Daniel Stewart, of Ranger was killed about 5 p.m. Saturday in a car/pedestrian accident.

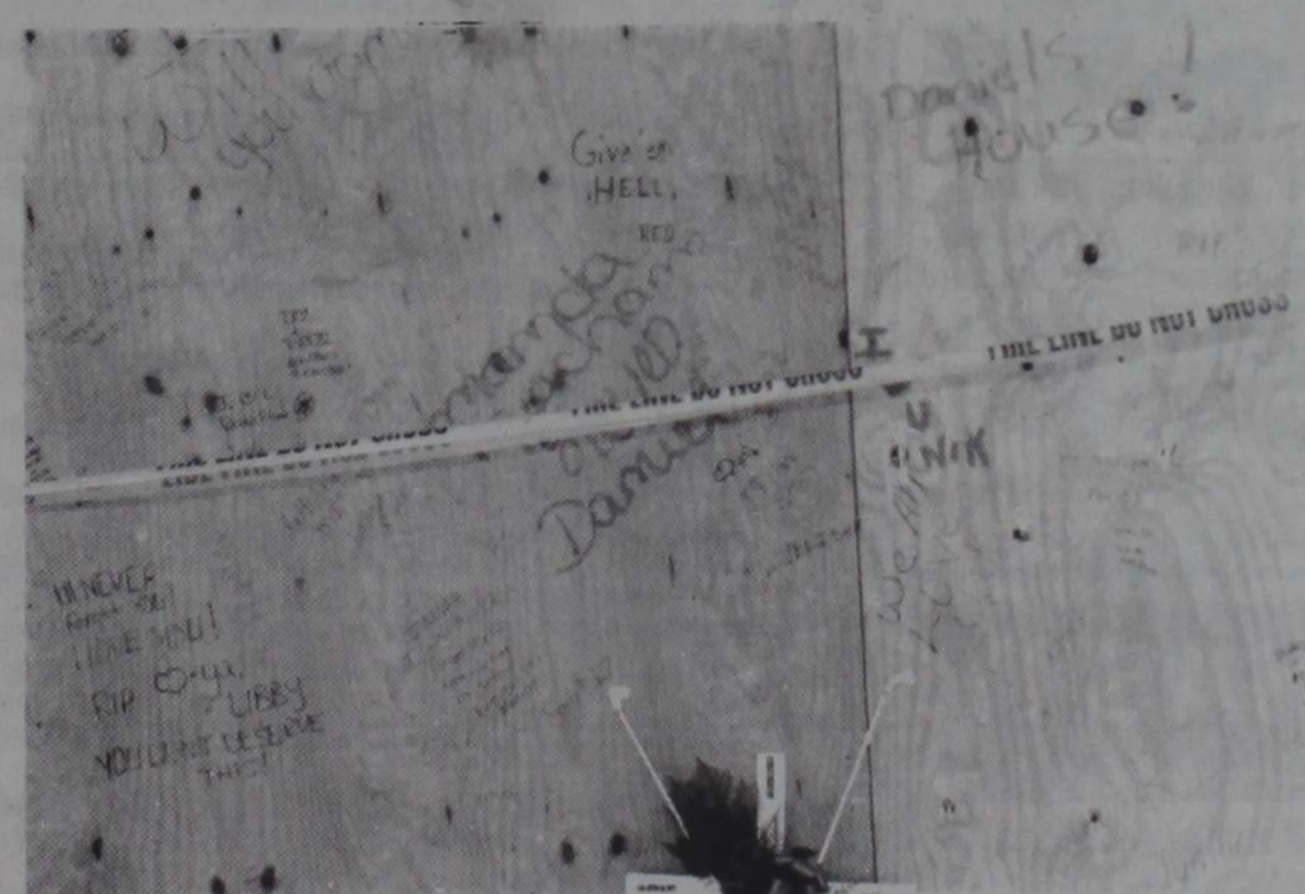
Daniel Stewart was pronounced dead at 5:22 p.m. by Justice of the Peach Alford Bush.

Information on the driver of the car could not be released because she is a 16-year-old juvenile. She was treated and released at Eastland Memorial Hospital.

Stewart was walking

across the street when he was stuck. The car

Proud To Be An American

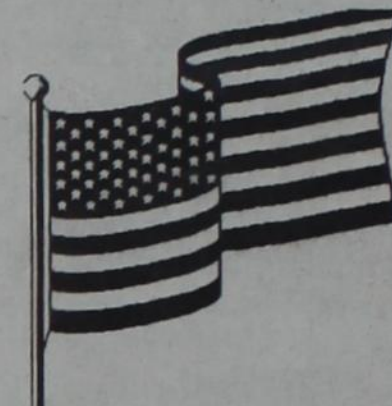
Reflecting this Independence Day let's share thoughts. It's great to live in a country of such freedoms as worship and speech.

HANDLING PUBLIC TEMPER TANTRUMS

For some parents outings with their children often become a display of embarrassing behavior on the part of a child. Some parents find it difficult to control their child's temper tantrums in public. Here are a few suggestions that can help:

*Be sure you have the child's attention. Remain calm and, if possible, remove the child from the situation. If this is not possible, acknowledge the child's feelings and provide clear directions for expected behavior.

*Gain control of parental feelings before trying to redirect the child's behavior.

*Help the child control his emotions by giving him time and space. He will be more receptive to directions.

*When possible, ignore the behavior and reinforce desired behavior through encouragement and recognition.

*Spanking, while it may get the child's attention, can result in feelings of humiliation, belief that "hitting" is o.k., embarrassment for him and others.

If parents find themselves repeatedly lashing out at their kids' misbehavior, it may be due to an underlying problem. The following are suggestions to help parents deal

with these problems and to show the love they really want to convey:

*Pick him/her up and hold him/her quietly

*Stand and wait

*Take the child to his room, carry him to a safe spot and let him work it out.

*Bring a treat from home to appease the child while shopping in the grocery store.

Talking with other parents also can give parents confidence, and reassure them that they are not alone.

Eastland County 4-H Horse Program Reining Clinic Series Set

The Eastland County 4-H Horse Program is sponsoring a beginner reining clinic series.

The first clinic is set for Saturday, August 3, 1996, at the Eastland County Livestock Show grounds, located on FM 3101, north of Eastland. The clinic will begin at 8 a.m. and will continue all day.

Roger Blackmon from Baird, Texas, will be the instructor. Mr. Blackmon is an accomplished horseman and an expert in reining. He is a retired Texas A&M Extension Agent and helped form some of the top 4-H horse programs in the state. He also initiated 4-H adult reining clinics which have been held in Abilene to help disseminate reining information to the local level. He also breeds and raises Quarter horses.

The clinics will begin with the basics of horsemanship. Clinics are planned to be held on a monthly basis with in-

creased horsemanship skills progressively added to each session. Knowledge of reining is important in all riding events. Even if riders are not interested in competing in reining events, these clinics will help set a foundation which is important to any rider.

Cost for each clinic will be \$25.00 per family. Registration will take place until July 31, 1996. Entries after July 31, 1996, will be charged \$30.00 per family.

has been set for the changing of congressional district boundaries in Dallas and Houston.

The changes were required following a June U.S. Supreme Court ruling — in favor of Republican plaintiffs — declaring two districts in Houston and one in Dallas illegal because of racial gerrymandering.

Because so little time separates the scheduled hearing and the Nov. 5 general election date, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and the districts' congressional representatives — all of whom are Democrats — want the court to put off the changes until the 1998 mid-term election.

But Attorney General Morales said, "I think it is wishful thinking to believe that this court will allow us to go through the 1996 election cycle with unconstitutional districts."

If the boundaries are changed, new elections would be required in each district in which boundaries change, even though voters selected nominees from the two major parties in the March and April primaries and runoffs, the *Houston Chronicle* reported.

Secretary of State Tony Garza listed three ways the scenario could play out in the redrawn districts, in which the court could:

- Order new primaries, to be conducted by Sept. 6; or
- Order a special election on Nov. 5 that is open to candidates from all parties; or
- Order the precinct chairman in each party to select new nominees without primaries.

SSC Land to Be Resold

Land bought by the federal government for the Superconducting Super Collider project — which lost its funding in 1993 — is going to be resold to the public.

The Texas Natural Research Laboratory Commission and the Texas General Land Office are coordinating the resale of about 10,000 acres of land in Ellis County, southeast of Dallas. The federal government eventually gave the tracts of land to the state

of Texas after the project was suspended.

General Land Office spokesman Ron Calhoun said the land sales will be done in a "systematic, prudent way" but people who lived on the land before it was taken over by the federal government will get no special privileges.

Official Wants Tobacco Dumped

State Board of Education Chairman Jack Christie sent a letter dated June 17 to the managers of the Permanent School Fund asking that they sell off any holdings in tobacco-producing companies.

"This is to let them know how a few of us feel," Christie told the *Dallas Morning News*.

"I find it incredible that we generate funds through investments in tobacco, which have to be used to educate students to avoid the very product that our investments support," Christie said in the letter.

The state filed a lawsuit March 31 against major tobacco companies, seeking \$4 billion for money spent on treating tobacco-related illnesses.

The House Approves Most-Favored-Nation (MFN) Trade Treatment for China

The future of American agriculture will increasingly rely on developments in countries and markets far from our shores. A case in point is China.

On June 29, the U.S. House of Representatives voted 286 to 141 to extend MFN treatment for China. This means that the U.S. will allow China's products to enter our country at the same low tariff rates that apply to virtually all trading partners.

While MFN treatment for China has been a controversial issue, it is important to keep in mind just how important trade is to the agricultural sectors in Texas and the United States.

For example, it is likely that grain supplies will continue to be tight through next year. A rising demand from Asian economies could result in an export boom that could keep

both production and prices at the boiling point for much of the upcoming decade.

From fiscal year (FY) 1994 to FY 1995 agricultural exports increased by 175% U.S. agricultural exports increased by 175% U.S. agricultural exports to China topped \$2.6 billion last year, compared to \$333 million worth of goods in 1993. In 1995, Texas was responsible for 23% of U.S. agricultural exports in China, with exports totaling \$650 million.

China's economy is one of the fastest growing in the world. Its income has grown 10% this year and is expected to continue at this rate through the coming decade. China has a population of 1.2 billion -- four and a half times more people than the U.S. -- and includes a growing middle class with more disposable income that can be spent on more varied and more nutritious diets.

By 1995, U.S. grain exports to China had already reached 9.1 million tons. China's demand for grain is expected to outstrip supply by over 20 million tons as early as the year 2000. In fact, at 12 million tons per year, China is the world's largest wheat importer. By the year 2030, China is expected to import about 90 million tons -- one half of today's total global grain trade!

China is the world's largest importer of cotton, and is the largest export market for U.S. cotton -- importing 18% of total U.S. exports. Cotton exports to China increased from \$497 million to \$813 million between 1994 and 1995.

The U.S. currently exports \$12 billion in agricultural products to China each year, providing more than 170,000 American jobs. For each additional \$1 billion in agricultural

On my wedding day, she told me she was glad to be rid of me!

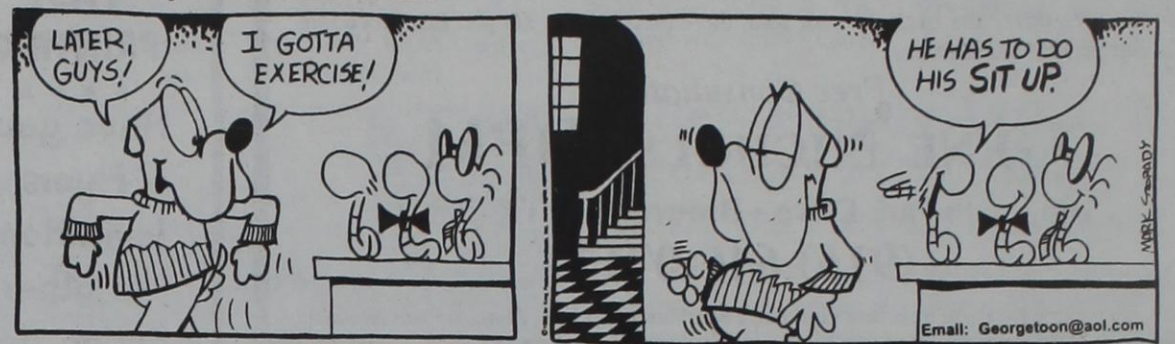

Dear Beatrice: Generally, people who were abused as children become abusive parents. However, that doesn't have to be the case at all. I think that since you're aware of the danger, you won't pass this on to your child. However, to put your fears at ease and to help you resolve anything left over from your own terrible childhood, I suggest some professional counseling.

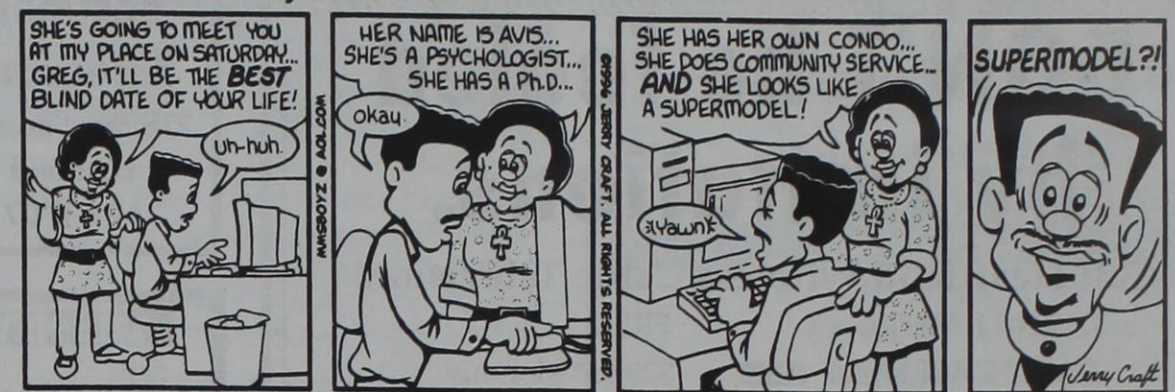

Q. We are planning to go on vacation next month and have been looking into places which accept pets. We'd like to bring our dog along with us. He's basically still a puppy and we'd hate to put him in a kennel. Is there anything we can do to train him to travel well in the car?

A. Start training him by taking short, frequent trips to get him used to being in the car.

Just as you train him at

home, train him to stay in one spot in the back seat. Look into the special pet seat belts that are on the market. There are also different sized crates that are good for traveling dogs.

When you finally set out on that long trip, you should stop every two hours or so to stretch the dog's legs and to walk him. Make sure he has plenty of fresh water at your rest stops as well.

If he shows signs of car sickness, you can give him a dramamine before setting out on your journey.

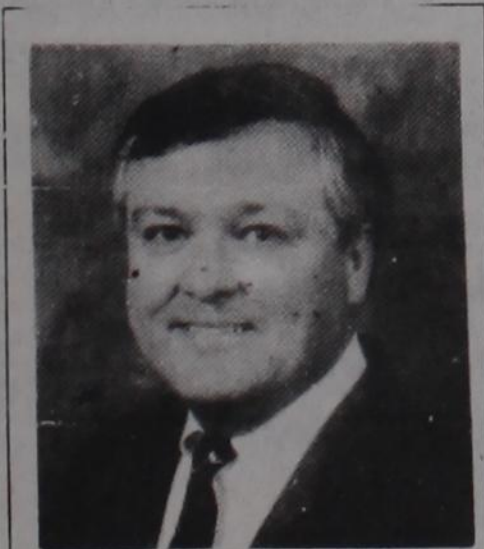

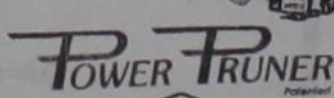

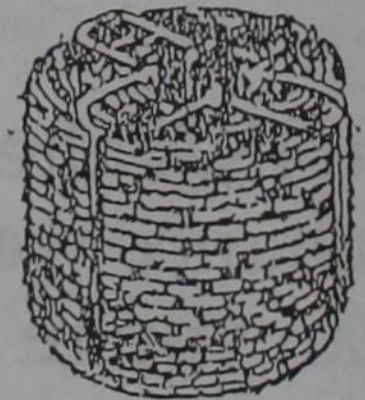
