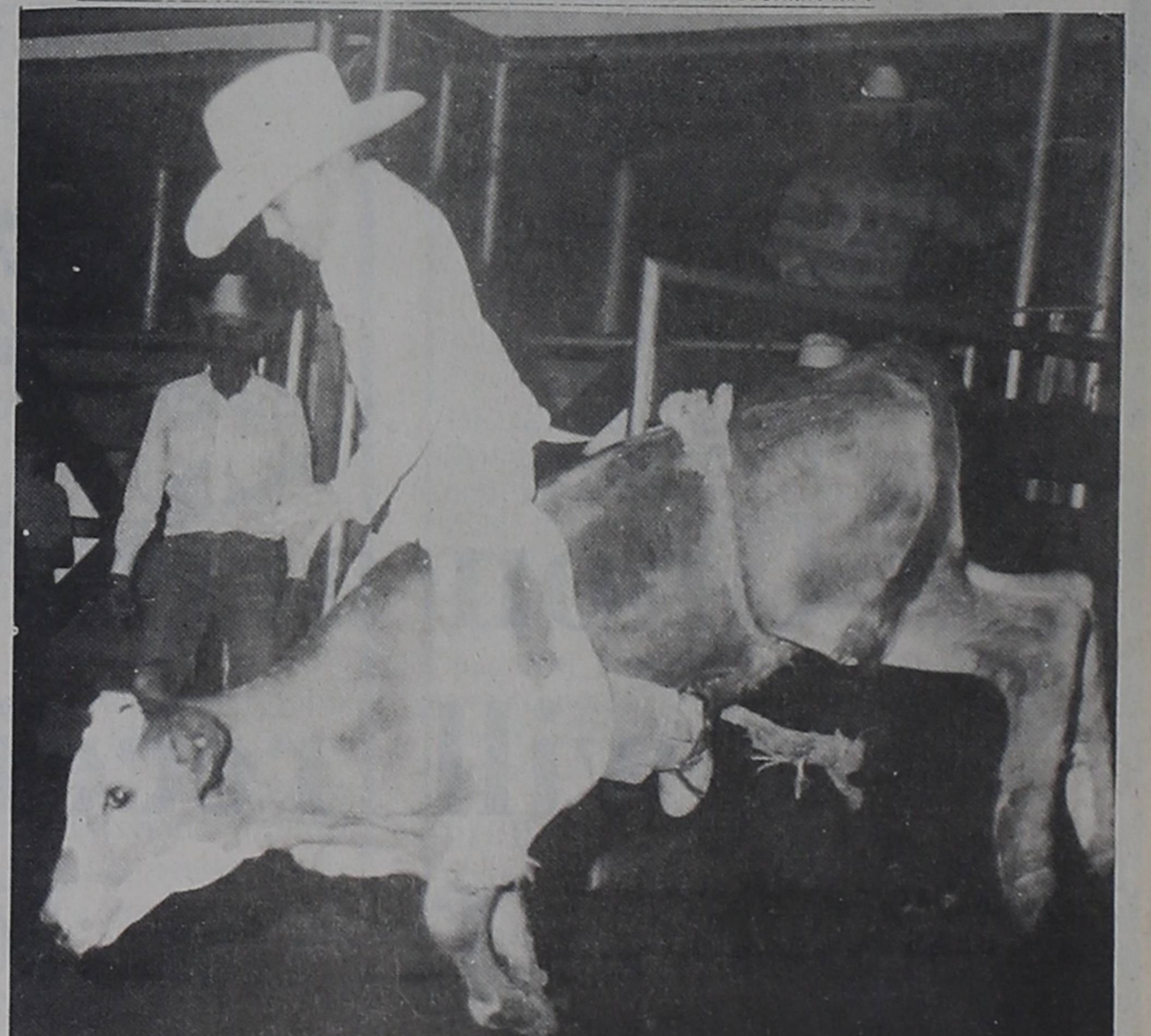

quality of life, he said. "One of the values that is persistent in the United States in the desire for a certain level of independence," Miracle commented. Miracle said individuals who believe failing health will prevent them from taking care of themselves or confine them to a hospital for an extended period of time may choose suicide. He added that those who lack the financial resources necessary to support themselves also may elect to kill themselves. "Those people may well turn to suicide for dealing with what they see as an inevitable reality that is not desirable," Miracle said. Miracle believes society is becoming more receptive to suicide as way to preserve life's dignity and dying while still in control. "I think a growing segment of society is looking at this at least in a neutral, if not a positive, fashion," he said.
