

Land Office Set July 16 Sealed Bid Sale On Tracts

The Texas General Land Office (GLO) has scheduled a special bid sale of 100 tracts of surplus state land and tax foreclosure land for July 16.

Located in 34 Texas counties, the tracts range in size from a 1.18 acre tract in Leon County to a 1,239.5 acre tract in Presidio County.

There are two types of property included in this sale. The first is surplus Permanent School Fund (PSF) land. All revenue

generated from these tracts goes to support public education in Texas.

The second is tax foreclosure land. These tracts were deeded to the state by counties that could not dispose of them through public auction. The General Land Office was given the authority to sell these tracts by state law.

The land office is authorized to dispose of surplus tracts that are not generating much income for the state with the proceeds used to buy prop-

erty that maximizes leasing incomes for the PSF.

Some of the tracts in Far West Texas are being sold subject to executing a conservation easement with the Texas Historical Commission to protect sites that have archeological or historical significance.

Minimum bids have been set for each tract. There is no limit on the amount that may be bid above the minimum. Bids must be received no later than 10 a.m., July 16, 1996, the time of the bid opening. Bid opening will be held in Room 831, Stephen F. Austin Bldg., 1700 N. Congress, Austin. For more information on

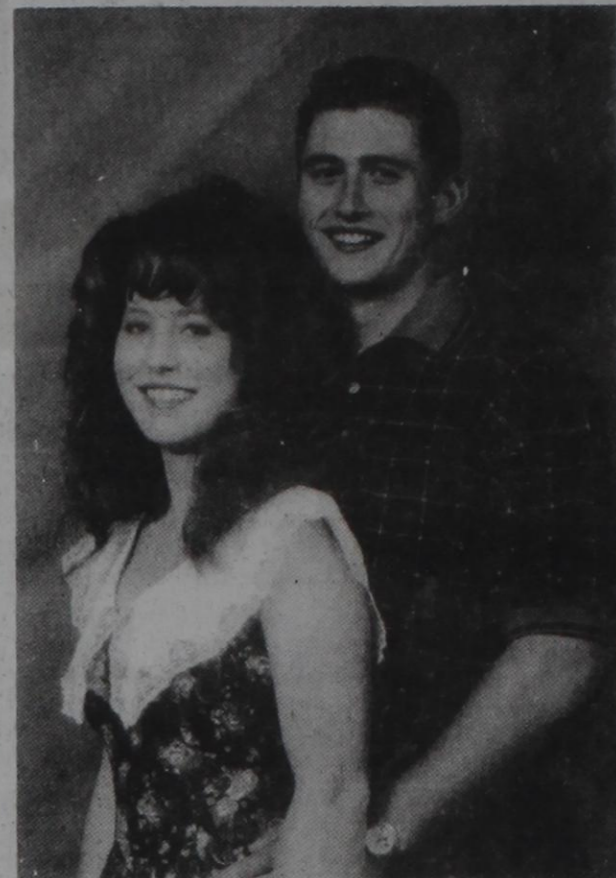
Kisha Casey

Legionnaires fight to protect 'Old Glory'

I want you to use your imagination for a moment. Picture yourself walking a mile in somebody else's boots.

You are in the heat of a ground battle. Death and destruction are all you can see through the haze of dust and exploding hunks of earth. Exploding rockets and towering flames radiate overtures of death. Artillery blasts pound your eardrums and rattle your rib cage. The smell and taste of gun powder overwhelm the senses.

If this continues, you know you will meet your maker.

Your adrenaline is flowing fast. Your heartbeat pounds like an airmann.

But you and your comrades are not throwing in the towel. For you are fighting for freedom. You hang tough through the night. When the sun comes up, you and your buddies look for a sign of hope.

When you look into the sky, you see the unifying symbol of everything for which you fight. The American flag. "Old Glory," is wafting gently in the breeze. The flag is a bit tattered — and so are you.

The flag's presence shows America is not defeated. The dreams of a proud and resilient people are still alive.

This was the scenario in which American troops found themselves in 1814. They were fighting the British at Baltimore Harbor because they believed in a sovereign United States.

The American flag is a symbol of freedom. The American flag is a symbol of liberty's triumph over tyranny. We pause on Flag Day, June 14, to

reflect on the significance of "Old Glory."

If you served the United States in World War I, World War II, the Korean War, the Vietnam War or the Persian Gulf War, you looked up at "Old Glory." If you served in El Salvador, Panama, Lebanon, Grenada, Somalia or Bosnia, then you noticed the American flag went with you. If any of your loved ones served in the armed forces, then you understand that the flag represents the cause to which service members take an oath.

"Old Glory" holds the same significance today as it held for American troops in the nation's struggle for independence. The American flag is the legitimate symbol of "one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all." It's worthy of a special place in our society.

Many of us 3 million wartime veterans who comprise The American Legion are a little tattered — by time. But we're still standing, just like "Old Glory" was on that eventful morning in Baltimore that inspired Francis Scott Key to pen "The Star Spangled Banner." As long as we're alive, we're going to fight to protect the flag

from fools who want to burn it to make a point.

Intentional physical desecration of the flag is not free speech. It's an outrage. It's an ugly act of disrespect for the patriots who took an oath to defend the Constitution of the United States.

The people who say flag desecration is free speech remind me of the British forces in 1814. They underestimate the resolve of the people who are fighting to preserve the flag. They underestimate the will of 80 percent of Americans, according to national polling data, who favor a flag-protection amendment.

There is still some fight left in the 3 million men and women who call themselves Legionnaires. We will win the battle to protect "Old Glory." Our persuasive power will be our weapon. The dust will settle on Capitol Hill after the battle. We'll ease our tired bodies into our favorite chairs. We'll read the newspaper, looking for a sign that our cause survived the battle.

We will read about passage of the 28th Amendment to the Constitution. It will simply say, "Congress shall have the power to prohibit the physical desecration of the flag of the United States."

Providing a constitutional sanctuary for "Old Glory" will be the legacy of a proud and resilient people: Legionnaires, veterans and, above all, Americans.

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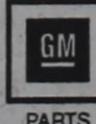

County Commissioners Address Courthouse Parking; Other Matters

A solution seems to be in sight for the parking problems around the Courthouse.

At the County Commissioners meeting Monday Judge Scott Bailey presented a letter addressing the matter to Russ Thomason, local Attorney and member of a Citizens Committee.

The letter requests that the City of Eastland assume parking regulations around the Courthouse. Thomason said this will be considered at the next meeting of the Eastland City Commissioners on June 17.

In the letter Judge Bailey outlined various stipulations by the Commissioners Court. One is that the east side, on the 100 block of South Seaman, be reserved for the disabled, government vehicles, and emergency parking.

The City will have the decision on whether to grant one hour or two hours parking around the Courthouse.

The City and County will share cost of the signs. Jurors must display a jury card as a parking permit.

Enforcement will be by City traffic officers.

Thomason thanked the Commissioners and Judge Bailey for working on the long-standing problem.

"Hopefully it will work," the Judge said.

Precinct 4 Commissioner Reggie Pittman wasn't so sure of a quick solution to the problem of overcrowding at the County Jail.

His current report showed 28 in the facility. Fifteen of these prisoners were awaiting trial. This was even one more than the last report, which had received plenty of attention from visiting personnel from the Texas Jail Standards Commission.

Pittman showed a letter from the Executive Director of the Commission.

It said that staffing recommendations at the Jail had apparently been followed promptly, and the facility was now in

compliance on that matter.

But the Director, Jack E. Crump, asked for more information on the overpopulation at the Jail.

Sheriff Bob Richardson had sent him the material requested, Pittman said.

Pittman asked the Commissioners to consider "moving some of the prisoners out, rather than having a fine or having to build a new jail."

The Commissioners discussed the possibility, but said the cost could run as high as \$60 per day for each inmate carried to another jail.

They also discussed how slow the state was in sending transfer paper work on prisoners held on "blue" warrants for other counties.

The Court system also continued to be of concern. On a brighter note, County Clerk JoAnne Johnson reported that 43 cases had been disposed of in the County Court last month.

In other business, the Commissioners denied a request from the Housing Authority, City of Rising Star, for a tax waiver.

The Project is actually tax exempt, but the Local Authority makes "Pay-

USDA Announces Price Support For '96 Peanuts

The U.S. Department of Agriculture today announced the average price support levels by type, quality and location for the 1996 peanut crop. The figures are based on national price support levels of \$610.00 per short ton for quota peanuts and \$132.00 per short ton for additional peanuts.

The quota support level by type for an average grade ton of 1996-crop peanuts will be:

\$604.78 for Virginia-type peanuts
\$614.94 for Runner-type peanuts
\$565.56 for Spanish-type peanuts
\$604.78 for Valencia-type peanuts from the Southwest area which are suitable for cleaning and roasting, and, \$565.56 for other

Valencias.

The method of computing the price support levels for 1996-crop peanuts and the grades within the types is the same as last year.

For each percent of sound mature kernels in a ton, including sound split kernels, the support level will be:

Virginia-type peanuts, \$8.797;
Runner-type peanuts, \$8.624;
Spanish-type peanuts, \$8.581;
Valencia-type peanuts in the Southwest area which are suitable for cleaning and roasting, \$9.140;
Other Valencias, \$8.581.

The loan value for additional peanuts is 21.64 percent of the applicable quota support level. The factor represents the ratio of the \$132.00 per short ton national support level for additional peanuts to the \$610.00 per short ton national support level for quota peanuts.

The deductions and discount schedules that were applicable to the 1995 crop peanuts will be used for the 1996 crop, except for transfers of the Segregation 2 and Segregation 3 additional peanuts to quota loan status, which will now be supported at 70 percent of the quota support rate, as required by new legislation.

The actual price support level for an individual lot of peanuts will depend on the percent of the various sizes of the kernels in each ton of peanuts and other factors.

AUSTIN — State inspectors pop in so infrequently at registered in-home day-care facilities that bad situations can slip through the cracks.

Inspectors are required to visit each of the 12,769 registered family homes in Texas only once every three years, according to a report by the Associated Press.

An internal audit of the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services shows infrequent monitoring of registered family homes that care for four or more unrelated children "has a questionable impact on the protection of children" and might as well be cut to save money.

Child-care advocates oppose cutting the monitoring.

Ronnie Earle, Travis County District Attorney, opposes curtailing the unannounced inspections, but said that if the monitoring is cut, there must be an alternative program. "We have to provide for the safety of our children, and that means these homes have to be monitored," he said.

Meanwhile, last week, the Texas Sunset Advisory Commission released a study recommending the Department of Protective Regulatory Services be given power to fine deficient or dangerous day-care facilities, the *Austin American-*

Statesman reported.

"I think it would put some teeth in the laws out there," said Fred Seale, deputy director of programs for the agency. "It becomes more of an issue ... if there's a penalty associated with a non-compliance finding," he told the *American Statesman*.

The agency has authority to revoke licenses or file lawsuits, but the authority to fine would expand enforcement power to deter violations of state law, the sunset commission report said.

Last year, state regulators found about 92,000 violations of child-care standards, but imposed only 122 sanctions and of those revoked only 48 permits to operate.

Sharp Recommends Drought Aid
Texas Comptroller John Sharp last week released a list of ways the state could help drought-stricken farmers across Texas.

"These hard-working folks who put food on our tables deserve the full range of available assistance to see them through these trying times," he said, and made four recommendations:

- That the U.S. Department of Agriculture extend its emergency livestock feed program, which is set to expire Aug. 31, and readmit 24 counties to the program that had been dropped.

- Expand the state agricultural water conservation loan program, which helps water districts, farmers and ranchers pay for water conservation efforts and irrigation systems.

- Redirect loans that go to farmers who diversify their crops and expand their processing.

- Put more money into the small community emergency loan program so towns can deal better with the drought.

Sharp also announced the Texas Department of Transportation will promote a program allowing ranchers to get livestock feed by cutting and baling grass from state highway

rights of way.

No Refund for Eaten Food

Attorneys for the State of Texas last week withdrew their demand for a \$3 million refund for a soybean-based meat substitute purchased — perhaps illegally — by the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

Why? Most of the granular, just-add-water foodstuff made by the Canadian firm, VitaPro, has already been eaten by Texas prison inmates and guards.

Seeking a refund also could have required switching the location of the trial from prison headquarters in Huntsville to a court in Austin. State attorneys opposed the move because their witnesses and records are in Huntsville.

The state's attorneys continue in their efforts to void a \$33.7 million contract with VitaPro, contending the contract violates Texas' competitive-bidding laws.

VitaPro attorneys argue the contract is valid because the company complied with its terms.

Children Raped Against Dump
More than 500 Mexican children gathered in Austin last week to protest a proposed low-level nuclear waste dump to be built near the small West Texas town of Sierra Blanca.

Sierra Blanca, population about 700, is 16 miles from the Mexican border and about 80 miles southeast of El Paso. The children came from Ciudad Acuna, Coahuila, a town 300 miles from Sierra Blanca that relies on the Rio Grande for its water.

The children came by buses to the state Capitol and joined about 150 Austin-area children to march by the Governor's Mansion in hopes of persuading Gov. George W. Bush to abandon his support for the dump.

Critics of the dump-building proposal say the proposed dump site is in an earthquake-prone area that has many faults in its subterranean.

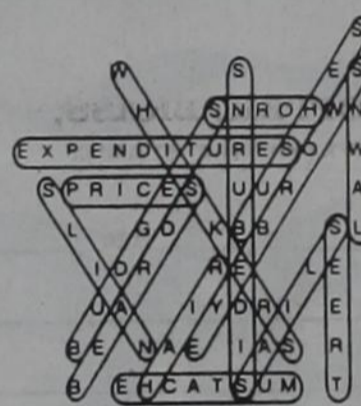

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department announced a total of \$250,000 in awards to 19 organizations, schools and local governments to fund special programs to introduce at-risk, and physically challenged youths to state parks and outdoor recreational opportunities.

Many of the grants are designed to provide ways for Texas Hispanics, African-Americans, inner-city youth, single parents and other groups

TPWD has identified as "underserved constituents" to get out and enjoy the great outdoors.

African-Americans, Hispanics and other minorities are projected to make up the majority of the Texas population by the year 2030. Yet, relatively few members of these groups currently hunt, fish or visit state parks.

The winning grants were chosen from among nearly 150 applications after review by TPWD's Community Outdoor Outreach Grant Review Committee. The awards are for the first funding cycle of the two-year pilot program.

"This program not only allows at-risk and underserved kids to enjoy such outdoor ac-

tivities as camping, boating, hiking or fishing, but also will help them learn more about conservation, the environment and wildlife habitat," said program coordinator Darlene Lewis.

A cap of \$20,000 per grant was imposed, Lewis explained, to enable the department to offer more organizations a piece of the pie. Grants ranged from \$1,300 to \$20,000.

"To many of our Texas youngsters are growing up in cities, isolated from the outdoors and the important values that visits to the wilderness can instill," said Andrew Sansom, TPWD executive director. "In my five years at Parks and Wildlife, I've never been more excited than I am about this new community outreach program which will continue to pay dividends down the road."

Examples:
City of College Station - \$12,813 to introduce 1,000 youth at risk to camping and fishing at state parks. The targeted age group is 16 and under.

City of Monahans - \$5,165 for a fishing tournament for 110 children and 210 adults. Youth ages 5-14 as well as persons with physical and mental disabilities will participate.

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Keep Your Child Safe And Happy During The Long, Hot Summer

Summertime... and who ever said the levin' was easy?

"As much as kids look forward to the start of summer, there are many parents who dread it--especially those who work full-time," commented Tara Reddy, M.D., and adolescent psychiatrist at Huguley's Willow Creek Hospital in Arlington, Texas.

"Like everyone, children need some down time--time to relax and unwind from pressure filled school days," Dr. Reddy explained. "But when kids have 'nothing to do,' they generally seek out something to fill their time--and that 'something' may not be an appropriate choice.

"Summertime can be especially difficult for parents of young adolescents," he continued.

"these children may balk what they consider 'babysitting,' yet they continue to require scheduled activities and supervision during the long days of summer.

Dr. Reddy recommended a structured schedule and explanations for children during the summer--while at the same time, cautioning against over-

scheduling children during their "off" time. Children need to be busy and active--but they also need time to contemplate and just be kids, too," he emphasized.

He offered these suggestions to help ensure summertime fun for children and parents alike:

Try to schedule one planned activity each day. Check into community organizations, churches, schools and other resources for summertime offerings. Community sports groups offer wonderful opportunities for people of all ages. Many community organizations--hospitals, libraries, religious facilities, summer camps--also offer volunteer opportunities for older children.

-If possible, plan one major exciting event each month--like a family outing. This gives everyone in the family something to look forward to.

Give your children chores and responsibilities. Make sure they fulfill their family obligations.

Check into opportunities in your neighborhood for play groups--or for older children, see if a neighbor needs a moth-

er's helper or assistance in the house or yard.

Know your children's friends and their parents.

Don't over commit! Allow for time to just relax--important for the whole family!

Dr. Reddy added these pointers for working parents:

Make sure your children know how to reach you at all times.

Check in with your children spontaneously and often.

Be sure your children know your expectations of them--including what they may and may not do, chores that need to be completed, where they may go and with whom. Set up a reward system for appropriate behavior.

Solicit the help of a stay-at-home neighbor for assistance in emergencies. Make sure your children know how he or she can be reached.

Work out a system with other parents for carpools and supervision at special events.

Get involved in community evening activities--like softball or other athletics. These provide an excellent way for entire families to meet new friends and get involved in their neighborhoods.

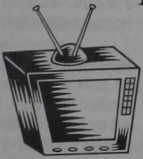

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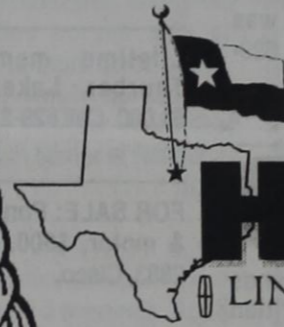

May Sales Tax Payments 1.4% More Than One Year Ago

John Sharp, State Comptroller of Public Accounts, reports a total of \$196.8 million in May sales tax rebates to 1,079 cities and 115 counties, 1.4 percent more than the statewide allocations of one year ago. "Sales in Texas continue to clock along at a good pace. City rebates were up slightly from last year's, while county payments were down. This apparent reduction really reflects large audit collections that

inflated county allocations during this same period last year," Sharp said. This month's sales tax rebates include taxes collected on March sales by businesses filing monthly returns and reported to the Comptroller in April and those businesses filing quarterly returns for January, February and March. The comptroller's next allocation is scheduled for Friday, June 14.

Drilling Up Around State, Oil Production Down

Statewide, the Texas Railroad Commission issued a total of 1,049 original drilling permits in April 1996, compared to 895 in April, 1995. The April total included 769 permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 45 to re-enter existing well bores, and 235 for re-completions.

Sofar in 1996 there have been 4,005 drilling permits issued, compared to 3,651 recorded during the same period in 1995.

Total well completions for 1996 year-to-date is 2,789, a one percent increase from the 2,752 recorded during the same period in 1995.

The major part of this exploration is taking place in the Midland area (177 permits in April) and the

San Angelo area (155 permits). West Central Texas had 87 permits in April.

Production is still down, however. Callahan and Eastland County are included in this trend.

The latest monthly oil and gas statistics, for February, 1996, report the following:

Callahan County—32,678 barrels of crude oil 147,665 Mcf (1,000 cubic ft.) of gas.

Eastland County—37,550 barrels of crude oil 537,087 Mcf of gas.



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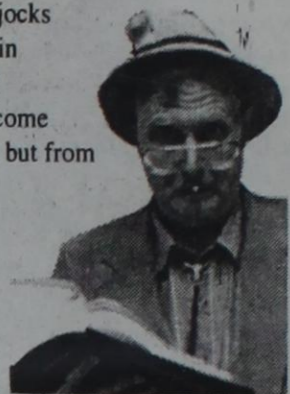
