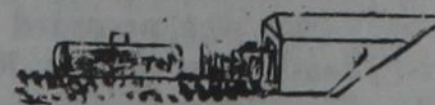

All Americas Bowl Set Saturday In Ranger

and Gary Rickard may come from opposite ends of the North American continent, but they have plenty in common.

One, they both enjoy coaching, and have been relatively successful in their chosen professions. Chysyk guided his Bjorkdale Bandits to the Canadian Class A provincial championship last fall. Rickard, who is regarded by many as being one of Texas' top passing gurus, has had the Happy Hill Farm Academy Pioneers ranked among the best in Texas for years.

The biggest bond between the two coaches is more simple. They're both tickled to death to have the talent they will have at their beck and call this coming Monday when they step onto the field as coaches in the All-Americas Bowl, the first-ever international six-man all-star game which is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Saturday night, July 27 at Ranger College. Chysyk, along with Bjorkdale assistant coach Glenn Button and Peetz (Co.) coach Kirk Smock, will coach the North squad. Rickard, along with Mineral Wells Community Christian's David Nixon and former Covington High School head coach C.W. Williams, will lead the South. "I'm tickled to death," said Rickard, who normally coaches from 10-12 players at Happy Hill, a home for troubled youths south of Granbury, "I won't know what to do with that kind of talent. I mean, I've had some talented kids, but not that many talented kids at once."

And make no mistake, there is plenty of talent on hand. The game will feature 48 of the best six-man athletes in the world. Players will be coming from Texas, the Canadian province of Saskatchewan, New Mexico, Colorado, Nebraska and Montana.

"These are some of the best six-man athletes there are," said Joseph M. Nash, the president of the 1996 All-Americas Bowl and the publisher of North America's only six-man football magazine. "I think people will be really surprised when they see the talent and abilities these athletes have."

One of the top players

coming into the game is record-setting running back Petey Salaiz. This past season, the former Mullin (Tx.) standout rushed for over 3,000 yards and became only the second high school athlete ever to surpass the 10,000 yard rushing plateau in a career. Former Sugar Land great Ken Hall was the first to accomplish the feat.

Joining Salaiz on the South roster are several other big time names, including Jerad Zahn, who helped the Midland Christian Mustangs win five straight state TAPPS titles from 1991-1995, and All-America linebacker Brandon Pointer, who helped the Amherst High School Bulldogs win back-to-back national championships in 1994 and 1995. Other players scheduled to participate for the South squad are Jack Monteiro (Allen Academy), Shane Zant (New Home), Tanner Etheredge (Klondike), Aaron Vann (Allen Academy), Blue Willis (Covington), Casey Rowland (Meadow), Marc Phillips (Dallas Academy), Landon Buffe (Mullin), Bryan Necessary (Jonesboro), Chris Pendleton (Milford), Michael Camfield (Strawn), David Thompson (Abilene Christian), Stephen Karr (Abilene Christian), Nathan Byrd (Jonesboro), Noah Williams (Covington), Chris Fisher (Dallas Academy), Charlie Tingle (Covington), Daniel Taylor (Panther Creek), Cody Cope (Panther Creek), Jeremy Crutcher (McLean) and Dallas Hopper (Sands).

Chysyk's North squad will have plenty of muscle as well. The North squad will be paced by the likes of Lake Arthur (NM) running back Jason Bratcher and Highwood (Mont.) linebacker Gage Grossman. Bratcher is a bruising-style rusher who helped carry the Panthers to the New Mexico state semifinals last season. He rushed for 1,500 yards in 1995. Grossman, an All-America selection, had over 90 tackles last year as he helped the Mountaineers nail down their fourth consecutive Montana state championship.

Chysyk will have three of his fellow countrymen to call on, including his former players Pat Clarke and Blair Currey. Clarke, Bjorkdale's all-time

leader in tackles and receiving yardage, and Currey, the school's all-time leading rusher, led the Bandits to an 11-0 mark in 1995, including a 72-22 win over rival Hafford in the provincial finals. Joining Clarke and Currey on the roster from the Land of Moose is Kelliher High School standout Kurt Blight.

One thing Chysyk can look forward to is a little experience when it comes to adjusting to the Texas-based NCAA rules standards. The North team will have the service of both Travis Shaver and Chuck Thompson, key members of the Weldon Valley High School squad that invaded the Lone Star State last fall and upset the No. 1-ranked Mullin in a game that drew over 8,000 people to Gordon Wood Stadium in Brownwood.

Other North team players include Jeff Maynard (Carrizozo, NM), Jeff Long (Peetz, Co.), Scott Davison (Highwood, Mont.), Lonnie DuBoise (Ramah, NM), Wes Morgan (Melrose, NM), Larrin Wille (Watrous, Sk.), Chris Kuncel (Prague, Ne.), Kyle Grossart (Wolbach, Ne.), Cody Strong (Monroe, Ne.), Justin Hinze (Rising City, Ne.), Travis Allen (Idalia, Co.), Trent Schmidt (Hildreth, Ne.), Jason Randel (Kit Carson, Co.), Casey Tobiasen (Hildreth, Ne.), Reed Kramer (Arthur, Ne.), Jeremy Weisdorfer (Roy, NM), Clete Caudill (Wolbach, Ne.).

Izzard Shares Ideas On Welfare Reform

Rudy Izzard, Republican candidate for U.S. Congress, 17th District, made a campaign stop at the Eastland Telegram Tuesday afternoon.

He said this trip was focused on Welfare Reform, which was being considered that day in a Republican Bill before the U.S. Senate. (It passed).

Izzard stated that his opponent, 17th District incumbent Charles Stenholm, Democrat, had voted against this Bill in the House. He discussed the differences in his and Stenholm's approach to Welfare Reform.

Looking fit and tanned, Izzard joked that he was "bringing some rain to Eastland County," since clouds had dogged him all the way from Snyder.

Unfortunately the rain seemed to hurry with Izzard toward Stephenville, his next stop on a one-day swing around the area.

In Eastland the candidates sat down in the "break room" at the Telegram and answered questions from publisher H.V. O'Brien and other news personnel.

Rudy Izzard said this was the third time the Republican Welfare Bill had been drafted, and it had some bi-partisan support.

He criticized Stenholm for voting against it in the House of Representatives on July 18. Stenholm voted in favor of substitute bi-partisan legislation.

Izzard said: "I think the Republican Welfare Bill is a giant step in the right direction. It has five guidelines: Welfare should not be a way of life, it ends payments to those not deserving, it requires work for benefits, it provides states with flexibility and adequate funding, and encourages personal responsibility to end rising illegitimacy rates."

Izzard said that he totally supported bloc

grants to the states for welfare.

"The more local the more cost effective and compassionate," he declared.

O'Brien asked about unfunded mandates to the states, and the plight of children when welfare was withdrawn from their families.

Izzard indicated there would be no such thing as "unfunded mandates," and that he was for assisting children in real need.

On other subjects, he discussed the fact that redistricting of the 17th Congressional District is a fact—it is in the courts right now.

He said that next Monday (July 29) the State Supreme Court was supposed to announce a decision. If there is no agreement, a Federal Judge will decide by August 8.

"The 17th District will probably not be altered radically, and Eastland County will not be affected," Izzard said.

"But there is a possibility that Tom Green County, which is currently split, will all be placed in the 17th District."

Izzard's home is in Tom Green County.

The discussion turned to agriculture, and Izzard "An eloquent defender of the subsidy for agriculture."

"What do you recommend to re-establish the small family farm?" O'Brien asked.

"Diversification is the key," the candidate answered. "That, and making sure we have markets for products."

"I'm not a protectionist—we need global trade," he added. "But, on NAFTA and GATT, our negotiators are spineless!"

He said he was not for any more loan guarantees to Mexico. But he thought the United States should provide emergency health care to illegal aliens, and

education to their children.

As Rudy Izzard left, he summed up his campaign this way: "My key theme is Congressional Reform—to restore trust in government. Welfare Reform is just part of that picture."

Into And Out Of Africa

Another In A Series
By Loys Allmand
In November 1995 the
Zambian Acapella group
came to perform at Siebert
Elementary. The ten out-
going energetic young
men from Zambia were
touring the state raising
money to build schools in
their country. The group
was well received by stu-
dents and faculty at
Siebert Elementary as
well as by the rest of the
people here that met
them. They were good
ambassadors for their
country.

With this short intro-
duction to the Zambian
people I immediately
wanted to go. There was
a possibility of teaching
reading in their school
even though at that time I
was not quite sure where
in Africa Zambia was lo-
cated.

When I heard that my
church was sending a
team to Zambia, I was

ready to go. Had I real-
ized earlier that shots
were required I would
have given more thought
before volunteering!

On June 9th with pass-
ports, Visas, and luggage
in hand, nine of us were
driven to DFW to board a
British Airways DC 10.
Our plane left at 4:30 p.m.
Sunday and arrived at
Gadwick Monday at 6:30
a.m. Since the movies
were not too good and
sleep didn't come easy the
time was spent getting to
know the others on our
mission team. It was a
time to close fellowship
with 5 seats across the
middle of the plane with
lucky Danny Brown
caught in the middle seat.
By the end of the trip I
had come to the conclu-
sion that overseas flying
is not for long-legged
people unless you can af-
ford first class seats. All
in all, the flight was not
bad and we arrived at

Gadwick, outside London,
looking forward to a 15
hour layover. Many of us
had not been to London
and the layover gave us
time to take the 30 mile
train ride into the city and
enjoy a tour of London
from the top of a double
decker bus. Because Dr.
Bob Matthews was famil-
iar with London, we made
good use of our time see-
ing most of the more
famous sites such as Big
Ben, Westminster Abbey,
Saint Paul's Cathedral, an
art museum and the
bridges over the Thames
River. I was surprised to
see the many British writ-
ers such as Shelby, Keats,
Robert and Elizabeth
Barrett Browning, hon-
ored and buried at West
Minster Abbey along with
British Royalty. Also
Robert Livingston is bur-
ied there. Having served
as a missionary to Africa
after his death his heart
was buried in Zambia
where he loved the people
so.

I had always heard of
the rainy, foggy days in
London, but our day was
filled with sunshine. We
saw just enough to deter-
mine to return to London
to take in all the sites in
more detail.

We returned to our ho-
tel room in the air termi-
nal to freshen up and eat
a delicious evening meal
before catching another
plane to Lusaka, the capi-
tal of Zambia. Even

though we hadn't much
more than catnapped
since Saturday night we
were all in high spirits
looking forward to the
next part of our journey.
After an eleven hour
flight with a little more
sleep than the first one
we arrived at Lusaka. We
were met by our mission-
aries and the national
pastor of the Olympia
Baptist Church.

We loaded into two
Toyota vans to go to the
Baptist compound. This
was mid-winter in Zam-
bia and along the way
were beautiful flowers,
trees, and shrubs. Poin-
settias in full bloom were
as tall as some of our trees.
They were beautiful! The
narrow paved streets were
shared by cars and pedes-
trians who did not move
over far to accommodate
the cars. We saw modern
buildings as well as small
shack looking shops. Most
of the people in Lusaka
dressed in American style
clothing, especially the
men and children. Women
wear only dresses with
skirts well below their
knees. Women also wear
chintings (shin tin ges).
These long pieces of color-
ful fabric serve a multi-
tude of purposes; worn
wrapped around their
waists over their dresses
they protect their cloth-
ing, they are used to carry
babies on their backs, to
wrap around their shoul-
ders on cool evenings, or
to put over their heads.
None wear shorts or
slacks, pants, incident-
ally, in the Zambian form
of English, refer to under-
garments.

While on our way to the
compound we were met at
intersections by young
people trying to sell toma-
toes and bananas to the
people in their cars.

Many of the houses,
whether for one family or
multiple families, were
made of cement blocks.
Some houses were very
large and modern with
beautiful yards. More
were smaller with nice
neat dirt yards. Dirt yards
had the added advantage
of warning the occupants
of the house if a deadly
snake had crawled near
their home. Almost all
homes or clusters of homes
had a very high cement
block fence around them
with large metal gates.
Many of the more affluent
looking homes had bro-
ken glass or sharp wire on
top of the cement fencing
for added security. Most
had a guard at the gate to
let people in and out.

The city had several
market places where
there were fruits and
vegetables. Others had
curios made of wood,

malikite, soap stone, as
well as baskets. Buying
curios at a reasonable
price required bargaining
skills that the merchants
expected and enjoyed
taking part in. Still other
markets had clothing.
Malls or department
stores as we know them
are nonexistent.

We felt well to do in
Zambia since one U.S.
dollar equals 1224 Zam-
bian quache. Besides
having to convert our
currency we also had to
try to convert to the met-
ric system of measure.

Our primary purpose
for going to Zambia was to
help with a weekend cru-
sade. Each day we were
paired with a national
church member and went
to a certain area near the
church for house to house
visitation. This was so
enjoyable because we
became well acquainted
with the nationals. Many
people invited us into their
homes where we shared
God's plan of salvation.
Some days we just stood
by the side of the road at a
busy intersection and
visited with people as they
passed by. Even though
some were in a hurry and
had heavy loads on their
heads, they were gracious
and polite and took time
to receive our literature
and visit with us. The
Zambian people are warm
and friendly and we did
not meet one of them that
could not sing.

They usually do not
have church at night be-
cause most of the people
walk and do not need to be
out after dark for safety
reasons. Our first meet-
ing ran until well after
dark. The 35 member
Zambian Acapella Jr.
Choir came to perform.
They are as talented as
the group who came to
our school. This group will
come to the U.S. in the fall
of 1997 to tour. It was
quite a memorable expe-
rience to sit under an
African sky looking at the
stars hearing my own
pastor preaching. The
Zambian Nationals who
are Christians are com-
mitted and dedicated and
it moves you to be around
them. Visitation, church,
and fellowship meetings
allowed us to get to know
them in all settings. One
evening the ladies cooked
and brought food to the
compound. They use a
thick mush made from
finely ground corn called
enshema rolled into a
scoop to eat the rest of
their food. We tried to eat
our food this way. The
potatoes, greens, and
small whole fish were
easier to eat with enshema
than the slimy boiled okra.
We enjoyed learning first

hand about their native
dishes. Afterward we sang
songs and had a wonder-
ful time of fellowship.

We worked hard, but
along the way the mis-
sionaries invited us to
their homes for meals.
They each had a nice safe
place to live with all the
modern conveniences. We
were gone for 12 days and
I didn't watch TV at all.
We were told it is on each
day for about 3 hours,
surprisingly I didn't miss
it.

Because of our interest
in education, Betty
Hughes and I had the
privilege of visiting the
Chikelo Primary School.
The school, which is run
by the state, had neat
grounds with shrubs, but
not grass. The building
was made of cement
blocks. The classrooms
were about the size of our
rooms, but with cement
floors and the walls were
decorated only with peel-
ing blue paint. The bare
rooms had desks with
narrow tops and bench
seats that 2 or 3 students
shared. No books were
seen except for tablets for
each student to copy from
the blackboard the
teacher wrote on. All stu-
dents had perfect pen-
manship. Two thousand
students attended the
Chikelo school divided
into 3 sessions of about 3
hours each with 54 teach-
ers staffing the school. The
students were happy, like
our students with big
smiles. Some were eager
to show their work while
others were too shy to
share.

The parents were re-
quired to furnish the chil-
dren with uniforms or
they were not allowed to
attend school, while the
children are required to
learn. In Zambia their
idea of "no pass, no play" is
if a student fails in one
subject they are no longer
allowed to attend classes.
We were happy to see how
much they learned even
though resources were
limited. Parents and stu-
dents realize how impor-
tant an education is and
make it a priority.

With the crusade over,
our second week in Africa
took us to Zimbabwe
which is 509 kilometers
from Lusaka. This gave
us an opportunity to see
more of Zambia and expe-
rience their highway sys-
tem. Just as it is in our
country, we came upon
highway construction
crews working on their 2
lane highway. This slowed
us down several times as
well as having to dodge
pot holes. Because of the
British influence they
drive on the left side of
the road, but thankfully
for the same reason the
National language is
English. So, even though
driving was confusing,
communication was eas-
ier. Most of the nationals
also spoke a language
native of their region of
Zambia such as Bemba or
Nanja. Sometimes they
didn't understand our
Texas English nor did we
always understand their
English.

The countryside was
varied as in Texas with
hills, trees, shrubs, and

fields. Along the way we
saw fields of sugar cane
as well as pastures so
thick you couldn't see
through them. Small vil-
lages were scattered along
the highway. Most of the
houses were round mud
huts with thatch roofs.
Many people were walk-
ing by the road. Some-
times it was difficult to
see where they lived or
how they made a living.
School children along the
road were recognizable by
the uniforms they wore.

Along the border be-
tween Zambia and Zim-
babwe lie Victoria Falls.
The roar is almost deaf-
ening in places and the
mist will get you wet at
some of the look out points.
Many rainbows were seen
as we walked the one mile
across to see the different
views of the falls. We drove
through a game preserve
one morning and saw
many animals although
not as many as I had
imagined before I went.
Baboons were the most
plentiful, but we also saw
2 or 3 herds of giraffes.
Two hippos were on an
island in the river. We saw
kudu, elan, wart hogs,
water buffalo, and a small
herd of elephants. We
were thrilled each time
any animal was spotted,
especially the lions.

That night we went to a
nice restaurant where
many of the animals we
had seen that day were on
the menu, along with
crocodile and caterpillar.
I tasted some of each. The
crocodile was good. The
caterpillar was charcoaled
and because I chewed
and swallowed it so
quickly I really don't know
how it tasted. I wouldn't
include it in my daily diet.

Along with our meal we
were treated to entertain-
ment by a dance group
dressed in costumes na-
tive to that country. They
sang and danced then
would change into the
costumes of another na-
tive tribe and perform
their songs. It was quite
entertaining.

Another highlight of the
trip was a short cruise
down the Zambezi River.
The water was as smooth
as glass. Giraffes walked
along the bank with the
beautiful sunset casting
long shadows from the
trees beneath the red
orange sky, then the sun
sank out of sight.

The trip back to Lusaka
allowed us to see more of
the countryside and sights
we had missed on the way
down to Zimbabwe.

The beautiful coun-
tryside, the wild animals, the
warm friendly people, and
the wonderful sounds of
their music would make
it impossible to choose a
favorite thing about the
trip. It would be my wish
that everyone could go and
experience Africa.

Others who made the
mission trip have been
asked to show their expe-
riences and memories.

A Good Time To Be Registered And Promise To Vote In November

Strategies are being mapped, budgets set and "talking points" established as players in the political process get poised for the BIG ONE in November.

There are days left in July and the entire month of August before the Parties, the Candidates and their Supporters go all out in the race for votes in the General Election.

And in Eastland County, there are already signs that this could be an outstandingly interesting political season.

Both major parties have candidates ready to approach the starting gate. That gate generally goes up the first day after Labor Day. You can be assured that a lot of quiet work is now being done in preparation for that starting date.

And the players are wondering: whose coattail will pull along whom? If any!

The presidential decision will top the ballot: Incumbent Bill Clinton, Democrat, vs. Presumed Nominee Bob Dole, Republican. (Both await nomination at their respective party conventions in August--the Democrats in Chicago and the Republicans in San Diego).

Texas voters then will choose between Incumbent Republican United States Senator Phil Gramm or Victor Morales, pick-up driving teacher who shocked the Texas Democratic Party by securing the Spring Primary Nomination over Party-appointed, would-be shoes-in. Will the Presidential vote influence this race or vice versa?

Voters in the 17th District will then see Veteran Congressman Charles Stenholm's name on the Democratic side of the ballot and Challenger Rudy Izzard's name on the Republican side. Will other races affect choices here or can this race affect others?

Countian Jim R. Wright, long-time 91st District Judge, was appointed by Gov. George Bush to the unexpired term on the 11th Court of Appeals and he is unopposed by either of the major parties for re-election to the court which serves 23 counties. A Stephenville attorney is running as an Independent candidate.

Eastlander Jim Keffer, running on the Republican ticket, is challenging Veteran State Rep. John Calk, Democrat from Breckenridge, for the right to represent District 60 which covers six counties, including Eastland, Shackelford, Stephens, Palo Pinto, Callahan, Hood, Runnels and part of Taylor.

And within Eastland County, it gets very interesting. Stephen Herod, who was appointed by Gov. Bush to fill out Judge Wright's term on the 91st District Court (which serves Eastland County) is seeking re-election, running as a Republican.

Veteran Eastland Attorney Saul Pullman is seeking the judgeship as a Democrat.

The county sheriff's race pits a nominee from each party: Darrell Shipman, running as a Republican, and Wayne Bradford, as a Democrat.

Veteran County Commissioner L.T. Owen, Democrat, is opposed by Republican James New for that Rising Star-Carbon-Gorman Precinct post. Indications are that both major parties will open campaign headquarters on Labor Day. Both parties have big things planned.

County voters are going to be "woo-ed" so it behooves all eligible voters to be registered and ready, because every vote is going to be sought, is important and can make a difference.

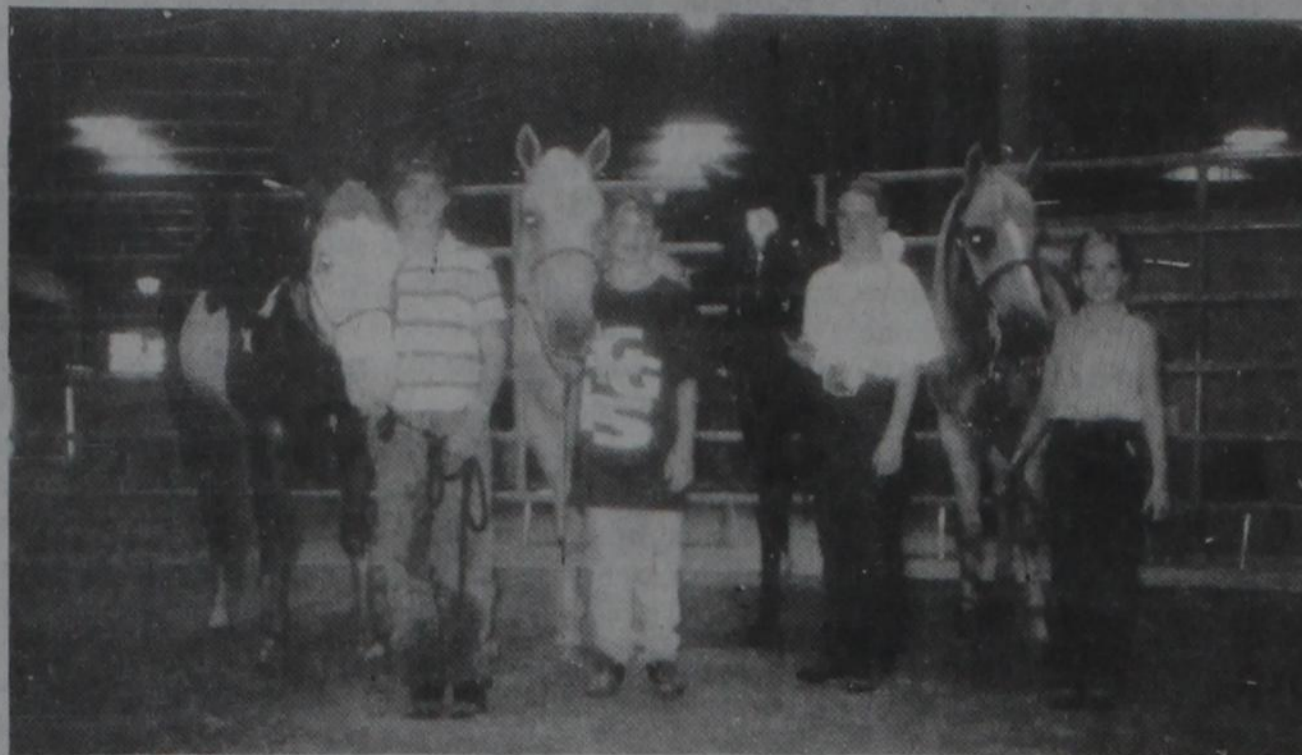
Agriculture Viewpoint By Davy Vestal

Recent evaluation in Coastal Bermuda fields have confirmed some preliminary thoughts on fertilizer utilization and management in Eastland County.

On June 19, 300 lbs. of 34-0-0 was applied to a field that had been cut for hay 3 weeks earlier. After the first cutting, the field received 250 lbs. of 32-0-0 for a total of 550 lbs. of Nitrogen based fertilizer. Only a small portion of the field received both applications so the remainder of the field was used as a check for benefits of late growth fertilizing.

No rain was recorded on the plots from June 19 through harvest date of July 1. Protein samples taken from each indicated a 12.1% crude protein on the added fertilizer plots versus an 11% crude protein on the check. While this is not a significant difference, it is believed that if rain would have fallen on the plots, that not only would the protein difference be greater but harvest tonnage as well.

At the present time the added fertilized plots are much greener in appearance which will directly effect protein content and visual evaluation indicate that the plots have around twice the available forage to harvest. What does this indi-

Stenholm Named Conferee On Nation's Welfare Reform

Congressman Charles Stenholm has been appointed to serve as a conferee to resolve differences in the two separate bills recently passed by the House and Senate to reform the nation's welfare system.

A senior Member of the House Budget Committee, Stenholm was one of 12 House Democrats chosen to serve on the welfare reform conference committee. He authored

and supported a bipartisan welfare reform bill that would have eliminated the federal welfare entitlement and turned the program over to the states with tough work requirements and time limits on benefits.

"I voted against the Majority's welfare reform legislation last week because I am opposed to the federal government dictating to the states a 'one-size-fits-all' approach for

managing welfare programs," said Stenholm. "As a conferee, I look forward to addressing the issue of unfunded mandates being placed on our state and local governments, along with my concerns about the impact this legislation could have on poor children."

Stenholm said that he was encouraged by the Republicans' acceptance on Wednesday of a motion to instruct conferees which addressed many of the concerns he had raised during the welfare debate.

The motion instructs conferees to eliminate unfunded mandates on state and local governments, to maximize protections for children, to prevent the creation of a larger uninsured population, and to guarantee welfare savings are devoted to deficit reduction.

Although the motion is non-binding, Stenholm is hopeful that its passage bodes well for bipartisan agreement in the conference.

Earlier this year, Stenholm played a key role in helping the State of Texas secure a waiver from federal requirements for the

welfare reform bill passed by the Texas Legislature and signed by Governor Bush.

"Our own State of Texas is in the process of implementing an important overhaul of the state's welfare system, but the Texas plan does not meet the requirements of the Majority's bill," observed Stenholm. "I just don't believe the federal government should be able to tell Texans what works best for Texas."

The National Governors Association, the U.S. Conference of Mayors and the National League of Cities have been critical of the House bill for imposing unfunded mandates, while restricting the flexibility to administer welfare programs in the nation's communities.

"Having spent a great deal of time working with welfare providers, recipients and local citizens in the 17th District, I just have to believe Texas can best determine how we look after our needy children and elderly, and how we put able-bodied people to work," added Stenholm.

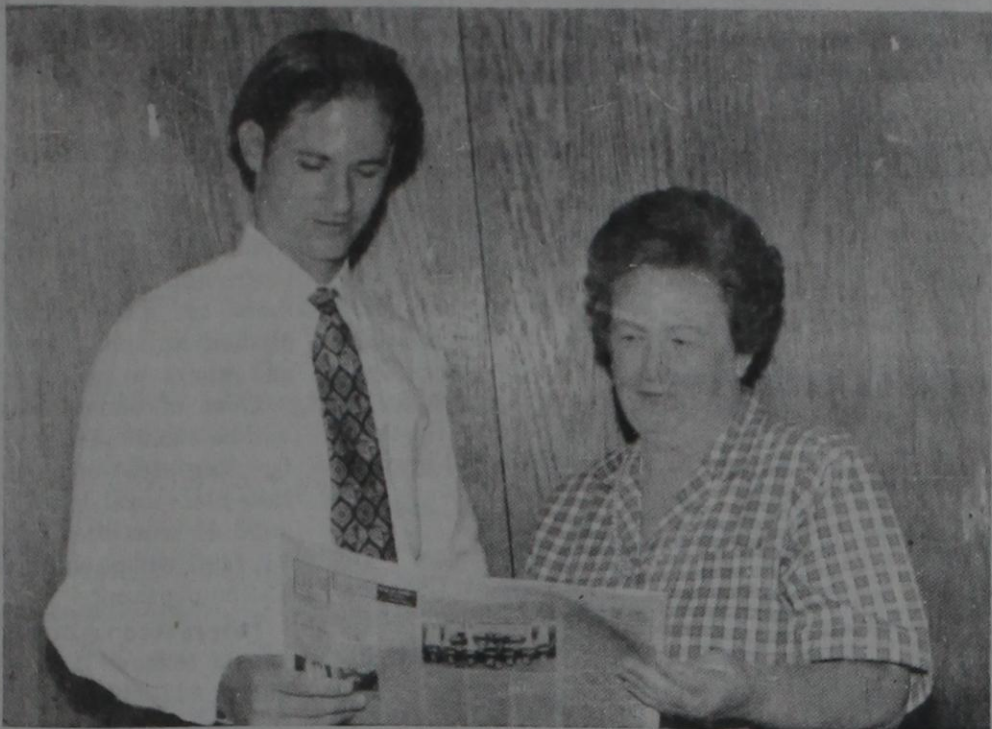

Visible Work Resumes On McCleskey No. 1 Project

After many hours of "behind the scenes" preparation, the visible manual labor has resumed for the Central Texas Historical and Genealogical Preservation's project

to reconstruct the site of J.H. McCleskey No. 1, the discovery well of Ranger's Oil Boom that played such an important role in winning WWI. On June 22nd Lynn

and Jerry Williamson completed the post setting and welding of the frame to fence the acre and half plus site. The society members were already and on July 16th they, along with a

few additional helpers, completed the enclosure and began moving the vintage equipment which on July 21st was all at the site where reconstruction of the wooden derrick is

scheduled for early August. W.G. "Dub" Shivers of Shivers Well Service, Hull, Texas who has the pattern for the derrick, will cut the timbers in their yard at Hull. They will then be transported to the site where Mr. Shivers will supervise the "rig building."

Everyone is invited to attend the dedication of the project scheduled for 4:00 P.M. on September 21, 1996, during the Ranger Exes Homecoming.

From the moment Eastland Attorney Jim Farrar donated the site, and North Ridge Corporation donated the vintage equipment, lots of research, personal contact, and phone calling, along with many volunteers and donations of individuals, businesses, working equipment, labor, and materials, has resulted in the entire project becoming a reality. A list of all donors for the entire project will be published when it nears completion.

The derrick reconstruction that, in the beginning, was believed to cost an estimated \$20,000 will be closer to \$15,000. To date \$7,600 in contributions have been made by SBC Foundation; Clements Foundation; Pate Foundation; W.K. Gordon, Jr. and Family; and a pledge from Ranger College employees. 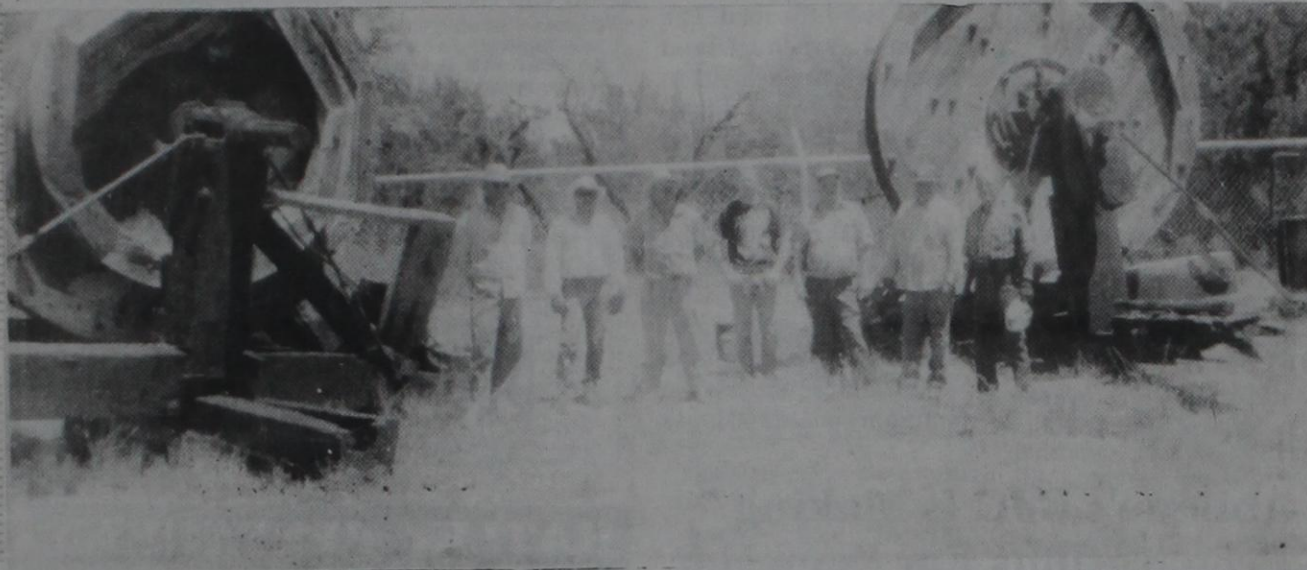

EMPLOYEE THEFT: HOW TO PREVENT IT

In my last column I discussed the risk of employee theft and how to spot it. Now let's talk about ways to prevent it.

Your first safeguard is an effective system of internal controls. This includes the well-tried concepts of segregation of duties, dual controls, standardized policies and procedures, and a thorough review process. Wherever possible, have two people involved in a process. Don't allow the person who writes checks to also reconcile the bank statement, or the person who writes purchase orders to control the inventory records. Don't allow employees to approve their own expenses or time records. Consider requiring dual signatures on checks above a certain amount.

Establish clear priorities and procedures for paying employee expenses, purchasing materials or inventory, and paying invoices, and make sure that they are followed. A thorough monthly review process can be a great deterrent. Don't be embarrassed to set high standards, ask tough questions, and demand good answers.

Not all employee theft is financial. Make sure the layout of your facilities doesn't invite theft. Consider segregating valuable inventory in a high security area. Review security around your shipping and receiving areas. Make sure visitors and outsiders are kept in well-monitored public areas unless accompanied by employee.

Perhaps the most effective way to prevent theft is to screen employees well when you hire them. Follow up on references and listen carefully to the responses. And when employees leave, always change computer passwords and change locks if necessary.

Finally, set a good example yourself. Employees will live up to (or down to) the standards you set. If you bend the rules, they will soon hear about it and consider that acceptable behavior.

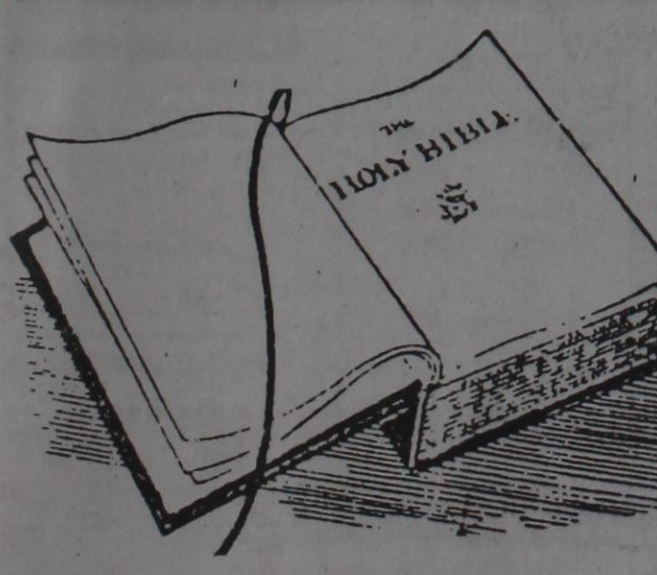
