At Prosecutor's Request All Charges Against White Dropped In 'Unique' 91st Case

 In a dramatic turn of events in 91st District Court Thursday prosecutors from the State Attorney General's office dropped all charges against former Sheriff Ronnie White.

In the misdemeanor case of Official Oppression, being tried this week, White was accused of removing a fence owned by Mike McPhail on County Rd. 483 (Alameda Cemetery Rd.) without a proper order. He was also accused of threatening McPhail.

One other indictment was related to the fence incident, and another was not.

Many 'Firsts'
 Wednesday, beginning with Attorney Siedler of Fort Worth, a lawyer hired by McPhail.

Siedler said he "didn't think McPhail had hindered anyone" in moving his fence at the Alameda Cemetery Rd.

The Attorney also said he had telephone conversations and a meeting with Sheriff White, in which White told him he thought McPhail had blocked access.

Upon questioning by Lewellen, Siedler said he thought the Sheriff was just trying to do what he thought he had to.

Siedler had apparently advised McPhail not to meet with the Commissioners Court about the Cemetery Road, but to send a letter instead.

He said he thought there would be a "large amount of citizens involved in almost a riot...demanding that the Sheriff do things" at the September Commissioners Court meeting.

Apparently Siedler was referring to the Alameda Cemetery Association, which met with the Court in June, August and September of 1995 requesting an order that the McPhail fence be removed.

Mike McPhail was called to the stand, and he testified that the fence was old and had to be replaced. He said he never was approached about the cemetery group's concerns, and received information about it from newspapers.

McPhail stated that finally Sheriff White told him he was committing a crime and threatened to arrest him.

District Attorney Mike Siebert took the stand late Tuesday. He testified that Sheriff White had asked him what should be done about the fence.

He had replied that since McPhail had offered to remove the fence, the issue was

moot.

On Wednesday, County Judge Scott Bailey testified that he began to learn about the fence last summer. He said he signed a Commissioners Court order Sept. 11 to "seek removal of the fence." Bailey said the order did not give anyone authority to tear the fence down.

The order he signed was on exhibit in the courtroom, along with photographs of the Alameda Cemetery Rd.

Bailey said he was attending a funeral on Sept. 25 when the motion came up to have the McPhail fence removed by 5 p.m. the next day. Commissioners Pittman and Ainsworth voted to have White remove the fence, and Lyerla and L. T. Owen abstained.

Bailey said the action from that meeting was not valid because a majority did not vote, and the presiding Judge, Comm. L. T. Owen, did not sign the order.

The final witness for the state was Pct. 1 Comm. Ken Lyerla. He said he found nothing wrong with McPhail's fence, and that he was the first to talk to McPhail.

McPhail said he would remove the fence if a fence across the road was also taken down. He was referring to a fence put up by Kenneth Brown, a leader of the Alameda Cemetery Association.

The Prosecution rested its case after Lyerla's testimony. The first defense witness called up was Pct. 4 Commissioner Reggie Pittman. He stated that on Sept. 25 he made a motion to have the fence down by 5 p.m. the next day, and thought the motion passed.

He testified he made the motion to remove the fence because "Commissioners Courts have a right to remove a fence" blocking access on a county road.

During some of the testimony Judge Burdock chided spectators for showing emotions. He reminded them that they were in a Court of Law, not at a pep rally.

He also had some choice words to the jurors about not reading newspapers or watching television while the case was being tried.

He said that you could not believe everything you read in the newspapers - that sometimes journalists worked with hearsay information and the courts were only interested in truth based on evidence.

Thursday began

with testimony by Pct. 2 Comm. Calvin Ainsworth, who started by answering questions from Attorney Lewellen.

Ainsworth was questioned about the Alameda Cemetery Road, which he had been maintaining. The Commissioners gave the normal width of such a road as around 46 1/2 ft.

He said that when McPhail moved his fenced he took in from 2 to 12 ft. of this road in places.

"There's not room between the fence and a horn to make a good ditch," he said.

"The fence went uphill, and the farther it went, the farther into the right-of-way. A post was almost to the bottom of a bar ditch."

Dangerous
 But Ainsworth said it wasn't so much the road maintenance that was bothering him, but that he considered the road dangerous.

Ainsworth said he voted for the Sheriff to remove the McPhail fence. "But I thought we was doing something wrong," he added.

About this time the jury was asked to leave the room, and lawyers had some exchanges.

Ainsworth resumed testimony with the jury absent. But when the Commissioner said he pulled up one of

 Some of the testimony in the Official Oppression trial of Ronnie White this week revolved around a vote at Commissioners Court on Sept. 25, 1995.

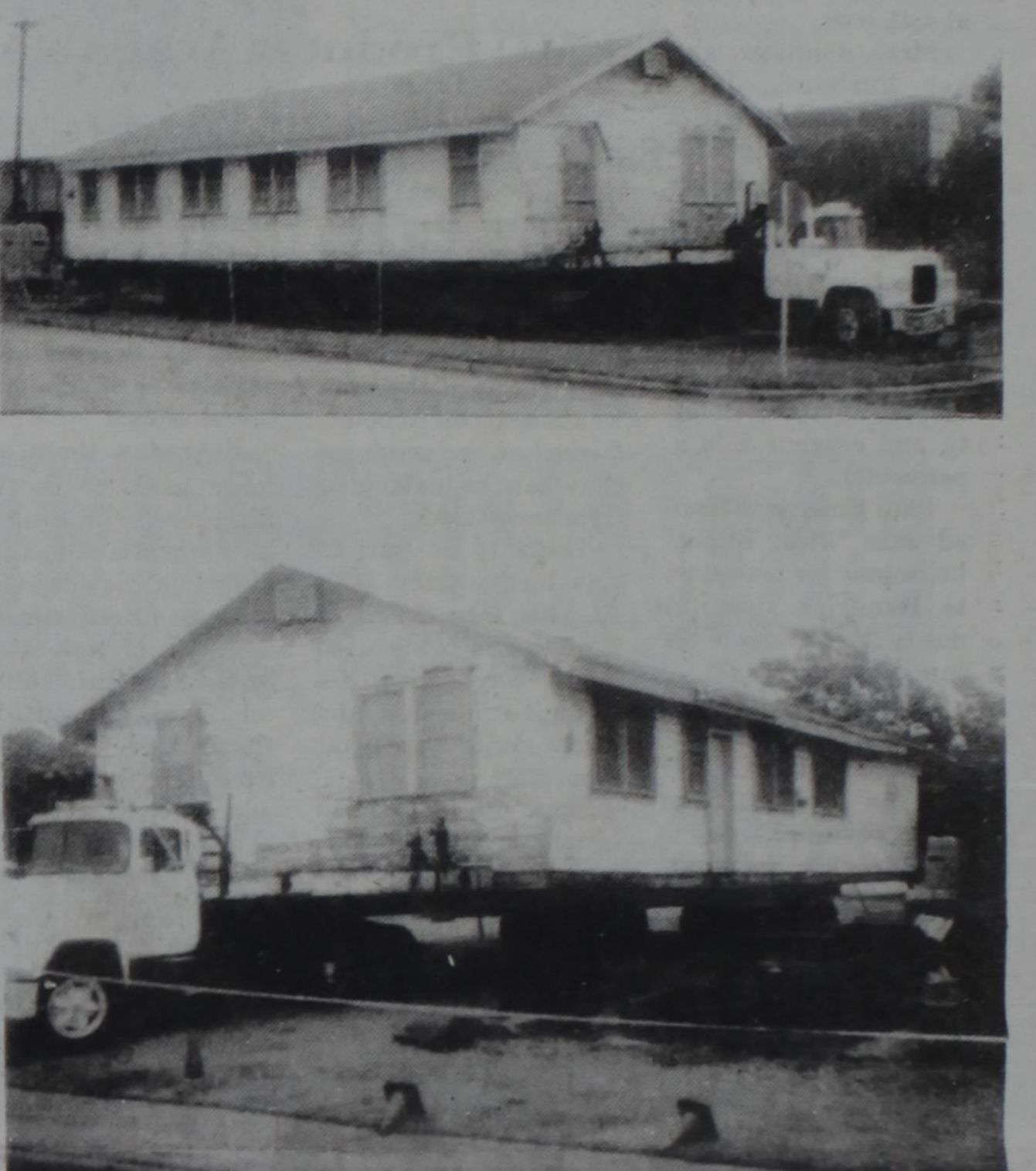

Commissioners Pittman and Ainsworth voted "aye," and Commissioners Owen and Lyerla abstained from voting. Judge Bailey was absent.

Some stated that the motion "failed." This is not according to 21st Century Robert's Rules of Order.

On abstaining, the rules say:
 "An abstention is not considered a vote and is not counted in the final tally."
 So, according to these rules, the vote was 2-0 for the motion.

First Flight Called To Vehicle Rollover

A family's trip to Abilene fell short Saturday afternoon, June 15, when their west bound 1996 Ford Crown Victoria left the roadway and rolled several times at the 323 mile marker 1-20 about 3 miles east of Putnam.

Evelyn Johnson, 74, of Lamesa, California, fell asleep and drifted off the road and overcorrected, causing the vehicle to roll and land on its top in the center median, according to DPS Trooper, Stan Waters. Callahan County dispatch was notified of the accident at 4:45 p.m.

Mrs. Johnson and her husband, Jesse Johnson, 73, got out of the vehicle along with Amanda Suba, 8, before emergency personnel arrived. Paul Suba, 12, was extricated from the upside-down vehicle by rescuers from Cisco and Baird Fire Departments, Eastland County, and citizens E.M.S. personnel.

Paul Suba was loaded onto "First Flight" helicopter for transport to Hendrick Hospital due to the severity of his injuries.

Amanda Suba was transported to Hendrick Hospital by Citizen E.M.S. and Jesse was transported to Hendrick by an Eastland ambulance.

West bound interstate traffic was diverted to the north service

road at the Scranton Road exit for about 30 minutes to allow "First Flight" to land on the pavement.

East and west bound traffic was narrowed to one lane for about an hour to allow rescuers room to work.

Evelyn and Jesse Johnson, along with Amanda Suba, were treated and released in Hendricks Emergency Room, according to hospital spokesperson.

Paul Suba was admitted and was in stable condition Monday evening.

18 Wheeler Overtakes On Interstate 20

An overturned eighteen wheeler blocked west lanes of I-20 for about 4 hours Wednesday morning, June 12, causing traffic to be rerouted to the service road until the lanes could be cleared of wreckage.

Callahan County Dispatcher Arlinda Williams received the call reporting the accident at 7:36 a.m. and alerted emergency responders to be in route to 323 1/2 mile marker. Baird Fire Dept. was first on the scene and found the truck driver, Robert Moriana, 60, of California, sitting on a guard rail.

Cisco E.M.S. transported Moriana to Eastland Memorial Hospital where he was admitted and was in stable condition at 5:00 p.m., according to a hospital spokesperson.

Callahan County Sheriff's Deputy John Windham said Moriana lost control of his west bound Freightliner after drifting into the right hand ditch and turned over on the passenger side when the driver tried to pull back upon the highway.

The PST Freight truck had a load of televisions and the trailer partially broke in half when it struck a guard

rail. Both west bound lanes were blocked until wrecker crews could drag the trailer off the guard rail and then upright the eighteen wheeler. At that time the trailer finished breaking in half, according to a fire department spokesman.

A large diesel spill was cleaned up by the Texas Department of Transportation.

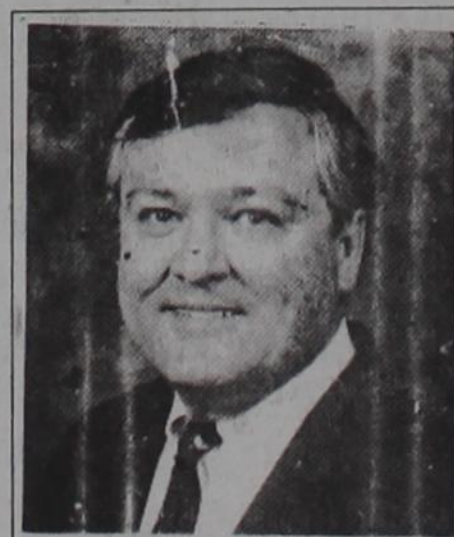

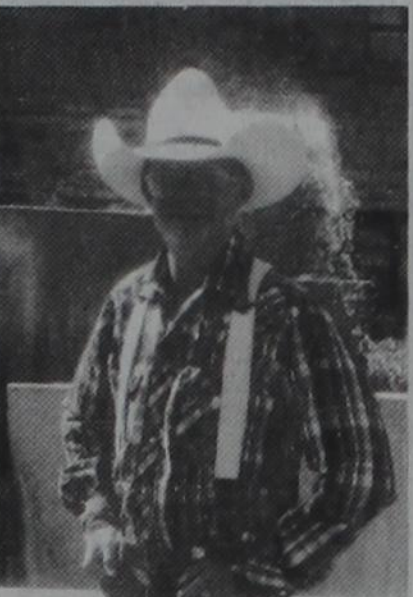

BARTERING AND TAXES

"If you mow my lawn, I will paint your house." Businesses everywhere are now trading goods and services, either directly or through bartering clubs. Members in these clubs earn "barter dollars" by providing their goods or services to club members. These barter dollars can then be used to purchase goods and services offered by other members.

Trading for goods and services allows businesses to conserve cash. Bartering also provides a way for businesses to utilize excess capacity. Unfortunately, bartering does not provide tax advantages. A business must include the value of bartered goods or services it receives when computing its taxable income. For example, if an accountant performs tax services for a dentist, who in turn cleans the accountant's teeth, both professionals must include in taxable income the value of the other's services.

If a business uses barter dollars to make a business purchase, it may deduct that purchase as a business expense. On the other hand, a business may not deduct the value of personal goods or services purchased with barter dollars, and such a purchase may result in additional income for the owner.

Bartering clubs are required to annually report bartering transactions to the IRS (as well as to the traders) using Form 1099-B. Business owners who don't barter through a club may be required to file Form 1099-MISC with the IRS.

Bartering can be a good supplement to regular business, but too much bartering can rob a company of the cash it needs to meet payroll or purchase inventory. Bartering can also trigger an unexpectedly large tax bill, and a company that barter extensively may need to adjust its quarterly estimated tax payments.

nation committee. The delegates elected Theresa Smith of Johnson County to a second term as SDEC position. Dan Bouleware, chairman of Johnson County, will represent the county chairs in the state organization of county chairs.

Friday evening brought out the state officials to address the full body of delegates, Lt. Governor Bob Bullock spoke about the mean-spirit of current trends and talk shows. In making a statement that he was a Christian and a Democrat, all at the same time, Lt. Gov. Bullock received a long applause.

Temporary Chairman Bill White introduced Congressman Dick Gephardt of Missouri as the next Speaker of the House.

Before a stage of seated dignitaries of Lt. Governor Bullock, Attorney General Dan Morales, Speaker of the House "Pete" Laney, and others, Land Commissioner

Garry Mauro welcomed the first lady to Texas. Hillary Rodham Clinton spoke on the advantages of being a Democrat. Hillary re-emphasized Congressman Gephardt's theme of less cuts for Head Start, education, Medicare, and issues for women and children. Hillary told of President Bill Clinton's proposal of a tax break of \$1500 per year for every full-time student enrolled in an education program above graduation from high school. A \$750 tax deduction would be allowed for every part-time student enrolled in an education program after graduation from high school. As long as the student maintains a B average and remains free of drugs, the tax incentives would be good for a second year. Age is not a factor in the tax break. The first lady stated that the president has hopes that future Americans will look at 14 years of education as today people

look at a 12th grade education.

After the business of the day was passed, the state elected officials entertained at various locations with good food and delightful conversation. The youth and intelligensia seemed to blossom on Friday night.

The Democratic Platform contains a new feature. The "Core Values" section of the platform is a summary of the entire document. It is exactly what it is intended to be. It is a Platform printed on two sheets of paper. Basically the platform for 1996 candidates in the state of Texas will recognize opportunity, responsibility, family and community, security, freedom and fairness. When asked why he chose to run against Texas Republican Senator Phil Gramm, Victor gave a very democratic reply, "Why not?" Again the basic philosophy of the Democratic

Party came forward in his ideas, that being that all people no matter of their wealth should have the very best education and health care humanly possible.

After the speech and with Willie Nelson's "On the Road Again" sounding from the stage, Victor drove his white Nissan off the convention floor as delegates filled red gasoline cans with fuel dollars. Road Crews were signed on to the campaign.

Cecile Richards, executive director of the Texas Freedom Alliance, introduced an Austin Baptist minister and an Austin Rabbi. The rhetoric of the Baptist put the convention delegates in a rhythmic mood as he and the rabbi spoke on tolerance.

Saul Pullman, June Hicks, Ann Murray, Edith Foster, Carolyn Foster, Dana Pearson and Dan Collins, voting delegates from Eastland County, voted to give Bill

White, a Houston attorney, a full term as chairman of the State Democratic Party. In taking the gavel White thanked his educator parents, who were in the audience, for making sure that he had a dream and that dream was in the Democratic Party. Ron and Phyllis Graham also attended the convention as delegates from Marble Falls.

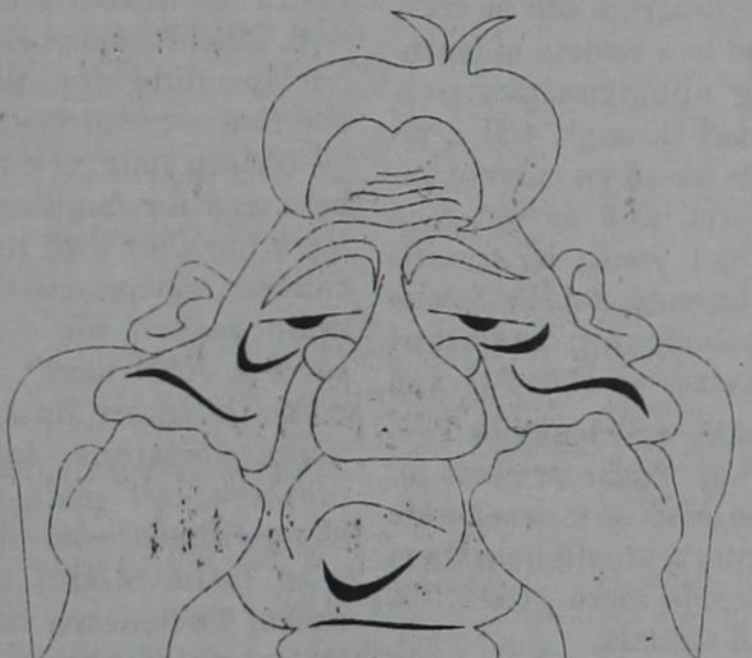

McPhail's fence posts himself, Defense Attorney Lewellen rose to his feet.

"Why is the Sheriff being charged and not these people (Pittman and Ainsworth)?" he asked Judge Burdock. "This man (Ainsworth) pulled the post up!"

Burdock warned Ainsworth that he could be accused of the same conduct as White, and that he might need a lawyer to advise him.

Ainsworth continued with more testimony, with the jury still absent. He said he had talked to the lawyers from the Attorney General's office - they were apparently aware of some details, he was telling about here.

"I just thought the Sheriff and I were doing a good job," he said.

Shortly after that remark the court took a long recess. Apparently there was some conferring of lawyers during this time.

Pleads 5th

Around 1:15 p.m. the Judge called the court back into session, with the jury still out. Calvin Ainsworth appeared at the witness stand with Attorney Russ Thomas. Ainsworth pled the Fifth Amendment against incrimination, and did not testify further.

Attorney Lewellen called former Sheriff Ronnie White to the stand - the jury still out. White testified that he was innocent of the charges against him - that he had never intentionally broken any law.

He said that he did not plan to take a job in law enforcement again, for it was too

stressful for his family and friends.

Lewellen said that two suits would be filed soon - for the payment of Ronnie White's defense fees, and also for a determination of the cost of McPhail's fence, and who might owe for it.

Judge Burdock called in the jury. Then he announced that he granted the State's motion to dismiss this case!

"Your services are no longer needed," he told the jurors.

The judge then remarked that he appreciated the conduct of the Attorneys during this trial.

"Lewellen is a tiger in the courtroom," he commented.

The judge turned to Ronnie White. "I wish you the best of luck, whatever you undertake," he said.

He had a comment for the County Commissioners. "You

may wish to seek the advice of District Attorney Mike Siebert in the future." He said.

After Court was dismissed, Attorney Gary Lewellen stated: "I'm really thankful this is over for Ronnie White and his family. I was defending an innocent man."

Ronnie White, too, said he was just glad the trial was over and the indictments dropped. He will have further statements for the Eastland County newspaper soon.

Others, private citizens and some officials, had less charitable comments on the trial. "The whole thing was stupid." A number said. "The Sheriff was just trying to do his job."

"What a waste of taxpayers money!" Others commented.

New Bridge Open; Eastland County Residents Cut Ribbon

Neighbors around the new bridge on County Road 180, S.E. of Cisco, held a special ribbon cutting on Sunday, June 16. Jackie and Mittie Burson, long-time area residents, cut the ribbon across this new bridge on the South Fork of the Leon River, Pct. 4.

A number of families were present at the occasion. After the ribbon was cut they retreated to the shade along the roadway and enjoyed homemade ice cream provided by Ron and Phyllis Graham. Then they lingered to visit for awhile.

Among those present for the occasion were Jackie and Mittie Burson, Ruth Britain, Danny and Annette Claborn, Tommy Claborn, Diana McCaghren, Joyce Berry, Delbert and Annette Justice, Linda Justice, Lynn Justice, Shayne and Tavia; Howard and Angeline Stovall, Jessica, Ben and Zach; Roan and Phyllis Graham, B.H. and Joyce Coleman, and Viola Payne.

Howard Stovall was

prevailed upon to "say something" to mark the event.

"I will miss the old bridge," he said, referring to the picturesque structure that had been replaced. "I came by here many times, just enjoying the cool, quiet spot. But it was really hard to get heavy equipment across that old bridge."

Jackie and Mittie Burson said the old bridge was here when they moved to the community in 1920. Their father, W.T. Burson, had died out at Westbrook, and their mother bought a farm about 2 miles west of the river. She and her children moved to it and farmed the place with teams.

The old bridge had been repaired a number of times over the years. Then some months ago the Texas Department of Transportation advertised for bids on a new structure.



Jackie and Mittie Burson cut a red ribbon, signifying that the new bridge on County Road 180 is completed. The Burson sisters moved to a farm near this bridge in 1920, when they were small children.

The contract was awarded to J.L. Strain and sons of Tye for this bridge of concrete - 80 ft. long and 24 ft. wide. The contract on another bridge, a culvert type on nearby CR 183, was awarded at the same time. The bid was for approximately \$160,000 on both. Strain Construction Co. began work at both locations in January, 1996. Final inspections were about 3 weeks ago.

According to Brian Neaves, TDoT Resident Engineer, there have been no cost overruns on these bridges.

That was something to be happy about. But the neighbors meeting at the bridge had more to be thankful for than just a new crossing on the river.

As one of them said: "It's great to live where people care about each other and like to get together."

We don't know what Marilyn would look like today at 70, but here in over 400 photos (many unpublished) the legend lives. The transformation of Norma Jeane Mortensen into the luminous Marilyn Monroe still dazzles and intrigues.

The Eastland, Ranger, and Olden Volunteer Fire Departments recently met in a joint training session sponsored by TU Electric at the Eastland Service Center.

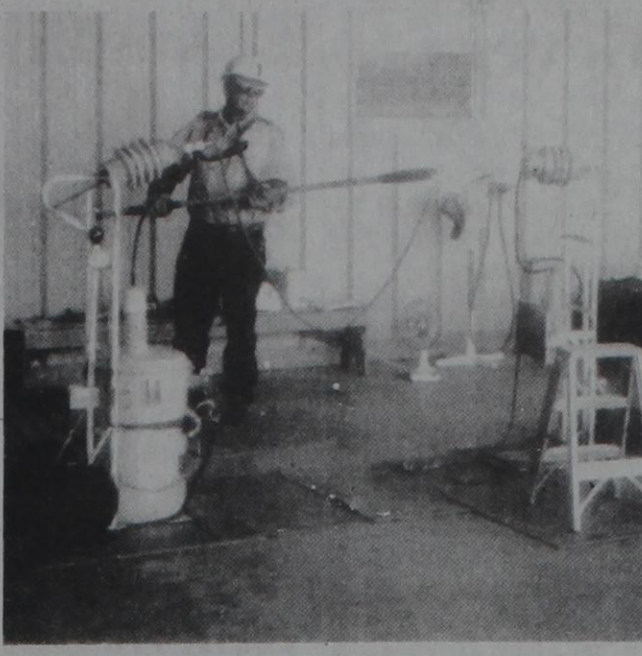
Glen Swift and Pat Hogan, Arcing Demo Instructors, presented a safety program showing how arcing occurs and the effects.
