Doctor Says — Give Every Child Check - Up Before School Opening

School days will soon be here again. Thousands of Texas boys and girls and teachers will be returning to the schools. Each child entering school should be as free as possible of any physical defects which can be corrected. The earlier these are corrected the better chance the child has for academic progress and for good social and emotional development, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

August is the time for a complete medical and dental check-up. Eyes, ears, nose, throat, and teeth should be carefully examined by the family doctor and dentist, and all remediable defects corrected. If such defects are neglected, they may result in serious damage to growth and development.

Dental corrections often take time, but a person is repaid many times over for good dental care. Healthy teeth lend attractiveness to the personal appearance, enable thorough chewing of food, and promote general good health.

In school rooms, children expose each other to many communicable diseases, especially the common cold and diseases such as measles, scarlet fever, whooping cough, and diphtheria. Protect the child from diphtheria and whooping cough, as well as smallpox, by safe and dependable immunization.

Parents, see that your child has complete protective treatment against preventable diseases; a clean healthy throat and mouth; the best possible vision and hearing; adequate diet, sleep and rest

MOURNING DOVES
OPEN SEASON -- NORTH ZONE: Sept. 1 to Oct. 15, both days inclusive. Shooting hours, one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

SOUTH ZONE: Oct. 20 to Dec. 3, both days inclusive, except in Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, Zapata, Webb, Maverick, Dimmit, LaSalle, Jim Hogg, Brooks, Kenedy, and Willacy counties where mourning doves may be hunted only on Sept. 12, 14, and 16, from 4 p.m. to sunset, and from Oct. 20 to Nov. 30, from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

BAG LIMIT: Not more than 10 per day and not more than 10 in possession.

White-winged Doves
OPEN SEASON: Sept. 12, 14, and 16, inclusive.
SHOOTING HOURS: 4 p.m. to sunset.
BAG LIMIT: Not more than 10 per day and not more than 10 in possession.


Shotguns must be permanently plugged to three shell capacity.
Shotguns may not be larger than 10 gauge.

Unlawful to take whitewings or Chachalaca south of U.S. Highway 83 in southern tip of Texas marked on the map as "Game Sanctuary."

No hunting permitted in game refuges and game preserves.

A hunter may not have more than 10 a day of either or both species (Whitewings or mourning doves) in the aggregate.

First School of the Panhandle
Stories of West Texas ...

The gentleman from Iowa, sitting on the porch of Clarendon's one hotel, was enjoying the arrival of the Mobeetic stage. Never, at least not during his own three month's residence here, had that stage managed to slip in quietly!

There was always the shrill excitement of the children, the happy barking of their dogs, and, on occasion, an escort of hilarious cowhands. In the background waited the more staid adult population of some two dozen trying in vain to curb their interest in the unloaded mail bags.

As Judge White stroked his little pointed Van Dyke beard and watched the clamoring, dusty youngsters, including his own two

sons, his mind was jerked back to its immediate problem. A school must be started; and somehow, somewhere, the necessary funds raised. Donley County was not yet organized and he knew that the money must come through individual subscriptions. And there were only five families with scholastics!

"How about asking the cattlemen to help out?" his wife had queried, but he had vetoed this idea immediately. They were slightly older men with no young children, and were of rugged individual type that preferred to do things alone.

There was Charles Goodnight, for instance. He had already become a legend to the people of the Palo Pinto country with his drives through New Mexico. Having amassed a fortune, only to lose it in the crash of '73, he was now on the way towards another. As the first cattle baron on the plains, he had located his Old Home ranch in the Palo Duro canyons in 1876, and the J. A. the following spring. He was also a leader of the Stockmen's Association, which organization was slated to meet in Clarendon quite soon. As went Goodnight so would likely go the other cattlemen.

Judge Benjamin Horton White, who later became known as the beloved father of Donley County, knew that he had hesitated long enough. As this was a community

project, there was only one thing worthy of doing. And he must beard the lion, and do it.

Charles Goodnight listened attentively to the judge, and then offered to personally present the need to the assembled stockmen. That organization immediately adopted a resolution to establish a school fund. T. R. Dickson, the secretary, was instructed to figure the cost per capita and to mail individual bills to each member.

And thus was instigated the first public school in the Panhandle of Texas. In a picket house and on planks nailed across dry goods boxes, sat the first class; the White boys, the Phillips boys, the Allen girls, the Wagner children, and Wally Parks.

A LOOK AT THE BOOK
By DR. BOB JONES, JR.

PRESIDENT OF BOB JONES UNIVERSITY

Nothing is more difficult than knowing how rightfully to divide one's life and time. There are some who give too much time to rest; there are others—not many—who give too many hours to work. Few of us are well balanced. Many teachers of the Scriptures lay great stress on doctrine and very little on the practice of that doctrine in their lives. Paul sets a better example. In the book of Romans, he spends eleven chapters discussing doctrine and in the rest of the book urges the application of that doctrine in practical Christian living. There are to many people who are willing to argue about the Bible and all too few who practice what it teaches. A man's doctrine is worth no more than what it produces in his life. We are warned against "doubtful disputations" (Romans 14:1). There was no profit in them. There is much profit in living a godly life. There are many Christians who prefer the epistles of Paul to the book of James because Paul stresses the deep truths which delight the intellect as well as enlighten the heart. James writes about the practice of our Christian faith in daily living. He speaks about controlling the tongue—something so few of us do; and he stresses self-control, charity, and kindness, and makes the point that it is impossible for a man to show his faith without his works.

There are those who say, "I believe in living up to the Sermon on the Mount; that's my religion;" but I never knew one who said it who proved by his life that the Sermon on the Mount was his religion. Indeed, one's doctrine must be right if one's life is to be right. One cannot live up to the Sermon on the Mount unless he has come into fellowship with the Preacher of that sermon, and such fellowship comes only when one believes the Gospel and trusts the Lord Jesus as personal Saviour. Then, knowing the Teacher one should manifest his faith in the Son of God by striving day by day to live a life which is pleasing to Him. "The pure in heart shall see God," but the heart must be made pure by the blood of the Lord Jesus Christ. We cannot take any of the Word of God and leave the rest and have the right sort of life or the right sort of doctrine. There must be an acceptance of the whole of the Word and an endeavor to practice daily that which it teaches in the strength and power of the Spirit, who is the Author of the Book.

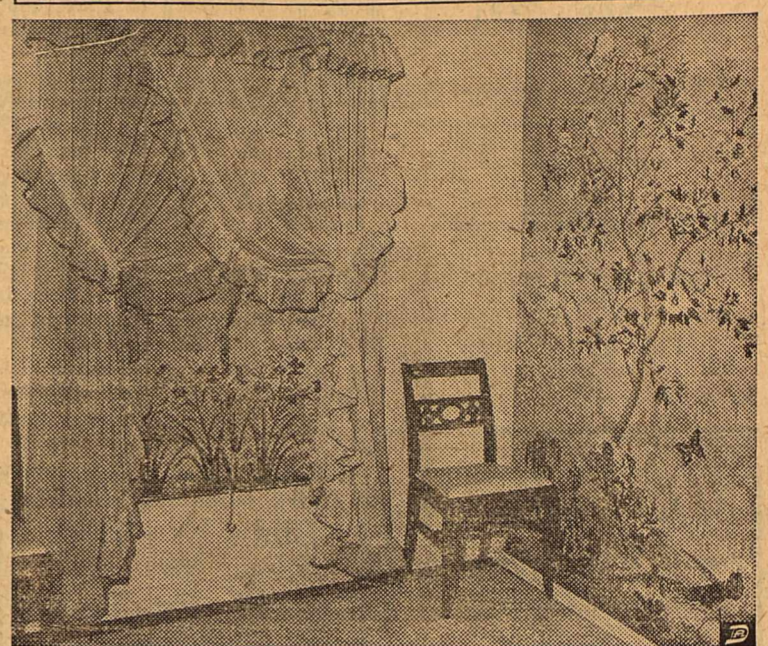

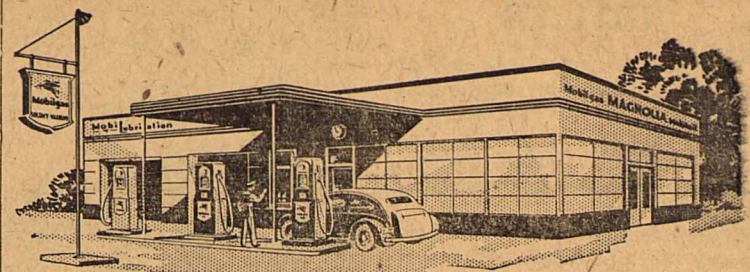
Q. How does a veteran apply for readjustment allowance?

A. A veteran must present his original service discharge or separation paper, or if that has been lost or destroyed, a certificate in lieu of or a properly authenticated copy of such paper. He must file an application on Veterans Administration Form 4-1382. An initial claim is usually filed at the same time the application is made. This claim indicates whether the veteran is unemployed, partially employed or self-employed.

Q. What is the maximum length of training a disabled veteran can get under Public Law 16?

A. The maximum is four years; however, Veterans Administration may extend the time if factors in any case warrant an additional period for rehabilitation.

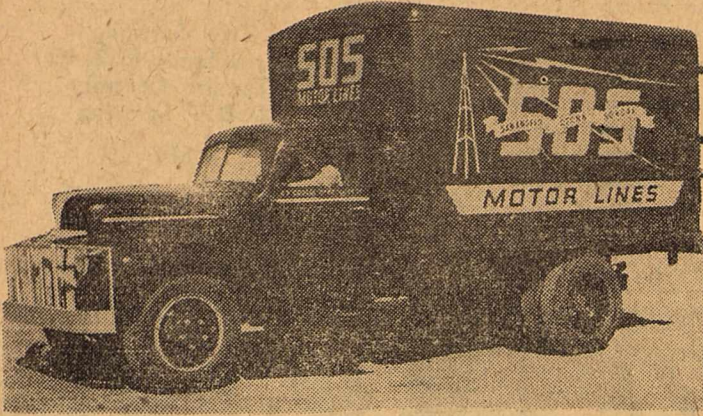

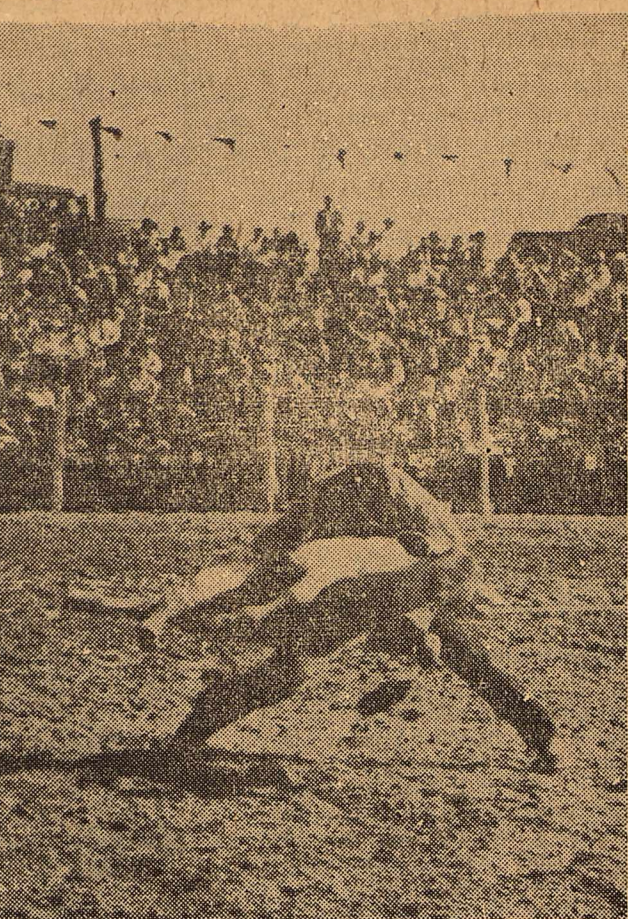

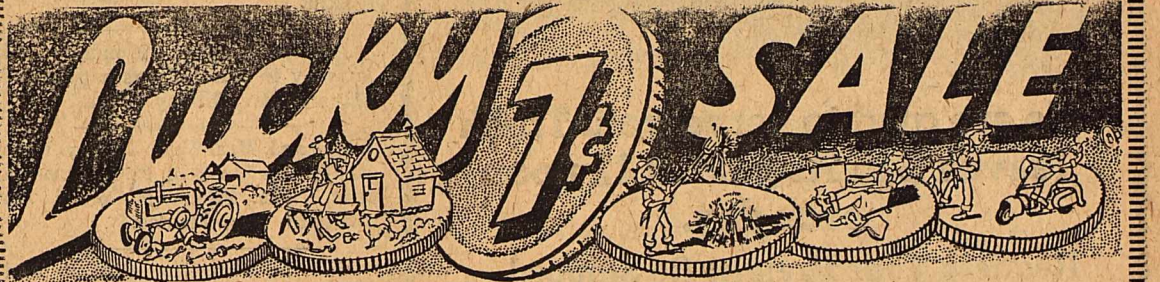

Son of a gun



The Boys and Girls fund and the Boy Scout and Girl Scout buildings received a surprise boost last week when Berry Duff, former Sonora resident now living in Fort Logan, Colorado mailed his check in for each of these projects. Duff is a subscriber to the News and has been keeping up with local activities in the "old home town" during the year he has been gone. Duff will be remembered here as county agent. He is now employed by the federal government.

Temp Carter, ranchman of Garden City, Glasscock County, has found out that it's not always the number of sheep a man owns that determines how much money he puts in the bank. It's the stocking rate that counts.

In 1945-46, Carter ran 350 ewes on 2 1/2 sections of land, explains Glasscock County Agriculture Agent H. M. Fitzhugh. The stockman received prices for his lambs which showed him that he was stocking his range too heavily. He cut his flock down to 186 ewes.

During the winter of 1946-47, he fed some 20 bales of alfalfa hay and six sacks of cake to the 186 ewes, which produced a 133 percent lamb crop this last spring and summer. His first lamb was born March 7, and on July 10 he sold 87 lambs which weighed an average of 76.3 pounds. Then in July, he marketed 99 more lambs which weighed around 64 pounds each, and he still has 33 lambs on the ewes.

The county agent says that Carter has not only upped his

lamb crop percentage by reducing his stocking rate, but has received a nice price for the lambs and has sent them off to market in time to give the ewes a good rest before the next breeding season.

Flies and DDT don't get along together.

H. M. Fitzhugh, Glasscock County agent, says three new power spraying machines were bought by Glasscock County ranchmen in as many weeks, and were put to work as soon as they were delivered.

Everything on the ranches that could be sprayed were sprayed - cattle, sheep, horses, barns and other buildings. J. C. Bryans reported that he hasn't seen a fly on his animals in 10 days. His sheep graze without having to huddle up to fight flies and his lambs are putting on weight since he sprayed, in spite of dry weather.

Ranchmen of Winkler County, according to Roy L. Peden, county agent, are spraying with DDT "whenever they get a herd together."

Last year Jess Moseley of Hudspeth County had a few screw worm cases on calves and while he had them up for treatment, he sprayed with DDT as well. Then, says County Agent C. M. Knight, he put the calves and their mothers in a trap for a few days. On the third day he noticed that there were no horn flies on the calves or on the cows. Control lasted three weeks. Now many local ranchmen are spraying about a fourth of the cows in each herd.

And Brewster County Agent Frank N. Newsom reports that a thousand sheep were treated with a six-tenths percent wettable DDT powder spray at shearing time in early April; he checked the flock in June and July and the lambs were free of sheep ticks on both occasions.

Good cows brought \$14 to \$15 at Houston and San Antonio, and \$15.50 to \$18 at other southwest terminals.

Sheep and lambs moved at strong to sharply higher prices at Fort

Worth last week, but spring lambs showed some weakness at Oklahoma City and Denver, and feeder lambs and goats fell at San Antonio. Medium to good spring lambs brought \$18 to \$19.50 at San Antonio, and \$20 to \$23.50 at Fort Worth and Wichita.

THE BOND - A - MONTH PLAN

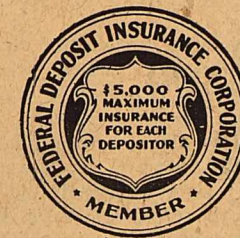

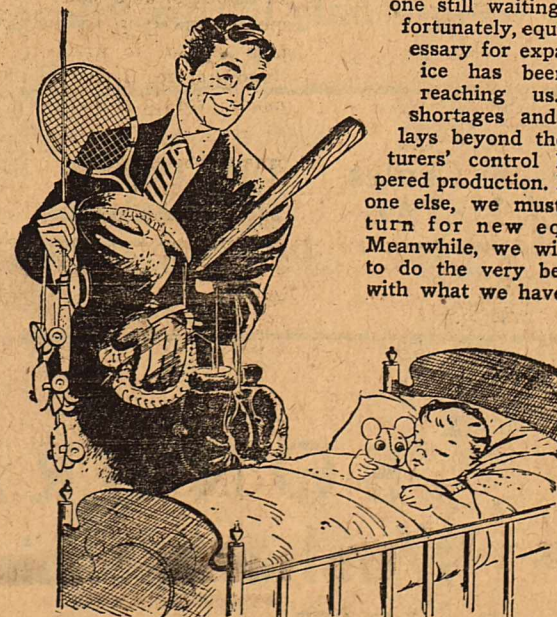
