## Trial Full Of 'Firsts' **For Eastland County**

This trial had a number of unusual features. Chalk up some new 'firsts' for Eastland County!

This is probably the first time in Texas history, according to White's Defense Attorney Gary Lewellen, that a Sheriff has ever been tried for removing a fence from a county road.

Another probable 'first' - the Attorney General's Office sent a prosecutor, John Klassen, who is reportedly a "top gun" for the Department. The Attorney with him, John Neal, described himself as "an observer." He had plenty to observe!

Also, there were two Investigators from the Attorney General's Office, who-with Texas Rangers assisting - conducted the original investigation.

This trial might also have set a record for the number of times the Jury was sent from the Courtroom. It seemed to many spectators that visiting Judge Bill Burdock sent the jury out just when the testimony became most relevant.

The temperature in the annex to 91st District Court might have set a record too, from the wilted appearance of people who had to wait there.

The State's charge of Official Oppression was apparently weak from the start, and began falling apart as witnesses took the stand.

No one expects to ever see another trial like it and most hope they don't!


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

This is the second in a series of weekly boating safety tips produced by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department as part of its boating safety initiative.

Personal Flotation Device (PFD) is a ten dollar phrase for what most people know simply as a life jacket. Texas law requires a wearable PFD for each person on board regardless of boat length. Those under 13 years of age must wear a PFD while underway.

All PFD's carried on board must be serviceable, readily accessible and of appropriate size for the intended wearer. Never keep any PFD under lock and key. Make certain your passengers always know the location of these important life saving de-

Type I PFD (Offshore Lifejacket)—This device has the greatest required buoyancy and is designed to turn most unconscious persons in the water from a face down position to a vertical and slightly backward position to a vertical and slightly backward position (righting ability). Type I is a good choice if you plan to venture offshore or onto waters where chances of immediate rescue are slight.

Type II PFD (Near-Shore Lifejacket)— This is the most common PFD on boats today. This vest is designed to maintain the wearer in a vertical and slightly backward position (righting ability) and is available in a variety of sizes.

Type III PFD (Flotation Aide)—This PFD has about the same buoyancy as a Type II PFD but little or no righting ability. These devices are designed specifically for activities such as water skiing, fishing and sail-

Type V PFD (Special

Use Devices)-This is the newest PFD device with a minimum of 7 1/2 pounds of buoyancy which can be further inflated to 22 pounds of buoyancy by the water. Should you select this PFD, it is required to be worn at all times while aboard the

NEW LIFE FOR SILK FLOWERS - Don't throw away those old silk flowers when they begin to look as if they'd had better days. Just wash in warm, spapy water and let dry. If only greenery and leaves have held their shape well, spray both sides of the leaves with clear glossy spray paint and let dry. A can goes a long way and costs around \$1. If leaves are worn-looking or curled up, you can remove them and iron with medium to high heat. You can use steam of spray with the heat. (Make sure you use a dry cloth to cover the leaves so you won't melt the plastic on the back.) Spray-paint and let dry and put back on stems.

If you have flowers, regardless of the color, you can change to whatever color for a new look. The non-glossy paint for flowers works best. Wait until perfectly dry to spray with clear glossy paint. Redoing the silk flowers does require some time and

Dear Sue: My son is upset because his friend, Paul, won't be in his class next year. Paul's mother is going to teach Paul at home. I don't understand how this works. I thought children were obliged to attend school under the law. Can parents just decide not to send their child anymore?

I heard from some of the other parents that she thinks there are too many distractions in school and she can teach her child better at home. I have to admit that I also think my son doesn't get all the attention I think he should and the teacher does have to spend too much time keeping order in the classroom. What do you think of teaching children at home? Margarite K.

Dear Margarite: A parent who wants to teach her child at home must notify the school superintendent, file a lesson plan and cover the standard subject hours. On the average, this lasts only one year. Parents find that it's very difficult to devote the necessary time on the child's lessons. Also, a parent usually knows one way to teach a lesson but sometimes that way won't work. A teacher knows several ways to get the message across to the child.

Even if the parent is a qualified teacher, there isstill one very big problemwith teaching the child at home and that is that the child doesn't get the chance to interact with other children. 

**Banana** Breakfast Yogurt (for four)

2¼ cups sliced bananas (about 3 medium-size ripe bananas cut into ¼" slices—save 4 slices to use later)
One 16-ounce container unflavored low-fat yogurt
2 tablespoons honey

1/4 cup dark raisins and granola cereal

Put banana slices, yogurt, honey, granola and raisins in a medium-size bowl. Stir to mix well. Divide mixture among 4 bowls. Sprinkle each with extra granola and raisins and top with a banana slice. Serve immediately.

Banana-Chocolate Chip Ice Milk (for six)
1 cup mashed bananas (about two medium-size)
½ cup miniature chocolate chips
1 quart vanilla ice milk, softened

In medium-size bowl, using rubber spatula, fold bananas and chocolate chips into ice milk until just blended. Spread mixture in 8" square metal baking pan. Freeze 3 to 4 hours until firm. Fifteen minutes before serving, remove ice milk from freezer to soften slightly before cutting into squares.

Banana-Pudding Pie (for eight)

30 vanilla wafer cookies

Two 3 ½-ounce packages instant vanilla pudding and pie filling

Make pudding as directed on package with 3 cups skim milk. Sprinkle banana slices with lemon juice. This will prevent them from turning brown. Alternate layers of wafers and pudding in a 9" pie plate. Spread whipped topping over last layer. Refrigerate several hours until firm.





**New Law Affects** Social Security **Benefits For** Stepchildren

Beginning July 1, 1996. a stepchild can receive Social Security benefits on a stepparent's earnings record only if the child depends on the stepparent for at least one-half of his or her financial support. This dependency requirement is the result of a law enacted on March 29.

The new law also requires that the stepchild's benefits end if the stepparent becomes divorced from the child's parent after June 30, 1996. The child's benefits terminate in the month following the month the divorce becomes final.

The divorce must be reported to Social Security as soon as it becomes final. Each year, the Social Security Administration will notify stepparents who have a child (or children) receiving benefits on their record to remind them that benefits will be terminated in case of divorce.
