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Newsprint Hikes Drive Up Publication Expenses

Newsprint price increases. Its effect is being felt around the world. It's credited with shutting down the venerable 111-year-old Houston Post newspaper, and it's forcing all publications to re-think a lot of their old ideas.

A letter from this newspaper's newsprint supplier spells it out very plain: "Effective with shipments on May 1, 1995, Champion will increase its list price for (all grades) by \$40.00/ST (short ton of 2,000 pounds) and where applicable, reduce our discount (for prompt payment, etc.) by three percent. New price: \$830.00 ton."

Two of our rolls weigh in at a ton. You undoubtedly are reading the "handwriting on the wall" as we have done: as much as we all dislike the idea, we are forced to go up on our subscription prices, and look for every avenue to reduce newsprint usage, without sacrificing the local news coverage that you expect and deserve.

Effective June 1st, which will be mid-year, all circulation rates for the five local newspapers will go up.

However, to help soften the blow, renewals at the present rates will be accepted through the month of May by each of the five local papers.

Effective June 1:
Cisco Press, Eastland Telegram and Ranger Times in-county subscriptions will be \$22.00 a year; adjoining counties \$26.00 a year; in Texas \$28.00; and out of state \$40.00 a year.

The Rising Star and Baird Star after June 1st, will be \$15.00 per year in-county; \$16 adjoining county; \$18.00 in state; and \$21.00 out-of-state.

Most readers have already observed that we've made changes over the months, mainly in combining news stories to be seen in the various papers. Some like this; some don't. It's done to conserve resources and to provide news that we think is of interest throughout our area. Some wonder why we don't just print one paper and distribute it throughout our area. When asked that, we answer that we believe that it's important for each area to retain its own paper and its own identity as much as possible. We try to do that.

Frankly it would be more cost-effective to print one paper and distribute the same to all subscribers, and it could easily come to that some day, but we try to avoid it as long as possible.

The people in each of the towns we serve have been very supportive of their local newspapers over the years, and we sincerely want to maintain that local concern as long as possible. We'd want to be able to produce the best local paper possible for each area and have all the people in each area consider that newspaper their number one advertising and news source.

Advertising rates are also being adjusted upward effective June 1st.

Drastic measures are being taken by many papers to help offset the newsprint price increases: a Valley paper raised their subscription rates by 47%; a New Mexico paper went up because their newsprint costs had gone up 24% in one year; and most are increasing advertising and subscription prices.

Big, medium size and all are making changes, from the New York Times, Wall Street Journal (laid off 100 people), Milwaukee Journal eliminated 200 jobs; Wichita, Kan. Eagle laid off 16 and the Orange County Register raised all prices by 25%.

The new \$22.00 annual subscription rate for Cisco, Eastland and Ranger, will bring the per-issue cost, delivered by mail in Eastland county to just over 21¢. For the Rising Star and the Baird Star, the new \$15.00 per year in-county rate, the per-issue cost will be just over 28¢.

To give readers an idea of the conservation measures being considered and/or undertaken in an effort to reduce newspaper price hikes, your local newspapers are asking:

- Are we carrying columns and features more out of routine than reader interest?
- Is editing of briefs, series, local news, other news accomplished with space availability in mind?
- Is every open page, be it a cover or inside, necessary? Can the number of pages be reduced by increasing the number of pages available for ad placement?
- Can black & white art be regularly downsized from the present rules, freeing up space for text?
- Is the news department working within a monthly space budget which forces increased consumption resulting from today's news break or special effort to be balanced by space trims other days?
- How often is the press being stopped because of a news error, afterthought, or design change?

Food Pantry Volunteers Tell Of Summer Needs

At the May meeting of the County Resources Association members learned of current needs of the Eastland County Food Pantry. Other matters were also discussed.

Volunteers at the Pantry reported that 25 families were served in April, and the families included 102 individuals.

The Pantry has some increased needs right now. As school ends the school lunch program will be curtailed in most places. So, families depending on food stamps will find it hard to stretch their allotment around those extra meals.

Food Pantry Volunteer Lois Robinson said that donations to the Pantry have fallen off, as they sometimes do in the summer months. Contributions of money or food would be greatly appreciated, she said.

The cash is used to purchase food at a large Food Bank in Abilene,

where commodities are sold in bulk.

Right now the local Food Pantry especially needs canned meat, soups and fruit. Also needed is pasta, including spaghetti and macaroni. Tea bags are in short supply, too. As always dried beans, rice and other staples are welcome.

Also, there is a need for bar soap, shampoo and toothpaste.

Volunteers also reported on the Clothes Closet, which is located with the Food Pantry. Due to lack of storage space, only summer clothing can be accepted right now. They especially need summer clothing for children and large-sized adults.

The Food Pantry and Clothes Closet is located at 204 N. Lamar in Eastland, and is open for donations from 1-4 p.m. on Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

On other matters, the County Resources Association decided on

a fund raising project. Plans are to have a booth at the Old Rip Festival next September. Donations will be accepted and prizes awarded in several drawings.

Anyone who would be willing to provide an item to be used as a prize is invited to call Patricia Hardin at 629-3351. All contributions received at the festival will be used for community needs.

The County Resources Association will not meet in June and July. The next meeting will be in August, with the date to be announced.

Dogs, Cats Require Rabies Vaccination

As summer approaches it is imperative that the citizens of Cisco become more aware of the potential problem with rabies. While statistics indicate that Eastland County does not have as much of a problem as other areas of the state, there is an epidemic of rabies throughout Texas.

Rabies is a disease of overpopulation and thrives where there is an abundance of wildlife, as there is in most Texas counties. In Texas, skunks, bats, coyotes, and foxes are the most commonly infected animals.

However, domestic dogs and cats can also be affected by this disease. The most common distribution pattern is for a rabid skunk or fox to bite and infect one or more dogs or cats during a fearless invasion into a community. Signs of rabies to watch for include: animals that have a radical change in behavior; wild animals which seem to be tame or friendly; wild animals which you do not usually see in the daytime; pets that have difficulty walking, eating or drinking; and, animals that tear at or scratch an old wound until it bleeds.

Bond Set At \$100,000 On Shooting

Arrested in Eastland County Monday night was David Bruce Webster, who is accused of a shooting which occurred in Callahan County shortly before. He was placed in the Eastland County jail.

At 8 p.m. Monday, on a warrant from Callahan County, Webster was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Jack Graham in Eastland and charged with assault with a deadly weapon. Bond was set at \$100,000.

At press time Tuesday Webster had not made bond, and (Cont. On Focus Page)

and local ordinances require annual rabies vaccination for all dogs within the city limits. Doug Fairbanks, Cisco Chief of Police, stated that "Conviction for violation of the City's rabies ordinance of not having your dog currently and properly vaccinated could result in up to a \$1,000 per day fine. And state law requires that all cat owners must also have their cats vaccinated for rabies." Chief Fairbanks went on to say that "To help prevent rabies within Cisco, it is essential that pet owners restrain their pets at all times, not allowing them to roam loose. Cisco has a leash law, and it will be enforced."

Rabies can be controlled within a community if everyone will follow the simple rules of avoiding wild animals that come into the city, being watchful for the early signs of rabies, controlling your pets from running loose, and most importantly, that all dog and cat owners have their pets properly vaccinated for rabies.

Governor Bush signed H.B. 1250

Austin, Texas-Representative John R. Cook announced today that the Governor had signed H.B. 1250 which permits members of junior and community college boards of regents to have an alternative to securing training programs in Austin. Dr. Roger Schustereit of Cisco Junior College pointed out the problem that board members were required to attend a two day training program in Austin by statute. It made no sense to specify that the training had to take place in Austin and Representative Cook in working with the Higher Education Coordinating Board staff filed H.B. 1250 to

permit alternative training.

Community leaders, otherwise willing to provide their experience to support of our junior and community colleges, were having a difficult time taking days away from their business to attend this training when there were reasonable alternatives to get the same information and benefits.

Representative Cook believes that this legislation will permit more individuals to volunteer to seek election to junior and community college boards such as Cisco Junior College and Ranger Junior College in Eastland County.

Positive Reports, Full Agenda Occupy Eastland Commissioners Meeting

Eastland City Commissioners heard a positive financial report from Manager Paul Cateo and handled a multitude of agenda items at the regular meeting at City Hall Monday evening.

"Revenue is above expected and expenses are below estimates," the Manager told the Commission and a full house of visitors.

The delinquent tax report wasn't quite as good, but not as bad as some cities are reporting. For the 1994 year, it was reported that 344 were behind in the amount of some \$52,465.00. There are a total (all years) of 482 for \$178,984.00.

Commissioners endorsed a program presented by a Lamesa firm which proposes to survey, assemble data and publish a county-wide director, possibly sponsored by a civic organization.

A positive report was heard from a spokesman from the Blue Flat Solid Waste Co. of Gordon which is making application for a permit and if granted, could possibly save money for BFI and others in shorter hauls for solid waste disposal.

A citizen complained of a city policy which permits supervisory personnel to have non-employees in city vehicles. No action was taken.

Eastlander Roy Smith was granted tentative approval to place septic system collections into the city's collection system, subject to approval of regulatory agencies.

The City agreed to maintain, but not resurface, Lago Vista Drive just off East Main St., subject to the formal conveyance of the property owner. It was pointed out that due

to a possible mix-up during a past change in city administration, the property had not officially been conveyed by plat to the city.

After hearing an estimate of \$44,000 to install a pedestrian sidewalk along W. Sadosa St. to Siebert Elementary School, it was decided to survey with the schools the amount of use such a sidewalk would get.

In a discussion of the burning of dilapidated buildings it was decided to check liability in such matters before proceeding.

Jim Carlin was declared the high bidder and awarded right to purchase lots from the city on N. Lamar Street.

City code enforcement and David Campbell was introduced as the new enforcement officer.

After learning that R.E.D.C. (formerly FmHA) grants couldn't be available for up to two years, the city fathers decided to seek some \$2.4 million in low interest loans for water system improvements.

Commissioners approved payments to contractors in connection with the water treatment plant and collection system.

No action was taken following an executive session, but the Commission did later approve a water tap for a citizen outside the city limits.

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Book Review

America's Foremost Illustrator Captures The Spirit Of America

Many inspired artists have sought to preserve America's greatest moments. One such artist, Mort Kunstler, stands out, capturing America's past and present with historic accuracy that has been lauded by collectors and critics alike. Known as America's foremost historic artist, Kunstler brings the sense of excitement and adventure to his illustrations in *The American Spirit: The Paintings of Mort Kunstler* (Rutledge Hill Press, \$39.95 hardcover), a collection of his work that vividly portrays the development of a nation.

In his distinguished career of over forty years as an illustrator and a major artist, Kunstler has painted much of our nation's history. In his approach of a subject whether a key event or a great personal life - Kunstler painstakingly researches every detail, including visiting the sites and in-depth interviews with authorities. The *American Spirit* begins with an exploration of America's First inhabitants, the Native Americans. In vivid detail, Kunstler illustrates the harmonious connection between man and nature with depictions of Haida Indian ceremonies such as "The Haida Bear Dance." The discovery of America and the beginnings of colonial settlement are experiences and momentous occasions in our earliest history and are brought to life and emotion. Kunstler's art with Commager's moving text lead through the birth of the new nation. From the "reading of the Declaration of Independence to the Troops" to many depictions of scenes throughout the war for independence, the foundations are laid for the enduring strength and determination of our nation to succeed. Kunstler chronicles the great expansion of our nation, portraying such events as the establishment of the railroad system and the exploration of Lewis and Clark.

A large section of *The American Spirit* is devoted to examining the Civil War, an area in which Kunstler receives universal praise for his accurate and

powerful recreations. Such works as "We Still Love You, General Lee" along with images of many deciding battles stir emotions and provide insight and understanding of this chapter of America's history. The documentation of America's growth continues and is movingly depicted by Kunstler, through both World Wars up through the Modern Era and the Space Age.

The *American Spirit* is more than a history of a nation. It is an expression of American values and American endurance as seen through the eyes of one of the country's most gifted contemporary artists.

Mort Kunstler, born in Brooklyn, studied art at Brooklyn College, UCLA, and Pratt Institute. He has had nine one-man exhibitions at New York's Prrestigious Hammer Galleries and has been showcased in leading museums across the country. His work is sought by major art collectors and museums worldwide. Kunstler also enjoys tremendous success with limited edition prints of his work. Collections of his work include Gettysburg, with historian James McPherson, and *Images of the Civil War*. Kunstler is the father of three and resides in Oyster Bay, New York, with wife, Deborah.

He has conducted research in vacuum usage, heifer mastitis, antibiotic testing, milking procedures, parlor efficiency, cooling dairy cattle and barn design.

Professor Bray will discuss how Florida Dairyman living in a subtropical area can survive 90+ degree temperatures and 90% humidities. He has done extensive work in cow cooling and how temperature influences milk production. Bray also has some down to earth suggestions for dairymen and has worked with producers in Florida on low cost alternatives for cow cooling.

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Pharmacy Topics

Women can reduce their risk of almost all bone fractures with hormone replacement therapy after menopause, says a report published in *The Annals of Internal Medicine*. The doctors recommend starting estrogen within five years of menopause and continuing it indefinitely.

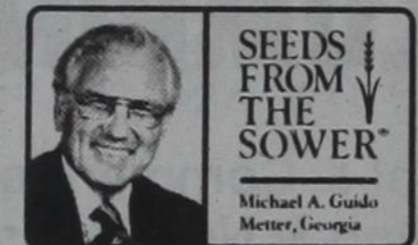

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BOOK REVIEW

Practical Book Bails out Communities Deep in Water and Wastewater Problems

Water problems getting your community down? Wells dry or contaminated? Septic systems failing? Outside funding for a solution dried up? You may find a way out in a new book from a non-profit that has spent the past twenty years helping small communities solve problems—affordably: The Self-Help Handbook for small Town Water and Wastewater projects, published by the Small Towns Environment Program (STEP) of the Rensselaerville Institute, Rensselaerville, NY 12147.

"There is probably not a county in this country that doesn't have a community with water problems," says STEP director and the Handbook's co-author, Jane W. Schautz. "The state gets on the back of local officials to comply with health and environmental standards—but can't pay for a fix. Local residents watch their property values fall and health hazards rise—but see local taxes going out of sight if they pick up the tab. We offer a different, but proven, approach, one that costs less and builds local capacity."

The authors of The Self-Help Handbook share experience gained in actual projects in the nine states where the Small Towns Environment Program is active (AR, ID, MD, NY, NC, SD, TN, TX, WA). The book includes numerous case studies, drawings, diagrams, examples of forms, and other useful information, all in layman's terms.

The Self-Help Handbook is aimed at communities ready to pitch and solve their problems starting with local resources. Arkansas State Representative John Dawson says in the preface that The

Handbook is for anybody who wants to help people make a tremendous impact on their own lives through improving their own community."

Not all communities are self-help candidates, so The Handbook offers guidelines for testing a community's self-help potential before launching into the specifics of how to apply self-help strategies. Communities which pass the readiness test can look forward to looping 30 to 70 percent or more from the cost of

their water or wastewater project. New Jerusalem in Representative Dawson's Arkansas district did their water-line project for \$80,000 instead of the "retail estimate of \$180,000.

Self Help strategies detailed in The Handbook start with taking advantage of local resources (e.g., choosing the simplest solution, involving local workers and volunteers, alternatives to buying equipment). Always in user friendly terms, strategies also include how to get free or reduce-cost legal engineering and financial help and specific guidelines for

what to do before construction (e.g., getting an engineering plan, learning the regulations, preparing a construction schedule). The Handbook also covers calculating the monthly bill to homeowners for construction and eventual operation of a water or wastewater project.

STEP is supported by the United States Environmental

Protection Agency (USEPA) and the Ford Foundation. The Handbook was underwritten by USEPA. The Self-Help Handbook by Jane W. Schautz and Christopher M. Conway is available from the Rensselaerville Institute, Rensselaerville, NY 12147 for \$21.95 +\$3 S&H.

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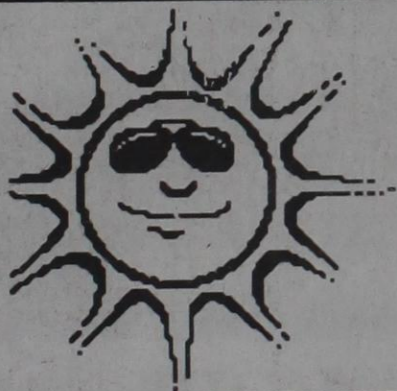


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47 Club News

Also, why can't there be page numbers shown when an article is continued instead of having "continued inside"?

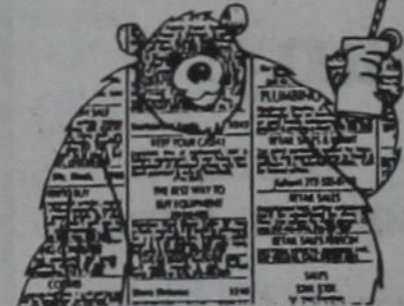

Developmental Screening For Children

On May 24th, 1995 a developmental screening will be held for young children ages zero to three (0-3). This screening will be conducted at the Eastland County MHMR Center,

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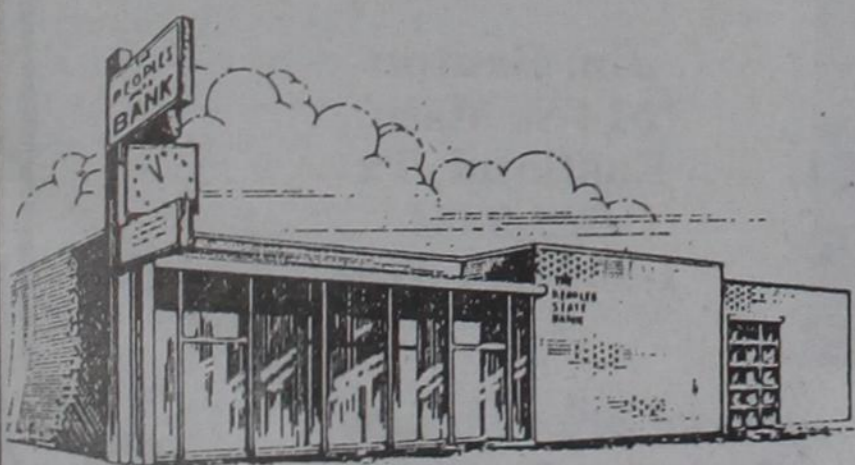
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
