The home of Richard and Lois Robinson burned to the ground early Monday morning, apparently after being hit by a bolt of lightning. The Robinsons were at the Eastland County Dispatch at the time, where Richard serves as Chief Dispatcher. The call on the house - located S.W. of Eastland - came to the Eastland Fire Department at 12:38 a.m., during a thunderstorm that raked the county. Reportedly the blaze was first seen by an individual who lives four miles to the north. By the time the fire department personnel reached the scene the wooden structure was engulfed in flames.

Golemon Auditorium To Host Commencement Exercises

McCabe, President of Tarleton State University in Stephenville, Texas, will be the featured speaker. Dr. McCabe is Texan by birth, originally from Rio Hondo, Texas. He received his BA and MS degrees from New Mexico Highlands University in Albuquerque, New Mexico. President McCabe has spent his career in the educational field. He was employed as an assistant professor at Pan American University in Edinburg, Texas from 1972 until 1976. From 1976 up to 1984, Mr. McCabe was Head of the Department of Secondary and Higher Education at East Texas State University in Commerce. Upon leaving East Texas, Dr. McCabe accepted a position as the Dean of the College of

Education at Lamar University in Beaumont, Texas, from 1984 to 1988. On August 17, 1988, Dr. McCabe joined Tarleton State University as the Vice President for University operations. He was later named the 14th President of Tarleton State University by the Board of Regents of the Texas A & M University System on July 26, 1991. It will be an honor to have Dr. McCabe speak to the 1996 graduates of Ranger College. As of now, 34 Associates degrees and 20 Certificates of Graduation are on the agenda. Dean Cockburn has informed us that so far, no one who has applied for graduation has failed to meet the necessary requirements. Seating for the ceremony is limited to the first 200 people, so plan to be there as early as possible to ensure a seat.

Fugitives Steal 6 cars, Lead Lawmen On Chase

A local D.P.S. officer driving on I-20 in Eastland County noticed that the car following him didn't have a front license plate. When the officer attempted to stop the black "muscle car," it sped away. As the officer pursued, a check of the rear plate found that the car was stolen. A high speed chase resulted with the cars crossing the median and changing directions before they finally left the Interstate Highway. The D.P.S. car was temporarily stuck in the mud as both cars left the highway and were northbound on County Road 177, giving the black car a lead. And one witness said that the black car must have been going 150 m.p.h. on I-20 before leaving the highway. The D.P.S. officer said that he believed that a passenger in the car was dropped off on the County Road before the chase with the black car began again. Due to a hill blocking his view, the officer didn't see which way the black car went, so he headed west looking for him. He soon turned around, however, and met the black car, also headed west. The black car turned around, and the race was on. The black car left the highway and became stuck in the yard of Kevin and Joan Strickland. The man inside ran behind some houses and up a hill to the home of Bob and Jean White. Bob White had just answered a telephone call and when he hung up, he found himself facing a young black man, six feet tall or taller but slender, holding a screwdriver and threatening him. He demanded the keys to Bob's pickup which was parked in the driveway, and Bob let him have them. And as the man hit and destroyed a brick gate post with the pickup as he was leaving, Bob was calling 911 and reporting the theft. While officers were searching for the man at the foot of the hill, Kevin Strickland saw him leaving in Bob's pickup and alerted officers. The es-

Molly's Fig Tree Comes To Eastland

One afternoon last week the children in Housson's Child Care Center in Eastland gathered to watch Joe Housson, assisted by young Justin Cummings, plant a special tree in the back yard.

With the group was Mrs. Housson (Neda), and Hadley Powell, an assistant at the Child Care Center. The children's eyes sparkled as Mr. Housson carefully placed the little tree in the earth. They all seemed to realize that this was a very special tree. "Molly's fig tree," Joe Housson called it.

He told the children that trees were one of the greatest gifts of God. He recited the poem "Trees," by Joyce Kilmer.

"Only God can make a tree," he told them. Then Joe Housson explained why this little tree was called "Molly's fig tree," and how its story was really a part of the history of his mother's family.

He said the story began in Alabama after the Civil War, when his grandparents, James and Molly Shirley, married and settled down in the clay hills between Birming-

ham and Mobile. They stayed there from the late 1870's to the late 1880's.

In the backyard of their farm home was a fig tree with big, sweet golden figs.

Finally James heard about land that he could buy in Texas, in San Jacinto County. So they managed to sell their little Alabama place. They got their wagon loaded, with their mules, Tobie and Rhodie, harnessed to pull them to Texas.

But then Molly said: "I want a sprig of that fig tree in our back yard!"

James was in a hurry to get down the road, and didn't want any delay. But finally Molly convinced him to dig up a shoot of the tree. She wrapped it in a burlap bag and put it

under the wagon seat. She also carried along a jug of water to keep the roots wet.

Well, they finally crossed the Mississippi River, then the Sabine and Nueces - and settled out of Cold Springs, Texas.

Mr. Housson explained to the children that the land his grandparents had there is now in the Sam Houston National Forest. Members of the family kept the land until about 20 years ago, he said.

James Shirley raised cattle, corn and cotton - and the fig tree thrived in its new home. James and Molly had twelve children, and they all enjoyed the fruit from that tree.

Things went well until a neighbor began to give James Shirley a lot of trouble. He stole things, and one day met James at a rail fence - threatening to come over the fence and whip him.

James picked up the top rail off the fence, hit the man over the head and knocked him down. When the quarrelsome neighbor recovered enough he ran home, but the incident upset Molly and James.

Apparently James decided there would be more trouble, and he didn't want to have to kill anyone.

About that time he found a farm in nearby Polk County, near where the Alabama/Coushatta Indians lived. And a start of a fig tree was moved over to this new home with the family.

As it happened, the unpleasant neighbor was later killed in a saloon by his own son-in-law.

In 1915 Galveston had a bad hurricane, similar to the deadly one in 1900. It rolled inland to Polk County. During the storm Molly became very sick, and the family sent the oldest son, Bud, to get a Doctor. But before he got back, Molly died.

"Bessie, my mother, went back to Moss Hill and got a root of the fig tree and planted it at the farm at Batson," Mr. Housson told the children. "As I grew up, there was always that tree with the big golden figs."

Mr. Housson said there were three children in the family, Olivia, himself (Joseph), and his brother, J.B.

After his mother passed away the family sold the old home place. But Joe's sister, Olivia Hallett, brought a start of the old fig tree to her home in Fort Worth. About 18 months ago she rooted the cutting that was planted at the Child Care Center here in Eastland.

As Joe Housson finished the planting ceremony, he told the children: "In planting this tree we have done a thing of love. And the way to keep happy is to make someone else happy."

"As time goes by, and you come here, go by and see Molly's fig tree!"

Developmental Screening Set For May 15

On May 15, 1996 a developmental screening will be held for young children ages zero to three (0-3). This screening will be conducted at the Eastland County MHRM Center, 301 Pogue, Eastland, Tx. from 2-4 p.m.

The screening, which takes about 20 minutes to complete, tests a young child in four areas; personal/social skills (playing, eating, dressing, etc.), fine motor skills (ability to manipulate small objects), gross motor skills (running, jumping, etc.), and language development (speech, following instructions, etc.). If a child is found to have two or more delays in one area, there is further testing available or referral to the appropriate agency.

The purpose of Early Childhood Intervention is to identify and correct as many problems as possible for young children. Early detection of young children's delays have proven beneficial to the child, parents, and teachers.

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News And Views For 17th District

Rev. & Mrs. Billy Graham Receive Congressional Gold Medal

Billy and Ruth Graham received the Congressional Gold Medal on Thursday, May 2, 1996 in a ceremony in the Capitol Rotunda. I was privileged to join with my colleagues in this tribute. My wife Cindy and I attended the Gold Medal Banquet that evening to honor these two very special people who have contributed so much to family and faith.

The Congressional Gold Medal is regarded as a means of expressing public gratitude, through the Congress, for distinguished contributions to American society. George Washington received the first medal in 1794, and the Grahams are only the second husband and wife team to receive this honor.

The award was used by the Grahams as an occasion to focus on the Ruth and Billy Graham Children's Health Center in Asheville, North Carolina. This center will offer preventative and educational health services to children in the Southern Appalachians, and will cover a 10,000 square mile area.

Gasoline Prices Increase

There has been much discussion and understandable concern in Washington, Texas and around the nation about recent gasoline price increases. There are several reasons for the increases, which appear to be the result of market forces.

The coldest winter in years caused much of the oil supply to be used up; with fuel supplies low,

prices went up. Refineries were busy processing large amounts of heating oil well into the spring and delayed production of gasoline. The world oil market has also been jittery about what will happen if Iraq is allowed to release \$2 billion worth of oil in the international marketplace.

President Clinton has called for investigations by the Department of Energy and Justice Department. He has also ordered the sale of 12 million barrels of oil from the Strategic Oil Reserve. Our nation consumes 17 million barrels per day, so I am not sure this will have any significant impact. Frankly, I am reluctant to see these reserves drawn down; their purpose is to be a reserve in

times of national emergency.

There have been calls to repeal the 4.3 cent gasoline tax passed in 1993. My opposition to that tax increase caused me to vote against the final version of the 1993 budget. Repeal of this tax would cost the federal budget \$30 billion over the next six years. Replacing that revenue must be considered in the overall budget.

I think it is encouraging that some of our independent oil and gas producers are interesting in doing some drilling again. We as a nation should be doing everything we can to develop our remaining oil and gas reserves.

The latest reporting period, Texas preliminary January 1996, shows that crude oil production statewide averaged 1,352,588 barrels daily, down from the 1,422,394 barrels daily average of Jan. 1995.

Texas wells produced 464,278,179 Mcf (thousand cubic ft.) of gas, based upon preliminary production figures for Jan. 1996. This was down from the January 1995 preliminary gas production total of 469,263,434 Mcf.

The January 1996 oil and gas production totals for Callahan and Eastland Counties are as follows:

Callahan County- gas production, 148,545 Mcf. Crude oil, 34,480 barrels
Eastland County- gas production, 573,426 Mcf. Crude oil, 39,627 barrels

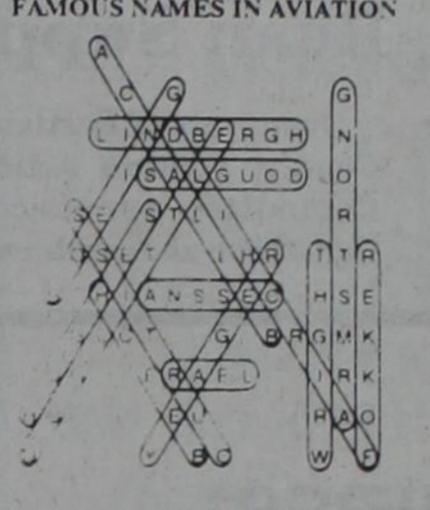

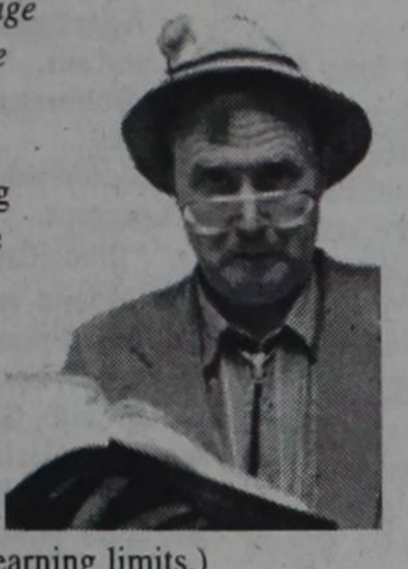

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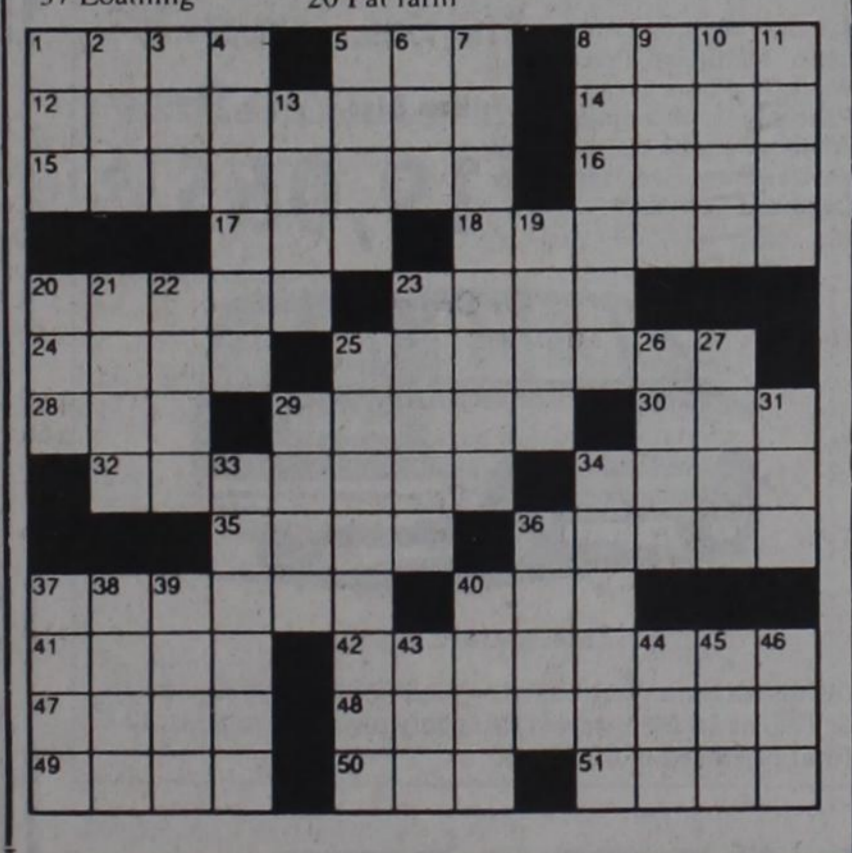

READER INPUT NEEDED

April 23rd the U.S. Senate, by a vote of 100 to 0, adopted insurance reform legislation which includes an historic amendment requiring nondiscriminatory coverage for mental illness. The amendment was co-sponsored by Sens. Pete Domenici (R-New Mexico) and Paul Wellstone (D-Minnesota) with important support from Sens. Alan Simpson (R-Wyoming) and Kent Conrad (D-North Dakota).

The bill now is in a joint Senate-House Conference Committee. Due to strong opposition from the insurance lobby and the business community, the Domenici-Wellstone non-discrimination amendment is in grave jeopardy of being dropped from the bill.

The two (apparent) presidential candidates, President Bill Clinton and Sen. Bob Dole, will be key to the survival of the Domenici-Wellstone amendment. Members of the Conference Committee will look to their two party leaders for guidance on how they should vote. The public is being urged to telephone and write both candidates to urge their leadership in opposing discrimination against people with severe mental illnesses by supporting the Domenici-Wellstone amendment.

NAMI, the National Alliance for Mental Illness, urges that callers and writers stress the fact that keeping the amendment in is a vote to end discrimination; removing the amendment is a vote for discrimination; and that both Presidential candidates are being told the same message.

AUSTIN — Gov. George W. Bush's name was among those picked by the Republican National Committee to preside over the Republican National Convention Aug. 12-15 in San Diego, Calif.

Bush will serve as a temporary co-chairman along with New Jersey Gov. Christine Todd Whitman.

Sen. Robert Dole, R-Kan., the all-but-anointed GOP presidential nominee, is working for consensus on the abortion issue, and it appears he has his work cut out for him, even with his hand-picked stars. At an Austin news conference last week, Bush reiterated his stand that anti-abortion language should not be stricken from the party platform, but Todd, a social moderate, reportedly wants to remove the anti-abortion language.

Bush said he would use the GOP spotlight to promote Texas. "I see this position as giving me a chance to say what wonderful things are going on in Texas," he told reporters.

AG seeks Reversal of Ruling

Texas Attorney General Dan Morales last week petitioned the U.S. Supreme Court to reverse a lower court ruling and allow race to be a factor in college and university admissions.

Morales is appealing a March 18 decision by the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans that struck down the admissions

policy at the University of Texas School of Law.

The lower court ruling stems from a 1992 lawsuit filed by four white students who complained that the University of Texas School of Law rejected their enrollment applications because of an affirmative action mandate that favored less-qualified minority students.

Morales said the state will defend the right of the University to consider race and ethnicity and other factors as admissions criteria.

"The noble principles of diversity and inclusiveness should be greatly valued by all public institutions — especially our institutions of higher learning. It's simply wrong to give one applicant an automatic advantage over another applicant based solely upon the color of one's skin," Morales told reporters in Austin.

Welfare Pilot to Begin June 1

A state pilot program that cuts the amount of time welfare recipients can receive benefits will premiere June 1 in Bexar County.

State officials hope "time-limited welfare benefits" will help people free themselves from welfare by breaking the cycle of poverty.

The newly created Texas Workforce Commission will oversee contractors and trade schools hired to provide job training.

"I believe the time limits should offer a little incentive and a little pressure to people to improve their education and job skills," state Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, told the *San Antonio Express-News*.

Under the program, Aid to Families With Dependent Children recipients will be asked to work at least 30 hours a week or spend 20 hours a week in job training.

On Sept. 1, Dallas, Tarrant, Travis, Fort Bend and Denton counties will follow Bexar with the program, and by January, 81 other counties will have implemented the program.

Major Crimes Drop in Texas

The murder rate in Texas last year was the lowest since 1965, and

most other major crimes decreased as well, a new report shows.

The only increase was in thefts, which were up 1.4 percent from 1994 to 1995.

"While it is disappointing that incidences of theft increased, it is good news to us that all other categories of index crimes have shown a decrease," said Col. James Wilson, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, which compiles the Crime Index report.

According to the report, nine of every 100,000 Texans were murdered in 1995, the lowest rate since 1965, when 7.5 of every 100,000 Texans were slain. A total of 1,694 Texans were murdered last year, 16.4 percent fewer than in 1994.

Other report highlights:

- Rapes were down 4 percent.
- Aggravated assaults decreased 0.9 percent.
- Robberies were down 10.6 percent.
- Motor vehicle thefts decreased 5.3 percent.

Other Capital Highlights

■ Ground was broken last week on the President George Bush Tollway. When completed in 2002, the 26-mile, \$1 billion project will run from Garland to Irving, arcing through seven Dallas-area suburbs and three counties.

■ Gov. Bush says he will be "firm and polite" in insisting that Mexico honor a water-sharing agreement that could be threatened by Mexican farmers' pumping water from the Rio Grande for irrigation. In a letter to Mexican officials, Texas Secretary of State Tony Garza told them that farmers' continued pumping could kill the Texas-Mexican water-sharing pact.

■ The Texas Education Agency estimates that almost 7 percent of the class of 1996 will not receive diplomas this month because the students have not passed the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills exam after seven test dates. That figure is a slight improvement over last year, when about 8 percent had not passed by graduation time.



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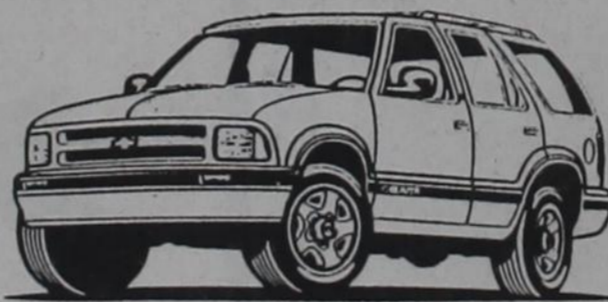
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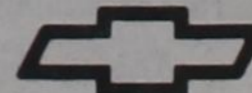

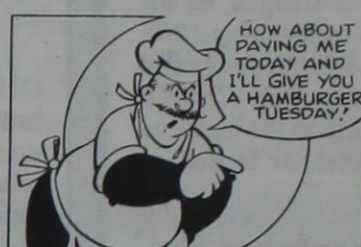

PROPERTY TAX PROTESTS AND APPEAL PROCEDURES

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the cancellation of an agricultural appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
- the local governments which should be taxing your property
- any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affected you.

Informal Review

Contact the appraisal district staff at 817-629-8597 in Eastland, Texas for an informal review.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse, Eastland, Texas.

NOTE: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review of the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

More Information

You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at 817-629-8597 in Eastland, Texas or visiting the office which is located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse, Eastland, Texas. You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Comptroller's Property Tax Division at P. O. Box 13528 in Austin, Texas 78711-3528.

Deadline For Filing Protests With The ARB*

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

BUILDING A HOME? HERE'S A TAX RULE YOU NEED TO KNOW

If you're planning to build your own home, you'll probably start by buying land and then taking out a construction loan to fund the construction costs. When the house is built, you'll roll the construction loan and any loan you used to buy the land into a regular mortgage on the finished property. Interest on your final mortgage debt is generally deductible, but a special rule may apply to the interest you pay on your land acquisition and construction loans.

First, let's assume that when it's completed the home is a "qualified residence." That means it is your principal residence or a second home such as a vacation cabin. You can deduct interest on debt used to acquire or construct a qualified residence, so once you move in, the mortgage interest is deductible. But what about the interest you paid during construction?

A special rule allows you to treat a home under construction as a qualified residence for up to two years of the construction period. So, if you complete construction in less than two years, you can deduct all the interest on land and construction loans during the entire construction period. But two years is the limit. If, for example, you experience delays and the construction takes 30 months, there will be a six month period when you cannot take any interest deductions.

Note that interest is only deductible after construction has begun. You cannot take a deduction for the interest you pay on a land loan during the period before you begin to build. If you're planning to build your own home, it pays to plan the timing of purchase and construction carefully to maximize your tax benefits.

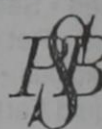

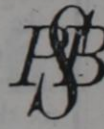
