Child And Adult Care Food Program

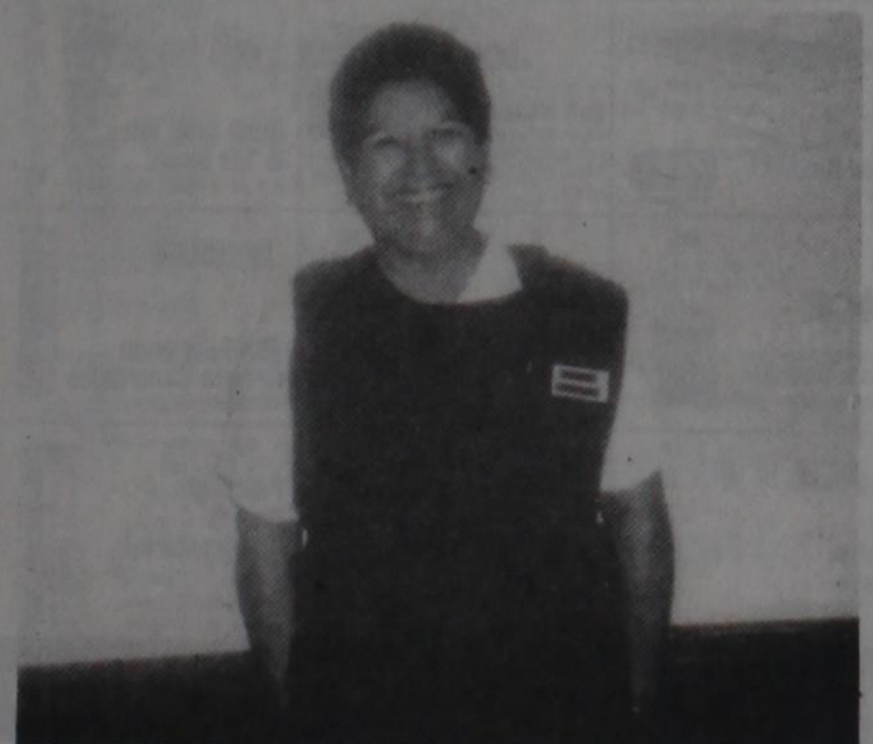

Gov. Bush Proclaims September Texas PTA Membership Enrollment

(Austin) - Gov. George Bush recently proclaimed the month of September as PTA Membership Enrollment Month in Texas. The proclamation states, "Because children need advocates, schools need volunteers and citizens need a link to children's education, all Texans are urged to begin or renew their communities by joining a local PTA."

Fiesta Cisco To Offer Something For Everyone

Blue Grass music with "Star Canyon," "Double Mountain Boys," and "The County Seat" will be a major attraction of Fiesta Cisco, Saturday and Sunday, August 24 and 25, at the Cisco City Park and Jr.-Sr. High School campus.

But there is lots more, with something of special interest for everyone. There will be arts and crafts, antique cars, tractors and machinery, a carnival, water polo, a golf tournament, basketball shootout, barbecue cookoff, junior bull ride, B.A.S.S. national qualifying kids' casting contest, and lots of food and refreshment items.

Fiesta Cisco will be from 10 a.m. until 8 p.m. on Saturday and from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. on Sunday. Extra Costs For Holding Prisoners Report Shows

In a recent budget report, the Eastland County Auditor certified that the county had spent \$62,161 in the previous twelve months beginning July 1 for the maintenance and operation cost of keeping inmates sentenced to the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

A check with Sheriff Bob Richardson disclosed that the State no longer pays anything on these costs - it has not reimbursed the county for this since the new State Jails were built.

The only way the state will reimburse a county is if the prisoners are left here over 45 days after being "paper ready," Richardson said.

The Sheriff explained some of the steps it takes to deliver an inmate to the Texas Department of Corrections.

After a person has been found guilty by the court, the Sheriff's Department notifies the TDC at Huntsville and sends papers with information.

After receiving and looking over these forms, the TDC reports back to the Sheriff that the person is "paper ready." They also schedule a date when they will take the pris-

oner. Sometimes the date is two weeks away, but this is nothing like the backlog a few years ago, Richardson says.

When TDC notifies that they will receive the inmate, all it takes is one piece of paper with him, the Sheriff says.

He remarks that the main trouble on holding prisoners is not with the TDC, but with the "blue" warrants where parole violators are held for the state.

"The Parole Board only has hearings every six or seven months," Richardson says. "The cases can't be disposed of until then."

"Out of 22 inmates we have in the jail today, 5 are being held on state parole violations."

Sheriff Richardson said he would like to see the law changed where persons arrested on parole violations would have to

be sent back to the county where the crime was committed.

This is what happens on a regular warrant now.

A Trip Can Be Refreshing

Lela Latch Lloyd of Cisco found a way to "beat the heat" this summer.

She took a trip to Talkeetna, Alaska, where she homesteaded in the 1970's. Her sister, Mary Carey, still lives in this inter-mountain community, south of Mount McKinley and Denali Park.

It had been three years since Lela Lloyd had been in Alaska. Too long, she decided. During this time she had experienced disability and illness, but managed to pull through it all.

So it felt great to be well enough to board a Delta flight on July 11, and head north.

After 12 hours on the plane Lela was met in Anchorage, Alaska by sister Mary and a niece, Judy Hall of Cleburne, who was visiting in the area. Another niece, Lenore Preston, lives in Anchorage.

Among other relatives visiting in Alaska were Bobby and Mary Jane Little of Eastland. Several of their Eastland friends were also traveling in the vicinity.

Mary Carey, Judy and Lela drove to Mary's home near Talkeetna - a place which includes a gift shop as well as fiddlehead fern farm.

There Lela found a number of things to occupy her. For one thing, she sat at the cash register in the book store and gift shop and helped out.

The weather was cool, with a blanket needed for sleeping at night. Sometimes it was rainy, but the firewood cast a glow over the cleared portions of the forests.

Tourists from many parts of the world were in the area, and a number came by the gift shop to pick up Mary's books on Alaska, Lela's books, or books by Mary's daughter, Jean Richardson. They also bought fiddlehead ferns and interesting gem stones.

North of Talkeetna Jean Richardson, her husband Frank and son Joe were very busy running Mary's McKinley View Lodge. Lela also visited there during her trip.

Jean Richardson had some great news from Houghton Mifflin, a leading publisher. A story from her book "The Courage Seed" will be included in a reader about children from different cultures.

"The Courage Seed" tells of a Navajo Indian girl who moved to Houston.

Mary's McKinley View Lodge was filled with visitors and interesting things. But Lela says that the most unusual business she saw on the trip would have to be the fiddlehead fern farm at Talkeetna.

Mary's five acres of this delicacy, transplanted from the wild, is said to be the only farm like this in the world.

The fiddleheads are harvested when the tender green shoots come up from the melting snow. At the gift shop Mary sells the ferns frozen and canned, and also sells a book with fern recipes.

Lela Lloyd says that the most interesting person she met during her five weeks at Talkeetna was Keith Mytray, a young explorer who crossed the remote Brooks Ranger on foot several years ago.

This trek was written up in the National Geographic magazine in 1993. When he isn't roaming Alaska, Keith Mytray helps Mary Carey with the fern farm.

Lela reports that her "most heartwarming experience" this time was to see the improvements a couple had made to the place she once homesteaded. It has been purchased by Harold Heinze - a retired President of Arco Corp. - and his wife Cheryl. Renters had about trashed the house before the Heinzes bought it.

"I cried for joy when I saw how the house had been repaired and improved," Lela said. "And they have cleared up the grounds, enlarged the yard and garden."

She said that a plaque was being placed on the property, listing her as the homesteader, Mary as the next owner and the Heinze family as the present owners.

On other improvements, Lela says the greatest Church improvement she found was in a Mission Baptist Church near her homestead.

"It started out in the 1970's as a tent in a gravel pit," she says. "Not it's a lovely two-story building, with a kitchen and a gym."

She says the growth of this Church almost mirrors Talkeetna, which had 79 people about the time she first went there. Now it's a bustling tourist center with four airports.

Lela says the only things that disturbed her during her trip was that Frank Richardson and Bobby Little were ill during part of the time. Bobby Little is home now, and expects full recovery.

In early August the weather became colder in Talkeetna. There was frost twice before Lela left on August 15. It was a

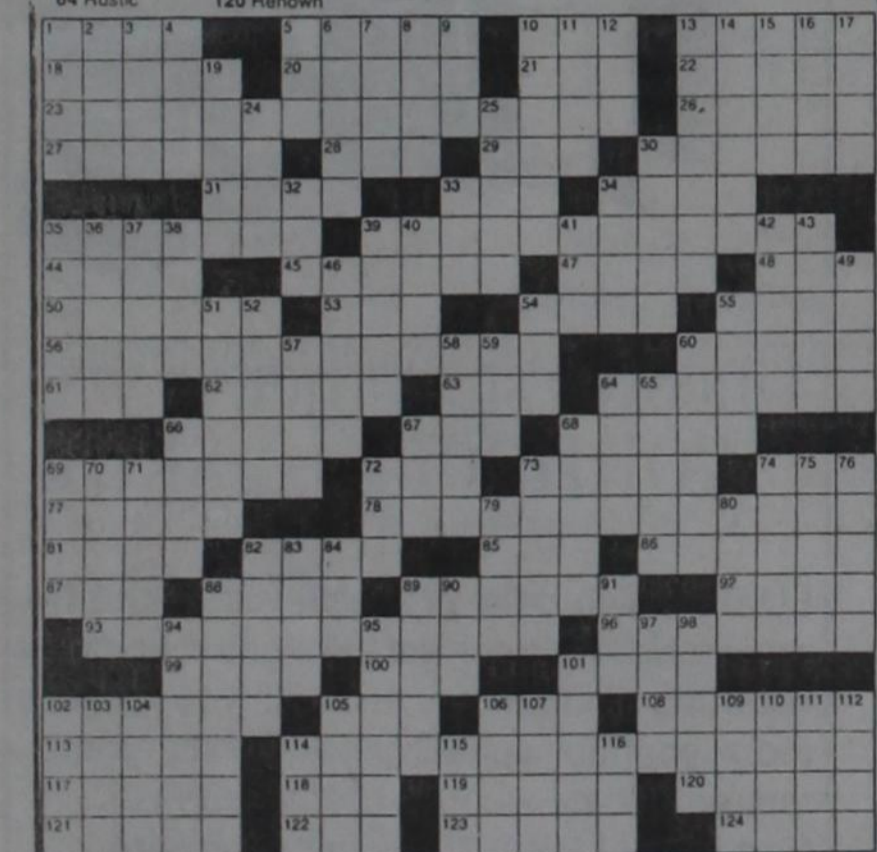

Please, if you submitted a family history for the Eastland County History Book, send us a copy of your history and give us permission to use it in our newsletter and in our home at Maner Memorial Library at Cisco Junior College. We have plenty of room for all you genealogist and for any guest who would enjoy seeing our information and doing research. We would love to have a lot of queries sent in so that the word will go out to other societies that we are all still working on family and so that a relative somewhere might see the query and send in more information. I received some very interesting news this last week from a man in New Jersey who was a relative. None of the family here knew he existed so now by sharing the information we have, our books on family history will grow by many pages. Of course, it also means that it will take some work to sort out the correct data. I am looking forward to it with great anticipation.

Wash Emu breast, remove as much fat as possible. Rub with salt, pepper and flour. Melt butter in a casserole, add 1 cup thinly sliced onions and emu. Brown meat on all sides. Add 1/8 teaspoon ground cloves and cook until tender, about two hours, turning often. Place in baking dish after removing excess fat. Combine 4 tablespoons sugar, 1 tablespoon water, cook in small sauce pan over low heat until browned. Stir into gravy 3 tablespoons wine-vinegar and 1/2 teaspoon dried mint.

SALMON CROQUETTE

1 large can red salmon
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 eggs
1 tablespoon mustard
1 finely chopped onion
2 tablespoon corn meal (or enough to reach desired thickness)

Stir well and drop into a pan of hot deep grease for about 5 minutes. Turn once. Serve with French fries and slaw. My family loves it with syrup and peanut butter on the side.

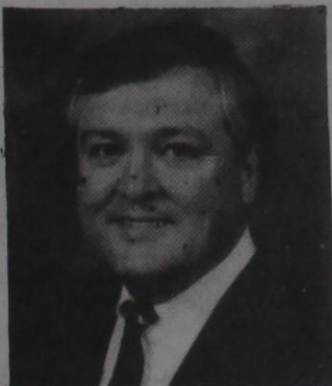

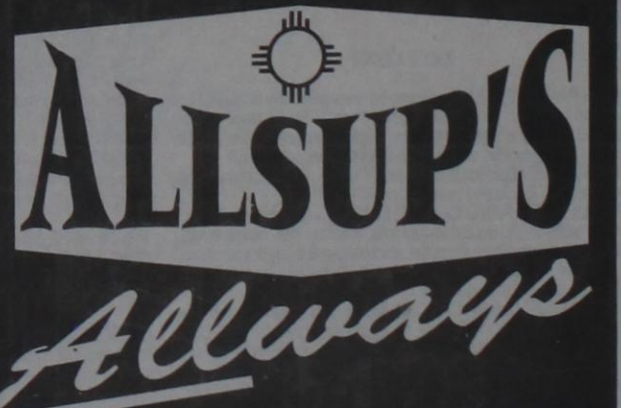

The OUTRIGHT LIES about Public Education are the ones that hit too close to home to be ignored. The truth is that our Public Schools are doing an OUTSTANDING job with the tools they are given (too little money and more things to be responsible for every year). In fact, graduation rates are up, dropouts are down and test scores are improving. The general level of knowledge is at best a guess. Sharp Delivers July Sales Tax Rebates To \$143 Million To Texas Cities and Counties

John Sharp, State Comptroller of Public Accounts, delivered a total of \$143 million in July sales tax rebates to 1,080 Texas cities and 115 counties, a 6.7 percent increase over the July 1995 allocations.

"The fact that local sales tax refunds statewide have averaged 8.6 percent ahead of the first seven months of last year is an excellent indicator of the state's continuing healthy economic climate," Sharp

said. This month's sales tax rebates include taxes collected on May sales and reported to the Comptroller in June by business filing monthly tax returns.

Twenty special purpose districts around the state were sent monthly payments totaling \$3.4 million.

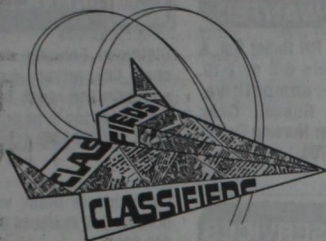

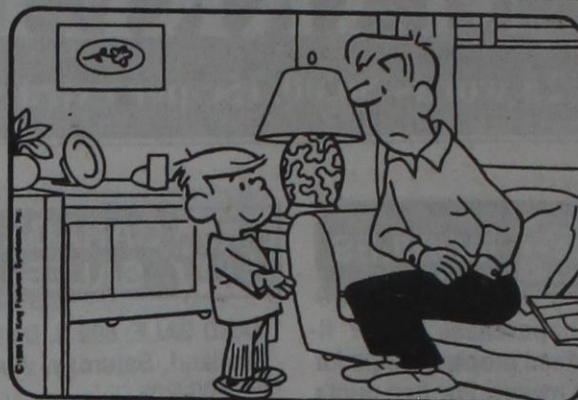

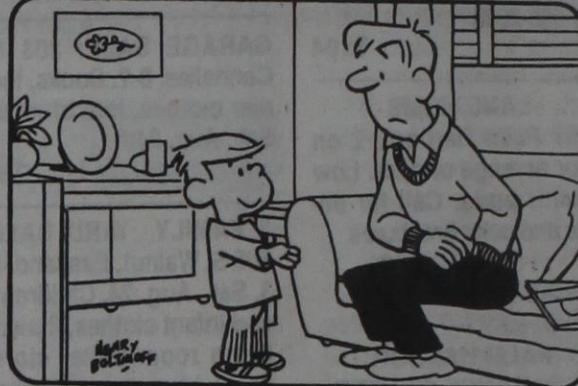

Guest Slot By HVO

Congress passed health care reform legislation on Aug. 1st and the President signed it Wednesday.

It could be a model case to demonstrate how special interests and partisan politics play into these things.

The final bill has good points and some not so good.

The Republicans are touting passage of the bill as a major victory, while the Democrats, while not happy with the finished product, say that it's better than nothing.

Many are disappointed that the "sweeping reform" health care package still does not have any provisions for mental illness. Despite coordinated, bipartisan leadership from Senators Domenici and Wellstone, the support of many members of Congress and the President as well as heroic efforts by the national members of the NAMI (National Alliance for Mental Illness), Congress ultimately settled for legislation that once again abandoned those with mental illness.

Late in July, House and Senate reached a compromise on legislation to curb some of the worst abuses by health insurers. The House okayed the compromise with only two dissenting votes and the Senate unanimously passed it the next day. Democrats opposed Medical Savings Accounts, pushed by the Republicans, and compromised on that provides a four-year, limited test.

The new law protects those who want to change jobs are start a business without losing their present coverage, and also limits pre-existing condition exclusions.

Listed on the "bad" side of the bill are provisions which criminalize transfers of assets to qualify for Medicaid.

A disappointing omission is protection by mental health coverage. In its passage of the original bill, the Senate approved an amendment sponsored by Sens. Pete Domenici and Paul Wellstone, which required that benefits for mental health and substance abuse be comparable to medical benefits. Fierce lobbying by the business community, who claimed it would increase costs drastically, killed the mental health provision in conference negotiations.

Just prior to the final vote on the conference report, Cong. Stark (D-Calif.) moved to "recommit the conference report to the committee" with instructions to modify it to provide mental health insurance parity. His recommitment motion failed 228-198, so the measure passed without that parity.

The Texas Congressional vote: All Republicans except Stockman voted NO for recommitment.

All Democrats except Geren and Stenholm (who voted NO) voted to recommit. (Wilson did not vote).

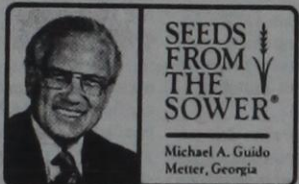

CHANGES WITH AGE

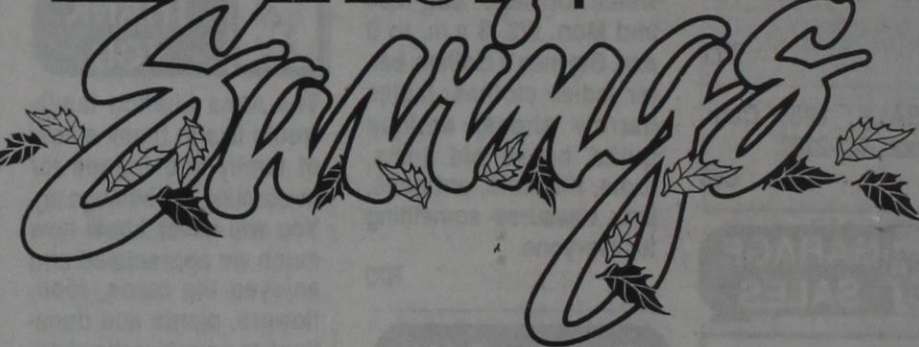

Bulldogs and Buffaloes Stall In Defensive Struggle

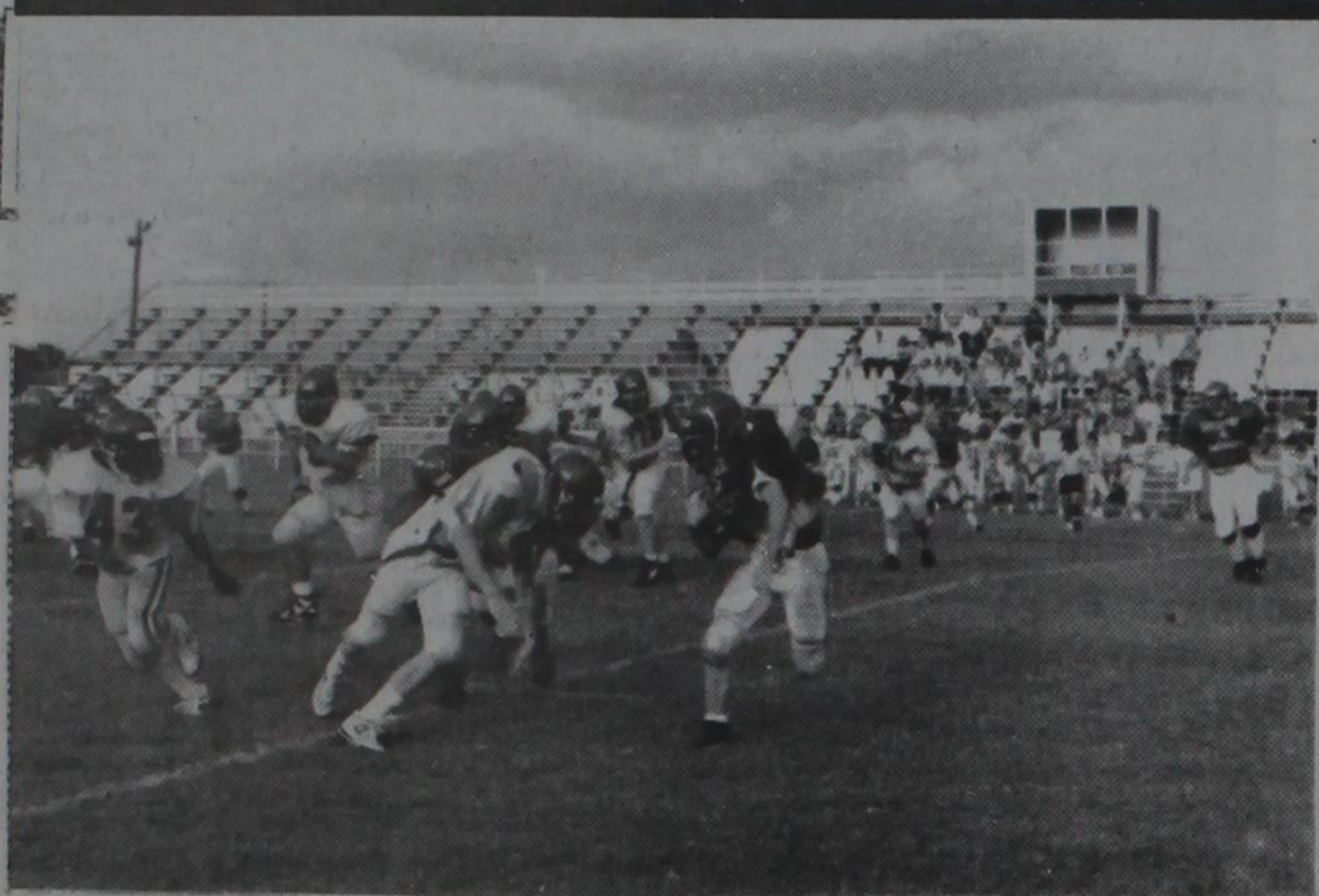

The varsity failed to produce goal line crossings for either team as good defense produced

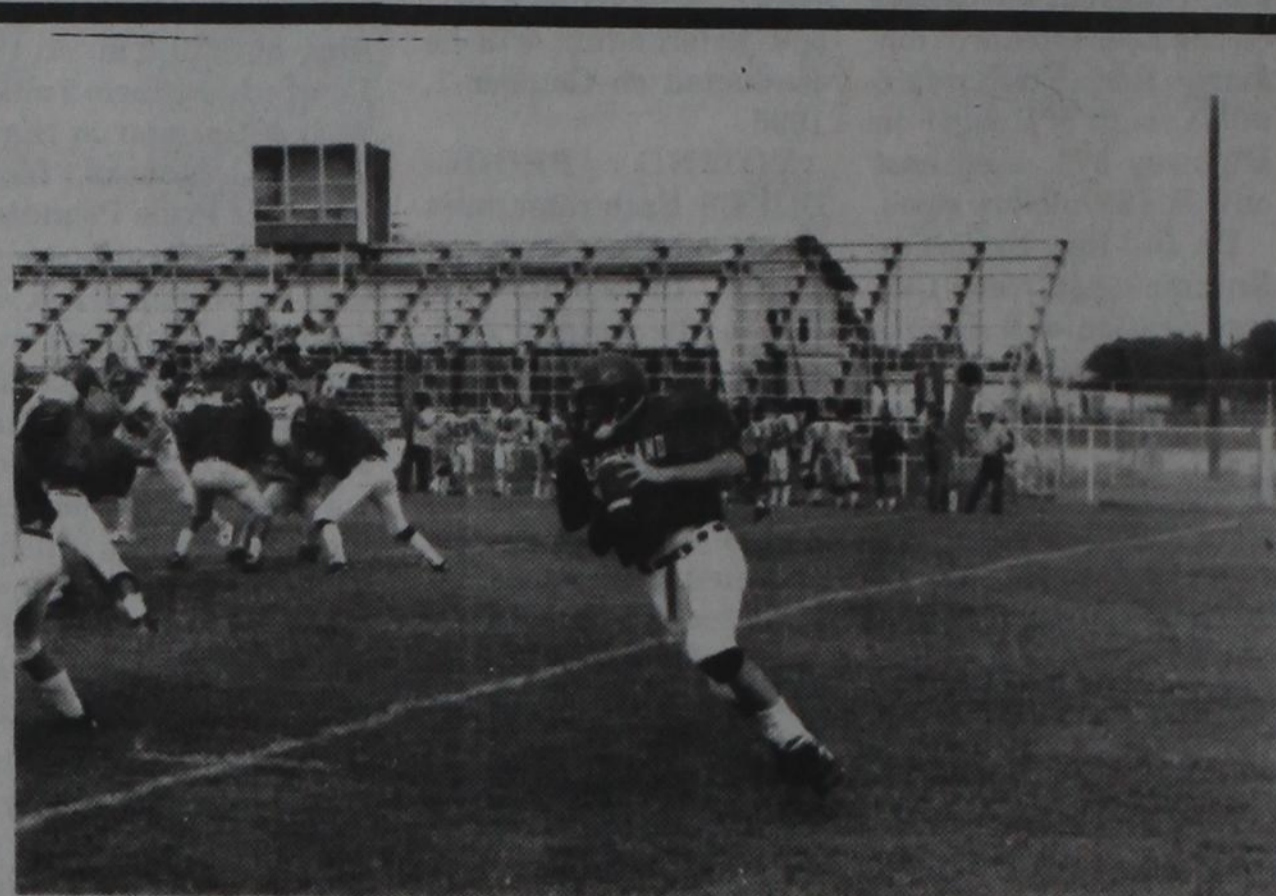

If Will Wood and Webb Ruff with Old Rip were on schedule, they were in awe when they reached New York City at noon on May 15, 1928. They were most impressed, and especially with the Hotel Pennsylvania, where they stayed for 13 days.

This was in the New York Times on May 6: "RIP VAN WINKLE OF TOAD FAMILY COMES TO TOWN - Texas Cornerstone Resident Gives Callers Hard Looks - Phrynosoma "Rip" Cornutum, Van Winkle of the horned toad species, reached New York yesterday from Eastland, Texas, where, his friends and admirers assert, he occu-

pled the cornerston of the city courthouse. . .

"Thirty years in a state of suspended animation do not seem to have lessened Rip's remarkable natural ugliness or improved his temper. There was only a mean glitter in his eye for visitors who saw his yesterday at the Hotel Pennsylvania although his friend and owner, Will M. Wood, who brought him here handled him freely enough. Mr. Wood says that when he was a boy of four he was playing with Rip one afternoon when his father suggested and carried out the creature's incarceration in the cornerstone which was being laid that day. Both were on hand last February to see Rip emerge, sluggish but indubitable alive.

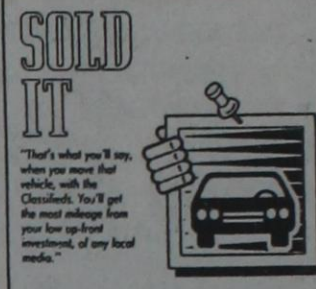
"Rip has been exhibited in several cities along the road to New York, and has even had an audience with President Coolidge, who according to Mr. Wood, stroked Rip's back

gingerly, and exclaimed: "How remarkable!"

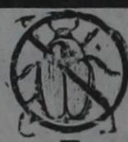
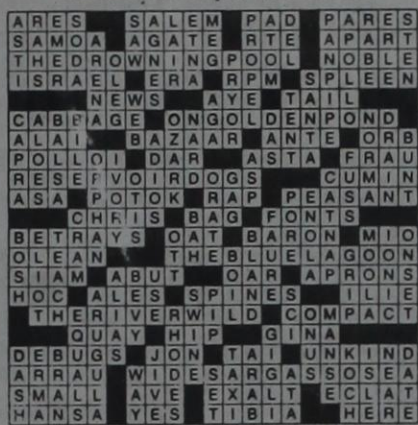

Fighting For Civil Justice

After nearly a decade of fighting for civil justice reform in Texas, I thought I had seen just about everything. Now it looks like Texas drivers could end up paying for one of the biggest litigation boondoggles in our history.

A Dallas plaintiff's lawyer recently filed a class action lawsuit in a South Texas courtroom, alleging that two auto insurance companies illegally computed premiums. He is asking for more than \$100 million in damages. That comes out to about \$30 to \$40 for each policyholder and \$30 to \$40 million for the plaintiff's lawyers. Ever wonder why plaintiff's lawyers are falling

over each other to file class action claims?

The insurance companies say they were following regulations adopted by the State Department of Insurance. The insurance commissioner agrees, but has indicated that the rules will be changed for future premium calculations. The companies have vowed that they will follow any new rules issued by the Department.

Sounds reasonable, right? Not if you're a plaintiff's lawyer who stands to make \$40 million dollars. That's why the lawyer filed the suit in South Texas, just three days before new judge-shopping rules went into effect, and not in a major city, where most of the affected policyholders live. It's also why the lawyer then had to decide whether to hear the case or defer to the Department. How do you think the judge ruled?

There's more. The plaintiff's lawyer has put up hundreds of thousands of dollars to run

television advertisements in major media markets. The advertisements strongly imply that the insurance companies are intentionally ripping off consumers and encourage affected policyholders to sign up as plaintiffs in the lawsuit.

Obviously, the insurance companies asked the South Texas judge to prevent the ads from going on the air, arguing that the ads were prejudicial and would make it almost impossible to get a fair trial. Guess how the judge ruled on that one.

With this case Texas has reached a new level of lawsuit abuse. As if blatant judge-shopping and cozy judge-lawyer relations were not enough, we are now allowing plaintiff's lawyers to sell their case to the public over the airwaves - with no regard for a defendant's right to a fair and balanced process, whoever the defendant may be.

It's perfectly clear what the plaintiff's lawyer is trying to do here. Hand pick the most favorable court and judge you can find. Hire the judge's buddy to run interference for you. Put an ad

on television accusing the defendant of being a crook. Superheat the atmosphere around the case so much that the defendant is forced to give up his rights and agree to some outrageous settlement. Fat multi-million dollar fees for the plaintiff's lawyer; peanuts for the consumers "represented" by the lawyer.

If the plaintiff's lawyer is permitted to get away with this scam, it will cost every Texas driver money. All because one plaintiff's lawyer saw a way to make the system work for him. Those who think we've had enough legal reform had better think again. Regardless of what happens in this particular case, Texas courts are still the forum of choice for plaintiff's lawyers all over the country. Although we have made some progress, we are a long way from a court system that is free from manipulation and legal chicanery. Ralph Wayne is President of the Texas Civil Justice League, a non-profit organization that advocates tort and judicial reform.
