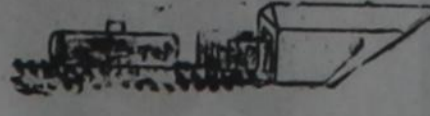

What appeared to be general showers were settling in on Eastland County Friday morning, coming in from the south.

By 9:30 a.m. Friday a total of 21 inches had been reported in Eastland, with similar amounts in different areas of the County.

Citizens are asked to do no outside watering at all between the hours of 10 a.m. and 8 p.m.

The ranchers are particularly hard hit by this current drought, for they have been contending with other unpleasant factors along with it. Not the least of these are political decisions affecting the cattle market and world trade.

All hoped these soaking rains would continue, and the cooler weather which went along with them.

This may sound bad, but from a line north and south of Abilene to the west things are even more serious. In response to requests from Gov. George W. Bush, the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture has named 22 Texas counties as natural disaster areas due to drought.

But at least Eastland county didn't have to worry about a hurricane, like folks on the East Coast.

"Disappointing" was the word for the weather in Eastland County this week.

These counties and more than 59 adjacent counties are eligible for aid through the Farm Service Agency (FSA).

But, like H. V. O. advertises in "Tidbits," Wanted: Thorough, ground-soaking, tank/lake-filling and drought-breaking rain!

It was especially disappointing Tuesday, and after, when the brassy skies changed and promised so much.

The affected counties include some fairly close to Eastland County, such as Jones, Fisher and San Saba.

Hunter Safety Course To Be Held July 26-28 At TSTC

A Hunter Safety Education course is being offered at Texas State Technical College. The course will be taught July 26, 27, 28. The registration deadline is July 24th.

The complete course is open to adults and youngsters and will include instruction in rifle, shotgun and bowhunting handling and safety. Students will also learn about hunting laws and regulations, conservation, outdoor ethics, hunting traditions, wildlife identification, first aid and survival. The course will be taught by Billy Holt and Gary Doyle, certified Hunter Safety Education instructors.

A new aspect of the hunter safety program this year is the walk-through field course which will give the students the opportunity to experience some simulated hunting situations, such as crossing fences, climbing tree-stands and wildlife identification.

More than a 3/4 million Texans have already been certified as safety hunters taught similar hunter safety education courses. The

course is mandatory to 49 states before a hunting license can be purchased.

Students 17 years of age and older completing the 15-hour course will be issued a Hunter Safety card from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. The course fee is \$5 per student to cover registration and materials. Quail Unlimited will pay the \$5 fee for students 17 years and younger.

The Hunter Safety Education course will meet at TSTC on Friday, July 26 from 6-10 p.m., on Saturday,

July 27 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., and on Sunday July 28 from 1-5 p.m. Those interested in the course will need to pay as soon as possible since there are a limited number of openings available and enrollment is based on a first come, first serve basis. No telephone enrollments will be accepted.

Registration is at the TSTC-Breckenridge Campus located at 307 North Breckenridge Avenue. For more information about the course, call Sherry Holly at TSTC, (817) 559-6556, or course instructor Billy Holt at 559-8010.

Eastland Mission Team Follows Livingstone To Africa

Seven years before the outbreak of America's Civil War, a Scottish doctor named David Livingstone ignited the imagination of the entire English-speaking world. Through lectures and books he described his missionary work in southern Africa, and numbers of young adults caught the excitement of world missions.

About 150 years later, a mission team from Eastland, Texas, committed to walk where Livingstone walked. On June 9, 1996, the team of 9 prepared to leave Eastland for 2 weeks. Together they read the same passage of Scripture that Livingstone read with his family before he left for Africa: Psalm 121.

Our first stop was London, where the team took advantage of a 15-hour layover to do some sightseeing. From atop a traditional English double-decker bus, we took in some of the historic sights of London. We especially wanted to see Westminster Abbey. Some of England's most famous personalities are buried in the very floor and walls of this building, including the man whose steps we were following - David Livingstone. When Livingstone died shortly after his 60th birthday in 1873, his body was shipped back to England from Africa and buried here. But out of love his African companions literally buried his heart in Africa--the place now known as Zambia.

And Zambia was our next stop. We spent our first day and evening simply getting settled to our temporary home and culture, which included learning to use Zambian currency. That took some getting

used to, considering it took 1,224 Zambia Kwacha to equal one American dollar. After we were given a brief orientation to Zambian culture and to our assignments, seven of the missionary families welcomed us with a Baptist custom that is the same all over the world: a pot luck supper.

After the meal, our mission team divided for the week's work. Dr. Bob Matthews, his 13-year-old daughter Charlotte, and Pastor Danny Brown, traveled with Mike and Lindy Howard to their home about 45-minutes north-east of Lusaka. Mike and Lindy live in the rural area of Chongwe. That is, when they are not visiting some point in their mission field. Mike is a church developer with the Southern Baptist Convention's International Mission Board. He is responsible for starting churches and training leaders in a 250-square mile area. For the next several days, Bob, Charlotte and Pastor Danny would assist the Howards in Chongwe and in Shikabeta, a 3-hour drive further northeast.

Bob Matthews' skills as a physician were greatly appreciated by the nationals. And while medical needs were being met, so were spiritual needs. During the day, Charlotte Matthews and Pastor Danny Brown spent time making evangelistic visits with Mike Howard. On Friday and Saturday evenings, Pastor Danny preached a crusade with the aid of an interpreter.

The other six members of the mission team served in Lusaka: Pastor Tom Goodman, Terri Harris, 15 year-old Amy Harris, Betty Hughes, Loys Allmand, and Bryan Neaves. Their mission

work was in a setting that was quite different than Chongwe and Shikabeta. Over a million people are found in Zambia's capital city.

These six served with Southern Baptist missionary Joe Barbour and national pastor Meshack Zulu. Pastor Joe and Pastor Meshack serve the International Baptist Church. While the church currently rents a girl's school on Sundays in the Kbweta suburb, several of the families have begun a new congregation on their own property in the Olympia Park suburb. Even though the building is still under construction, services are already underway at the new site. Together with several of the church's members, the mission team made evangelistic visits in the community. Several were won to the Lord and many were invited to the weekend crusade.

The weekend crusade was held at the new church site, even though the building is still without a roof. The congregation gathered in the open, which was really quite comfortable for this time of year. June is a winter month for Zambia. The temperature hardly rises above 70 degrees during the day and at night the temperature can drop to 45 degrees. As the sun set, charcoal-burning stoves called mbaulas were set throughout the congregation and we continued to worship under the constellation of the Southern Cross.

Zambian Acapella, Jr. attended one of the services. Their affiliate group, Zambian Acapella, toured through Eastland in December of 1995.

Our mission team members were encouraged to participate in the crusade. Brian Neaves, who is a black belt in TaiKwonDo, gave his testimony in

connection with a martial arts demonstration. Terri Harris also gave a moving personal testimony which God used to help at least one woman make a major life decision. If brought the evenings' messages. No interpreter was needed in the city, since the official language is English. Of course, there's a difference between Zambian English and Texas English! I made a reference to clothing in one of my messages and almost began talking about the pants the ladies of the mission team were wearing. That would have created quite a controversy since in Zambia, pants is a reference to underwear!

The Lusaka team stayed very busy. In addition to the evangelistic visits and the weekend crusade, Loys Allmand toured some of the Zambian schools. This was of particular interest to Loys, who has just retired from her many years as Eastland's elementary school principal.

Amy Harris helped with the Backyard Bible Clubs conducted by the pastor's wife Carol Barbour. Amy taught children how to make a Power Band, which is a bracelet with colored beads that is used to tell the plan of salvation.

Betty Hughes was asked to lead a ladies meeting at the church. She stressed the importance of each Christian being involved in missions.

The Baptist Theological Seminary invited me to lead a seminar based on my book, *The Intentional Minister*. About 25 pastors and seminary students joined me for a 3-hour study on the bibli-

cal role of the pastor.

On Sunday morning, we worshipped with our new friends. Bryan Neaves and the Texas Highway Department provided us with a Texas flag that has flown over Eastland. We inscribed the names of our mission team along the margin and gave the flag to the International Baptist Church.

After Sunday morning worship in Chongwe, Bob and Charlotte and Pastor Danny returned to Lusaka. That afternoon, several of the nationals surprised us with a dinner party. They taught us how to eat Nshima, a thick corn meal, and Ndiwo, a general word for various forms of relish such as okra, rape, and fish called kapenta. They also provided each lady with a chitngay, which is a ladies wrap, and they taught us some of the songs that we had come to love. This written report simply cannot do justice to the beautiful a capella music of Zambia.

The next day the mission team traveled about 7 hours southwest to Victoria Falls at the

border of Zambia and Zimbabwe. Several of us toured a game park and then in the evening we went to a restaurant where we could put on our plate almost everything we saw at the game park: kudu, impala, eland, warthog, crocodile, and mupone. What's mupone, you ask? Fat, barbecued caterpillars. Talk about having butterflies in your stomach!

Our time at Victoria Falls was absolutely breath-taking. If you can imagine a mile-wide river dropping off a thirty-story building, you can begin to get a picture in your mind of this spectacular place. Nationals call it Mosilotunya, which mean "smoke that thunders." That's because of the huge plume of mist and the rumbling that rises up when all of that water tumbles into this narrow gorge. Livingstone was the first white man to see these falls, and in a burst of British patriotism, named them "Victoria Falls," after his queen, Victoria.

I tried to imagine what it must have been like for Livingstone to come upon these falls 150 years ago and introduce them to the

Western World. It was a fitting place for us to conclude our walk along the path of David Livingstone. Just like him, we hope the report of our African travels will inspire others to consider the adventure of foreign missions. And just like Livingstone, we left behind a bit of our heart in Zambia.

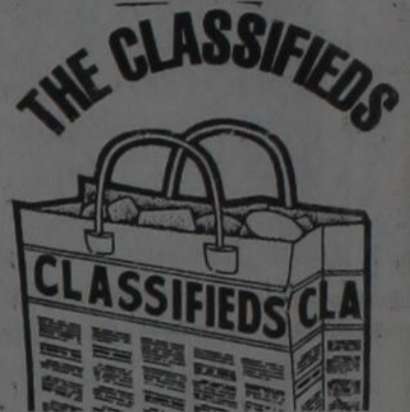

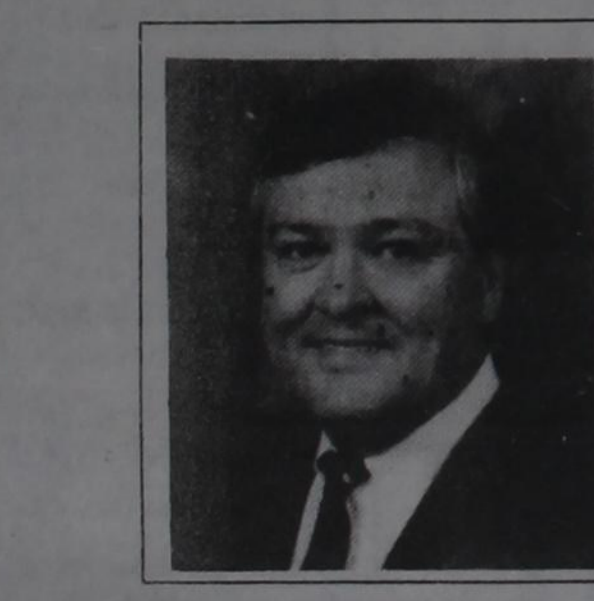

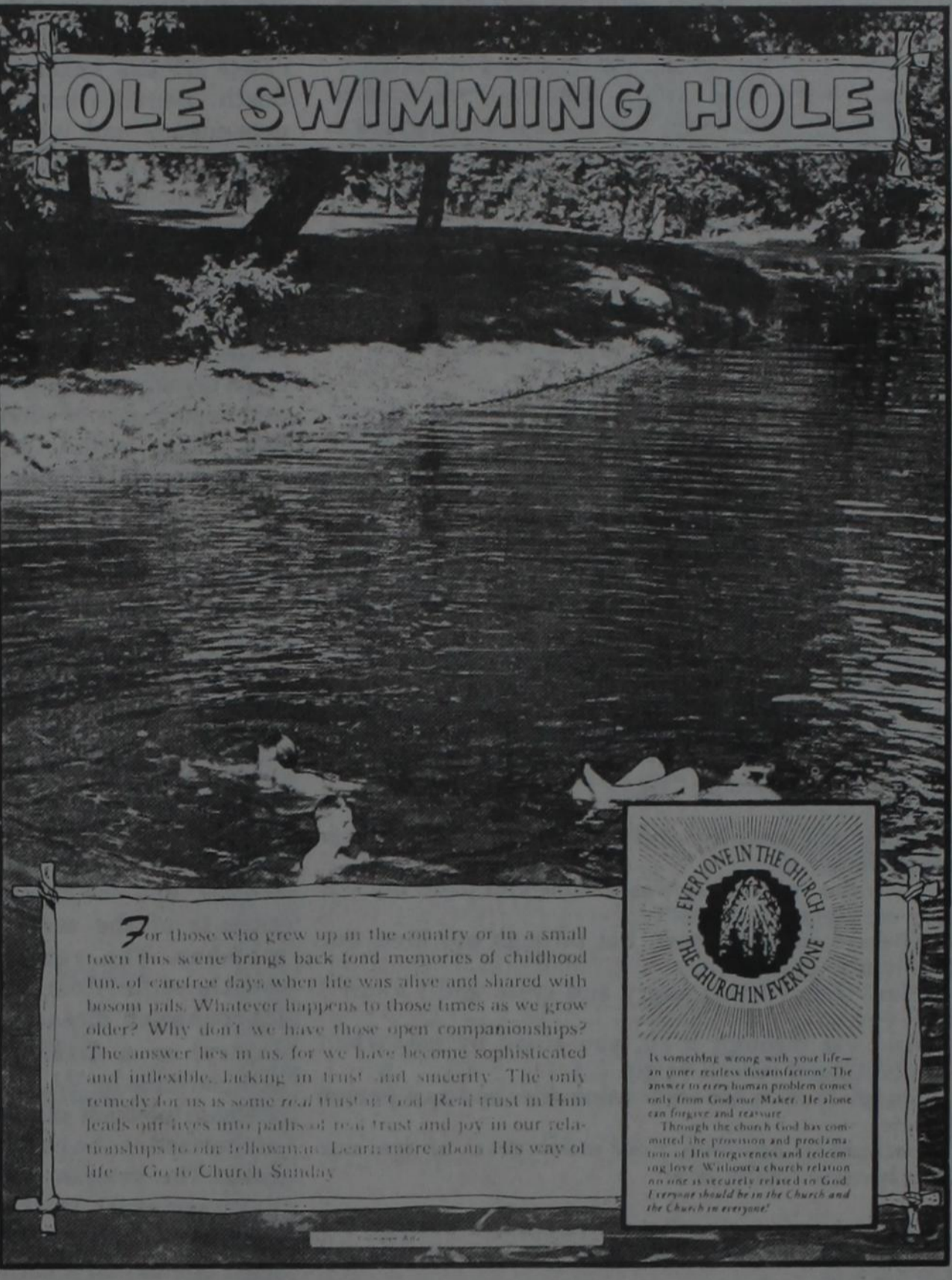

VA Benefits For Widows And Dependents

Widows of disabled veterans are entitled to VA Benefits depending on the type of disability and the cause of the veterans death. Benefits include dependency and indemnity compensation (DIC), death pension, education assistance, home loan guarantees, and reimbursement for burial expenses. In addition, the State of Texas provides some benefits for widows and dependents of veterans. These include employment and reemployment preference, education assistance in state schools, tax exemptions, and special license plates. Most state benefits are only available when the veteran died during Active Duty or is MIA/POW.

DIC benefits may be authorized for surviving spouses, unmarried children under 18 (23 if in school), and low-income parents of the service-member. The veteran must have died from service-connected disease or injury, or a disability compensable by VA.

Death pension may be authorized on the basis of need. The veteran must have served at least 90 days in Active Service, at least one day in a period

of war, and be discharged under conditions other than dishonorable.

Education benefits are available to spouses and children of veterans who died on Active Duty, are permanently and totally disabled due to Active Duty, or are MIA/POW.

Unremarried spouses of veterans who died from service-connected disabilities or are listed as MIA/POW may be eligible for a GI Loan guarantee to buy a home.

VA will pay \$300 burial allowance for veterans who were receiving or were entitled to receive compensation or pension payments at the time of death. When the death is due to service connected causes, the allowance will be \$1500. In addition, a plot allowance of \$150 is available for veterans with a service-connected disability or who were drawing compensation or pension at the time of death.

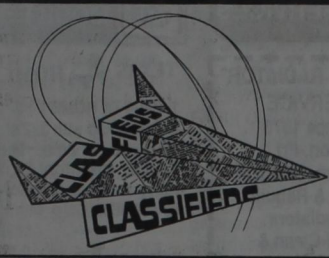

Household Help by John Amantea

Q. Realizing that living in a 65-year-old house presents problems along the way, I would like to explain my situation to you. We moved here 21 years ago and noticed a few minor cracks in this totally-tiled (floor) house. Never did we realize that these cracks would get so bad.

The worst area where the tiles are 9"x9" in size is badly cracked. The cracks extend through 12 tiles (108 inches). The others are bad and seem to grow just as rapidly.

My main concern is, are we in any danger of a sinking floor? We are situated on a slight incline with part of the house virtually sitting on the ground. Can you give me any thoughts?

A. I also take a 65-year-old house into consideration because of its age. A building this old is apt to have structural problems of one sort or another.

You didn't mention any water or seepage problems from beneath your floor, so we'll rule that out. I can also guess that a good majority of your home is situated on a poured concrete wall or foundation blocks. Even though a portion of your house is sitting on the ground, this shouldn't have an adverse effect as far as those cracks are concerned.

The biggest dilemma you have is structural settlement. Although I haven't inspected your home personally, the extent of the cracks you have described proves so. This kind of problem is often common, but I suspect a more serious concern in your case. You have also made mention that the cracks grow as rapidly as the others, which could be significant.

At this point, I cannot give you any methods of repair due to the possibly serious nature of the problem. I also could not give you a conclusive answer whether your floor is in any danger of actually sinking.

In my opinion, it would be a wise investment to have a home inspection engineer come in and assess your problem. I can give you no easy answers from my end.

Saving for retirement is crucial for women. Even small amounts can go toward U. S. savings bonds or mutual funds with an automatic savings plan. If you have more money to work with, diversify your holdings among several types of investments. The younger you are, the more you should consider growth investments, which are likely to increase your nest egg in excess of the inflation rate. True, your strategy may change over time, depending on your age, total assets, tax bracket, and tolerance for risk. But you should never totally stop investing for growth.

Of course, picking winning investments isn't the only goal of good financial planning. Adequate insurance is also essential. For example, disability is far more common among middle-aged people than death, yet disability insurance is often overlooked. Consider supplementing any employer's coverage with your own policy. Most people aim to replace 60%-80% of pretax income, since disability payouts are generally tax-free. A disability policy should cover partial disability as well as total disability. You should be able to save money on premiums by opting for a longer waiting period before receiving benefits.

If you have dependents, you need enough life insurance to protect them. This is true even if you're a married stay-at-home mom, if your absence as caregiver would create financial hardship for your family.

Finally, prepare an estate plan that meets your needs. Review it with your accountant and your attorney every few years to ensure that you stay current with the tax law and changes in your personal circumstances.

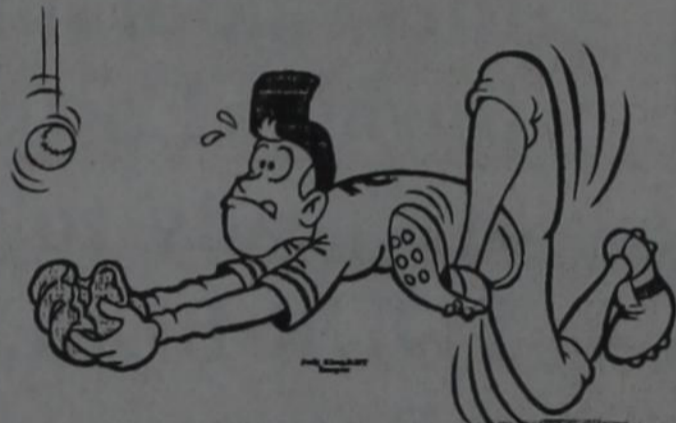

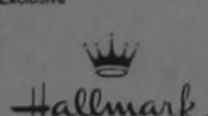

Crime And Violence, Pregnancy, Drug And Alcohol Abuse: Leading Concerns Among Young Teens

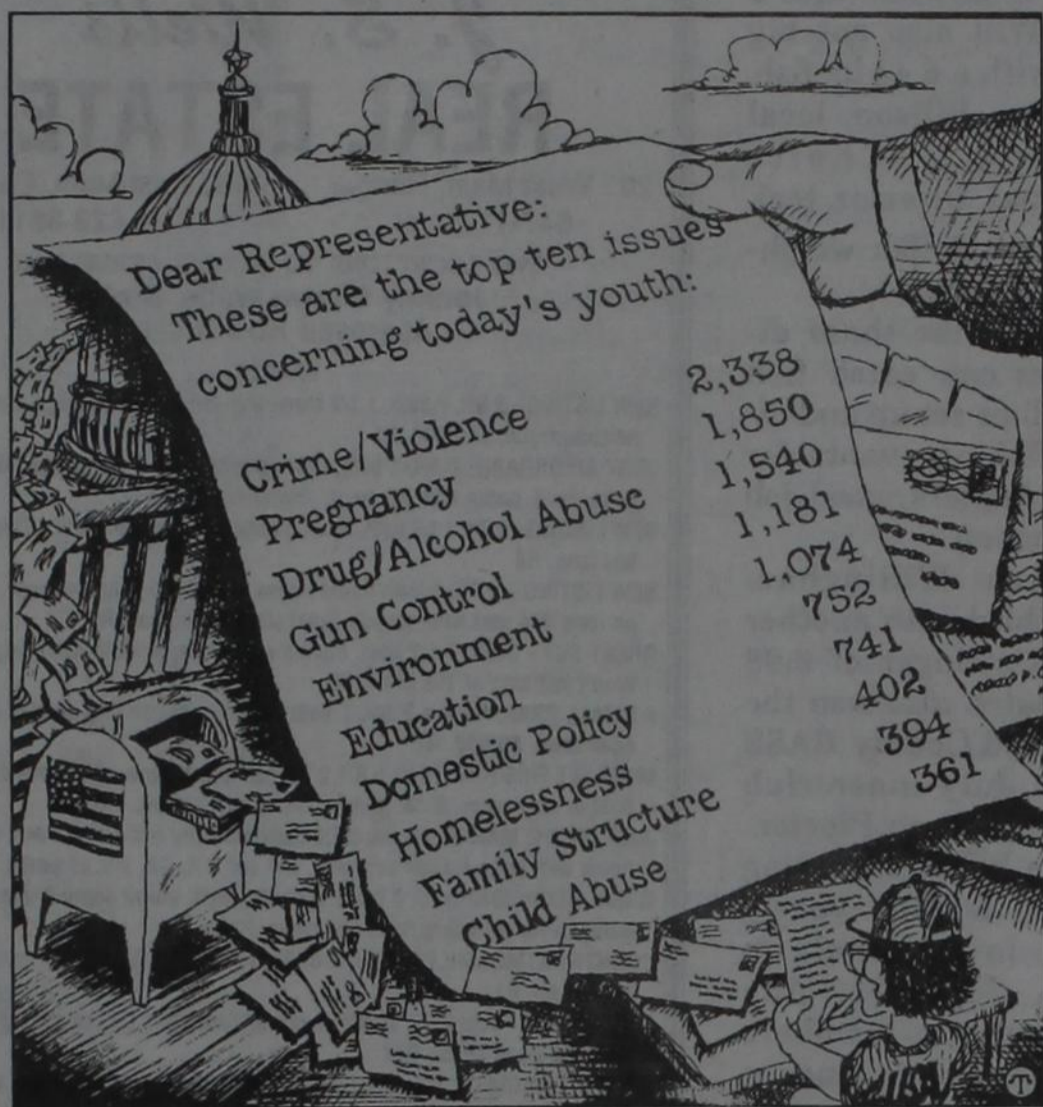
(NAPS)—Crime and violence is the top public policy concern among today's young teenagers, followed by pregnancy issues and drug/alcohol abuse. This ranking of concerns is based on more than 13,000 letters written by seventh- and eighth-graders to their U.S. representatives through the seventh annual RespecTeen Speak for Yourself social studies curriculum.

This is the second consecutive year the topic of crime and violence has led the list of teenage concerns. Just three years ago, it was only the seventh most frequently mentioned issue by students. Among other notable developments this year, family structure became a priority issue for young teens, ranking ninth on the list. This marks the first time that family has been mentioned as a leading area of concern. Some issues discussed under this topic include communication, divorce and runaways. Reflecting another significant change, AIDS did not make the top 10 list of teenage issues in 1995, but ranked 15th. AIDS was the number one concern of students in 1990 and, until now, the topic had consistently ranked among the top 10.

"Clearly, the views of the nation's young people are shifting and they are very concerned about the growing crime rate and violence around them," noted Barbara Glass, author of the RespecTeen Speak for Yourself curriculum. "Their rising interest in family structures also indicates a growing awareness of social and family issues. This may be due, in part, to recent changes in our political landscape."

The top 10 issues and the number of letters students wrote about each issue are:

- 1) Crime/Violence 2,338
- 2) Pregnancy Issues 1,850
- 3) Drug/Alcohol Abuse 1,540
- 4) Gun Control 1,181
- 5) Environment 1,074
- 6) Education 752
- 7) Domestic Policy 741



- 8) Homelessness 402
- 9) Family Structure 394
- 10) Child Abuse 361

"We're pleased to see young people voicing their opinions on issues that are important to them. By encouraging youth to speak out, we help empower them to more fully participate in our democratic process," said Ellen Albee, director of Lutheran Brotherhood's RespecTeen program. "Writing letters is an educational process for many students, but more importantly, reading the letters helps decision-makers understand and address teens' concerns."

"Writing these letters to their U.S. representatives allows young teens the opportunity to voice their fears and hopes for the future and to offer their own solutions," said Glass. "Through their involvement, they experience

democracy hands-on and become empowered to take action."

The RespecTeen Speak for Yourself curriculum was distributed to social studies teachers nationwide last fall. The curriculum encourages young people to examine the issues affecting their lives, teaches them how they can play a role in government decision-making and helps them work toward change in social issues.

The RespecTeen National Youth Forum is part of Lutheran Brotherhood's larger philanthropic initiative in support of youth. 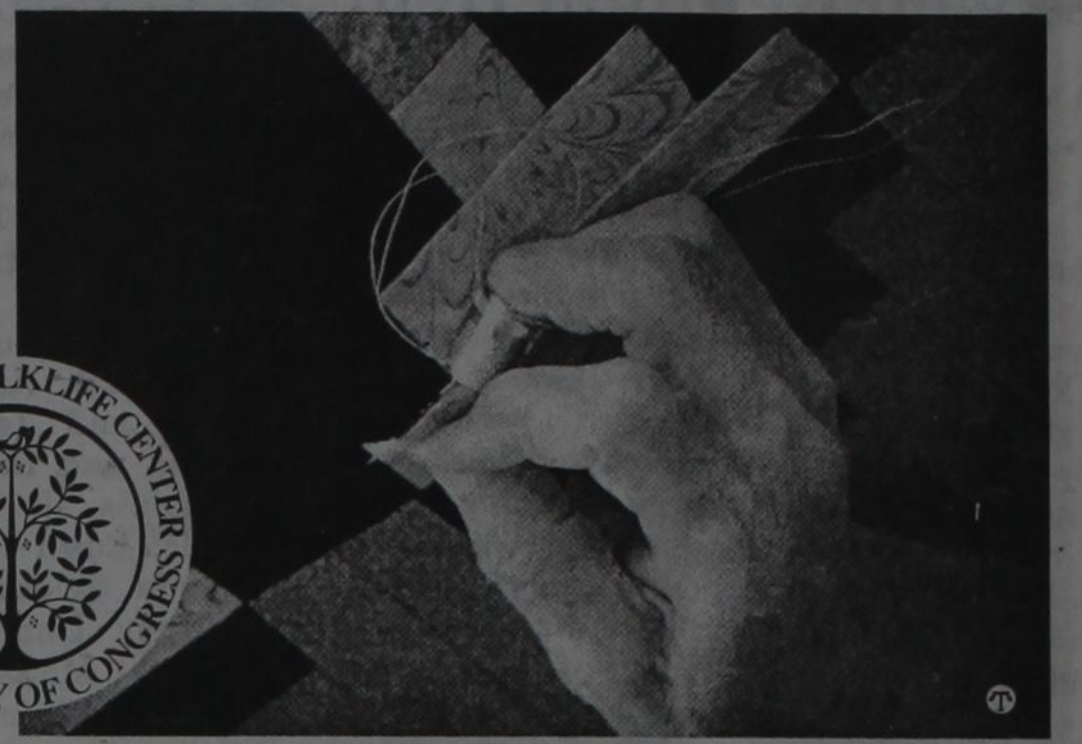
Quilting Contest Sews Up Interest Of Social Historians

(NAPS)—Quilters used to enter a contest to win a blue ribbon and a handshake from the judge. Today, America's top quilters command prizes upward of \$10,000, through competitions like the All American Quilt Contest sponsored by *Good Housekeeping* magazine and Coming Home, a division of the catalog merchant Lands' End.

This time, the ante will be raised yet again: In addition to monetary prizes, participating quilters will gain national recognition from the Library of Congress. The contest theme, "If Quilts Could Talk," goes to the heart of what quilting reveals about everyday American life, according to Alan Jabbour, director of the Library of Congress' American Folklife Center.

"Quilts, combined with other historical research, offer folklorists an important glimpse into the life and times of the maker," says Jabbour. "These quilts and their stories will be studied by scholars in the future."

The contest marks the third pairing of *Coming Home* with *Good Housekeeping* as co-sponsors of the national quilting competition. Participating quilters are asked to provide a photograph or slide of their entry, along with a brief, 100-word essay detailing the story behind their creation.

"A traditional legacy of the quilter is warmth and beauty that can link a family through many generations," says Cecelia Toth, needlework director with the *Good Housekeeping* Institute. "We're excited to learn that the Library of Congress thinks the contest can have much broader social and historical significance."

The deadline for the third All American Quilt Contest is March 28, 1996. Winners will be announced in the October, 1996, issue of *Good*

Housekeeping, with prizes awarded as follows: National first prize, \$10,000; second prize, \$3,000; third prize, \$2,000. In addition, the top entrant from each state and the District of Columbia—along with five "judges choice" winners—will receive a \$100 Coming Home certificate.

Fresh Ideas In Shrimp

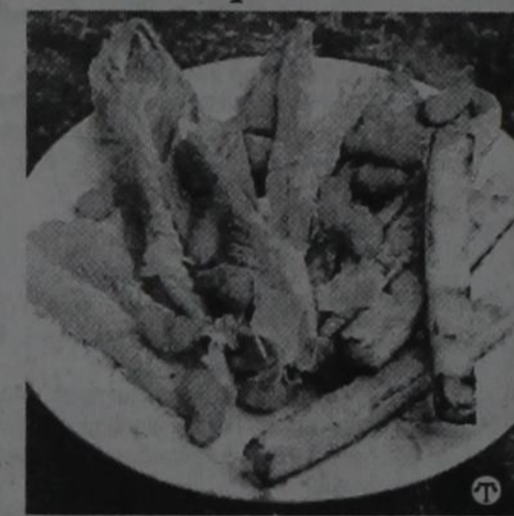

 juice from 1" lemon
 3/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
 1/4 cup freshly shaved Parmesan cheese
 12 4 inch x 1 inch cuts of French or Italian bread, brushed with olive oil and grilled
