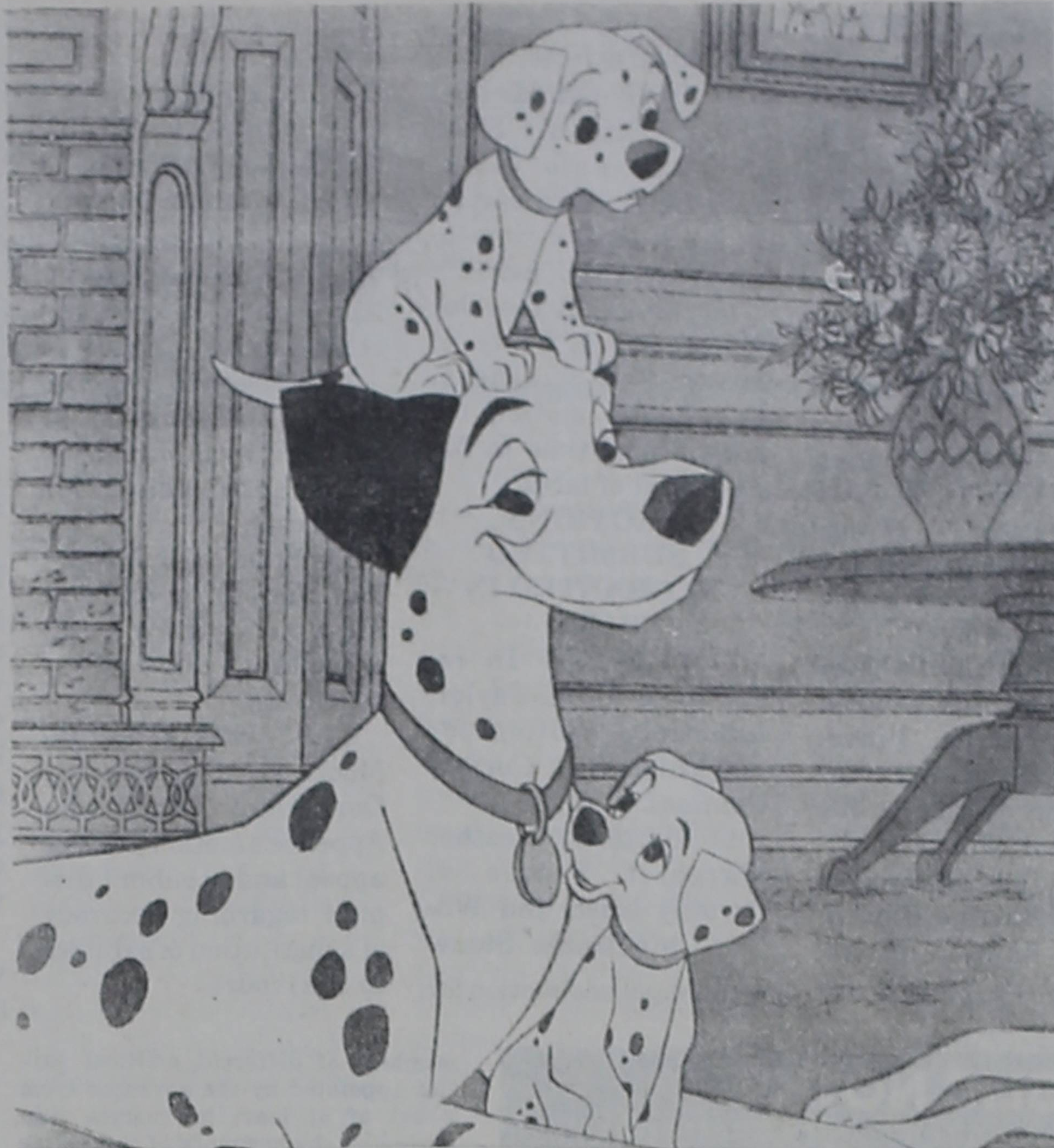
some great music again this year.
