THIS IS A COPY of the official notice of 9-1-1 addresses that will be mailed to the people of rural Eastland County.

The 9-1-1 Emergency Medical System is not in operation in Eastland County yet. It is in the testing phase, as reported at the last two County Commissioners meetings. The system was originally scheduled to be ready by January 31,1992.

In the meanwhile the County Commissioners have mailed out cards to Rural Residents, officially notifying them of their new 9-1-1 address. This will become their P.O. mailing address at a later date.

Note on the illustration that each rural residence has a number with a CR (County Road number). There is also a building ID number. These designations are for the convenience of the 9-1-1 Sys-

tem. More information was obtained from Venita Roach, Eastland Postmaster, who is coordinating the County Postoffice activities in regard to the

911 System. "Residents are requested not ot start using the 911 addresses until notified in newspapers and on the radio to make



radio was \$375.00. **District Water Expansion** Plans Expects 'Go-Ahead' Soon

Very encouraging, although unofficial, water words were shared with members of the Eastland County Watery Supply Board at their regular meeting Thursday.

It now appears, the report indicates, that the many hurdles in dealing with so many different agencies have been topped, and it is conceivable that the district could receive the necessary funds for badly-needed treatment and delivery expansion, within a matter of weeks. Unofficial word is that the Farmers Home Administration loan \$2.650 million loan at five pers cent, could be final very soon.

Plans are for increasing the treatment, delivery and storage facilities by the Water District, whose customers are the cities of Eastland and Ranger, which in turn sells water to a number of other entities.

Once the money is delivered, the board will hold a pre-let meeting, and it's estimated that as many as 50 firms might bid on the project. It's estimated that a bid-letting could be toward the end of April with construction perhaps starting by June 1. Completion time is an unknown factor at this time, officials understand, depending in large measure on the number of contracts and the ability to carry on various projects at one time. First priorities would be the expansion of the plant treatment facilities, then the delivery systems and perhaps lastly the million-gallon storage tank to be located east of Eastland.

Earlier announced bid-lettings and related dates have been dashed in the past due to the complicated procedures inherent with a project of this magnitude and dealing with the number of regulator agencies involved and complying with the various requirements of each.

President Tommy Crowder presided, and expressed optimism that the expansion projects can be begun, and completed as soon as possibly to fill the water needs of the various systems. The sub-systems include Olden, Morton Valley, Carbon, Staff and West Bound and with Eastland and Ranger.

Recently, the nation's top scientific body, the National Academy of Sciences, concluded that the unnecessary costs of security imposed as a result of the animal rights extremists pale in comparison with the potential costs involved if they succeed in slowing or eliminating research on causes and remedies of debilitating disorders and diseases.

According to the Academy's report, Science, Medicine and Animals "...it would be immoral and selfish not to use animals in research today, given the harm that could accrue to future generations if such research were halted ... " The same thing can be





Are we going to allow this to happen? I sincerely believe that if the citizens of this country do not stand up now, and take a solid stand for public health protection, this may well be our des-

Area Anglers are having some of the best February fishing in years. Our warm weather are putting those bucket mouths up shallow Calmer areas are best on most lakes.

Leon the La Mancha area is excellent, as well as the #7 hole slough and the Country Club slough. Staffhasn't turned on yet, butit's getting close. Spinner baits and craw worms are turning some good numbers in the 3 pound range.

Possum Kingdom produced another big fish unofficial weight of 12.34 from the Rock Creek area with a jig and pig in 12 feet of water. The Costello Island area is producing good strings of blacks in the 2 to 4 pound range using jigs and spinners.

Hubbard Creek's black bass are good to 7 pounds on crank baits off secondary points. And some nice 2's & 3's are coming from the Lost Creek to Green House slough area.

Recent flooding has caused some schedule changes for rainbow trout stockings in Texas public waters.

This year the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department is stocking 65 sites, the most ever, with more than a quarter million fish. The trout stocking program is nun with funds from the sale of \$7.00 Texas Freshwater Trout Stamps, of which 31,034 were sold in 1991. The stamp's are required. along with a valid fishing license, for all freshwater trout fishing in Texas,

Trout stamps and fishing licenses are available from department game wardens and from many statewide retail outletsl such as sporting goods stores. The daily bag limit is five trout and possession limit is 10 in all Texas waters. There is no minimum length limit.

TPWD first conducted pilot trout stockings in 1966 in some cooler tailrace areas. The program grew in popularity in the





Volume I and Volume II (Vol II temporarily out-of-print) include all abstracts granted by the governor and council under authority of the British Crown from the opening of the land office in 1735 until its closure in 1775. 

Using a straw may protect dental enamel from attack by sweet and/or acidic drinks. Academy of General Dentistry reports say that many kinds of drinks can erode enamel, leaving teeth open to cavities and sensitive to cold.

Taking time-release niacin in high doses may lead to hepatitis symptoms, doctors at the Mayo Clinic found. Niacin should be taken under a doctor's supervision; frequent liver exams are advised.

Texas Law Enforcement To Receive Grant

The state of Texas has been awarded \$25.5 million to fight drugs and crime by the U.S. Department of Justice. U.S.Senator Phil Gramm has announced.

A majority of the funds, \$15,781,505, will go to the 49 Texas task forces, which serve 215 countries.

"This allocation will continue to support the critical work done by the Texas law enforcement officers on the front lines of the drug war," Gramm said.






