Phylecia Schooling Place 6 Ranger College Board

My name is Phylecia Schooling. I am running for place 6 on the Ranger College Board of Regents. My husband, Steve, along with my daughters, Andrea, 16, and Allison, 15, live in Ranger. In 1976 Steve and I moved here from the Dallas-Fort Worth area. We began in business immediately, but really didn't become involved in the community as a whole until after our children were born in 1979 and 1981. In the years since 1976, I have been in business for myself, worked in my husband's machine shop as a shop hand, and a general council to him. I have taught Sunday School and led the women's auxiliary at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Breckenridge, where we have been members since 1980. I have worked with the Girl Scouts of America as an assistant troop leader, troop leader, Council trainer, served on the Heart of Texas Girl Scout Council Board of Directors for two terms, local Service Unit Chairman for 3 years. I worked briefly at the Walnut Street Clinic for a new doctor in town. I have served on the Ranger Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors for most of the past 10 years, serving a term as president, managing the chamber for a year, and presently serving my second term as Secretary/Treasurer. And, as most of you know me, I have worked for Lone Star Gas for 8 years, as clerk here in Ranger, then in Eastland and finally as the Lone Star Gas representative here in Ranger at this time. During these same years, I have been a student at this college, as has my husband and I fully expect that my daughters will begin their college careers at Ranger College.

I believe the issue facing any educational institution are totally involved in turning out graduates, the school's product if you will, people who are prepared to meet the needs of life include work, family, community and self. The school must be that final educational, parental, ethical push and example that changes children into thinking, creative, productive adults, who are ready to become our future. I believe that any paying customer, which includes all students at Ranger College who are not on scholarship, and all taxpayers of the state who support the ones who are here on scholarship, would expect nothing less than the best, most current education their dollars can buy. I think that it is fair to say that if you are not moving forward, getting better, then you are actually going backwards. There is no marking time or treading water. We must move forward, we must strive to turn out the very best product we can.

The issues facing Ranger College are very much the same as those facing business. The mission is to turn out the best students possible. The Board of Regents is elected by the taxpayers to set policy and to hold the administration accountable. The administration-the President and Deans-are responsible for the operation of the school. The President and Deans, in conjunction with the Board are also responsible for, as they say in business, a "vision". "Where are we today? Where are we going to be tomorrow? Where do we want to be five or ten years from now?" The administration is then responsible for finding the people to accomplish all this. Since our product is an education, then we need good teachers. We also need classrooms, dormitories, maintenance, a sports program, the lost goes on.

Then, there must be a way to pay for all these things. The Board is responsible for setting the local tax rate which accounts for a very small portion of the operating budget of this school. Most of the money comes from the students and the state. In other words, it is a competitive situation. When you recruit, you say "We are going to provide you, the student, with the best education and educational experience your money can buy." So, we are back to our mission. The issues are all wrapped up in this cycle. Attracting students and faculty, providing the place and the experience and the education and doing it in such a way that you can attract better students and better faculty and provide a better place and better experience and a better education to attract more and begin again.

I am very proud of Ranger College. The classes I've taken here have been very beneficial. My husband, Steve, who has a Bachelor of Applied Arts and Science from Tarleton says the classes he took here were as good as any he took at Tarleton. Ranger College is one of the economic keys to this community of Ranger, Texas where I have a twenty year investment. I am realistic enough to know that very little, maybe nothing, in this world is totally black or white. Everything is varying shades of gray. But I firmly believe we must be steadily moving forward, never making

time or just treading water. If am elected, I pledge to work as hard and as diligently for Ranger College as I have in the other endeavors of my life-being a wife, mother, mentor, organizing, working and standing up to be counted.

John Yeary New Administrator E.M.H. 'Good Hospital' 'Unlike Most Rurals'

It would be hard to find a more optimistic Eastland resident than John Yeary, the new Administrator of Eastland Memorial Hospital.

Yeary, 35, comes to Eastland from Dallas, where he was Director of Retirement Center Operations for Liberty Health Services Inc. He assumed his duties at Eastland Memorial on March 19, and spent his first week there reviewing the operation of the Hospital with Jane Rose, Interim Administrator.

"This was a rare opportunity to learn about the management of the facility," Yeary says.

He remarks that the in-depth look at the facility verified his first impressions.

"This is a good Hospital," he declares. "In most ways it is unlike any other rural Hospital.

"While other communities are struggling to keep their Hospitals alive, Eastland Memorial has become a County-wide Health Care Center, with excellent Doctors and staff!"

When Yeary was offered the position of Administrator here he realized this was the kind of job he had always wanted, and his education had prepared him for it.

But before making a final decision he and his wife Tena visited Eastland to see what kind

of place it might be to live. They were especially interested in a good school for their sons John, 7, and Justin, 5. And, as Baptists, they were interested in a good church in which to worship.

They were favorably impressed with these things and much more in Eastland. Yeary grew up in the small town of Haskell, on the Rolling Plains, and Eastland reminded him a bit of his home area. "But there sure are a lot more trees here," he says happily.

Yeary brings an impressive background of education and achievement to Eastland Memorial Hospital. He graduated from Hardin Simmons University in 1982 with a Bachelor of Business Administration-Management Degree.

He followed this with a Master of Science - Healthcare Administration Degree at Trinity University in San Antonio, 1984.

After that he held various positions: At Hendricks Medical Center, becoming Vice President in 1987, with administrative responsibility for a number of services.

Then he worked on the creation of a five-Hospital system in Central Louisiana. Later he revised operating policies and procedures at U.T. Southwestern Medical Center, Fort Worth.

At Liberty Health Services Inc. Yeary had the responsibility for the administrative and business operations of home health provided in thirteen centers across Texas.

He and his family lived in Garland while he worked with this agency. Here in Eastland, Yeary says he doesn't anticipate any big changes at Eastland Memorial right now.

Students Tour Bindery, See Books Being Made

How do you make a book?
Students of Eastland County Home School Association (ECHSA) found out recently. They

toured the manufacturing plant of H.V. Chapman and Sons book bindery in Abilene.
In the high-ceiled, book-lined reception area, bright with walls of

square-paned windows and doors reminiscent of colonial shops, ECHSA students met owner Stan Chapman. He pointed out two antique pieces of binding equipment amid the chairs and tropical plants. His grandfather operated them when he opened his business in this same building in 1947.
"To make a book,"

Chapman began, "someone must first write the manuscript. Then someone (usually a printing company) prints, folds, and collates the pages. Then they bring it to us. We bind it."

He does it much as his grandfather did fifty years ago — basically, the way it's been done for centuries. There are concessions to the speed and muscle of machinery, but his employees (including his father and uncle) still do a lot of work by hand.

"Books are assembled in sixteen-page sections called 'signatures,'" Chapman explains. "We sew each signature at the fold with nylon thread on a Smything machine. The machine sort of crochets the signatures together as it goes."

Chapman continues, "Like people, books must have a strong, health spine. So, after we add front and back end sheets of heavier paper, we coat the spine with five coats of a flexible white glue containing resin. That secures the stitches that hold the signatures together."

"We also attach a square of woven 'supermaterial' to the spine. This cheese-cloth-like fabric, with the end sheets and covers, forms the book's 'hinges.'"
Next, fascinating ECHSA students, comes The Guillotine—a super-sharp trimmer with a massive blade. It ensures the book's pages are all precisely even.

"That completes the 'heart' of the book," says Chapman.

For hardbacks, cutting the selected cover material and the cardboard forms is next. Rollers apply a dark glue to the inside of the soft cover, and skilled hands fold it around the front, back and spine cardboards.

Books have names, of course.

"Dad adapted this old snapper to stamp the author's name, title, designs and so forth in gold foil," Chapman notes, leading students to an ancient press. Clamps and rods tenderly hold a shining ribbon of gold. Spools of other widths and colors share a shelf with "dies" which imprint special designs.

Then the clean, bright pages—the "heart" of the book—slide into the cover. Front and back are glued to the end sheets. The supermaterial, sandwiched between the covers and end sheets, lends its strength to the bond.

The book is almost finished.

Chapman spins the handle on a tall, heavy press, filled now with large, official-looking volumes. He lifts one and examines the end sheets.

"We don't want the glue between the cover and the end pages to squeeze out and glue pages as well," he explains.

The plant can produce about five hundred books a week. Orders range from one book to many thousands to bind. Volume decreases unit cost, of course, but small orders and quality work secure Chapman's market niche.

"Giant automated machines help the big companies spew out thousands of books quickly," he comments. "Their machines never stop. But those big, expensive machines require big dollars. They can't afford to set up for small runs. We can."

"Furthermore, they use cheaper materials and less durable processes. For instance, they glue the cover on and call it done. Ours set overnight in these heavy presses to make sure the bond is permanent."

In addition to Smything-sewn books, Chapman does drilled stitching (another durable process) and glued volumes, both paper back and hard cover.

Besides binding magazines for libraries, Chapman rebinds valuable books such as Bibles. Another intriguing item: hardbound volumes with blank pages.

ECHSA students saw Eastland County authors' names on several Chapman-bound books: Lela Latch Lloyd, Cecil Copeland, Harry Watson.

Other customers include Texas/Alaska writer Mary Carey, John Black of Putnam, the Longbothams of Clyde, and well-known Western writer Elmer Kelton of San Angelo.

Says Harry Watson of Cisco, translator and editor of Japanese works: "I chose this town for my home and business partly to be near my printer and Chapman, my book binder."

Pat Starr Cleared Of H.E.B. Robbery

Cisco resident Pat Starr, who was wrongly identified as the robber of an HEB store in Stephenville, was cleared of the charge after spending more than four months in jail.

James Wheat of Lake Leon was called as a witness during the trial of Starr last week in the 266th District Court of Stephenville. In a surprising turn of events, Wheat confessed to and reportedly apologized for robbing the store. He was sentenced to five years as an accomplice to the robbery.

Cameron Dewey Light of Cisco was sentenced to 25 years for the robbery, in a plea bargain arrangement.

Wheat talked at length about the robbery, and his statement was recorded in the Court records. A local police officer said he had never seen a witness confess on the stand like that, outside of the movies.

After Wheat confessed to robbing the store Light entered his plea bargain the next day. Due to two previous felony convictions,

Light could have been sentenced to 99 years or life. He was given the shorter sentence in exchange for his confession.

He will have to serve at least half of his 25-year sentence before he is eligible for parole.

Starr and Light resemble each other, which might have led to the mix-up in identity by some witnesses of the robbery.

Starr had been held in the Erath County Jail for 133 days. Representatives for Starr said they felt their client was innocent, and urged the police to pursue leads which might link Wheat to the crime.

Starr's mother, Thelma "Sis" Sellers, said she felt her son was being blamed for someone else's robbery. She heard it was Cameron Light, and Wheat had gone with him.

She had made an audio tape of Wheat telling about the robbery. The quality of the tape was poor, but a transcription of it was made for the jury.

In his confession, Cameron Light admitted that he and James Wheat were the only ones involved in the robbery.

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Let Us Not Forget

By Cecil Copeland

The Third Army, 5th Infantry Division, European Theater of Operation, or ETO.

Let Us Not Forget I, Cecil Copeland, was in the 737th Tank Battalion, part of the 5th Infantry.

We crossed the Danube River at Passau, Germany, into Austria about the end of April, 1944.

We went East into Austria and then turned North into Czechoslovakia.

The 5th Infantry liberated the town of Volary. The people pronounced the name, "Wollern." In this town we liberated approximately 140 Jewish women or girls, from 20 to 30 years of age. From this point on, I will refer to them as the girls.

The girls were the remains of 4000 that started the death march of 500 Kilometers.

The march started at Grunberg, Germany on January 25, 1945 and ended March 15, 1945 at Helmbrechts, 300 Kilometers.

After a month of waiting at Helmbrechts to see how the War was progressing, the march started again. By this time there was only about half of the girls alive. If one tried to escape, the Germans lined up the rest and shot the tenth one, right on down the line.

The ones that got too weak to keep up were shot where they fell.

The second march started April 13th and ended May 5th. When the 3rd Army liberated the town of Volary, there was 200 more Kilometers walking for the girls.

Forty nine girls died at Volary from malnutrition and murder by the German guards. Several died after the United States Army liberated them. Some of them had lost weight down to 70 or 80 pounds. The human body can stand only so much.

The purpose of the march was to get a bunch of slave labor into Austria. Hitler thought he would pull his army back into Austria and make a last ditch stand. He thought the Allies would let him have a country to start over in, but that did not happen.

In 1994 I wrote a letter to the Mayor of Volary and asked for the true story of what happened. About a month later, I received a phone call from Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Robinson. They sent me a copy of her scrap book or album. She was a survivor of the death march. She was born Amalia Mary Reichmann in Bielitz, Poland. The only crime this person committed was being born a Jew.

The Nazi gave her a number of 63905 which was tattooed on her arm.

I asked the Mayor for a true story of the town of Lidice. This town was

West of Prague. The capital of Czechoslovakia. He told me the town was not rebuilt, but the Four Powers, England, France, Russia and The United States, constructed a memorial, with a lot of flowers and memorials to honor the dead. I will let the letter from the survivor speak for itself.

I mentioned this thing with the girls in my book, "War As I Saw It."

Dear Mr. Copeland:
Mr. Svatopluk Vokurka, mayor of Volary (Czech Republic), a good friend of our family with whom we were visiting a month ago, asked that I contact you in regard to your letter of inquiry to him.

I introduce myself as one who is married to a former concentration camp prisoner who survived the two consecutive Death Marches which ended in Volary (Wallern) Czechoslovakia. I met Amalie Mary Reichman in Salzburg in April 1946. Mary and many of the survivors had recovered in the Volary makeshift hospital after liberation and been taken to the American Zone of Occupation, Austria. There they were deemed to be "Displaced Persons" and lived under UNRRA aus-

pices in makeshift camps. I served at the time with Company C, 11th Combat Engineers. Under a program then called the War Bride Program, I arranged to bring Mary to the US (I lived in Provincetown, Massachusetts at the time.) We've been married since 17 June 1947 and have two children and three grandchildren. There is a great deal to tell you about the events which brought the young women (ages from 16 to 34, but concentrated in the 20-24 age group) to be liberated by units of the 5th Infantry Division on 6 May 45. Mary and I have tried to put what happened to the girls behind and concentrate on being normal American parents. However, in the last three years, we've decided that we should piece together what happened and leave a story behind for our grandchildren. We've spent a lot of time trying to track down as many of the girls who survived as we can (there were perhaps 200 of the original 1,500 who began the Death Marches on 29 January 45 alive and scattered on May 6, 1945 when the first contact was made with American boys). There may be 100 still alive; we've contacted about 35. All express a wish to leave a recounting of the events 29 January - 6 May 1945. We've proposed that in exchange for getting together with the "girls" as I still call them and videotaping their recollections and copying any photos they might have, Mary

and I will write an accounting with photos and share it with the girls for their families. We've met with groups of 5 to 6 girls in Los Angeles, Israel, New York and interviewed by phone a number more.

We've located and visited with Captain Charles Fraser and T/4 Melvin Jackfert of the 5th Medical Battalion who were with the girls from the liberation through the first critical three weeks. During that time and despite heroic action by the boys of the 5th Medical Battalion, eighteen of the liberated girls died in addition to those who were lying dead when the boys arrived.

We've also located and spoken on the phone with T/4 Harry Morgan of Yonkers NY who was the jeep driver of the first contact with the girls. Major Harry Hooper of Cincinnati who was the officer with Morgan has since died. We've also spoken with Major Frank Anker of Chicago and Captain Nathan Knoll of Miami who worked with Captain Fraser at the Volary hospital.

I'm pleased to have seen the commendation Dr. Fraser, Melvin Jackfert and eight other medical personnel were awarded for their work in Volary

with the survivors. All girls with whom I spoke remember the GI's with deep, deep emotion as "angels."

I enclose some photos taken by the Signal Corps the day after (May 8, 1945) the surviving girls were taken to the hospital. You can see that some of the photos have the Signal Corps insignia in the bottom corners of the photos. Also, I send you Mary's album which we put together for our children and grandchildren. You can see that the article about liberating the girls was written up in the 5th Infantry Division's newspaper (pages 44-45 of Mary's album) of May 25, 1945 and the photo of the forced walk past by German civilians (page 43) of the reburial of twenty two girls who died in Volary between 3 May when they were forced there by the SS and 7 May 1945 when the 5th Med Btn boys removed the survivors to a woodworking school converted into an emergency hospital.

As for Lidice, it's also a long story, but the essence is that it was a town of about 1,000 working-class persons about 15 miles west of Prague. In May 1942, Reinhard Heydrich, Hitler's personally-selected head of the German-occupied Czech

lands was assassinated. A reprisal was the eradication of the entire village of Lidice as well as numerous other acts of reprisal. On 10 June 1942 on personal orders of Hitler, the town was surrounded without notice by SS; all men over the age of 14 were shot to death (about 585), all women were sent to the concentration camp Ravensbruck (about 220 of the approximately 500 women survived) all children were arrested and sent in Gestapo care in Lodz, Poland. There about 15 were deemed fit to be "Germanized" and were sent to SS families to be reared as Germans. Every one of the 200 or so other children (infants to age 14) were gassed and cremated in nearby KL Auschwitz, specifically in the gas chambers and crematoria at Auschwitz Birkenau subcamp. The town of Lidice was burned and the ruins bulldozed. Nothing was left; neither humans nor animals nor buildings.

Of course, there was no connection between anyone at Lidice and the assassination; I can only surmise that the non-connection was the reason the peaceful community was chosen. That is, the barbarity and non-culpability was to show

the Czechs the cost of opposing the Nazi's 1,000-year Reich. Don't know if this letter responds to your inquiry to Mr. Vokurka, but please write or phone or fax us if there be any specifics which I might be able to advise. Of course I'm interested in your contact with Volary. I remember from your note to Mr. Vokurka a reference to being in a tank unit in the Volary area. According to the 5th Infantry's account, Charlie Co. of the 2nd Regt moved into Volary with men from the 803 Tank Destroyer's reconnaissance platoon. Was the 803rd the unit with which you served? Mary and I would like to hear from you. Very best regards Amalie Mary and Bernard Robinson xxx

I have maps of the march of the girls made, towns, and places where the German guards shot the prisoners, and cemetery lot numbers where they are buried. A lot of the bodies were left on the side of the road. Some were covered with trash or brush and later found by the Americans and buried. S.S. Lt. Alois Dorr was in charge of this march. Dorr was born January

14, 1911 in Hapfing, Germany. I have a copy of his sentence to life imprisonment in the penitentiary at the Nuremberg War Crimes trials.

Dorr served ten years of a life sentence and was released. All other guards did not serve any time. They said they were following orders from the man in charge.

The girls were given a bowl of potato soup, once a day. Some days they got nothing at all.

Mr. Robinson told me that his wife was very emotional about the American flag and the American soldiers. As time went on, she prayed to God; "Give me one more day, Lord, one more day." Her best friend was shot by one of our air planes. She told Amelia as she was dying, "We are so close to the Americans, Lord do not let me die now!" Some of the guards were killed from the same strafing.

Some people think the atrocities did not happen. If anyone wants to check the authenticity of this death march, I have telephone numbers, army records, and War Crimes Trial records. We must not let something like this happen again.

WHO IS AT RISK FOR OSTEOPOROSIS?

There are many factors that determine who will develop osteoporosis. The first step in prevention is to determine whether you are at risk. The risk factors are:

- Age - The older you are, the greater your risk of osteoporosis. Your bones become less dense and weaken as you age.

- Gender - You chances of developing osteoporosis are greater if you are a woman. Women have less bone tissue and lose bone more rapidly than men because of the changes involved in menopause.

- Race - Caucasian and Asian women are more likely to develop osteoporosis. However, African American and Hispanic women are at significant risk for de-

veloping the disease.

- Bone Structure and Body Weight - Small-boned and thin women are at greater risk.

- Menopause and Menstrual History - Normal or early menopause (brought about naturally or because of surgery) increases your risk of developing osteoporosis. In addition, women who stop menstruating before menopause because of conditions such as anorexia or bulimia, or because of excessive physical exercise, may also lose bone tissue and develop osteoporosis.

- Lifestyle - By smoking, drinking too much alcohol, consuming an inadequate

amount of calcium or getting little or no weight-bearing exercise, you increase your chances of developing osteoporosis.

- Medications and Disease - Osteoporosis is associated with certain medications (e.g. cortisone-like drugs) and is a recognized complication of a number of medical conditions, including endocrine disorders (having an overactive thyroid), rheumatoid arthritis, and immobilization.
- Family History - Susceptibility to fracture may be in part, hereditary. Young women whose mothers have a history of vertebral fractures also seem to have a reduced bone mass.

HOME PRESSURE CANNER GAUGE TESTING CLINIC

I will be testing pressure canner gauges for accuracy this coming Friday, May 10th at the Extension Service Office. The office is located on the first floor of the Eastland County Courthouse.

Persons wishing to have their dial gauges checked need only to bring the canner lid states Janet Thomas, County Extension Agent. This test is provided free.

There will also be free pamphlets on canning, freezing, pickling, and jelly making.

SAVE THE WAY FOR CANDLES

Paraffin is no longer recommended as a method for sealing jams and jellies, as air can get in around the edges and cause

spoilage. Mold on jellies may not be as harmless as was previously thought. Do not eat any jams or jellies that contain mold. All jams and jellies should be processed in a boiling water canner.

LOW SUGAR BUT STILL A SWEET IDEA

To sweeten with less sugar you can't just reduce the amount of sugar or add a sugar substitute to your jelly or jam without also using modified pectin products such as reduced calorie pectin. Pure Fruit Pectin Lite is usually available where you buy regular pectin. Such pectins have been developed to jell and prevent spoilage with less sugar. Reduced sugar spreads taste less sweet and have a softer texture, but the naturally sweet flavor of the fruit stands out deliciously. Also reduced sugar products often require longer processing in the Boiling Water Canner.

Beautiful strawberries are now becoming abundant in our grocery stores.

Low Sugar Strawberry Jam

12 cups stemmed, firm-ripe strawberries
1 1/2-1 3/4 teaspoons red food coloring
1 3/4 oz packet Pure Fruit Pectin (Lite)
36-48 packets aspartame artificial sweetener

Crush strawberries and measure 6 cups pulp. Combine pulp, food coloring and pectin in a 6 to 8-quart saucepan. Let stand for
