Texas Jail Standards Commission Lifts Remedial Order On Jail

Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey and Sheriff Roland White have received a notice from the Texas Jail Standards Commission that the agency has vacated the Remedial Order on the County Jail. This is welcome news for everyone in Eastland County.

Jack E. Crump, Executive Director of the Commission, stated in a letter dated July 26: "At its regularly scheduled meeting on July 24, 1991, in

Austin, Texas, the Texas Commission on Jail Standards by motion, second and unanimous vote did vacate the Remedial Order issued Eastland County on October 3, 1986, based on inmate population being consistently maintained below capacity and properly classified."

This is the first time the order on the Jail has been rescinded since the facility went out of compliance. It has passed inspection

for several years now - 1988, 1989, 1990 and 1991.

At one time it appeared that the County would be ordered to expand the present Jail, which was constructed in 1980 with a 24-bed capacity. But thanks to the work of county officials this has been averted.

The cost of Jail expansion

was estimated at around 1.2 million, more than the cost of the present building.

A copy of the letter announcing the vacating of the Remedial Order was sent to Robert Dearing, a Supervising Inspector for the Texas Commission on Jail Standards. He has been making inspections of the facility.

Ranger Community Library To Hold Benefit Book Sale

The Ranger Community Library will hold a benefit book sale on August 3 from 10:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. at the library at 600 Pine Street. All proceeds from the sale will be applied to the reopening and operation of the library.

County Tax Appraiser Urges Vote For Amendment One

Ranger Kiwanis Club members and guests probably heard more than they wanted to at their Wednesday luncheon meeting about taxes and elections.

At best, it's very confusing, County Tax Appraiser Steve Thomas, guest speaker, pointed out, in attempting to bring some information for the upcoming Aug. 10th elections. That's plural elections on that day; there will be a State Constitutional Amendment vote at the regular voting site AND a local school location vote too.

The first Amendment proposal provides exemption and personal property taxation privilege to the newly-created County Education District. (Proposition Two is for the issuance of state bonds to finance higher education scholarships).

At the school vote, Mr. Thomas pointed out, voters will then mark their ballots "for" or "against" the exemptions and the personal property tax.

President Tony Betancourt presided. The new County Education District is made up of one representative from each school district in the county, and its purpose is to collect additional taxes and distribute them

through the local schools in an effort to equalize educational opportunities.

Mr. Thomas recommended that voters vote FOR the first amendment, and then vote for the exemptions and against the personal property taxes on the school ballot. He said personal property is generally anything that is not real estate or revenue producing property, and normally includes vehicles, boats, and travel trailers.

Absentee balloting is now underway for the two Aug. 10th election and will end on Aug. 6th.

On Monday night, 6 p.m. at Ranger Jr. College auditorium. Mr. Thomas will speak to the public on the elections.

News From Genealogical Publishing Company: IRISH PEDIGREES, The Origin and Stem of the Irish Nation by John O'Hart, Two Volumes.

O'HART'S Irish Pedigrees is the magnum opus of Irish genealogy, a vast and prodigious compendium of family history and source material. It is a work that can only be reprinted, for such a book cannot be written twice or even substantially improved upon.

The first volume explores the "origin and stem of the Irish nation." The old Irish genealogies assembled here are brought down to the lineal descendant of each family living at the time of the English dispossession, though a rather substantial number of the descents are brought down to the 19th century. In addition, this volume includes chapters on the "English invasion" and "Cromwellian Devastation" as well as a lengthy appendix with an extraordinarily detailed table showing families in possession of land in the 12th

century.

The first half of Volume II consists of Anglo-Irish genealogies, all of which are carried down at least to the period of the Commonwealth, and most to the last quarter of the 19th century. This section is succeeded by a detailed survey of the Huguenot and Palatine families of Ireland and a chapter on the Ulster Plantation and Scots settlers—with accompanying tables and extensive lists of names.

The latter half of Volume II contains lists of the principal families in Ireland grouped by century and thereunder by county; a list of Ulster Plantation adventurers; lists of Irishmen in the service of foreign countries, notably France, Spain, Austria, and the United States, including complete rosters of the officers of Meagher's Irish Brigade and Corcoran's Irish Legion who fought in the American Civil War; a list of the "Wild Geese" and their descendants; lists of kings, nobility, and gentry—ancient and modern—of all provinces and counties, with genealogical descents; lists of English and Welsh names; and lists of Irishmen in government.

An index of more than 100 pages neatly coordinates reading and research.

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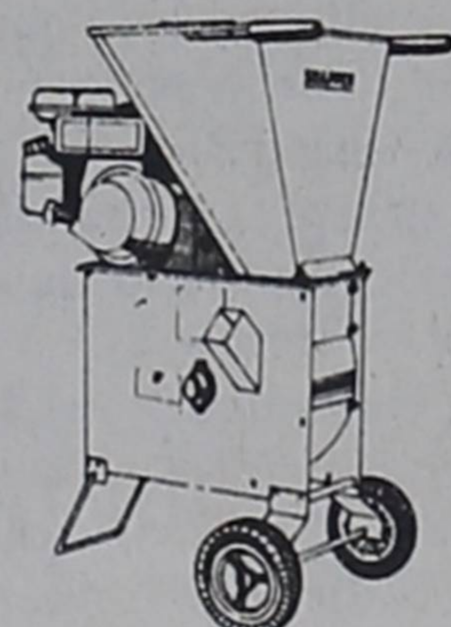

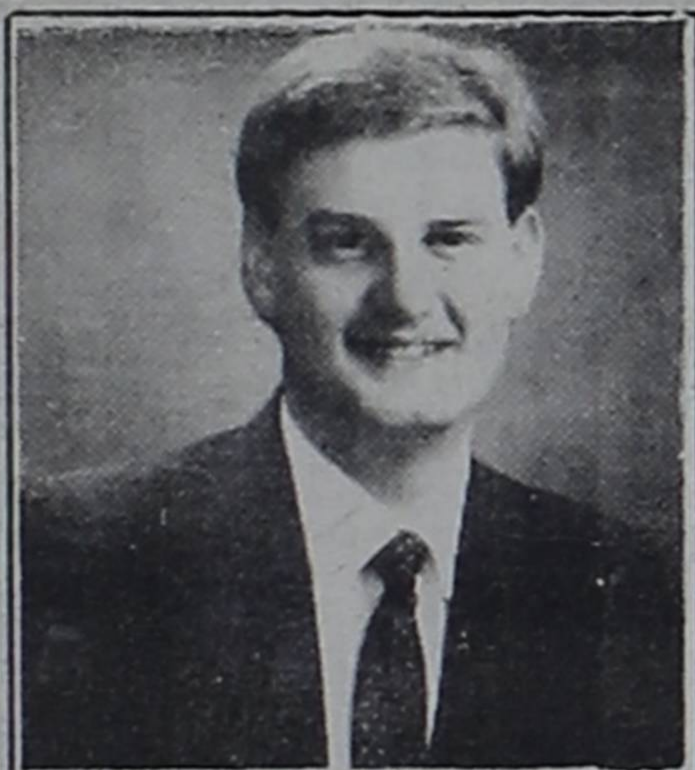
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Wedding Bells

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Letters To The Editor

Dear Editor,
 "The degree of government interference in our economic life will be determined in a large measure by the degree of social and moral responsibility and concern for the general welfare that free economic groups demonstrate. When these groups fail to carry out their basic social and moral responsibilities to the community, the vacuum created by such failure will inevitably be filled by greater government intervention." Walter P. Reuther, in a letter to President Eisenhower Nov. 28, 1956, as quoted in Reader's Digest, Oct. 1957, "Can We Solve Our Economy's Most Dangerous Problem?" by Harold B. Wess.

Today, everyone wants everything done for them by the government. So the government does it and they tell us how it is gonna be done. Instead of saving and investing for our old age, let the government take care of us. So they tell us how much or how little we are entitled to and they make us pay for it whether we want to or not. Wonder why the government interferes so much in our lives? Cause we told them to; we didn't want to do it ourselves. So now, they think they are suppose to live our lives for us. Well, I don't believe that I want to give control of my life over to the government; I'd like to start taking some of it back. Therefore, I am going to propose a simple, straight-forward solution to the present county-wide ambulance/emergency health care problem. I am going to call for everyone in Eastland

County to forget this notion of "what's in it for Cisco, what's in it for Eastland, what's in it for Ranger, ... Rising Star, Carbon, Gorman, etc.."

Now I don't know how many people live in the county, 50,000 can't be right. So, let us say 20,000. At \$15 per person; \$300,000, but there. But each individual person is the smallest unit of our free enterprise system. Every unit of the system must be a part of this program if we want to take back some control of our lives. Therefore, every business should join in. Let us again say that there are 2,000 different businesses in the county. We set up a scale depending on how big the business is, but if it averages \$100 per business; \$200,000. That's \$500,000 already. Shall I go on?

Think what we could do with such a program; a program similar in design

to Health Maintenance Organization. Everyone could have free emergency ambulance/EMT care. The tax money the county, cities and hospital districts are putting into this could go for other things. We could control it; as long as we all pull together we would never have to worry about the county, city or hospital pulling out on us.

I don't have it all figured out yet, no. But I do have some ideas.

1. An organization of members only; a co-op or something. 2. Never let it be a taxing entity; then you lose control of it. 3. The service would be free to all members, no if, and/or buts. 4. An elected board of 3 to 5 members to oversee the program, a hired person to make the day to day decisions.

If you want good basic emergency ambulance service, do nothing. Someone is waiting in the wings to step in and slap you with another tax to give it to you. Then they can tell you how much to pay for it, how little of service you will get, and make you pay when you use it to boot. If you want really good emergency ambulance service, then let's all join together and build one free of government control. But you can't afford it; can you afford more new taxes that get higher and go on forever? You can't afford it, so you'll let the government do it and let the property

owners pay for it. Then keep your mouth shut when the government steps in and taxes your car or TV to pay for it. You asked for it, remember? But what about those truly can't afford it; the ones in nursing homes, single mothers with 3 or 4 children, etc? If everyone will join in and do their part, pay their part, then reasonable human compassion will let us take care of these who can't pay. Besides, the nursing homes, as businesses, would pay their share, thus their employees and residents would be covered.

This will never work unless we all join in from the whole county, individuals; businesses, clubs, groups, etc. You can not let half the people do it and expect to ride on their coattails. You can not expect to take back control of your lives from the government by sitting around and waiting for the government to take care of you.

I quote again from Mr. Weiss in the Digest. "Unless the trend is reversed, we will end in the same plight as Great Britain and France, where featherbedding on the part of labor, restrictive practices and confiscatory taxes have almost destroyed the economy and brought both nations to the brink of, if not into, socialism." A couple of days ago, Paul Harvey said it best in so many

Without the amendment, there will be no funds for the state's student loan program after March 1992. An unprecedented increase in demand for student loans has depleted this self-supporting program. In 1988, 6,259 students received these loans. Last year the number of student borrowers increased to 26,239.

The Hinson-Hazlewood loan program functioned as a revolving fund between 1977 and 1989. No new bond sales were needed because loan repayments covered the cost of making new loans. But today's unprecedented demand requires the sale of additional bonds to support our college students.

Our future depends on wise choices today. Vote "yes" for Proposition 2. It will permit deserving young people to help pay for an education they otherwise might not be able to obtain.

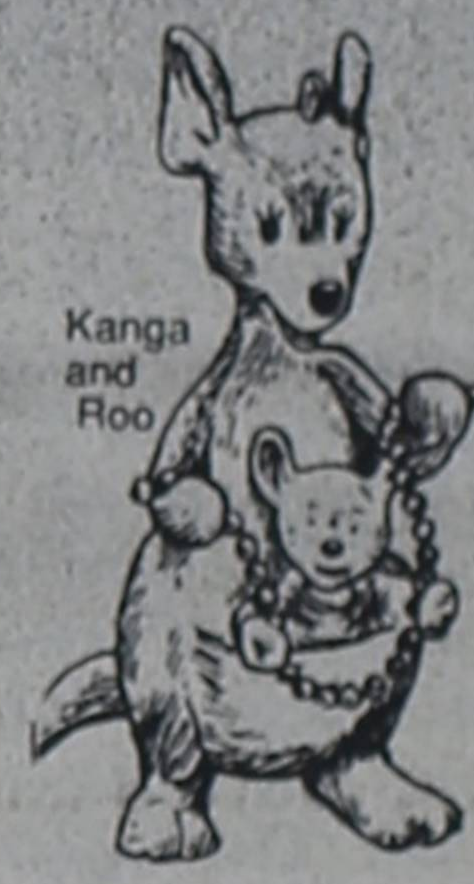

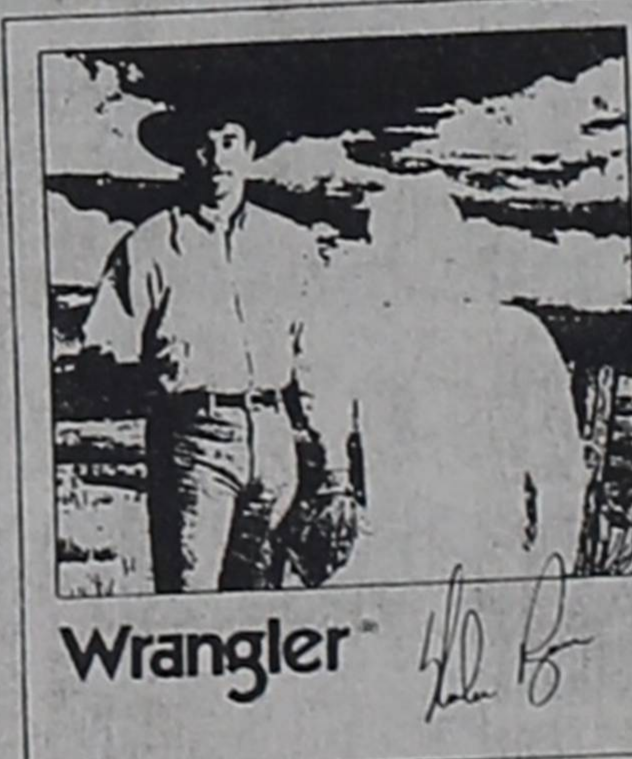

Children's Nutrition Tips For Back-To-School

School is just around the corner, and parents are beginning to shop for supplies. But a nutritionist at the Children's Nutrition Research Center in Houston says one obvious entry on the annual checklist is often overlooked - breakfast.

"It is the most important meal of the day, especially for children," said Janice Stuff, a research instructor at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Breakfast supplies 1/4 to 1/2 of the recommended daily allowance of vitamins and minerals. If you skip breakfast, it is hard to catch up during the day."

Mastering the three Rs requires a lot of energy. Without breakfast, children are usually hungry by midmorning. A hungry child is too cranky and too tired to concentrate on schoolwork, Stuff said. "Breakfast gives a child an energy boost improving his or her behavior,

attitude and physical and mental performance."

Healthy breakfasts draw on several of the basic food groups. Parents can fortify their mini-scholars by serving a dairy product, a protein, a bread or cereal and a fruit.

However, it is okay to vary the menu and offer foods that do not fit the traditional breakfast ideal.

Stuff suggests the following alternatives:

- * peanut butter and jelly sandwich
- * yogurt and toast with jelly
- * fresh fruit and cottage cheese
- * cheese and crackers
- * soup
- * popcorn
- * breakfast taco
- * leftovers

Before parents rush to the store and overstock the pantry with breakfast "goodies," Stuff encourages them to read labels. "Parents may discover they are giving their child a product that lists sugar, sodium or fat as a main ingredient," she said.

Sugar-coated cereals are an example. Stuff recommends that children be introduced to a variety of natural wholegrains.

Discretion is urged when selecting breakfast meats as well. "A number of breakfast meats are marked lean or lite. They may have fewer calories, but 70% of those calories may come from fat," Stuff said.

To add protein to the morning meal, she recommends either Canadian bacon or ham that has been prepared in a non-stick skillet or microwave oven. "Only 45% of the calories in Canadian ba-

con or ham come from fat. Despite good intentions, parents may undermine efforts to start their child's day on a healthy note.

According to Stuff, children's food choices and eating habits are influenced by the preferences of their parents.

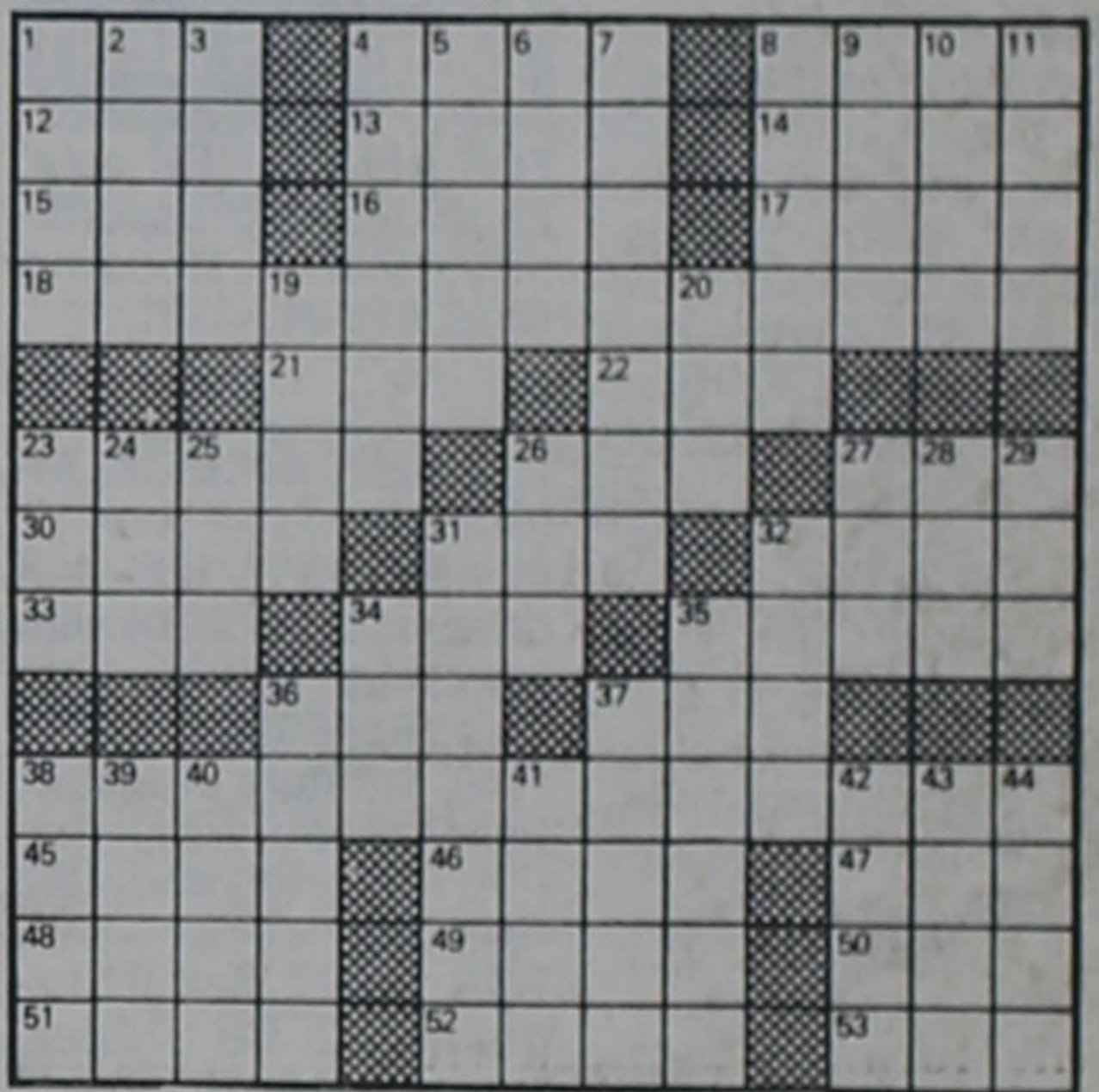
"Parents must set a good example, and Mom is an especially important role

model. If she sips coffee and munches on a doughnut, what kind of message is she sending her child?"

When possible, parents should also include the child in menu planning, shopping and meal preparation. The entire family should practice the ABCs of good nutrition.

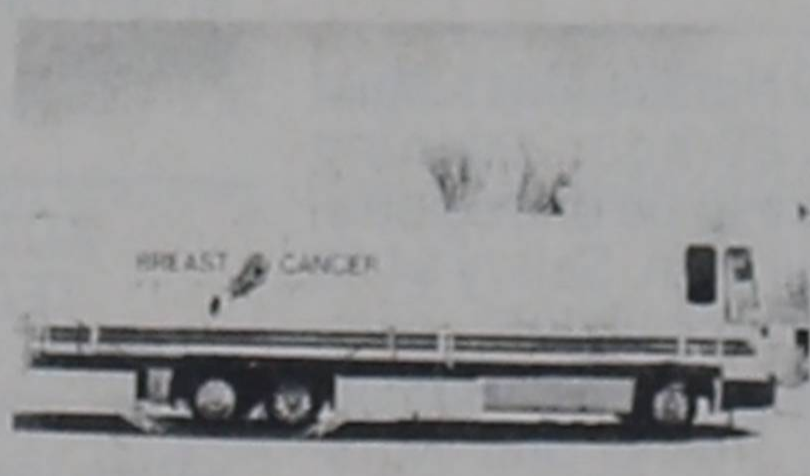

TDH Announces Health Objectives For Year 2000

This month, the Texas Department of Health began distribution of an important blueprint for future health called **Healthy Texans 2000 Partnership**. This document offers a vision of a new century of better health for all Texans.

The 74-page document is the product of a statewide effort involving more than 1,000 Texans from the public, private and voluntary sectors and is modeled after **Healthy People 2000**, a national strategy for improving the health of the nation during this decade. It addresses the prevention of major chronic illnesses, injuries and infectious diseases, including violent and abusive behavior, environmental health and HIV infection.

"The purpose of **Healthy Texans 2000 Partnership** is to make a commitment to three broad goals," said Dr. Robert A. MacLean, acting commissioner of health. "Those goals are to increase the span of healthy life for Texans, to reduce health disparities among Texans, and to achieve access to preventive health services for all Texans."

"This set of objectives for the year 2000 makes an important, compelling point to us and to all health policymakers: we can no longer afford not to invest in prevention," said

Dr. Ron J. Anderson, chairman of the Texas Board of Health. "Medical care alone will not eliminate the devastating impact of chronic disease on the disadvantaged, nor will it reduce the rate of infant mortality or the burden of homicide and violence or any of the other health problems borne by our society. From the perspective of avoiding human suffering as well

as saving wasteful costs in treating diseases and injuries that could have been prevented, the 1990s should be the decade of prevention in Texas."

The cooperative process, known as the Texas Health Objectives for 1990 and begun in the early 1980s to prevent and control the many serious health threats Texans face, continues with **Healthy Texans 2000**

Attention Hunters! If you need to take the hunter education course before fall hunting seasons, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department can help. Actually, even those who do not have to take the course can benefit from it.

Beginning Sept. 1, persons born during the period Sept. 2, 1971, through Aug. 31, 1975, must have completed a certified hunter education course to hunt legally in Texas. Also, if you plan to hunt in another state this fall, the course is accepted by all states and Canadian provinces.

"This course is designed

to teach hunter safety and responsibility, but we also want to make young hunters aware of their hunting heritage," said Terry Erwin, conservation recreation coordinator. "This course will make them a better hunter and more responsible sportsman. Hunters must realize that they will be held accountable for not only their own actions, but those of other hunters. Wouldn't you rather hunt with someone who is safe and responsible?"

While not mandatory for persons born before Sept. 2, 1971, it would be beneficial to all hunters to take the course.

We want to produce safe, knowledgeable, responsible and involved hunters. Even veteran hunters could use some refreshing," Erwin said. "The course will give you a reason to give back to the support instead of just being a taker of the resource." It also can help the mature hunter develop more effective hunting skills and provide information on how to prevent accidents.

Course topics include hunting heritage, the sportsman's role in wildlife management, safety and responsibility, understanding the basics of modern firearms, archery and muzzleloader firearms, survival and wilderness first aid, game laws, wildlife identifica-

SSI Benefits

Most people are surprised to learn that Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits go to children, but they do. In fact, we pay monthly SSI benefits to more than 350,000 disabled children under 18. About half of

this total are under age 10. Their payments average \$387, and in most States, they're eligible for Medicaid, which helps them pay their medical bills.

For children to get SSI, their disability must last, or be expected to last, for at least 12 months. More than half of the children currently receiving SSI have mental disorders. For example, they are mentally retarded autistic, or have serious psychiatric problems. Another fourth have disabilities of the nervous system or sense organs, such as blindness, deafness, or epilepsy. Many children born with leukemia, cerebral palsy, Downs Syndrome, or HIV positive, or who have other severe birth defects, also get SSI.

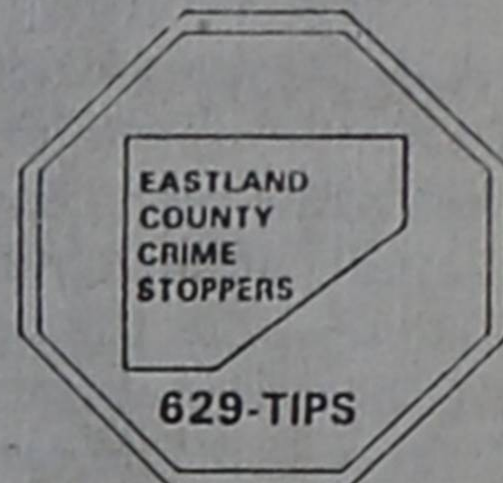
Social Security recently adopted new rules for evaluating children's disabilities. Under the new procedures, we look at how the child's disability keeps him or her from doing things children of a similar age can normally

do. Under previous rules, only children who met specific medical criteria were found eligible for SSI. The new rules mean many more children will be eligible for SSI.

In addition to being disabled, a child must have limited income and resources to qualify for SSI. We also consider the parents' income and resources, but a family doesn't have to be destitute for the child to get SSI. Many resources—like the family's home, for example—aren't considered. And we make allowances for other children living in the home.

Parents or guardians who have a child they think could qualify for SSI should contact a Social Security office. Or if you know someone with a disabled child, tell them about SSI. It can really make a difference.



Wool Promotion Referendum Is Set For August 19-30

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has scheduled a referendum Aug. 19-30 for wool producers to decide whether to continue a market promotion and improvement program.

Keith Bjerke, administrator of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said the proposed program, similar to one approved in 1986, would continue to authorize deductions from producer price support payments.

If the referendum is approved by a majority of either the producers voting or the producers who own a majority of the sheep represented in the referendum, deductions from wool price support payments would be established at a rate not to exceed seven cents per pound of wool marketed and not to exceed 35 cents per hundred weight of unshorn lambs for calendar year 1991.

For calendar years 1992 through 1995, the deductions may increase up to an additional one cent per pound of wool marketed

and up to an additional five cents per hundred-weight of unshorn lambs, per year.

The amounts deducted will be used by the American Sheep Industry Association to finance advertising and sales promotion programs for wool in domestic and foreign markets, and for information programs for producers on production management and market development and improvement.

ASCS county offices will distribute ballots in early August. Completed ballots must be returned in person to the county office postmarked by the August 30 deadline.

To be eligible to vote, a person must have owned sheep or lambs six months old or older for at least 30 consecutive days in 1990. A cooperative may vote on behalf of its members but if it does so its members are then ineligible to vote on their own capacity.

In the 1986 referendum, producers owning 67.8 percent of the sheep approved the program.

Weight Loss Surprises Researchers

WASHINGTON -- A nutrition organization was hopeful that a nutritionally complete "hi-tech" food tablet would help erase world hunger problems, until a study revealed that one of the ingredients could cause significant weight loss.

Researchers in Europe found that an ingredient in the aptly named product Food Source One actually caused people to lose weight, even though specifically instructed not to alter normal eating patterns, according to one study published in the prestigious *British Journal of Nutrition*. Researchers in an earlier study had speculated that the weight loss was due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calories.

While the development of Food Source One, a project of National Dietary Research, would not be used to successfully fulfill its original goal, the formula which has since been improved with other natu-

ral colloids has been a windfall for overweight people. A Daytona Beach, Florida woman fighting a weight battle for 12 years used the product on the recommendation of her physician and lost 30 pounds. She stated, "Not only have I lost 30 pounds but my cholesterol has dropped from 232 to 143. I have two closets full of clothes which have not fit me in two years that I can now wear." In a separate report, a telephone interview revealed that a Wilmington, North Carolina pharmacist lost 14 pounds in 3 weeks on the product and was never hungry.

On other political issues, Mrs. Sadowski says she opposes abortion. She also stands for more basic morality in laws and government, and is an advocate for more attention to issues affecting women.

Both Jeannie Sadowski and Dr. Sadowski say they have been well received on their campaign trips into towns of the 17th District.

"It's really an education, getting out and meeting the people," they declare. "That's what representatives need to do - find out what the people are thinking."

Mrs. Sadowski says 'the issues are the thing - and I will stick with them.' But she adds that she thinks a basic problem exists which causes representatives to lose touch with the people.

"I think one person can stay in office too long - can live in Washington until he doesn't understand what the people back home are thinking."

"I am in favor of limiting elected representatives to Congress to two four-year terms," Mrs. Sadowski states. "In that way they would have to step aside and give other people a chance to see if they can do a better job of running the government."

Jeannie Sadowski says she has been told she needs to hire a speech writer to compete with the professionals.

"No," she says, "I am not hiring anyone to write my speeches! When I talk to people I want the words to be mine - I want to stand behind every promise I make."

One of the main promises, she repeats, is to step up the ladder, which gives you that constant sense of achievement," Good said.

TDA ANNOUNCES MAJOR CATTLE SALE TO MEXICO, PURCHASE WORTH MORE THAN HALF-MILLION DOLLARS

AUSTIN—Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry today announced the sale of more than half a million dollars worth of cattle to the state of Yucatan, Mexico.

During the past three months, Texas Department of Agriculture livestock marketing specialists have assisted representatives of the government of Yucatan in purchasing 800 Brahman X Holstein heifers from three East Texas ranches. The heifers were valued at \$570,450. The cattle were shipped in stages through TDA's Brownsville export facility beginning in late May. Transport of the heifers were completed this week, Perry said.

"This large sale to the state of Yucatan is another example of the vast, worldwide appeal of Texas livestock," Perry said. "Our export pens have reported more than \$41.8 million in Texas livestock sales since Jan. 1 of this year, and on Monday of this week, we announced an additional \$1.3 million Brahman cattle sale to Thailand."

According to Dr. Roger Zapata, a representative of the government of Yucatan, the Brahman X Holstein cattle will be used in their livestock breeding program.

"Texas is well-known for producing quality breeds and having a large variety from which to choose," Perry said. "That's why we have launched a 'Texas Livestock - Best in Any Language' campaign that will promote Texas genetics internationally and will continue to increase our export sales."

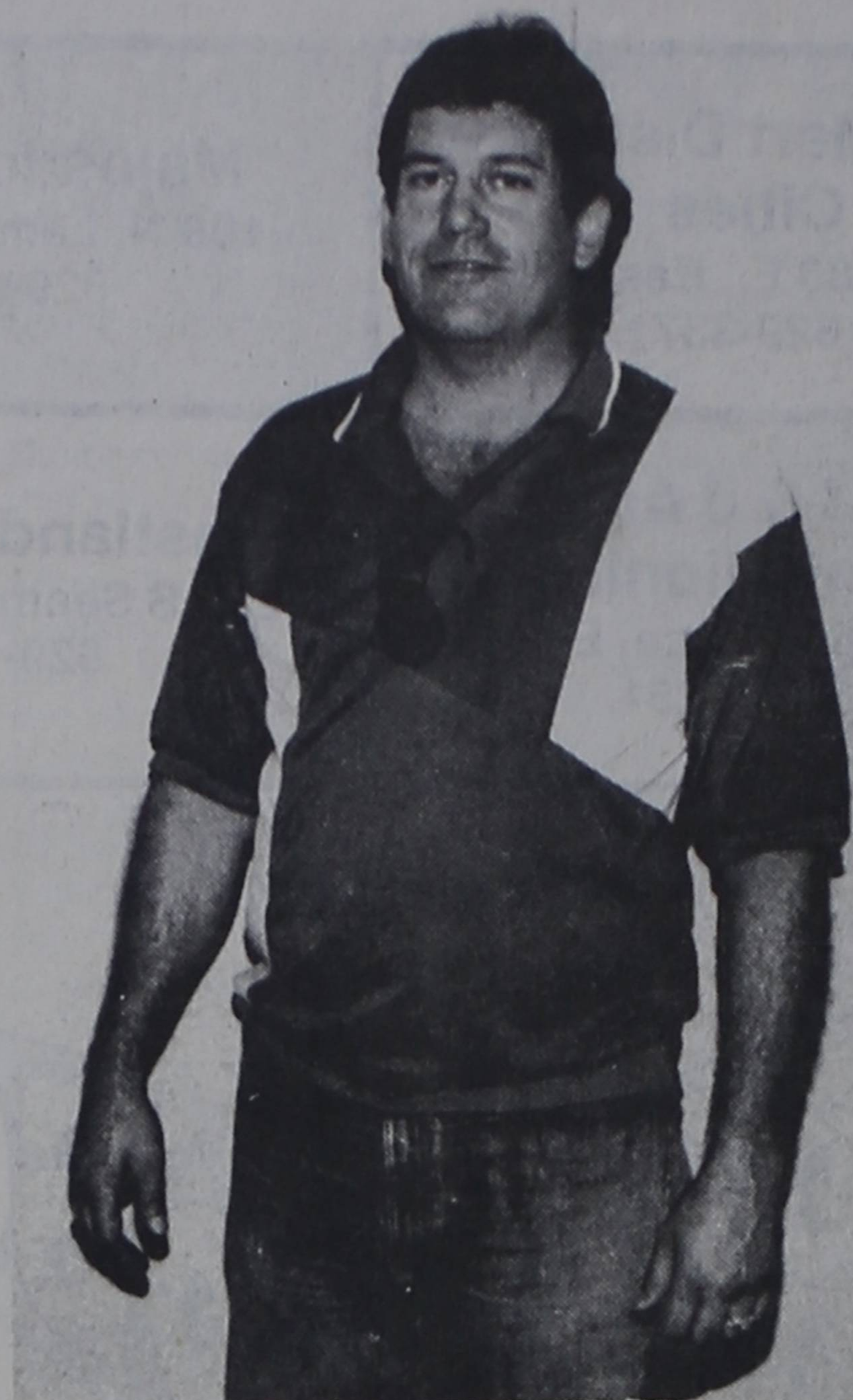
