ing the gel stage of development. Most pecans have entered the gel stage at this time. Once the pecans have entered the gel stage they are highly susceptible to female weevil egg lay.

Dr. Jesse Cocke, Extension Entomologist, recommends after the first insecticide application weevil activity should be monitored in 7 to 10 days. If weevils are present at this time, a second application is required. Draughty conditions can delay weevil emergence thereby requiring additional insecticide applications. It is important to check for weevils and weevil punctures every 7 to 10 days after each application of insecticide IT'S THE LAW! to assure that economic control is achieved.

Sevin 80S and Sevin XLR are recommended insecticides for control of the adult pecan weevil. Read and follow label instructions.

Heat milk, water and butter until very warm (125 to 130 degrees F); stir into dry ingredients. Stir in enough remaining flour to make soft dough Knead on lightly floured surface until smooth and elastic, about 4 to 6 minutes. Cover; let rest 10 minutes.

On lightly floured surface, roll dough to 12-inch circle or 10xl5-inch rectangle. Place on greased pizza pan or baking sheet. Bake at 400 F for 20 minutes or until done. Remove from pan; cool on wire rack. Sift confectioners' sugar on top. Cut into wedges, strips, or squares to serve. Serve with whipped cream cheese or creamy peanut butter, if desired.



...NEW BOOK RELEASE from GPC, Inc: ANGLO-AMERI-CANS IN SPANISH ARCHIVES, Lists of Anglo-American Settlers in the Spanish Colonies of America, by Lawrence H. Feldman. We often forget that a large chunk of colonial America was once under Spanish control. Indeed, between 1766 and 1784 Spain consolidated its domination, claiming jurisdiction over all or part of what are now the states of Louisiana, Florida, Mississippi, Alabama, Arkansas, and Missouri. Eager to exploit this territory, Spain opened it up to settlement and encouraged people living in the English colonies to the north and east to take up the land. When early in the 19th century this territory came under U.S. jurisdiction, the records of the colonial administration were sent to Cuba, thence to Seville, Spain, where they were housed in various archives.

In Seville, the researcher can still find the papers relating to the administration of the Spanish-American colonies, in particular, census lists, militia lists, oaths of allegiance, surrender lists, lists of landowners and slave-owners, and arrival lists. From the principal archives in Seville (e.g. Archivo General de Indias), and from other archives, Lawrence Feldman has extracted the names of about 7,000 Anglo-American settlers, arranging them in tabular format by state. Thus, from the records mentioned above, Mr. Feldman has compiled name listsand associated data (places of Ernest and Orrin Wesley. residencs, dates, occupations, etc.) from the records dealing with Mobile and Tombecbe' (Alabama), Pensacola and Augustine Saint (Florida), Baton Rouge (Louisiana), Natchez and Nogales (Mississippi), and New Madrid (Missouri), with smaller lists for Belize in Central America.

American researcher. Now, rescued from almost total oblivion, it is published with an informative introduction to Spanish archives and a complete index of names. 



The Eastland County Extension Program Council Executive Board and 7 local 4-H families conducted a study to determine how recycling can make a difference. Katy and Becca Siebert of the Eastland Junior 4-H Club, Holly Greenwood and Joanna Wallace of the Ranger 4-H Club, Amy Agnew of the Rising Star 4-H Club, Leigh Henke of the Cisco 4-H Club, Jeremy and Jessica Keith of the Olden 4-H Club and Ricky Agnew of the Nimrod 4-H Club and their families separated their household trash for 7 days to collect information on recycling.

The 4-H members and their families represent an average family of 4. Their household trash was separated into paper, aluminum, glass, HDPE plastic, compost material and other. Weights were

How did the Eastland County 4-H families' trash measure up to other Americans' trash? Research has shown that 84 percent of Americans trash is recyclable while in this study only 74.3 percent of the Eastland County 4-H families' trash was recyclable.

The composition of the local families trash was very similar to most American families trash. The composition the local families trash was 40.9% paper, 5.7% glass, 3.0% aluminum, 4.8% plastic, 19.8% food waste, and 25.7% other, while the average Americans' trash is composed of 40% paper, 7% glass, 8.5% metal, 8% plastic, 7.4% food waste and 11.6% other. Yard waste was not collected locally, but it makes up 17.6% of the Americans total waste.

BULLOCK PRAISES ANTI-CRIME PACKAGE

"Final passage of this bill is a monumental relief to the state and county governments that have literally been under siege," Bullock said.

Bullock said the plan, which will be phased in over a three-year period, calls on the state to add 25,300 prison beds including 12,000 beds designed for the drug abuse treatment of nonviolent offenders.

> County. "These Senators have worked long and hard on this legislation," Bullock said. "They deserve our thanks and our appreciation for a job well-done.'

The legislation next goes to the Governor for her signature.

EMPLOYMENT COMMISSION TIGH TENS CONTROL ON EMPLOYEE LEASING COMPANIES

Employee leasing companies are costing Texas taxpayers millions of dollars according to Texas Employment Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers. "Something should be done to stop the drain or many unsuspecting employers are going to be hit with major financial losses," she said, "and unless the issue is addressed soon, the tax revenue drain on the state will continue to increase, and both lavor and business will eventually suffer."

Texas has approximately 200 known employee leasing companies which exist to provide personnel services to other businesses. Employee leasing companies move a client company's entire work force on to

their payroll records and then lease the employees back to the client company. The arrangement is intended to take personnel matters such as insurance and payroll responsibilities away from struggling businesses and put them into the hands of the employee leasing company. "The concept is fine," said Nabers, "It is the results that are bad."

Atypical employee leasing company maintains an average of 32 clients with 13 employees per client, according to Nabers. Considering that the employees earn at least the taxable wage base of \$9,000 per year, the total taxable wage is almost \$1.5 billion per year. "Right now, the average TEC tax rate for employee






