## West Texas Trauma Snake Bite Interrupts Pig Feeding For Gailey Family



A trip to the barn to feed 13 new piglets resulted in an unexpected flurry of harrowing excitement for young Kailey Gailey.  
 When walking back to the house with her mom, Kathy, she ran to meet a cat who was playing in the tall grass. Also hiding in the grass was a Texas rattlesnake.  
 "We never saw it until it jumped and bit her," Kathy said. "I saw it jump up and bite. I saw it all happen."  
 The bite on Kailey's forefinger caused almost instant swelling. Her mom said the 4-year-old's hand looked to be the size of a cantaloupe. Kathy rushed her to Eastland Memorial Hospital, and the emergency staff there promptly routed Kailey to Abilene.  
 Kailey's dad, Bobby, said Kailey made it to Abilene in record time. Paige LeMasters, M.D., admitted Kailey directly to the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit at Meek Children's Hospital.  
 LeMasters said a snake bite on any person is serious, and coupled with Kailey's small size, this was a critical situation for the young girl. Having access to a pediatric intensive care unit was a great benefit for Kailey. It allowed her to stay in Abilene, and close to home, for care, rather than be transferred to another hospital in a larger city.

## Former World Aerobatics Champion To Perform At Breckenridge Air Show

Seven time United States National Aerobic Champion and former World Champion, Leo Loudenslager, will be a

featured performer at the 19th annual Breckenridge Air Show, coming up Saturday and Sunday, May 25 and 26 at the Stephens

County Airport, two miles south of Breckenridge, Texas on Highway 183. Loudenslager's performances have been

viewed by more than twenty million delighted Air Show spectators here and abroad. He has also won nine gold, six silver and three bronze medals in world competition, and is in the Aviation Hall of Fame and the Aerobatic Hall of Fame.

He will fly the new Bud Light Laser 200, a plane he has spent years building and refining for maximum performance. It features a 220-horsepower Lycoming engine, has a top speed of 230 mph, is 20 feet long, has a wingspan of 24 feet, 5 inches, and weighs 850 pounds. Nearly 50 percent of this weight is engine and propeller.

Also performing will be former U.S. Intermediate National Champion Randy Henderson enter-

taining with grassroots "Texas style" aerobatics in The Texas T-Cart, a highly modified, clipped-wing Taylorcraft BC12-D aircraft.

Military planes included in this year's show will include performances by the famed AV-8B Harrier "Jump Jet," F-14 Tomcats and F-16 Falcons as well as static displays of the huge C-130 Transport and assorted military field artillery, armored vehicles and ground support equipment.

Among the restored WWII planes that are expected to participate in this year's show include a Gruman F-3-F Biplane, one of only four remaining anywhere; also the F-8-F Bearcat, P-38 Lightning, P-51-D Mustang, B-25 Mitchell, P-40 Flying

Tiger, SB2C-5 Helldiver, BT-13, P-63 King Cobra, F-4-U Corsair, AT-6 Texas, FM-2 Wildcat, TBM Avenger, T-28 Invader, T-34 and many more. All participating warbirds are beautifully restored to their original glory. Many of the planes in the show are one or two of a few left of their type that are still flyable.

Other special features of the air show will include reenactments of famous World War II air battles, including the Pearl Harbor bombing depicted in the movie "Tora, Tora, Tora," a famous allied bombing raid known as "Thirty Seconds Over Tokyo," and famous Navy air battles. The show will also include several aerobatic acts and other special attractions.

A new addition to this year's show will be a Radio Control Air Show performed by the Lone Star Squadron AMA Show Team on Saturday. Their performances will be held at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. and will feature dozens of scale model aircraft and even a flying lawn mower and Snoopy's flying doghouse. The annual event is sponsored by the Breckenridge Chamber of Commerce. Although the actual air show will be held from 1 to 5 p.m., Sunday, May 26, the

Harriers and F-16's will be performing, and the radio control aircraft shows, fly-ins and static displays of the WWII vintage airplanes will be going on all day Saturday, May 25, and during the morning hours on Sunday. Admission on either day will be \$6.00 for adults, with children under age five admitted free of charge. For more information, contact the Breckenridge Chamber of Commerce at 817-559-2301.

## Best Times To Call Social Security Office

Each day Social Security receives between 250,000 to 300,000 calls over its toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213. With so many people calling, you may have to wait to speak to a representative unless you take the advice of Social Security manager Ken Hargis of Abilene. Hargis said the Social Security has a 24-hour automated service that a person can use for many Social Security matters. Service representatives are available from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. any business day. "For the best service, you need to recognize when you need to speak to a representative and when you can use the automated service," he said.

"If you call during business hours, the phone is less likely to be busy during the afternoon, during the later part of the week, and during the later part of the month," Hargis said. "For example, if your check is at least three days late, you would need to call early in the month; the best time to call would be in the afternoon and on Thursday or Friday. But if you want to inquire about your eligibility for benefits, you may be able to wait until later during the month when the telephone traffic is less. Callers may use the 24-hour automated service for a number of services, including: To get an application to replace a Social Security card, To request a form SSA-7004 to get a Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement, or To verify monthly benefit amounts. By using the 24-hour automated service, you don't need to wait to talk to a representative. Just call, select a message, leave your name and address - and maybe you'll be asked to leave

## The Chopping Block by Philomena Corradeno

There's nothing like a hearty stew or soup to warm the spirits as well as the body. Today I have two that might qualify as soupy stews.

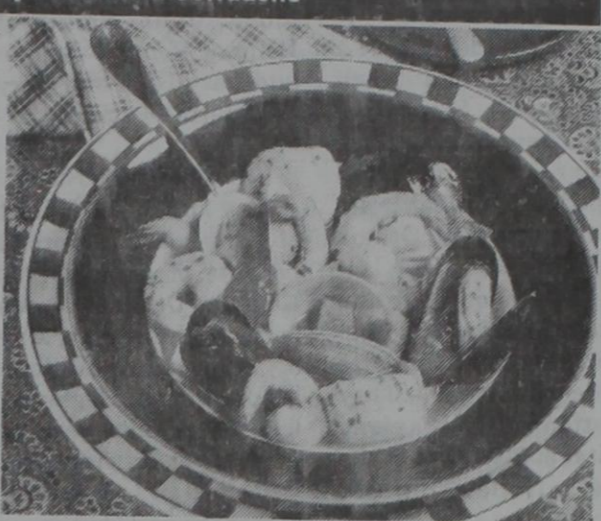
The first is a Cioppino, a wonderful fish stew similar to the French bouillabaisse or Spain's Andalusian zarzuela. The second is a spicy beef stew made with round tip or chuck (I prefer the more flavorful chuck), seasoned with oregano and cumin.

With either of these dishes you need only a bowl of steaming boiled potatoes and crusty peasant bread. You might also want to refresh the palate after the stew with a green salad.

With the cioppino, I'd serve a medium-bodied white wine such as a Gavi from the Piedmont area of Italy or a Frascati from the Lazio area. With the meat stew you can't go wrong with a medium-bodied red such as a Barbera or a light-bodied red Bardolino.

### CIOPPINO

3 tablespoons olive oil  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
1/2 cup chopped green pepper  
2 cloves garlic, finely chopped  
1 cup dry white wine  
3 large ripe tomatoes, peeled, seeded and chopped  
2 (8-ounce) bottles clam juice  
1 tablespoon Lea & Perrins Worcestershire sauce  
1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper  
1/4 teaspoon dried oregano leaves  
1/4 teaspoon dried basil  
12 mussels, well cleaned  
12 little neck clams or one 10-ounce can minced clams  
1 pound fresh white fish cut into 1-inch chunks



1/2 pound raw shrimp, peeled and deveined  
In a 6 to 8 quart saucepan over medium heat, saute the onion, green pepper and garlic in oil until soft. Add wine and bring to a boil. Add tomatoes, clam juice, Worcestershire sauce, pepper, oregano and basil. Bring to a boil; reduce heat; cover and simmer 20 minutes. Add mussels and clams; cover and simmer 5 minutes. (Remove any unopened shellfish at this time.) Add fish and shrimp. Cover and simmer an additional 3 to 5 minutes or until shrimp are pink and fish opaque. Makes 6 servings.

chopped and divided  
1/2 cup water  
1 (4-ounce) can whole green chilies  
1 tablespoon cornstarch  
1/4 cup sliced green onion tops  
Brown beef, onion and garlic in oil in Dutch oven. Pour off drippings. Combine oregano, cumin, red pepper and salt; sprinkle over beef. Add 3 cups tomatoes and water, stirring to combine; reserve remaining tomato. Cover tightly and simmer 1 hour 55 minutes or until beef is tender. Meanwhile, drain green chilies; reserve liquid. Cut chilies into 1/2-inch pieces; add to beef mixture. Combine cornstarch and reserved liquid; gradually stir into stew and cook, uncovered, until thickened. Stir in reserved tomato; garnish with green onion tops. Makes 4 servings.

1 1/4 pounds well-trimmed beef round tip roast\*, cut into 1-inch pieces  
1/2 cup coarsely chopped onion  
1 large clove garlic, minced  
1 tablespoon vegetable oil

1 teaspoon ground cumin  
1/2 teaspoon crushed red pepper pods  
1/2 teaspoon salt

Richards advises keeping them away from other cats or the virus will spread. FeLV, the retrovirus that causes feline leukemia, is spread from infected cats through saliva and urine, and through the sharing of a food dish and litter box. Symptoms include anemia, jaundice, weight loss, and eventually, the onset of leukemia.

Between three and four percent of the U.S. cat population is infected, but high-risk groups, such as multiple-cat households, have an even higher rate of infection or seven percent. ## Carbon Council Elects Mayor Pro Tem, Appoints Member

The Carbon City Council Monday, May 20 elected M. B. Gilbert Mayor Pro Tem, and Shana Davis as a Council member, Place 5.

In April, Ken Knowles was elected Mayor in an unopposed race.

Knowles presided over Monday's meeting. Besides the Mayor, those present were Sylvia Gosnell, City Secretary, and Council members M. B. Gilbert, Ancil King, Dale Walker, Truman Bryant and Shana Davis.

Also present was C. N. Adams, Water Operator, and a number of visitors from the community.

First on the agenda was the reading of last month's minutes, and this prompted a discussion.

Dale Walker voiced opposition to the \$300 per month salary of Larry Greer, who accounts for the City water.

This is a different position from that of

City Secretary. There were several comments as to why the jobs couldn't be combined. Sylvia Gosnell explained about her hours and duties.

The Council decided to accept the minutes, on a vote of 3-1.

Turning to the current reports, C. N. Adams said that Carbon now has 208 water meters, with one more going in.

"This is more than we've ever had," he stated.

He also reported on some of the difficulties experienced by the Water Department, mainly due to leaks in the lines. He has been kept busy repairing leaks, and these cost the city plenty in lost water.

Another agenda item concerned the proposed budget for the City and Water Department. Mayor Knowles stated that the budget would not be finalized until the meeting in June, but now was the time to discuss it.

The Council went over various items. The proposed budget for the next fiscal year - beginning July 1 - was:

City of Carbon: \$14,692

Water: \$94,630.

Again there was discussion on how to cut costs, mainly on water.

(Later one Councilman said that the city was losing about 35 percent of its water from leaks before it even reaches the local me-

ters.)

On a related matter, C. N. Adams said it was cheaper to buy new water meters every five years than to have the old ones tested.

On a budgetary topic, the Council approved signing an agreement with Parker and Gulley, CPA's, to conduct the annual audit.

Toward the end of the meeting Mayor Knowles opened the floor for citizens to express concerns. Most of these focused on deterioration of the town, bad streets and roads, crime, and lack of law enforcement.

Several citizens reported homes broken into and also trespassing, with "nothing done about it."

There were comments on a large party held by high school students, reportedly young people from another town. The Sheriff's Department and DPS came out on this disturbance.

Harold Files told the Council that he would work as a Night Watchman and patrol the streets.

"A deputy sheriff told me: 'We're stressed out, we don't have enough deputies to cover the county,'" he said.

"Homes and stores have been broken into. It's about time to put a

stop to it," Files declared.

One woman added that if anyone broke in on her again they would be shot.

Mayor Knowles said the services of a Night Watchman were badly needed, but there wasn't enough money in the General Fund to pay a salary. He said the City might have to resort to a Volunteer Watch Group.

Knowles said he had been doing a lot of thinking. "When we meet only once per month we never get anything done - and the residents want something done now."

"I wasn't raised here, but this is my home. I am tired of people looking down on the city of Carbon!"

"No, I don't know why the Sheriff's Department won't patrol our city more. There are a lot of things people want answers to."

"So I propose we have meetings twice per month."

After some discussion, the council approved a motion by Ancil King to set up the twice a month meetings. One councilman, Dale Walker, opposed the motion, saying there were better ways to reach the same objective.

The Mayor stated that the June council meeting would be held at the regular time, and details of the bi-monthly meetings would be worked out before they were phased in.

Today Kailey is doing fine, her mother says.

Her nickname is "Poah" and she remembers the hot August 30th summer day she and her mother were feeding their 13 little pigs. Their 'Miss Piggy' had given birth to seven

and a friend had given them six others, but Miss Piggy wouldn't feed any of them. So the family was feeding them four times a day.

All was going well but they hadn't counted on the rattler in the grass.

Through the ordeal they did count on the local hospital and the Hendrick Pediatric Intensive Care Unit.
