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New Shorts Length Policy At RHS

So that students may be aware of the new policy before they purchase next year's school clothes, the Ranger ISD school board has made a decision early. Shorts must have at least a 6 inch inseam length to be acceptable in grades 7-12 starting this fall.

This standard length policy was sug-

gested by the student council so that students will be able to measure their own shorts before the shorts are worn to school. The consequence for breaking the rule remains the same-one violation means the students may not wear shorts for the remainder of the school year.

The summer administration of the exit level Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) and the Teams test will be conducted on July 16, 17, and 18 in the Ranger ISD school board room. Students who were in the 10th, 11th, and 12th grade at Ranger High School will be eligible to take any section of the exit test that they have not yet mastered. In addition, individuals who are

out of school may test at the summer administration.

Out of school examinees must preregister by completing a packet which must arrive in Iowa no later than June

14. Current RHS students do not have to preregister.

The 40th Colony Reunion will be held June 16th and 17th, Father's Day weekend at the Ranger High School Cafeteria.

Anticipation of the annual gathering of old chums, former classmates, neighbors, and friends are high. Visitors from various Texas cities are expected along with some from New Mexico, Oklahoma, Missouri, Arkansas, Louisiana, and California.

The Saturday evening registration will begin about 6:30 p.m. Name tags will be available then. Former residents come armed with cameras, pictures, and news.

Refreshments of Coffee, tea, and punch will be served with an array of cookies, cakes, pies, and pop corn.

Sunday morning registration will begin about 9:30. A basket lunch will be spread at

noon. Following lunch President Leroy Smith of Midland will preside over a business meeting at which time election of officers will be held, a financial statement be given, a memorial list of the past years obituaries read, and Pete Hathcock will report on the Colony Cemetery fund.

Some of Colony School's first students say the building, a one teacher structure served it's last year of 1921-1922. At that time

students watched the laying of bricks for the Old Breckenridge highway, often looking out the windows, then playing on the tin pipes that were used under the highway. An old oil well was located in a corner of the school grounds, and an old bull wheel had its place.

In 1922, a new two room school building was built on the Maynard place some of the teachers were Maude Latham, Maude Pritchard, and Wilma

Simer. Consolidation of Ackedy, Oakley, and Conner Schools into the Colony Schools called for a new nine teacher building on the Davis place. Fully accredited, the school now had a choral group, basketball, and baseball Teams that won many championships over the years, awards in UIL contests were numerous.

Mrs. Dean Poyner operated the school cafeteria, specialized in home mad soup and oatmeal cookies. Several high school girls assisted her at noon time. She also taught piano lessons and expression lessons there as well as in the Pleasant Grove and

Morton Valley areas. Colony school consolidation with Morton Valley during the mid 40's and Colony buildings were torn down.

In 1957, Mae (Bowen) Isabelle saw reason to start an annual Colony Reunion on Father's Day weekend uniting old friends who had moved away. Mae

served as Secretary and the back bone of this event, working diligently all through the years on the project. She still assists in the success of the yearly event.

Six Spring Graduates At Tarleton Are First To Receive Dietetics Degree

An Eastland and Gordon student are among six members of the spring 1996 graduating class at Tarleton State University who have the distinction of being the first to re-

ceive one of the University's newest degrees, the Bachelor of Science in Dietetics.

The degree program was approved for the University's Department of Human Sciences in 1995 by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board. However, several students already enrolled at Tarleton got a jump on the new program by working toward that degree with hopes of it being instated.

The six graduates, Diane Fair of Columbus, Cindy Floyd of Strawn, Berette Hart of Eastland, Cindy Hipp and Bonnie Matthews, both of Granbury, and Kay Knight of Gordon, distinguished themselves not only as the first Dietetics graduates but for exceptional marks after graduation. Five out of the six graduates were placed in post-graduate internships, bettering the national placement average of 80 percent.

Tarleton faculty member Janet Miles-Maestas explains that the road to becoming a Registered Dietitian only begins with the Baccalaureate degree. After graduation, the students must complete an internship that could last anywhere from nine months to two years. They then must successfully complete the American Dietetics Association Registered Dietetic exam before receiving their long sought certification.

Because of the nature of

the program, internships with quality institutions are highly competitive. Although students may apply for as many internships as they want, the acceptance rate nationally is only about 80 percent.

"We were thrilled to learn that five of our students were accepted and four of them were actually placed," said Miles-Maestas. "That really reflects well on how well prepared our students are when they graduate."

Perhaps the most prestigious internship snatched up by one of Tarleton's newest alumna is located at Presbyterian Hospital in Dallas. They receive hundreds of applications annually for only a minimal number of vacancies.

Two more students will be working on programs at Texas Womens University and Texas Tech which allow them to participate in internships while working on their Masters degrees. A third was accepted for an internship at Stephen F. Austin University.

"These students know going into the Dietetics program that there is a long road ahead of them before they can receive their certification," said Miles-Maestas. "They receive a well-balanced training in the profession including clinical applications, administration and the nutritional aspects. The internships will put them in real life situations and allow them to learn while doing."

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

2. CREATING A GROSS RECEIPTS TAX
To a lot of folks, a gross receipt tax on the total revenues of all businesses sounds attractive on the surface. At just a two percent rate, the gross receipts tax would raise a whopping \$18 billion a year -- enough to fund the entire public school system.

But delve a little deeper, and the gross receipts tax runs into trouble.

First, the tax is borne solely by business. While the reality is that all taxes are ultimately paid by the consumer, this drastic shift in tax burden from individuals to business seems highly unfair.

Second, taxing gross receipts will be a boon for some industries and a huge hit for others. Wholesalers and retailers, which have high sales volumes but low profit margins, would suffer the most under a gross receipts tax. A 1.27 percent gross receipts tax would increase the tax load on wholesalers and retailers by more than roughly 500 percent. Agriculture, utilities and homeowners, all of whom have large property tax bills, would come out ahead.

The working group considered exempting

smaller businesses from the gross receipts tax to make it more palatable to mom-and-pop businesses. A standard \$500,000 deduction would eliminate more than 90 percent of businesses from the tax and still raise huge sums of tax revenues. Rest assured, however, that the remaining 10 percent of the businesses that will have to carry the load won't go down without a fight. Nevertheless, this seems to be the early favorite out of the options developed so far.

3. IMPOSING A VALUE-ADDED TAX
The value-added tax, or VAT, is the most intriguing option presented, partly because it's a mystery to most Texans. The VAT is, in effect, a sales tax on business transactions. An assessment is made every time a product's value increases.

For example, a printer would pay a VAT assessment on the difference between his wholesale paper supplier's cost of purchasing the paper and the sale price to the printer. The printer in turn would charge his customer an assessment on the difference between his cost to purchase the goods and the price of the final product sold to the customer. The customer may use the printer's final product to make yet another profitable transaction, and the difference between the customer's cost of the printed materials and his profit on the final transaction would be subject to the VAT.

Once again, the VAT would produce a whole new set of winners and losers. Construction would be the hardest hit industry, facing a 458 percent tax burden increase with a three percent VAT. The politically potent service sector -- lawyers, accountants, software designers, etc. -- would face a multi-billion dollar tax increase. Wholesalers, retailers and financial services also would be hard hit.

Homeowners, agriculture and utilities would again be the big winner under a VAT because of the property tax relief they would enjoy. Besides the shift in tax burden, the biggest problem with a VAT -- which is widely used in Europe -- may well be Texans' unfamiliarity with the concept. To enact such a tax would take a massive educational campaign, and no one has volunteered to take the lead in that effort.

The political obstacles to enacting any kind of meaningful property tax relief coupled with tax reform probably outweigh an economic argument.

Consider these points:
• Texas historically has only raised taxes to address a fiscal crisis. In other words, the Legislature only passes tax bills to address budget shortfalls, not to promote equity or reform.
• The losers will scream louder than the winners. Those who face reduced tax loads

"The thing is that with two characters like Bilko and Colonel Hall, that kind of real-life relationship helps so much."

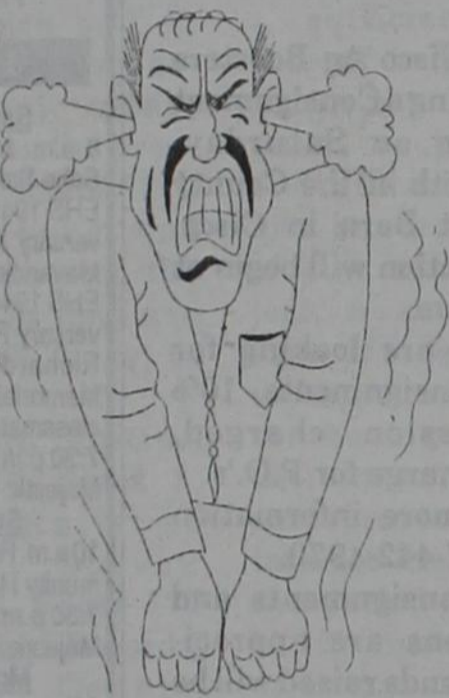
The filming of "Sgt. Bilko" took place in the Los Angeles area, with four days in Las Vegas at the Mirage Hotel.

• Tax bills must originate in the House, and no sitting House member has ever carried a tax bill. The late Rep. James Hury, then chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, tried to pass a tax bill -- in response to the budget crisis -- in 1991. After an allnight floor session, his colleagues loaded the bill with so many exemptions and other goodies that lobbyists joked that it was the first tax bill that actually cost the Treasury money.

• The status quo is safer than change with unknown consequences. It's one thing to say you're for tax reform; it's another to establish a voting record on the issue that may come back to haunt you. The legislative system is designed to block major changes, and that is likely what will happen next session.

Governor Bush should be commended for his politically risky undertaking. His head and his heart are in the right place. And who knows, with his record of legislative success, maybe he can pull the tax reform rabbit out of his hat.

Melanoma reaching epidemic proportions

Modern is not always better. Take for instance the most deadly form of skin cancer, malignant melanoma. In 1930, the lifetime risk of developing an invasive melanoma was 1 in 1,500. But by 1980, the chances had leaped to 1 in 250. And if the current rate of increase continues, by the year 2000 the lifetime risk will be 1 in 75. Today, Americans have a 1 in 87 risk for developing melanoma.

Those odds were calculated by three New York members of the American Academy of Dermatology, Drs. Darell S. Rigel, Robert J. Friedman and Alfred W. Kopf, members of the New York University Melanoma Cooperative group. Their findings were published in a dermatologic clinical journal.

They also reported that the rate of developing melanoma is increasing faster than any other cancer. Melanoma is now the most frequent cancer in women ages 25 to 29 and the second most frequent cancer, after breast cancer, in women between 30 and 34.

The melanoma epidemic is worldwide. Despite vigorous public education efforts, Australia, Austria, Canada, Germany, Italy and Scotland have experienced increases. No country has been identified with a decreasing rate.

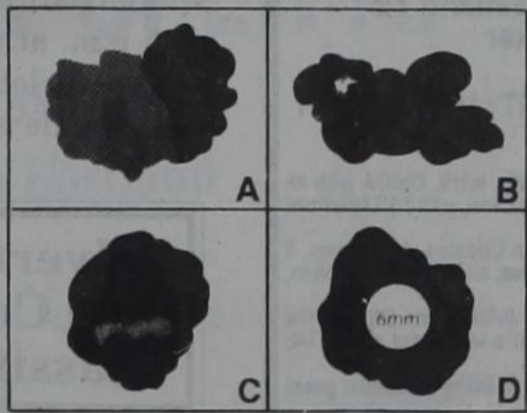
With so many countries affected, global factors are being considered. Depletion of the stratospheric ozone layer that allows more intense ultraviolet light to reach the earth's surface may, in part, be responsible for the increases. Lifestyle changes that lead to more "fun in the sun" also may play a role.

Even the numbers reported by the dermatologists may not tell the whole story. Dr. Rigel says the disease may be underreported because "Melanoma is the only major cancer that patients may not at some point in their treatment be seen at a hospital." Therefore, many cases may not find their way into tumor registries.

More melanoma also is costly. According to the three dermatologists, in 1990, an estimated \$1.1 billion was spent for melanoma treatment in the U.S. Medicare program alone. With melanoma rates doubling every 12 years, the paper calculates the annual cost of treating melanoma could exceed \$5 billion by 2010.

The picture could be brightened by several steps suggested in the paper:
• Improve melanoma diagnosing skills by non-dermatologists who most frequently first see suspected melanomas.

- Emphasize sun protection and avoidance to the general public. The belief that tan is "chic" or beautiful must be replaced.
- Develop and better integrate diagnostic techniques.
- Expand and evaluate melanoma screening programs.
- Establish a National Melanoma Registry.

These steps could have a cumulative effect. "As the effects of all these programs are felt," Dr. Rigel says, "we look forward to the day when the current near epidemic increase in the numbers of melanomas are merely a historical footnote."

The reason about 4

million Germans came to America in the 1840-1880's was great depression and unemployment; political unrest and failure of liberal revolutionary movement. The Danes, Norwegians, and Swedes numbering about 1 1/2 million came in 1870's-1900's because of poverty and shortage of farm land.

About 1 million Poles came to America in 1880's-1920's because of poverty, political repression, and cholera epidemics.

In 1880's-1920's about 2 1/2 million Jews from Eastern Europe came to

America because of religious persecution. In that same time frame about 4 million Austrians, Czechs, Hungarians, and Slovaks came because of poverty and overpopulation.

The same reason brought about 4 1/2 million Italians to America in 1880's-1920's. 1910-1920 about 700,000 Mexicans came to America because of the Mexican Revolution, low wages and unemployment.

Then in 1950's-1980's another 1 1/2 million Mexicans came seeking better living conditions.

About 600,000 Cubans came to America in 1960's-1980's because of Fidel Castro's take over in 1959. 1970's-1980's the Cambodians, Laotians, and Vietnamese came in numbers of about 165,000 because of the Vietnam War and the Communist takeover.

America has been considered a land of opportunity for all for a long time and it should be our prayers and dreams that she can forever be known as

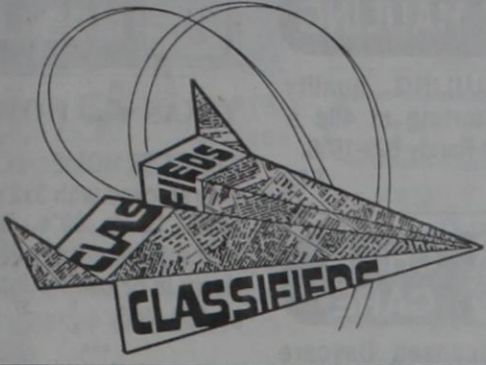

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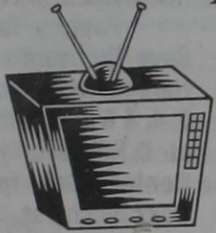

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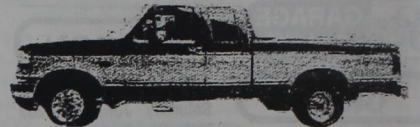

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INSTALLMENT SALES: ONE WAY TO DEFER TAXES

It's not often that the IRS says, "Don't pay us now. Wait until you have the cash." But that's not the idea behind the installment sale method, which is required for certain property sales when at least one payment is received in a year after the sale.

Installment sales occur when the seller agrees to finance the buyer's purchase, instead of requiring the buyer to obtain a loan. The buyer then makes periodic payments to the seller, with interest, until the purchase price is paid.

Under the installment sale method, the seller reports capital gain as payments are received, instead of reporting the entire gain in the year of sale. The tax on the gain is due only as payments are received from the buyer.

Installment sales offer advantages to both the buyer and seller. The buyer can avoid the extra costs of bank loan, and the seller can enjoy a stream of interest income while deferring taxes on the gain. However, if the seller needs the cash all at once, an installment sale doesn't make sense.

The installment method isn't available for all sales. For example, it can't be used on sales that result in a loss, sales of inventory, sales by dealers, or sales of publicly traded securities. And the installment sale method does not apply to gain triggered by recapture of depreciation, which is taxes as ordinary income.

Sometimes, you may not want to use the installment method, in which case you must elect not to use it. For example, if you have offsetting capital losses, you might want to report your entire gain in the same year. The same is true if the property you sold was a passive activity with suspended passive activity losses.

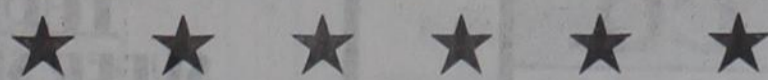

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Medicare Provides Help For The Terminally Ill

Caring for the terminally ill patient can be a difficult and stressful task. The stress can be eased, somewhat, if the patient has hospice coverage under Medicare. The special service, available only once in a lifetime, provides the highest degree of comfort care and convenience to the patient and his/her family.

The hospice benefit provides coverage for a variety of services not usually covered under Medicare. There are no deductibles and Medicare pays for services provided every day by a hospice. This benefit also permits a hospice to provide appropriate personal care, including homemaker services and counseling. In other words, it's the special type of care that a terminally ill person needs.

A hospice may be a public agency or a private organization that provides care for terminally ill patients. It is not a hospital. The terminally ill patient can be cared for in their home or as an inpatient at the hospice. The hospice also provides respite care for the patient, so the home caregiver, usually a spouse or relative, can have a few days off. Respite care is limited to no

more than five days in a row. There is no limit to the number of times respite care can be used during an illness.

A terminally ill patient can qualify for the hospice benefit and Medicare Part A will pay for hospice care if all three of the following conditions are met.

1. A doctor certifies that the patient is terminally ill.
2. The patient chooses to receive care from a hospice instead of a hospital.
3. Care is provided by a Medicare-participating hospice program.

In addition to doctor and nursing services, the hospice provides other Medicare covered services including medications, home health aide and homemaker visits, medical social services, medical equipment, short-term inpatient care (including respite care), and counseling for the patient and the caregivers.

The hospice benefit covers a seven-month period. This time can be continuous or, if the patient chooses, may be used in two 90-day periods, and then a 30-day period. If necessary, this time can be extended. The patient may stop the hospice benefit

period, return to regular Medicare coverage, and then start the hospice benefit again, if another benefit period is available.

The patient pays \$5 toward each prescription, and 5 percent of the Medicare-allowed rate for respite care, approximately \$5. If a patient needs treatment for a condition not related to the terminal illness, Medicare continues to help pay for all

necessary covered services under the standard Medicare benefit program.

If you are caring for a terminally ill person and have any questions about Medicare and the hospice benefit, visit or write your local Social Security office. You may also call our toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213. Our busiest times are early in the week and early in the month. If possible, it is best to call at other times.

Tips FOR PARENTS HELPING CHILDREN LEARN THROUGH THE ARTS

Plant the Seeds of Creativity This Summer With Outdoor Arts Activities

To plant the seeds of creativity, retreat to the outdoors this summer where your children can explore a world of hands-on learning.

Teachers and experts agree that by drawing on arts-related outdoor activities, parents can channel children's natural interest in this area into further study and discovery.

"Children's natural curiosity about the outdoors makes a backyard or park the perfect summer classroom," said John D. Kemp, president and CEO of Very Special Arts, an organization that creates educational opportunities through the arts for people with disabilities, especially children and youth. "And when kids are out of school, parents can keep them involved in learning throughout the summer with educational arts activities that explore nature."

Very Special Arts recommends the following activities designed for young children, including those with disabilities:

"Leaf" your mark! Creating leaf print stationery: Gather interesting-shaped leaves from your backyard or a nearby park. Arrange the leaves with the veins up, under a sheet of white or colored paper. Using the sides of unwrapped crayons, assist your child in rubbing the crayon over the paper with leaves underneath to create imprints. Repeat the process by rearranging the leaves and mixing crayon

colors to create a design of patterns. This process encourages spatial associations needed to learn math concepts. You and your child can use the stationery when sending notes to friends and family.

Make an impression! Painting with watercolors: Find a spot in a yard, garden or other green space with plants and flowers around to inspire your child's artwork. Dampen a sheet of heavy paper with water using a sponge or broad paintbrush. Now the paper is prepared for dabbing paint onto its surface using a small, wet paintbrush with a pointed tip. Using a tray of watercolors, have your child stroke the brush back and forth across one color at a time. Touch the tip of the brush onto the paper and watch as the color explodes to create an "impression" of the colors and shapes of the garden. Have your child use words or phrases to describe the painting. Later, at home or at the library, read with your child about this style of art called Impressionism.

Grow up! Learning how a garden grows: Learning about the outdoors can be more fun if children role play through creative movement and drama. To help children understand how plants grow, as well as develop critical thinking skills, have them imitate nature-related movements. To imitate a seed, have your child roll up and pretend to be under the ground. Explain that as the seed receives sun and rain, it begins to grow, and have your child slowly extend one arm, then the other until fully standing. To imitate the sun, children can round their arms over their head. For rain, join your child in making fluttering finger movements that mimic rain. Encourage other creative movements as well.

Very Special Arts, which sponsors programs in 50 states and 85 countries worldwide, has produced an educational program called "Start with the Arts" for children, with and without disabilities, ages 4 to 6. 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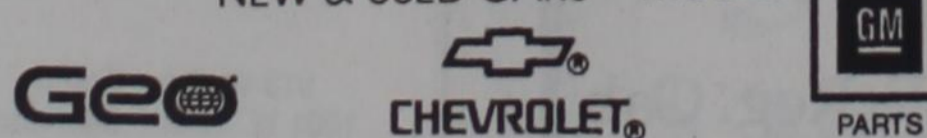

Older Americans Month Theme, Aging: A Lifetime Opportunity

This year's Older American's Month theme, "Aging: A Lifetime Opportunity" highlights the expanded horizons growing old may bring. With better health and increasing longevity, many people can look forward to second or even third careers, and a chance to fulfill cherished ambitions. A recent USA Today Gallup poll indicated that 70 percent of baby boomers expect to work after they "retire."

In 1940, an American could expect to spend seven percent of his or her adult life in retirement. Today that figure is 26 percent, and a long retirement has become commonplace. The highest-growing segment of the population are people 85 and above.

Social Security changes over the years generally recognize the increased vitality and longevity of older Americans. For example, the retirement test, the earnings limit designed as a measure of whether a person is actually retired from the workforce, has increased over the years. This means people may earn more while still receiving Social Security benefits. Just recently, the lim-

its were increased to \$12,500 a year for 1996 for people 65 and over. Earnings over the limit reduce benefits \$1 for every \$3 in excess earnings. The limits remain at \$8,280 for beneficiaries age 62 but not yet 65; benefits are decreased \$1 for every \$2 in excess earnings.

The increased earnings recognize the need for

greater income that many working beneficiaries face, and the likelihood that people are to work past age 65.

Another feature that affects older workers is the delayed retirement credit. Benefits are increased each month after age 65 the person delays retirement, up to age 70. In 1996, benefits increase 5 percent a year; the figure increases gradually until it reaches 8 percent in 2007.

This means that older people who want to continue working can do so with the knowledge that

they are increasing the benefits they can count on as much as 25 percent for those who retire today, and as much as 35 percent for people who retire in 2008.

You should note also that the age at which a person retires with a full benefit is scheduled to gradually increase from 65 to 67 by 2022. This change recognizes that people will be working longer and will be drawing Social Security longer. The age for early retirement will remain at 62 for those who prefer it.

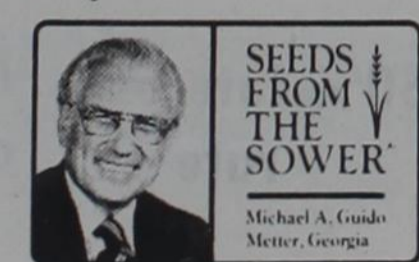

Texas Trauma Forum Adopts New Symbol For Alcohol-Related Trauma

After a spring break in South Padre Island, the Kocsis family was returning at night to their Fort Worth home. In Austin, Guadalupe Alonzo Jr., 19, allegedly had spent the evening drinking at a local bar. Just after 5 a.m. on I-35 north of Austin, their cars and lives collided when Alonzo drove south in the northbound lane of I-35. Alonzo was pronounced dead at the scene. Also killed were Diane Stanco Kocsis, 47, Antal Kocsis, 10, and Erica Kocsis, 25. Two other members of the Kocsis family were injured. Tests showed that Alonzo's blood alcohol level was 0.11, above the legal intoxication level of 0.10.

Trauma is the fourth leading cause of death in Texas and the leading cause of death for Texas children. To increase the public's awareness of traumatic injuries, May has been declared Trauma Awareness Month. And since alcohol often is cited as a factor in motor vehicle crashes, the Texas Trauma Coordinators Forum (TTCF) has begun a Black Ribbon Campaign to help educate Texans about the dangers of driving while intoxicated (DWI).

"More than 50 percent of people treated for trauma in emergency rooms have alcohol involved in their injuries, whether the injury resulted from a car wreck, a gunshot wound or a fight," said Cindy Crocker, injury prevention coordinator and trauma nurse for Parkland Hospital in Dallas. She also is chair of TTCF. "We chose the

black ribbon because ribbons are familiar symbols to Texans and the color is to remind people of the fatalities that DWIs already have caused." The ribbons are similar in shape to the red ribbons worn for AIDS awareness and the pink ribbons for breast cancer awareness.

In 1994, more than 37 percent of auto crash deaths in Texas involved alcohol. That averages to one person dying in an alcohol-related crash every seven hours. More than 34,000 Texans — or about one person every 16 minutes — received injuries in alcohol-related crashes in 1994.

Dr. David Smith, Texas Commissioner of Health, said, "Motor vehicle crashes are a leading cause of death in Texas.

Alcohol contributes to about one-third of these crashes. While the number of people killed in motor vehicle crashes has lessened in recent years because of seat belt and helmet laws, educational programs and creation of a statewide trauma system, the number of alcohol-related crashes has remained fairly constant. Trauma facilities, which treat alcohol-related injuries daily, know first hand the need to decrease the total number of people injured or killed because of alcohol."

Texas has created a statewide trauma system of 22 Trauma Service Areas (TSAs) that organizes emergency medical services and hospitals to save time in appropriately treating injured patients. The system classifies each hospital according to one of four care levels. A Level IV trauma facility offers first care to severely injured patients before transfer, while a Level I

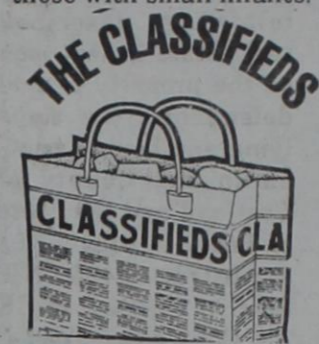

trauma facility offers highest levels of subspecialty care and medical research. Level II and III hospitals provide care at levels between that of Level I and Level IV hospitals. The trauma system also collects facts on how people are injured and develops injury prevention programs. Overseeing each TSA is a Regional Advisory Council (RAC), which maintains communication between the emergency services and the hospitals. The Texas Trauma Coordinators Forum also works to decrease the number of injuries and deaths from alcohol-related incidents.

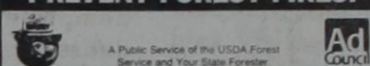

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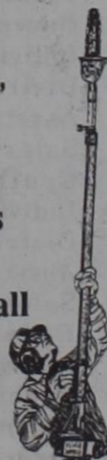

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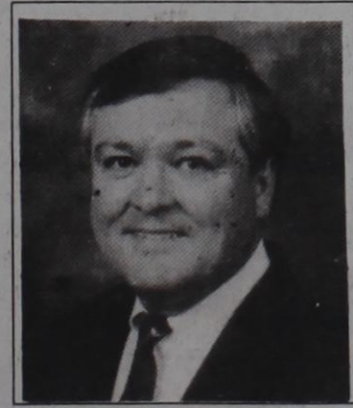
