BOVINA FOOTBALL FANS all agree that the 1980 season has been very successful from all angles.

Having already clinched a winning record, standing at 6-3 going into his final game, Coach Paul Toppliff must be considered a great motivator, since this year's aggregation of talent is not materially different from those of recent years.

Included in the team's winning column are decisions over highly-rated Plains, pre-season district favorite Vega, and county rival Farwell. And fans aren't convinced that the Mustangs can't upend Springlake-Earth in their season finale, which would be quite a feather in their collective caps.

With their win over Farwell, the Mustangs can claim the unofficial "Parmer County Championship." They were the only one of the four county high schools to face all of the other three: they outscored Friona in the pre-season scrimmage, two touchdowns to one, and then downed Lazbuddie, 25-0 in a regular-season game.

Things look good for a year from now in the gridiron picture, as BHS will not lose too many seniors from this year's squad, and should be even more salty in 1981.

Sophomore quarterback Dale Gilbreath has been the leading passer for class AA quarterbacks in this region for most of the year, and stands a chance to hold his ranking in the final standings.

Regardless of the outcome of Friday's game, the Ponies have had a great year, and we congratulate them and Coach Toppliff on a job well done.

THE SUSAN B. ANTHONY dollar has had a less than illustrious career. It was announced this week that the controversial dollar coin, introduced 16 months ago, is still far from gaining the acceptance which the government had hoped it would.

Of the 850 million coins minted, only 300 million are now in circulation. The rest of the coins are in Federal Reserve and U.S. Mint vaults, and production on the coins has come to a standstill.

The government, it is said, has spent almost \$600,000 on a nationwide promotional campaign, and is experimenting with ways to make the dollars more appealing.

Businessmen complain that the coin looks and feels too much like a quarter, and if you have had any of the "Susie" dollars, you know what they mean. The U.S. Treasury Department is considering minting a new version, perhaps using an alloy that would give the coin a gold color, and placing an eagle on the back with a large raised numeral "1".

The only trouble with using an alloy is the fact that most alloys which would be used might turn the coin a sickly green after a short use, but experts are working on this problem and say they have a solution.

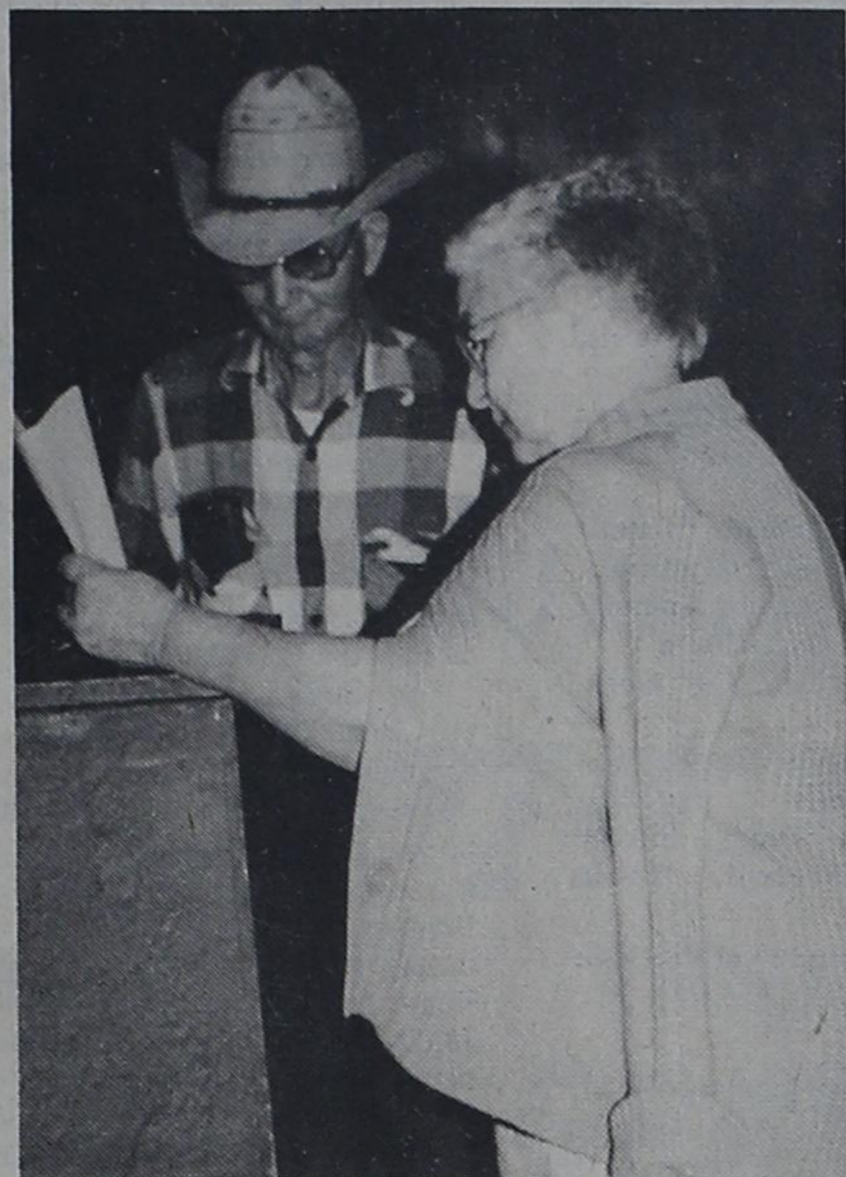
The government, it is said, isn't just being stubborn in wanting to replace dollar bills with dollar coins. It costs two cents to print a dollar bill, which lasts only an average of eighteen months in circulation.

The cost for minting the dollar coin is around three cents each, and the average life for a coin is 15 years. This would be an annual savings of \$50 million.

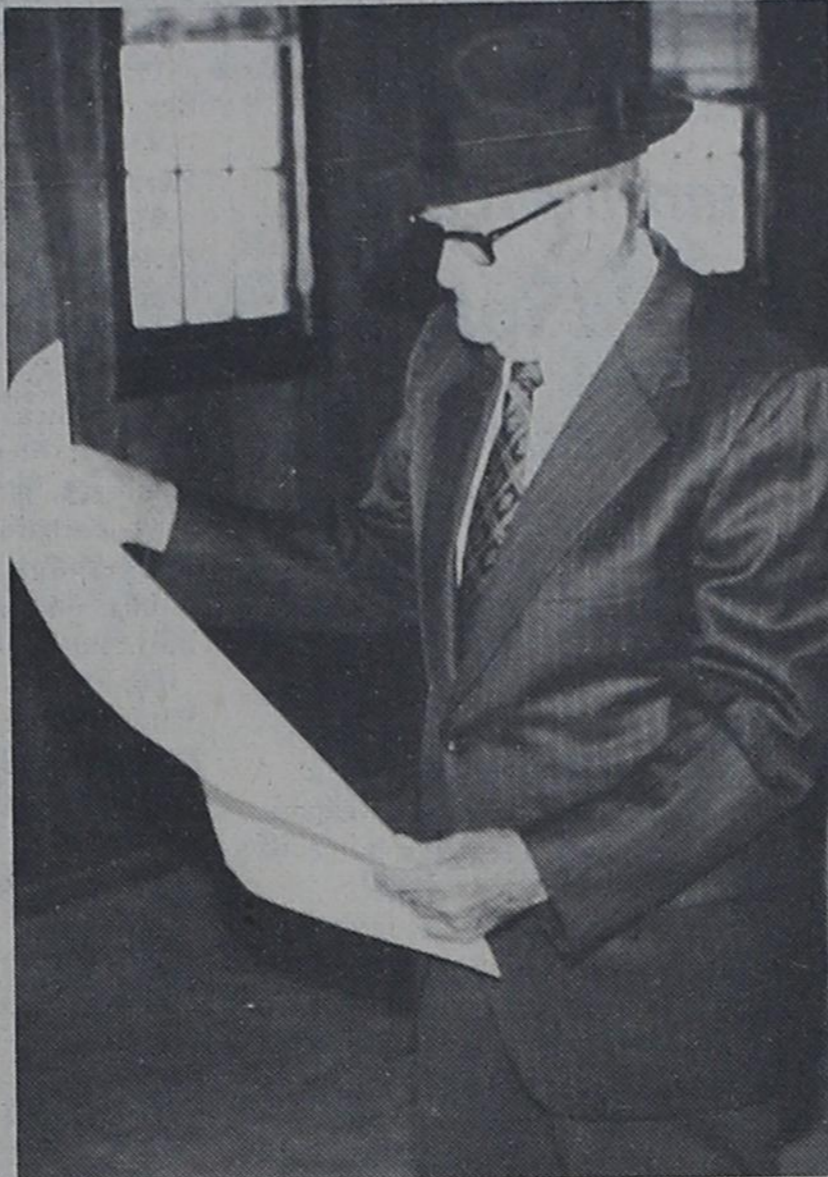
We're all for saving money. Hopefully the government will come up with a better alternative than the Susie dollar.

Ponies Top Farwell; Host S-E Friday

The Bovina Mustangs put it all together again Friday night to take a 7-0 victory over the Farwell Steers. The victory couldn't have been more satisfying since it came at the expense of arch-rivals.

Following a scoreless first half the Maroons picked up their seven points in the third quarter. The Steers' punter received a bad snap from center and the Mustangs recovered the ball on the Farwell five-yard line to set up for the Mustangs touchdown.

Quarterback Dale Gilbreath passed to Ricky Shepherd for the six points with 4:35 left on the clock in the third period. Ricky Shepherd kicked the PAT for a 7-0 Bovina lead.

Bovina had two other serious scoring threats during the game, having one pass intercepted in the Farwell end zone. Another time, they moved the ball to Farwell's one-foot line, but failing to get it across.

The Mustangs defense did an exceptionally good job holding the Steers throughout the game.

Shepherd caught 10 of Gilbreath's passes for 147 of Bovina's 157 yards as the win improved their season record to 6-3 and 2-2 in district play. Meanwhile, Farwell falls to 0-4 in district and 4-5 for the season.

Receiving the Offensive Player of the week is Ed Chisom. Special Team, Tim Grissom, and Hardest Hit is Jon Riddle.

"I'm very pleased with the team. This is our first big win away from home, a step up the ladder. I feel we have accomplished what we set out to do: have a winning season," said Coach Toppliff.

"Our team likes to play good teams. Springlake-Earth is 9-0 for the season, they have the quickest team we've faced. They are big physically and very quick. I'm very excited, we haven't lost at home yet. We will play for fun, more wide open and have a good time, with the idea of winning," he said.

An invitation has been sent by a committee to those whose addresses

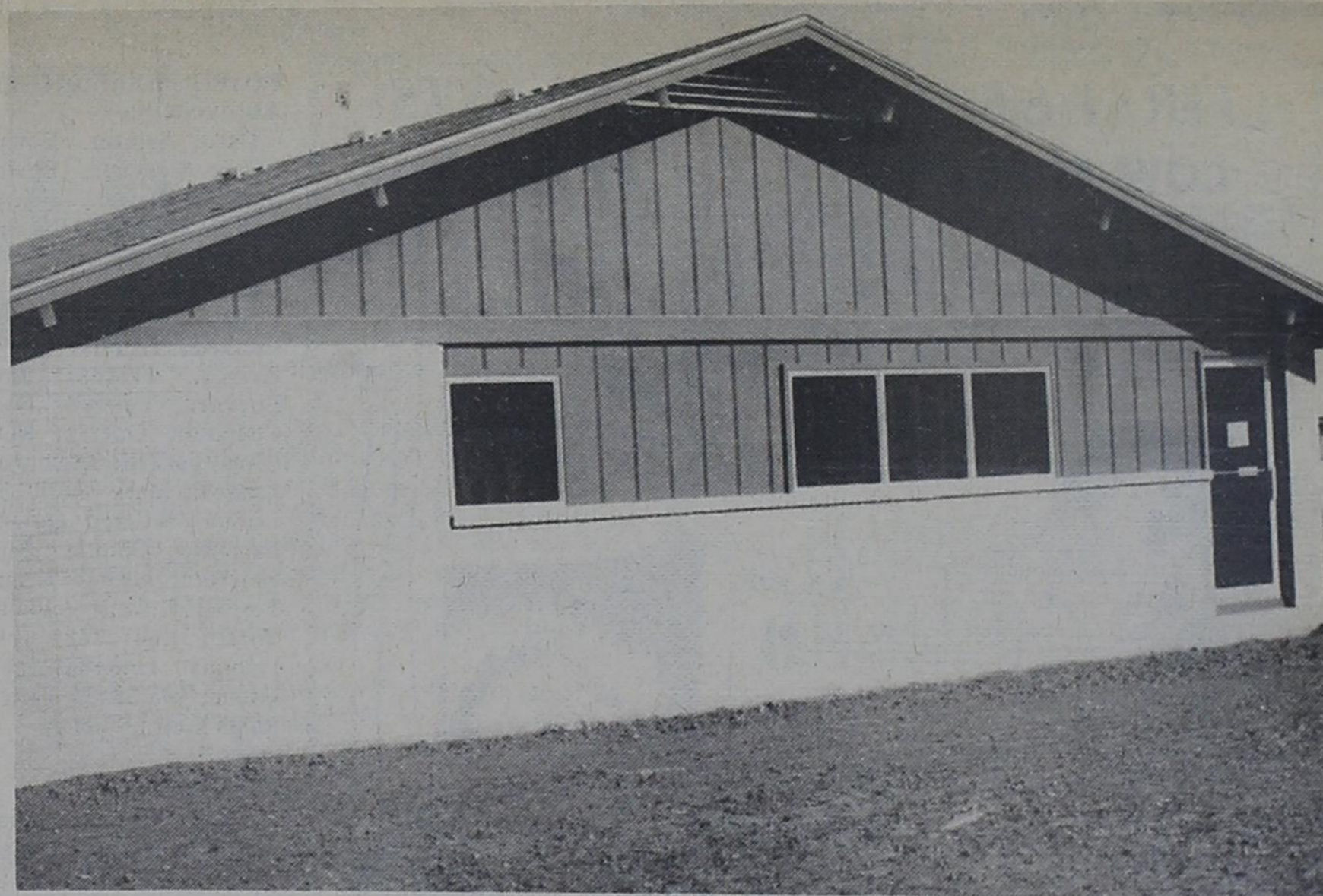
Sr. Citizens Host Dinner

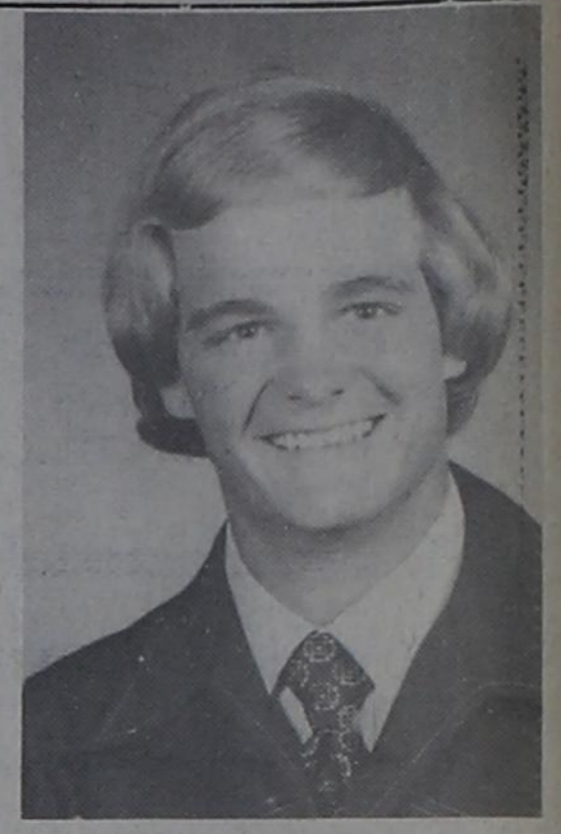

Dear Editor,

It has come to our attention that in spite of the two articles which have appeared in the October 1st and 15th issues of the Blade, there are still some questions about the Clinic debt owed at the First State Bank.

The Bovina Medical Clinic, as everyone knows, belongs to the community.

When Dr. Bolch came to our clinic, he was guaranteed \$4,000 per month for two months, May and June. Because the first two months were during a slack period, the Clinic Board found it necessary to borrow \$5,000 as this was the difference between receipts and the guarantee.

Later on, in September, Dr. Bolch said he needed \$2,500 in order to pay his bills and continue to practice in Bovina.

Some donations had come in and the Board only needed to borrow \$1,700 to meet the Doctor's needs.

The Clinic is at the present time, \$6,700 in debt.

Your donations are needed and will be appreciated. We extend a hearty "thank you" to all who have already donated.

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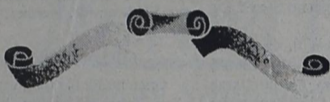

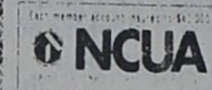

Opportunities for sewing professionally have never been better, so think about starting your own sewing business.

More and more women are employed outside the home and in need of expanded wardrobes, so potential clients are increasing.

In addition to the financial rewards of having your own sewing business, self-confidence and respect are extra rewards for the successful seamstress.

How To Start

Check locally to determine sewing and alteration charges or fees in your area. This will "pay off" in helping you establish your fees.

Some fees are set by the garment type, but they may also be influenced by fabric and extra detailing.

It's advisable to seek an attorney's advice in developing a contract for sewing services and an accountant's advice for necessary business records.

Studies show that many professional seamstresses don't take advantage of tax deductions, keep complete business records or have adequate insurance.

Also, you can advertise your services in the newspaper's classified section to get started, but remember that most people choose a seamstress from personal referrals and word-of-mouth.

Yes! You!

Knowing what clients want will help you understand your skills are unique, and the more skillful you are, the more demand there will be for your expertise, so, in deciding, be sure to consider these major factors: client desires, needs.

Clients often are interested in paying someone with skills in handling special fitting problems, redesigning garments or sewing special fabrics.

Many want unique or special looks not available in ready-to-wear garments.

Some feel they will save money compared to buying ready made, but they don't feel they have the time or skills to sew for themselves.

Be Business-Minded

Once you decide to venture into your own business, you will "be your own boss," of course, but it's also wise to be business-minded.

For example, so that both parties will have maximum satisfaction, it's important for the customer and the professional seamstress to agree in advance on labor charges, customer-or seamstress-supplied materials, number of fittings, down payment, method of payment and completion date.

With these thoughts in mind, there's really no reason, if you want to try, why you can't be a success in your own sewing business!

Whitefield was dead on arrival at Parmer County Community Hospital of an apparent heart attack at about 8 a.m. Friday.

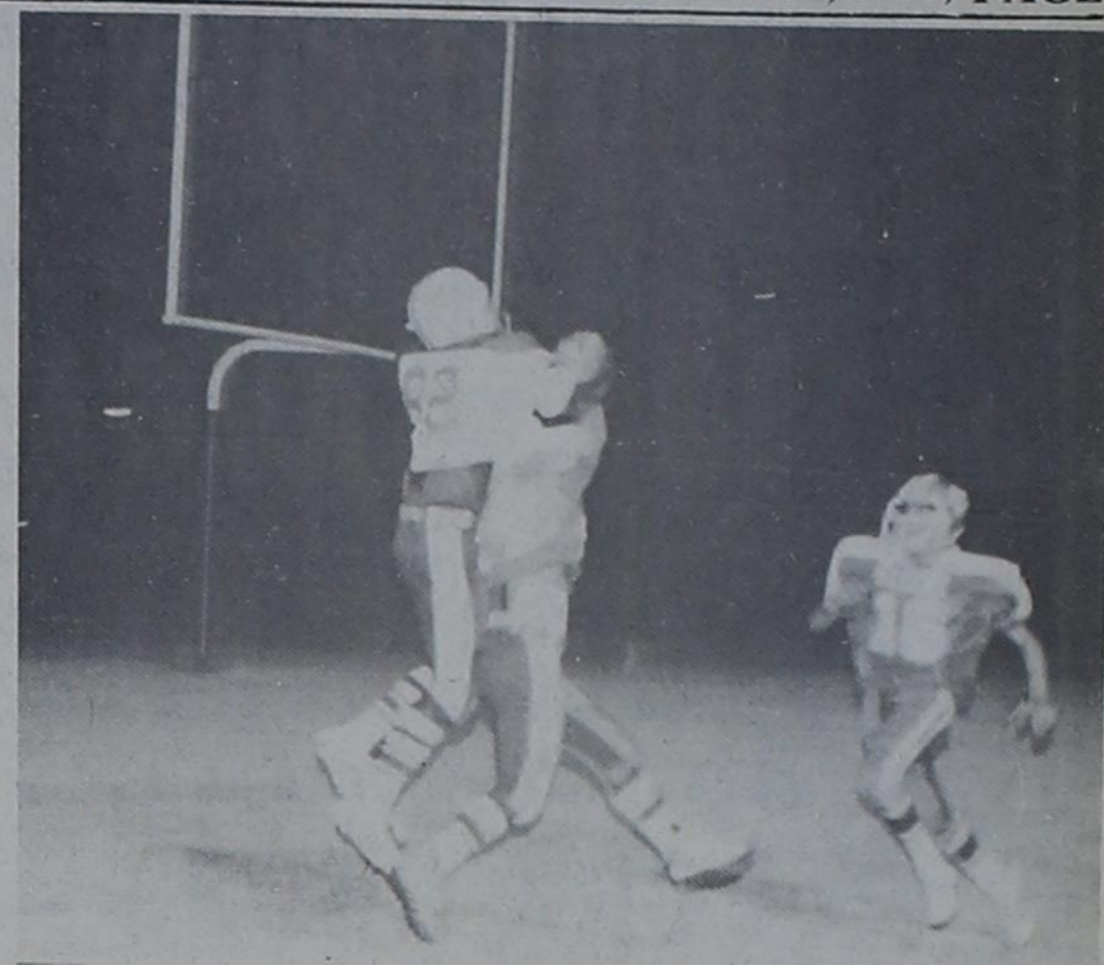

He was a member of the Parmer County Historical Commission since its inception, and was chairman of the organization's history book project.

He had served as chairman of the Lakeview voting precinct from 1947 to the present. He was superintendent of the Sunday School department, and had served in all leadership capacities of the Congregational Church.

Survivors include his wife Grace; one brother, Mike Whitefield of Houston. Two nephews also survive, Chief and Mike Buchanan, and a niece, Lisa Buchanan, all of Friona.
