State Redistricting Plan Rejected - Primary Election March 10

Eastland County Clerk JoAnn Johnson reports that she has received confirmation from the Texas Secretary of State that the U.S. Supreme Court has rejected the State's redistricting appeal.

The plan that will be used is the Federal Court Redistricting plan, with Primary Elections to be held March 10 as scheduled.

Absentee balloting (Early Voting) will be held from Feb. 19 through March 6. Registration to vote in the Election will be open until Feb. 10,

thirty days before the Primary.

In the latest ruling a Three-Judge panel for the U.S. Supreme Court turned down a request by the State for a stay on a previous ruling by the State Court. The State Legislature had worked on redistricting plans during a regular session last summer and a special session called Jan. 2.

More information on the Federal Court Plan will be available soon. It is known that Senator Glasgow will still represent Eastland County under this plan.

The Smokestack Restaurant Burned Down

A 100 year old building burned down Wednesday at 5:00 P.M. between Abilene and Dallas, and just in case you don't know which one I am talking about, it was the Smokestack Restaurant. It was owned and operated by Randy and Andrea Bennett.

Two employees, the Bennetts' daughter Mollie and Teresa Cockburn, who also lived on the 2nd floor and two or three customers were in the building when Teresa noticed something wrong with one of the fryolators and immediately called the owners. The fire started at 4:30 p.m. and spread through a ventilator to the ceiling and second floor, according to

Andrea Bennett. The fryolators are supposed to shut off when they reach a certain temperature, but they didn't. And they just kept getting hotter and hotter until there was grease flaming several feet in the air. Mr. Bennett was able to put out the flames several times but it kept coming up again and again. It was a hopeless cause.

Firefighters fought the fire, but they had little water to do so, and had to drive 12 miles to refill their pumper trucks. There was a lot of old wood inside and it went up pretty fast. They hope to rebuild, but it's too early to think about that.



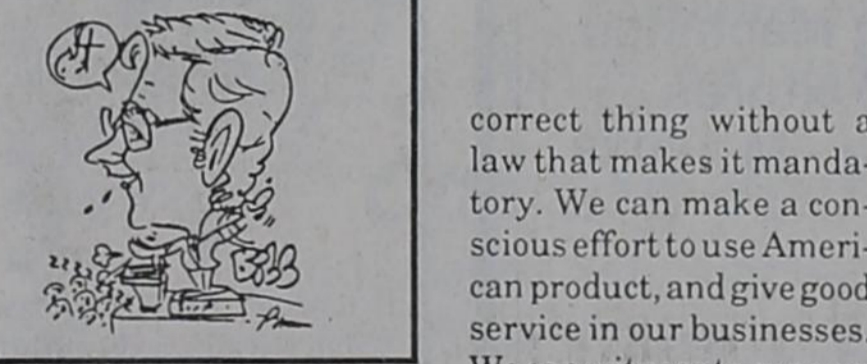

POINTS TO PONDER

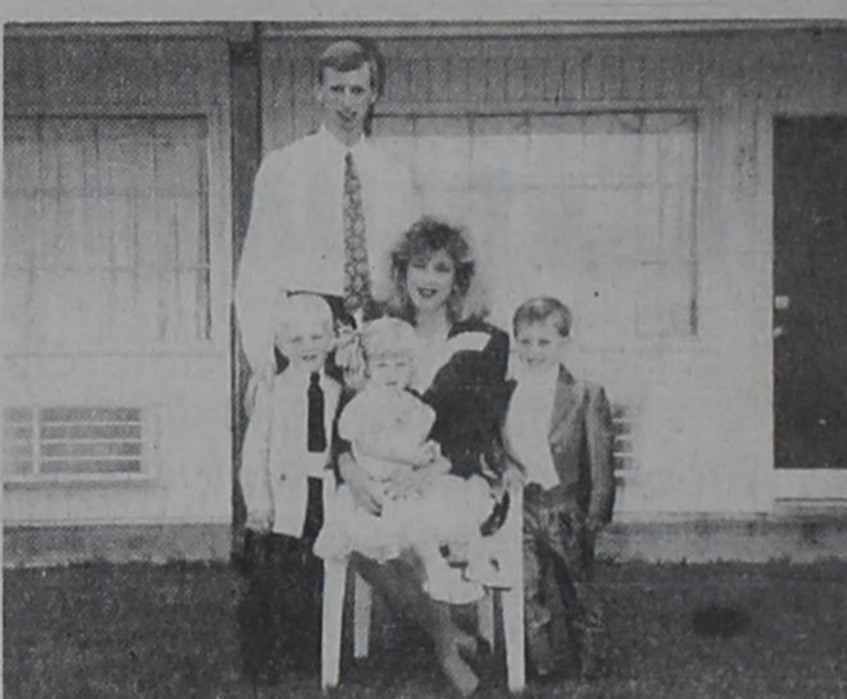

Many Disaster Assistance Programs Available To Texas Farmers And Ranchers

Fifteen assistance programs are available to farm and ranch families who live in flood-ravaged Texas counties that have been declared federal disaster areas, Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said.

The programs and the assistance available through each one are:

1. Farm Assistance: The Farmers Home Administration may make emergency loans to farmers or ranchers to compensate them for actual property or produce on capacity. For more information contact the local county FmHA office.

2. Other Agricultural Services: Farmers and ranchers may apply for cost-sharing grants for emergency conservation programs, such as debris removal from crop or pasture lands, repairs to land or water conservation structures and fencing. For more information contact the local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

3. Disaster Unemployment Assistance: This assistance provides weekly payments to people who are unemployed due to a disaster. This includes self-employed persons, farm workers, farm and ranch owners and others not

covered under regular unemployment insurance programs. This program is administered by the Texas Employment Commission.

4. Tax Assistance: The Internal Revenue Service allows casualty losses that were suffered on home, personal property and household goods to be deducted on income tax returns if these items are not covered by insurance. For more information call the IRS at 1-800-424-1040.

5. Disaster Housing Assistance Program: The Federal Emergency Management Agency may provide funds for alternate rental housing or emergency home repairs for those who have lost their permanent residence.

6. Individual and Family Grant Program: Grants are available for eligible victims to meet serious needs or necessary expenses not covered by other disaster programs or insurance. The Texas Department of Human Services administers this grant program.

7. Home/Personal Loans: Disaster loans through the Small Business Administration are available to home owners and renters for restoring

or replacing uninsured damaged property.

8. Emergency Assistance: Emergency food, clothing, shelter and medical assistance may be provided to individuals and families affected by a disaster. Assistance may be provided by the American Red Cross, the Salvation Army, church groups and other voluntary organizations.

9. Business Disaster Loans: Disaster loans through the SBA are available to repair or replace destroyed or damaged business buildings, inventory, machinery or equipment. Maximum loan amounts are \$500,000.

10. Insurance Information: Assistance and/or counseling is available on insurance problems and questions. Contact the State Board of Insurance or the National Flood Insurance Program at 1-800-638-6620.

11. Legal Services: Free legal advice, counseling and representation may be provided to low-income disaster victims. Services include replacing legal documents, transferring titles, wills and landlord related problems. Contact your local legal aid society or the Disaster Hotline at 1-800-462-9029.

12. Social Security Benefits: The Social Security Administration provides assistance in expediting check delivery and in applying for disability and survivor benefits. Call your local Social Security office for more information.

13. Veterans Benefits: The Veterans Administration can expedite delivery of information about benefits, pensions, insurance settlements and VA mortgage loans. Check your telephone directory for the toll-free number under Veterans Administration.

14. Consumer Services: Counseling on consumer problems such as price gouging and disreputable business concerns and practices is available. Contact the Texas Attorney General's Office or other local and state entities.

15. Aging Services: Services to meet the needs of the elderly who are impacted by disasters. For more information contact the State Commission on Aging or local area agency on aging.

Pharmacy Topics

Extensive study at Harvard University school of Public Health indicates that moderate alcohol intake -- one or two drinks a day -- substantially cuts the risk of heart disease.

After pupils are dilated for an eye examination, new eye drops return them to normal quickly so patients can resume their usual activities. Dapirazole is approved by the Food and Drug Administration.

The mercury in tooth fillings -- a small amount in the silver amalgam -- poses no health threat to patients, the National Institutes of Health concluded. The amalgam has been in use for almost 150 years.

Measles is on the rise, perhaps because only 60 percent of youngsters in some areas have been immunized. Children generally should have the first shot at 15 months, the Centers for Disease Control suggest.

Temporary memory lapses may be caused by low levels of zinc and iron. Research at the University of Texas in Galveston suggests that supplementation of both minerals helps restore short-term memory.

"CAN THIS be real?" You ask yourself that often as you explore the fairy-tale castles of King Ludwig II, the legendary, larger-than-life monarch who, with his monuments, have come to be almost symbols of Germany, and known around the wide world. Real, indeed. The most regal Royal Castles Neuschwanstein with its towers and turrets, no doubt the most remarkable: lover of Wagner's operas, Ludwig hired a set designer, not an architect, and it soars from its mountainside like the stage creation it is. No wonder then that it was Walt Disney's model for the movie Sleeping Beauty and for the centerpiece of his amusement parks.

Gaynell and I picked a perfect crystal-clear day from Garmisch. The height to which he built and to which you bus, van and walk today is no small piece of cake. And as you walk the guarded porticos, and drink the view from the ramparts, you get a feeling for this unusual king. A member of a the dynasty that had ruled Bavaria since 1180, he devoted his entire time and energies to creating flights of fancy that came close to bankrupting his government. Finally, in 1886, before this particular castle was finished, officials became convinced that Ludwig had taken leave of his senses, and a medical commission forced him to give up the throne. He was

incarcerated in a lesser lakeside castle, Berg on the Starnbergersee. On the evening of June 13, 1886, his second day there, the king and his doctor disappeared. Later that night, their bodies were pulled from the lake. Circumstances remain a mystery today. Strange indeed.

The interior is befitting: his bedroom is tomb-like with a giant Gothic bed. The throne room is throne-less. Corridors are ghostly grottos, as though from Wagner's frightful operas. During the 17 years from the start of construction until his death, the king spent only about 100 days here. His Ministrel's hall, completed as he designed it, holds chamber concerts to this day.

Most of the photos you see of this castle are made from Mary's Bridge, spun like a medieval maiden's hair across a deep, narrow gorge. From this vantage point, there are great views of the castle and the great Upper Bavarian plain beyond. More than a million people visit the castle annually and summer lines are reported to be two hours long, so our early November visit was right. Situated high above the Pollat gorge, the castle is, by Ludwig's order, "in the style of the ancient German knights' castles," in white stone, a splendid fairy tale edifice.

His Linderhob Palace is in the nearby Graswang valley and it looks like a rococo pearl embedded in a landscape that has been raised up artificially. He must have been intoxicated by the past, and looking at these today, it's not hard to imagine what they did to the Bavarian treasury. It was at Neuschwanstein

that his ministers, making their first visit, came to inform him that he had been deposed.

Wagner apparently saw Ludwig as a source of financing for his extravagant operas rather than a kindred spirit. While Bismarck was ruthlessly unifying Germany from his power base in Berlin, Ludwig (The Dream King) was building a succession of elaborate and wildly romantic palaces, summer houses and public buildings in and near Munich in the South which his family helped develop in many, many ways.

On an island in Lake Chiemsee, he built his third and most sumptuous Schloss Herrenchiemsee, modeled after the Louise XIV's great palace at

Versailles, even up to and including the famous Hall of Mirrors, a dazzling hall where concerts are held in season. Ludwig saw himself as a Sun King too, and the people laughed and called him mad. Today, the Dream King's creations are the absolute top German tourist attractions. Once an embarrassment perhaps but not now. National treasures, indeed!

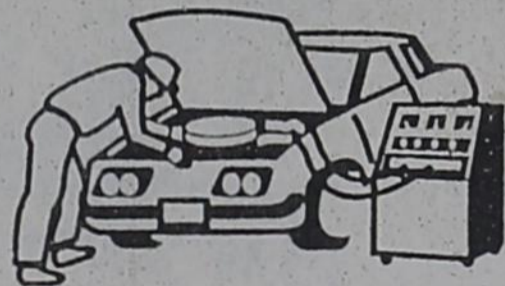

7. 16.77, Mill Creek, caught 3-01-90 by Herchel Brickey
8. 16.75, Lake Fork, caught 3-08-90 by Steve Trephus
9. 16.59, Lake Fork, caught 5-15-87 by Guy Witherspoon
10. 16.54, Lake Fork, caught 2-27-91 by Bill Reed

Of the top 50 fish certified in the state of Texas 34 have come from Lake Fork. To be on the top 50 an angler must have a fish weighing at least 14.53 pounds.

Other lakes represented on this list include: Pinkston 1, Mill Creek 2, Gibbons Creek 2, Possum Kingdom 2, Echo 1, Amis-

tad 2, Welsh 1, Houston County 1, Jacksonville 1, Falcon 1, Choke Canyon 1, and Lake Murvaul 1.

The previous year of 1991 bassin placed 12 fish in the top 50. 1992 is expected to give us a new state record, but then so were previous years. Conditions are stacking up for it this year with plenty of water, ample cold weather and an increase in past years of catch and live release.

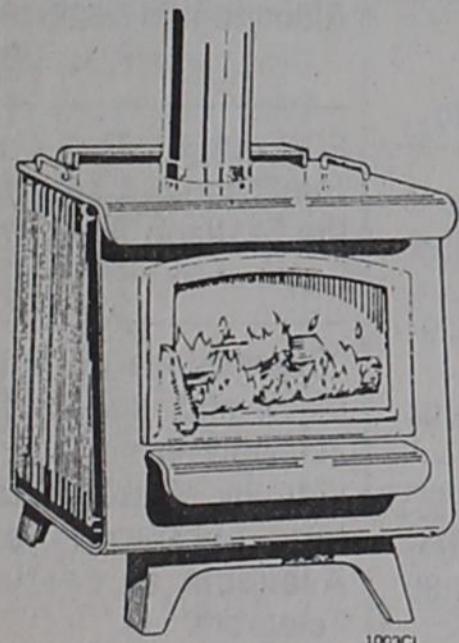

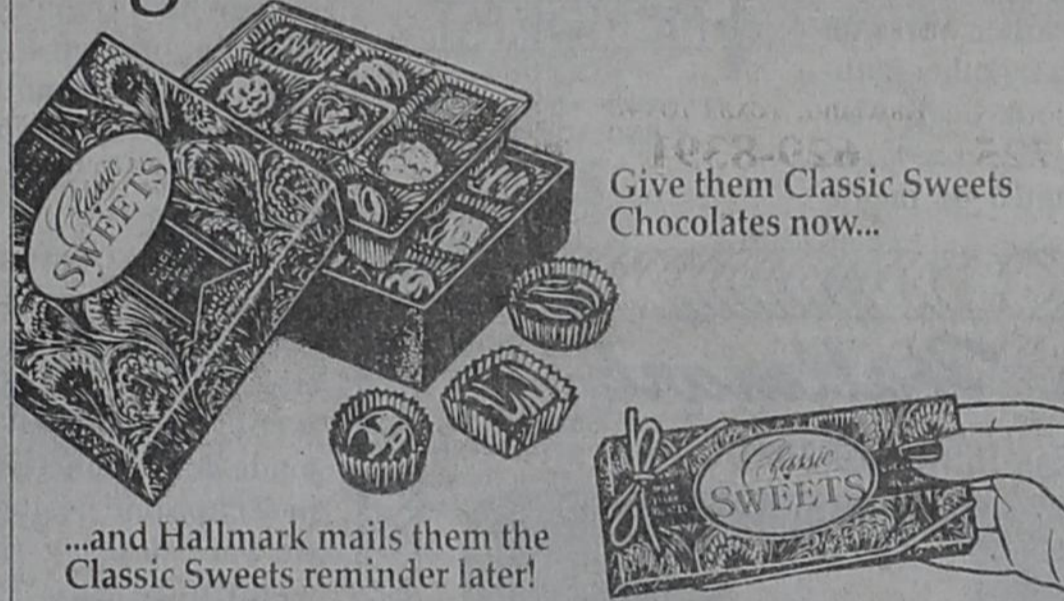

...THE INDIANS OF TEXAS: FROM PREHISTORIC TO MODERN TIMES By W.W. Newcomb, Jr. Reviewer Pat Gohlke.

Although very little is factually known about the beginnings of man on the North or South American Continents, Professor Newcomb has analyzed and arranged with a critical and scholarly eye, the archeological information in a most persuasive way. He states that "...we should count ourselves lucky that we know as much as we do."

Unlike earlier works on this subject by other authors, this book deals with all of the tribes known to have inhabited or migrated through the area now known as Texas.

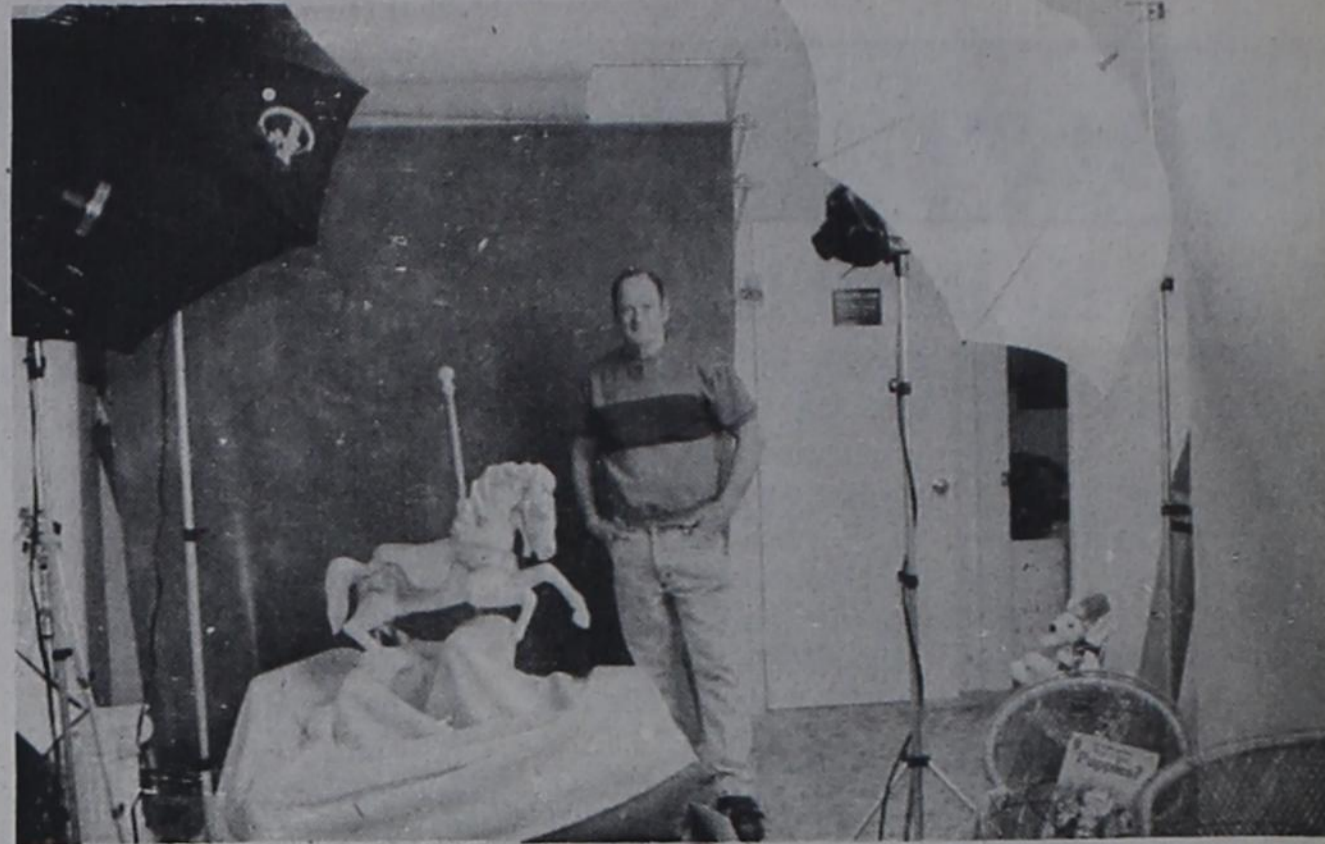
Professor Newcomb, as a professor of Anthropology at the University of Texas, has approached the cultures of each tribe, describing their differences and similarities, their languages, worship, social systems, eating habits, etc.

In his forward he states "Every human organism is born into one culture or another, and quite literally it embraces and envelops him at the moment of birth..." He further states that "The story of the Texas Indians concerns but a minute segment of human existence, a cupful taken in a moment from the stream of human events..." but for many of us the lives of our Indian predecessors holds a romantic and fascinating place in our minds and hearts.

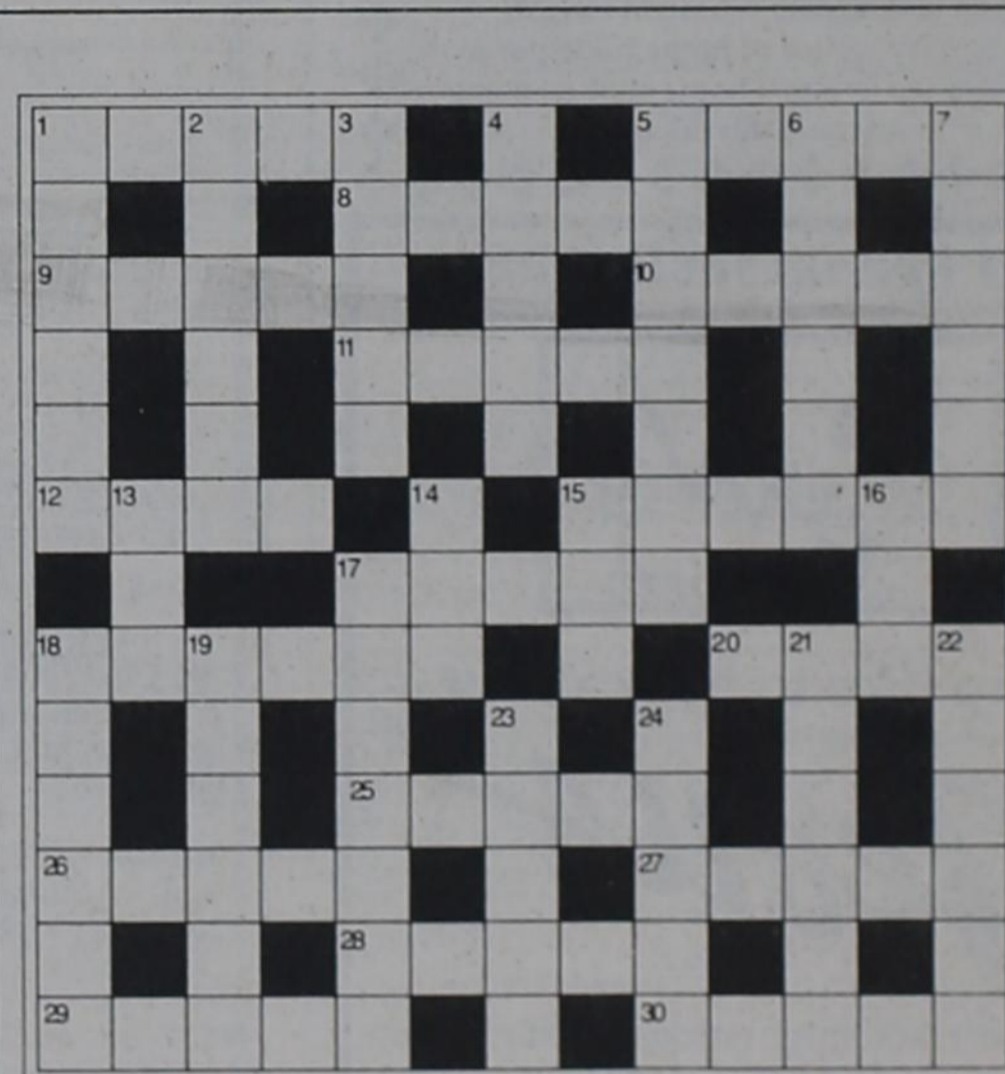

October Texas Gas Production Up Compared To 1990

Railroad Commission Chairman Lena Guerrero announced that Texas oil and gas wells produced 464,510,119 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas in October, up three percent compared to October 1990's gas production total of 454,710,071 Mcf. The September production was 438,628,643 Mcf.

The state's top producing counties, rank ordered by preliminary October production, were: Pecos, 30,744,757 Mcf; Webb, 26,103,369 Mcf; Zapata, 24,951,064 Mcf; Panola, 17,727,431 Mcf; Hidalgo,

16,826,391 Mcf; Crane, 12,714,270 Mcf; Hemphill, 9,348,471 Mcf; Yoakum, 9,245,311 Mcf; Crockett, 8,910,356 Mcf; and Ector, 7,917,705 Mcf.

Texas gas production in October came from 180,003 oil wells and 46,395 gas wells.

Eastland County wells are reported to have produced 858,941 Mcf of gas in October.

HIGHLIGHTS

The million dollar special session adjourned last week, and nobody could say for sure whether anything had been accomplished.

What is certain is that until a federal court speaks, the Texas primary election is now in chaos on several fronts:

- Candidates meeting the Jan. 10 filing deadline did so amid the uncertainty of unfinished boundary lines;

- Texas voters may not be balloting with the rest of the South in the March 12 Super Tuesday presidential primary; and

- The primary, whenever we finally get around to having it, may cost taxpayers an extra \$1.4 million.

In the House, the end of an ear came into sight when Speaker Gib Lewis announced he will not seek re-election, but told members he intends to remain presiding officer for another year.

Lewis, a conservative Fort Worth Democrat, faces trial on two misdemeanor ethics charges, but some insiders say he is tired of being hounded by liberals in his party.

The Gib Lewis Legacy

Since 1982, flush with new seats, liberal Democrats have sought to organize the Texas House along party lines, like the U.S. Congress, in order to control it.

But Lewis swept into the first of five terms in 1983, heir to the system of predecessor Billy Clayton which handed out a fair

share of plums to Republican lawmakers.

Since then, the Legislature has increased expenditures and taxes despite Lewis' attempts at restraint.

In 1993, a new era begins in the Texas House, perhaps with Democrats sitting on one side of the aisle and Republicans on the other.

Senate Democrats Prevail

In the Texas Senate, Democrats ran over their Republican colleagues and won approval of a redistricting plan that would preserve a Democratic majority in the Senate.

Last week, Attorney General Dan Morales was in Washington to plead with U.S. Justice Department officials to quickly accept the Senate plan.

"I remain hopeful and optimistic we're going to be able to keep the elections on time, March 10. A delay would have a negative impact," Morales said after meeting with officials.

The Senate plan must be "precleared" by the federal agency even though it is identical to a plan approved by the Justice Department last year.

More Speaker Hopefuls

One thing is certain, there will be no shortage of candidates to succeed Speaker Lewis.

As two more candidates jumped into the race, Capitol lobbyists moved to distance themselves from involvement in the campaign.

Reps. Sam Russell, D-Mount Pleasant, and Tom Uher, D-Bay City, said that they are officially candidates for the speakership.

The two lawmakers joined five other House members who have announced they will seek the post. The other candidates are Reps. Billy Clemons,

D-Pollock; David Cain, D-Dallas; James Hury, D-Galveston; Pete Laney, D-Hale Center; and Jim Rudd, D-Brownfield.

Lawmakers and lobbyists predicted that the race for speaker will be a long battle that might not be settled until November's general election or the start of the next regular session in January 1993.

House Reforms Eyed

One day after Lewis announced his retirement as speaker, a government watchdog group started campaigning to reform the chamber's rules and power structure.

Common Cause of Texas wants to make the House function more openly and democratically after the five-term speaker leaves office next year, said Mary Nell Mathis, state chair of the self-styled citizens lobby.

Electing the speaker by secret ballot is one of the reforms Common Cause is pushing. "This is the only secret vote Common Cause would ever support," Mathis said.

The group plans to mail letters to its 7,000 members to ask House candidates whether they will support reform of the House's operating rules.

After the filing deadline passes, the organization will send a questionnaire to candidates for the 150 House seats. They will be asked whether they back the reforms.

Other Highlights

- Gov. Ann Richards became the first governor in 20 years to grant an executive reprieve. Johnny Frank Garrett was sentenced to die for raping and killing a 76-year-old nun in an Amarillo convent on Halloween 1981.

- Texas Railroad Commissioners adopted a new system to set natural gas production allowables equal to the historic de-

The D.P.S. Hand-Held Laser

The Texas Department of Public Safety soon will be using a hand-held laser speed detector in its traffic law enforcement efforts, DPS Director Col. James Wilson said Friday. "These laser devices cannot be picked up by conventional radar detectors," Wilson said. "Call it Stealth speed enforcement. We think it will have a significant impact on our efforts to slow down Texas drivers. And it is well documented that excessive speed leads to traffic injuries and deaths."

The laser, which weighs four pounds and is similar in appearance to hand-held radar units commonly used by law enforcement, was donated to the DPS by GEICO Insurance Co. The device transmits a narrow beam of infrared light instead of the microwave beam used by traditional radar units.

"We'll be using this high-tech piece of equipment at various locations across the state," Wilson said. "We are delighted to have one, and down the road, we may eventually get more. The only thing holding us back is money: The guns cost about \$3,700 each."
