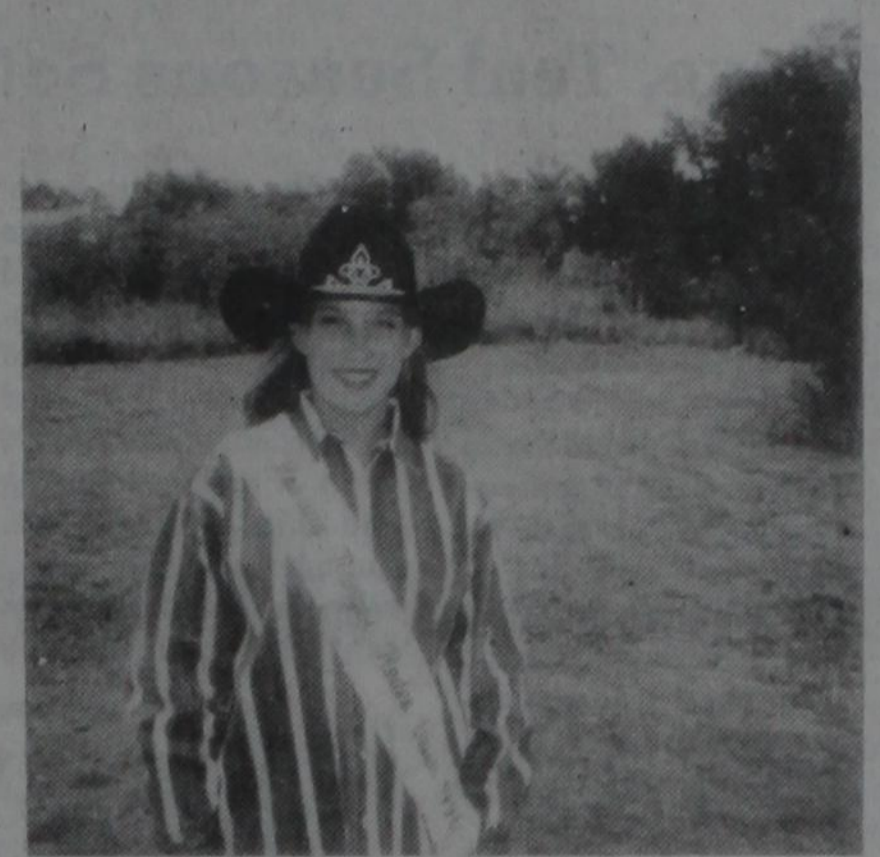

\$3+ Million Budget, Tax Hike Due To Be Sept. 9th

Eastland County Commissioners Monday came a step closer to finalizing the budget for the next fiscal year, which begins Oct. 1. County Judge Scott Bailey suggested Sept. 9

"I believe we have everything worked out," Ainsworth told the Court. The Cloughs were to give their final word Monday afternoon. All appeared to be pleased with the relinquishment. Also approved was a request by Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. to lay a telephone cable along and across County Road 119 (Lake Bernie Road) in Pct. 4, North of Cisco. Pct. 4 Comm. Reggie Pittman said the Company would bury the line according to requirements.

Another item brought up by Pittman did not result in any action. He reported on problems in connection with Curtis Cemetery Road, south part of his Precinct. "There's not road signs on it, nothing" Pittman said. "I would like to get it declared a County Road."

He said that several places in the road go through a gate, but the landowner said he could open the gates. "People want a way to get to the Cemetery," Pittman stated. Heshowed the Commissioners a photograph of the road that ends at the Cemetery. "It looks like you have to build a road!" One Commissioner remarked. "There goes your budget!" "Well, it needs work - no question about it!" Another said. The matter was tabled for the present. On another item Shanah Coe, representing Zee Safety Company, brought a sample of her products to the Courtroom. This Company has a number of first aid, safety, and training products and services.

Some exceptions were made, such as possible utility easements. The end of Young Street will not be closed, giving access to the home of Mrs. Harold Clough.

Mrs. Clough, her son Eric, and Mr. and Mrs. Pat Patterson were at the Court session. On July 15 Pat Patterson made a request for County relinquishment, indicating that most of the streets and alleys were not in use.

He showed the Commissioners a photograph of

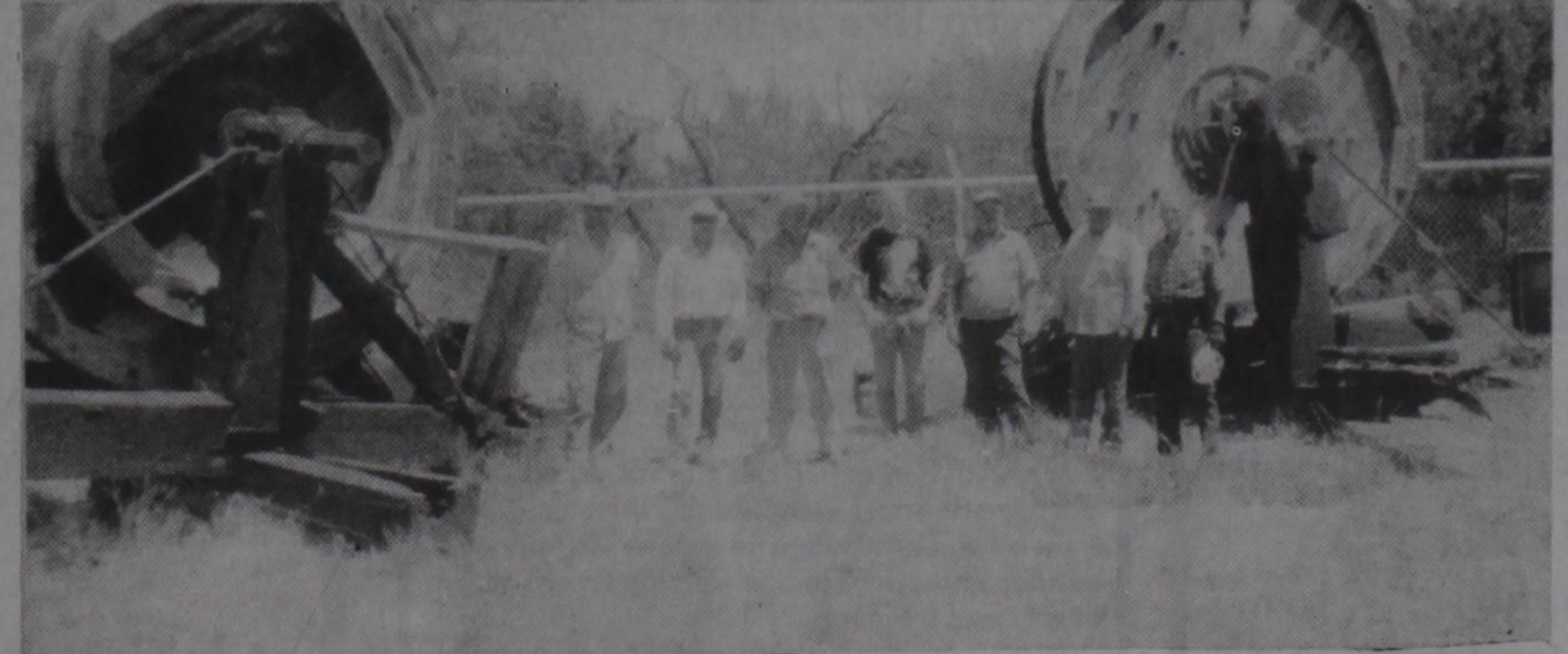
On Courthouse matters, Tax Assessor/Collector Sandra Cagle told of her need for more help in her office.

Dove, Teal Seasons Set

Austin—The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission adopted a Sept. 14-22 teal hunting season, with the provision that an additional seven days would be added to the end of the season if approved by the FWS in early August.

The bag limit for teal will also remain at four birds per day and eight in possession, unless the FWS approves more liberal bag limits.

Noteworthy changes to the Migratory Game Bird Proclamation approved by the Commission include allowing the taking of waterfowl from floating craft when forward progress by sail or motor has ceased, retaining the 60 day mourning dove season with a 15 dove daily bag limit, and dropping the "feathered wing" requirement for doves in the South Zone.

Last year a wing was required to remain attached to doves while being transported between the place taken and the person's home for species identification. This restriction has not been in effect in the Central and North Zones. The change in regulations provides consistency statewide to assist in law enforcement efforts.

Dates for mourning doves are Sept. 1-Oct. 30 in the North Zone; Sept. 1-Oct. 19, Dec. 26-Jan. 5 in the Central Zone; and Sept. 20-Nov. 7, Dec. 26-

Jan. 5 in the South Zone.

The white-winged dove season is Sept. 7, 8, 14, and 15 in the Special White-winged Dove Area of South Texas. Bag and possession limits are 10 white-winged, mourning and white-tipped doves in the aggregate, including no more than five mourning doves and two

whitetails per day. Shooting hours will be noon to sunset.

As last year, the rail and gallinules hunting seasons will remain concurrent with the waterfowl

seasons. Season dates are Sept. 14-22 and Nov. 9-Jan. 8. General waterfowl season regulations will be set by the Commission at its August public meeting.

The Department of Veterans' Affairs (VA) Community Care Clinic in Abilene opened Monday at the Abilene Regional Hospital Complex and will be staffed by VA personnel permanently, according to an announcement by Congressman Charles Stenholm.

The VA Clinic was moved from Abilene Diagnostic Clinic, and soon will serve the entire 17th District which includes Eastland County, Congressman Stenholm told this newspaper Monday. This county was not

originally included in the recently-opened Abilene VA Clinic.

Counties generally west and north of Eastland County are presently served by the Abilene facility.

Until further announcement, local veterans should continue utilizing regular VA facilities out of Waco - 1-800-827-1000.

"This move is a mark of the VA's long-term commitment to the veterans of West Central Texas and will enable the VA to carry out its mission in a more cost-effective manner,"

said Stenholm. "We have an obligation to care for the needs of those who served our country," observed Stenholm. "While this expansion is long overdue, the expanded care provided by the new clinic will help us fulfill our commitment to veterans in the Big Country."

RARE DOCUMENT?—Perhaps! It's from newspaper files and the publication date is Nov. 27, 1922. The little 33-page booklet carries a lot of history, a lot of geology and geography. The well tables and logs in the book appear invaluable. The tables list the farms, company, elevation, depths, daily production, dates of completion and other data. Company names include Prairie Oil & Gas, Leon Oil, Hamon and Westheimer, Gulf, States Oil Corp., Texas & Pacific, Magnolia, Tex Rickard, Humble, Sinclair, Sun and many others. On a pick and choose basis, portions of the book will appear in this newspaper and the original will be kept for future archiving.

OIL AND GAS DEVELOPMENT History of the Discovery of the Ranger Field

Prior to 1917 a few shallow wells were drilled in the vicinity of Ranger and Eastland in a search for the sand in which oil had been obtained at Strawn, in Palo Pinto County. These wells, however, were not drilled deep enough to reach the "Black lime," and as no oil was encountered in over-

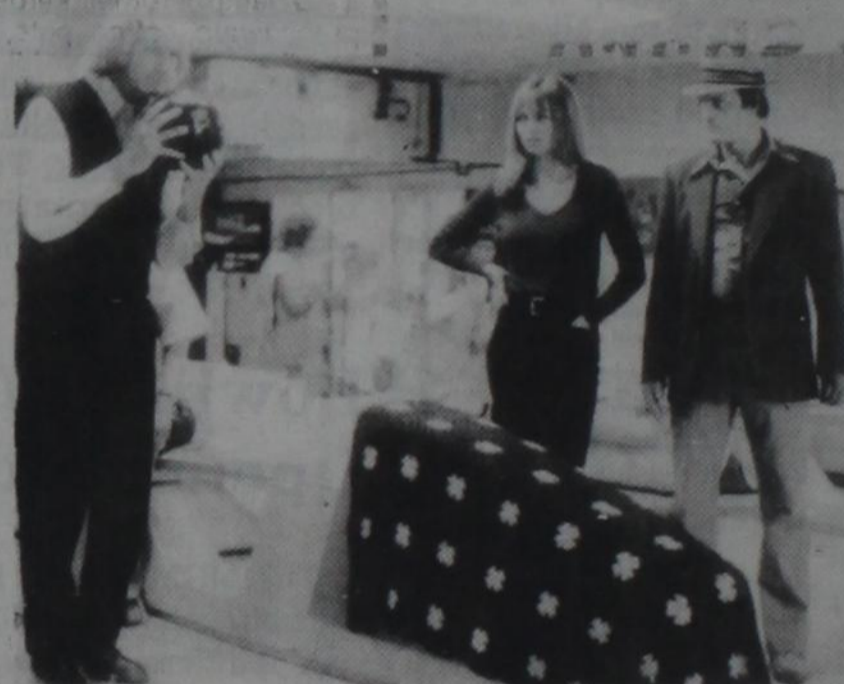
lying formations, the possibility that the area might produce oil was considered to be very slight. On October 30, 1916, however, the Texas Co. discovered oil in the so-called "Smithwick lime" on the Park lease, near Breckenridge, Stephens County. This discovery induced the Texas Pacific Coal Co. to drill a well on the Walker farm, just north of Ranger, Eastland County, and in August, 1917, this well reached the "Black lime," from which considerable gas was obtained. A second well was drilled on the J.H. McClesky farm, 1 mile southwest of Ranger, which on October 11, 1917, penetrated at a depth of 3,431 feet a sandstone about 200 feet below the top of the "Black lime," from which oil began to flow at the rate of 1,200 barrels a day. After this strike development progressed rapidly, resulting in the extension of the Ranger field over several square miles of territory, with a maximum average daily production in July, 1919, of 80,000 barrels, and in the discovery of other important fields in central and northern Texas. In fact, the opening of the Ranger field marked the beginning of probably the most intense activity that has ever occurred in the oil industry in the United

States.

Production and Decline of the Wells

When the field work for this report was finished, July 1, 1920, there were in the area mapped, which included the entire Ranger field with the exception of a dozen or so dry holes and small producers east of the town of Ranger, 850 oil wells, 35 gas wells, 150 dry holes, and 220 wells being drilled. The total production of the field up to that time was about 20,000,000 barrels, which probably represents 75 per cent of the total ultimate production of the field. The maximum daily production of the field (80,000 barrels) was reached in the second week of July, 1919. The daily production July 1, 1920, was about 20,000 barrels. The initial production of the individual wells has been high. The first wells drilled in the different parts of the field came in with 1,000 to 11,000 barrels each, though few exceeded 5,000 barrels, and most of them produced less than 2,500 barrels. Among the largest producers in the field were the Prairie Oil & Gas Co.'s Emma Terrell No. 1 (No. 93 on the map), the Texas Pacific Coal & Oil Co.'s G.E. Norwood No. 1 (No. 196 on the map), and the Ohio Ranger Oil Co.'s Eli Perkins No. 1 (No. 155 on the map). The initial daily production of these wells was of 7,000 11,000, and 8,000 barrels, respectively. The large initial production of the wells decreased rapidly. Some wells produced during the first month one-third of their total output and at the end of twelve months

or less ceased to produce. Thus the ultimate production of the wells is not large, averaging no more than that of wells producing 100 barrels a day for a year. The ultimate production of the entire field will not exceed 1,000 barrels an acre, though some of the most productive leases will recover from 2,500 to 3,500 barrels an acre. Leases that show a greater acreage production than this are apparently drawing oil from adjoining properties. The possibilities of doing this are apparent from the statements of Stephenson and Bennett that the first well drilled on an average-sized lease obtains approximately 75 per cent of the ultimate production of that lease and gets one-third of this during the first month. Thus a well drilled along a property line, if completed one month ahead of the offset well, will probably obtain 25 per cent of the oil recoverable from the adjoining lease. However, the fact that so small a percentage of the ultimate yield is obtainable by the later wells probably is not much the result of the draining of the area by the first well as of lowering of the gas pressure in the sands caused by allowing the gas to flow freely into the air. In the early development of the Ranger field no attempt was made to conserve this gas pressure, and it is probable that the ultimate recovery in this field will be less than one-fourth of the total amount of the oil in the sands. If the gas pressure of the sands had been conserved, a much greater percentage of the oil could have been recovered.

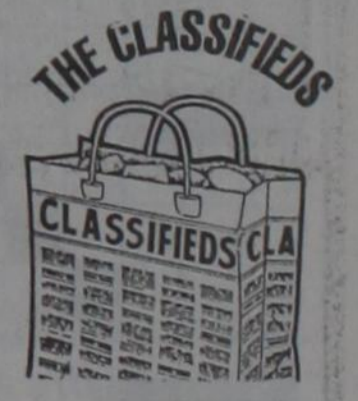

Congressman Stenholm's Position On Welfare Reform Support for Bipartisan Bill; Opposition to Republican Bill

Congressman Stenholm helped author a bipartisan welfare reform alternative that would have eliminated the federal welfare entitlement and turned the program over to the states with tough work requirements and time limits on benefits. The alternative would have reduced federal welfare spending by \$53 billion over the next six years. Most importantly, the Congressional Budget Office found that it was the only welfare proposal that would succeed in moving welfare recipients to work. Finally, it was the only welfare bill which has been promised a Presidential signature. The only way to end the status quo is to pass a bill that can be signed into law.

Congressman Stenholm supported an alternative that was developed by members of both parties working together to craft a welfare reform bill, including Rep. Mike Castle, a Republican and former governor of Delaware, and John Tanner, a conservative Democrat from Tennessee. The goal of Congressman Stenholm and the other members who joined him in this effort was to put aside partisanship to develop a welfare reform bill that would work and could be enacted into law instead

of continuing to use welfare reform as a political issue.

The alternative was a true bipartisan compromise that went much further in reforming welfare programs than many members of the Democratic party wanted to go. In fact, the bipartisan alternative was opposed by several liberal interest groups in Washington.

When a significant number of Republicans expressed interest in joining Congressman Stenholm in support of this bipartisan alternative, Speaker Gingrich sent these Republicans a letter telling them to vote against the bipartisan bill so "Republicans maintain the upper hand on this issue." After receiving this and other pressure from the Republican leadership, twelve Republicans who had cosponsored the bipartisan bill voted against it.

Texas is implementing the welfare reform proposal that was passed by the Texas legislature and signed by the Governor. Congressman Stenholm worked with Governor Bush to get the Texas waiver approved by the Department of Health and Human Services earlier this year. However, the plan being implemented by Texas would not meet the mandates in the Republican bill. For example, the Republican bill requires states to put all welfare recipients in jobs of at least 30 hours a week.

The Texas legislature looked at local job markets and decided that welfare recipients should be required to work 20 hours a week. The Texas legislature decided that while it would be preferable to require recipients to work for 30 hours a week or more, that it would not be practical or realistic for the state to say 30-hour-a-week jobs could be found by all recipients.

The National Governor's Association came down on the side of Texas, unanimously adopting a resolution expressing "concern about restriction on state flexibility and unfunded costs" in the Republicans' work programs. The bipartisan Castle-Tanner bill adopted the recommendations of the National Governors Association, giving states flexibility to develop welfare to work programs that are appropriate for local communities, and giving states the funding necessary to operate work programs that help welfare recipients obtain and keep jobs.

The non-partisan Congressional Budget Office determined that the Republican bill would fail to move welfare recipients to work. In its report on the Republican bill, CBO said: "most states would fail to meet these (work) requirements...most states would choose to accept the penalties for failing to meet the participation rates instead of trying to meet the costs of the work programs." The bipartisan Castle-Tanner bill was the only proposal that CBO estimated would succeed in moving welfare recipients to work. The bipartisan alternative gave states the flexibil-

ity and resources to move welfare recipients to work and to allow them to remain employed instead of returning to the welfare rolls. Rhetoric about tough work requirements is either an empty promise or the largest unfunded mandate ever if they are not backed up with sufficient funding.

The Republican bill prohibits states from providing assistance for the needs of children if the child's parents are cut off because of a time limit. The Texas plan imposes tough time limits on adults, but does not cut off assistance for children after the time limit. Congressman Stenholm agreed with the Texas legislature which decided that it is not fair to punish a three year old child for the irresponsibility of an irresponsible parent. The bipartisan bill authored by Congressman Stenholm would have allowed states to protect children after a time limit; the Republican bill would prohibit Texas and other states from providing assistance for children after their parents reach a time limit.

The National Association of Counties, the U.S. Conference of Mayors and the National League of Cities all opposed the Republican bill for placing unfunded mandates on local governments and restricting local flexibility. The Castle-Tanner bill required that local governments be allowed to design and implement programs in their communities and protected local governments against unfunded mandates.

AUSTIN — Ignoring protests by religious conservatives, the State Board of Education voted last week to begin screening textbooks only if the attorney general says it is legal.

In a 10-5 vote that followed some heated debate, board members agreed to ask the attorney general to decide whether they still have authority to screen textbooks for objectionable materials.

Some state officials agree that power to screen textbooks was taken away by the Legislature in its school reform law last year. But religious conservatives and some lawmakers have argued that the board is not prohibited from throwing out textbooks it considers inappropriate.

Board Chairman Jack Christie acknowledged there was only an "outside shot" the attorney general would approve screening, but he said the board is ready to review all textbooks if given clearance to do so.

Sen. Bill Ratliff, chairman of the Senate Education Committee, who wrote the 1995 reform law, said he has no quarrel with the board asking the attorney general for an opinion.

"But I am very clear about the law," Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant, told the *Dallas Morning News*, insisting that his intent was to shift the major decisions on textbook content from the state to local school boards.

GOP Group Targeting Laney

House Speaker Pete Laney accused a Republican group attempting to seize control of the Texas House of seeking to make the Legislature look like Congress — gridlocked.

"A small group wants the Texas House to adopt the worst partisan aspects of Congress," Laney said. State Rep. Kent Grusendorf, R-Arlington, chairman of the Campaign for Republican Leadership, said "it's entirely possible that we can achieve a Republican majority. We've got an aggressive campaign planned this year."

Democrats hold a 17-14 edge in the Senate and an 86-64 majority in the House.

Grusendorf's group listed 27 House seats where it envisions potential Republican victories, including Laney's West Texas District. His GOP opponent is Springlake rancher Hollis Cain.

The Republicans say Gov. George W. Bush would have been able to achieve more of his legislative agenda with a Republican speaker.

But Bush's press secretary, Karen Hughes, said the governor would not campaign against Laney or others in the Legislature who helped him pass his program.

Insurance Rules Invalid

A state "blacklisting" rule blocking insurance companies from considering another company's decision to drop or refuse to cover a prospective customer is invalid, the Texas Supreme Court has ruled.

The rule, along with another thrown out by the court, was adopted by the Texas Board of Insurance, which was replaced in 1993 by an appointed commissioner.

The first rule also prohibited insurers from denying coverage or setting rates based on the fact that a prospective customer had been covered in a high-risk pool.

The second rule prohibited insurers from conditioning the sale of automobile insurance on the purchase of another policy or refusing coverage because the customer owned only one vehicle.

Rod Borderlon, executive director of the Office of Public Insurance Counsel, said when insurers rely on other insurers' decisions, consumers don't get a fair shake from either company.

He said the court made clear that the procedure, not necessarily the rules, was wrong.

But Jerry Johns, president of Southwestern Insurance Information Service, said insurers must consider all the information available.

"The insurance industry is making every effort to provide the best possible price for our customers, and we cannot do that without the tools necessary to evaluate risk," Johns said.

A spokesman for Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer, said the department will comply with the court's ruling and will study the best ways to deal with the "consumer protection issues involved in these rules."

Locals May Share Lottery Cash

State Sen. Tom Hayden, R-Wichita Falls, said he will introduce a bill next year to give cities and counties five cents of every \$1 lottery ticket sold within their boundaries.

All lottery revenues now go into the state general fund.

With ticket sales of almost \$3.5 billion in the past 12 months, the Texas Lottery is the most successful in North America.

And Sen. Haywood thinks local governments should share in that success.

There would be no restrictions on how the cities and counties could spend their share of the money under his proposed legislation, Haywood said.

Haywood said Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, the Senate's presiding officer, has promised to let him move the bill if he can get the needed votes.

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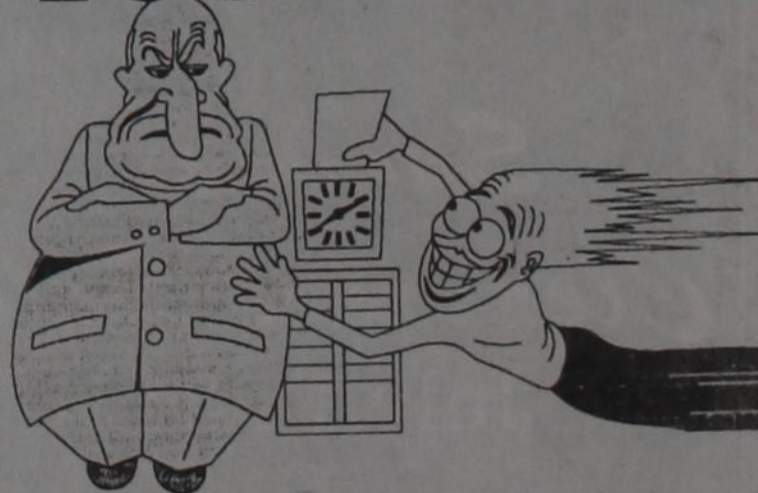

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PUZZLING HEEL PAIN

Many people visit the podiatrist because of pain in a heel. Some relate the pain to a sudden injury, but others are clueless. By examining the foot and employing X-rays, the podiatrist diagnoses the problem. Sometimes it is an imperfect heel bone or a disorder such as arthritis. More often the problem lies in the fascia, a fibrous band of tissue which winds around the heel and extends to the forefoot. It helps to control the action of the arch.

Heel pain results when excessive stretching of the fascia leaves it irritated and inflamed at the heel bone. Factors inviting this condition include spending a lot of time on the feet, shoes with little cushioning and overweight. In typical cases the podiatrist subdues the inflammation and relieves pain with cortisone injections, oral medications and taping and padding the foot. Sometimes an orthotic shoe insert or physical therapy are employed to speed recovery.

Our fears seem as big and as terrible as this alligator sometimes, don't they? Fear about this thing and that can paralyze us and prevent us from doing our daily work.

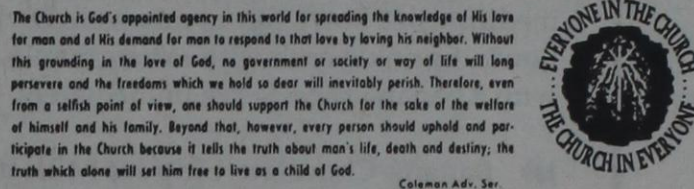
Many of our fears are real. A great many of our fears, however, are unfounded — a result of thinking and worrying about ourselves. Sir John Denham phrased it this way:

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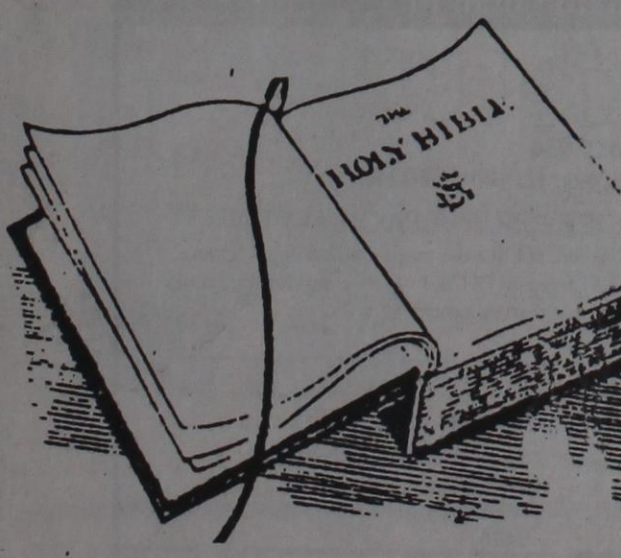

Bananas are naturally sweet and delicious. They're also nutritious... rich in vitamin A for healthy skin and good vision!

Banana Breakfast Yogurt (for four)

- 2 1/4 cups sliced bananas (about 3 medium-size ripe bananas cut into 1/4" slices—save 4 slices to use later)
- One 16-ounce container unflavored low-fat yogurt
- 2 tablespoons honey
- 1/4 cup dark raisins and granola cereal

Put banana slices, yogurt, honey, granola and raisins in a medium-size bowl. Stir to mix well. Divide mixture among 4 bowls. Sprinkle each with extra granola and raisins and top with a banana slice. Serve immediately.

Banana-Chocolate Chip Ice Milk (for six)

- 1 cup mashed bananas (about two medium-size)
- 1/2 cup miniature chocolate chips
- 1 quart vanilla ice milk, softened

In medium-size bowl, using rubber spatula, fold bananas and chocolate chips into ice milk until just blended. Spread mixture in 8" square metal baking pan. Freeze 3 to 4 hours until firm. Fifteen minutes before serving, remove ice milk from freezer to soften slightly before cutting into squares.

Banana-Pudding Pie (for eight)

- 30 vanilla wafer cookies
- Two 3 1/2-ounce packages instant vanilla pudding and pie filling
- 3 cups skim milk
- 2 medium-size ripe bananas, cut in 1/4" slices
- Lemon juice concentrate
- One cup non-dairy frozen whipped topping

Make pudding as directed on package with 3 cups skim milk. Sprinkle banana slices with lemon juice. This will prevent them from turning brown. Alternate layers of wafers and pudding in a 9" pie plate. Spread whipped topping over last layer. Refrigerate several hours until firm.

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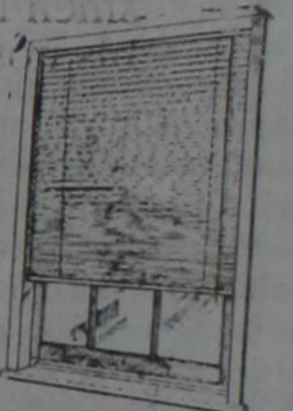
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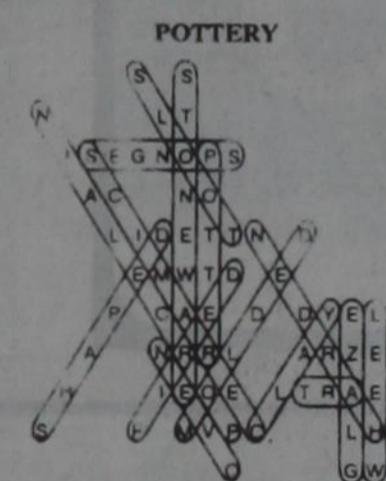
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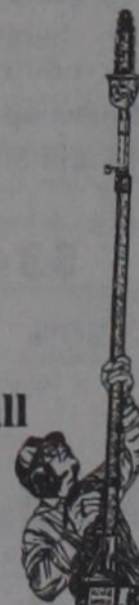

average, he said. For the test, randomly selected trees were shaken with a trunk shaker fitted with pads to avoid trunk damage. From one to three shakes were given each tree to dislodge approximately 25 pounds of nuts from each tree on Aug. 1, 1995.

The remaining crop on both thinned and unthin-

ned trees was allowed to mature. Both groups of trees were similarly managed.

Mature pecans were harvested in October, when Atascosa County Extension agents Brent Batchelor and Larry Perez analyzed yields and found significant differences between harvests from thinned and non-

thinned trees.

When orchard owners see that their trees are overloaded, thinning by shaking is less expensive than pruning or hedging trees to reduce nut load. Pruning and hedging work must often be contracted out, Stein said.

Stein doesn't expect to

be able to replicate the experiment this year because there aren't enough overloaded trees.

"If we have overloaded trees, we'll go ahead and shake some, but most areas don't have heavy crops this year because of the drought and heavy insect feeding," he said.

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Shaking Pecan Trees Could Thin, Improve Crop

Giving an early shake to overloaded pecan trees could help thin crops and improve nut quality, data from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service indicates.

"Sometimes trees overload and the pecans don't develop very well, so we looked at shaking the trees in July or so and thinning the nuts," said Dr. Larry Stein, Extension horticulturist at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Uvalde. "Decreasing the load can help the nuts mature, and so far our results indicate both size and quality can be improved."

Initial tests conducted with an Atascosa County grower found that by shaking overloaded Shoshoni pecan trees in mid-summer, the grower could improve the percentage of kernel within nuts from thinned trees.

What's more, the return set, or crop that set on the trees in 1996, was from 60 percent to 70 percent of a full crop on the thinned trees. None of the unthinned trees set nuts in 1996.

"What pecan trees tend to do is bear in alternate years so that one year you have a big crop and the next year there's none," Stein said. "So what you're doing by shaking is managing the crop load on your tree."

Thinned trees produced an average of 50.7 nuts per pound, while unthinned trees needed 58.3 nuts to make a pound. In addition, nuts from the thinned trees averaged 51.3 percent kernel weight versus 46.8 percent for nuts from the unthinned trees.

The nuts from the thinned trees did not reflect the statewide average of 40.9 nuts per pound and 53.8 percent kernel, Stein said, but that statistic is misleading because state averages come from pecan shows where only the best nuts from the youngest trees are measured.

"Those are 100 percent Cadillac," Stein said. "Most orchards aren't going to have those condi-

tions. This was really a significant increase in quality."

Thinning appeared to allow the nuts to mature to a level closer to the state

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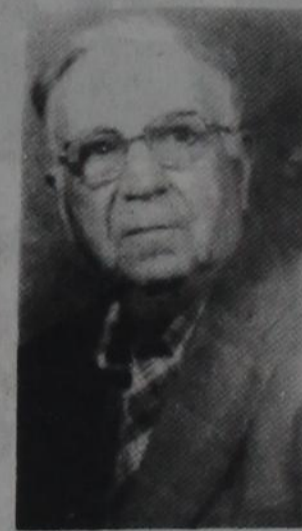
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All Americas Bowl Set Saturday In Ranger



Ranger—Rocky Chysyk and Gary Rickard may come from opposite ends of the North American continent, but they have plenty in common.

One, they both enjoy coaching, and have been relatively successful in their chosen professions. Chysyk guided his Bjorkdale Bandits to the Canadian Class A provincial championship last fall. Rickard, who is regarded by many as being one of Texas' top passing gurus, has had the Happy Hill Farm Academy Pioneers ranked among the best in Texas for years.

The biggest bond between the two coaches is more simple. They're both tickled to death to have the talent they will have at their beck and call this coming Monday when they step onto the field as coaches in the All-Americas Bowl, the first-ever international six-man all-star game which is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Saturday night, July 27 at Ranger College. Chysyk, along with Bjorkdale assistant coach Glenn Butten and Peetz (Co.) coach Kirk Smock, will coach the North squad. Rickard, along with Mineral Wells Community Christian's David Nixon and former Covington High School head coach C.W. Williams, will lead the South.

"I'm tickled to death," said Rickard, who normally coaches from 10-12 players at Happy Hill, a home for troubled youths south of Granbury, "I won't know what to do with that kind of talent. I mean, I've had some talented kids, but not that many talented kids at once."

And make no mistake, there is plenty of talent on hand. The game will feature 48 of the best six-man athletes in the world. Players will be coming from Texas, the Canadian province of Saskatchewan, New Mexico, Colorado, Nebraska and Montana.

"These are some of the best six-man athletes there are," said Joseph M. Nash, the president of the 1996 All-Americas Bowl and the publisher of North America's only six-man football magazine. "I think people will be really surprised when they see these athletes have."

One of the top players coming into the game is record-setting running back Petey Salaiz. This past season, the former Mullin (Tx.) standout rushed for over 3,000 yards and became only the second high school athlete ever to surpass the 10,000 yard rushing plateau in a career. Former Sugar Land great Ken Hall was the first to accomplish the feat.

Joining Salaiz on the South roster are several

other big time names, including Jerad Zahn, who helped the Midland Christian Mustangs win five straight state TAPPS titles from 1991-1995, and All-America linebacker Brandon Pointer, who helped the Amherst High School Bulldogs win back-to-back national championships in 1994 and 1995. Other players scheduled to participate for the South squad are Jack Monteiro (Allen Academy), Shane Zant (New Home), Tanner Etheredge (Klondike) Aaron Vann (Allen Academy), Blue Willis (Covington), Casey Rowland (Meadow), Marc Phillips (Dallas Academy), Landon Buffe (Mullin), Bryan Necessary (Jonesboro), Chris Pendleton (Milford), Michael Camfield (Strawn), David Thompson (Abilene Christian), Stephen Karr (Abilene Christian), Nathan Byrd (Jonesboro), Noah Williams (Covington), Chris Fisher (Dallas Academy), Charlie Tingle (Covington), Daniel Taylor (Panther Creek), Cody Cope (Panther Creek), Jeremy Crutcher (McLean) and Dallas Hopper (Sands).

Chysyk's North squad will have plenty of muscle as well. The North squad will be paced by the likes of Lake Arthur (NM) running back Jason Bratcher and Highwood (Mont.) linebacker Gage Grossman. Bratcher is a bruising-style rusher who helped carry the Panthers to the New Mexico state semifinals last season. He rushed for 1,500 yards in 1995. Grossman, an All-America selection, had over 90 tackles last year as he helped the Mountaineers nail down their fourth consecutive Montana state championship.

Chysyk will have three of his fellow countrymen to call on, including his former players Pat Clarke and Blair Currey. Clarke, Bjorkdale's all-time leader in tackles and re-

ceiving yardage, and Currey, the school's all-time leading rusher, led the Bandits to an 11-0 mark in 1995, including a 72-22 win over rival Haford in the provincial finals. Joining Clarke and Currey on the roster from the Land of Moose is Keliher High School stand-out Kurt Blight.

One thing Chysyk can look forward to is a little experience when it comes to adjusting to the Texas-based NCAA rules standards. The North team will have the service of both Travis Shaver and Chuck Thompson, key members of the Weldon Valley High School squad that invaded the Lone Star State last fall and upset the No. 1-ranked Mullin in a game that drew over 8,000 people to Gordon Wood Stadium in Brownwood.

Other North team players include Jeff Maynard (Carrizozo, NM), Jeff Long (Peetz, Co.), Scott Davison (Highwood, Mont.), Lonnie DuBoise (Ramah, NM), Wes Morgan (Melrose, NM), Larrin Wille (Watrous, Sk.), Chris Kunel (Prague, Ne.), Kyle Grossart (Wolbach, Ne.), Cody Strong (Monroe, Ne.), Justin Hinze (Rising City, Ne.), Travis Allen (Idalia, Co.), Trent Schmidt (Hildreth, Ne.), Jason Randel (Kit Carson, Co.), Casey Tobiasen (Hildreth, Ne.), Reed Kramer (Arthur, Ne.), Jeremy Weisdorfer (Roy, NM), Clete Caudill (Wolbach, Ne.).
