



Prostate Screening Oct. 18

Prostate problems are common in adult men. Cancer of the prostate has been a serious concern as written in National Health News. It is estimated that about 50 thousand men will die of prostate cancer in 1991; and about 200 thousand new cases will be diagnosed. Numerous T.V. shows and radio talk shows have helped to increase the awareness of prostate problems in adult men.

There are three common diseases of the prostate that cause symptoms and need treatment. First, the most common is enlarged prostate. As man gets older the prostate, which is a donut shaped gland at the base of the urinary bladder through which urine passes, increases in size and obstruction of urine flow becomes progressive, a man finds that his urinary stream slows down. Men with enlarged prostate tend to go to the bathroom more often and may get up frequently at night to void. Frequency of urination occurs because the bladder does not empty completely with every attempt to void. Gradually the man may notice that it takes too long to urinate. With time as the blockage to urinary flow worsens, urgency follows and men may notice that they have to go to bathroom in a hurry, and they may even wet their clothes. As a cancer grows it may cause blockage to the flow of urine and diminish the stream of urine. Burning, urgency, blood in the urine, and frequency of urination are common symptoms of prostate cancer. Prostate cancer tends to spread to the back and hip bones and may cause bony pains.

It is important that if one has any symptoms of prostate disease that he be thoroughly examined by a physician. The Physician may then perform a variety of tests to diagnose the problem and treat it appropriately.

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

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

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the voters of this state to consider state debt questions in the form of ballot propositions that must clearly describe the amounts, purposes, and sources of payment of the debt only after approval of the propositions by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 11 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land for which there is not a valid transfer of title from either the State or the Republic of Texas to a private party. A patent is a document of title issued by the state. On application to the School Land Board, a person is entitled to receive a patent if: (1) the land is surveyed public free school fund land, (2) the land was not patentable under the law before the adoption of this proposed amendment, (3) the person acquired the land without knowledge of the title defect out of the State of Texas or the Republic of Texas and held the land under color of title, the chain of which dates from at least January 1, 1941, (4) the person has a recorded deed on file in the county courthouse and, in conjunction with his predecessor in interest, has claimed the land for at least fifty years as of January 1, 1991, and (5) the person, in conjunction with his predecessor in interest, for at least 50 years has paid taxes on the land together with all interest and penalties associated with any delinquency. If the applicant is denied a patent, the applicant may file suit against the School Land Board in a district court in the county where the land is located within 60 days from the date of denial. The proposed amendment does not apply to beach land, submerged land, or islands, and may not be used to resolve a boundary dispute. The proposed amendment also does not apply to land found by a court to be stateowned or to land on which the state has given a mineral lease that is in effect when a patent is sought. A patent under this proposed amendment for land within five miles of mineral production shall reserve minerals to the state in the manner provided by law for reservations of minerals in sales to claimants of unsurveyed school land within five miles of production. An application for a patent under this proposed amendment must be filed with the School Land Board before January

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment that would increase the total amount of bonds that may be issued by the Texas Water Development Board to provide wholesale and retail water and wastewater facilities to economically distressed areas of the state. The proposed amendment increases the maximum principal amount of the bonds from 20 percent to 50 percent of the \$500 million amount authorized by article III, section 49-d-7, of the Texas Constitution. The proposed amendment would increase the maximum aggregate dollar amount of bonds that the Texas Water Development Board could issue from \$100 million to \$250 million.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to increase from 20 percent to 50 percent the percentage of Texas water development bonds previously authorized by Texas voters that may be issued for economically distressed areas."

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance education loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury tion, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interests.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds not to exceed \$300,000,000 to continue existing programs to provide educational loans to students, with repayments of student loans applied toward retirement of the bonds."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION **NOVEMBER 5, 1991**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 114 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize home rule cities having a population of 5,000 or fewer inhabitants to amend their city charters by a majority vote of a city's qualified voters at an election held for that purpose. The amendment makes clear that home rule cities that have declined in population below the population required to initially adopt a charter may nevertheless continue to amend their charters.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing home-rule cities with a population of 5,000 or less to amend their charters by popular vote."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize the Texas Department of Transportation to expend money, from any source available, for the costs of the turnpikes, toll roads, or toll bridges of the Texas Turnpike Authority, provided that any monies expended from the state highway fund shall be repaid to the fund from tolls or other turnpike rev-

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment mandating the repayment to the Department of Transportation of monies expended to assist the Texas Turnpike Authority in the construction, maintenance, and operation of turnpikes, toll roads and toll bridges."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 26 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to invest, as authorized by law, moneys of the Veterans' Land Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board, the purchase of lands, or the payment of expenses. The bonds would constitute a general obligation of the state. The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of up to \$1.1 billion in general obligation bonds for acquiring, constructing, or equipping new prisons or other punishment facilities to confine criminals, mental health and mental retardation institutions, and youth corrections institutions, for major repair or renovation of existing facilities of those institutions, and for the acquisition of, major repair to, or renovation of other facilities for use as state prisons or other punishment fa-

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 39 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow a county, junior college district, or municipality to exempt tangible personal property from ad valorem taxation if: (1) the property is acquired or brought into the state in an enterprise zone to be forwarded outside the state, (2) the property is assembled, stored, repaired, maintained, manufactured, processed, or fabricated in the enterprise zone, (3) the property is transported outside the state not later than 175 days after being acquired or brought into an enterprize zone, and (4) the person who acquired or brought the property into an enterprise zone is a qualified business. A member who has served for one term and any part of a second term would not be eligible for reappointment. If the commission recommends a change in salary, the voters would be authorized to accept or reject the salary change at the next general election for state and county officers. Most of the anglers reported good numbers of 14 inch fish being caught with a wide variety of baits. Spinner baits seemed to work well in the stained water with worms doing better in the

clearer portion of the lake. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission on August 29 approved rules that allow the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to issue permits for persons to sell certain nongame fish taken from public fresh water.

The rules were needed because effective Sept. 1, Senate Bill 726 prohibits the sale of any fish taken from the public fresh waters of the state, with several exceptions, said Phil Durocher, acting director of inland fisheries. One of the exceptions is for those nongame fish regulated under Chapter 67. This chapter states, 'The department may issue permits for the taking, possessing, transportation, sale or exportation of a nongame species of fish or wildlife if necessary to properly manage that species.' The commission adopted rules to implement the permit authority.

'The law, which bans the sale of fish without a permit, is effective Sept. 1, but Parks and Wildlife Commission decisions can't legally take effect for 20 days. During that time fishermen can't sell fish and we can't issue permits,' Durocher said. 'The commission, during Thursday's meeting, expressed concern about the impacts this delay would have on legitimate operators and asked the staff to find a way to allow fishermen to stay in business until permits are available. We'll issue temporary permits allowing them to continue operating as they currently are.'

The temporary permit will be valid until October 15. To continue selling nongame fish, fishermen must get this temporary permit. Between now and Oct. 15, fishermen must apply for a long term permit under the new rules.

Amendments Pros, Cons

On Tuesday, Nov. 5, voters will be asked to vote on 13 amendments to the Texas Constitution. While some of these propositions are better known, such as Proposition Number 11 regarding the institution of a lottery, all are of importance,

These ballot propositions were passed through the Legislature as either a Senate or a House Joint Resolution amending the Texas Constitution. Each one received approval by at least two-thirds of the members of each legislative body, but does not become effective unless it receives voter approval. If a Constitutional amendment is adopted by the voters, then it becomes a part of the Constitution, and can only be changed or deleted by another popular vote after a Joint Resolution has again passed in each legislative body.

Durocher said applications will be reviewed and evaluated as to whether or not issuance of a particular permit will harm the resource.

Temporary permits are only for those currently fishing by legal means and methods,' he said. 'The temporary permit will give them time to apply for a regular permit.'

Nongame fish that may be sold by a permitted fishermen include alligator, shortnose, spotted and longnose gar, bowfin, gizzard and threadfin shad, common, grass and bighead carp, goldfish, bigmouth, black and smallmouth buffalo, river carpsucker, black and yellow bullhead, Mozambique, blue and redbelly tilapia, Rio Grande cichlid, silversides, mullet, shiners and minnows.

As you can see, chang-Texas the Constitution is an involved process requiring the approval of a large number of people. Therefore, I urge careful consideration of these proposals, as each one is proposing a change to the document which provides for

the rule of law in Texas. What I will do over the next few weeks is to explain each Constitutional amendment, and the arguments for and against each one. I hope this will then help you in making an informed choice concerning the propositions on the November 5th bal-

PROPOSITION NUM-BER ONE: "The constitutional amendment allowing a home-rule city with a population of 5,000 or less to amend its charter by popular vote."

Under the current law, if a home-rule city drops below the 5,000 population mark, it loses authority to amend its charter, and requires an act of the Legislature to make any changes. The recent census figures have officially placed the population of 36 home-rule cities below the the 5,000 population mark, thus prohibiting these cities from amend-

ing their charters. Arguments for: These 36 cities have been operating for decades with the ability to amend their charters by popular vote. These cities should not be prevented from amending their charters because their populations have decreased.

Arguments against: The amendment did not go far enough. It proposes to remove the restriction regarding the amendment of a charter, but does not remove the population restriction regarding the adoption of a charter.

PROPOSITION NUM-BER TWO: "The Constitutional Amendment mandating the repayment to the Texas Department of Transportation of monies expended to assist the Texas Turnpike Authority in the construction, maintenance, and operation of turnpikes, toll

roads, and toll bridges." This amendment would permit the Legislature to allow the Texas Department of Transportation to allocate funds to the turnpike authority by legislative appropriation. If the money to construct, maintain and operate a turnpike came from the highway fund, then it would have to be repaid from tolls and other turnpike revenue. Arguments for: This

would allow metropolitan transportation needs to be met more efficiently because turnpikes built can be built to the same stanquickly than by using federal funds. Toll roads are usually built in hightraffic areas, and revenues can be expected to repay their cost, thus freeing up more State highway dollars for other highway projects. The Texas Turnpike Authority can earn a better bond rating if the State provides money for turnpikes, thus saving money on the actual building costs and reducing the cost to motorists using the turnpike.

Arguments against: Texans should not have to support toll roads with tax dollars, because toll roads are supposed to be self-supporting. Toll facilities could be built on projected growth. If the growth does not occur, then the project would become unprofitable resulting in State debt. The amendment could lead to a proliferation of toll roads above and beyond the actual need. Finally, toll charges can strain the budgets of those with fixed or limited incomes.

PROPOSITION NUM BER THREE: "The Constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to further implement and enhance the administration of veterans' housing assistance and land pro-

grams and to expand the investment authority of the Veterans' Land Board.

Arguments for: This amendment would result in an increase in investment income by allowing bond proceeds to be invested-in investments with higher yields than those of the Federal govdards as freeways more ernment. It would also allow greater investment flexibility.

Arguments against: The elimination of the Constitutional requirement that bond proceeds be invested in bonds and obligations of the federal government only could create an opportunity for more risky investments. Investing in Federal government bonds and obligations are prudent investments and are good public policy.



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

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) soon will publish new rules governing the disposal of automobile batteries. Under a law SB 1340 which became effective Sept. 1, lead-acid automobile batteries are no longer permitted i municipal landfills and must instead be recycled.

The Texas Board of Health, at its Aug. 24 meeting, adopted emergency rules for public compliance with the law. Those rules are now published in the Texas Register. Final rules will be adopted after a Sept. 25 public hearing and a review of public comments

ending on Oct. 11. The law further requires that all battery retailers must accept used batteries offered for recycling. Similarly, battery wholesalers are required to accept, and pick up within 90 days, used batteries collected by their

retail customers. Retailers also must post signs advising the public about the new requirements. The law specifies the wording for the signs, and the signs themselves will be produced and dis-

tributed by TDH. the authority to enforce compliance with the recycling law. According to T.A. Outlaw, cheif of the TDH Bureau of Solid March 1, 1992, as part of

Waste Management, "The inspectors may issue warnings or citatins to any battery retailer who fails to post the new signs. The penalty for failing to post the sign within three days of receiving a warning can be as much as \$100 a day."

Outlaw added, "Besides posting the required signs, business must collect a fee on the wholesale or retail sale of any leadacid battery." For each battery with a capacity of at least six volts but less than 12 volts, the fee is \$2. For batteries of 12 volts or more, the fee is

All such fees from battery sales mut be reported to the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts on or before the 20th day f the month, following the month in which they were collected. Reporting forms and information about fees are available from the Comptroller's office at 1-800-252-5555. Comptroller's office will deposit battery sale fees into the Hazardous and Solid Waste Remediation


