

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**COUNTY COMMISSIONERS POSTPONE ISSUANCE OF INDUSTRIAL REVENUE BONDS**

Eastland County Commissioners Tuesday postponed action on a Resolution approving issuance by the Eastland County Industrial Development Corp. of industrial revenue bonds.

The bonds will be used to purchase land and finance the construction of a tire recycling plant. (South Texas Tire Recovery Inc. project). This plant is expected to be located south of Olden across I-20.

Dick Wooley, a banker and officer of the industrial board, called the delay technical and temporary.

County Judge Scott Bailey said the bond approval item will be listed on the agenda for 1:30 p.m. at the regular Commissioners meeting on Monday, Oct. 28.

On another item, the Commissioners agreed for Sheriff Ronnie White to sign a contract with the Texas Criminal Justice

Commission Institutional and Parole Division to house state prisoners in private prisons.

These are prisoners which have been arrested in Eastland County on "Blue Warrants," and they are housed here until the State picks them up, which sometimes takes a number of months.

Judge Bailey said the agreement could save the County thousands of dollars each year. Right now there are three or four of

these prisoners in the county jail.

There may be restrictions on which "blue warrant" prisoners the State will accept for the private prisons. One stipulation will probably be that the prisoner must be in good health, the Commissioners were told.

The Commissioners concluded this called meeting with an Executive Session to consider possible litigation and discuss insurance cover-

**"THEY'RE TEARING DOWN THE FRIGID QUEEN-A MEMOIR"**

In the early fifties the "FRIGID QUEEN" was already a thriving enterprise selling cokes and hamburgers and camaraderie to teenagers in hot-rod Chevys and Ford "pick-em up" trucks, and to the young at heart in old Studebakers and fancy Pontiacs. If you were bored, hungry, thirsty or just curious, you hopped into your vehicle (whatever vintage) and made a drag down Main Street, but you seemed always to wind up at the "Fridge" as it was affectionately called in those days. Everybody went to the Fridge for something at least once a week; most visited regularly everyday.

When I came to Ranger in 1952 there were five of us brash, green, brand

new teachers who were out to save the world. Betty labored to change ingrained West Texas speech patterns; Mary Joy and Carol spent long hours hammering math and science concepts into young minds; Fred was the talented and ambitious new band director; and I spent the first five years here dispensing information in the domestic arts. I well remember those times when our group "went to the Fridge." Early on, Fred's witty critical comment that the "Frigid Queen" might be the worst name a fast food place ever had, may have been typical of our first reaction; but soon, we too, fell under the spell of the "old girl" and made visits there a

regular part of our recreational life. As those early years passed, our group diverged and one by one most moved away; as did more and more of our local population.

The Fridge still thrived in the sixties and seventies, catering to the young people of a shrinking community and serving as one of the only bright spots for teens who had no indoor movie, bowling alley, skating rink, ice cream parlor, or Friday night sock hops. I still went to the Fridge sometimes; in later years with my teenage daughter who has her own memories of "dragging Main and meeting at the Fridge." How many romances started there? How many girls managed to meet a boy there even

as they waited to be old enough for "real" dates? How many hearts were broken as pairs changed partners at the Fridge?

But, alas, as the times changed, so did the Fridge: first the ownership, then the name, and lastly the purpose of this venerable institution. Like a sad old lady, living on the memories of an earlier day, the Fridge stood abandoned through most of the eighties.

If you drive by today, you will see that they are nearly finished tearing down the building, proof positive that the "old girl" is dead and gone. But the memories will live. Fred (wherever you are) Betty, Carol, Mary Joy, and all of you out there who share those fond memories, let's lift a Cherry Coke to toast her one last time.

**POINTS TO PONDER**

Every time I hear of another death by violent means I ask, when will the killings stop. The murder of 23 people in Killeen was a senseless act of a person beyond normal understanding. The death of a husband by his wife is another senseless act. In Dallas, a 15 year old high school student, shot in the halls of the school forces one to ask, Why? Why are we Americans killing each other at such an astronomical rate?

One group says the only way to stop the killings is gun control. Another group says, no, the only way to stop the killing is to lock up the one who does the killing. But nobody seems willing to pay the cost of what it takes to control the violence in our society. Nobody wants to pay higher taxes to pay the policemen better salaries. If we are going to put more people in prisons we must pay for them. Congress doesn't even see the need to ban assault rifles, whose only purpose for existence is to kill people.

Someone said, if some of the people at Luby's in Killeen had had a gun that they may not have been as many people killed. But on the other hand their might have been more.

John Wayne in his last movie, made a statement that made a lot of sense. He by no stretch of the imagination was for gun control, but the character he played in the 'Shootist' said in response to a question as to how he was such a successful gunfighter and lived so long. His answer was, "Another person will hesitate for a split second before they fire. I won't" that was only a movie but I content that a violent person who is set on committing a crime and is armed with a weapon will fire first if he sees someone he's going to rob. The victim a decent person will hesitate a split second and possibly end up dead.

Whatever the argument for or against gun control, that is not the basic cause of violence. Even in the most wildest period of American history such noted killers as Billy the Kid, Bill Hickock, Wyatt Earp, or Doc Holiday just to be killing.

What is needed is a change of heart. People need to have the power of God working on them and through them. Violence is not just with guns or knives. Violence is in the physical abuse of a child, of elderly parent in the care of their children. The

spouse abuse, both male and female is another. People have not allowed the redeeming grace of God to change them. William Penn said of the early Quaker movement: "they were changed men before they went about to change others."

It seems as if we allow our hearts to be filled with violence, rather than love. Perhaps that is why sports stadiums are full, while church pews are empty. It may explain why we are more prone to solve our differences in a violent manner rather than a dialogue. In order to control social violence people need the discipline of prayer and worship, to open to them the life changing power of God. Take your family to Church this week and let God take away any violent attitude that may have built up in the press of daily life. May our prayer be: "May the words of my mouth and the action of my life as one and in harmony with Thee, my God. Amen."

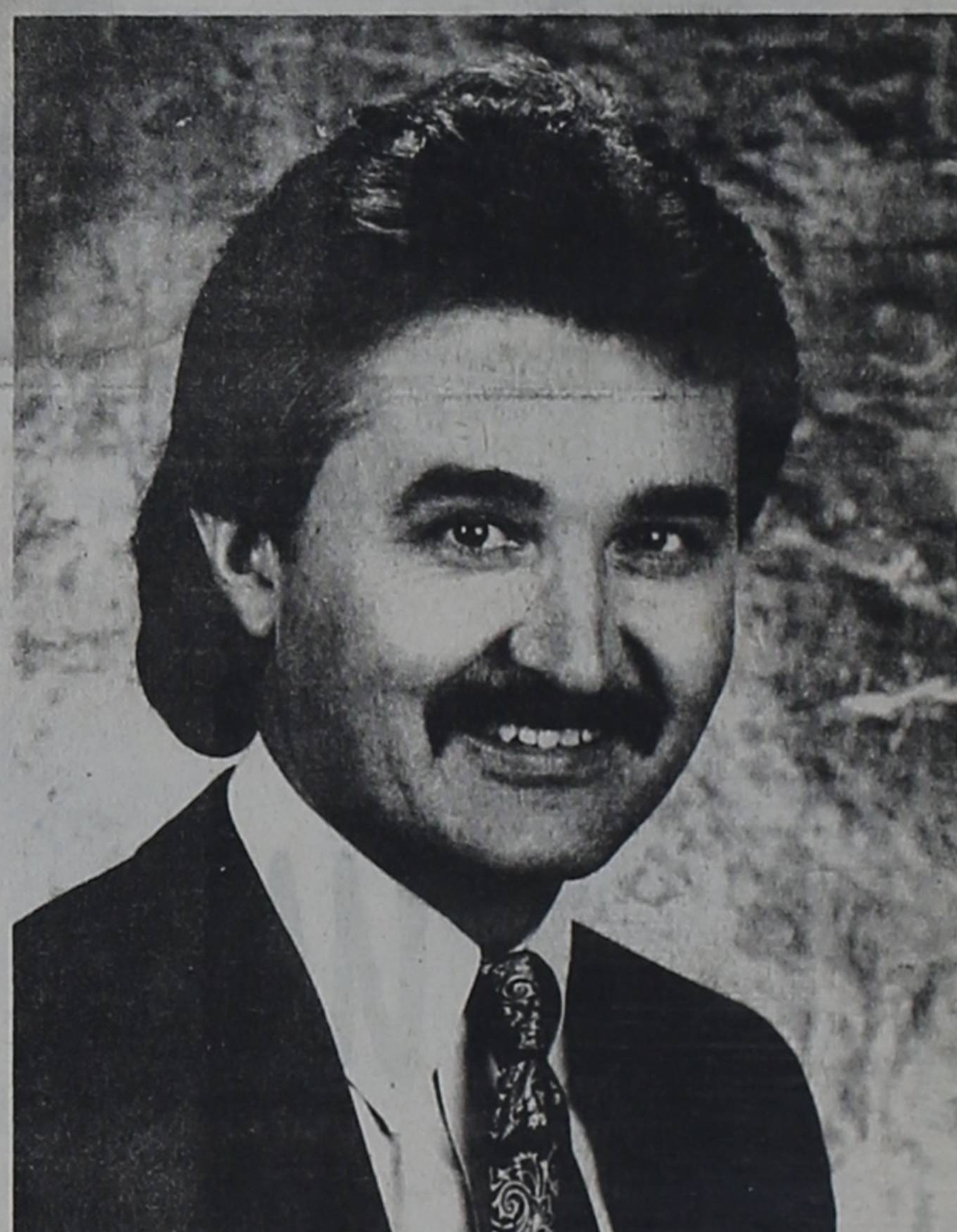

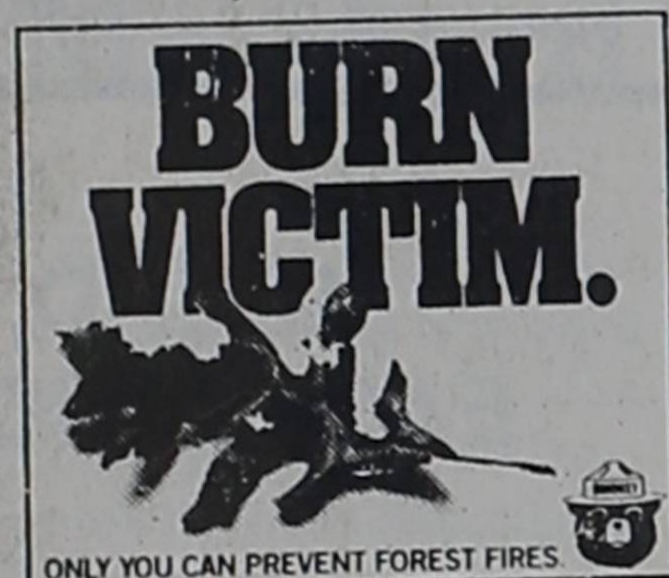
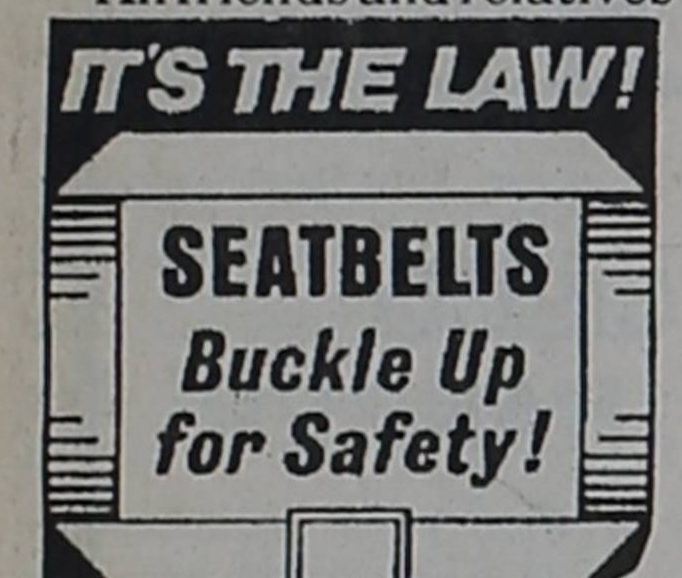

## Pharmacy Topics

Behavior therapy works as well as drugs in fighting insomnia, a study at the University of Alabama in Birmingham found. Drugs worked faster, but results were longer-lasting when people learned new sleep habits.

Doses of ultrasound speed healing of fractures, the American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons reports. In tests, 20-minute doses were aimed at an opening in the cast. Doctors don't know why it works.

It pays to stop smoking at any age. Researchers at the Group Health Cooperative in Seattle found that even smokers in their 70s -- even those with heart disease -- will live longer if they quit.

Researchers at Texas A & M University suggest a possible correlation between magnesium intake and cholesterol. As magnesium levels go up, cholesterol goes down -- at least in rats, the scientists say.

Early exposure to germs at day-care centers and pre-schools may pay off in acquired immunity. Researchers at the Centers for Disease Control found that the longer kids have been in day care, the lower their risk.

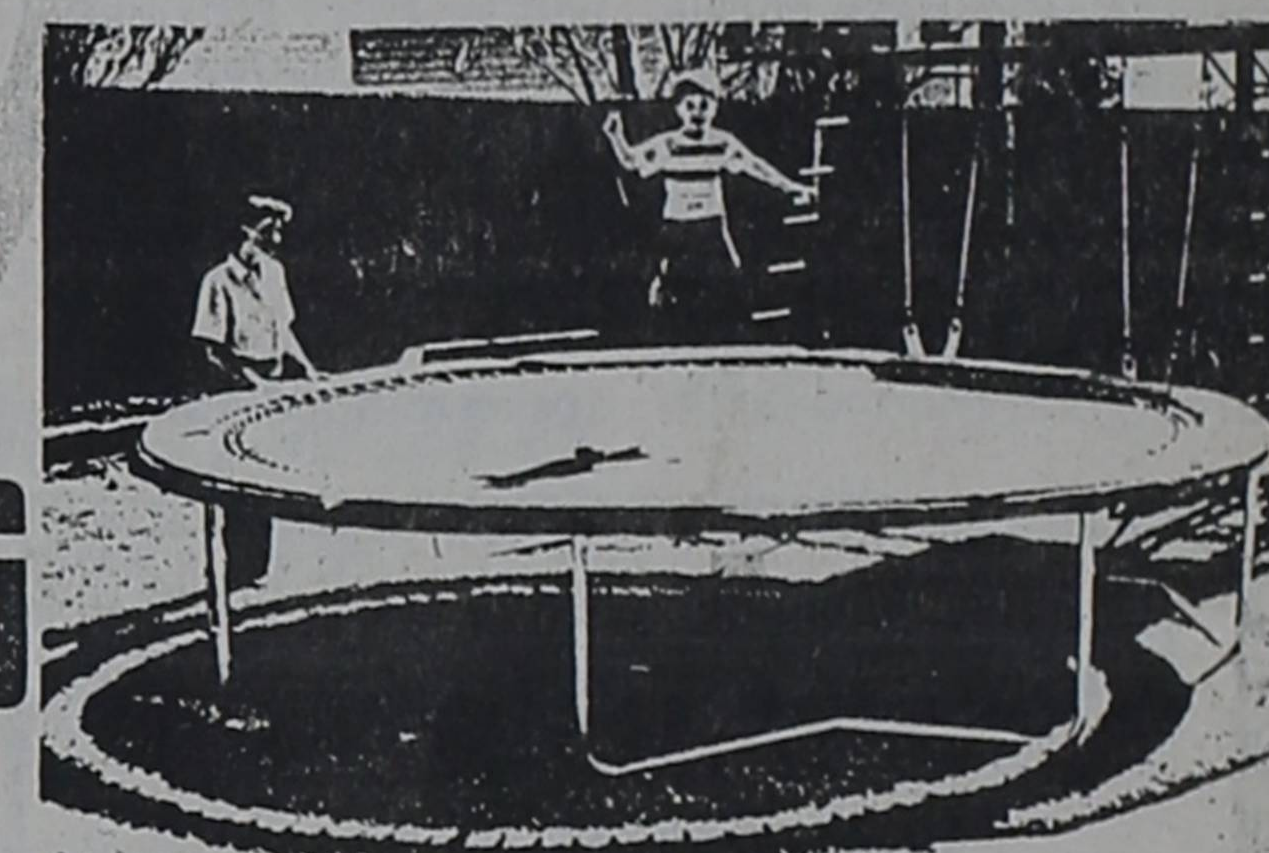

show takes on a Halloween look.

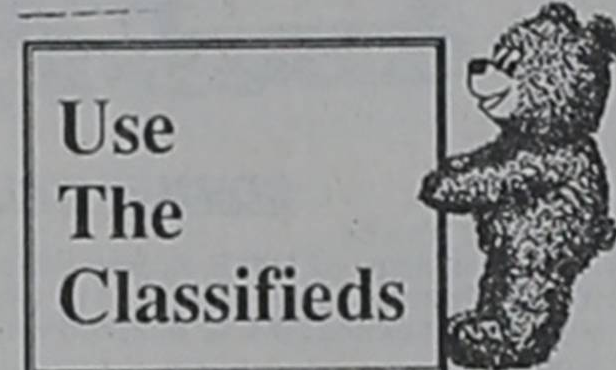
Elsewhere in the park, visitors will find a fortune teller, a "mad" organist, a Halloween marionette show and magicians.

There is no extra charge for the Halloween attractions, with the exception of a requested one dollar donation at the March of Dimes haunted house.

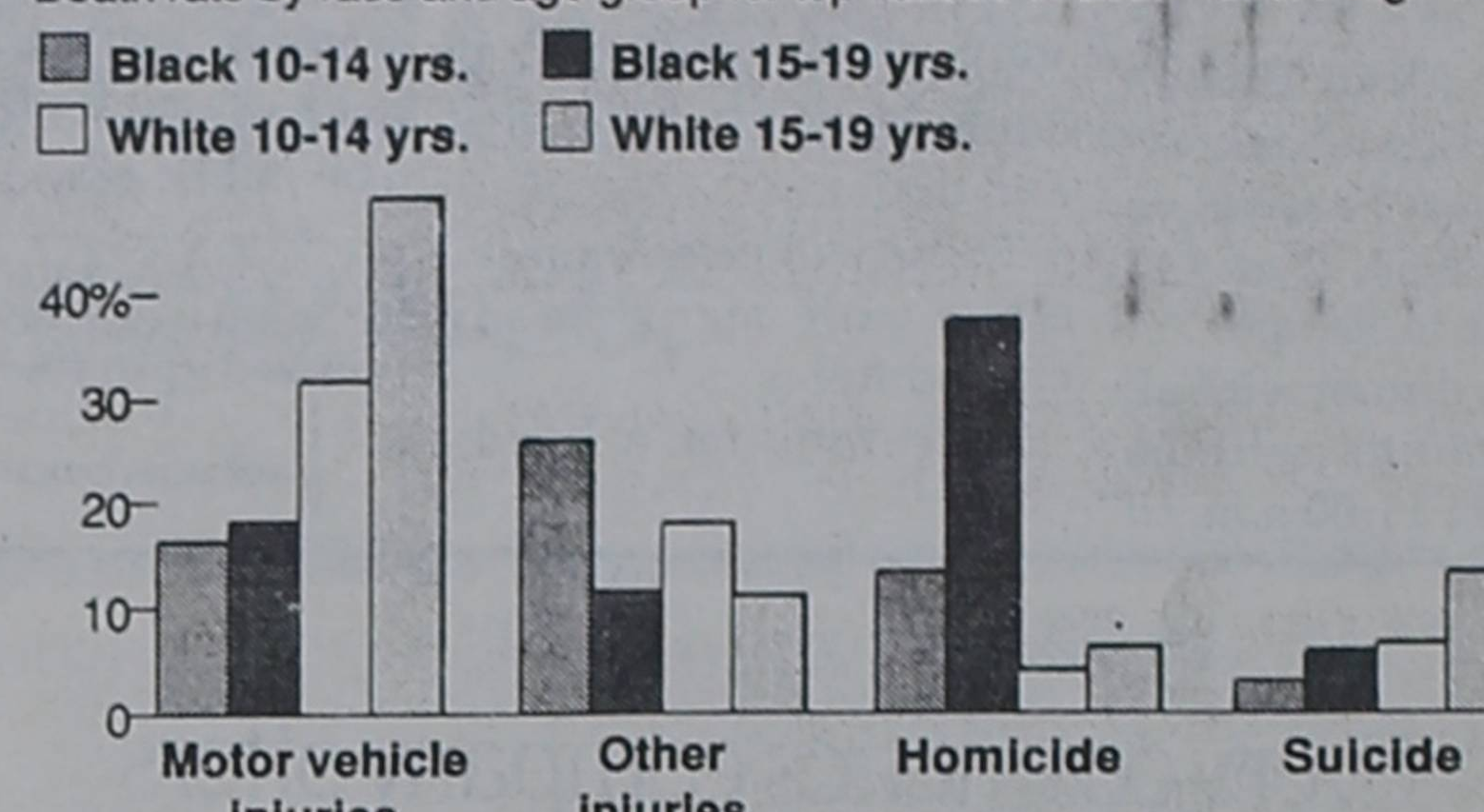

The problem with cutting costs in state government is that "there are a lot of people in the middle who have built careers on making sure the system isn't efficient," says State

Comptroller John Sharp. Sharp made this observation in a speech to Texas county judges and commissioners last week where he outlined his plan to replace paper food

stamps with a credit card system.

Instead of presenting food stamps at the grocery check-out, a person would use an "electronic benefits transfer card."

The system would prevent certain types of fraud as well as eliminate enough paper to save thousands of trees, Sharp said.

Sharp thinks other savings would follow as the state reduced its 300 full-time fraud investigators plus the courier services which deliver stamps to local offices.

"But I got calls from every timber company, every printer, every cou-

rier service and half the fraud investigators," he complained.

**Lottery Or Budget Cut**

Meanwhile, Sharp warned voters that if they fail to approve the proposed state lottery on the Nov. 5 ballot, it will be necessary to cut \$462 million from the state budget.

The comptroller wants to begin an instant scratch-off game by July, which he predicts would generate \$462 million in 14 months.

**Lewis Drops One Suit**

Texas House Speaker Gib Lewis has dropped one of two legal maneuvers to get an Austin judge removed from his pending misdemeanor ethics case.

Lewis, D-Fort Worth, also dropped his lawsuit against Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle, who presented the case to a grand jury that indicted Lewis 11 months ago.

The action came a few days before state District Judge Bob Perkins is scheduled to decide

whether the criminal cases against Lewis should be transferred to a lower county court.

Tim Evans, Lewis' Fort Worth attorney, said last week's filing will not affect that decision. It involves only a separate request, filed three weeks ago by Lewis' Austin attorneys, that sought to remove Perkins from the case if he refused to approve the transfer.

"Gib Lewis has no quarrel with the judge. His quarrel is with Mr. Earle's prosecution, and he looks forward to the day when it is exposed to the scrutiny of a neutral jury," Evans said.

**Term Limit on Ballot?**

Amid frustration and anger toward Congress, a bipartisan group announced a petition drive to place on the Texas ballot a measure limiting politicians' terms in office. Texans for Term Limitations, headed by Republican Rob Mosbacher and Democrat Jim Calloway, said the group will attempt to collect enough signatures to place a non-binding referendum on the March primary ballots of both major political parties.

"We need fresh people, and they should not be white male lawyers," Mosbacher said. "They should be women, blacks, small business people, school teachers, union people, artists, all kinds of people."

**Defeat of No. 7 Urged**

Lane Zively, president of the non-union Texas Public Employees Association, urged voters in the Nov. 5 election to reject Proposition 7 allowing teacher and employee pension funds to be invested in real estate.

The State Teachers Association, the state's largest teachers' group, has taken no position on Proposition 7, but its president, Ollie Besteiro, also urges the amendment's defeat.

The Teachers Retirement System has invested in real estate since 1983, has foreclosed and taken over management of 10 buildings, will foreclose soon on two more, and has lost \$156 million in market value on its real estate holdings.

**Bonner to Head TDC**

Gov. Ann Richards last week appointed Cathy Bonner to serve as director of the Texas Department of Commerce.

Bonner, 41, former small business owner involved in marketing, construction and cable television businesses, had served as interim director since April.

"Cathy Bonner has successfully restored the credibility and accountability of the TDC," Richards said. "She will continue to provide the leadership needed to do what this agency was meant to do bring jobs to

**Comptroller's Index Hits All-Time High**

"The Index of Leading Texas Economic Indicators hit an all-time high in August, surpassing its previous record of September 1990," Comptroller John Sharp said.

"Rising stock prices of Texas-based companies, an increase in new business incorporations and a longer workweek for manufacturing employees combined to push the Index of Leading Texas Economic Indicators to an all-time high of 116.4 in August, a .7 percent increase from August 1990," Sharp said.

The previous record high for the Texas Index, set in September of last year, was 116.2.

The Index of Leading Texas Economic Indicators was developed by the Comptroller's Office to predict future changes in the national and state economies. The Index is useful because it helps forecast significant economic upturns and downturns several months in advance. It is comprised of 10 different components, including consumer confidence, oil prices and unemployment insurance claims.

"Stock prices of selected Texas-based companies tracked by the Comptroller's Office rose

4.5 percent from July to August and are now 15.4 percent above last year. The average of new business incorporations was also up by 48 percent from 2,945 in August 1990 to 3,085 in August 1991," Sharp said.

"The average length of the workweek for manufacturing employees also was up in August from 41.9 hours a year ago to 42.25 hours today. Housing permits appear to have turned the corner, with the average 8.4 percent above a year ago. The number of permits issued in August reached 4,250, which improves the outlook for construction and real estate employment," Sharp said.

"Another reason for the increase is that the comparable national index is up by .7 percent to stand at 145.4, which is good news since the national economy now plays a more important role in the Texas economy," Sharp said.

"However, help-wanted advertising remains 11.3 percent below last year at this time, largely due to the national economic recession. And the number of initial claims for unemployment compensation rose in August to a seasonally adjusted 73,400, or 10.1 percent over last year," Sharp said.

Consumer confidence levels remain weak. The Consumer Confidence Index for the West South Central states was up in August, but still below August 1990. This particular gauge has bobbed up and down this year, falling with the Iraqi crisis, rising after Operation Desert Storm, but declining again in response to the national recession.

In addition, oil prices, which are 22 percent below their levels during the Kuwait crisis, have shown no sign of rising enough to stimulate new exploration by the state's energy industry.

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
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## Nutrition Program

## Use Leaves For Compost

Leaves from trees are already beginning to pile up in many yards throughout the county. Leaf raking is a chore which most people have at the bottom of their list.

Leaves should be removed from lawns not only for appearance, but also to prevent damage to the grass. A heavy blanket of leaves can smother a lawn if allowed to remain.

In previous years, leaves were burned or hauled to the dump to be burned or buried. Air pollution controls have made the smell of burning leaves a thing of the past. Actually, leaves are much too valuable to burn, and it is more efficient to compost them. Leaves can provide a ready source of composted soil to use in preparing flower and shrub borders, potted plants, or as a top-dress-

ing for the yard.

The simplest method of composting leaves or other vegetable matter is to alternate 4 to 6 inch layers of vegetable matter with 2 to 4 inches of good garden soil. Sprinkling commercial fertilizer on each layer of vegetable matter hastens decomposition. One cupful or 1/2 pound of 10-10-10, 10-6-4, 10-20-0 (or the equivalent) per 10 square

feet of vegetable matter is sufficient. If manure is available and free of weeds, it is also beneficial to add it to the soil layer.

The compost pile should be 4 to 6 feet wide and any desired length. The surface of the pile should slope toward the center, forming a basin to hold water. The top layer should consist of soil. Leaf layers should be watered

thoroughly as they are spread out. When the pile is complete, additional water should be periodically added to keep the material moist but not soggy.

The compost should be turned or mixed with a garden fork or shovel every 3 or 4 months. Within 6 months to a year it should be ready for use.

## AREA LAWMAKER JOINS STEERING COMMITTEE TO PUSH PASSAGE OF PROPOSITION 8 STATE TREASURER KAY BAILEY HUTCHISON ANNOUNCES

State Rep. Bob Turner is a member of the statewide, bipartisan steering committee to promote and encourage passage of Proposition 8 on the Nov. 5 ballot, State Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison announced.

Proposition 8 would require that future state debt-authorizing measures include a statement regarding the purpose of debt, amount of debt created and source of repayment.

"Having a person of Bob's caliber on this steering committee will go a long way in ensuring passage of Proposition 8," said Mrs. Hutchison, who has made state debt management a top priority of her administration. "A 'yes' vote for Proposition 8 is a vote for good

government, straightforward language and 'truth in advertising.'"

Under Proposition 8, there is no change in the constitutional requirements for state debt authorization, Mrs. Hutchison said. The state constitution would continue to require a two-thirds majority vote in each house of the Legislature and a majority vote of the people for all general obligation debt.

"The most important element of Proposition 8 is that its passage would ensure that all future state debt issues are presented to voters in clear, concise language. The crux of this issue is clarity," she said. "Texans deserve no less than what Proposition 8 would require."

## SUPPORT NEEDED FOR PRISON BONDS

Our criminal justice system is broken. Texans are fed up with the spectacle of violent offenders being released from prison after serving only a fraction of their sentence.

County jails are backed up with state inmates, and our state penitentiaries operate like a revolving door — sending violent criminals back out onto the streets after they have served only a fraction of their sentence.

Judging from the mail my office is receiving, I can assure you that most Texans recognize crime as the No. 1 problem facing this state. And Texans want to keep violent offenders off the streets.

One way to do that is to vote on November 5. Proposition 4 authorizes the state to issue up to \$1.1 billion in general obligation bonds to finance the cost of new prison facilities that will lock up 25,300 new prisoners. When you consider that our current prison capacity is right at 50,000, you can see what a difference these 15 new prisons will make. If we are going to keep violent offenders incarcerated, we must have the space for them.

New crime control laws also create a substance abuse felony punishment and provide space for 12,000 inmates punished under this provision. The money raised from the \$1.1 billion bond issue can also be used in this effort to break the cycle of addiction and crime.

To ensure us additional prison space for violent criminals, we need you to vote yes on Proposition 4 on November 5.

There are other important items on the ballot. — Proposition 1 is the constitutional amendment that would authorize a state lottery.

If approved, a state lottery will pump about \$500 million into the state treasury this biennium. That's half a billion dollars that can be put to good use educating our children, making our communities safe, creating jobs for Texas and providing health and human services to those Texans in need.

The lottery is that rare

est of all beasts — a popular method of raising state revenue.

At this time in Texas history when we are making cuts in areas we never dreamed of cutting before — when we are faced with increasing federal court orders to spend more state dollars on human services — we cannot pass up this opportunity to bring in much needed revenue.

Remember, every dollar a lottery raises for the state is one less dollar we have to raise in taxation.

— Proposition 12 authorizes the state to upgrade the living conditions of those Texans living in unincorporated neighborhoods, or Colonias, along the Texas-Mexico border. It grants the state the power to spend up to \$250 million on loans and grants for water and sewer projects in the Colonias.

Disease is rampant in these communities where children are forced to drink untreated water and raw sewage stands in the streets. We must have these bond monies available to eradicate these unacceptable conditions.

— Proposition 13 would allow the state to continue issuing up to \$300 million in general obligation bonds to finance higher education loans to students. Voters must approve this amendment if we are going to continue funding the Hinson-Hazlewood student loan program. Since 1965, the state has loaned \$580 million dollars to more than 200,000 Texas students through this program. It is one of the few state programs that is completely self-sufficient.

In fact, it's a money-maker — because Texas students have a good record of repaying these loans. It is one of the few programs we can offer middle income students. Texas must maintain its investment in education if we are to be prepared for the century ahead.

We need your support on these proposed amendments. Please vote on November 5.

Would you buy a home without knowing what it looks like, how much it costs and how long it's going to take to pay off your mortgage?

Of course not! The same common sense guidelines and requirements that apply to buying a home, a car - or anything for that matter - should apply to state government when it comes to authorizing debt.

For that reason, I am vigorously endorsing passage of Proposition 8 on the Nov. 5 constitutional amendment election ballot. Passage of this amendment would ensure that future ballot propositions calling for the issuance of state-backed bonds clearly state the amount of the issue, the purpose for which the money will be used and the method and source of repayment.

Proposition 8, which I call the "truth in advertising" proposal, is a major step in the direction of good government. Texans deserve no less from their elected representatives than what Proposition 8 would require.

As state treasurer, I have pushed for a state debt policy and have made debt management one of my top priorities. At the heart of this policy is fostering a relationship of honesty and integrity with Texas voters.

Under the current system, Texans are asked over and over again to approve huge amounts of debt without knowing how much it is, what it's for and how it will be repaid.

A classic example of this took place on Aug. 10 when voters were presented with a constitutional amendment that would have authorized the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans for students.

This statewide proposition, which would have provided low-interest college loans for students to attend our colleges and universities, did not reveal the amount of bonds voters were being asked to consider. The amount was up to \$300 million.

I am convinced this proposition was rejected in August because the ballot language was confusing, the amount was not stated and voters ultimately were skeptical about what they were being asked to approve.

This same amendment,

Proposition 13, will be reconsidered by voters in the Nov. 5 election. This time the amount of the bonds will be clearly stated. I favor the issuance of these state bonds to fund the Hinson-Hazlewood College Student Loan Program. Beginning in 1993, the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board says the entire program, including administrative costs, will be self-supporting.

This is not a new issue. Two years ago, voters approved nearly \$2 billion in state debt under the same confusing circumstances.

In that 1989 constitutional amendment election, one proposition read, "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the recovery and further development of the state's economy, with goals of increasing job opportunities and other benefits for Texas residents, through state financing of the development and production of Texas products and businesses."

That proposition's passage led to the authorization of \$75 million in state debt.

On Nov. 5, we have the opportunity to make it mandatory that all future debt-authorizing measures be stated in plain English.

Passage of Proposition 8 will ensure that we never again are asked to by the State Legislature to support the issuance of state debt without knowing its future costs and from what source it will be paid. It would place the state under the same standards that now apply to local governmental entities.

Passage of Proposition 8 will help solve part of the problem Texas voters have faced in the past. But even with this policy in place, there still needs to be legislative leadership to assure that all ballot propositions - not just debt issues - be stated clearly.

It is imperative that we take this first step in the direction of good government and public policy by supporting and voting for Proposition 8. The outcome of this proposition and the other 12 issues on the Nov. 5 ballot could have a tremendous impact on the future of Texas.

The property was appraised at \$1,500. This forfeiture is being conducted pursuant to Title 21, United States Code (U.S.C.), Section 881 and the following additional federal laws and regulations: 19 U.S.C., Sections 1602-1619, and Title 21, Code of Federal Regulations (C.F.R.), Sections 1316.71-1316.81. You may contest the seizure and forfeiture of this property and/or petition to the FBI and request a pardon of the forfeited property. If you want to contest the seizure or forfeiture of the property in court, you must file a claim of ownership and a bond in the amount of \$250 with the FBI by NOVEMBER 12, 1991. The bond may be in cash or a cashier's check payable to the U.S. Department of Justice or provide a surety. If you are indigent (needy and poor), you may not have to post the bond. To request a waiver of the bond, you must fully disclose your finances in a signed statement called "Declaration in Support of Request to Proceed in Forma Pauperis." You can obtain this form from the FBI Field Office listed below. File the signed declaration and a claim of owner-
