91st District Court Revokes Probation

On July 2, the following sentences were handed down by Judge Steven R. Herod in the 91st Judicial District Court:

• Jason Dean Horn, 22, a resident of Eastland, received five (5) years confinement in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. On December 27, 1995, Jason Horn was given probation for the offense of Indecency with a Child; and thereafter, the State filed a Motion to Revoke Probation due to new charges and other violations. Jason Horn was also convicted and sentenced for the offense of Burglary of Building, which was committed after he was placed on probation for Indecency With A Child.

• Randal Allen Hamilton, 32, a resident of Eastland, received four (4) years confinement in the

Institutional Division of the Texas Department of

Criminal Justice. On December 14, 1995, Randal Allen Hamilton was given probation for the offense of Driving While Intoxicated, Third Offense; and thereafter, the State filed a Motion to Revoke Probation due to new charges and other violations. Randal Allen Hamilton was also convicted and sentenced to four (4) years and six (6) months confinement in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice for another offense of Driving While Intoxicated, Third Offense. This offense was committed after he was placed on probation for Driving While Intoxicated.

The cases were prosecuted by District Attorney, Mike Siebert.

Rotarians Hear Suggestion For Increasing Eastland's Water Supply; Giant Dam Is Answer

Rotarians at their noon day luncheon Monday heard Herb Tanner describe the water situation here in a very forceful manner. Mr. Tanner feels that it is wise to support the bond election, as it will mean the most logical thing to be done at this time. It will enable the city to tide over an emergency that now exists.

However, the emergency measure is not to be confused with a plan to provide an adequate water supply for all time to come.

Water or rather the lack of water, has proven very costly to Eastland in recent years. Because of the city's geographical location, it is very favorably considered as a site for factories and government projects, until the water question is brought up. Then Eastland fades out of the picture. No concern of importance will give second thought to a waterless town.

The subject is not new, Mr. Tanner said, but much time and thought has been given to it. Proposed sites have been sought, but in most instances there was something that would make the site undesirable. Either too much salt in the soil or

too little watershed or drainage.

There is, however, one location that seems to be ideal. This location is about 7 miles Southeast of Eastland.

Should a dam be constructed there it would be possible to have a watershed of more than 200 square miles, and when full the supply would be large enough to take care of all the water needs of Eastland, Ranger, Olden and other points in the country. And the cost would not be as great as most people thought. Revenue from the sale of water would pay for it in time, and the supply of water would be adequate for all needs for the next 100 years, it is thought.

To make this possible it would be necessary to form a water district, and property owners in the area would vote for the construction of such a dam, together with piping it into various cities if they so chose. The system would be their own private property, and should pay for itself within a course of time.

This would eliminate future worry. It would do away with water rationing, and would place Eastland at the top of the list capable of caring for large factories, etc. Of course these factories would purchase the water they consumed. They are now asking for donations, but merely for an available supply.

Mr. Tanner's remarks were to the point, and the address was well received.

Dr. Duane Hale To Conduct Indian History Seminar

Dr. Duane Hale of Cisco will hold a Tribal/Band Histories Seminar for Native Americans at the University of Oklahoma from July 8 through July 11.

Sponsored by the University and the American Indian Institute, the workshop will focus on techniques needed to research and write Tribal histories.

Dr. Hale, a history instructor at Cisco Junior College, specializes in Spanish and Native history. He has done much research and writing in these fields.

Since 1983 he has held 25 workshops similar to the one scheduled next week. Some of them have been conducted at the University of Oklahoma, with others in San Francisco, Arizona, the National

Archives in Washington, D.C. and Sic in Canada.

Dr. Hale says that the idea for these Seminars came from his experiences searching out material and writing histories. He had worked extensively with the Delaware and Chickashaw Tribes when he realized that four main things were needed to produce a history.

You must have a knowledge of the language and culture, and knowledge of the techniques of research and writing, "he says.

"The tribes-especially the Elders-knew their own language and culture. So all they really needed was the knowledge of how to research and write their own histories."

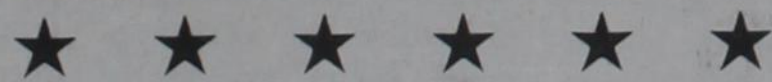

From Whence Came I? By Wanda Skinner

As I turned through the pages of a ten year old Heritage Quest magazine, I found an article of great interest and wondered if there were some similar things that could happen right here in Eastland County. In an old Catholic Cemetery in a small town in Florida a stone was found that was two feet wide, three inches thick, and 45 inches tall. The inscription was very difficult to read but it appeared not to be in English. The cemetery was archived but this stone was not interpreted. About seven years later a couple of people decided this tombstone was begging for an interpretation. They began to work and found that the word at the top which was AMATAR may have been an analogue of Mother. Some of the writing resembled English letter, some resembled the Cyrillic alphabet of Russia. There were two carved panels at either side of the top of the stone. As the weeds and grass were removed around the stone the dates, 1836-1897 became visible. There was a carving of a rising sun on the left side of the dates and a carving of a crescent moon on the right. These are the universal signs of birth and death. A census record search for the last name that appeared on the stone was unsuccessful. A trip to the church records found a name similar which proved to be the name they needed. The name had been O'Donnell but had been placed in the record as O for the middle initial. There was also a date error of three years on the naturalization papers. The puzzle was worked out and the name was found and the results were recorded. The archives also had proof of the finding. There is a challenge

and a warning in this example. The challenge is that we need to never give up, keep striving and the warning is that we need to check out the records and make sure the spelling and the names and dates are correct. Even those public officials make mistakes in putting the information they have on paper. By the way, I am so thankful for my spell-check on my computer. Without it and my proof-reading husband, my articles would fall far short of their mark.

Do you happen to have access to an old cemetery

that may contain only a few graves and headstones? It might make an interesting project to find all you can about the writing on the headstone. Give someone from the ECGS a call and see if we might be able to help you with this. We would love to see all the cemeteries records brought up to date. There may be many hidden and forgotten ones out there. 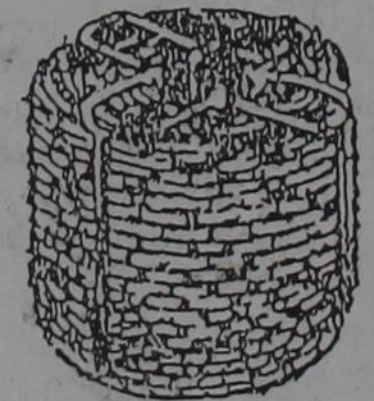

Fishing Outdoors

As we told you last week Tommy Maynard of Eastland competed in the B.A.S.S. Divisional fish off at Toledo Bend June 16-22. This events feature bass club champions from eight states and Zimbabwe Africa.

This was a three day tournament with two days of practice. The Texas team took top honors with a total weight of 258 pounds 3 ounces, beating out runner up Louisiana 232.9 pounds. Each team consisted of 12 anglers of which Tommy finished 4th. Tommy's weight was not available at this time but it was somewhere just over 22 pounds. An excellent finish for a West Texas Angler on a lake he has fished only a handful of times.

The overall individual winner this year was David Truax 38 pounds 4 ounces. David will now advance to the National Event which will be announced at a later date. The top five winners at the National Level will advance to the Bass Masters Classic in 1997.

Leon's bass are reported to be improving in the mid lake area using black and blue worms. Some fish to six pounds have been reported in 3 to 5 feet of water. The crappie are

Don't Be A Pain In The Boat

This is the fourth in a series of weekly boat-

ing safety tips produced by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department as part of its boating safety initiative.

Many boaters have noticed the increased numbers of law enforcement on lakes across Texas. Some have come in contact with a Texas Parks and Wildlife game warden and have a reminder of the experience - a citation.

"A lot of the citations are issued because boaters lack the proper number of life jackets or kids are not wearing life jackets," said Carlos Vaca, boating law administrator for TPWD. "But, surprisingly, a good number of the citations are issued because of failure to produce certificate of number."

TPWD statistics show that since the saturation patrols began a month ago, game wardens have contacted 168,549 people and issued 3,359 citations. Here are some of the most common infractions for which boaters are cited:

- Improper exhaust system - not having a muffler insert of exhaust water manifold.

- Failure to have enough PFD's (personal flotation devices) on board. All PFD's must be serviceable, readily accessible and of appropriate size for the intended wearer.

- Failure to display registration number.

- Operating without proper lights. From sunset to sunrise, boats are required to have one red and green combination at the front of the boat and one 360 degree white light aft.

- Failure to have a serviceable fire extinguisher.

- Children under 13 years of age not wearing PFD's. All children under 13 years of age in motorboats under 26 feet in length must wear a U.S. Coast Guard approved PFD while underway.

- Failure to produce certificate of number or facsimile thereof.

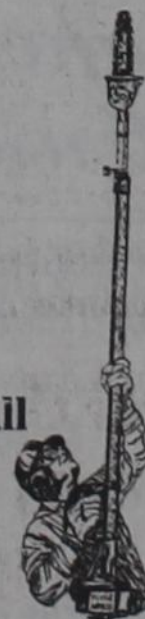

We are required to send this notice to all farm operators and owners. It is the farm operators responsibility to report crop acreages. Farm owners are sent reminders in case the operator does not report.

The final date to report your planted acreage of peanuts, grain sorghum, corn, and cotton, is Monday, July 15, 1996. Producers that do not have CAT crop insurance with this office have their reporting final date extended until August 15, 1996. Other crops for which reports will be accepted include commercial vegetable crops, melons, guar, and any other crops that the farm operator wishes to establish a cropping history.

Crop shares will be requested and must be accurately reported. Inaccurate crop shares could result in farm owner being denied his share of FCIC payments or CAT payments, and being denied the right to vote in commodity referendums.

Farm operators will be asked to certify their farming intentions for the 1996 crop year and their compliance with the Sodbuster/Swampbuster Conservation Compliance Provisions.

YOUR OLD TAX RETURN, ONE MORE TIME

Out of sight, out of mind. When it comes to old tax returns, that's an approach many people like to follow. But before you completely forget about your old tax forms, you may wish to consider filing an amended return.

If you made a mistake on a prior-year tax return, an amended return is the way to set things right. Arithmetic errors, missing information, and oversights are all fairly common, and generally there's no reason to fear filing an amended return - whether you owe money to the IRS or vice versa.

Certain special situations can also trigger amended returns. For example, if you suffer a casualty loss in a presidentially-declared disaster, you may deduct the loss on your tax return for the year of the disaster, or you may amend the prior-year return and deduct the loss in that year. The best strategy depends on your tax bracket for both years, plus other factors such as the amount of your loss and whether it occurred early or late in the year.

An amended return can help ease the sting of certain business and worthless security losses. You also may benefit from an amended return if there's a retroactive change in the tax law as a result of new legislation or a favorable court ruling. Note that an amended return is generally required if you previously deferred gain on the sale of your home, but failed to purchase a replacement home within two years.

As a general rule, you may file an amended return up to three years after filing your original return, although other time limits may apply. The rules may be tricky, so be sure to give us a call if you'd like assistance or more information.

"There are many unanswered questions about how retail competition would affect consumers." "This study confirms that homeowners, apartment dwellers, small businesses, and other small-volume consumers would likely face higher electric rates for several years if Texas were to rush headlong into deregulation."

"This issue really comes down to a basic question of fairness. The big corporations already have a good deal on their electric rates, but they want more even if it comes at the expense of small-volume consumers. That's just not fair."

"Higher residential prices are especially hard on working-class families. Lower-income customers spend a larger percent-

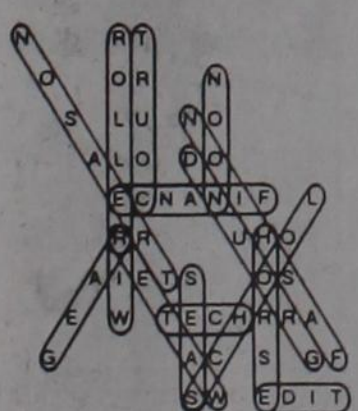

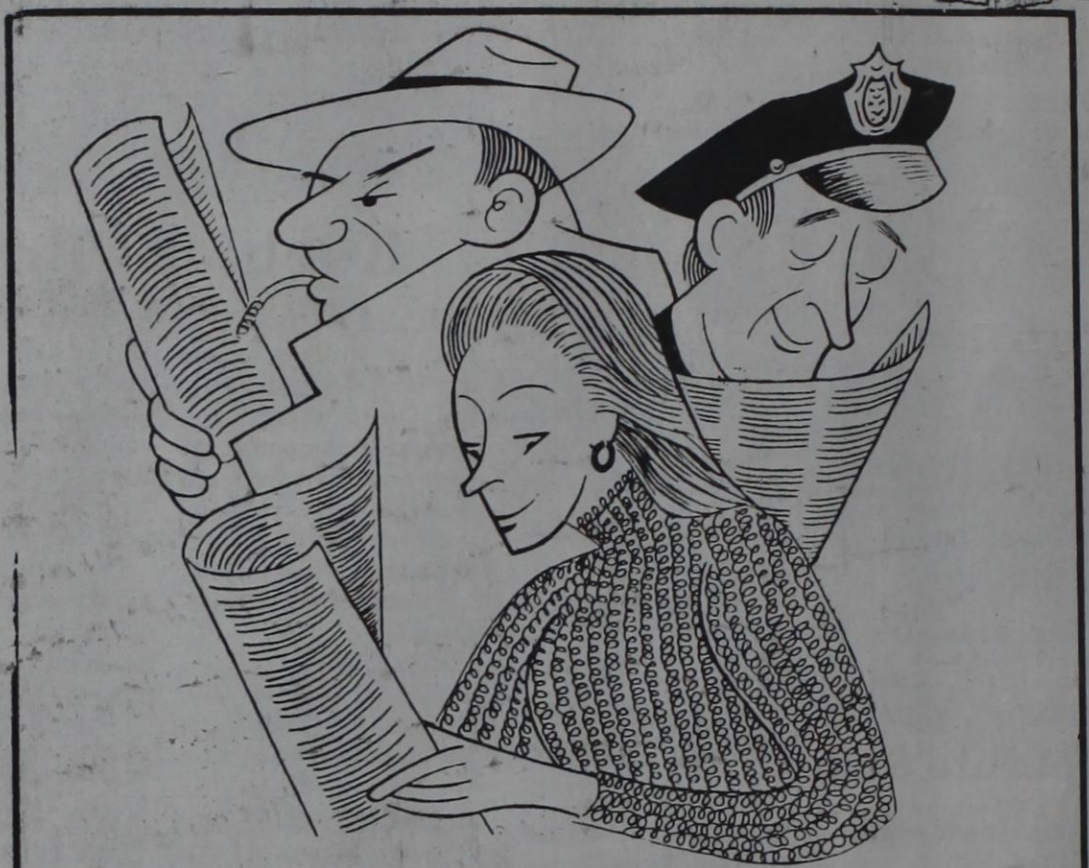
