

**Patricia Crawley Has Been Selected To Attend The National Young Leaders Conference**

Patricia Crawley of Ranger has been selected to attend the National Young Leaders Conference from October 22 to 27, 1991 in Washington, D.C. Having demonstrated academic achievement, leadership and citizenship, Patricia will be among 350 outstanding high school students from across the nation at the conference sponsored by the Congressional Youth Leadership Council. Patti is a Senior at Ranger High School and the daughter of Sissy and Doug Crawley.

The theme of the National Young Leaders Conference is The Leaders of Tomorrow Meeting the Leaders of Today. Throughout the uniquely designed six-day conference, Patricia will meet with key leaders and newsmakers from the three branches of government, the media and the diplomatic corps.

Highlights of Patricia's week in Washington will include welcoming remarks from a Member of Congress on the Floor of the United States House of Representatives and a panel discussion led by prominent journalists at the National Press Club. Patricia will explore presidential decision-making in a simulation entitled "If I Were President." Patricia will also visit the diplomatic embassy of either Lebanon, Finland, Sweden or Sri Lanka.

Patricia will meet with

Senator Lloyd Bentsen, Senator Phil Gramm, Representative Charles W. Stenholm, or designated staff members. These meetings provide students an opportunity to discuss important policy issues and focus on topics of personal concern to Patricia. Culminating the National Young Leaders Conference will be The Mock Congress on Gun Control during which scholars assume the roles of United States Representatives by debating, lobbying, and voting on proposed handgun legislation.

Founded in 1985, the Council is a non-profit, non-partisan educational organization committed to recognizing outstanding youth like Patricia and providing them with a "hands-on" civic learning experience in the nation's capital. Over 375 Members of the United States Congress join in the commitment to educational excellence as members of the Council's Honorary Congressional Board of Advisors.

"I firmly believe that by touching one life, the National Young Leaders Conference enriches thousands more," said John Hines, Council Executive Director. "Scholars return to their schools and communities charged with the lifelong duty of leading all Americans to better understand their rights and responsibilities in this participatory democracy."

**County Food Pantry Receives More Donations And Volunteers**

Persons attending the Eastland County Resource Association meeting Thursday, Oct. 3 hear an update on the Food Pantry from Volunteer Lois Robinson.

Mrs. Robinson said she was very pleased with the response from Churches and individuals to appeals for food to stock the pantry.

Other volunteers had offered to help Mrs. Robinson and the other individuals who had been keeping the pantry open. Tina Ford and Doris Pickens of Eastland have volunteered to work at the facility.

Corrie Cowley and several Girl Scouts have helped unload food and put clothing away. They will continue to assist at various times.

Mrs. Robinson said more volunteers can be used, including persons who will do repair and carpentry at the trailer where the pantry is located. This address is 204 N. Lamar - on County property just northeast of

the County Jail. The phone number for the pantry is 629-2132, and the facility is open Monday, Wednesday and Friday, 1 p.m. - 4 p.m.

"If we can get more donations of food and more volunteers we can keep the pantry open longer each week," Mrs. Robinson said.

She reported that 32 families were assisted with emergency food during the month of September.

At the County Resources meeting Mrs. Robinson was presented a check for \$100 from the Seventh-Day Adventist Church. She reported that the previous day another check for \$100 had been given to her from an individual who wished to remain anonymous.

She also had an inspiring report of the generosity of many churches in this area, most of which give regular support of food, money or both.

**Visitors Express Gratitude To Community**

Some visits are so special that they leave a bright afterglow. That's the way the weekend of September 27-29 was for Rosalie Leslie Loreto of Eastland, when four nephews from the New York City area visited in her home.

These Loreto nephews are part of the family of the late Justice Charles A. Loreto, Rosalie's husband. Judge Loreto's career included twelve years on the Municipal Court and 15 years on the New York State Supreme Court. He died in Eastland on July 1, 1990.

The son of Italian immigrants, Charles Loreto grew up in a large, loving and closely-knit family. All his nieces and nephews meant a lot to him, but these four-sons of his brother, James - had a special place. For he had lived in their home for several years before his marriage to Rosalie Leslie, Texas native and Assistant Dean of Women at the University of Maryland.

The visitors welcomed by Rosalie Loreto Friday included Dr. James Loreto, an optomologist from Bethesda, Maryland, near Washington, D.C. Dr. Loreto's specialty is eye surgery. Also in Eastland was Thomas Loreto of Harrison, New York. Thomas Loreto works in the New York Metropolitan area as Group Supervisor, U.S. Customs Dept. One of his responsibilities is John F. Kennedy Airport.

Also in the group was Alfred Loreto, of North Port, Long Island, N.Y. Alfred Loreto is a Technology Instructor in the Public School System on Long Island. Another visitor, Richard Loreto of Orangeburg, N.Y., works in the N.Y. Metro area. He is Project Manager/Asst. Superintendent for New York City Electrical Contractor. His area of supervision includes JFK Airport, La Guardia Airport, Shea Stadium, etc.

How these brothers managed to take off time and coordinate their visits required some planning!

But they did manage, for they had a special purpose in mind. That was 'to express gratitude to family friends and all the good people of Eastland for helping Uncle Charles and Rosalie during the last days of his life.'

As they made the flight to Texas the memory of 'Uncle Charles' was vivid on the minds of these men. They remembered the many times that had visited in his room, and the encouragement he had given them.

The brothers arrived at the DFW Airport Friday morning, then hurried to Eastland in time for lunch. Aunt Rosalie had a wonderful meal waiting, and the visiting began right there.

Later the group went to the Eastland Cemetery to take flowers to the grave of Judge Loreto. Father Tom Tetzar, Priest of the area Catholic Churches, offered a prayer of gratitude for the life and example of the Judge.

The Loretos nephews had previously met Father Tetzar in New York City, where in July 1990 he officiated at a Memorial Service for Judge Loreto.

The next stop was at the home of family friends Tom and Dee Neville. The Nevilles and Charles and Rosalie Loreto became friends when Mrs. Neville worked as a secretary for the Judge in the mid 1990's.

At that time he was retired and spending much of the time in Eastland working on his memoirs. These were compiled into the well-known book 'In the Name of Justice', published in 1985.

A stop at Eastland Memorial Hospital gave the nephews an opportunity to tell doctors, staff and personnel how much they appreciated the good care given to their Uncle. They were very pleased with the facility.

Late Friday afternoon the Loretos went to the home of Judge and Mrs. Austin McCloud.

The McClouds had a group for dinner. 'And what a dinner!' says

Rosalie Loreto. There was good food, good company, and many interesting topics to discuss. The visitors also enjoyed a video presentation of the 'Polo on the Prairie' fund raiser for M.D. Anderson Cancer Center.

Saturday morning dawned bright and beautiful - a great day for touring the area. First stop was at the Conrad Hilton Hotel in Cisco, which the visitors found interesting. Although the building was not open, they enjoyed reading the Historic Marker and looking around the grounds.

Heading northwest toward Albany, the Loretos were intrigued by Moran. Why did this small town have five exits off the highway, they asked? They stopped to take pictures of the 'Yacht Club' and other local scenes.

The rolling hills and wide vistas toward Albany drew their eyes. They found the town full of atmosphere. There was an interesting stop at the Old Jail Museum, where documents were most attentive.

But the modern world soon intruded - two Patriot Missile launchers were being hauled down the streets of Albany.

At noon the visiting nephews said they 'didn't want the same kind of food we can get in New York City - we want some real barbecued beef!'

They were directed to a barbecue place (Cook's) where mesquite wood was used in a grill. The food was great, Rosalie Loreto reports.

At the barbecue place the easterners saw two 'real' cowboys sitting and eating with their hats on. They began to want western hats like those fellows were wearing, but were told there was no 'Western Wear' store in Albany.

So they made a quick run to Breckenridge, where six cowboy hats were purchased - four for the adults, and two for children back home.

When the group reached the Eastland area they drove on to the Bob Perkins home at Lake Leon.

They said Lake Leon was very scenic - they 'loved' the area.

'I'd like to pitch a tent here at Bob Perkins,' one of the visitors remarked.

After a good visit there, the group came into town for a Saturday night dinner at the First Methodist Church. Speakers on mission work were being featured during the program.

'Can we wear our big hats to the Church?', a nephew inquired.

'Of course', Rosalie Loreto replied. 'But I hope you don't leave them on your heads while you eat - like those cowboys did in Albany!'

So the hats were carefully hung up in the Church, with assurances that no one present at the program was apt to take them!

The event at the Church gave another opportunity for the Loretos to say 'thank you for your prayers and kindness.'

The visit began to wind down - only another night at the Loreto home in Eastland, then back to the DFW Airport and big city living. But as the men discussed impressions of their stay, various observations surfaced.

They were most impressed by the friendliness of the people in the area, and the 'laid back' atmosphere. They were amazed at the way people waved at each other, especially drivers on the roads.

They were astonished at the low prices of houses in Eastland County. One nephew said he was spending more on taxes for his home in a New York suburb than it would take to buy a home here!

The visitors were impressed with the number of Churches in the towns, and gratified to find 'no saloons' in Eastland and Cisco. 'That's good!' they commented.

Alfred Loreto, who restores old cars, was especially interested in some old cars he saw on a lot in Cisco, and others spotted in various places. 'No

**POINTS TO PONDER**

Last week as I was out side the registrars office at Ranger Junior college putting a parking permit on my truck bumper Dean Leonard Marusak stopped beside me. We talked for a few minutes about pet peeves. It was a casual conversation but one that I have reflected on since then. Of some of the things that might be called peeves to me is the people who are unwilling to see there may be other sides of an issue.

I listen to a Dallas radio station KLIF, there are two host of talk shows who are at the opposite political spectrum. One is very liberal politically and the other is very conservative. The people who call in either totally agree with them or rant at them because they don't agree with them. There seems to be little room for compromise.

The other day the issue was abortion. The pro-life group left no room for compromise. The argument was life is so sacred that it must not be taken by abortion. I agree life is sacred in fact the Bible states "Thou shalt not kill," but that doesn't apply just to unborn fetuses. That applies to all areas of life. The argument continued that there are people begging to adopt children, all one has to do is look in the paper at the ad of those seeking children to adopt. Again in most case these ads are for beautiful perfect new born children, not for

those who were born with drug adictions because of addicted mothers. Nor are there ads for children who are eight, and up, who are available to be adopted. Few want to adopt children who may have been abused, arrested, or have phycological problems. When pro-lifers start caring as much for those kids as much as they do for unborn fetuses they will have a much stronger case.

On the other hand those who call for abortions on demand are not listening to the other side of the issue. Abortion should never be used as just another contraceptive device. For it isn't the destruction of a human life. The Bible states "Thou shalt not kill." Another point that the pro-abortion group fails to acknowledge is that they would like the tax payers to foot the bill for all abortions. This should not be excepted in cases where abortion is justified and there are such case, and when the woman involved is unable to pay. A woman should not be forced to bear a child that is the results of incest, or rape. But abortion isn't the answer to all unwanted pregnancies.

In both issues there is room for dialog, understanding and compromise. If we really want to be Christians and act like Christians we need to take our families to Church and learn how to be Christians and "love one another."

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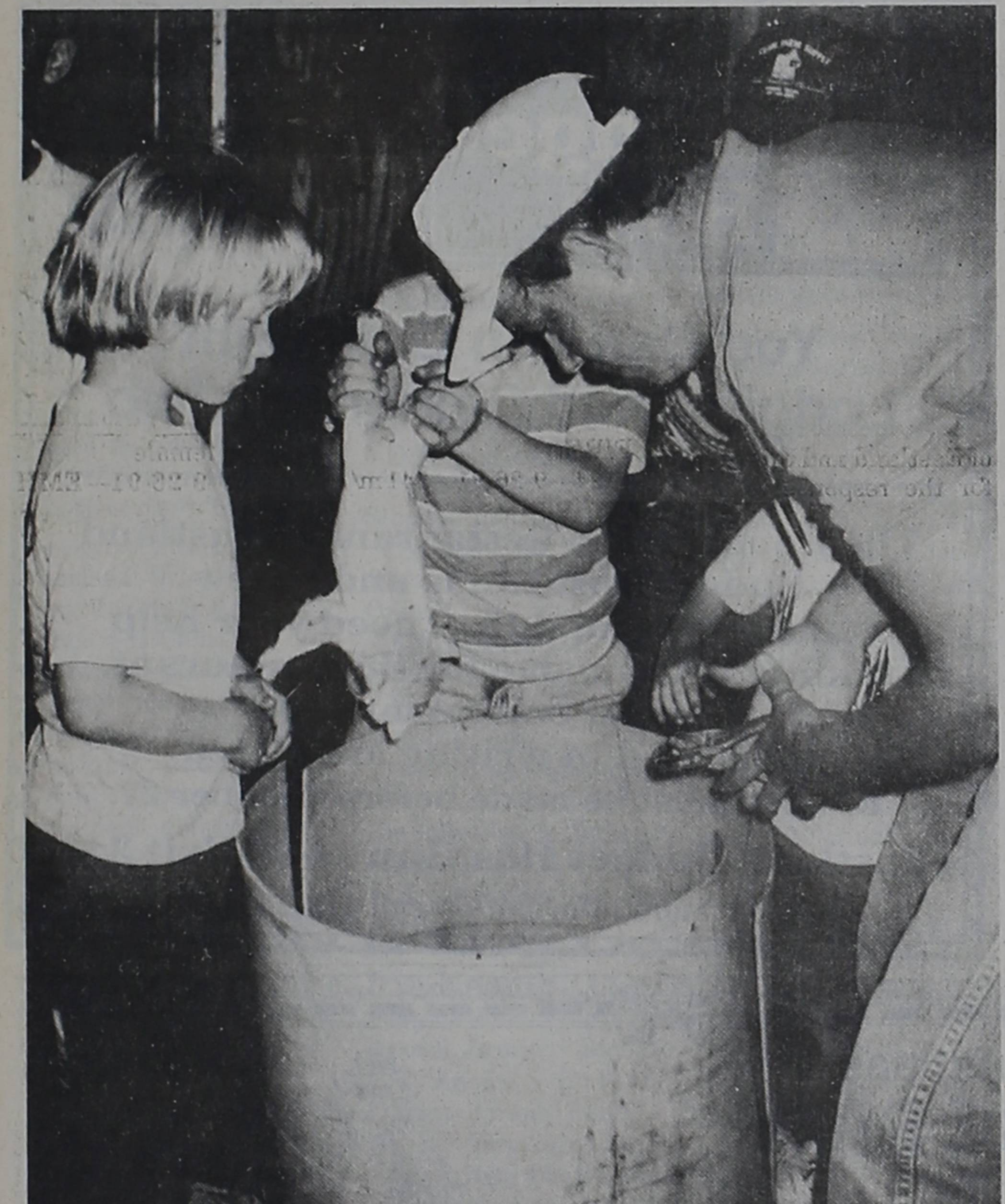

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## Social Security 800 Number Is New

The Social Security Administration (SSA) changed its toll-free telephone number as of October 1, 1991, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene said. The new number is 1-800-SSA-1213.

The SSA number change resulted from Congressional legislation that requires Federal Government agencies to convert to a new telecommunications system called "FTS 2000." Since

the new system is managed by a different service carrier than the agencies had used in the past, SSA had to change its toll-free number.

Hammons said that since its nationwide implementation 2 years ago, the 800 number service has become a popular option for people who have Social Security business. Callers find that their requests can be handled easily, conveniently, and expeditiously by phone. In many instances, their business can be completed at the time of the initial

call. Recent studies show that more than two-thirds of the 800-number callers prefer using the telephone over having to visit a Social Security office in person.

SSA also offers a telephone response unit that uses an automatic script to speed the processing of certain routine requests.

Service on the 800 number is available weekdays from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. But, the best times to call are early in the morning or late in the afternoon, Wednesday through Friday after the first week of the month.

## Oil Operators To Hold Meeting On October 15

A meeting for all area oil operators will be held at the Eastland National Bank building meeting room at 7 p.m. October 15. Purpose of the meeting is to discuss recently passed Senate Bill 1103, its severe adverse economic effects on stripper operators and what options or defensive action that operators should take to achieve relief from the bills provisions.

Senate Bill 1103 is a revenue raising bill requiring all operators to provide funds to plug wells abandoned by others in the past, mostly promoters in the boom years, by assessing annual fees and or bonds for each well owned by the operator.

S.B. 1103 will impose economic hardship on stripper operators who will bear most of the cash burden, and could force many into bankruptcy.

If this is allowed to happen, local school districts will see a sharp decrease in revenue as well as the county and any other taxing jurisdictions in the areas dependent on stripper wells for revenue. This would result in a tax increase on real property such as farms, homes and businesses.

Additionally jobs will be lost in oil field and related industry.

In these difficult economic times, decreased tax revenues increased taxes on real property and lost jobs is not an acceptable alternative.

A recent meeting in Cross Plains was very successful and well attended. Your presence at the Eastland meeting on October 15 is needed.

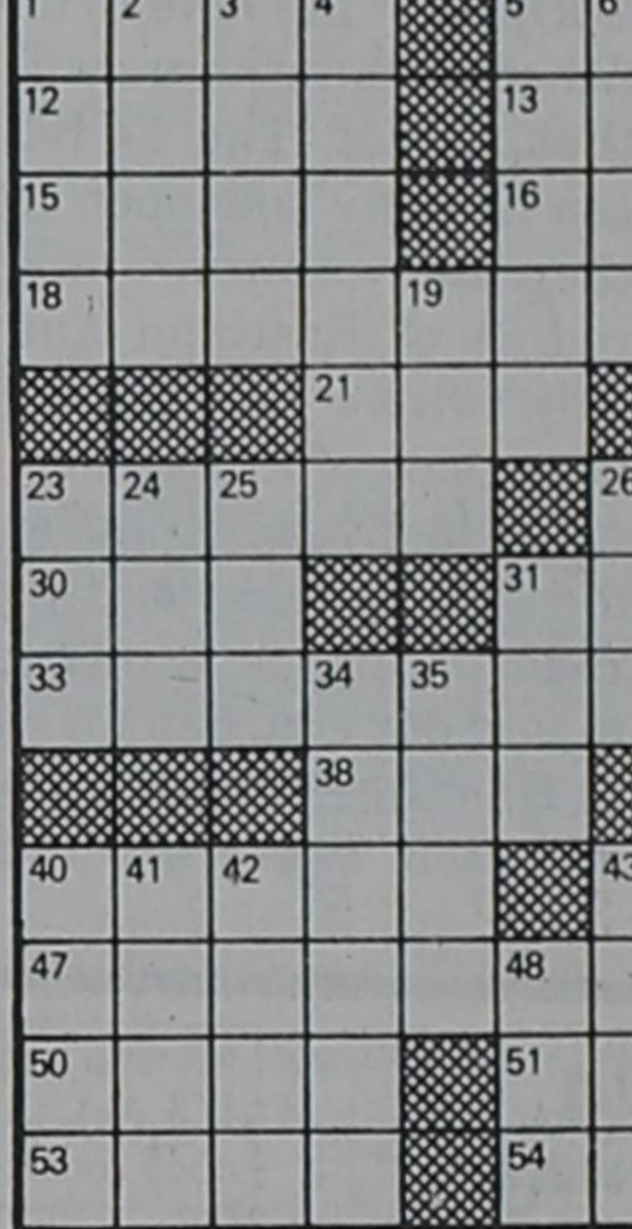

At greatest risk from severe effects of the flu are the following groups: adults and children with chronic disorders of the heart and lungs, including children with asthma; residents of nursing homes or other chronic-care facilities; and otherwise healthy people who are 65 or older. Physicians, nurses, and other personnel who have contact with high risk patients, and providers of home care to high risk persons such as visiting nurses, as well as all household members, including children also need to be vaccinated because they can transmit influenza to high risk persons.

Other groups who should consider immunization are: the general population - anyone who wishes to reduce the chance of acquiring influenza infection; persons infected with HIV, and foreign travelers.

To be protected, the American Lung Association of Texas and the Texas Department of Health recommended that high risk individuals get their flu shot now. "Influenza kills each year, despite the fact that it is a preventable disease," said Harris.

"With the availability of effective vaccines, the number of deaths caused by the flu can be substantially decreased." Vaccinations may be obtained by calling your physician or local health department.
