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## COUNTY COMMISSIONERS DISCUSS NEW TELEPHONE SYSTEM, COURTHOUSE WIRING

Eastland County Commissioners Monday discussed a number of topics, including a new telephone system, and courthouse wiring.

Tim Hammon with AT&T Telephone Service gave an evaluation of the Courthouse Telephone system. He said a new and better system could be provided that would change seven-digit dialing in the Courthouse to a two-digit transfer of calls.

The Sheriff's Department could be tied into this system. He said phone

service was costing about \$40 per line per month, and the new system could cut down on lines and save money in the long run.

District Clerk Bill Mears told the Court that the new system might be something to consider in next year's budget.

The Commissioners postponed a decision on replacing electrical wiring in the Courthouse until they have more information on what is needed, Precinct 2 Commissioner Calvin Ainsworth said that the worst problems

were on the second and third floors.

"We're not in trouble now as long as the air conditioners are not in use and the computers are working well," he reported.

In other business, the Commissioners signed a letter to purchase used asphalt from the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation. This material will be used on rural roads.

Pct. 4 Commissioner Reggie Pittman brought a report on the County

Jail. He said 24 prisoners were currently in the jail, with 7 for TDC, 10 awaiting for trial, 3 City Prisoners, and 4 on "Blue" warrants. Of this number, 2 had been held more than 60 days.

The Commissioners approved a Holiday Schedule for 1992. This will include all the Holidays observed in 1991, plus General Election Day, Nov. 3, 1992, for the Courthouse only. This is needed because the first floor of the Courthouse is used as a polling place.

## Seeking 8th Term As Representative



Congressman Charles Stenholm

Congressman Charles Stenholm traveled through the 17th Congressional District last week making formal announcement of his plans to seek an eighth term as representative.

Beginning in Stamford, local supporters met with him for public appearances in Abilene, Sweetwater, Big Spring, Lamesa, San Angelo, Brownwood, Stephenville, Granbury, and Mineral Wells. With numerous stops in between these

visits, he covered most of the vast 32 county district which has been recognized by the Justice Department as making up the 17th District following the recent re-districting.

"Naturally, I would have been pleased to leave the 17th District as it was," Stenholm said. "Since this was not possible, I am thankful the district remains with common interests and similar opportunities."

Stenholm has been present for over 96 percent of all recorded votes during his years in office. He serves as Chairman of the Livestock, Dairy & Poultry Subcommittee of the Committee on Agriculture and is a member of the Budget Committee. Charlie and Cindy have two sons, Chris and Cary, and a daughter Courtney Ann.

During his trip last week, Stenholm said often: "I take the responsibility of being a representative of the people very seriously and shall continue to work for our area to the best of my ability."

## Leo C. Williams Elected To The Texas Farm Bureau Board Of Directors

Leo C. Williams of Ranger was elected to a two-year term on the Texas Farm Bureau Board of Directors at the state's largest general farm organization's recent annual convention in Lubbock.

Williams, who runs a 247 acre dairy farm in Eastland County, was elected to the TFB Board earlier this year to fulfill the unexpired term of Robert Turner of Voss, who resigned and ran successfully for the Texas House of Representatives.

Active in Farm Bureau for many years, Williams served as vice president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau in 1988, and then as president in 1989 and 1990. He also served on the county's dairy, membership, budget and Young Farmer & Rancher committee.

Williams currently serves on the Board of Directors of the Upper Leon Soil and Water

Conservation District. He received an award in 1978 for his contributions to agriculture in Eastland County, and was selected "Best Conservationist" in 1988 by the Upper Leon SWCD.

A graduate of Texas A&M University, Williams received his bachelor of science degree in agricultural education in 1952. He taught agricultural science at Grafrod High School in Grafrod from 1961 to 1969 and served as principal there for one year.

Williams and his wife, Eloise, have three daughters, one son and six grandchildren.

He represents TFB District 7, which includes the following counties: Brown, Callahan-Shackelford, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Erath, Jones, Llano, McCulloch, Mason, Mills, Palo Pinto, Runnels, San Saba, Stephens and Taylor.

# Safe Practices With Heaters Can Avert Tragic Losses

## National Drunk And Drugged Driving Awareness Week

The winter months can be harsh. Like many families last winter, a Texas couple worried about staying warm. Both were classified as legally blind, yet they relied on a small gas heater to warm their home. One evening in January, the 66 year old woman tried to light the heater as she had on many nights. She turned on the gas, then threw lighted matches at the heater as she listened for the distinctive "whoosh" that said the fire had ignited.

Unfortunately, on that evening, the fire flared and caught her clothes on fire. Her wheelchair-bound husband couldn't tell what was happening. The woman managed to dial 911, but then panicked and ran out in the front yard. She died of burns, becoming one of 23 Texans who died in heat-

ing related fires during 1990.

From now through February, Texans will try to stay warm by using various types of heating equipment in their homes. Unfortunately, many will discover that improperly used heaters can cause property damage, injuries and even death.

"Each year, the number of reported fire deaths increases during December, January and February," said State Fire Marshal Ernest A. Emerson. "Much of this loss is related to the misuse of heaters, and the unfortunate fact is that many, if not most, of those fires can be prevented."

Statistics on fires are gathered through the Texas Fire Incident Reporting System (TEX-FIRS), a standardized reporting program coordinated by the State Fire

Marshal's Office through which more than 320 fire departments in Texas report fire incidents. Emerson said that according to TEX-FIRS statistics for 1990, the misuse of heating equipment ranked as the third leading cause of residential fires. A total of 1,756 fires were caused by heating equipment, resulting in more than \$14 million in property damage. At least 110 persons were injured in these fires.

"When the causes of these fires are examined, it becomes apparent that the homeowner or resident can do several things to reduce the chance of fire in his or her home," Emerson said.

He described six fatal fires to illustrate the hazards most commonly associated with heating equipment. "In none of these fires were smoke alarms present in the home," he added. "Perhaps some of them could have been saved if a smoke alarm had been there to warn of the fire, especially since about two-thirds of these fires occurred during the night or when someone was sleeping."

**\* Combustible items, such as furniture or clothes, are placed too close to the heater.** Three people died when clothing was left too close to a portable gas heater. The 20 year old woman tried to escape with an infant girl when they were overcome by the fire. An infant boy died of asphyxia.

**\* A portable heater is placed too close to combustible items, especially beds and furniture.** An infant died when a portable electrical heater was placed too close to an upholstered chair. The fire occurred just after noon, but adults in the home were not warned of the fire because there were no smoke detectors. The infant died of asphyxia; his 2 year old sister also suffered injuries from smoke inhalation.

**\* Clothing catches fire when the person comes too close to the heater.** A 30 year old man who was intoxicated was sleeping too close to a portable electric heater when his clothes contacted the heater. His clothing caught fire, and he died of burns and asphyxia.

**\* The heater or stove is not used or maintained properly.** Three people died in a fire started by overheated heating equipment, which ignited upholstered furniture in the room where an infant was sleeping. A 30 year old woman and a 2 year old boy were also sleeping when the late evening fire started. The woman and infant died of burns and asphyxia; the 2 year old died of asphyxia.

**\* The heater or stove is not installed properly, allowing heat to be transferred to combustible objects such as the floor or wall.** An 87 year old man died when a chimney connector for a wood burning stove caused the interior wall covering to catch fire.

**\* Central heating systems are not maintained and monitored properly.** An infant boy died in an early morning fire caused by the mechanical failure of a central heating unit. The malfunction caused the ignition in the room where the boy was.

"A goal of fire prevention is to keep heat sources — such as heating equipment — away from fuel sources," Emerson said. "By taking specific actions that are simple, common sense safety precautions, everyone can help prevent home heating fires and fire deaths."

The State Fire Marshal's Office recommends these safety precautions when operating heating equipment:

**1. Keep all heaters at least THREE FEET away from combustible objects, such as walls, curtains, drapes and furniture, especially beds.** Use a yardstick or meter stick to measure the distance.

**2. Use only heating equipment that is in good operating condition.** Watch for worn electrical cords, gas leaks or faulty switches. Keep your heating equipment (including ducting) clean.

**3. Have your heating equipment, both central systems and portable equipment, serviced by a qualified expert at least once a year.** Have your fireplace, wood burning stove and chimney inspected and cleaned at least once a year.

**4. Test your smoke alarms each week.** Install a smoke alarm if you don't have one. Contact your local fire department if you can't afford one or install one yourself. Replace the battery if it has not been changed in the past year.

**5. If your heating equipment is not safe, ASK FOR HELP.** Contact local authorities for help in improving your heating equipment or for locations of shelters in extremely cold weather.

**6. If you know someone who does not have safe, adequate heating equipment, offer help or ask a local social service agency to help.**

**7. Be sure all heaters, stoves, fireplaces and chimneys are installed and insulated properly.** Check for heating of adjacent floors and walls, which can be very hazardous.

**8. Use only approved heaters and fuels.** Check for UL or Factory Mutual labels. Because portable heaters are illegal in some jurisdictions, check with local fire authorities to be sure that portable heaters are allowed in your area.

**9. Follow all operating instructions for your heating equipment EXACTLY.** Read the instructions before operating your heater.

**10. Wear close fitting pajamas or night clothes — and avoid loose, billowy gowns or robes — to reduce the risk of igniting your**

clothes by contacting heaters or cook stoves. Warn senior citizens and children to stay away from heaters.

**11. Be sure there is adequate ventilation in any area where there is an open flame.** Keep the central gas heating system ventilation ducts open. Provide ventilation for wood or gas fueled heaters by opening a window.

**12. Practice emergency procedures so you and your family know what to do in case of a fire:**

\* Know to "stop, drop and roll" to put out the fire if your clothes catch on fire.

\* Have an emergency exit plan with two exit routes from each room, and explain your plan to overnight guests. Keep your exit routes clear, don't place portable

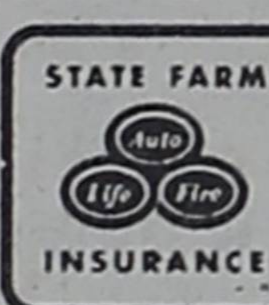

# Guest Slot

PRIOR KNOWLEDGE of the city: Little except memory of the post-WWII play & film "Judgement at Nuremberg."

It's a beautiful old, walled citadel; hdqs. for Vince's Regiment; train terminal for our Eurarail expeditions; and principal city of the area known as Franconia. It dates to 1040 and was the scene of the first meetings of the Holy Roman Empire; Hitler's greatest Nazi rallies; and the Allied war trials. It's the birthplace of German Artist Albrecht Durer, Woodcarver Wolgemut and Sculptors Adam Kraft and Peter Vischer.

Thanks to Amy, we got into the American Bavarian Army Hotel right next to the Hauptbahnhof (main station), which is adjacent to the Royal Gate (Nurnberg symbol) and Handwerkerhof, an authentic medieval mall where craftsmen stay busy pretending it's still the Middle Ages. They turn out puppets, baskets, power mugs, plates, glassware and

oodles of gingerbread cookies.

On a cold wet Saturday afternoon, Nurnberg's attractions are all in good walking distance: historic St. Lorenz Church; and further, the Main Market Square, where traditional vendors were already breaking camp for the day, and the scene of the annual Christkindmarkt is held each November, and the 60-foot "Beautiful Fountain" (scaffolled this day for repair) with its gold ring which all must rub for good luck. Further up, the 13th century St. Sebaldus Church, where the choir was in rehearsal in preparation for Sunday services. Much of this ancient area, destroyed in bombings, has been restored.

Brisk sight-seeing eventually calls for hot coffee, and one of two McDonald's in this ancient area was in order, but alas we chose the wrong one, the one adjacent to and frequented by residents of a half-way house, presumably provided to help cope with the city's wide-spread drug problem.

Evening meal in an authentic cafe in the craft area for Nurnberg's

famous succulent sausages and kraut.

Saturday night at the Army's unbelievable Post Exchange (three floors of inexpensive merchandise) and equally-gigantic commissary where the military does its shopping. It's a virtual city, with everything from newstands to an automobile dealership, where the Post Exchange, located on the edge of town, provides for service people. Wonder what the future holds, in view of the drawdown reductions?

Breakfast was not German typical at the Army hotel where we stayed; it was a full, American mess-hall volume and quality served on order, with our kind of coffee. So adequate, in fact, that a brief stop at BurgerKing at the P.X. took care of us until late that evening.

(Side note: German money lineup is pretty easy: DMark is made up of 100 pfennigs, and, in addition to 1,000, 500, 50, 20 and 10 bills, also come in 5, 2 and 1 coins. Designation is interesting: 1 DM, (coma, not period) 50 pfennigs. So: 1,50, not 1.50.) Which reminds: when a waiter serves you, they invariably say "So." Trolleys run constantly.

We learned that valuable and irreplaceable works of art were

evacuated from the St. Lawrence Church during the war, and saved. The church itself was damaged by bombs and artillery fire. The roof frame was wiped out, the vaulting, organs and pews totally destroyed. Reconstruction began as early as 1945, and the church was in full use again in 1952. The people of Nuremberg and the parishioners of the church provided the funds. They were helped by a benefactor from the USA who wanted to pay tribute to his ancestors. Work continues on many items, including the stained glass windows.

Our folks tell us that the Christkindmarkt, the pre-Christmas market that runs Nov. 27 to Christmas Eve, with the highlight, the Dec. 10 candle procession in which thousands of children march in the ancient city, is unbelievable beautiful.

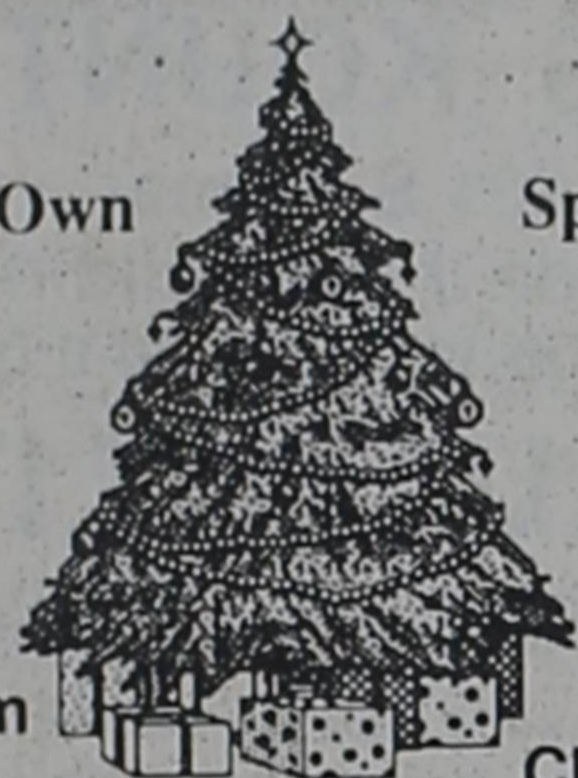

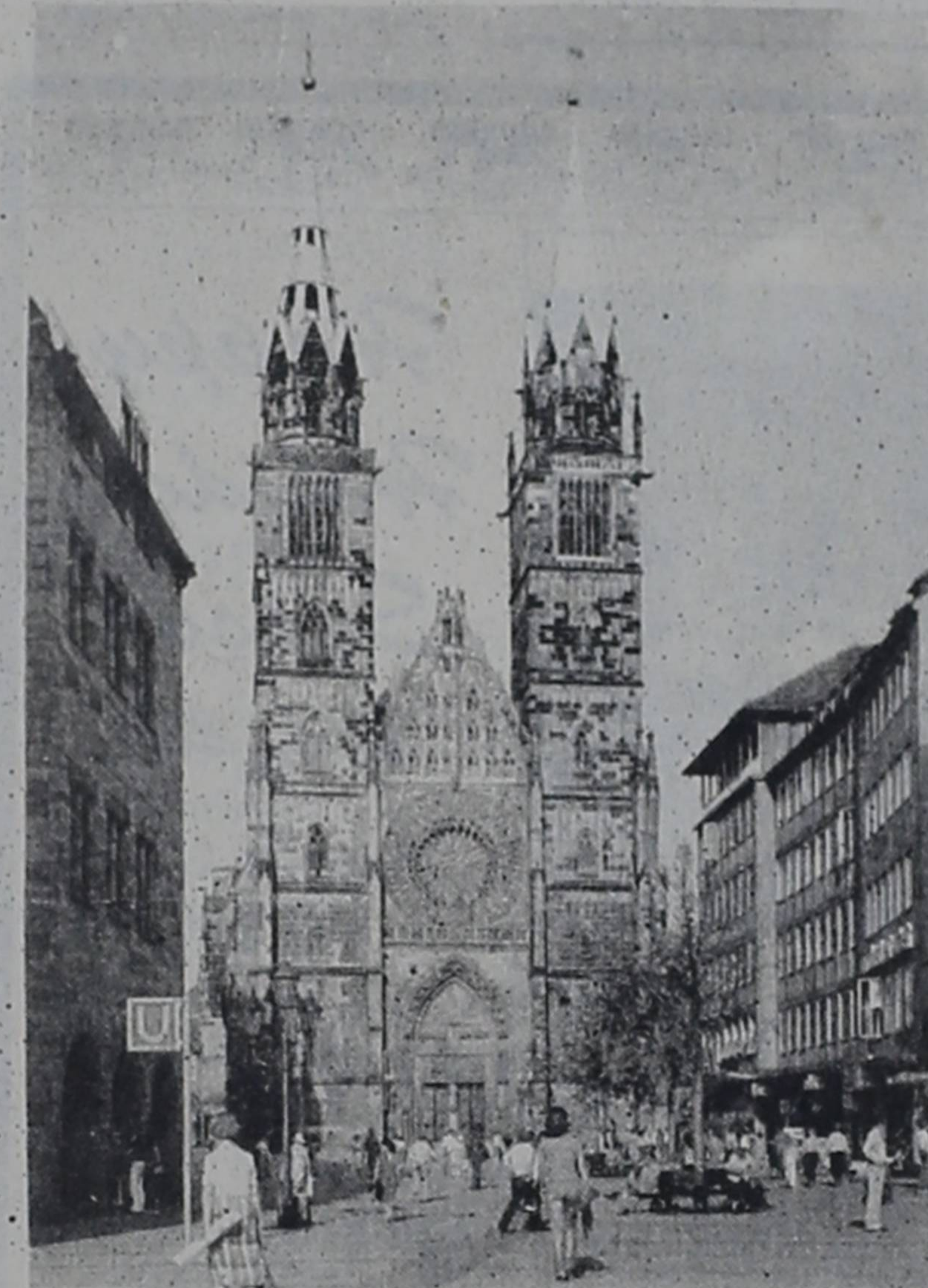

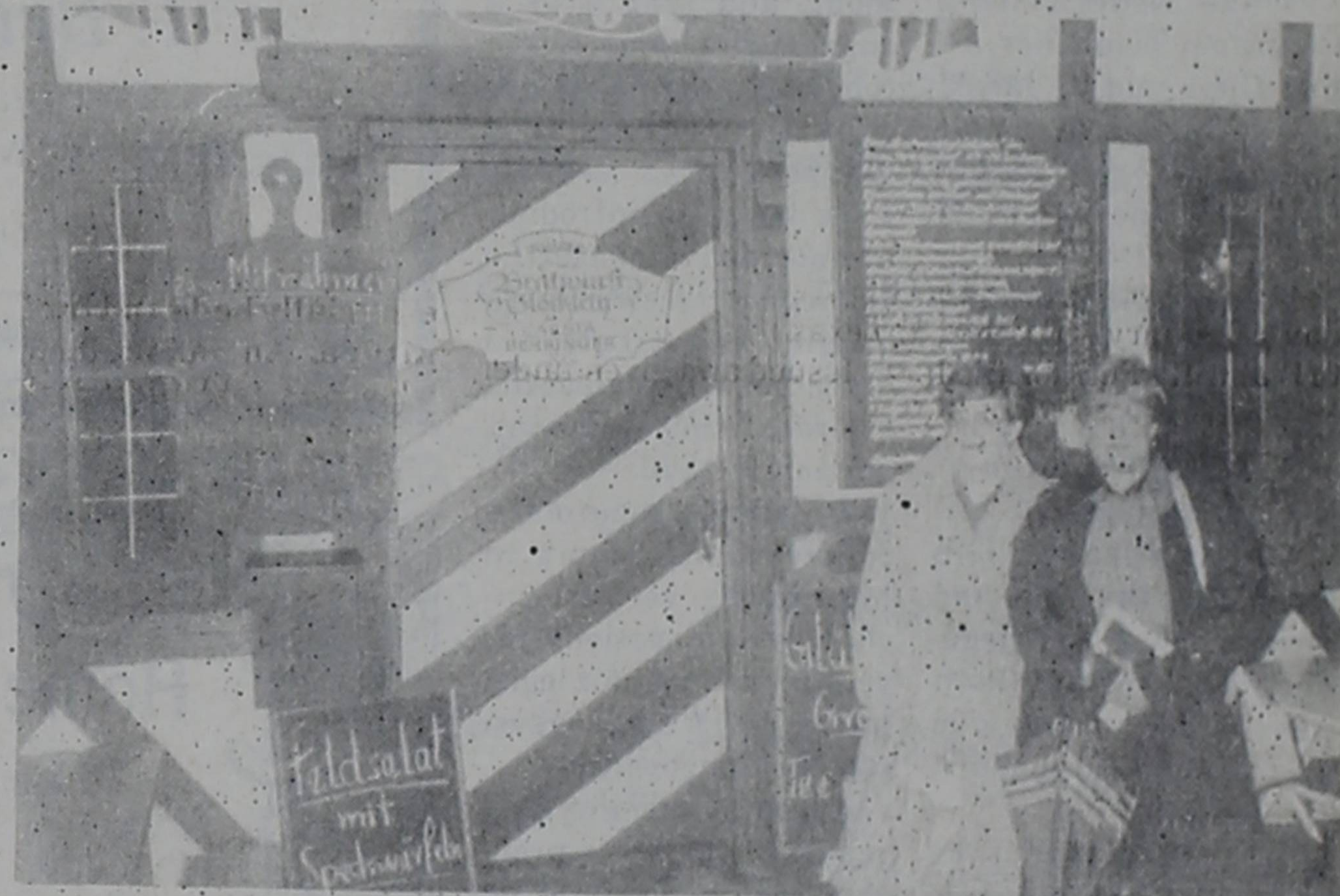

Legal entanglements at all tiers of redistricting, plus a maverick GOP candidate, threaten to make Texas' primaries a rousing, convoluted, politically bloody election.

In other words, 1992 will be business as usual in a state where politics is a contact sport.

To date, no less than nine lawsuits are pending which could alter Texas redistricting, but some of those issues may be resolved by the Texas Supreme Court this week.

**Breakdown in Talks**  
 The threat that House elections may not occur on time became obvious last week when negotiations broke down between Democratic lawmakers and Hispanic representatives.

The deadlock also heightened the possibility that a kill-the-Democrats House redistricting plan devised by Republicans could become the political map under which elections eventually are held. A Republican three-judge federal court panel is scheduled to consider adoption of that plan this week.

House Redistricting Chairman Tom Uher, D-Bay City, said he hoped new talks with Hispanic lawmakers would begin, but the hope appeared dim.

"It's more likely that the federal court is going to draw this plan," Uher said.

**Special Session Looms**

House Speaker Gib Lewis said the talks had disintegrated. "We negotiated for two days. Both sides would have to give up too much to make it salvageable."

"A special session is the only way we could resolve it at this point, unless we want to go ahead and let the courts do it," Lewis said.

Gov. Ann Richards said she will decide whether to call a special session this week. She is awaiting a Texas Supreme Court decision on whether Attorney General Dan Morales has the power to settle a Senate redistricting lawsuit in court.

**Duke Enters Race**  
 Meanwhile, Louisiana state Rep. David Duke, founder of the National Association for the Advancement of White People, last week predicted he will run strong in the Texas presidential primary.

Duke said Texans will like his anti-immigration, and anti-free-trade with Mexico themes.

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Perhaps. For just the day before, Gov. Ann Richards, visiting officials in Washington, said she fears the Mexico free-trade pact will become a destructive election issue.

**Labor Opposes Pact**  
 Richards has been listening to others, not David Duke; many labor union Democrats oppose the pact, foreseeing plant shutdowns here and the exporting of U.S. jobs to Mexico.

Black union leaders, like top Texas Democrat campaign general Allen Parker Sr., would never go for Duke, of course.

But Duke assumes, and Richards probably fears, that rank-and-file white Democrats could get angry enough to cross over in numbers to the Republican primary.

**A New Constitution?**  
 State Sen. John Montford, D-Amarillo, wants the Legislature to rewrite the Texas Constitution, something that lawmakers couldn't quite do when they last tried in 1973.

Montford had his staff update the defeated document, and sent it as a suggested version to the top leadership, other officials and various civic groups.

He plans to introduce an amended version in the '93 regular session as a single constitutional amendment to replace the entire existing document, written in 1876.

Apparently some of the controversial items in Montford's version include annual sessions, 12-year term limits for legislators, and a cabinet system for the governor.

It would undo the 1981 repeal of the state property tax, and would do away with several elected officials: treasurer, land commissioner, railroad commissioner and agriculture commissioner.

**School Finance Question**  
 Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock said last week there is "an awfully good chance" the Texas Supreme Court will declare Texas' school finance system unconstitutional, which would throw schools in disarray and require a special legisla-

tive session. If the court does, Bullock said he hopes it issues "clear-cut guidelines" on what constitutes a legal system.

"We followed what we thought were their guidelines," Bullock said. "If they reverse that decision, I'm going to be critical of them in public."

**Mauro, Gramm Feud**

Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro last week accused U. S. Sen. Phil Gramm of trying to steal credit for his plan to clean up Texas beaches.

Republican Gramm, sponsor of a \$100 million clean-up bill, failed to invite Mauro to participate in his press conference and later denied Mauro's charge.

Mauro, a Democrat, said the plan was drawn

up by a panel chaired by one of his staff members.

**Turner's Bad Week**  
 After failing to appear for a hearing, a state district judge ordered Rep. Sylvester Turner, D-Houston, to pay more than \$49,000 in a civil case accusing him of misrepresenting a client's fire insurance claim.

Turner, who is campaigning to become the first black mayor of Houston, had a bad week: media reports linked him as the attorney in a possible faked death for insurance benefits scam, and his legislative aide was jailed in Louisiana for possession of 64 grams of cocaine.

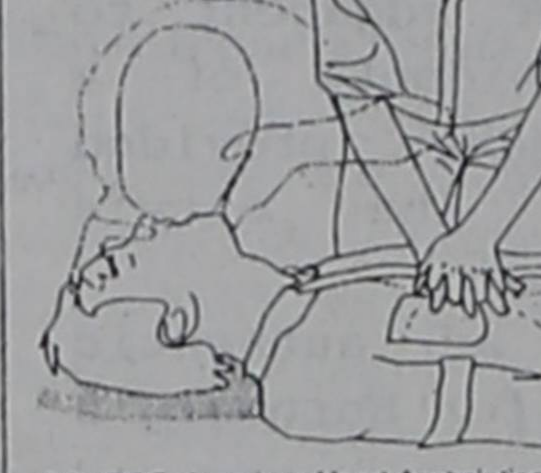

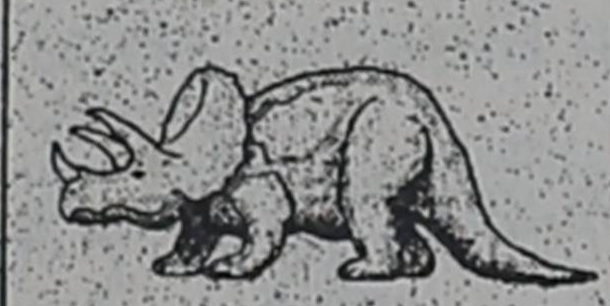

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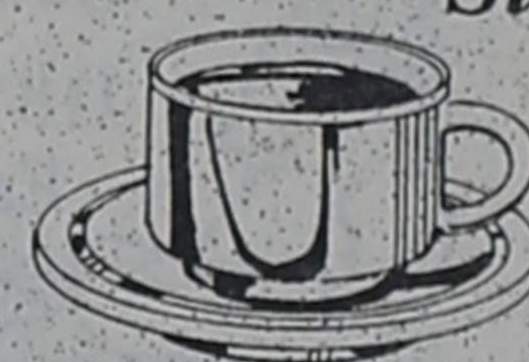

# Texas Grown Ornamentals And Christmas Trees Provide More Than Decoration

Brilliantly-colored poinsettias and lush Christmas trees offer a festive touch during the holiday season. But holiday plants and trees also provide a major boost to the Texas economy, Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said.

"With the combined sales of more than \$20 million dollars a year, Texas-grown Christmas trees and poinsettias are a welcome Christmas gift for our statewide economy," Perry said during a Capitol news conference designed to promote the state's horticulture industry.

Texas is the third largest producer of nursery products in America — fourth nationally in poinsettia production alone, Perry said. Ornamental plants overall are the state's fifth largest agricultural commodity. And while the Texas Christmas tree industry is still in its infancy, it, too, is becoming an important

economic asset. With this abundance of Texas-grown horticultural products, Perry is encouraging consumers shopping for that perfect Christmas tree or plant to look for the Texas Grown label.

"Frankly, it's good not only for Texas producers, but for consumers, who can rest assured that when they buy Texas, they buy Texas quality and freshness," Perry said. "Just as importantly, when we buy Texas-grown trees and plants, we help the Texas economy."

In all, Texas nursery growers sell more than \$500 million a year in ornamental plants, including \$12.5 million worth of poinsettias each year. Other Texas-grown holiday plants include Christmas cactus, azaleas and containerized hollies.

In addition, this year the state's Christmas tree harvest of some 400,000 trees will account for another \$8 million in sales

— up from \$6.5 million in 1989. The annual economic impact of the Christmas tree industry is \$17 million.

"The horticulture industry is a crucial part of our state's economy, and it deserves our support," Perry said. "So, when

Texans think Christmas trees, I hope they'll think Texas. And when Texans buy holiday plants, I want to encourage them to buy

Texas."

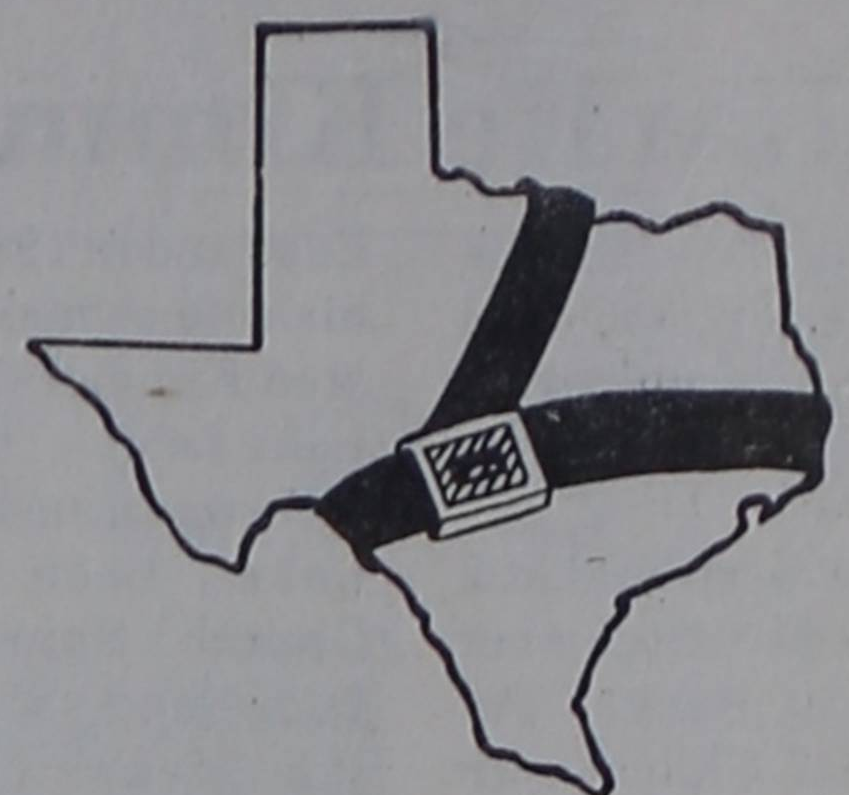

Perry was joined at the news conference by Ellen Ellison, president of Ellison's Greenhouses Inc. in Brenham, and Marshall Frazier, who owns Sour Fork Christmas Tree Plantation in Waelder.

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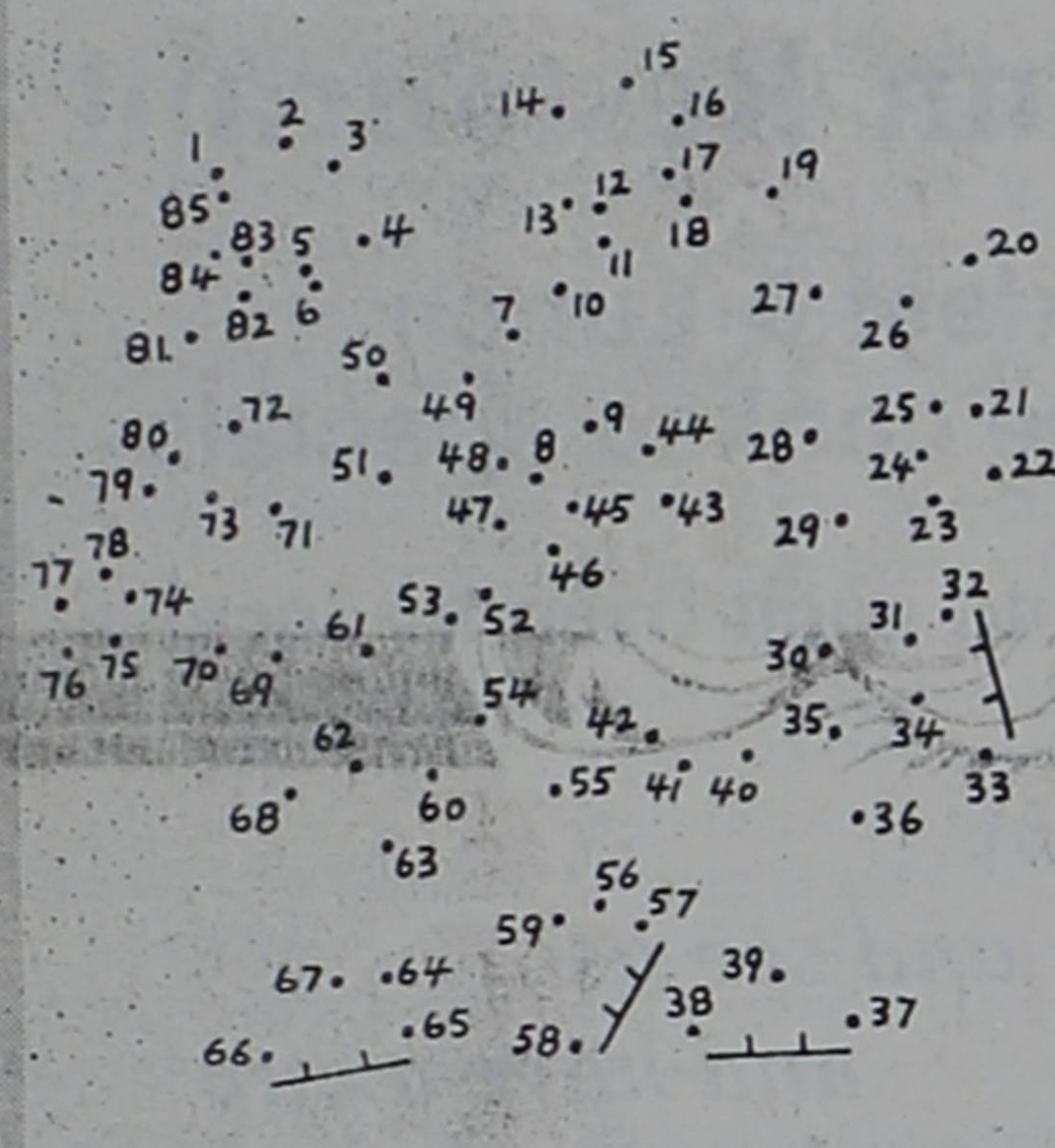

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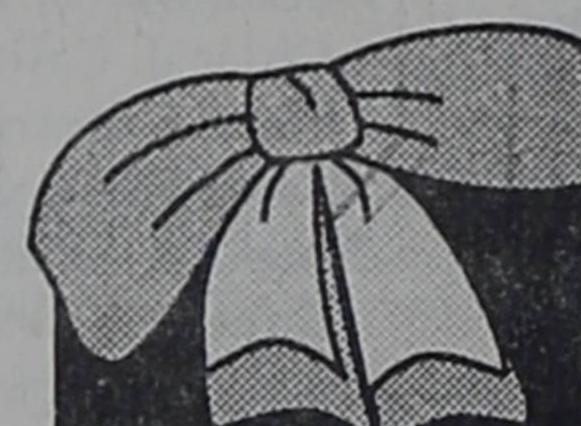

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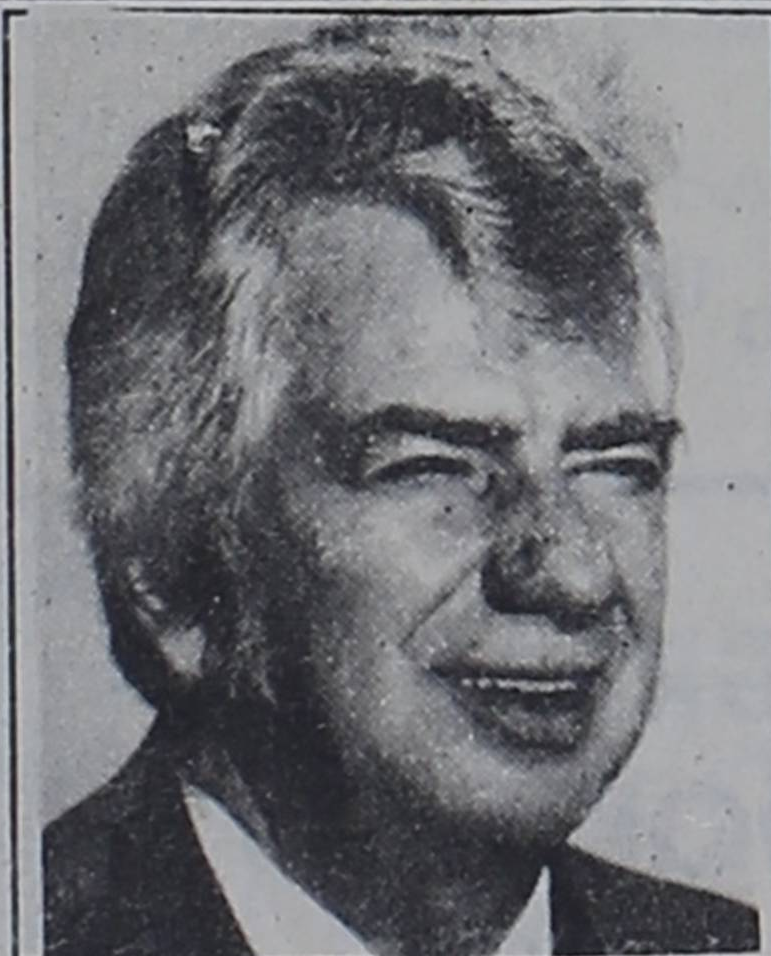
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**Your Bible Questions Answered**  
By Dr. M.H. Clark

**QUESTION:** "Why do Christians worship on the first day of the week instead of the seventh-day sabbath?"

**ANSWER:** The first mention of the seventh day is found in Genesis 2:2,3, where we read the God "rested" on this day from His creation work, and that He "blessed and sanctified" this day. But notice carefully that we read NOT ONE SINGLE WORD about the seventh day or the "sabbath" in the rest of the Book of Genesis, which covers a period of about 2500 years (if we accept the traditional dates of Bishop Ussher). For two thousand and five hundred years there is not one word about it. There is not even a hint that God ever told Adam, Noah, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, or Joseph to cease from work and rest on that seventh day or any other day. There is not the slightest hint that anybody in those two and a half millenniums ever observed that day.

But then after God had chosen Israel, the descendants of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, as His special chosen people for a special purpose, He commanded them to observe the seventh day, or "sabbath." It was one of the Ten Commandments in the Law of Moses. (Read Exodus 16:23-36; 20:8-11; 31:12-18.) Notice that in the last reference we are told in verses 13 and 17 the sabbath was "A SIGN BETWEEN ME AND THE CHILDREN OF ISRAEL FOREVER."

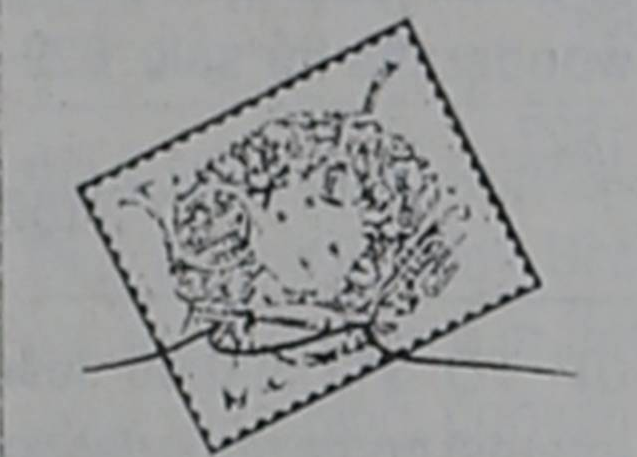
Just like circumcision, this relationship of God with the nation Israel. Then look in the Book of Nehemiah, chapter 9 and verse 14, where in their prayer to Jehovah, the Levites said to Him, "And made known unto THEM (Israel) thy holy sabbath." The sabbath, which God himself had "blessed and sanctified," was not made known to anybody on earth until it was made known to the Jews, the nation of Israel, 2,500 years later. It was plainly said to be a "sign" of the covenant relation between Jehovah and Israel. The Jews will yet again observe that seventh day when Christ returns to this earth to rule over them, in person, as well as over all the nations.

But in this present age, a separate and different age, our whole faith, our whole hope for eternity, rests upon the glorious fact of the resurrection of Christ (1 Corinthians 15:1-20) on the "first day of the week" (Matthew 28:1; Mark 16:1-2; Luke 24:1; John 20:1). This first day became the day of Christians, believers in Christ and in salvation only through Him, to cease from their ordinary pursuits and assemble to worship Him (Acts 20:7; First Corinthians 16:1,2). This is undoubtedly "the Lord's Day" spoken of by John in Revelation 1:10. Moreover, we are told over and over in the books of Romans and Galatians that believers in Christ "ARE NOT UNDER THE LAW," that is, the Mosaic Law which was given to Israel and Israel alone. See Romans 3:20, 28; 4:18-16; 6:14; Galatians 2:

16, 21; 3:10-13; 5:1-5. The seventh-day sabbath was not given to man for some 2500 years of human history, and that to only one nation as a sign of their particular relationship to God. It has no binding effect upon Christians whatsoever.

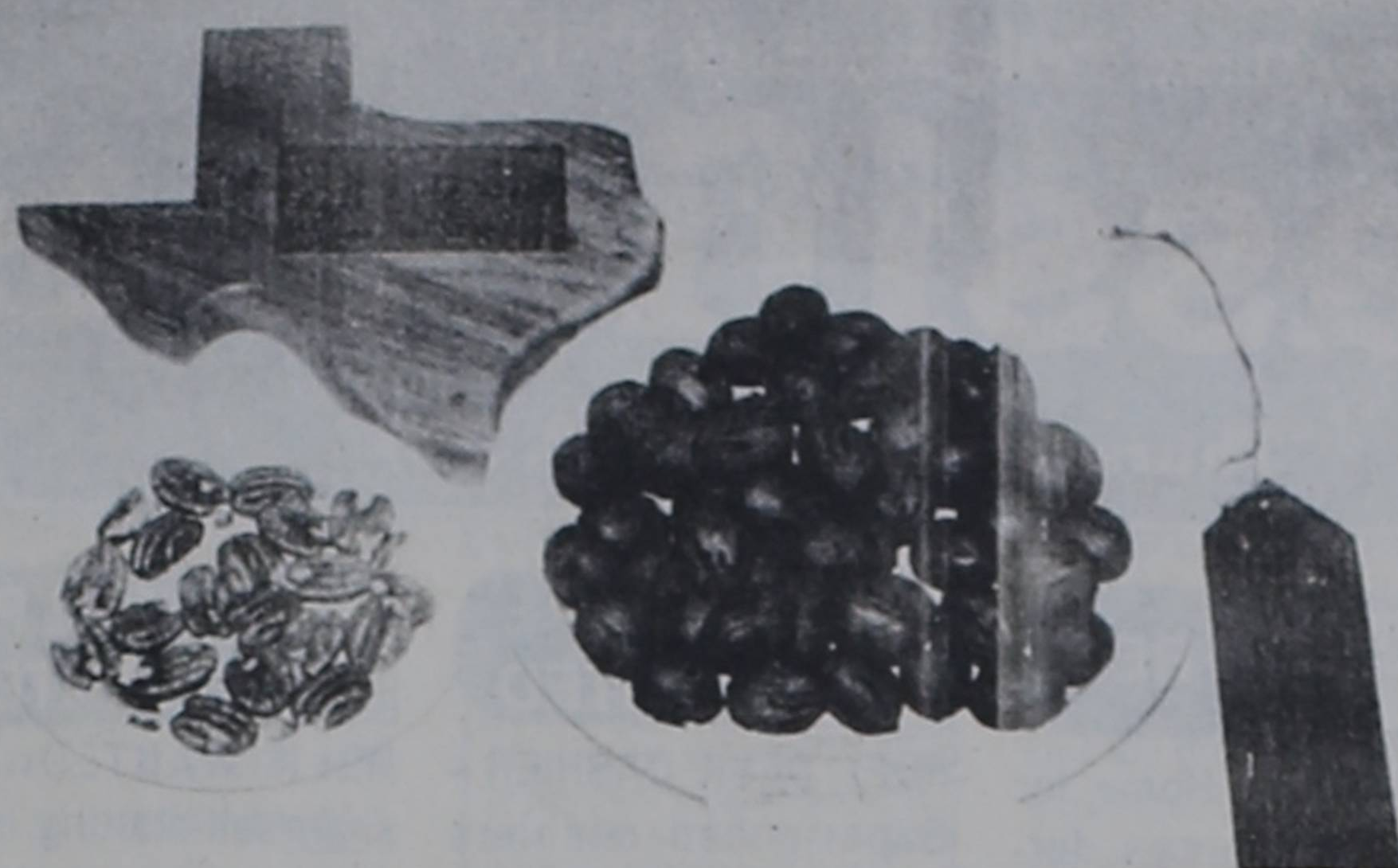

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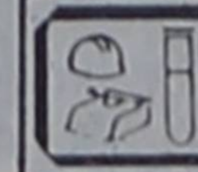

**Business Travelers Can Stay Overnight In Texas For Less**

"When compared with other major cities around the country, Texas offers some expense account bargains," State Comptroller John Sharp said. "When business travelers compare the cost of one night's lodging, dinner, taxi, a movie and a local newspaper, Dallas and Houston come out big winners," Sharp said. Cities compared in the study, conducted by Runzheimer International, included Atlanta, Chicago, Dallas, Denver, Houston, Los Angeles, New York and Washington, D.C. "When ranking the cost of a night's single lodging, Dallas tied with Denver for the least expensive, with an average room rate of \$100. Houston was close behind at \$107 per night. New York had the most expensive average cost of \$232. Other cities' costs were Atlanta, \$116; Chicago, \$162; Los Angeles, \$147; and Washington, D.C., \$184," Sharp said. "Meanwhile, the average cost of dinner for one ranges from \$19.32 in Dallas to \$35.33 in New York. Second to Dallas was Denver, where dinners cost \$21.60. Dinners in Atlanta and Houston average just over \$22. Dinners in Chicago, Washington, D.C. and Los Angeles all fall in the \$23 price range. The survey also found that movies in Dallas and Houston compared quite favorably to the other cities at under \$6. That was considerably less than the cost of a movie ticket in

New York that will run well over \$7. The cost of a daily newspaper in Dallas and Houston also compared favorably with those of the other cities in the survey. Hailing a taxi from downtown to the airport in Houston does cost around \$27.50, the most expensive of cities in the comparison. Other cities, with their corresponding averages, are: Los Angeles, \$24; Chicago, \$23; Dallas, \$22.50; New York, \$17; Atlanta, \$15; Denver, \$10.20; and Washington, D.C., \$6.80.

## Cold, Icy Weather Could Pose Threat To Home LP-Gas Users

With the arrival of the winter heating season, Texas homeowners who fuel furnaces and appliances with liquefied petroleum gas should double-check to make sure the regulator on their LP-gas tank is properly installed, say Chairman Lena Guerrero and safety officials of the Railroad Commission's Liquefied Petroleum Gas Division.

If the regulator vents over, high-pressure gas can be released directly to home appliances. A normal 3/4-inch blue flame on an appliance could suddenly surge, becoming a dangerous torch. Over the past few winters, several fires have been caused by such regulator freeze-ups, officials say.

Regulators on many home tanks are located

under a protective metal dome on the top of the tank, shielding them from weather and insects. However, homeowners with tanks where the circular regulator has been installed outside the dome cover should check to make sure that the regulator vent is pointing down toward the ground, away from the elements.

If homeowners are concerned about whether or not their regulator is properly installed, they should contact the local LP-gas dealer that fills or services their tank.

For economic reasons, some consumers are buying propane in portable tanks for use as a supplemental heat source. However, a dangerous and potentially deadly situation can develop when homeowners bring LP-gas

portable cylinders indoors. Commission safety regulations prohibit portable LP-gas containers indoors because of the danger of explosion or fire if stored too close to a heat source.

Cylinders and containers must be installed outside in accordance with the Commission's LP-gas safety rules.

LP-gas, more commonly known as propane or butane, is used as a residential and commercial fuel in areas where natural gas utility service is not available.

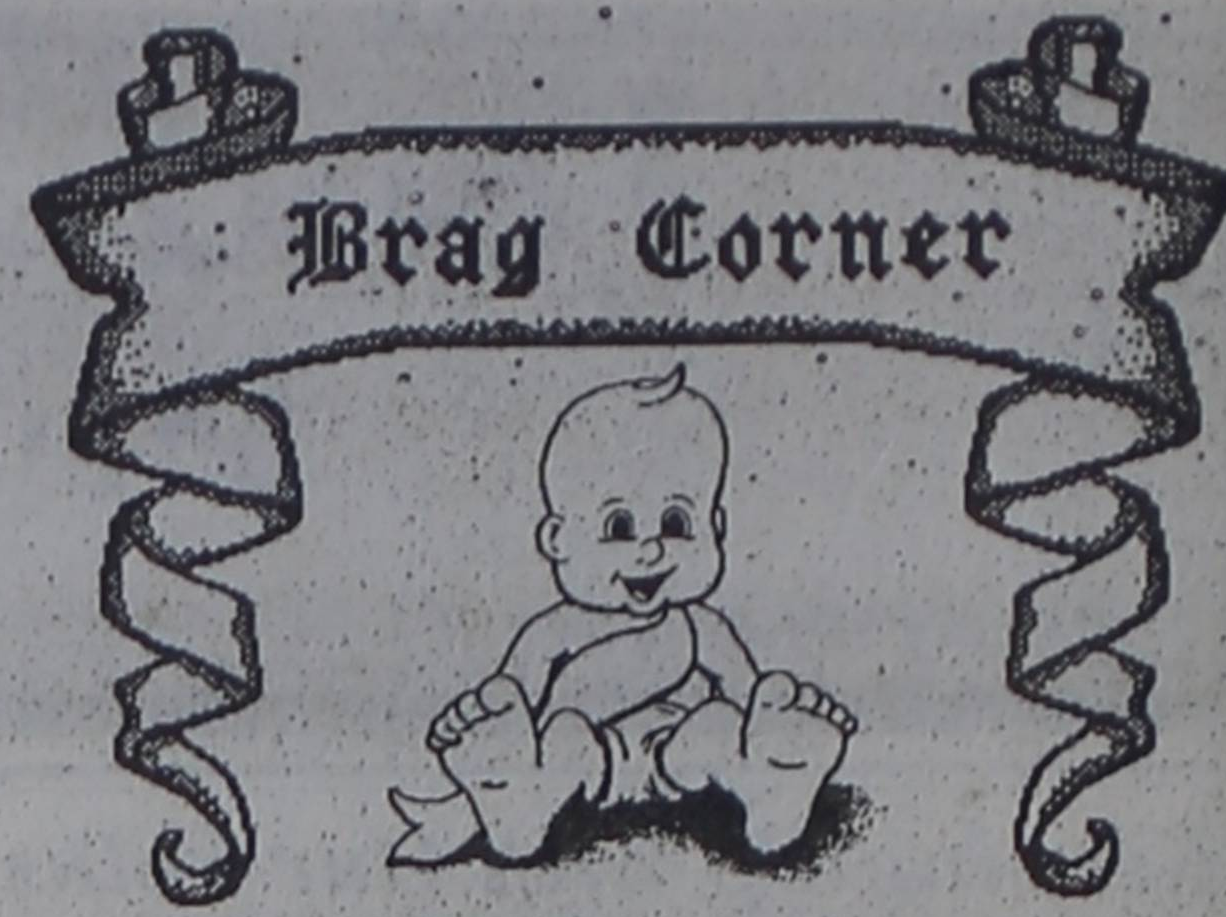

## TDA Has Grant To Develop New Program

The Texas Department of Agriculture and Texas A&M University have been awarded \$180,000 by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to help other states develop farm worker protection programs, Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry announced.

The grant will enable Texans to share their expertise in implementing and enforcing the Texas Agriculture Hazard Communication Act, Perry said. The act, more commonly known as the Right-to-Know law, serves to protect farm workers when they work around pesticides.

As a result of the grant award, Perry said TDA and Texas A&M will conduct two training workshops next year. Officials from as many as 45 states are expected to attend.

"Our Right-to-Know program will serve as a model for states developing their own worker protection programs," Perry said. "In fact, this critical Texas statute is being used to a great extent to develop proposed federal regulations."

The federal government is requiring that all states have agriculture worker protection plans. Final federal guidelines on farm worker protection are expected to be in place in 1992.

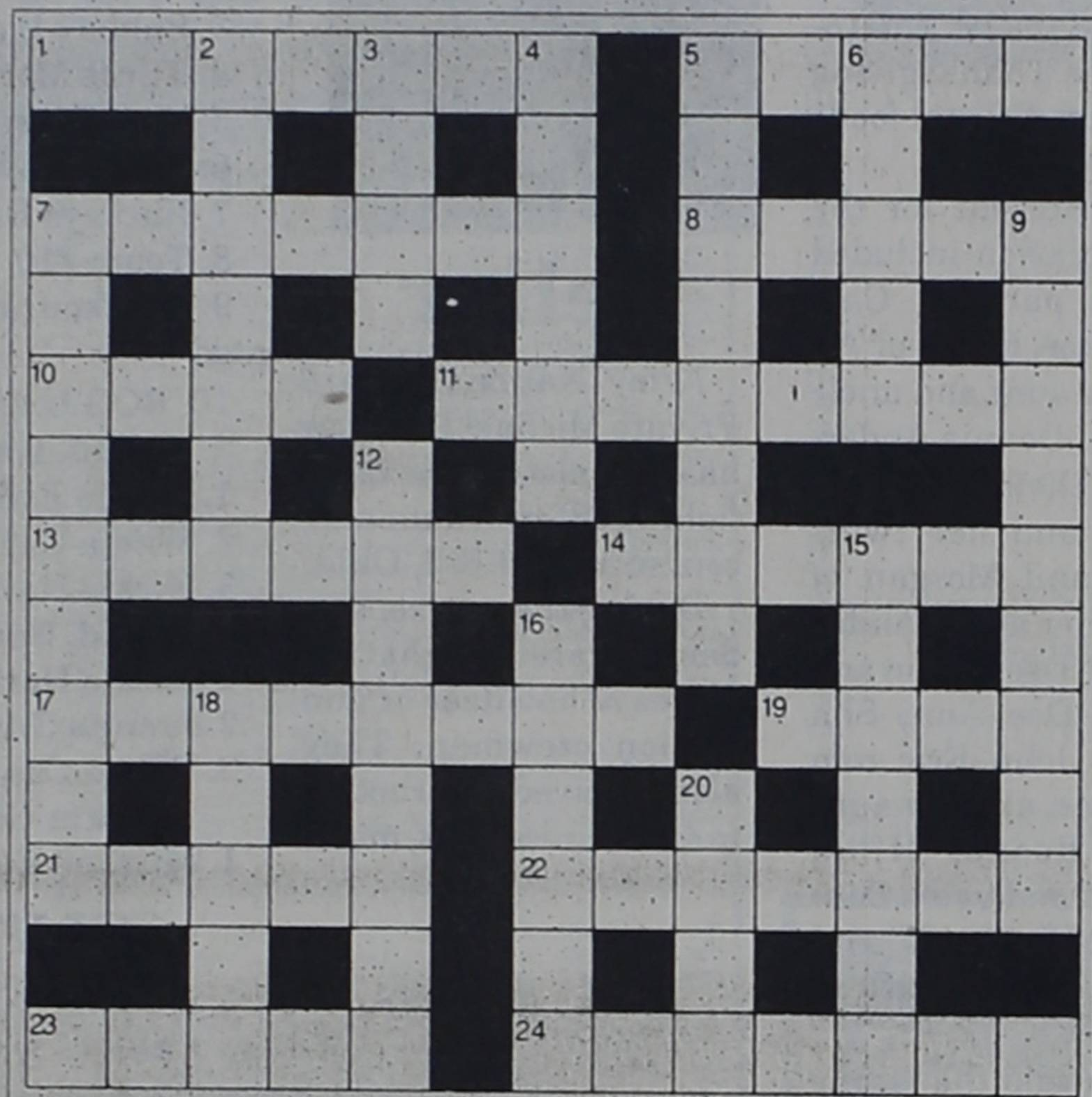
Under the Right-to-Know program, administered by TDA, farm workers must be advised about the types of chemicals they are working around, pesticide poisoning symptoms and ways to guard against contamination.

In September, TDA took the first legal enforcement action ever pursued under the Right-to-Know law. In that case, a farming operation paid \$1,000 in fines - the maximum allowed by law - for failure to comply with provisions of the statute.

The two worker protection training sessions will be held next year in March and October in McAllen.

The sessions will include trips to fields where produce is hand-harvested to give participants and understanding of the complexities involved in developing and implementing worker protection standards.

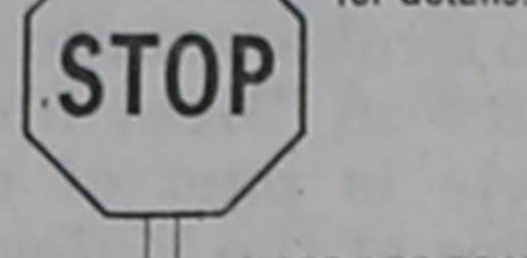

### CRAPPIE TIMES A COMING

Area lakes came to life over the past weekend. Warmer weather gave anglers that much needed break to venture out on the water. And for the most part the fish joined in and bit well.

Crappie were the top catches at almost all lakes. Hubbard Creek, Oak Creek, Brownwood, Daniels and a reported 3 pound crappie came from Leon but confirmation hasn't been made. Jigs are out producing minnows as a rule right now. One source reported the jig bite

coming as the jig was moving up. The only detection being a little slack in the line as the fish would take the bait towards the surface. A heavy dose of fish formula will increase your time to react when the bite is this tough.

The largemouth were biting best at big windy "Hubbard Creek". A nice 8.06 came from the "Game Warden Slough" plus a stringer of 2 pounders. Crankbaits were the top bait, in a shad pattern. The actual Hubbard Creek area was host to some nice crappie action

and a bunch of small buck bass.

Lake Leon now has a certified bass record on file in Austin. We still need to have all catfish species, hybrid strippers, black and white crappie, warmouth, all bluegill, sun fish, perch, goggle eye, etc. records certified and proper paper work filed in Austin. So if you feel you have a record setter please give me a call and I will help you get your name in the records.
