Texas Water Right Commission approved Tuesday, the request by Claude G. Lawson to irrigate 44 acres of land in Callahan County.

Lawson, of Fort Worth, asked for 88 acre feet of water per year to be diverted from an 88 acre foot soil conservation service reservoir on the farm in the Cross Plains area.

Plans are to grow Coastal Bermuda with the water to feed his cattle and to keep enough water in the lake to be able to have fish in it.

**CAPPS LIME DISCOVERY IN CALLAHAN COUNTY**

A project was plugged back and recompleted as a Capps lime discovery 7 miles northwest of Clyde and prorated in the regular field.

It is Dixon Oil Co. and Reef Oil Corp. of Abilene No. 1 A. E. Dyer, 1,650 feet from the north and 990 feet from the west lines of Section 57, BBB&C Survey.

Daily potential was five barrels of 40 gravity oil, plus 13 barrels of water. It is pumping from perforations at 3,520-32 feet, treated with 3,500 gallons of acid.

The 5 1/2-inch casing is set at 3,834 feet. Total depth was 3,834 feet, plugged back to 3,770 feet.

It was originally completed as W.W.F. Oil Corp. No. 1 A. E. Dyer and was a producer from perforations at 3,818-24 feet in the Dyer (Strawn Sand) Field.

N. M. Dillard, Cross Plains staked No. 1-A W. L. Cutbirth Jr. in the regular field six miles south of Clyde.

The planned 1,350-foot rotary venture is on a 480 acre lease.

It spots 2,980 feet from the south and 2,000 feet from the west lines of Section 2, Block 1, SP Survey.

Laco Oil Co. of Abilene staked No. 5 F. L. Seale Trust in the regular field six miles southwest of Baird.

Having a proposed depth of 1,100 feet with rotary to test the Moutray Sand, it spots 1,150 feet from the north and 1,080 feet from the east lines of Lewis Johnson Survey 252.

Mobil Oil Corp. filed applications to plug back two projects in the regular field five miles north of Baird.

No. 3 Elma Jackson will be plugged back to 1,100 feet for completion attempt in the lower Tannehill. Location is 314 feet from the north and 1,661 feet from the west lines of Section 115, BBB&C Survey.

It was originally completed in 1951 from perforations at 2,692-98 feet and prorated in the Red Horse (Moran) Field.

Other project is No. 16 Elma Jackson which is to be plugged back to 1,550 feet for completion attempt in the Hope Sand or Speck Mountain. Site is 319 feet from the south and 1,764 feet from the east lines of Section 14, ETRR Survey.

It was originally completed in the Red Horse Field.

Scjourner Drilling Corp. of Abilene completed a regular field well six miles northwest

of Baird. The Tannehill Sand ciler is No. 15-A (formerly No. 15) R. D. Williams.

Site is 1,900 feet from the north and 450 feet from the west lines of Section 3, Block C, T&NO Survey.

Daily potential was 16 barrels of 39 gravity oil. Flow was through a 24-64-inch choke with 20 pounds tubing pressure.

Production is from perforations at 816 to 820 feet with the 4 1/2-inch casing set at 885 feet. Total depth was 886 feet, plugged back to 816 feet.

Staked in the regular field seven miles south of Clyde was Laco Oil Co. of Abilene No. 2-B Blan Odum.

Having a proposed depth of 1,300 feet with rotary to test the Moutray Sand, it spots 2,420 feet from the north and 2,095 feet from the west lines of Section 15, BB&C Survey.

**C-City Location For Circuit Assembly**
