Construction To Get Underway On SH 206 Northwest of Cisco

Work will get underway on SH 206 Northwest of Cisco next week. Construction crews will begin a microsurface process to resurface the existing 1.7 mile stretch of road between IH 20 and US 183. Clark Construction Company of San Antonio will start setting construction zone signs on May 8th and work should be finished around May 12th.

This project will not require the road to be closed but there will be some traffic restrictions in the construction zone. Texas Department of Transportation reminds motorists to be aware of the

speed zones and other construction signs in the area.

Carbon Commemorative Cancellation Set For July 1st School Reunion

Special Meeting
On May, 1st Mayor Ainsworth called a special meeting of the Ranger Commissioners to order. The reason for the meeting was to rescind a motion that was made April, 24th on the closing of the swimming pool.

Before the commissioners begin Comm. Britt stated that the reason that Comm. Tankersley closed the pool was to save money so he could give the elderly a discount on their water and sewer bills. Comm. Britt said that the pool loses about \$9,000 a year. Comm. Tankersley wanted to use the savings to pay for the discount to the elderly.

Comm. Britt went on to address the \$4,200. that the City lost on unpaid water bills by the public. These types of losses have to stop, the city can't keep spending money like this. Mayor Ainsworth added that if the city gets a good Finance Commissioner in office we can get the cuts needed to keep the senior discount on the agenda to be voted on at a later date.

Commissioner Tankersley then said that he would make a motion to rescind his

earlier motion with the stipulation that volunteers make all the repairs needed to open the pool. "We have the money to operate the pool in the budget but not the money to repair it." Several residents took the floor saying that they would get the volunteers together to see to it that the repairs were done in time to open the pool on schedule.

Comm. Tankersley

than made a motion to rescind the motion of April 24th with the stipulation that volunteers would do the work need on the pool to open it. Comm. Britt second, the votes were all ayes. Comm. Wells made another motion to open the pool, Comm. Tankersley second and the vote was all ayes. Mayor Ainsworth then declared the meeting adjourned.

Herod Nominated To 91st District Court

AUSTIN - Governor George W. Bush Friday nominated Ranger attorney Steven Ray Herod to serve as judge of the 91st Judicial District Court in Eastland County. Herod will be replacing Judge Jim Wright of Eastland who was elevated to the position of Justice of the 11th Court of Appeals.

Mr. Herod is a sole practitioner attorney with a general law practice. He is a graduate of Ranger High School, Tarleton State University and

Texas Tech University School of Law. Mr. Herod is also a part-time instructor at Ranger College, and serves on the advisory committee to the college's business department.

Mr. Herod is a former director of the Ranger

Chamber of Commerce. He is a deacon and Sunday School teacher at Mesquite & Rusk Street of Christ in Ranger.

He will serve as judge until the next General Election. This position requires Senate Confirmation.

County Commissioners Hear Details Of Leadership Program

At a luncheon hosted recently by the County Extension Service, the Eastland County Commissioners Court learned of plans to conduct a Texas Rural Leadership Training Course in the County.

Extension Agents Davy Vestal and Janet Thomas introduced Community Development Consultant David F. Scott of Abilene and West Texas Utilities Manager Charles Wetsel of Cisco.

Scott presented a video from Texas A & M University, and spoke at length on a Texas Leadership Training Course which is designed to give leaders skills and help them revitalize communities.

This nine-months training course would include classes in various parts of the County. There would

be room for about 30 participants, and the graduates of the course would have opportunities for continuing education.

"We are especially encouraging people aged 18 to 35 to enroll in this Course," said Extension Agent Davy Vestal. "We want to train young leaders. But that doesn't mean we wouldn't also welcome older people who want to take it."

Extension Agent Janet Thomas remarked that the Leadership Course includes the "Texas Friendly" training, which has been in the planning stage by the Extension Service. She said the Leadership Course also covered many other aspects of Community Development.

The video from A & M University was one used

with a manual in the Leadership Training Course. It dealt with the topic "Preparing For The Future," and examined trends that will affect the economics of small towns and the rural areas.

The main idea was that small towns can now compete with cities in many types of businesses - if local citizens are trained to do so.

"Technology is empowering individuals," an A & M specialist declared on the video. "Many smaller companies are involved in a Global economy."

In his talk, consultant Scott explored a number of those ideas, saying there had been an out-migration of young leaders from rural areas. He said the population was both older and younger in rural Texas, and many towns were no longer viable trade centers.

"Rural Texas will either move ahead or move back," Scott predicted. "Economic development is going to be different in the future."

He said the Training Program was set up to identify potential leaders for communities. It is structured to combine workshop sessions with community projects.

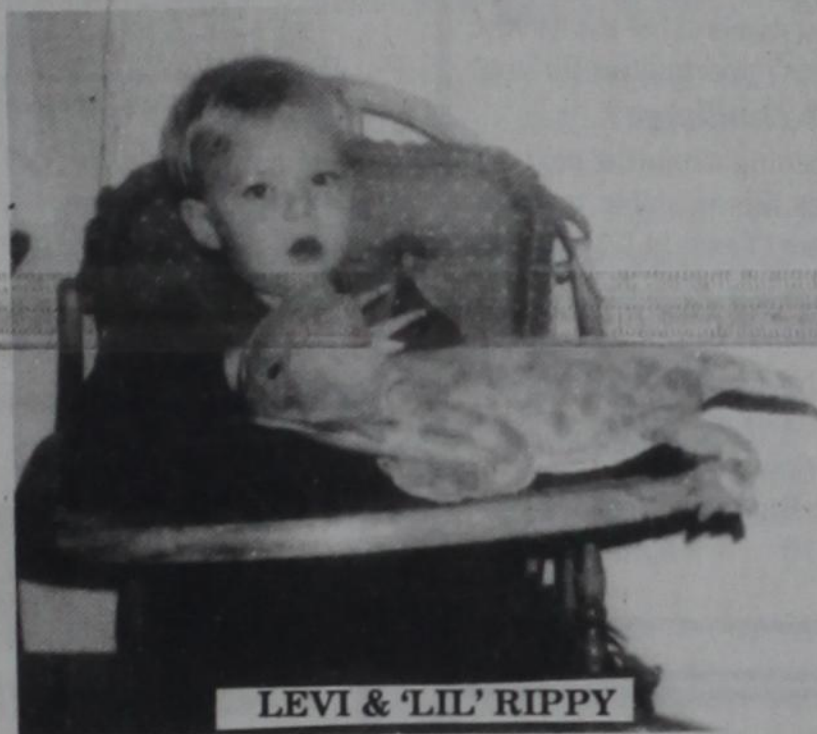

TML Region 6 Meeting Hears Executive Director

A hundred and one attended the Region 6 Texas Municipal League Spring Meeting held at the home of Eastland Mayor and Mrs. C.W. Hoffman Jr. Thursday evening.

The Extension Agents said they hoped these sessions could begin in September, with a graduating in May, 1996. What they needed now, they said, was a commitment from local people, and organizations willing to help sponsor someone.

Already there are some local Texas Rural Leadership Alliance Members: the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, Eastland Chamber of Commerce, Ranger Chamber of Commerce, West Texas Utilities, and TU Electric. Statewide the Alliance has many members, including the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Texas Conference of Churches.

After David Scott's talk the County Commissioners and others present exchanged ideas and comments on rural life and the Training Program. The Commissioners and Judge Bailey appeared favorable toward the plan.

Davy Vestal and Janet Thomas said that people

in the session, Sturzl said, "That's when the fun begins." "Consider the Texas Trail Lawyers Association; they're taking a beating." TML may win some, lose some, but it won't be for lack of attention.

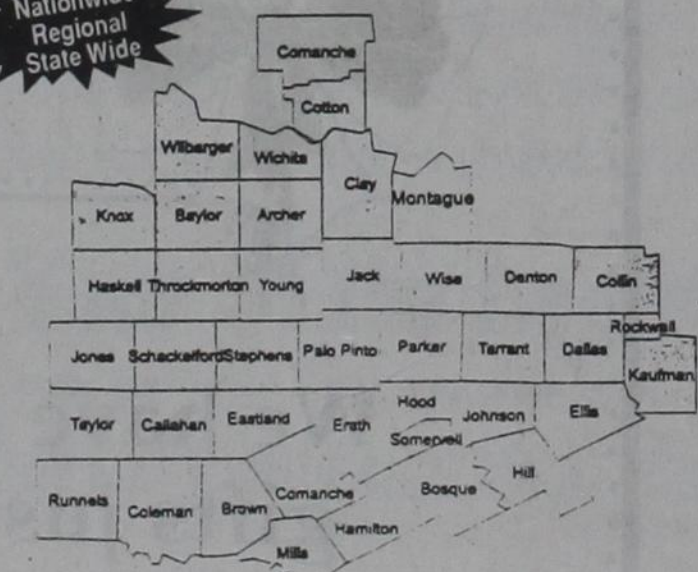

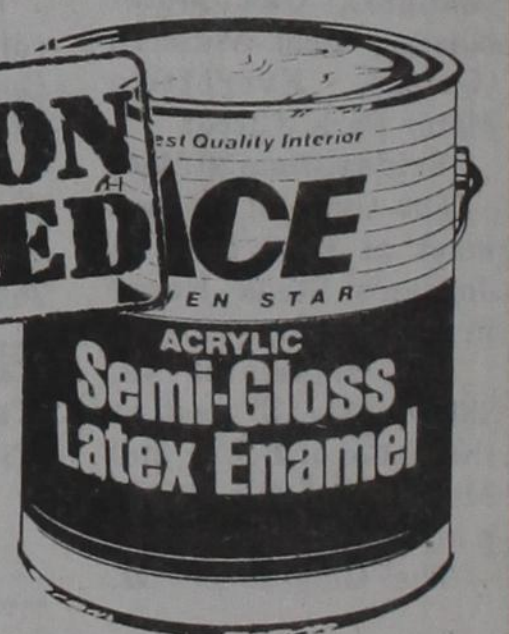

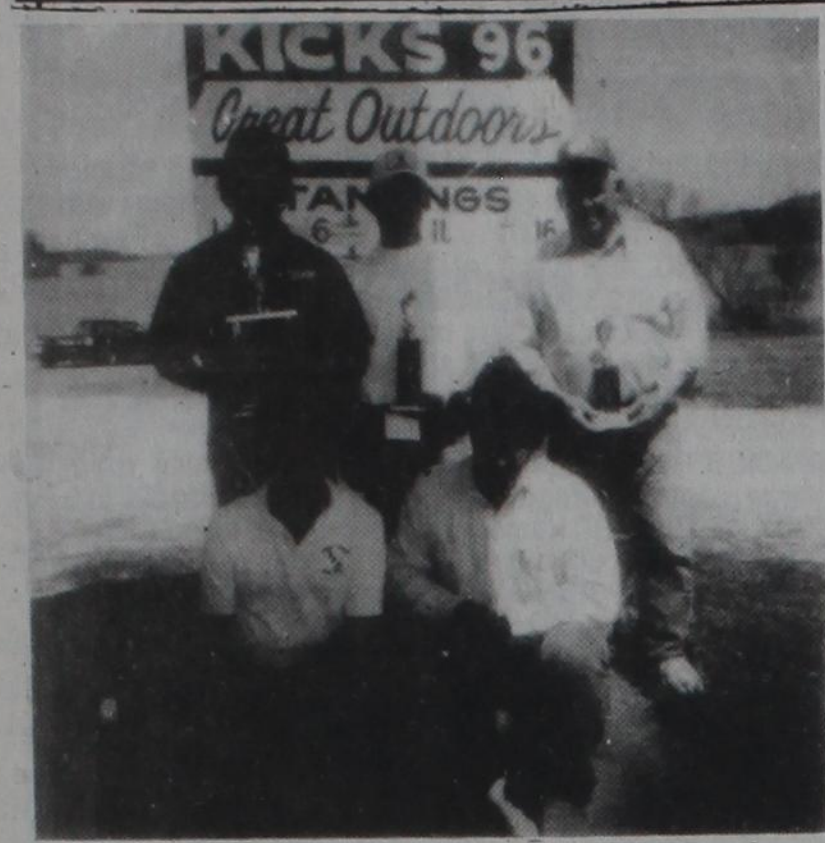

A BRUSH/WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT FIELD DAY will be held Tuesday, May 16, at the Jackson Ranch located approximately 8 miles northwest of Strawn, Texas. Registration will begin at 12:30 p.m. with the activities scheduled to commence at 1:00 p.m.

Representatives from the Natural Resources Conservation Service, Texas Agriculture Extension service, Texas Parks and Wildlife, and Caddo Wildlife Management Association will be addressing various topics.

Topics which will be addressed include: Brush Management of Cedar, Prescribe Burning of Cedar and Pricklypear, Chemical Control of Pricklypear, Deer Population and Dynamics, Effects of Brush Control on Wildlife, The History and Effects of the Caddo Wildlife Management Association. The Nutritional Balance Analyzer Program and Parasite Evaluation will also be addressed.

A field demonstration of roller chopping of cedar will be put on by Lawson Cattle & Equipment, Inc. Pastures which have been roller chopped in past

years will be observed and the vegetation response evaluated.

This tree was established in 1900 by James H. Burkett and was killed by lightning in 1993. It stood in the north median of Interstate 20 about two miles east of Putnam. Commission member Jud Gilliland was among several horticultural experts who conferred on actions in 1993-94 to try to save the tree. When it finally died, Commission member Robert Watson worked with the Highway Department to procure and save the wood for the Commission when the Highway Department finally cut it down. Robert,

a skilled wood worker, had the wood sawed up and has had it drying at his place near Rowden.

The pen handcrafters are brothers, Kenn and Tom Hill, of Odessa, and Bedford, TX, respectively. They previously have made pens utilizing wood from other famous trees. Certificates of authenticity will be furnished with each pen.

Sipe Springs Fire Dept. Gets Five-Ton Truck

Sipe Springs Volunteer Firemen have a lot more equipment to fight fires now. This week the Texas Forest Service delivered them, without cost, a 1970 Five-ton Military truck.

The six-wheel drive vehicle is equipped with two 500-gallon water tanks and a winch on the front. This truck replaces a three-fourth ton vehicle. In addition to the new truck, the Department has two small 4-wheel drive vehicles, a Rescue Van, and a 1500-gallon tanker.

along with the new truck came eight brand-new tires matching the other ten mounted on it. The Forest Service also brought two new tires for the Desdemona Fire Department.

The new truck will be especially good for grass fires out on the ranches, says Sipe Springs Fire Chief Rocky Reisner. He adds that it will also be useful on muddy roads

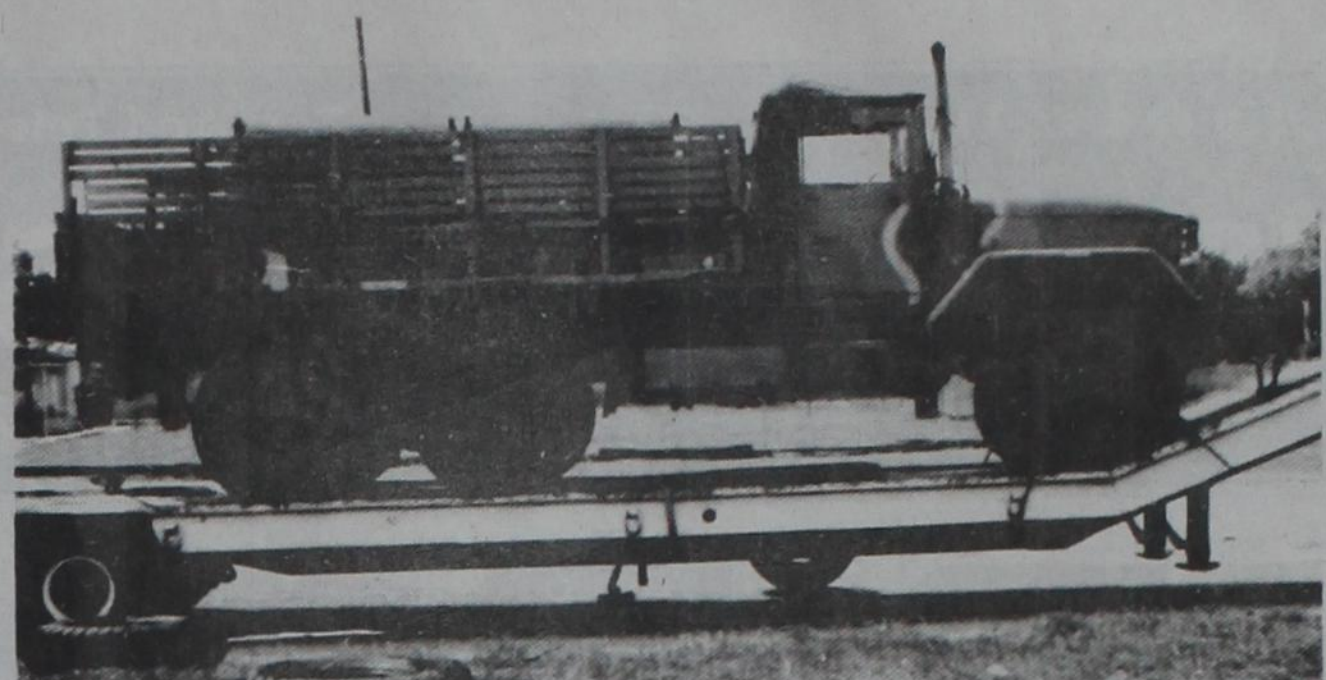
and in high water. He estimates that the big truck will go through two-three ft. of water without any trouble.

The Fire Chief says there are around 16 volunteers in the Sipe Springs Department. Last year they fought 64 fires, with 60 of them grass fires. Raymond McCoy is Truck Captain of the Department.

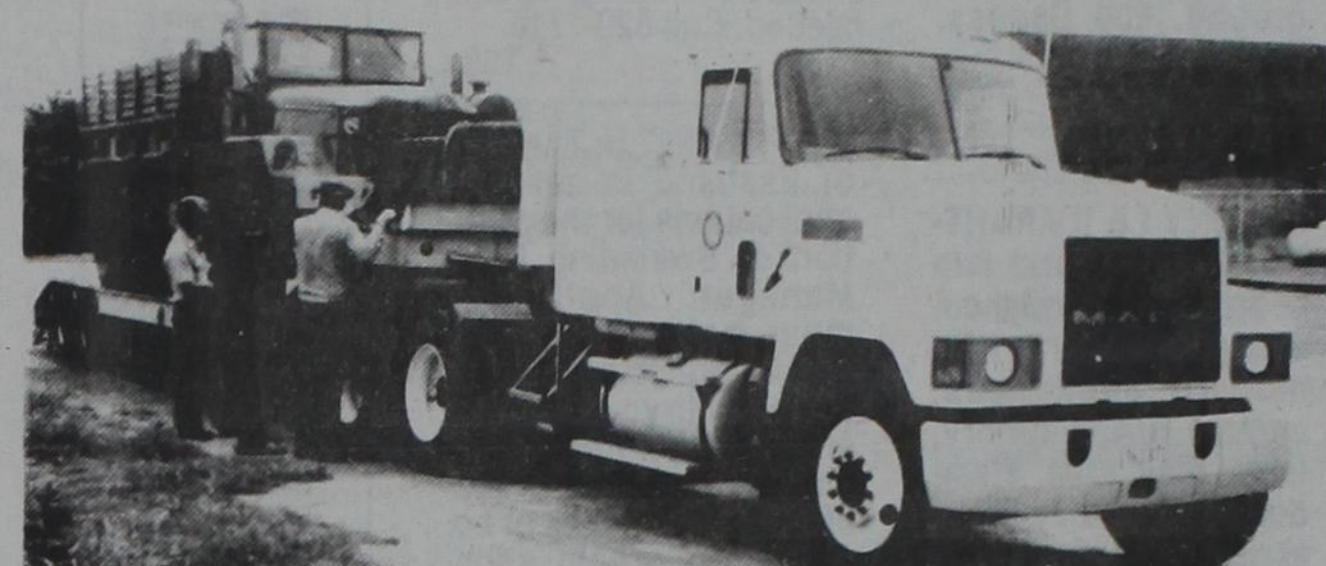
Firemen began checking over the truck on Thursday. On Saturday and Sunday the water tanks and pumps will be hooked up, and by Monday the truck should be in service.

Reisner estimates that the five-ton Military truck, when new, cost around \$80,000.

When all the missing are accounted for, the number murdered by the bombers of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City will exceed 150 persons. Property Tax Protests And Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the cancellation of an agricultural appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
- the local governments which should be taxing your property
- any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affected you.

Informal Review

Contact the appraisal district staff at 817-629-8597 in Eastland, Texas for an informal review.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse, Eastland, Texas.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review of the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of it's order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

More Information

You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at 817-629-8597 in Eastland, Texas or visiting the office which is located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse, Eastland, Texas. You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Comptroller's Property Tax Division at P. O. Box 13528 in Austin, Texas 78711-9831.

Deadline For Filing Protests With The ARB*

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

Excerpts From The Book, I Remember Callahan, History Of Callahan County

Editor: Hicks Turner. Sponsored by the Callahan County Historical Commission, 1986.

James H. Burkett During the fall of 1963, pecan growers around the world harvested the Burkett Pecan. Most of them did not know that this luscious, meaty and sweet pecan originated in Texas, to be exact, in Callahan County, two miles east of Putnam, on Battle Creek

The Burketts were in Callahan County before the turn of the century. There were four Burkett children: Omar H., Joe W., Ira Ona, and Katie Lee. Living in Lampassas and Llano counties, where native pecans grew in great profusion, inspired Mr. Burkett's interest in the pecan and pecan growing both for pleasure and profit. His acquaintance with Luther Burbank, a noted horticulturist, encouraged him to pursue the study in earnest.

during the fall of 1899 and the school year 1900-1901, the children attended school at Lone Pecan, about two miles east of their farm. Lone Pecan was named for a single pecan tree near where the school was first started on the Davis farm. In December of 1899, Omar and Joe Burkett were out hunting. They found several large round

pecans in a cache made by either squirrels or rats, on the bank of Battle Creek. When they showed them to their father, he was much interested and excited, and urged the boys to find the tree where these nuts had grown. The boys eventually found the tree on the south bank in a sharp bend...

Early in the spring of 1900, Mr. Burkett, working with the help of Joe and Omar, took three buds and two or three scions from this tree on the creek bank and transferred them to a small tree, some five to six feet in height, in the middle of the field, and about two hundred yards from the parent tree. The first year this small tree produced three pecans. That was the first Burkett Pecan tree and that was its first yield.

The parent tree on the creek bank was destroyed only a few years after its discovery. But for the timely work of Mr. Burkett in budding this tree and placing his work at the disposal of the pecan industry, there would have been one less paper-shell variety for the use and benefit of pecan lovers and growers all over the world. J.H. Burkett at all times refused to sell or in any way make a profit from his pecan. On May 20, 1960, at the site of the original (budded)

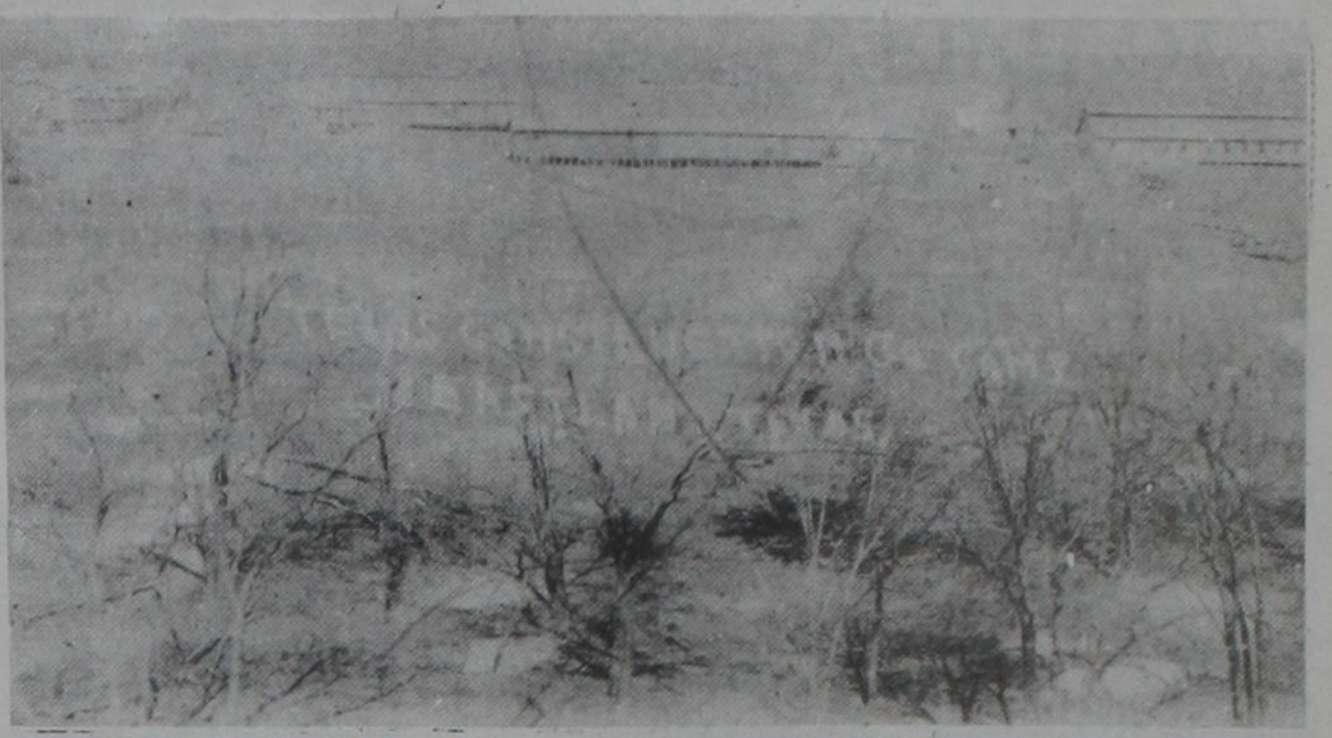

Why I Believe In Old Rip

By Edith Wood Grisham
The strangest thing happened! I found the best book "UNSOLVED TEXAS MYSTERIES" at Monahans Sandhills State Park Store, another of my little miracles. Wallace O. Chariton, one of the three authors, wrote, "Old Rip-Fact or Fiction? In it he refers to it as "one of the best Texas Stories of all time."

It contained something that I had never heard before, nor was it in the multitude of crumbling newspaper clippings. It was from my Uncle Hart Day, who was a barber in Tulsa and Muskogee, OK. According to the story, John White, Henry Cobb of Wichita Falls, Hart and his brother, were with a crowd of boys who were gathered around the cornerstone just before it was closed, one of them found a frog that they slipped in hurriedly.

Brother, Eugene, never did confirm the story, so evidently he was the brother, however, Sam was 32, Lon, 16 and Jess, 14. Hart was 24 and Eugene was 20, and were not exactly boys.

Mrs. Harry Clegern, then a little girl, said she watched the boys put the toad in the stone. Charles U. Connellee, founder of Eastland, also saw the boys do the deed. He explained for all the doubters, "Every loyal Texas inherently knows that a Texas horned toad will live for 100 years without food or air if he remains in Texas. It's just jealousy of Texas that is causing these scientific doubts about that toad."

I hope to share information with Mr. Chariton and express appreciation to him for such a wonderful story. The story of Old Rip continues to bring

publicity to Eastland. It was amazing how Old Rip's publicity continued to spread, and even in February was declared to be the most famous animal since the serpent in the Garden of Eden.

In a February 21st paper: "a respected Olden merchant, M.W. McMinn said, 'I believe Uncle Sandy Martin, now deceased, placed the frog inside, I was standing at his right. Later, he and a friend wondered if the frog was still in the cornerstone in 1897, and they raised the lid and the frog was still there.'"

The Amarillo Globe, probably in the Tackless Texan column had: "Amarillo now comes forward with a share in the famous horned frog incident at Eastland. . . William Monroe "Buster" McGough, a police detective and brother-in-law of Will Wood, was "eight years old and was in the crowd at the cornerstone laying and remembers seeing his grandfather, F.M. Lance, put a newspaper in the stone, but he doesn't recall seeing the frog or hearing about it, he honestly confesses, thereby spoiling a good story."

"It could have happened" said H.M. Law, geology instructor of Southern Methodist University. The Rev. Ernest C. Webb, instructor at the University of Texas, told his class that the occurrence was possible.

"From Reno, NV, comes a dispatch telling of finding two years ago near historic Virginia City of a toad in the Hale & Norcross mine on the Comstock. A blast set off 200' below the ground and when the smoke cleared away a frog was found imbedded in the rock wall. The crea-

ture was apparently lifeless but soon showed signs of life. An odd feature was that its mouth was sealed-which was observed in the case of the Eastland horned frog.

"We are on our way from Virginia to San Francisco and in hotel lobbies and cafes every place we have stopped the horned frog of Eastland has been the overshadowing topic." Declared a party of tourist who were in two Cadillacs. They stopped in Eastland especially to view the frog.

"Members of the zoology class of Texas Christian University of Fort Worth came to Eastland yesterday to see the frog. The emblem of TCU is the Horned Frog, incidentally.

"A scientist from Mississippi was reported to have spent considerable time studying the frog on February 22." This was reported in the Argus Tribune.

H.J. Tanner, of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce prepared a pamphlet, and thousands of copies were distributed over Texas and to most every nook and cranny of the far-flung United States.

"Newspaper space given to the frog was exceeded only by Lindbergh when he flew the Atlantic in 1928. Old Rip was placed on display in the window of the Madden Drug Store in order that all might see that he was alive.

"The story of Old Rip's 31 year sleep immediately raised a storm of controversy among scientists, the press and citizens throughout the United States.

"Dr. Julius Olsen of

Abilene Simmons University, science teacher, said, "I think it is quite probable the frog could have lived that long under the conditions, although I have never heard of a similar case before."

"Andrew J. Wolstead, of St. Paul, MN, former Congressman and father of prohibition enforcement act, exclaimed: '31 years without a drink. I think that toad should be heartily commended.'"

"Barry Miller, of Austin, acting Governor of Texas, said it was hard to believe, but he vouched for the endurance qualities of the ugly little reptile generally.

"Dr. D.B. Castell and J.T. Patterson, of Austin, University of Texas professors, would not comment definitely, but leaned toward skepticism.

"Dr. Raymond L. Dittmars of New York Zoological Gardens, and Dr. William H. Mann Washington, D.C., directors of the National Zoological Park, both said, absolutely impossible."

"While the experts were skeptical, various citizens in the nation recalled other instances of toads living for a long period of time sealed in cavities, and the editorial pages of the press were filled with the 'Toads' and 'Anti-Toads.'"

An early February Associated Press story reported that Earnest Wood: "to date has received offers which surpass the fondest hopes of a bathing beauty contest winner. To them all he has turned a deaf ear. The latest bait was a contract from Bert Levy Vaudeville Circuit of Dallas. Levy

wired Wood offering him and the frog a tidy sum to appear on the stage.

"Crowds continue to pour into this city to view the noted toad and enterprising photographers are reaping much money from postal cards bearing Rip's picture.

"Meanwhile the frogs sits in the display window of Madden Drug Store blinking at the queer faces of some of the thousands who peer in at him. He appears to be in no hurry to break his fast of 31 years and to date has not eaten any food although tempting morsels of bugs, worms and grass have been placed before him."

Berta Maxey, (Mrs. Fred), x-rayed Rip and found that one of his legs had been broken. I wish I could remember the name of the Doctor who wrote a report on Rip's condition for the medical journal. It was quite awhile before Rip could eat or walk.

The February 24, Thursday, Fort Worth Record had the puffed up picture of Rip along with a front view, and reported: "In response to an invitation from Dr. William T. Hornaday, former director, of the New York Zoological Gardens, they said that Will M. Wood and Neil Martin Day, his cousin, are taking the reptile to New York where it will be examined by scientists.

"The toad will be put on exhibition here for a time in connection with a theater engagement."

Boyce House said Hornaday was a friendly voice from the ranks of the scientists, as he had explored many parts of the world, including the Southwest.

Dr. Matthews Serves As 'Physician Of The Day' For Texas Legislature

More than 3,200 Family Physicians have traveled to Austin to serve the state legislature since the inception of the Physician of the Day program.

The Physician of the Day program is coordinated by the Texas Academy of Family Physicians and cosponsored by Travis County Medical Society, Texas Medical Association, Texas Osteopathic Medical Association, Texas Department of Health and Texas Department of Public Safety.

He related an incident in Ceylon while digging for elephant bones and tusks in sand packed so hard that it had almost the consistency of rock:

"So far as could be observed, that sand had been laying there for a thousand years. In this impermeable mass, about two feet beneath the surface, we uncovered a frog that was absolutely entombed there. Fortunately, it escaped spades and pickaxes and was lifted out alive. Its stomach was full of water, which it ejected and then hopped away. It opened my eyes to the possibilities of things at which scientists are prone to scoff."
