PUMP FAILURE CURTAILS RANGER WATER SUPPLY

An Eastland County Water Supply District pump at Lake Leon broke Tuesday, curtailing water supplies to Ranger, Eastland and communities which purchase water from these towns. This was one of three pumps used at the lake.

Tuesday Ranger residents were asked to curtail all non-essential watering. Eastland is already under a rationing plan based on odd-even house numbers.

The pump was rebuilt by a firm in Eastland, and was placed back in service at the lake about 10:30 a.m. Thursday.

All restrictions on water usage in Ranger were lifted at that time, according to Delbert Cozart, Ranger Water Commissioner.

This period of water shortage due to pump failure came shortly after water problems were discussed at the Ranger City Commission meeting Monday night.

At that time a group of citizens who live outside the city limits east of town

complained to the Commissioners about their

lack of water. Although Cozart appeared sympathetic, he reminded the group that they live outside the city limits. He said if they would come into the City, money would be available to replace a water line that is too small.

The group blamed the City for allowing too many water meters on the line. Originally 24 landowners made an agreement to hook onto the city line. Now the line is reported to have 36 water meters.

Thursday Cozart said that the City used the booster pump to keep as much pressure possible in the outlying lines while the pump was down. 'But that is something we try to do all along,' he said.

'Ranger runs into water problems when the big storage tanks runs low during these dry times, he said. 'During the summer it usually stands about 30 ft. in water. 'I'm glad to report things are back to normal.'

uled to go out in October. Proposition 2 of the State Amendments deals with the provision to issue general education bonds to provide educational loans to students.

At stake here is \$300 million to finance these loans to students attending Texas Colleges and Universities. These loans are needed to meet the fall 1991 demand for loans to financially needy students. If this Amendment does not pass, it is estimated that around 15,000 needy students may not be able to attend school.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS JOIN WITH CITY OF EASTLAND ON GRANT APPLICATION

Services was a main topic for the County Commissioners Monday, July 22. As previously reported, they approved a modified contract for Pct. 1.

But there were also a number of other important items on the agenda - among them was a proposal for the county to join the City of Eastland in a Community Development Block Grant application to the West Central Texas Council of Governments. Eastland Mayor C. W. Hoffmann, City Manager

Paul Catoe and Gary Montgomery brought the request to the court. Catoe explained that the grant would be for \$350,000, and would be used to raise Eastland Lake Dam and widen the spillway. The total cost of the project would be \$428,000.

Catoe referred to the dam, located northwest of Eastland, as a "high hazard dam.

"He said that in the event of a 30 inch rain over a short period of time (unlikely, but possible) there could be a loss of property and possibly a loss of life down from the

If the dam broke the water would gush down the North Fork of the Leon River.

Both Catoe and Hoffmann told of the two previous applications for the Grant, in which the county had joined. Although the applications seemed to be favorably received, they were turned down each time.

The application for these grants is highly competitive, Hoffmann said, but he felt the City might stand a better chance this time.

The city might enhance its chances even more if the county would agree to put some money "up front" for the project, BACK PAGE

Emergency Medical Commissioners were told.

The Commissioners agreed to join in the grant application, but said they would need to check on the legality on whether they could help financially with a project on land owned by the city. There was a discussion on the possibility of the county furnishing "inkind" help on the project, such as machinery or material for construction work.

On other items, the Commissioners approved the transfer of \$225,573 held in a debt service account to the General Fund. County Judge Scott Bailey explained that this money had been held to assure the final payment on the jail, which was constructed in 1980.

The jail was paid off on June, 1990, so these funds were not needed for that purpose.

Also authorized was the transfer of funds from the General Fund to the Road and Bridge Fund. This was involved with the purchase several years ago of the Lasater property just north of the jail.

Funds were transferred when it appeared that the County would be forced to expand the jail. Fortunately the situation has eased-the jail has passed the last three inspections.

On other jail matters, Sheriff Ronnie White reported that 14 prisoners were currently in the jail. Twelve are waiting trial, and two are being held for other counties. Not one is being held for TDC - for the first time in a long time!

Good news too on Courthouse maintenance -Comm. Calvin Ainsworth said the work on the interior continues. He also plans to install the new lawn sprinkler system and get in the new lawn CONTINUED ON

A pair of interesting pieces of mail crossed my desk this morning, both being related to the other. There was a letter from Milo Kirk and Kirk Brown of Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) and another from State Senator Bob Glasgow (D-Stephenville).

MADD, it seems, has written every newspaper in the state saying bad things about Glasgow and the senator seems to be asking for a fair shake in light of the organization's

What MADD is mad about is the failure of a bill in the past session of the legislature which would have given the Texas Department of Public Safety the authority to suspend the driver's license of anyone who refused or failed a breath or blood alcohol test. The proposal would have allowed a driver 40 days under a temporary permit before that driver had an administrative hearing on the license. If the driver did not ask for a hearing in that period, the suspension would take effect for a period of 90 days for a first offender. That person would not be able to apply for an essential need license until 30 days after their license was suspended.

MADD, through Kirk and Brown, claim that this bill would have saved 150 lives annually in Texas. They lay the hand of failure directly at Glasgow saying, "Glasgow's unfair, unethical behavior is understandable because he is a waterboy for the lobbyists, PACs and special interests in Austin."

Kirk and Brown go on to say

Glasgow's chief aide is the son of the publisher of a periodical for the alcohol industry and they berate Glasgow's participation in helping to write an ethics bill calling it "another case of the fox guarding

Ms. Kirk and Mr. Brown certainly give a new meaning to the word

Glasgow explained that, as chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee, he set the bill for public hearing and ultimately the bill failed to receive sufficient votes to be reported back to the entire Senate. The senator, who stated he was a

Mr. Smith has done a very credible job in analyzing the arguments put forth by MADD concerning the ALR bill. I believe Mr. Smith's conclusions are on the mark. I hope that by reading this column you may gain some insight into the dispute over the ALR bill.

Let me take this opportunity to reiterate my position about the ALR bill. I remain committed to passing an ALR bill that retains a citizen's right to due process of law. Social Security Disability Insurance Benefits

People with disabilities may work and still receive Social Security disability insurance benefits or Supplemental Security Income (SSI) disability payments. And they may be able to earn more than they think under changes

in the law, according to Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene.

"The law has changed considerably in recent years and many people may not be aware of how much they can earn and still keep their cash benefits and Medicare or Medicaid coverage," Hammons said.

Special rules, called

"work incentives," are designed to continue cash benefits and health care assistance, help with special work expenses caused by the disability, and provide rehabilitation and training to help people enter or re-enter the health care coverage. workforce. The rules are different for Social Security and SSI, but under both programs they are designed to provide the support and assistance a person needs while attempting to work in spite of a disability.

A beneficiary who returns to work gets a "trial work period" of 9 months (not necessarily consecutive) during which he or she can earn any amount without current benefits being affected. After the trial work period, bene-

fits will stop if average monthly earning exceeded \$500. However, there is a 36-month "extended period of eligibility" during which a person may receive a benefit for any month earnings fall below \$500. Medicare may continue for at least 39 months after the end of

the trial work period. Under SSI, cash payments continue as long as a person does not exceed the SSI income limits. In addition. Medicaid may continue after cash payments stop if a person needs the Medicaid in order to work and is unable to afford similar

SSI does not count the first \$65 of earnings and only half of earnings over that. Because of the earnings exclusion, a person could earn as much as \$899 and still receive a partial Federal SSI payment.

Under both programs, work expenses related to the disability - such as a seeing eye dog, a special typewriter, or a speciallyequipped car to get to and from work - may be deducted in figuring if your work affects your benefits, even if they are also useful in regular daily activities, Hammons said.

Also under both programs, disabled beneficiaries are referred to State vocational rehabilitation agencies for training. Benefits continue for disabled people who medically recover while involved in an approved vocational rehabilitation program until the program is over.

"Using these work incentives, people find that their total income is usually greater by working then by not working," Hammons said. "Any many find that their earnings increase to the point where they are no longer dependent on their disability benefits."


Most Texas dove hunters will be allowed to take six whitewings per day during the mourning dove season, and hunters in the Central Zone will have an extra week during the fall season.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission set the early season migratory game bird season dates during a public hearing July 9 in Port Aransas.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service allowed the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to increase the whitewing daily bag limit from two to six in all but four Texas counties

- Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr and Willacy. In those counties, where the whitewing population still is recovering from a prolonged drought and the 1989 freeze that destroyed much of the citrus

whitewing nesting habitat, only two whitewings will be permitted per day during the regular season, the same as last year.

Dove hunters in the Central Zone (see dove hunting zones map) asked the department for a shorter winter season and longer fall season, said Ron George, TPWD dove program leader. In response, the commission approved taking the last seven days of the winter season and adding them to the fall season in the Central Zone. The Central Zone season this year will be September 1-October 30 and Jan. 3-12.

Despite a one-millionbird increase in the conti nental blue-winged teal population, the USFWS denied a request by the department for a September teal season. This year's 3.8 million teal represent a significant increase over last year's 2.8 million teal but is only slightly higher than the 3.6 million teal that existed when the season first was suspended in 1988. USFWS also denied TPWD permission to have a four-day special whitewinged dove season, instead leaving a two-day

season.

Dates for the mourning dove season are: North Zone, Sept. 1-Nov. 9; Central Zone, Sept. 1-Oct. 30 and Jan. 3-12; and South Zone, Sept. 20-Nov. 11 (ends Nov. 9 in Special White-winged Dove Area) and Jan. 3-19. Daily bag limits in all three zones is 12 mourning, whitewinged and white-tipped doves per day. The only exception is Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr and Willacy counties in the Valley, which will have a daily whitewing bag of two. Possession limit in all zones is twice the daily bag. Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

The Special Whitewinged Dove Season is Sept. 7-8 and shooting hours are noon to sunset. Bag limit south and east of Del Rio will be 10 whitewinged, mourning and white-tipped doves in the aggregate, including no more than five mourning doves and two whitetipped doves per day. Bag limit north and west of Del Rio is 10 whitewinged, mourning and white-tipped doves in the aggregate, including no more than two whitetipped doves per day. Possession limit is twice the daily bag. One fully-feathered wing is required on all dressed doves at all times in the South Zone and the Special Whitewinged Dove Area.

Dates for rail and gallinule hunting are Sept. 1-Nov. 9. Bag and possession limits for king and clapper rails are 15 daily in the aggregate and 30 in possession; Sora and Virginia rails, 25 and 25; and gallinules, 15 and 30. Shooting hours for rails and gallinules are onehalf hour before sunrise to sunset.







while balancing the risks of excessive supplies of possible shortages," Harris said.

Wheat producers who comply with the acreage reduction requirement will be eligible for target price protection at \$4.00 per bushel, the same as this year. Harris said the program will not have a paid land diversion.

The 1991/92 wheat crop is projected at 2.0 billion bushels, down 26 percent from last year's 2.7 billion-bushel harvest. The decline reflects an 8-million-acre reduction in planted area and lower yields. "This year, decisions to plant fewer acres were based on higher acreage reduction requirements, new flexibility provisions in the 1990 farm legislation, and lower wheat prices," the ASCS official said.
