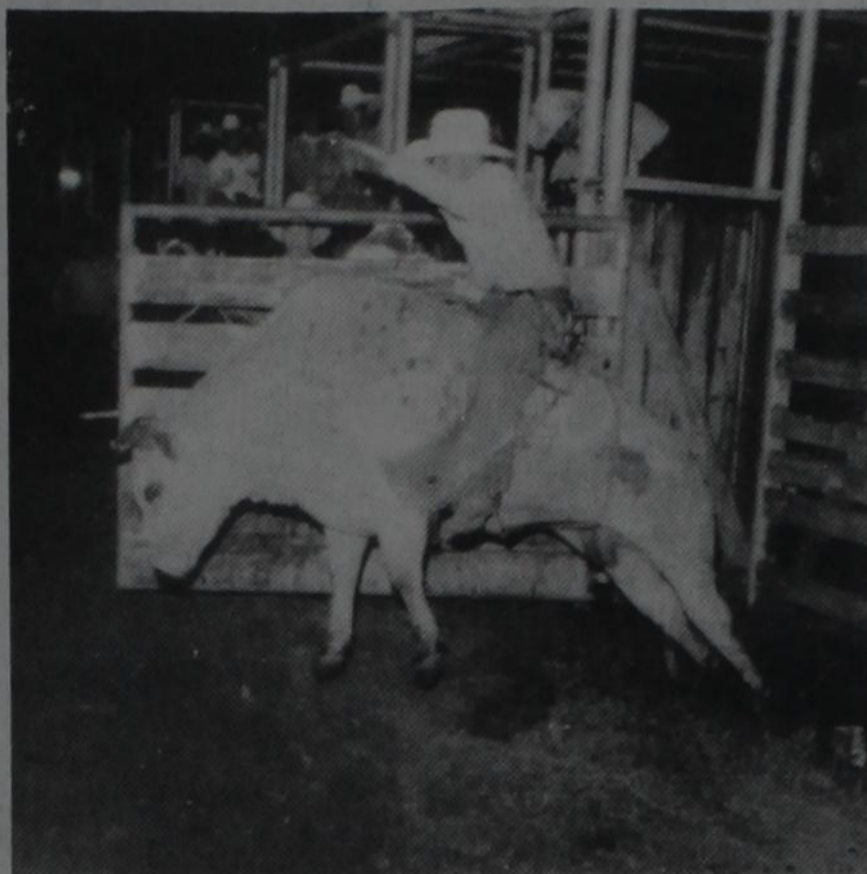

County Commissioners: Budget Requests Up More Workshops Planned

Eastland County Commissioners spent much of Monday listening to budget requests for the next fiscal year 1996-97.

This Budget Hearing was the first of several which will be held before the new budget is finalized.

Although advertised as a Public Hearing, not many citizens came out to hear the proposals. Most were in the Courtroom on matters concerning roads.

Most requests in the new budget were higher than those of last year. After going over many of

the figures, Auditor Donald Hazelip remarked that the requests would create a \$400,000 shortfall in funds from expected revenues.

County Judge Scott Bailey said that taxes are expected to bring in around \$1,112,000 to the County, with additional revenues in fines, forfeitures, fees, charges for services and other sources.

A three percent cost of living raise has been figured into the salaries of all county personnel.

Judge Bailey remarked that inflation was a little over three percent on the national level.

Crime continued to take a big bite out of the Eastland County budget.

Proposals on the cost of law enforcement and operation of the Courts were all higher.

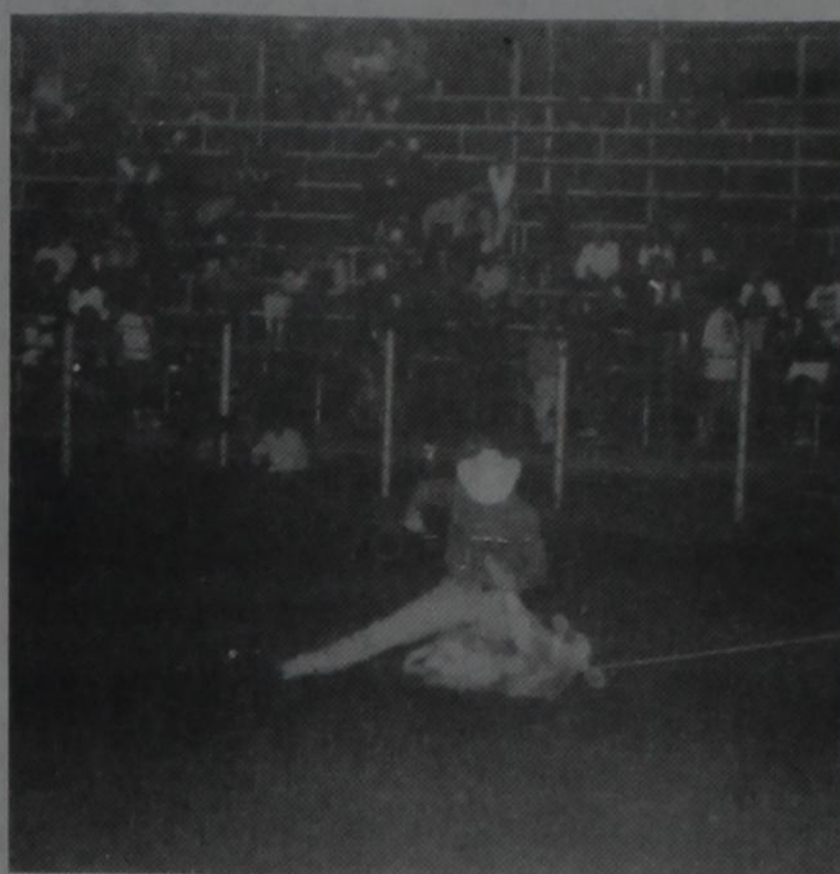

50 YEARS OF RODEOING

In March of 1946 a group of young men from Ranger, most of them just back from the battlefields of WWII, got together and decided they wanted to do something significant for their hometown. With the help of the Abilene Jaycees, they formed a Ranger chapter of the Junior Chamber of Commerce and, wanting their new organization to get off to good start, devised some pretty ambitious plans.

Over the fifty-year span of time since rodeo arena was built, many improvements have been made but much of the original work is still being used. The cattle holding pens, are much the same as they were fifty



years ago. The pipe structure that holds the bleachers with repairs made as needed, is still essentially the same.

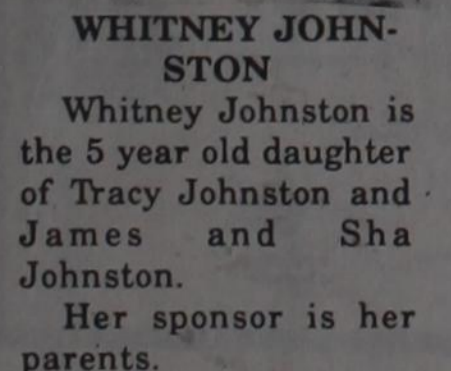

The average loss per burglary is considered about \$1,300.00.

Crime Stoppers To Canvas County For Associate Members

The board of directors of the Eastland County Crime Stoppers, Inc. announced to the various heads of Eastland County Law Enforcement agencies that the organization will begin offering associate memberships to the general public beginning July 15.

The announcement came during a July 2 barbeque hosted by the Crime Stoppers at La Mancha Lake Ranch, and was attended by law enforcement officials from throughout the county.

Crime Stoppers co-coordinator Terry Edwards introduced the board of directors to those present and then went on to explain the need to offer the memberships. "We need operating money and we need the support of the public," Edwards stated.

Edwards went on to explain that the group cannot use reward monies, nor grant monies to pay for their phone service which includes the 1-800 tips line. He also added that the organization does work in Eastland County and Rising Star Police Chief Darrell Cozart agreed, stating that 3 indictments were recently handed down

by a 91st District Court grand jury that would not have been possible without a tip from the Eastland County Crime Stoppers' tips line.

Cecil Funderburgh, Eastland Police Chief and co-coordinator of the Crime Stoppers, told his fellow lawmen that his office answers the tips line and then forwards the information on to the agency in whose jurisdiction the offense occurred. He went on to say that the tips line is answered in his office during regular business hours and is then automatically forwarded to a local number. This way the line is answered locally 24 hours a day. Chief Funderburgh then introduced Terry Simmons, who is the current chairman of the board of the Eastland County Crime Stoppers.

Simmons informed the group that the Crime Stoppers organization was begun in 1989 and at that time became a certified organization under regulations by the Governor's Office of the State of Texas. Under these regulations any monies donated must be used for reward funds only.

He also said that the board applies for and has received in the past,

including this year, grants through the Criminal Justice Department, but that these grant funds are restricted for certain uses and many of the general day to day operating expenses do not qualify.

"The only way that the board can generate unrestricted operating expenses is through designated fund raisers, such as the membership drive announced here tonight," Simmons added. "But, we need your support in this drive so that if you are called about someone going door-to-door, you will know who it is and what we are doing, because there are so many copycat solicitors out there that we don't want to have someone that is not legit accepting membership monies using our name," Simmons said.

"These board members present tonight will be the ones that will be offering the associate memberships, and no one else," he stated. The memberships will cost \$1 a month with a 12 month minimum. In closing, Simmons told the group that he and the entire board appreciate all that the area law enforcement agencies do

and that if there is every anything the Eastland County Crime Stoppers can do for them, just ask.

Chief Funderburgh acknowledged the donations for the barbeque meal which included brisket and sausage donated by Ranger IGA, Adam's Grocery, and Ranger Meat, papergoods by Bill's Dollar Store and Wal Mart. The barbeque was prepared by Gary Deats of Gary's Lake Leon Store at Lake Leon.

Heat Is Major Summer Killer

Heat is a major summer killer. Each year it takes a greater toll in lives than the more spectacular weather events such as hurricanes, floods or tornadoes. Texas's Division of Emergency Management and your local office of emergency management encourage citizens to protect themselves and their loved ones from the health related hazards of hot weather. The following may help you educate your audience about these hazards and the measures that can help reduce health risks.

•As a rule of thumb, when the temperatures rise, slow down. Heed your body's early warnings.

Reduce activity and stay in a cool, shady or air conditioned place as much as possible during the hottest part of the day. Heatstroke often develops swiftly, with little warning. More than half of heatstroke victims become ill less than 24 hours before being hospitalized

or found dead.

•Beware of high humidity. Perspiration is the body's natural cooling mechanism. When humidity is low, this evaporation "cools" the skin. Air movement, such as a breeze or fan, evaporates perspiration and cools the body. When the humidity is high, this evaporative cooling process is lost, and the danger of heat related illness increases.

•Do not dry out. Drink plenty of water often and regularly. Do not wait until you are thirsty. Avoid caffeine and alcohol. Eat small meals and eat more often. Avoid foods that are high in protein, which increase metabolic heat.

•Dress for hot weather. Wear lightweight, light colored and loose fitting clothing to help maintain normal body temperature. When outdoors wear sunglasses and a wide brimmed hat, a cap with meshed crown, or carry a parasol. Avoid sunburn,

and use a sun screen agent.

•Get out of the heat for at least a few hours each day. If air conditioning is not available, go to an air conditioned environment such as a shopping mall, public library or museum. If this is not possible, find a well-ventilated, shady area.

•Check on the elderly, sick or very young, they are most affected by hot,

humid weather. Take extra precautions for them while the hot spell lasts.

•Do not forget pets, they are subject to the same dangers posed by hot weather as are humans. Make sure pets have a cool, shady place in which to rest during the heat of the day, well ventilated, with a supply of fresh, cool water.

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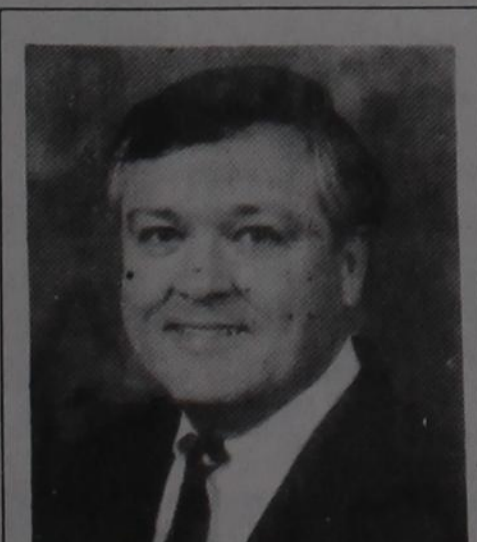

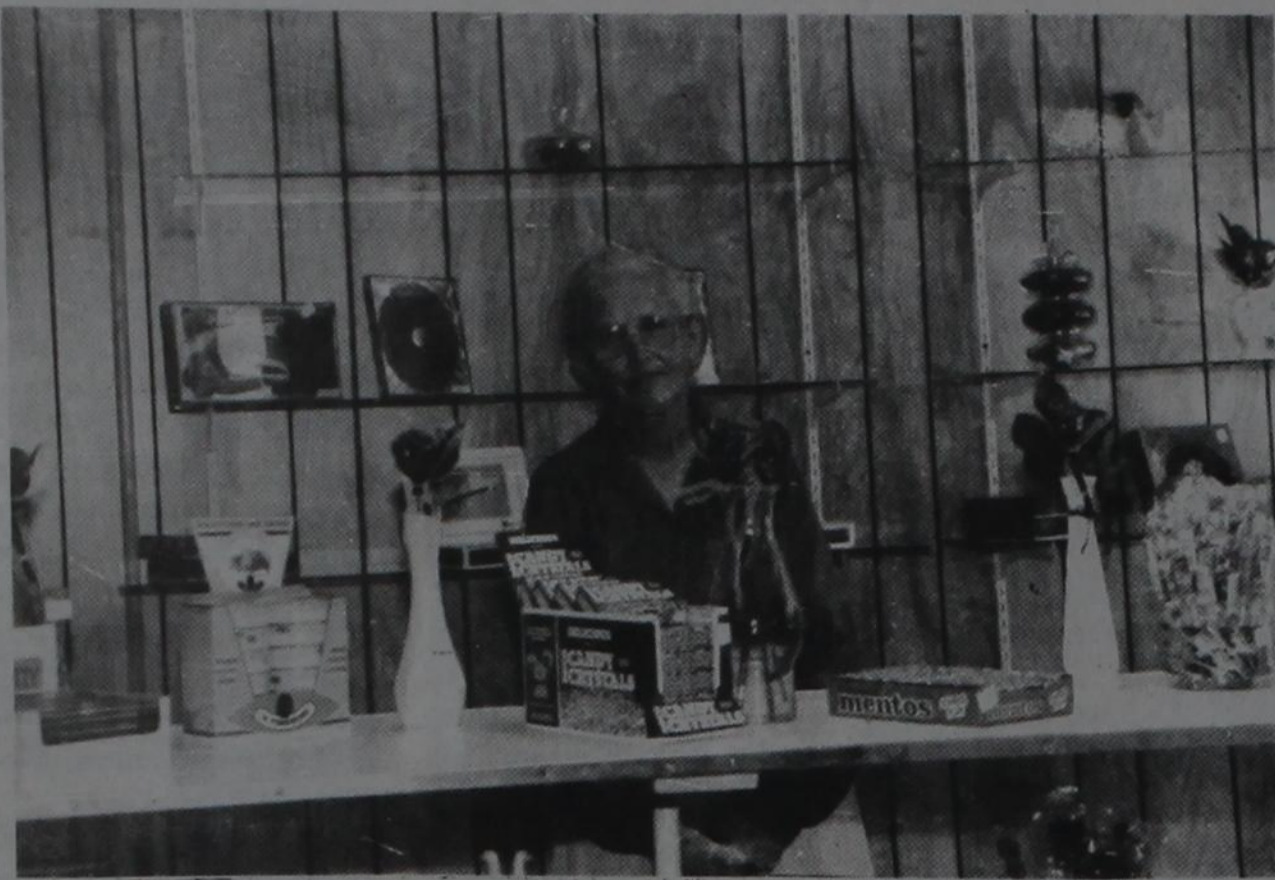
New Charges Filed On Brief Escape

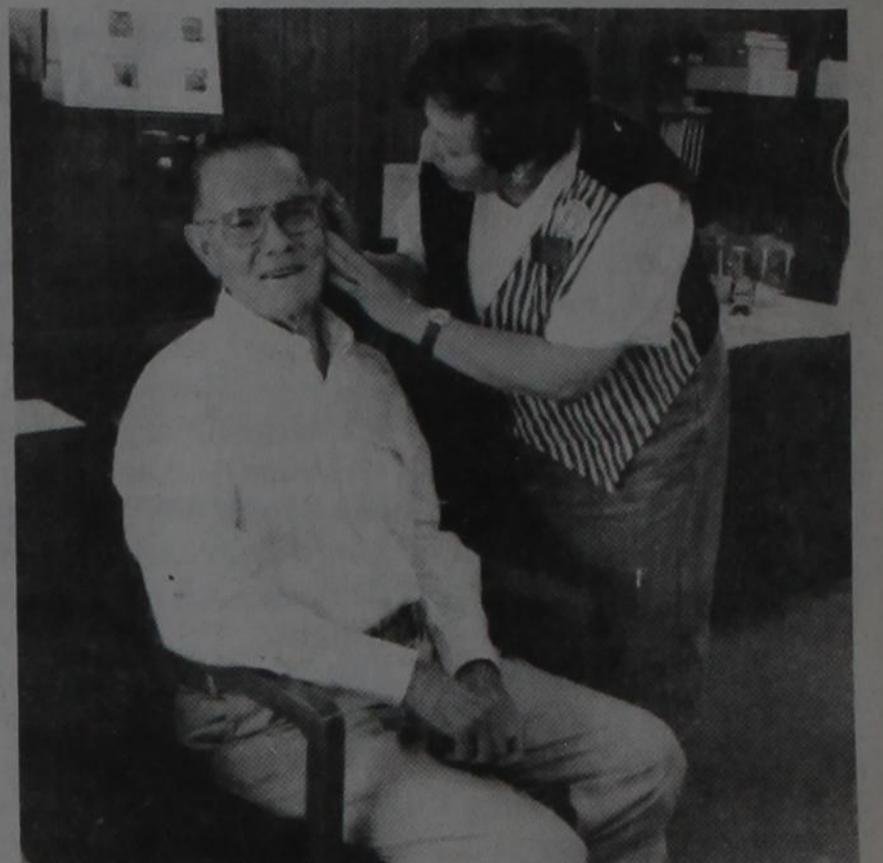

AUSTIN — Attorney General Dan Morales said last week no college or university in Texas should consider race as a factor in admitting students, granting scholarships or giving financial aid.

Morales issued the statement after the U.S. Supreme Court refused to hear a reverse-discrimination case against the University of Texas (Hopwood v. UT Law School) that had been heard in the spring by the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans. The court's ruling applies only to Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi.

Commenting on the issue, UT President Robert Berdahl told the *Austin American-Statesman*, "If anybody believes we can sustain the number (of minorities) without taking race into account, I think they are naive. We can't. And I think that's a loss for the university and a loss for the state."

Berdahl predicted the university will lose "an awful lot of the top minority talent from Texas, who will go out of state" where affirmative action practices continue and minority scholarships will be available.

Clinton Authorizes Drought Aid
President Clinton last week authorized the U.S. Department of Agriculture to sell up to 15 million bushels of grain from reserves in order to make drought disaster assistance payments to farmers in

drought-stricken West Texas and parts of the Southwest.

Though Texans had sought the release of the entire 45 million bushels of feed grain in the emergency reserve, U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison said she was satisfied with the authorization.

"Relief is on the way for Texas farmers and ranchers who have been hit hard by the drought. This will provide direct assistance for those most affected by drought conditions," she said.

The drought has cost Texas farmers and ranchers an estimated \$2.4 billion, making it the second worst natural disaster to hit the state this century, the Associated Press reported.

Report: Dissolve School Boards
A new report by the non-profit research organization, Education Commission for the States, suggests that states dissolve school boards, requiring new elections and sending tax money directly to schools.

The report, "Bending Without Breaking," says that for education to radically improve, the system governing schools must radically change.

Gov. George W. Bush signed the report's foreword but does not necessarily endorse it. Last week, at an Education Commission for the States conference in San Antonio, Bush told reporters he had not read the report, but said he endorsed only the parts of the report that agree with the changes in Texas, such as the establishment charter schools and less power in central education agencies.

Texas Education Commissioner Mike Moses, who also attended the conference, said that sending tax money directly to the schools could cause as many problems as it cures, the *Dallas Morning News* reported.

Moses said that if schools were granted such autonomy, there are questions about who would sit on the committees controlling the money and who would hold them accountable.

"Are we going to open up 6,300 new bureaucracies?" Moses asked, and suggested that it might cost schools more if they were to individually negotiate contracts for services, such as food service, bus transportation and copy machine repairs.

Rail Merger Plan Draws Fire
Texas officials and others last week urged the Federal Surface Transportation Board to reject a plan merging the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific railroads.

"It's going to hurt Texas. It's going to hurt our ability to compete," Texas Railroad Commissioner Barry Williamson told the three-member board.

"In Texas, this railroad (merger) is about as welcome as the drought we're experiencing," U.S. Rep. Lloyd Doggett, D-Austin, said. Union Pacific and Southern Pacific own nearly all of the rail lines from Interstate 35, east.

But the Texas Railroad Commission and other Texas officials would be content if the board approves the merger on the condition that Union Pacific and Southern Pacific sell some of their parallel lines to competing railroad companies, such as Consolidated Rail Corp., the *Austin American-Statesman* reported.

Texas, Mexico to Fight TB
Because U.S. and Mexican communities along the Rio Grande have unusually high rates of tuberculosis, Texas authorities and their counterparts from the Mexican state of Coahuila are taking action.

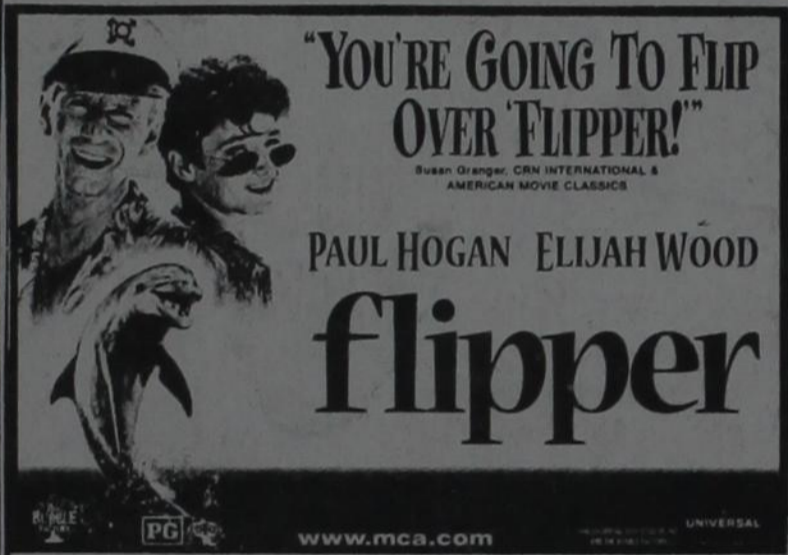
Texas Commissioner of Health Dr. David Smith and officials from Saltillo, Mexico signed an agreement last week to fight the spread of the disease.

Officials from both states will coordinate and share information on TB cases and contacts, work together to diagnose and place TB patients in treatment and increase access to needed prescription drugs.

"As my border colleagues and I know all too well, disease respects no borders," Smith said.

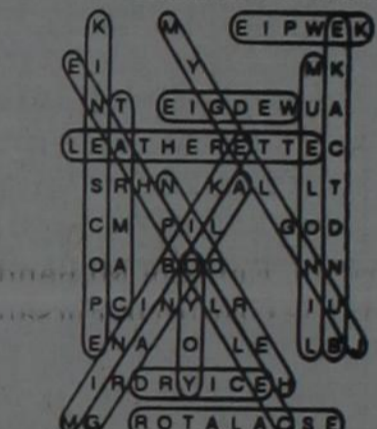
Moran had a very nice quiet Independence Day, due to the weather conditions. Very little coming and going was done. A few fireworks were on display, but not very many.

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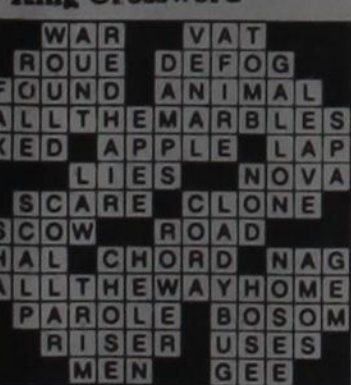

The Commissioners authorized Judge Scott Bailey and Hazelip to prepare papers to make the insurance benefits separate and not a part of salaries.

Mr. and Mrs. Alvis Scitern of Precinct 3 came to get information on what to do about getting sand moved from property adjacent to a rural road.

Precinct 1 Commissioner Ken Lyerla said it wouldn't be legal to go on private property and move the sand.

Scitern also asked who determines when a road can be closed. He was told the various procedures beginning with securing a petition with the names of eight property owners in the Precinct.

Pat Patterson also discussed roads with the Court. He requested information about the closing on several unused streets and alleys on an 18 acre tract right outside the city limits, east side of Ranger.

This property is adjacent to Highway 80, and was once laid out as a subdivision.

Patterson said he was surprised there was any opposition to closing of certain streets and alleys. He said he came here hopefully to reconcile plans with a resident of that area, a Mrs. Clough, who was also in the courtroom.

Mrs. Clough appeared to have no objection to streets and alleys being closed on Patterson's property, but was mainly concerned with access to her home on a county road in the area.

Precinct 2 Commissioner Calvin Ainsworth said he would be meeting with Patterson and Mrs. Clough Wednesday morning and look over the situation.

Judge Bailey said that relinquishments of the streets and alleys by the County would need to be placed on an agenda before being finalized.

These are expected to be on the agenda for the July 22 Commissioners meeting.

Precinct 4 Commissioner Reggie Pittman brought up the topic of fire ant control. He said the ants were supposed to dislike hot weather, but this summer they were worse than ever! He said the County Agent had booklets on how to control them, but no supplies for the public.

He suggested some of the feed stores or Wal Mart as possible commercial suppliers of products to kill the ants.

On another item, Treasurer Ruth Hart gave her quarterly report, and this was approved by the Commissioners.

She said the report will be published in the Gorman paper this time, following the plan of rotating among newspapers in the county.

Precinct 2 Commissioner Calvin Ainsworth was authorized to hire a janitor for the Courthouse to replace one who had resigned recently.

Commissioner Pittman's jail report looked somewhat better this time. It showed that 25 inmates were being held, instead of the usual 28 or more. Eight of the current inmates are ready for TDC, with six awaiting trial.
