I now ask for your support by signing the letters of support on the prison proposal. If you have not signed, please come by City Hall and add your name to the list of those supporting this project.

The prison representatives will be in Ranger on Wednesday, February 12th. There will be a reception at the Ranger Volunteer Fire Department from 11:00 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. The representatives will be visiting the proposal site on this date and I would like to urge everyone to show your support by attending this reception.

There will be a community meeting at the Community Club House on Saturday at 2:00 p.m. and again on Monday at 7:00 p.m. If you have any questions or would like to know the facts please attend these meetings.

Felony Burglary Charges Being Filed

A lengthy investigation by Eastland Police and Texas Ranger Gene Kea, in cooperation with the District Attorney's Office, resulted in felony burglary charges being filed on February 6th on a Houston resident.

Emerson Brooks, Jr., age 40, was charged with ten counts of burglary of a building in connection with a series of burglaries that occurred at various places of business in Eastland on the nights of November 25 and 26, 1991. Brooks is being held

in Milam County jail in Cameron, Texas pending trial for other alleged offenses.

The businesses burglarized in November were U-Save Pharmacy, Dr. Tredwell's office, Dr. Jolly's office, State Farm Insurance, Play-Off Sports, Images, Heather's Hallmark, Eastland Video, Kenneth Parker-CPA, and Mangum Service Center.

These cases will be presented to a Grand Jury in Eastland for indictment later this month.

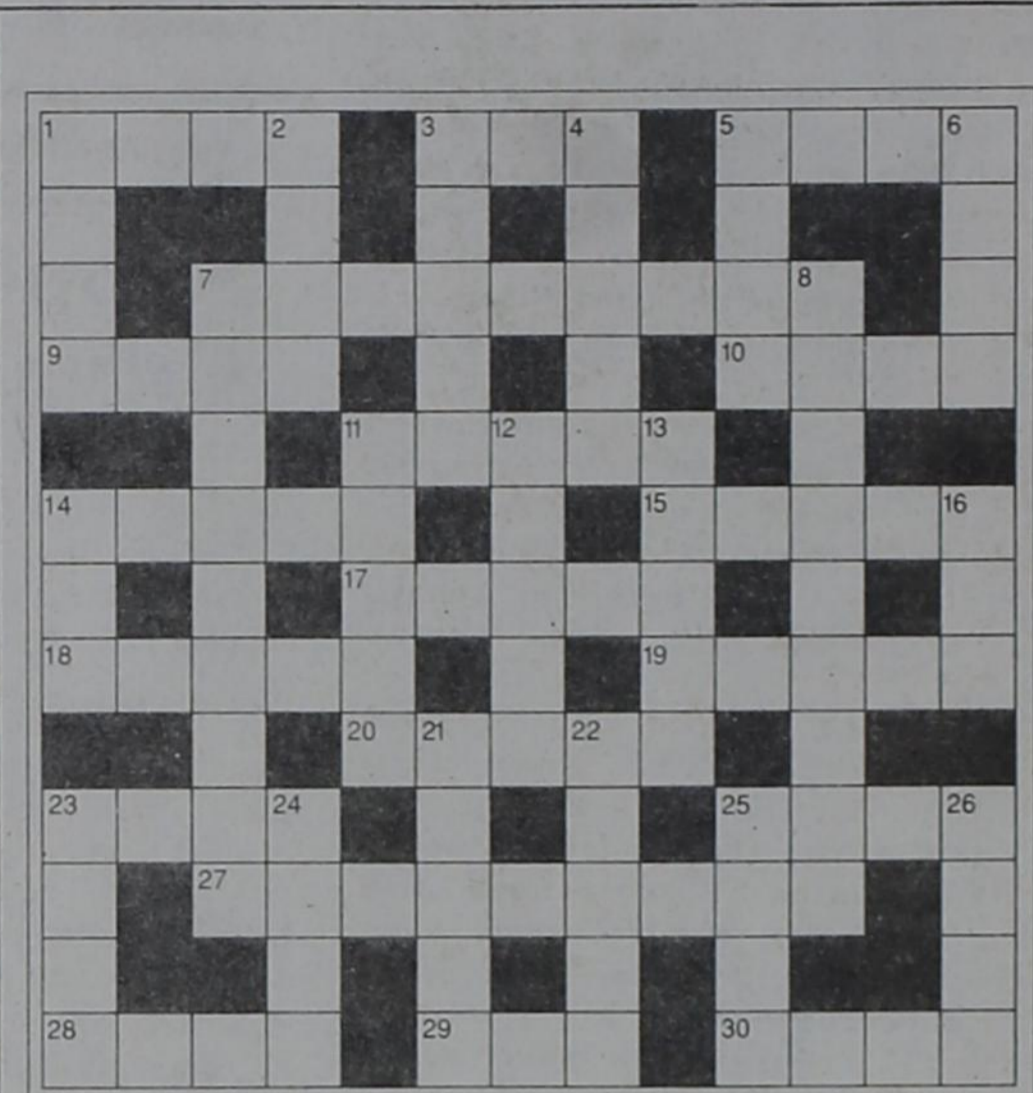

Letter To The Editor

Editor, I started reading a book of a series called "Great Lives Observed" and it certainly did not mean "Good Lives" because this one is of Maximilien Robespierre, one of the bloodiest leaders of the Reign of Terror during the French Revolution. The thing that grabs my attention is that so much said and done in 1792 is exactly like in 1992.

Early in his political activity Robespierre gave an impassioned oration against the death penalty. He claimed that it did not deter crime but in fact caused more crime. Does that have a familiar ring?

Only a couple years later he spoke as eloquently against even a trial for Louis XVI and his demand for execution without further formality was carried out. The ex-king was beheaded.

Today we regularly hear impassioned speeches against executions. Even my own dear Mother refers to executions as "judicial murder". Would you believe those are the exact words Robespierre used two hundred years ago? But Mother would never cry out for bloody vengeance, or would she?

Certainly many would rather deny they were suckered by low lies and war propaganda but the evidence mounts that the story of Iraqi soldiers dumping babies out of incubators was a whopper out of the whole cloth. The girl telling the story was in no way an employee at that hospital because she was of the family rulers of Kuwait and those people had several times the total native population hired to do almost any and all work before the war. On the other hand Egyptian doctors and nurses who did work there said it never happened. Remember that Egypt sent troops against Saddam Hussein and those people had no reason to lie. Anyone still wanting to live in Kuwait certainly would have reason to lie.

It was early in the propaganda campaign that while talking to Mother on the phone that she mentioned to me the baby incident and said they should kill Saddam Hussein. "Why Mother!" I said, "I thought you did not support the death penalty." She changed the subject. I certainly have no intention of discussing those supposedly dumped babies with her now but I never accept war propaganda at face value. I learned before I was out of high school that the first casualty in any war is Truth.

Social Security

People born after 1937 will have to be older than age 65 before they will be eligible to receive their full Social Security retirement benefits, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene said.

While life expectancies have increased dramatically since Social Security was enacted in 1935, the retirement age has remained the same.

People who are reaching retirement age now can start their Social Security benefits as early as age 62, but their benefit amount is reduced. If they wait until age 65 to start their Social Security, they receive a full, unreduced benefit.

The usual retirement age for people retiring now is age 65. Social Security calls this "full retirement age," and the benefit amount that is payable is considered the full retirement benefit.

Because of longer life expectancies, the full retirement age will be increased in gradual steps until it reaches age 67. This is the result of legislation enacted in 1983. This change starts in the year 2000, and it affects people born in 1938 and later.

Gallium nitrate, used against Paget's disease, seemed to slow its progress dramatically. Destructive bone process of Paget's often causes pain, deformities and fractures; treatment cut that in half.

Children who had a cold when they got the measles vaccine may not be adequately protected, research at the Army Medical Center in Tacoma, Washington, found. If there's a question, check with your doctor.

New form of interferon presents a specific treatment for chronic hepatitis B. In tests, large doses seemed to cure the disease; smaller doses stopped its spread.

Newer types of artificial knees are getting better long-term results, the British journal *Lancet* reports. Even younger, more active patients are doing well 10 years after the operation.

Oral contraceptive pills may be made less effective temporarily by the use of non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs and others. Check with your doctor; additional contraception may be advised.

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Small Towns Need To Get Mean

An article appeared in the Wall Street Journal the other day that everyone who lives in rural America should read.

The occasion was the closing of Street's Department Store in Oklahoma City. A family-owned business for 61 years, the going-out-of-business sale prompted the article and a view of current retailing nationwide.

But a couple of paragraphs in the story should interest you:

"Retailers are going out of business in droves, and many observers say the epidemic has a long way to run. The president of Wal-Mart, David Glass, predicted that by the year 2000, 50 percent of the retailers in business today will be gone."

"But I disagree," says industry legend Stanley Marcus, former head of Neiman Marcus. "I think it will be 75 percent."

And therein lies an ironic situation. We're in the process of destroying the rural towns of America at the same

time that our large cities are becoming un-governable.

Senseless killings in Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston, San Antonio and other major cities in Texas go unchecked. The murder rate in both Dallas and Houston are at all-time highs. Citizens who can afford it are barricading themselves behind walled and security-enforced enclaves in well-to-do subdivisions while those less fortunate are left to survive in an asphalt jungle.

Most of the rules and regulations promulgated by national and state officials in water, air, pollution, waste, banking, insurance and dozens of other fields are aimed toward compliance by big cities. And most big cities have the tax base, staff, and wherewithal to comply with the onerous new regulations.

But the arrogant, egg-headed regulators do not differentiate between large and small cities. Their attitude is that if it's good for Austin, it must be good for Andrews.

Between regional retailers and the regulators, the rural towns of Texas and the rest of the nation are under siege.

And they're not getting much help from their elected representatives or their residents.

Yet, the values that most Americans treasure: family, security, church, school, neighborliness, caring, giving - are most exemplified in the rural towns of this state.

Here in Texas we need to organize the rural towns of the state into a mean, ornery, snarlin political force that challenges every arrogant, senseless, dogmatic step taken by the state and its swollen state agencies.

It's a rare congressman, representative, or senator nowadays that will even attempt to take on those agencies in Washington or Austin that have the bit in their mouth and are running roughshod over elected city, school and county officials and their constituents.

We've lost control of our big cities and its unsolved problems and at the same time are doing our utmost to destroy the only safe havens for American values.

For example, the 1991 edition of Sales & Marketing Management, shows that last year, effective buying income for Andrews families totaled \$170 million. Local retailers managed to get \$65 million, or roughly 40 cents out of each \$1. In other words, \$105 million left town. No wonder that both Midland and Odessa are trying to pass an additional sales tax to levy on out-towners.

We're all guilty, in these difficult times, of trying to get the most for our dollar. No one can fault a family for trying to stretch income to cover a household budget. But in doing so, we're committing the same short-sighted accounting that is plaguing most giant public-traded corporations: sacrificing the long-term picture for the short-term gain.

As we see it, rural America can roll over, play dead, and accept the inevi-

table or get off our collective rears and fight.

Here in Texas we need to organize the rural towns of the state into a mean, ornery, snarlin political force that challenges every arrogant, senseless, dogmatic step taken by the state and its swollen state agencies.

And in the election year coming up, we should support those candidates who have the guts, the expertise, the desire, to curb the extensive, autocratic powers of the agencies and the will to stand alone against the big city boys.

We need to create a rural force of every city, school, county official in towns under 50,000 population to become an effective, political bloc in Austin.

And we need to educate the populace of rural Texas, or rural America, of the danger inherent in swapping the short haul for the longer trip to the future.

If you love the lifestyle in small town America and want to preserve those values, it's time to get off the couch, stand up, and start swingin'!

Money Talk

Q. I am having severe financial problems and am considering bankruptcy. Could you explain bankruptcy, particularly the difference between "Chapter 7" and "Chapter 13" bankruptcies?

A. To be considered bankrupt, a person, company or other legal entity must be unable to pay his or her creditors and then be declared by a court as insolvent. Insolvent means that an individual is unable to pay his or her debts as they become due.

The two types of personal bankruptcy most often talked about are "Chapter 7" and "Chapter 13." They refer to chapters of the federal bank-

ruptcy code. Under "Chapter 7" bankruptcy, all legally nonexempt possessions, if any, are seized and liquidated for the benefit of creditors by a court appointed trustee. If a debtor's non-exempt assets are insufficient, all remaining debts are discharged.

Under "Chapter 13" bankruptcy, a trustee is appointed by a court to administer a payment plan to distribute money to each creditor filing a claim against the debtor. The debtor keeps possession of all assets as long as "Chapter 13" plan payments are made in a timely fashion.

There's a misconception among some people that being legally declared bankrupt means that you

are given the opportunity to financially start over again with a clean slate. The truth of the matter is that bankruptcy information remains on your credit record for about 10 years. This means that it can be difficult to obtain a credit card or to get any type of loan, including car, home, education and personal loans.

Carefully consider all options and seek legal advice before pursuing bankruptcy. You might try to contact your creditors, explain your finan-

cial situation to them and work out a payment schedule.

If you need debt counseling, call the Consumer Credit Counseling Service at 1-800-388-2227. This is a non-profit organization that specializes in personal debt management.

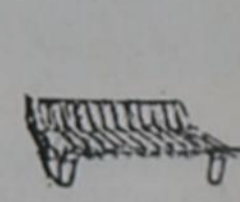

RRC Assesses \$60,500 In Well Plugging And Pollution Penalties

The Railroad Commission assessed a total of \$60,500 in administrative penalties this week to thirteen oil and gas operators for violations under Commission well plugging and pollution rules. Crutcher Oil Properties of Wichita Falls was ordered to pay \$3,000 for one inactive and unplugged well on the Fitchett lease in Young County; C. D. Cross of Grafrod was assessed \$3,000 for one well on the Useton lease in Young County; and, Beal Operating Co. of Coleman was penalized \$4,000 for one well on the Carl Stoop lease in Coleman County. In addition, Buck Creek Oil & Gas Corp. of Bartlesville, Okla. was ordered to pay \$6,000 for illegal discharge of oil on the Cornelius-G lease in Harrison County; Trojan Oil and Gas of White Deer was assessed \$3,000 for disposing of saltwater into an unpermitted, inactive well on the M. T. Johnson lease in Hutchinson County; Roeling Vacuum, Inc. of Hull was penalized \$9,000 for allowing oil to overflow from a faulty pit resulting in the contamination of soil and groundwater at its Liberty County washout pit; GRC Exploration of La Grange was ordered to pay \$4,000 for failure to plug a leaking, inactive oil well on the E. A. Arnin lease in Fayette County; Petro-Tex Operating Co. of Fort Worth was assessed \$8,000 for illegal discharge of saltwater from a leaking, inactive well on the Elizondo lease in Starr County; B. J. Elliott of Kermit was penalized \$5,000 for an oil well blow-out which could have been prevented on the Hendrick-H lease in Winkler County; Dale Redding of Wichita Falls was ordered to pay \$8,000 for allowing a pit containing oil to overflow, failure to remove a 55 gallon drum of oil which had been buried near the pit and for draining saltwater into a plowed field on the S. Bartos lease in Baylor County; and, Burrow Land and Royalty of Abilene was assessed \$1,000 for failing to back-fill a pit after plugging a well on the Treadaway lease in Eastland County. In addition, two operators agreed to pay penalties without admitting any violation of Commission rules. Mueller Engineering Corp. of Corpus Christi was penalized \$5,000 for failure to monitor and report well pressure changes and for allowing possible vertical migration of fluids under pressure on the Greiner Estate lease in Starr County; and, Burt Stringer & Assoc. To date, almost 4500 families, individuals and businesses have applied for disaster assistance by calling the toll-free number.

When calling, it will speed up the application process if the applicant has the following information ready: social security number; address before and after the disaster; insurance policy or agent's name, if insured; description of the damage; and directions to the damaged property.





...NEW HAMPSHIRE
MARRIAGE
LICENSES and IN-
TENTIONS 1709-1961
by Pauline J. Oesterlin.

One of the first laws promulgated by the New Hampshire legislature in 1679 required that intentions of marriage be published openly at least three times or posted in a conspicuous spot in the community for fourteen days prior to the event. [New Hampshire Laws, I, 26]. Many of these notices have survived and are in the State Archives.

The listing in this new work provides the researcher with an important new reference to these marriage records found in the New Hampshire State Archives, many of which may not be found recorded elsewhere. Licenses issued by John and/or

Benning Wentworth from 1742 through 1776 are listed, as well as some licenses given in the state from 1709 until 1911, and some special licenses which were issued from 1921 through 1961, giving permission for out-of-state ministers to perform marriages in New Hampshire. Also included are transcriptions of records from Concord, Jaffrey, and Stratham covering the years 1791 to 1860, which arrived at the State Archives in 1991. In general, the records include the name of the bride and groom, their residences, the date of the intention or marriage, and the names and residences of the out-of-state ministers.

This is a listing of those marriages in the State Archives, and is not intended to represent all marriages in New Hampshire, but many are probably not recorded in other places. Each listing is in alphabetical order by groom, and included is a complete index to brides.

It is important to find the full name of Velma's father, and is most important to find the full maiden name of her mother, and their places of birth, death and burial.

The same information is needed for both paternal and maternal grandparents of Velma. It has been said, but not proven, that Velma's mother was full blooded Indian. All help sincerely appreciated, for any part of my request.

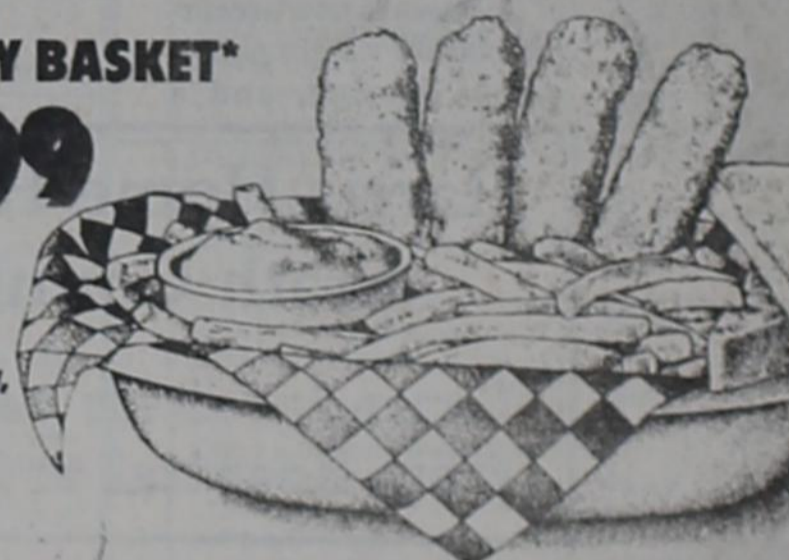

Tax Deferral Available For Over 65 Residential Homestead Owners

Section 33.06 of the State Property Tax Code requires the following information concerning the Deferral of Certain Property Taxes to be publicized.

Property taxes on the residence homestead property of those persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older may be deferred or abated if they satisfy the requirements of the State Property Tax Code.

The property owner must occupy the residence homestead on which the tax is being levied or on which a suit has been filed for collection of delinquent

taxes. To obtain a deferral, the individual must file with the Chief Appraiser for the Appraisal District in which the property is located, an affidavit stating that he or she is sixty-five (65) years of age or older and that he or she does own and reside in the residence that the tax is being levied on.

If a suit has already been filed by a tax unit, the individual must file with the court in which the suit was filed the same type of affidavit.

By filing the affidavit with the proper authority, the payment of taxes or forced collections, through suit is postponed until the person filing the affidavit no longer owns

and occupies the property as a residence homestead.

Although the tax is deferred; it is not canceled. A tax lien remains on the property and penalties and/or interest may continue to accrue during the period that the collection of taxes is deferred.

For information concerning the tax deferral or abatement, contact the Eastland County Appraisal District. The office is located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse and the telephone number is 629-8597 in Eastland.





CENTRAL TEXAS PEANUT SHORT COURSE

The Central Texas Peanut Short Course will be held Wednesday, February 19th at the DeLeon City Hall Building in DeLeon. Trying To Keep The Texas GM Plant Running

Senator Bob Glasgow (D-Stephenville) has been furnished information by the Department of Commerce regarding Governor Richard's urgent effort to keep the Texas GM plant running.

Senator Glasgow stated, "I strongly support Governor Ann Richards' efforts to keep the Texas GM plant running in order to save Texas jobs and our environment."

"The following is the Texas Commitment proposal from the Texas Department of Commerce," said Senator Glasgow, which will demonstrate how Texas, in partnership with GM, can become the alternative fuels capital of the world. It is a win-win strategy for everyone.

* It is a non-traditional plan, anchored in innovation and dependent upon the support of Texas business.

* American automobile manufacturers are losing marketshare and are downsizing their workforce. Sales must be increased to justify maintaining current production facilities.

* The Arlington GM plant is the only automobile assembly plant in Texas.

* More than 17,000 jobs in Texas are dependent on the automobile industry.

* The impact of closing the Arlington GM plant will go far beyond the 3,800 direct jobs that will be lost; more than 7,800 additional jobs will be lost statewide, and the Texas economy will suffer a \$340 million-a-year loss.

* Texas has already made a serious commitment to clean up its air by mandating that a certain percentage of vehicles purchased by the state run on alternative fuels. Cur-

rent laws require that by 1994, 30 percent of vehicles purchased for state agency, transportation authority and school district fleets must be alternatively fueled. In the year 2000, that requirement will jump to 90 percent of all vehicles, excluding law enforcement and emergency vehicles.

* Because GM leads the nation in production of alternative-fuel vehicles, it is natural that Texas join with GM in the effort to comply with this mandate. Currently, GM's Sierra truck is the only compressed-gas vehicle on state contract.

* The Governor's office will ask the Department of Energy to approve a plan to use Oil Overcharge Funds to help GM convert the Arlington plant to produce natural-gas-fueled vehicles and/or finance conversion costs of vehicles to compressed natural gas. The Oil Overcharge Fund is not taxpayer money. It is comprised of oil industry money awarded by court action to help stimulate energy conservation projects.

* A statewide public education plan will be launched to promote the benefits of driving alternative-fuel vehicles.

* The Governor is issuing a challenge to Texas business with private fleets to consider purchasing a compressed natural gas vehicle, helping to save the environment, and Texas jobs. Business
