More Rain For Eastland County Storms Veer Away

A stalled-out cold front brought intermittent rains to Eastland County during the Memorial Day weekend.

The west side of the county got more rain than the eastern half, and all escaped damaging storms which occurred elsewhere.

The worst of these was a tornado in San Angelo Sunday night. Large hailstorms, damaging winds and flooding ravaged the east side of that city from about 5-7 p.m. that evening.

That storm then weakened and veered through Callahan County on to the northeast, with only a spinoff of light rain in Eastland County.

At the Pump Station at Lake Cisco a rain last Friday night, May 26 to

taled .65 inches, and the one Monday night totaled .75. About the same amount fell in Cisco.

Lake Cisco is reported to be low, and could use a lot more runoff. The soil in the watershed has just now become saturated, and additional rain this week would bring water into the Lake.

In Eastland, Ron Bailey reports that Friday night's rainfall was .44 inches, and Monday's total was .58. There was a trace on Sunday.

There was not much rain to report at the Eastland County Water Supply District Plant south of Ranger. About .2 fell there on Friday night, and just a trace Monday night. Lake Leon was reported to have a depth of 75.1, barely over the spillway.

Rains were much heavier in the southwest side of the county. Rising Star got between .6-.7 inches on Friday night, and one inch on Monday night.

Sipe Springs, between Rising Star and De Leon, reported a total of 1.5 inches in both rains Friday and Monday.

At press time Tuesday more soaking rains were moving into the county. The weather forecast was for rain until Thursday or Friday.

Gardens and hay crops were sure to benefit from this moisture. The heavy foliage on trees and shrubs, the plentiful wildflowers and grasses also showed results of the late-spring rains.

5th Annual Old Time Country Festival In Ranger

The 5th Annual Old Time Country Festival, one of Eastland County's premier music events will take place Saturday, June 3rd at the Historical Society's new Heritage Center in Ranger. The all-day festival will feature lots of music and food concessions.

The Country Strings from Strawn will start the show at 11 A.M. Other performances will include Don & Randy of Westbound; Shonda White, former KEAN Talent Winner; Patrick Collins; Brandi Nicole Tedford, 1995 All-Star Talent Winner and State Finalist; and Various church quartets and performers from area churches. Sponsored by the Historical Society, the festival will take place on the site of the

Society's new Heritage Center across from the new Love's on Highway 80 (new Loop 254) in Ranger.

Game Warden Reviews Local Hunting, Fishing

Spring turkey season, which has just closed, is about thirty days long now and is becoming popular. Game Warden Kenneth Payne told members of the Cisco Rotary Club at their Thursday noon luncheon, "Many turkeys are being killed here," he said. In addition to a hunting license, a \$5 turkey stamp is required.

Payne, a Game Warden for 29 years, 26 in Eastland County, reported that 18 inch flat head yellow cat and 9 to 12 inch channel cat may be caught at Lake Cisco. But you must have a Coast Guard approved wearable life jacket when fishing from a boat even if it is less than 16 feet long.

Dove season opens September 1, and he says that there is good cover and he is seeing lots of dove. But too much hunting will make local doves moves south. All day hunting also makes it hard for Game Wardens to check hunters and enforce game laws, as it must be done morning and evening both.

In Eastland County, hunters may kill 1 buck and 2 antlerless deer, but they can't be killed in bow season and gun season both. Bow season is from September 30 to Oct. 31, and gun season is from Nov. 4 through Jan. 7.

Sixty percent of deer killed here are does and forty percent bucks. At present hunters from Fort Worth are paying \$5 to \$10 a day to hunt here, and are overhunting the deer, Payne says he believes. Killing two does and four turkey are too much.

Quail hunting was poor last year, but should be better this year as there are more quail. Fire ants are destroying the quail and hurting hunting in much of Texas. But motels are usually full in Eastland County during quail season. Three hundred licenses were sold in Eastland County last year to out-of-state quail hunters, mostly from Louisiana.

Only two or three percent of the hunting is illegal says Payne, and meat from illegally or accidentally killed animals is given to the needy.

Game Wardens have been having fun with a deer decoy. It seems that some who hunt illegally just can't resist shooting at it, and it has been hit many times. Of course it is being watched, and some hunters are still taking illegal shots at it as the Game Warden arrives. As much as \$500 in fines have been collected in a day. Hunters who are trespassing with a gun may be fined two or three

What little child can resist a ride in a bright red wagon? Not even when it is used to pull you to a treatment area at Eastland Memorial Hospital!

This little boy is 17 month old Dustin Wilcoxon of Cisco, pictured in the Ambulatory Care area of the Hospital. He is being treated by Dr. Ted Dyer, Ear, Nose and Throat Specialist of Abilene. Dr. Dyer travels to Eastland Memorial for periodic visits.

Dustin is the son of Melvin and Bridgett Wilcoxon of Cisco, and he has a 2 1/2 year old brother, Colin. His grandparents also live in Cisco: Dwayne and Senita Welch, and Melvin and Claudine Wilcoxon.

The Eastland Hospital Auxiliary purchased this sturdy little wagon about six weeks ago, after Ambulatory Care personnel suggested it would be a good idea.

Hospital procedures can be frightening to children, and it is especially distributing to be strapped on a stretcher and wheeled into a surgical area. They felt this wagon would be a more reassuring way to travel.

The wagon was an instant hit with Dustin, and he clamors to ride in it as soon as Betty Wilson, Ambulatory Care Manager, pulls it near him.

This little red wagon is only one of many things the 42-member Auxiliary has done for the Hospital, says Marcia Carr, Administrator.

This group has raised money to provide numerous items - a Life Pack Monitor, colored TV's for patients' rooms, and other things for both convenience and need.

Also, there are many services provided by the Auxiliary volunteers, such as a Gift Shop in the Lobby, helping deliver the mail, assistance in the business office, and special errands for patients.

Volunteers are on duty five days per week from 10 a.m. - 1 p.m. and 1-4 p.m. The Gift Shop is also open during those hours. A number of handmade items are in the shop.

"Most of all," says Marcia Carr, the Auxiliary is a network with the community. The members help us learn what improvements people in the community want."

She says there's no question about the little red wagon being a popular item!

What Is Pentecost?

Many have been the occasions when someone has enquired of me, "What does the word 'Pentecost' mean? Why is the word Pentecost incorporated into the name of your church?"

This, I hope, from a historical view will help solve some of the questions.

The word "Pentecost" is found on three different occasions in the bible, all in the New Testament.

We first discover the word "Pentecost" in Acts 2:1-4, "And when the day of Pentecost was fully come, they were all with one accord in one place. And suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance."

The day of Pentecost was one of the three major feast days on the Jewish calendar. The day of Pentecost or the "Feast of first-fruits", as it was often called by the Hebrews, was a celebration of the giving of the law to make the annual pilgrimage to Jerusalem for the observance of this most hallowed day. It is estimated by scholars that anywhere from two to three million Jewish pilgrims were within the gates of Jerusalem on the particular "day of Pentecost" as recorded by Luke in the book of Acts.

It is most significant that God chose the day of Pentecost to bring birth to the New Testament Church. The law, given to Moses, after the exodus from Egypt, was the beginning of the old covenant, which was limited to the Jews alone. The day of Pentecost, held fifty days after the most sacred of Jewish days, the Passover, was in celebration of the giving of

the law of Moses, or the old covenant. God chose, that on the exact day when man would be celebrating the old covenant, to usher in the New Testament of grace in the birth of the church on Pentecost.

Every student of the Bible will unanimously agree, that the church was born and brought to life on Pentecost.

What happen on Pentecost? One-hundred and twenty, including the twelve apostles, and Mary, the mother of Jesus, were gathered in an upper room in Jerusalem, waiting for the promise of the father. All of a sudden they began to speak in an unknown, unlearned language, or tongue, as the evidence of the Spirit baptism. People around them, who had quickly gathered upon hearing the great commotion, were amazed, because that all those who were speaking in these unknown tongues were Galileans, yet they were speaking clearly and distinctly in foreign or unfamiliar languages.

Some have futilely tried to explain this supernatural occurrence by saying that the only reason the one-hundred and twenty spoke in tongues was so that God could speak to every man present in his native tongue. This claim is erroneous for three reasons.

First, all Jews, no matter where they lived were required to be fluent in the Hebrew tongue, therefore varied tongues wouldn't have been necessary. Secondly, Peter the disciple to whom Christ gave the keys to the kingdom, preached an impromptu sermon to all those gathered. They all must have been able to understand, for the third reason which I will explain. Lastly, they all asked, "Men and brethren, what shall we do?" (Acts 2:37) Tongues was not given for the purpose of spiritual instruction, but was the evidence of the Holy Spirit infilling.

When Peter told them what they must do

in Acts 2:38, "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost.", they gladly received the Holy Ghost and were baptized in the name of Jesus.

This was the birth and the beginning of the church age, which yet remains on earth to this day, and will continue until the second coming of Jesus Christ in the rapture of the church.

A church that is "Pentecostal" is a church that believes, preaches, and practices, the upper room experience on the day of Pentecost. It is a church that believes

that the Holy Spirit baptism, just as it happened on the day of Pentecost, is a vital and necessary gift, still present in the modern-day church, and that it is evidenced by speaking in other tongues.

On Sunday, June 4, devout Jews again will gather to celebrate the giving of the law. Pentecostals and Christians everywhere will be found in celebration of the wonderful birth of God's victorious church.

"Boating while intoxicated" is illegal just like D.W.I., and jet skis can be especially dangerous and irritating to others.

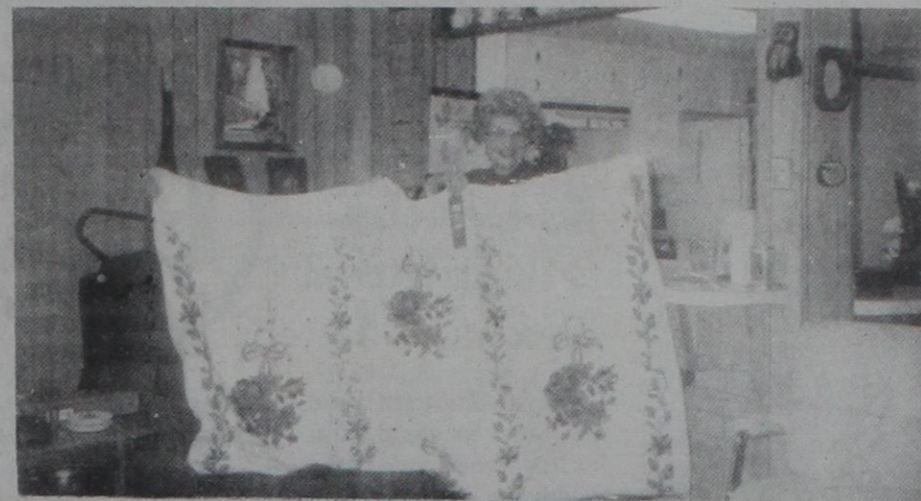
Lake Cisco has good catfish fishing, but not many have been taking advantage of the fishing there lately, concludes Payne.

Plans were made for the Birthday Party at Canterbury Villa nurs-

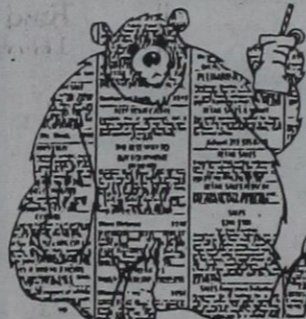

AUSTIN — House and Senate negotiators gave final approval last week to a bill that would increase local control of schools, offer parents new school choices and require more days of class for most students.

The measure, which rewrites the state's education laws, is expected to pass both houses before the legislative session ends May 29.

Conference committee members said the reduction in state regulations and the increased authority for local school districts should prompt districts to develop better academic programs.

"The freedom that is given to local school districts to adapt to the educational needs of their children is probably the most meaningful change in this bill," said Paul Sadler, D-Henderson, chairman of the House Public Education Committee.

Sen. Bill Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant, Senate Education Committee chairman, said that districts would have a free hand to make changes they think are desirable.

"We're trying to create a new mindset that local districts have the freedom to innovate and be creative, and not have to turn to the state for permission to do everything," Ratliff said.

Sen. Greg Luna, D-San Antonio, was the only member of the conference committee who opposed the compromise measure. Luna said the \$170

million contained in the bill for school construction is inadequate for property-poor school districts.

The voucher program, which was included in Sen. Ratliff's original bill, and was supported by Gov. George W. Bush, was killed by the conference committee.

While vouchers were rejected, the committee did adopt a public school choice program that would allow students in low-performing schools to transfer to another school in their district or a neighboring district using "public education grants" from the state.

Bush Likes Welfare Bill

Meanwhile, Gov. Bush, who had been critical of a welfare bill that emerged from conference committee, said he is pleased that lawmakers changed the bill to require a five-year wait before reapplying for welfare benefits.

The bill was voted out of conference committee with a three-year wait, but Rep. Harvey Hilderbran, R-Kerrville, persuaded some lawmakers to change the wait to five years.

"I am very pleased that happened," Bush said. "Texas must say to the able-bodied, 'You can be on welfare for a limited period of time, and then you're off.' The five-year time limit recognizes some may need to recycle on for legitimate needs."

Bill Increases Tuition

A measure negotiated by a House-Senate conference committee to raise tuition at Texas' public universities was approved by the House and Senate last week.

The bill, sponsored by Sen. Teel Bivins, R-Amarillo, would continue \$2 per semester hour annual increases in undergraduate tuition until fiscal year 2001, when it would reach \$40 per hour.

The measure would boost out-of-state student tuition to the level charged

by the other five most populous states. That would mean an increase from \$171 per semester hour to an estimated \$222.

One provision of the bill, however, would allow out-of-state athletes to attend Texas universities at the much-lower in-state rate.

"It puts Texas schools on a parity with other states in recruiting star athletes," Sen. Ken Armbrister, D-Victoria, said.

It was at Armbrister's suggestion that the provision was added to the tuition bill during debate in the Senate.

Food Stamp Card Launched

State Comptroller John Sharp last week formally initiated a new system of electronic welfare benefits for Dallas.

Sharp, Mayor-elect Ron Kirk and other Dallas officials formally launched the new Lone Star card system at a grocery store in Lakewood, near Dallas.

The Lone Star card works like a charge card, allowing welfare recipients to purchase food without stamps and to receive monthly cash benefits without waiting for a check from Aid to Families with Dependent Children.

Officials believe all Dallas welfare recipients will have received their cards by June 1, when more than 200,000 families in the Dallas area will switch to the cards.

Texas '94 = 552 Crashes, 58 Deaths, 240 Injured Texas, '95?

Some 58 deaths and 240 injuries could easily have been prevented last year if Texans had only heeded warning signs and signals at highway-railroad crossings, according to Railroad Commission Chairman Barry Williamson and Commis-

sioners Carole Keeton Rylander and Charles R. Matthews. Eastland, Callahan, and Comanche Counties each had one crash during 1994, with one injured in each. Brown County had grade crossing crash with no injuries.

The commissioners urged motorists to focus on the danger and play it safe as they cross railroad tracks during National Transportation Safety week, May 14-20. "The Senate has sent Gov. Bush a bill that would deregulate the state trucking industry to conform with federal law and transfer regulatory authority over registration and safety from the Texas Railroad Commission to the state department of Transportation and Public Safety.

"The House gave final approval to a major anticrime bill, but an amendment by Rep. Clyde Alexander, D-Athens, to legalize police checkpoints to catch drunken drivers, failed, 84-57, 10 votes short of passage.

"A package of Medicaid overhaul bills were unanimously approved by the Senate and sent to Gov. Bush's desk. Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, told lawmakers the measures will save the state \$6 billion in the next five years.

"Stop, look, listen, and live, it's as simple as that," Chairman Williamson said. "Please do not try to beat a train. You can't. The train will beat you, and it will beat you badly."

Texas led the nation with 553 rail crossing crashes in 1994, followed by Illinois (335), Indiana (281), Ohio (238), and Louisiana (225). Within the state, Harris County topped the car-train crash list with 65, followed by Tarrant (29), Dallas (25), Webb (21), and Bexar (18).

"We can't just hope for safety at rail crossings, we must plan for it," Commissioner Rylander said. "The next time you come to a rail crossing remember, a few extra seconds is not too long to wait for a train when the alternative can be fatal."

Rail crossing crashes took 58 lives and caused injuries to 240 others in 1994. Another 48 people died on Texas tracks while illegally

walking on, fishing from, or crossing railroad right-of-way. Sixty-two were injured in trespass incidents. Most of the victims didn't understand the danger, or ignored warning signs, signals, or safety gates, the commissioners said.

"Far too frequently we receive reports of preventable accidents and deaths at railroad crossings," Commissioner Matthews said. "Like any other area of public safety, education is the key. The goal of our bilingual public awareness campaign is to reduce these senseless tragedies by alerting Texans to the dangerous - often deadly - consequences of ignoring the warning signs."

Railroad Commission efforts to increase awareness of rail crossing dangers include presenting crossing safety programs to schools and other groups across the state, distributing school bus driver safety materi-

als, a trucking industry awareness program, and a near-collision program in which railroads report vehicles that narrowly escape crossing crashes to the Commission which then contacts the vehicle owners.

The Commission is also supporting the U. S. Department of Transportation's recently launched "Always Expect A Train" rail crossing safety program, and is joining with the Federal Railroad Administration and DOT to underscore National Operation Lifesaver Awareness Day, May 17.

Nationally, more than 6,000 people were hit by trains in 1994 - some in cars and trucks, and others on foot. There were 4,921 crashes at rail crossings, resulting in 610 deaths and 1,923 injuries. Trespasser casualties totaled 979 nationwide with 529 deaths and 450 injuries.

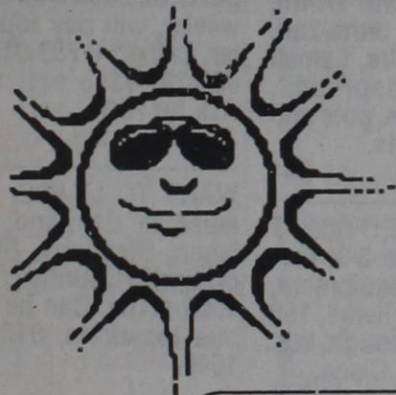

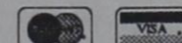

New mammogram technique could reduce the need for biopsies, say doctors at Harbor-UCLA Medical Center. A radioactive tracer, injected into women whose mammograms showed suspicious spots, helps the next mammogram differentiate between cancerous and benign lesions.

All-trans-retinoic acid cream proved effective against moderate precancerous changes (dysplasia) of the cervix, causing cells to regress completely in 43 percent of the cases.

Cigarette smokers are more injury-prone than non-smokers, an Army study reported. A North Carolina orthopedist found they heal more slowly. Poor circulation and lower bone density are the reasons.

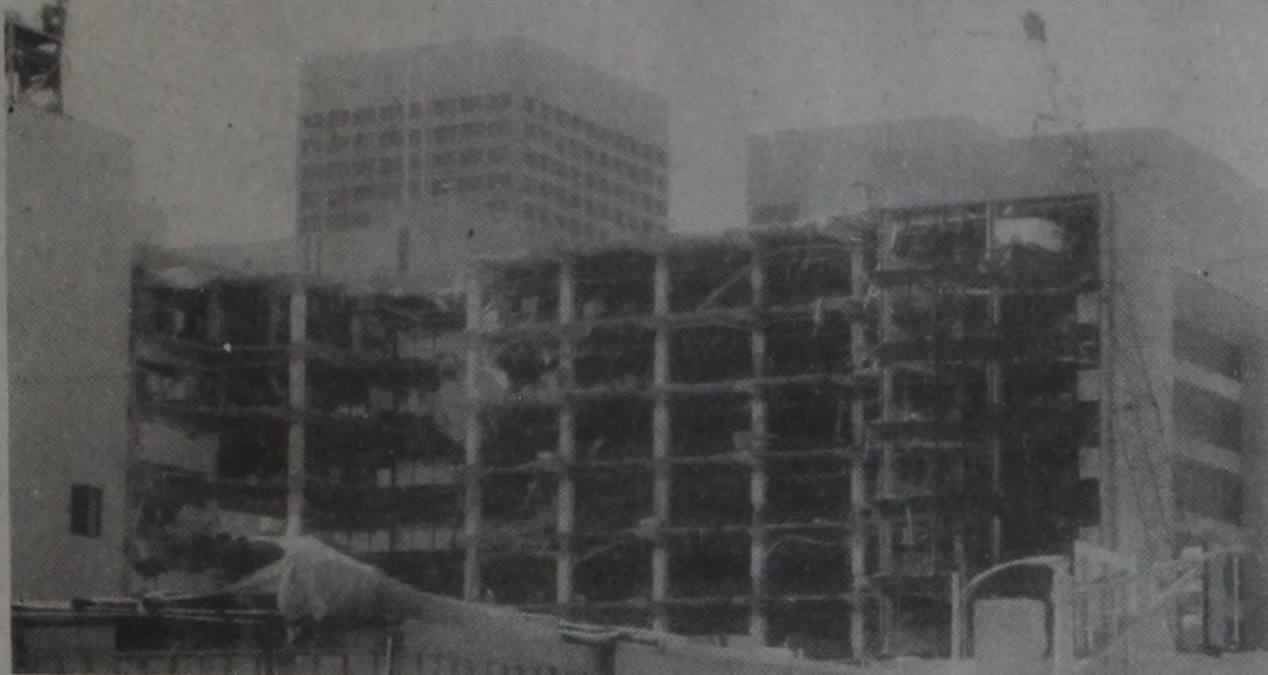

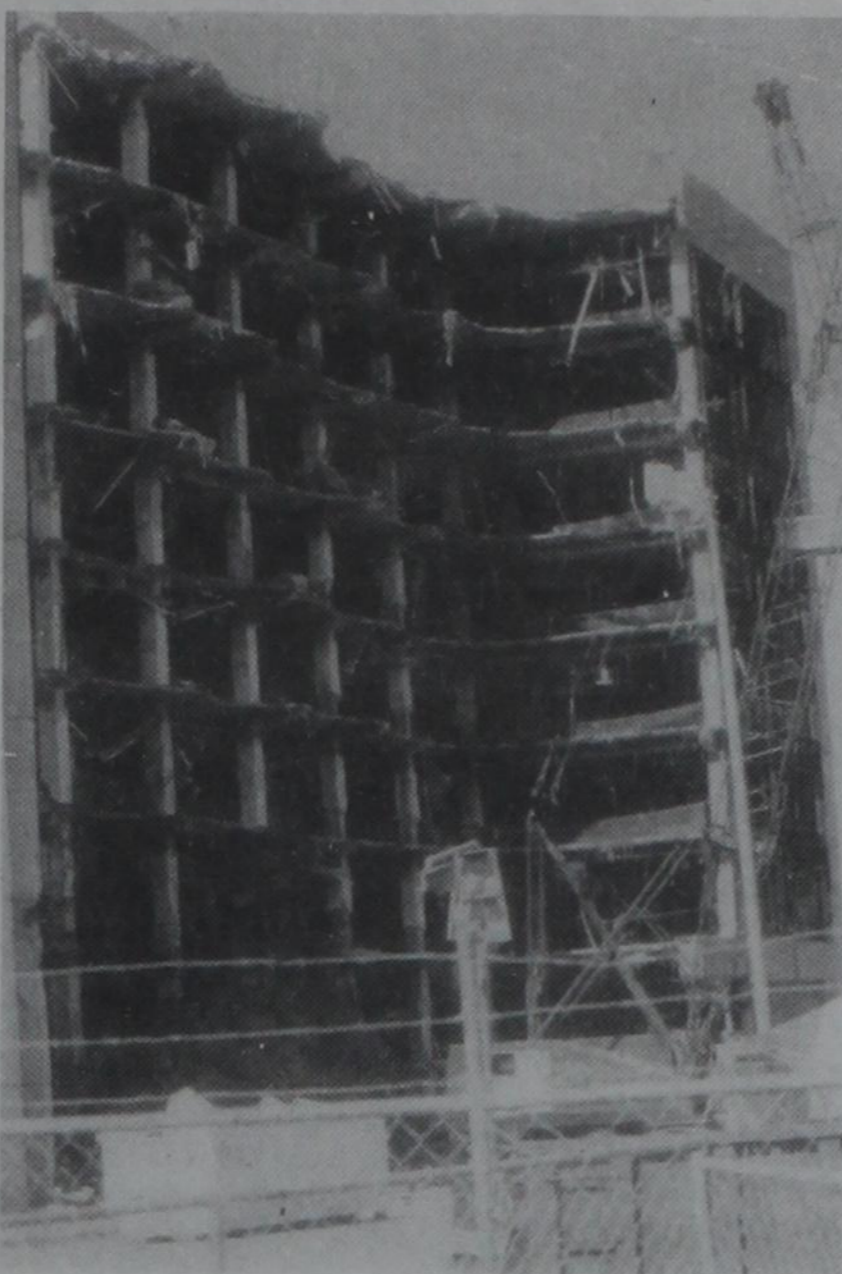

Damage to the Federal Building in Oklahoma City: these pictures were taken with telephoto lens from two angles by former Ciscoan Mark Kurklin to show damage caused by the explosion which killed 167 or more people. Mark had driven within five blocks of the Federal Building that morning but was more than twelve blocks away when he heard the explosion, which hurt his ears. Two more people are believed to be under the pile of rubble shown around the bottom of one footing. The building was to be demolished Tuesday so that the pile of rubble could be removed safely to gain access to the bodies. The extensive damage to the massive masonry and steel components of the building point out that it was truly a miracle that 170 or fewer people were killed. Usually more than 900 people would be in the building at that time, but fewer than 600 were present due to a number of unusual happenings. Several of those killed were in other buildings nearby. The blast blew out both near side and far side windows in buildings within two blocks including a very tall one. The insides of the nearby buildings were wrecked also. A large lady who was friends with Mark and Joanne Kurklin was in the Social Security office and was one of probably only three there who survived. She had to climb over a five foot high wall to escape, ordinary an impossible feat for her, but she reportedly cleared it with plenty of room to spare. Several buildings now have plywood replacing broken window glass.

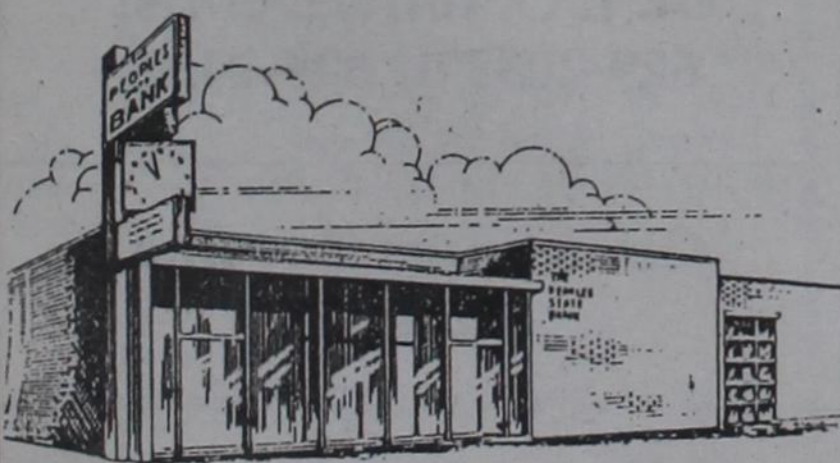
