The EEDC was established to accomplish several goals. The EEDC is committed to keeping existing businesses alive and well by providing support as requested. There is also the availability of funds to assist a business that is wanting to expand.

The attraction of new business from the outside is always desirable, but the members of Economic Development Board are in total agreement that our allegiance lies with those established businesses who may be in need of assistance for whatever reasons. Anyone wishing the support of the EEDC must first put together a proposal presentation that specifies what is

needed (equipment, land, cash, etc.). Next, contact Susie Quinn at Eastland City Hall (629-3349) and request to be placed on the upcoming meeting agenda. The agenda must be posted 72 hours prior to each meeting. Once placed on the agenda, attend the meeting and make a presentation to the Economic Development Board. A written proposal is provided to each member to facilitate discussion and recommendations.

Businesses experiencing difficulties that may eventually result in closing are encouraged to evaluate what they need and request the support of the EEDC. Don't wait until it's too late. Early intervention is the key to survival.

The Economic Development Corporation has to know about the needs of local businesses in order to provide a helping hand. Feel free to contact any board member and let them know where the EEDC might be able to help. All proposals are

Blood Donors Needed For Collection May 25

The Carter Blood Center of Fort Worth will collect blood at the Daugherty St. Church of Christ in Eastland on Thursday, May 25, 10 a.m. - 2 p.m.

This blood will be for Eastland Memorial Hospital, which serves the county. The local hospital is using an average of 40 units of blood per month.

Also, donors who wish their blood to go to the credit of Danelda Gevara may give blood during this collection.

Mrs. Gevara, an Eastland resident, recently received 4 units of blood in connection with a bone marrow transplant at Baylor Medical Center. Requirements for giving blood are that you be 17 years or older, over 110 lbs., and in good health. You should also be at least six weeks past any surgery, free from colds and flu for at least 48 hours, and not pregnant. Healthy people can safely donate blood every eight weeks.

From registration to the last snack the Carter Blood Center procedure will take only about 45 minutes - not long to save a life! Carter Blood Center is a non-profit blood



bank that serves area hospitals with a reliable source of blood.

The public is urged to "Give and Let Live" by donating blood at the Church of Christ next Thursday.

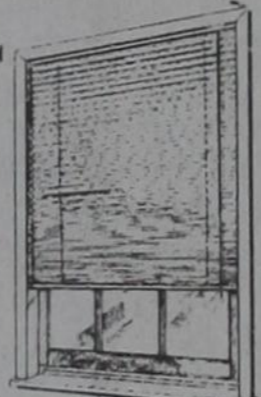

May 24 In Eastland**

On May 24, 1995, a developmental screening will be held for young children ages zero to three (0-3). This screening will be conducted at the Eastland County MHMR Center, 301 Pogue, Eastland, Tx., from 10:30 a.m. - 12:30 p.m.

The screening, which takes about 20 minutes to complete, tests a young child in four areas; personal/social skills (playing, eating, dressing, etc.), fine motor skills (ability to manipulate small objects), gross motor skills (running, jumping, etc.), and language develop-

ment (speech, following instructions, etc.). If a child is found to have two or more delays in one area, there is further testing available or referral to the appropriate agency.

The purpose of Early Childhood Intervention is to identify and correct as many problems as possible for young children. Early detection of young

Conference On Aging A Learning Experience, Judge Bailey Reports

County Judge Scott Bailey describes the 1995 White House Conference on Aging in this way: "I don't know what help I was to them, but they surely were a lot of help to me. I learned a lot."

The Judge explains that now he is better able to interpret National Policy on aging in a time of economic cutbacks.

"One of the main impressions I got at the Conference was the strong feeling among the elderly against what Congress is doing now," Bailey reports. "Many of the delegates were angry and restless. Some would stand up and shake their fists and say: 'We're not going to be treated that way!'"

"It almost seemed like the proposals on balancing the budget were causing a conflict between generations."

The Judge had a role at the Conference, which was held in Washington, D.C. May 2-5.

For one thing, he was publicly recognized for his years of service in the field of aging. Some of this time has been spent as Chairman of a Citizens Advisory Council.

At the Conference he

served on three different Committees, in some of the many meetings divided among 2250 delegates from around the country.

The Committees Judge Bailey served on were: Economic Security (Including Social Security), Legal issues involving the aged, and Quality of Life.

In these committees he had an opportunity to express his opinions and discuss the issues with people from around the United States.

The final resolutions from the Conference incorporated some of the ideas discussed in these Committees. The top 10 priorities were established as 1.) Keeping Social Security Sound for Now and for the Future. 2.) Preserving the Integrity of the Older Americans Act. 3.) Preserving the Nature of Medicaid. 4.) Reauthorization of the Older Americans Act. 5.) Increase Funding for Alzheimer Research. 6.) Preserving Advocacy Functions under the Older Americans Act. 7.) Ensuring the Availability of a Broad Spectrum of Services. 8.) Financing and Providing Long-Term Care and Services. 9.) Acknowledging the Contribution of Older Volunteers. 10.) Assuming Personal Responsibility for the State of One's Health. Many other topics and

sub-topics were discussed at the meeting, including poverty and hunger, medical care for aged Veterans, the rights of Grandparents who raise children, crime, personal safety and elder abuse, housing for Seniors, and other problems and goals.

Judge Bailey's appointment as a Delegate to this meeting came from the Texas Governor's office. The only other Delegate from this area, Walter Graham of Abilene, was appointed by Congressman Charles Stenholm.

Judge Bailey says that once the more than 70 Texas Delegates arrived at the Hilton Towers in Washington they were scattered around into various committees and hardly saw each other again.

Bailey found the members of the Committees where he served almost as interesting as the topics being discussed. On the Quality of Life Committee was Betty Friedan from the State of New York. She was the Betty Friedan who wrote the first book which spurred the Women's Liberation push of the 1960's.

Ms. Friedan was a rather vocal member of the Committee, Judge Bailey reports. But she got voted down on at least one Resolution she wanted to get incorporated.

Work in the Committees could be pretty confining, but all turned out for speeches by leading government officials.

President Bill Clinton spoke to the group, as well as First Lady Hillary Clinton. Vice President Al Gore spoke twice, and several Senators and Congressmen also made talks.

Judge Bailey says he was about as near to President Clinton as "across the auditorium of the Majes-

tic Theatre." He said security was very tight around the President. The shadow of the Oklahoma bombing was hanging over people's minds, and there was increased security almost everywhere.

He says President Clinton made a gracious address to the group. He welcomed the Delegates and recalled his late Mother's contribution in work for Seniors.

During lunch breaks and other times Judge Bailey was able to tell several people about Eastland County. He passed out Old Rip postcards to interested Delegates.

The meeting ended with a note of seriousness and concern about what the future might hold for Older Americans. Tougher times than usual were coming, many delegates said.

As Judge Bailey flew back to DFW Airport Friday, May 6 he realized that this Conference had been one of the highlights of his life.

Many years ago, as a young Texas Congressman in 1963, he had been appointed as an Alternate to such a Conference. But the actual Delegate went, and Bailey did not attend.

But if the Judge thought all the fireworks were going to be in Washington on this trip he soon learned differently! The Delta Airliner landed at DFW at 5:20 p.m., and he was due to catch a commuter flight out to Abilene at 7:40.

That flight was canceled, due to a severe storm moving in from the west. But while the Judge was standing in line for a hotel voucher for the night he heard that a plane was departing for Abilene. The pilot said he could fly north and miss the storm.

There was water on the runway - they made two or three runs to get airborne. They took off in lightning, rain and wind, and things felt mighty shaky in the plane. But one and one-half hours

Big Bucks In Breckenridge

The KEAN Big Bass Bonanza will take place this weekend at Hubbard Creek near Breckenridge. Entry fee now is \$65.00 per day.

Awards will be based on the top 3 big bass per hour and the overall top 30 fish. As always their are some extras also; a new lake record will win \$25,000 in cash, Sunday's big bass wins \$5,000 in cash, an exact 5.05 wins a new truck, and an exact 6.05 wins a new boat package.

Fishing reports from Hubbard are about normal for this time of year, terrible, but someone will catch the fish as always. Last year's winner Bobby Maynard of Eastland said fishing was tough last weekend.

An event such as this is set up for anyone who can hold a rod and reel. One cast can catch a single big fish on any given day. Some homework and knowledge can help but as most of the past winners will tell you, a lot of luck in a single fish event goes a long way.

The business in Breckenridge will set yearly sales records with the influx of visitors for KEAN. Even here in Eastland we will see some of the overflow.

Our own KICKS 96 Big Bass event next year should bring many dollars to town.

Plans are already being laid for this in 1996.

Back to KEAN, Eastland County can brag with 3 winners of KEAN, Chuck Burgess, Gary Harton and Bobby Maynard. 1995 could make 4 for our area but you can't win if you don't fish.

If this ain't your cup of tea here are a few KEAN alternatives: Texas Association of Bass Clubs team event at Possum Kingdom, Angler's Choice North Team at Texoma and Honey Hole West Team at O. H. Ivie.

And don't forget the West region event of Angler's Choice May 28 at O. H. Ivie.

Texas Department of Criminal Justice prisoners from the Holliday Transfer Unit are improving habitat for the endangered red-cockaded woodpecker on Texas Parks and Wildlife Department property here.

The 230-acre former state fish hatchery site where the inmates are working is home to at least three of the endangered woodpeckers, which require old, living pine trees to make their next cavities.

The prisoners are helping the woodpeckers by removing smaller trees and brush that will eventually grow into "midstory" vegetation. The midstory layer consists of trees more than 15 feet tall, yet lower than the forest

"crown" trees exposed to direct sunlight. Removing the midstory provides clear flight pathways and makes it easier for woodpeckers to find food.

"Historically, wildfires started by lightning controlled mid-story vegetation," said Melissa Parker, a Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologist. "However, modern fire suppression has drastically altered the original landscape, resulting in much more midstory than in the past. Essentially, the prisoners are doing what nature used to do."

The red-cockaded woodpecker has been making a comeback in parts of East Texas where its habitat is being improved through midstory removal and controlled burning programs.

Parker said the number of red-cockaded woodpeckers in Texas has increased from 288 clusters of two-to-nine birds each during the mid-1980s to 323 clusters today, for a current estimated total of 925 individual birds statewide. This was achieved in various ways, including moving juvenile birds to create breeding pairs, controlling midstory vegetation through prescribed burning and hand clearing and installing artificial nest

cavities inside tree trunks.

Voluntary partnerships with private landowners have played a key role in the red-cockaded woodpecker success story. One recent example came on Aug. 31, 1994, when Champion International Corp. signed an agreement to manage a 2,000-acre tract in Trinity County for the woodpecker. This allowed Champion to continue to harvest trees in the area while protecting a mature long-leaf pine stand, a rare ecosystem type favored by the woodpecker.

Parker hopes the inmate labor will help the woodpeckers survive at the old hatchery, since they are more easily studied and protected on state property. Other declining species that live in the same habitat, such as Bachman's sparrows and bobwhite quail, also are expected to benefit from the work.

Dana Lynn Dreinhofer, senior editor in University Relations, has been elected the 19th president of the University of Wyoming Staff Senate. Her one-year term begins July 1.

Recipient of the 1994 Michael D. Lindsey Distinguished Service Award, Dreinhofer was

recognized by UW's Student Publications Board for her "exceptional contributions" to students and student publications over the years. She routinely provides critiques and workshops for student journalists and has served on the publications board, one year as chairman.

Dreinhofer has been an organizing member of several UW developmental efforts. She and a committee of five other journalism alumni raised money to establish the Robert Combs Warner "Top Drawer" Award in News Photography and Photojournalism in memory of the former journalism professor.

Two other UW staff members joined Dreinhofer to spearhead the reprint of the 1928 Grace Raymond Hebard map, "The Romance and History of Wyoming," in a new, hand-watercolored, limited edition. Map sales benefit the Hebard Collection in the American Heritage Center and UW loan funds in Hebard's name.

During the academic year of 1988-89, Dreinhofer taught class in typography, as well as editing and production, half-time in the Department of Communication and Mass Media. During that time, she also organized the department's phonathon. In addition,

she served two years on UW's Cowboy Fever Advisory Council, promoting athletics and athletic scholarships.

In 1980 Dreinhofer received a master of arts in journalism from UW. She attended the Stanford Professional Publishing Course, an intensive two-week seminar for mid-career professionals, in 1989.

Dreinhofer was elected president of the Wyoming Professional Chapter of the Society of Professional Journalists in 1979. She received a distinguished service award at the end of her two-year term for "exceptional contributions to Wyoming journalism." Prior to her UW career, the Texas native was public relations director for the Wyoming Optometric Association for five years.

Dutch settlement of New Amsterdam. They purchased, and also received a grant from the Dutch West India Company for, approximately 100 acres of land in Manhattan, on or near the site of today's Empire State Building. They lived there only a few years and then sold their land, some of which was purchased by Claes Van Rosenvelt, ancestor of the two Presidents Roosevelt. The couple and their children then moved up the Hudson River to the trading post of Fort Orange, which was later renamed Albany, where they established a permanent home.

Sometime around the early 1800s, the descendants of this Dutch couple began moving to other areas. Although some stayed nearby, others moved throughout the United States and Canada. Their descendants can now be found in every state and in several Canadian provinces.

The NAVVF publishes

a quarterly newsletter, has published a two-volume work, *The Van Valkenburg Family in America*, a genealogy of the known descendants of Lambert and Annetje (now sold out, with a completely updated and revised version planned); and has completed a review of VV pension applications for the Civil War which has turned out to be a storehouse of genealogical information.

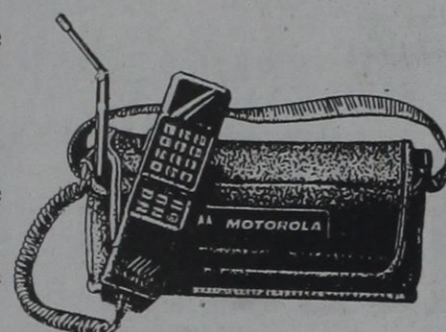
25TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF THE VAN VALKENBURG FAMILY, INC.

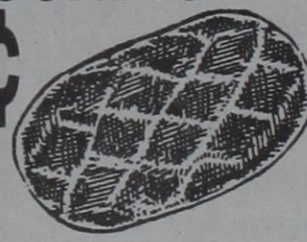

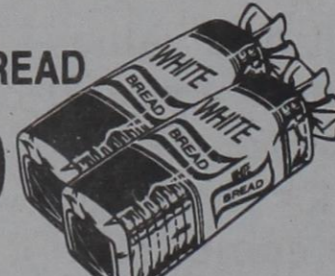

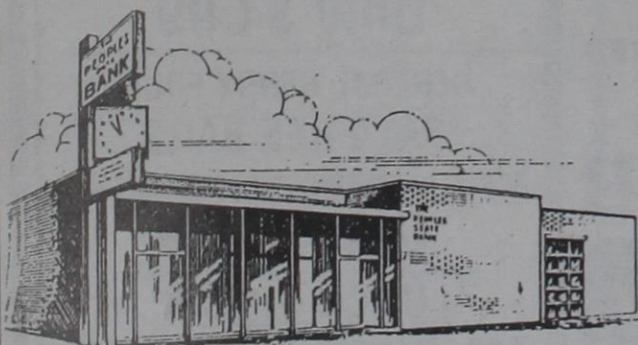
