Council Tables Proposed Truck Parking Ordinance

BOUGHTON, PENICK, HALE ON EQUALIZATION BOARD

The City Commission tabled a proposed city ordinance making it unlawful to park trucks on Concho Ave. between East Third Street and Mulberry Street, when it met in regular session Monday night at the city hall.

After the proposed ordinance was read by Mayor J. T. Ratliff and a general discussion was held, the commission voted unanimously to table the ordinance as the only group of citizens represented at the meeting were unanimous in their disapproval of the proposed ordinance. The bill was tabled until such time as representatives of the group favoring passage of the ordinance appear before the com-

Mayor Ratliff read several letters from the auditing firm of T. B. Trotter Co. of Austin, wherein the company agrees to audit the city's books from October 1, 1941 to September 1, 1945 for \$1,200 plus expenses, the audit to start

as soon as possible. A. R. Montgomery, Municipal Power Plant employee, appeared before the commission stating that he represented J. C. Berry and Jim Luckie, and requested that employees of the plant be given a raise due to sharply increasing costs of living. After a discussion the commission stated that salaries would not be raised before completion of the audit in August and that salary increases were being

Dr. J. F. Howell gave the injured man emergency treatment at the scene of the accident and he was later moved to a San Angelo hospital. He suffered multiple cuts and bruises and a possible back injury.

Although Revelas was traveling in the direction of Ozona, his truck struck the bridge railing on the left side. The left rear wheel hung on the curb of the bridge and tore out both rear wheels and the rear axle causing the truck to turn over. The vehicle came to a stop about 50 yards from the point of impact, according to Brooks Powell, deputy sheriff who made the investigation.

Soil Testing Lab Set Up At A & M

A soil testing laboratory has been set up at Texas A. and M. of soil samples. The service, as set up by the Board of Directors, is open to the general public. The 'aboratory will be operated by the Division of Chemistry, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, in cooperation with the School of Agriculture and the Extension Service. Fees will be charged ranging from 25 cents to \$7.50 for a

complete soil analysis. "An analysis of a sample of soil improperly taken is without value," Dr. J. F. Fudge, who is to be in charge of the laboratory, pointed out. He urged that persons wishing to submit soil samples write to the Soil Testing Laboratory, Texas Agrcultural Experiment Station, College Station, Texas, and ask for sampling direc-

Information with reference to the soil, its use and location, is also needed, and a form provided by the laboratory must be filled out and returned with the soil sample.

After the analysis is completed the results will be turned over to the Extension Service where M K. Thornton, agricultural chemist, and his associates will make recommendations for the improvement of the soil in the light of the chemical content and history.

The county agent in Sutton county will receive a copy of all local analyses and recommendations, and will be able to aid in the solution of other problems which may arise in the light of local condi-

George D. Chalk Loses Arm In Wreck Sunday

Sam Adams of Sonora suffered a mangled left arm necessitating amputation Sunday morning when the car he was driving toward Sonora veered to the left and sideswiped a truck.

Adams was given first aid by Jack Dudley, driver of the truck, at the scene of the accident and then brought to Sonora in an ambulance where he received further treatment. He was then rushed to a San Angelo hospital where his arm was amputated above the elbow Sunday afternoon. At last report his condition was grave. He received two transfusions earlier in the week and was to have had a third Thursday morning.

The collision happened on an incline about 7 miles from Sonora about noon Sunday. Dudley, whose home is in Brownwood, and whose statement was verified by his son and two nephews who accompanied him, said that he noticed Adams' car veering toward him and tried to pull off the road. He had his right wheels off the pavement when Adams' car hit the first standard on the left side of the trailer. Dudley said he stopped and Adams continued about 100 yards, stopped, backed up and left his car across the road where it was found by Deputy Brooks Powell who investigated the accident.

According to Sheriff Brown damage to Adams' car, a 1936 Chevrolet sedan, included a door handle knocked off and bent feners. Others said that Adams' life was saved through the quick action of the truck driver in applying a tourniquet to the injured

1946 Wool Sales Absentee Voting Pass Two Million Began Sunday Mark July 1

APPRAISAL FIGURES NEARLY \$1,000,000

Statistics released this week by George D. Chalk, manager of the Sonora Wool and Mohair Company, revealed that 2,135,855 pounds of eight and twelve months wool have been sold through July 1, 1946. Of this amount, Chalk said, 1,370,051 has been shipped and 765,804 is in the waarehouse awaiting shipment. Included in this total is 1943 through 1946 wool.

Total 1946 wool appraised to date amounts to 1,939,746 pounds which was appraised at \$906,262.49. This includes both eight and twelve months and averages 46.71 cents.

Last appraisal made, according to Chalk, was on July 1, when 230,000 pounds of twelve months brought \$106,865.38 and 16,935 pounds of eight months brought \$7,026.65, Appraisers were George E. Allison, Blanks Oglesby and A. S. Baker.

MRS. BRICE IMPROVING AFTER FALL SUNDAY

Mrs. A. H. Brice was reported to be improving slightly Wednesday following a thirty foot fall from the Devil's River Dam Sunday morning. Mrs. Brice fell about 6:50 o'clock Sunday morning. while descending from the concrete porch on the East side of the dam.

According to Brice, he and his wife and daughter were standing on the porch overlooking the dam when they decided to climb down to the edge of the lake. Mrs. Brice went first and evidently slipped as she began the descent.





Builders Cautioned That Present Termite Control - Is Inadequate

Termites are found in every section of Texas and do as much damage in this state as elsewhere in the nation in spite of termite control measures, according to Charles A. King, Jr., entomologist for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, who is recommending a vigorous war against these undercover agents.

It is especially important now to conserve lumber and other cellulose building materials necessary for repairs, remodeling, and essential construction, he points out. Termite damage in the nation is estimated at 37 million dollars every year.

The next few weeks termites still will be swarming, which makes them easy to discover. Termites are what is known as white ants and can fly during the swarming season. Later they lose their wings. The pests form concealed canals in which they travel and can eat away wood until "you'll step through the dining room floor before you know they're around," King warns.

If infestation is discovered, consult the County Agent or a termite control specialist. Measures also are listed in Farmers Bulletin 1911 issued by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Where new construction is planned, King recommends these precautions: Remove all wood or cellulose materials from the building site. Don't place any untreated timber in contact with the ground. Make sure there is at least 18 inches of clearance under buildings which don't have cellars, basetions. Provide good drainage and cross ventilation under buildings of frame construction. Allow at least two feet of screened opening for every 25 lineal feet of wall. Seal spaces around pipes and other floor or wall openings with coal ar pitch. Inspect for termites at least twice a year.

WASHINGTON **NEWS LETTER**

The house moved fast last week, passed various appropriation bills, adopted conference agreements on Selective Service, OPA, a pay increase for Army and Navy en-listments, and other routine busi-

Washington is going through another transportation strike, with taxis out of action this time. The cab unions are striking because the District Committees in Congress have not acted to limit the number of permits for taxis here. Some cabs are running, however, and a few of the drivers have been attacked by hoodlums, presumably men on strike. But it seems that folks get along very well without taxis and 10,000 of them taken off the streets relieves the traffic jam

The Texas delegation of 21 in Congress will see a lot of new faces when the 80th Congress meets next January. Four present members are not running again. These are Hatton Sumners of Dallas, Fritz Lanham of Ft. Worth, Luther Johnson of Corsicana, and Sam Russell of Stephenville. Sumners came to Congress in 1913 with Speaker Sam Rayburn. They were sworn in on March 4th of that year and have served continuously since then. Rayburn rose to the Speakership, while Sumners has for twelve years been Chairman of the powerful Judiciary Committee.

Fritz Lanham, one of the most able and beloved Members of Congress, has served nearly 28 years, while Luther Johnson is finishing his 12th term. Russell, who is quitting because of his health, will have served three terms.

Of the remaining seventeen Tex. as. Members, six are unopposed. They are Rayburn, Worley, Pickett, Lyle, Poage and Fisher. Ed Gossett of Wichita Falls is one of the Texas Members who has the active opposition of the CIO-PAC. His race, along with that of Milton West of Brownsville, who is opposed by the same group, is of particular political interest here.

Generally, over the Nation, the incumbents have thus far been favored at the primary polls this year. Of 184 M. bers who have been up for recomination, so far only four have been defeated in the primaries.

TIPS FOR HOME GARDENERS

Home gardeners and landscapers need to look ahead for jobs done now will pay rich dividends in the

For flowers which bloom in the rall, plant now amaranthus, cockscomb, cosmos, four-o'clocks, marigolds, periwinkles, petunias, portviaca, sunflowers, tithonia and zirnias.

It is suggested that these be planted in half-shade, using a cold frame or canvas covering to protect the seedlings from the hot san. Some thriving young plants new may be placed in the full sun. These include ageratum, bache-lor's button, cockscomb, coleus, four-o'clocks, cosmos, periwinkle, petunia, salvaia and zinnia.

Bulbs and tubers which may be plented in July are dahlias gladiolus, oxalis, water hyacincths, waterlillies, and waterpoppies. Texas bluebonnet seed may be sowed now, but these will not come up until fall, so plant where they are to remain, the specialist

Where fall blooming plants are forming long awkward branches, these may be cut or pinched back. Among those which may require this attention are dahlias, chrysanthemums, poinsettias, and liatris. Tall growing plants may need to be staked. Cuttings made of shrubs, trees, and many flowers (such as petunias and Carnations) will root immediately now if given half shade and plenty of moisture.

This advice is given on watering: Give all plants a long slow soaking and let them show signs of thirst before watering again. This keeps their roots deep in the soil. During dry weather, "use of the hoe instead of the hose" keeps plants
