

But nearly half of the million and a half pounds of iodine used each year in this country comes from oil wells. In fact, we are getting so much iodine from oil wells these

iodine ever got into oil wells? The answer is that it is mixed with the brine that comes up with the oil. To recover the iodine, chemical engineers literally blow it out of the brine in huge towers. Sounds like an odd way to stop infections, doesn't it?
