#### Aussies' Raise In Price Threatens Wool Shortage

10 TO 15 PER CENT INCREASE MAY REMOVE FINE WOOLS FROM U. S. MARKET

The American Wool Council said today reports of 10 to 15 per cent increases in prices at Australian wool auctions threatens "an acute shortage of fine wools" needed by domestic manufacturers.

OPA has decontrolled domestic wool, but maintained price controls on foreign wool. The council said 70 per cent of the raw material needed by American textile manufacturers in 1947 would be foreign

The industry will consume 1,000,000,000 pounds in 1947, the council estimated, and domestic wool production will approximate 300,000,000 grease pounds. Chief foreign sources are Australia and might be a possibility of some 35 South Africa.

The OPA limitation based on 1942 prices for foreign wools may cause Americans to be "bid out of" the market", the council contended, thereby leaving domestic manufactureers "crically short" of fine

The Commodity Credit Corporation's stockpile of approximately 560,000,000 pounds cannot meet the demand, the council said.



"A small number of veterans seniority from the date of original have in the past been obtaining certification. certification for the purchase of surplus property by representing themselves to be engaged in or about to engage in an established business, whereas they have actually been found to be merely representing commercial dealers in buying of surplus property," Morton added. He stated that this practice has resulted in not only depriving the veteran seeking to go into business for himself of short supply items, but has served to enable some dealers to get veterans to act for them in acquiring property considerably ahead of normal dealers buying position by utilizing the veteran under the number two priority granted exservicemen by the Manasco Act of Congress.

Under stringent regulations now in force, veteran purchasers seeking to buy from War Assets Administration will be protected, since all new applicants for certification will be required to produce three credentials not formerly requested by WAA. They are
(1) Evidence that he is or will be engaged in business requiring the property sought; (2) A copy the property sought or other learners. So of lease, rental agreement or other evidence of control of warehouse or storage space sufficient to house property sought; (3) evidence of possession by applicant of licenses required by law.

### To Eliminate Veteran Brokers'

Oil and gas development covers all of Texas, a map prepared by the Texas Mid-Contintent Oil and Gar Association shows, Every one of Texas' 254 counties now produces or has produced oil or gas, or has land under lease for oil and gas exploration, the map reveals.

Nearly 54.000,000 acres, or virtually one-third of the state's total land area, are now leased to Texas oil and gas operators. Last year their lease and royalty payments to Texas farmers, ranchers and other land-owners totalled \$215,000,000, providing a large "extra crop" for Texas agriculturalists. Since 1919 such payments have aggregated more than two billion dollars, or an extra cash bonus of nearly one-seventh of the value of all Texas; agricultural crops during this period, the association reported.

Oil and gas are now produced in approximately 1,100 different fields in 166 counties scattered through Texas, while an additional 17 counties formerly produced. The 71 other counties are now being actively explored for oil and gas, with land under lease for drilling.

#### Centennial Plan Considerate of Veterans

The future well-being of Texas is dependent primarily upon a sound economy and the happiness of our rural communities, for it is said that the farm is the "cradle of the nation." The life of our rural communities must be attractive—economically, socially, spiritually, and physically, so that our people will be drawn to the land.

World War II saw the greatest movement of youth from rural areas in history, with more than 1,500,000 of them serving in the armed forces and from 2,000,000 to 3,000,000 others in our war industries. Many of them have already returned to their farm and ranch communities, but whether or not the best of them will remain to develop the citizenship so important in America depends upon the initiative of the rural community. None of reconversion's basic objectives comes so close to home as the re-establishment of our returning servicemen and women in the community. Through their experience in war they have learned to appreciate the American Way of Life. They fought American Way of Life. They fought to defend our American institutions. We must now help them to make the best possible use of their heritage. Shortly before his death our beloved President, Franklin D. Roosevelt, said: "We have taught our youth how to wage war; we must also teach them now to live useful and happy lives in freedom, justice and decency."
