City Commissioners Met Monday; Test Show Dirt Dumped At Landfill Not Contaminated

In a City Commission meeting held Monday Commissioners agreed to advertise for a City Manager after Claudia Clinton told them they couldn't afford not have one.

Grant consultant Wilbert Williams was retained for the present time. The city is trying to secure for a new sewer system.

A representative of the Texas Municipal League was invited to give quotes for insurance at the May 13 meeting.

A payroll policy was adopted limiting pay

only to those who present a time sheet.

Arturo Blanco, with the Abilene office of the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, addressed the commission about hazardous waste that may have been dumped at the closed landfill.

Tests showed the dirt was not contaminated but it should not have been dumped at the landfill.

Laura Wilson, an engineer with Hibbs and Todd, helped close the landfill, said the only thing that can be dumped at the landfill

is properly tested, dry sludge after a permit is received.

Part of the landfill was closed in 1993, and remainder closed in 1994. Blanco said his examination revealed exposed litter breaking through ground cover.

Also, he said there is no sign of growth at the site and that some type of grass should be growing there.

Blanco told the group he expects a letter detailing what the city is doing to remedy the deficiencies within 30 days. Claudia Clinton, City Attorney, said the letter would be produced.

Mott's Five & Ten In Ranger May Close

Ranger's Mott's Five & Ten may be closing due to the condition of building. The building is bad shape and to make repairs would cost approximately 15 to 20 thousand dollars. E.B. Mott's of Dallas called the Ranger store and told them to start marking down the items in the store that it would be closed in about a month due to the

cost of repairs to the building. The cost of repairs do not justify with the income of profits of the store.

A spokesperson for the store said they were going to try and get the Industrial Foundation involved with this to try and keep this store from closing. Mott's has been in Ranger for about 20 years.

Notice Of Construction FM 2214 Chock-O-Block Bridge

The second phase of work on Chock-O-Block Bridge (FM2214) at Lake Leon will begin on Monday, April 29, 1996. This phase of work will involve moving the traffic over to the new section of bridge. This new section will temporarily be a one lane bridge with traffic signals on each end of the bridge regulating the direction of the traffic flow. Signs and illumination will guide vehicles through the project.

Detection devices will be installed on each end of the structure. All vehicles will have to stop at a red light before proceeding on a green light. The duration of a stopped condition may last as long as 3 minutes. This phase of construction will last approximately 5 months. Motorists are cautioned to be alert and cross the structure as safely and quickly as possible. Do not park or stop on the bridge.

Hummingbirds On The Way

Leon played host to a number of tournaments this past weekend with Fort Couples, B.A.S.S. Federation 915/817 Breckenridge Bass Club and the E.C.B.C. team.

The first wave of jewel colored, nectar seeking hummingbirds are zipping through Texas right now during their spring migration and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) is seeking the public's help in

tracking the presence of hummingbirds. TPWD would like more Texans to become involved in the Texas Hummingbird Round-Up, a backyard survey to track the location, migration and feeding habits of 17 documented species of the tiny creatures.

A \$6 donation buys native seed for a hummingbird garden, a survey form, a Texas 10 range map (pinpointing the top 10 areas for hummingbirds in Texas) and instructions for filling out the survey. Once the survey has been returned, participants will receive a colorful hummingbird decal and newsletter with survey results. TPWD plans to produce a book about hummingbirds based on survey results compiled over five years. More than 3,000 people have signed up for the hummingbird round-up in the past three years.

Preliminary results from the first two years of field surveys have revealed a number of unusual species sightings, including the Green Violet-ear in Gillespie and Nueces counties and Blue-throated hummingbirds

in Nueces and Bexar counties. Ruby-throated and Black-chinned hummingbirds usually are the first species seen in Texas.

"This year, people should be seeing more hummingbirds at their feeders, especially in urban areas, because of the extremely dry conditions which has decreased nectar producing flower growth," said Kelly Bender, Texas Hummingbird Round Up project coordinator.

The flitting sprites have flown all the way to the Lone Star State from Central and South America across the Gulf of Mexico or from the northern coast of Mexico. Some will continue their flight northward through the state to the northwestern United States, Alaska and Canada, while some will remain in Texas.

There are 17 species of hummingbirds which migrate through or nest in North America, and Texas proudly boasts visits by all 17. Of these, 10 hummingbird species, known as the Texas 10, are visitors regularly seen in different regions of the state. These include the Ruby-throated, Black-

chinned, Buff-bellied, Rufous, Broad-tailed, Anna's, Calliope, Blue-throated, Lucifer and Magnificent Hummingbirds. All of these hummingbird species, except the Rufous, Anna's and Calliope hummingbirds, also breed in Texas.

Hummingbirds are voracious eaters, and are constantly on the look-out for new food sources. Happily, this makes attracting hummingbirds to your yard quite simple. The small effort invested in preparing the hummingbird nectar, maintaining feeders and planting nectar-rich flowers will be repaid a hundred times over in the delight of watching the feisty and energetic acrobatics of your well fed hummers.

The three most popular plant species for hummers are salvia, honeysuckle and lantana. They also prefer the blooms of hibiscus, Turk's cap, trumpet creeper, morning glory, shrimp plant, four o'clock and Indian paintbrush.

To get a closer look at your hummingbirds, simply hand up a feeder and grab your binoculars. The fun will soon begin!

To help you identify the swarming hummers at your feeder, TPWD has produced "The Hummingbird Wheel", a beautiful 10 inch full color identification wheel which features color illustrations and descriptions of 16 North American hummingbird species. The back of the wheel gives information on other hummingbird species, a nectar recipe and fun hummingbird facts. It can be hung near your favorite "Hummer-birding" window for quick identification of the beautiful

Details On Courthouse Grant Application

At the County Commissioners Court April 22 County Auditor Ken Parker gave details of a Grant Application for the Courthouse exterior restoration.

The Commissioners approved this Grant Application, which will be handled by the Texas Department of Transportation.

Federal funds will be used. Included in the material presented by Parker was a letter from an architect listing the work needed and the probable cost.

Also, Parker had an article from a publication of the Texas Association of Counties. This told of a

new ruling where counties have the option to assume control of their Courthouse projects, rather than letting TDoT manage them.

The Commissioners stated that they would like to have control of the Courthouse project.

The letter and article are reprinted here: **ISTEA Relief: Counties with Grants Can Take Over Restorations**

Relief is in sight for counties that have obtained courthouse resto-

ration grants under the Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act (ISTEA) as a result of intervention by the staff of Governor George W. Bush at a recent meeting of state officials and Texas Association of Counties staff.

In February, TAC Executive Director Sam Seale and Allan Rutter, Transportation Policy Director for Governor George W. Bush, visited with three Texas Department of Transportation officials to air some of the difficulties counties have been experiencing with the administration of the restoration projects that were announced more than two years ago. Rutter arranged the meeting and worked with state and county officials to determine the status of the stalled grant program.

For the first time, TxDOT officials agreed that counties that apply to take over the projects themselves may be granted approval by the agency.

In conceding that the slow progress of the courthouse project is increasing costs, the TxDOT leaders agreed to TAC's request to establish a procedure to allow counties to assume control of their courthouse projects.

Robert Cuellar, Deputy Executive Director, Transportation Planning and Development, Robert L. Wilson, Director Design Division and Doug Woodall, Director, Statewide Enhancement Programs listened to examples of difficulties and inconsistencies in the agency's administration of the program.

The three TxDOT officials agreed that the complaints cited were probably accurate, but explained that the majority of the difficulties arose due to the differences between the agency's



Stenholm Fights Relocation of Border Patrol Agents

A sign in my office reads 'If it ain't broke, don't fix it.' This is sound advice, particularly as it relates to a misguided effort to move all interior border patrol positions in cities like San Angelo and Abilene to the border. I strongly oppose this action and am actively trying to reverse it.

In accordance with a provision included in an appropriations bill passed by the Congress, Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) officials announced their plan to move 200 border patrol agents from the interior to the border. INS would restaff these positions with so-called "criminal investigators."

But the fact of the matter is that these "investigators" would not have the same authority as border patrol agents have. The end result would be the elimination of a uniformed border patrol presence and the loss of critical law enforcement func-

tions in the affected communities.

Law enforcement officers from all across the 17th District have expressed their strong opposition to this redeployment. In San Angelo, over 160 folks showed up to express their deeply felt opposition to this proposal. Law enforcement officials drove over frozen roadways from as far away as Erath County to express their support for the border patrol.

These folks know firsthand about the need to address the problems of illegal alien smuggling, illegal alien employment, and drug trafficking among other things. They understand that if they cannot call on the border patrol agents to pick up illegal aliens, they will have no choice but to let them go free because local law enforcement does not currently have the authority to detain illegal aliens. We cannot afford this setback in our battle against illegal immigration.

I have taken up this

matter with Hal Rogers, the Appropriations Subcommittee Chairman who has jurisdiction over this issue, in an effort to reverse this policy. I am also working on a joint effort with other Members from border states in trying to convince full House Appropriations Committee Chairman Bob Livingston to reconsider the decision to eliminate the presence of border patrol agents in these communities.

In addition, I have communicated my views to INS Commissioner Doris Meissner, and have requested a meeting with the INS to further make the argument for not proceeding with this policy. Finally, I promoted legislative language which addresses this flawed policy.

Much of the debate over this issue is centered around strengthening enforcement on the border. I certainly support increased border enforcement, but not at the expense of interior enforcement. Those of us who live in Texas understand all too well that everywhere from El Paso to Wichita Falls is the border.

We also know that even if we had border patrol agents standing shoulder to shoulder at the border, illegal aliens would still enter our country. We cannot afford to remove the second line of defense provided by the border patrol agents at interior stations like Abilene and San Angelo. I will continue to work with my colleagues here in the House, as well as INS officials, to resolve this matter favorably.

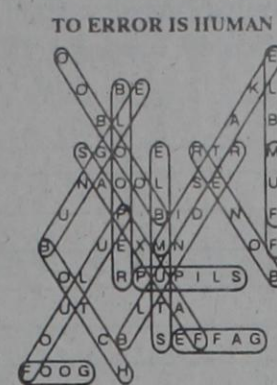

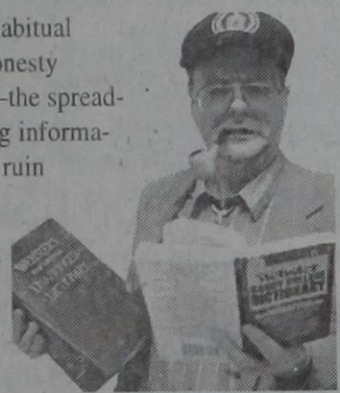

Construction On FM 2214 Chock-O-Block Bridge

The second phase of work on Chock-O-Block Bridge (FM2214) at Lake Leon began on Monday, April 29, 1996.

This phase of work will involve moving the traffic over to the new section of bridge. This new section will temporarily be a one lane bridge with traffic signals on each end of the bridge regulating the direction of the traffic flow.

Signs and illumination will guide vehicles through the project.

Detection devices will be installed on each end of the structure. All vehicles will have to stop at a red light before proceeding on a green light. The duration of a stopped condition may last as long as 3 minutes.

This phase of construction will last approximately 5 months. Motorists are cautioned to be alert and cross the structure as safely and quickly as possible. Do not park or stop on the bridge.

Pet Care

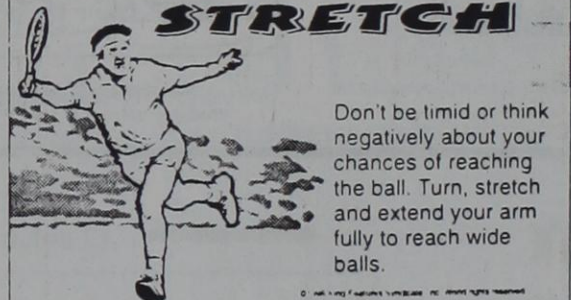

Q. My vet has told me that one of my cats (I have two) is too heavy and has to go on a diet. He told me what to feed him and how much, etc., but I have another problem. 

News For Texas Veterans

The VA has announced the distribution of almost 50 million dollars in dividends to more than 113 thousand Texas Veterans who have kept their Veteran's Life Insurance in force. Payments will average \$291 for WWI "K" policies, \$423 for WWII "V" policies, \$427 for Special "RS" and "W" policies, and from \$319 to \$889 for Reopened "J" policies.

Payments will be mailed out on the policy anniversary date. Rumors that Veterans who did not keep their policies in force are eligible for a special distribution are not true. Also, the VA Special Life Insurance for Disabled Veterans and the Mortgage Life Insurance policies do not pay dividends.

Veterans having questions about their insurance may call the VA Insurance Center at 1-800-669-8477.

The government of Kuwait is providing a new medal - the Kuwait Liberation Medal - for award to the one-third million American troops who were assigned to Southwest Asia between August 2, 1990 and August 31, 1993. Service must have been in either the Arabian Gulf, the Red Sea, the Gulf of Oman, the Gulf of Aden, the Arabian Sea, Bahrain, Iraq, Kuwait, Omar, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, or the United Arab Emirates.

Former military personnel who believe they qualify for the medal should

send a letter, and any supporting documentation to the Army Reserve Personnel Center, ATTN: DARP-PAS-EAW, 9700 Page Boulevard, St. Louis, MO 63132-5200. Next-of-kin of personnel who were killed in Desert Shield or Desert Storm may also be awarded the medal posthumously. Requests for posthumous awards should be sent to the Total Army Personnel Command, ATTN: TAPC-PDA, 200 Stovall Street, Alexandria, VA. 22332-0471.

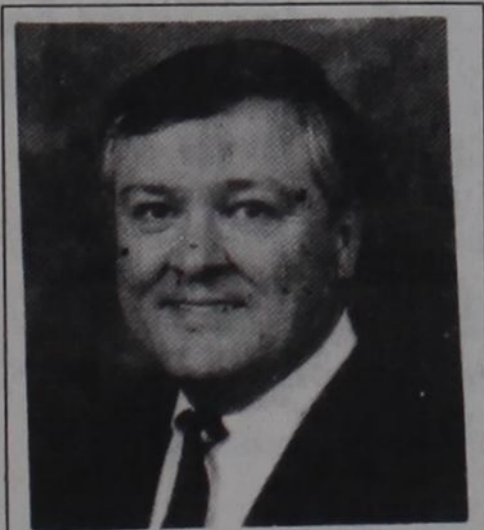

James Wheat was called as a witness during the trial of Mr. Starr, and in a surprising turn of events, Mr. Wheat confessed to and reportedly apologized for robbing the store. Mr. Wheat was sentenced to 5 years.

Cameron Dewey Light, who was found to be Mr. Wheat's accomplice, was sentenced to 25 years in a plea bargain agreement.

Mr. Wheat talked at length about the robbery and his statement was recorded in the court records, said District Attorney John Terrill of Stephenville. A local police officer said that he had never seen a witness confess on the stand like that outside of the movies. Mr.

Wheat blamed his actions on getting drunk and doing something he otherwise wouldn't do.
