## Rurals Get New 911 Addresses; Not To Be Used For Mail Yet

THIS IS A COPY of the official notice of 9-1-1 addresses that will be mailed to the people of rural Eastland County.

The 9-1-1 Emergency Medical System is not in operation in Eastland County yet. It is in the testing phase, as reported at the last two County Commissioners meetings. The system was originally scheduled to be ready by January 31, 1992.

In the meanwhile the County Commissioners have mailed out cards to Rural Residents, officially notifying them of their new 9-1-1 address. This will become their P.O. mailing address at a later date.

Note on the illustration that each rural residence has a number with a CR (County Road number). There is also a building ID number. These designations are for the convenience of the 9-1-1 System.

More information was obtained from Venita Roach, Eastland Postmaster, who is coordinating the County Postoffice activities in regard to the 911 System.

"Residents are re-

quested not to start using the 911 addresses until notified in newspapers and on the radio to make the change," Mrs. Roach says.

She indicates that quite a bit of work is involved in the transition, and it will take some time.

Other Postal Service officials in the county agree with her, saying that the changeover will take a group effort and will need the people's cooperation.

The Postal Service is working with City leaders and the County Commissioners in an effort to make the address changes as smooth as possible.

County Commissioners Richard Robinson (Pct. 1) and Calvin Ainsworth (Pct. 2) stated at the last Commissioners Court meeting that several roads in their Precincts have not been addressed.

Jedco Designs of Clyde was hired by the County to number the rural roads and address rural dwellings.

## District Water Expansion Plans Expects 'Go-Ahead' Soon

Very encouraging, although unofficial, water words were shared with members of the Eastland County Watery Supply Board at their regular meeting Thursday.

It now appears, the report indicates, that the many hurdles in dealing with so many different agencies have been topped, and it is conceivable that the district could receive the necessary funds for badly-needed treatment and delivery expansion, within a matter of weeks.

Unofficial word is that the Farmers Home Administration loan \$2.650 million loan at five per cent, could be final very soon.

Plans are for increasing the treatment, delivery and storage facilities by the Water District, whose customers are the cities of Eastland and Ranger, which in turn sells water to a number of other entities.

Once the money is delivered, the board will hold a pre-let meeting, and it's estimated that as many as 50 firms might bid on the project. It's estimated that a bid-letting could be toward the end of April with construction perhaps starting by June 1. Completion time is an unknown factor at this time, officials understand, depending in large measure on the number of contracts and the ability to carry on various projects at one time. First priorities would be the expansion of the plant treatment facilities, then the delivery systems and perhaps lastly the million-gallon storage tank to be located east of Eastland.

Earlier announced bid-lettings and related dates have been dashed in the past due to the complicated procedures inherent with a project of this magnitude and dealing with the number of regulator agencies involved and complying with the various requirements of each.

President Tommy Crowder presided, and expressed optimism that the expansion projects can be begun, and completed as soon as possible to fill the water needs of the various systems. The sub-systems include Olden, Morton Valley, Carbon, Staff and West Bound and with Eastland and Ranger.

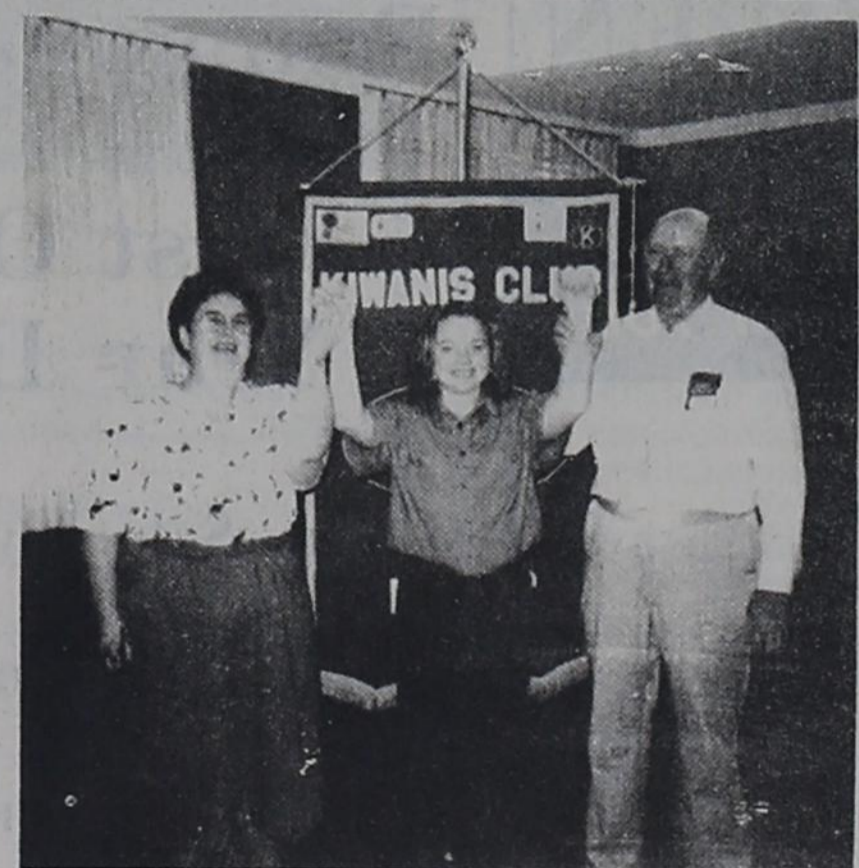

# Bush Tax Cuts Bold, Needed, Gramm Says

U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm lent immediate support to the president's proposals for tax cuts and incentives to aid middle-income Americans.

"The president has laid out a blueprint to jumpstart the economy that can pull us out of the recession by summer," Gramm said.

Key elements of the State of the Union address included these:

- An immediate reduction in the amount of income taxes withheld from workers' paychecks by the IRS. An average, married worker would get a one-time, \$350 boost in available cash.
- An increase in the personal exemption of \$2,300 by \$500 for each child under 18, effective Oct. 1. A family with three

children and gross income of \$40,000 a year would get a tax cut of \$250 a year.

- A tax credit worth up to \$5,000 for first-time homebuyers.
- A deduction for interest paid on college and vocational school loans.
- A deduction for home sellers to help offset losses that exceed 10 percent of their income.

"Approving this program will not only end the recession, it will lay a concrete foundation for a sustained period of economic growth," Gramm said.

"By investing in America's families rather than in American government, the president has chosen the correct path," he said.

# Editorial By Congressman Charles W. Stenholm Animal Rights Terrorists February 1992

In the past several years, there have been numerous serious criminal acts committed by animal rights terrorists against animal facilities. These acts include theft of research animals and data, fire bombings and bomb threats, arson and destruction of property. Individuals are also targeted with hate mail, death threats, and other means of harassment.

Unfortunately, current laws are not discouraging acts of violence against our farmers and ranchers, researchers and all of those who work with animals — including workers in zoos, circuses, fairs and rodeos. Criminal terrorist activities will continue unless the full power of the legal system is used.

At the center of the most extreme of these actions is the Animal Liberation Front (ALF), an elusive group classified by the FBI as a special interest terror-

ists, whose activities are often first reported by People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA) and whose philosophy of "animal liberation" is frequently expounded upon in PETA literature. Many scientists view the relationship between the two organizations as entirely too close for comfort.

According to various national media, PETA has recruited more than 350,000 members. It has an annual operating budget estimated to be \$8 million, with another \$2 million in cash reserves. The organization's president has said that they believe in the abolition of the exploitation and enslavement (per ownership) of animals. "A rat is a pig is a dog is a boy," is how one PETA slogan puts it.

Unfortunately, the true victims of criminal acts are not just those targeted for attack, but all members of society who rely on farmers and ranchers for food and on researchers for vital medical breakthroughs. All of us pay for the millions of dollars in physical damage, lost data and effort, security systems, etc. Medical schools alone have spent more than \$11.3 million in the last five years as a result of animal rights related losses.

Recently, the nation's top scientific body, the National Academy of Sciences, concluded that the unnecessary costs of security imposed as a result of the animal rights extremists pale in comparison with the potential costs involved if they succeed in slowing or eliminating research on causes and remedies of debilitating disorders and diseases.

According to the Academy's report, Science, Medicine and Animals "...it would be immoral and selfish not to use animals in research today, given the harm that could accrue to future generations if such research were halted..."

In reading your Letter to the Editor, Sunday, February 16, you asked three questions; what are the issues, what are the solutions, and who is the best qualified candidate? However, you never specified which local race these queries were directed toward. Assuming this is an open request, I thought I would take a few moments to present you with some answers based on my perspective.

What are the issues? As in any sheriff race the issues will vary depending on the candidate or voter you're speaking to. For me, Eastland County is known as a drug trafficking county, and recently one that has a number of vandalisms and thefts. It's recent past showed poorly to area and Federal Law Enforcement with the arrest of its elected sheriff. In talking with the people the most common complaint is the poor response from the Sheriff's Department to their calls for assistance, and the lack of active Law Enforcement. A secondary complaint is that of only seeing the sheriff at election time, or special occasions, and not having immediate access to communications with the sheriff.

What are the solutions? Again this will vary from candidate to candidate. However, I feel an aggressive attack on ille-

gal drug traffic, and complete follow-up on all cases no matter how minor will alleviate many current trends. An aggressive training program, a high caliber of professionalism, and joint efforts with all area Law Enforcement will rebuild the trust and reputation that is now lost. An aggressive approach to call response, and follow-up calls to complaints will end most citizen complaints. This along with an active reserve program, and increased community involvement will also help. An active sheriff making weekly visits to each community, as well as a listed home phone number should control the rest.

Who is the best qualified candidate? Rudie this definitely will vary from candidate to candidate. If you feel that the past Law Enforcement you've experienced in Eastland County is what you want for the next four years, then my opponents are the most qualified. But, if you feel its time for a change, if you feel the future should be better than the past, then I feel I'm the most qualified; and need your vote.

Re: Tragedy at Talco-Bogota School District

With twelve students in the area, and six at Rivercrest High being confirmed positive with the HIV virus, perhaps there would be merit in considering what has and has not been done in reaction to this outbreak.

(1) **Action taken by the school district:**

(A) Identities of those infected not divulged to students or teachers.

(B) Primary emphasis on protection of infected students' right to privacy.

(C) Parents of student body never formally notified of situation, or what, if anything, would be done to protect their children.

(D) More AIDS education considered as solution to problem.

(E) Teachers issued rubber gloves.

(2) **Actions not taken by any authorities:**

(A) Tracing and testing contacts of those known to be infected.

(B) Requiring mandatory HIV testing of all students and teachers.

(C) Various public health services honoring their first obligation - when there is an epidemic outbreak - protection to the uninfected public. As Dr. Lorraine Day reminds us in her recent book "AIDS: What the Government Isn't Telling You", the HIV virus is contained

in all bodily fluids, and can survive 7 to 10 days outside the body. Dr. Day points out that when one or more persons are in proximity with someone who is HIV positive, events can happen to put all parties at risk of infection. A small pox outbreak would no doubt have health authorities scurrying all over the place. But AIDS has become a protected killer.

I suggest the public recognize that as of now the medical establishment in this country is not going to take the necessary and proven steps needed to contain the AIDS epidemic's spread. Surely we have had time to recognize this fact. The numbers of Americans infected with HIV are far larger than we have been told. Protection to the uninfected public is not on the agenda of our medical, political, and special interest groups. By way of the AIDS epidemic, this country is beginning to passively walk to its grave. Are we going to allow this to happen? I sincerely believe that if the citizens of this country do not stand up now, and take a solid stand for public health protection, this may well be our destination.

# Fishing Outdoors

## Floods Cause Trout Stocking Changes

Area Anglers are having some of the best February fishing in years. Our warm weather are putting those bucket mouths up shallow Calmer areas are best on most lakes.

Leon the La Mancha area is excellent, as well as the #7 hole slough and the Country Club slough. Staff hasn't turned on yet, but it's getting close. Spinner baits and craw worms are turning some good numbers in the 3 pound range.

Possum Kingdom produced another big fish unofficial weight of 12.34 from the Rock Creek area with a jig and pig in 12 feet of water. The Costello Island area is producing good strings of blacks in the 2 to 4 pound range using jigs and spinners.

Hubbard Creek's black bass are good to 7 pounds on crank baits off secondary points. And some nice 2's & 3's are coming from the Lost Creek to Green House slough area.

Recent flooding has caused some schedule changes for rainbow trout stockings in Texas public waters.

This year the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department is stocking 65 sites, the most ever, with more than a quarter million fish. The trout stocking program is run with funds from the sale of \$7.00 Texas Freshwater Trout Stamps, of which 31,034 were sold in 1991. The stamps are required, along with a valid fishing license, for all freshwater trout fishing in Texas.

Trout stamps and fishing licenses are available from department game wardens and from many statewide retail outlets such as sporting goods stores. The daily bag limit is five trout and possession limit is 10 in all Texas waters. There is no minimum length limit.

TPWD first conducted pilot trout stockings in 1966 in some cooler tail-race areas. The program grew in popularity in the

1980s. Because of the growing interest and expense, the Texas Legislature authorized the trout stamp for users to directly support the program. The stocking program has grown from 12 sites in 1965 to this year's 65 sites.

Trout stocking provides an economic boost to many smaller Texas towns, generating spending in the towns and visitation in state parks. Some cities have even inquired about sharing in the cost of the program.

The wonderful choir of some 50 members echoed the sanctuary singing "O For A Thousand Tongues To Sing," and the FBC acappella ensemble brought a spirited rendition of "He's Worthy."

The congregation sang with enthusiasm "When We All Get To Heaven" and "Victory In Jesus." Just before Dr. Criswell brought his message the FBC sanctuary choir sang "Heaven and Earth Proclaim His Glory."

Seated in the sanctuary were people from most every church denomination throughout Eastland County to hear Dr. Criswell's message. People from Carbon, Cisco, Eastland, Kokomo, Ranger, Gorman, Rising Star and many of the communities throughout Eastland County plus towns and counties adjoining Eastland County were present for this evangelism rally.

Many had heard Dr. Criswell on radio and TV and knew what a stirring provoking speaker he is and wanted to hear him in person. Over 500 people were present which marked a record attendance for the Cisco Baptist Association.

Now to speak of the message and the man, Dr. Criswell.

Dr. Criswell began his message by holding up the Eastland Telegram, Ranger Times, Cisco Press Sunday, February 23, 1992

Bible and saying, "This Is the Word of God, the inerrant Word of God, God's book with a plan for the salvation of every man. If a person is to have the power of the spirit within, he must be a student of the Word of God. Every family member must make the Bible the center of spiritual devotional reading."

When the citizenry know and follow the teachings of the Bible then the families will be stronger and the nation can fulfill "In God We Trust," as a moral nation instead of a criminal one.

He challenged the ministers to come and kneel and rededicate their life as a servant of God and also the leaders of the governing board of the church to do the same.

He told how a church could be a strong active church if the people would quit putting their loose change in the collection plate on Sunday and give generously to the cause of Christ, not to serve themselves but others, for only when we give can we live. For many churches wither and die because of the stinginess of its members. Give generously, have a program, follow God's leading and if a church will expect great things from God it will do great things for God.

Dr. Criswell's theme was, "Christ Loved the Church and Gave His Life For It."

He said, no church can become great unless there is sacrifice, no people can wash away their sins except through the sacrificial blood of Christ on Calvary who gave his life for the church.

Dr. Criswell came as an unassuming servant of God, he electrified the congregation with his illustrations, his poetic delivery, his humor, and his challenge for the church was to assume its role to create a new people of God to make a new world and not be created into the likeness of the world.

He might well have said, "Lord, what a change within us one short hour spent in thy presence will avail to make. What heavy burdens from our bosoms take, we kneel now weak,

we rise now full of power." From Bishop Trench on prayer.

People who were present were challenged, spiritually energized, and rejoiced in heart that they were present to hear Dr. Criswell as a servant of God.

Dr. Criswell has served First Baptist Church in Dallas for some 28 years. A congregation of 28,000 members, with a yearly budget of \$12,000,000.00. He is still senior minister of the church and preaches every Sunday. Joel Gregory is pastor of the church and came to co-pastor with Dr. Criswell from Travis Avenue Baptist Church in Fort Worth.

A Bible College bears the name of Dr. Criswell "Criswell Bible College."

Dr. Criswell's insistence on the inerrancy of the scriptures has caused the Southern Baptist turmoil within its ranks. Some would say, "He is too literal, fundamentalist, and oblivious to other's point of view." What ever you want to call this man who has preached some 50 years for Christ and the church, you'll have to say he elevated and challenged the Cisco Baptist Association Evangelism Rally to deny themselves and take up their cross and follow Jesus.

Thank you Dr. Criswell for coming our way.

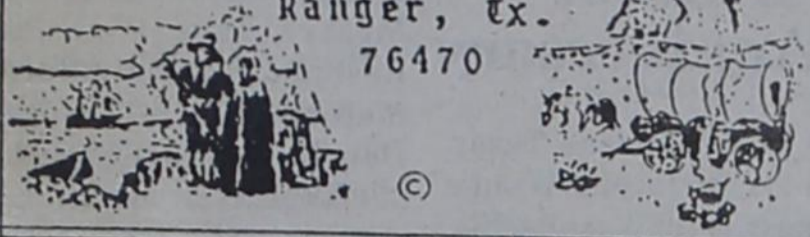

...COLONY OF NORTH CAROLINA LAND PATENTS 1735-1764 Vol I, by Margaret M. Hofmann. Reviewer, Jeanne Pruett.

Volume I and Volume II (Vol II temporarily out-of-print) include all abstracts granted by the governor and council under authority of the British Crown from the opening of the land office in 1735 until its closure in 1775. Since North Carolina was discovered and colonized by the British, the title to the soil was vested in the Crown of Great Britain under the principal that ultimate dominion belonged to the discoverer. In 1663 the King of England vested title to the soil of North Carolina in eight Lords Proprietors, and in 1729 the Crown of Great Britain resumed title to the soil of the colony by purchasing it from the heirs and devisees of the original eight Lords. The transfer of power from officers appointed by the Proprietors to officers appointed by the Crown took several months and was not effected until February 25, 1731. As a result the Proprietary officers did not discontinue issuing patents in 1729 as they ought, but continued to grant them through 1730.

For a number of reasons the first governor appointed by the Crown, George Burrington, did not open a land office. The first land office under the Crown officers was opened under Governor Gabriel Johnston on May 12, 1735, and the first two "royal" patents

were issued the following day, one to Cornelius Harnett and the other to Thomas Dallison.

For her abstracts in this and the companion volume (Vol II 1765-1775, temporarily out-of-print), the compiler has consulted and conflated the patent books in the office of the Secretary of State in Raleigh, the Auditor General's records of patents in the British Public Record Office in London, the provincial auditor's records of patents in the North Carolina State Archives and the Secretary of State's office in Raleigh, and the records of the colonial Court of Claims in the North Carolina State Archives.

Information in the abstracts include name to whom the patent was issued and date; county and number of acres granted; brief description.

**EXAMPLE: THOMAS BROOKS, 1 April 1751, 400 acres in Bladen County on the W. side of the N.W. river of Cape Fear on cross creek, joining JOHN RUSSELL.**

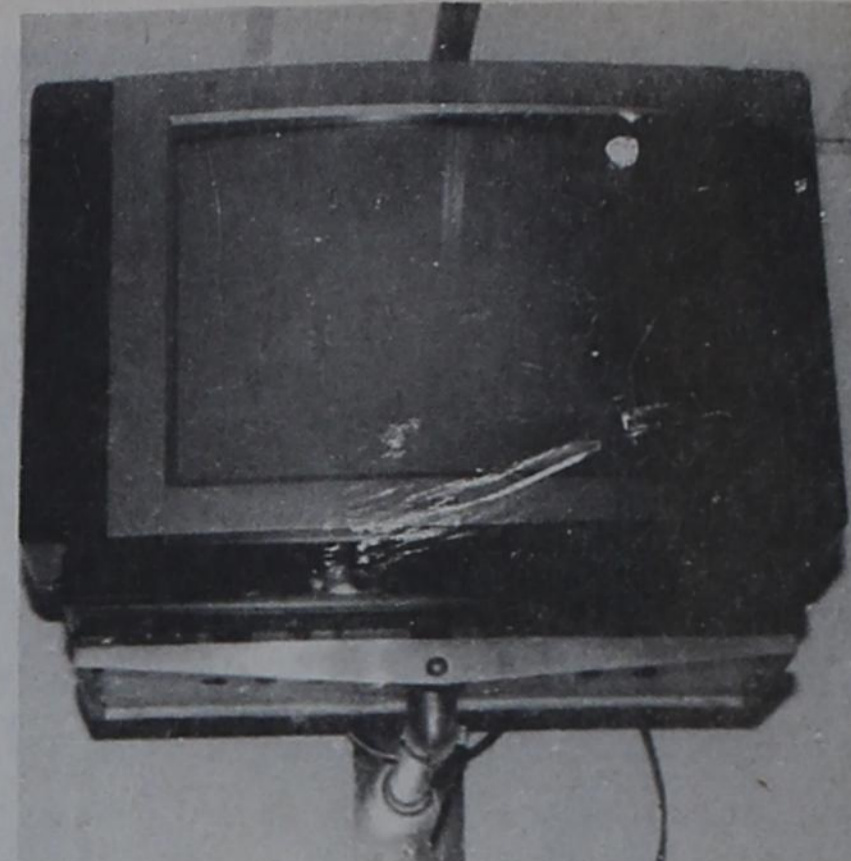

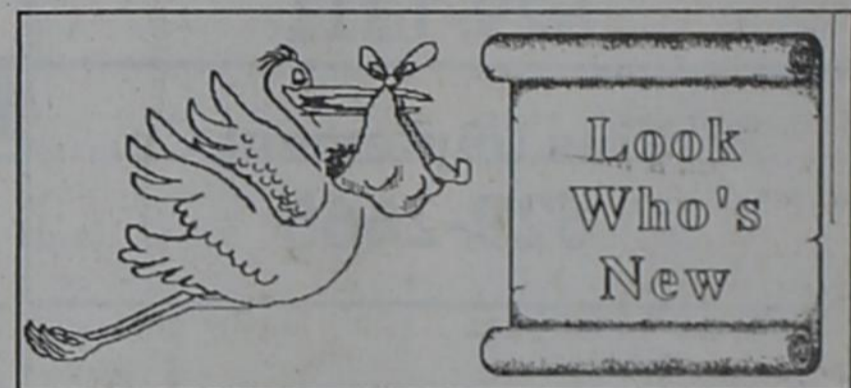

Using a straw may protect dental enamel from attack by sweet and/or acidic drinks. Academy of General Dentistry reports say that many kinds of drinks can erode enamel, leaving teeth open to cavities and sensitive to cold.

Taking time-release niacin in high doses may lead to hepatitis symptoms, doctors at the Mayo Clinic found. Niacin should be taken under a doctor's supervision; frequent liver exams are advised.

Exercise programs helped previously inactive people to improve their reaction time, grip strength, flexibility and balance. Study at California State University in Fullerton found exercise helped participants to drive more safely, too.

Experimental program to treat patients with advanced cancer with genetically altered antitumor genes passed its first test last summer at the National Cancer Institute. Patients remained alive after potent treatment, but its effectiveness was not immediately known.

### Texas Law Enforcement To Receive Grant

The state of Texas has been awarded \$25.5 million to fight drugs and crime by the U.S. Department of Justice, U.S. Senator Phil Gramm has announced.

A majority of the funds, \$15,781,505, will go to the 49 Texas task forces, which serve 215 counties.

"This allocation will continue to support the critical work done by the Texas law enforcement officers on the front lines of the drug war," Gramm said.

The grant represents a 379 percent increase over the amount the state received in 1989, the first year funds were available under the Edward Byrne Memorial State and Local Law Enforcement Assistance Program. State and local law enforcement entities apply for funds for task forces, personnel, equipment, information system improvements and financial investigation programs.

To date, Texas has received a total of \$82 million in federal assistance under the Byrne Program. "Texas law enforcement is afforded the opportunity through this grant to attack problems unique to Texas," Gramm said.

The funds will be administered through the state's Criminal Justice Division in Austin.

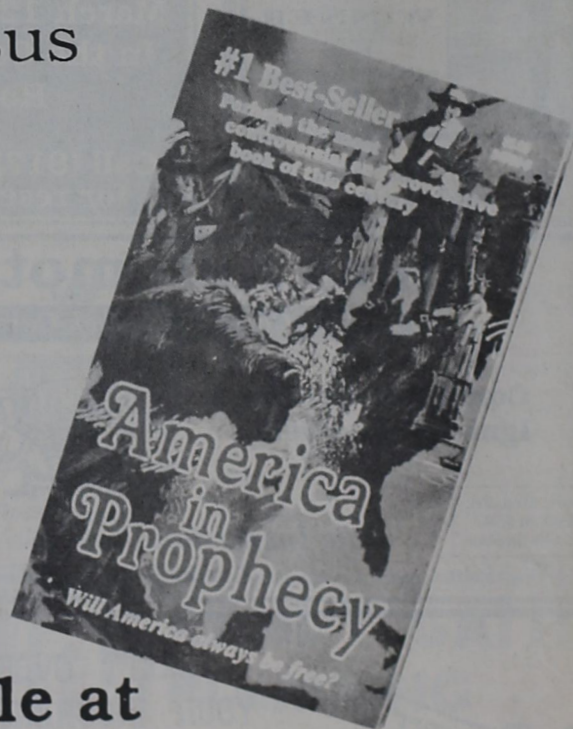
