SPORTS FLASHES

The Cardinals haven't been getting the pitching this year, but when they shut out the Giants, 8 to 0, July 29, it was their third whitewashing of the league leaders. Quite an achievement, inasmuch as the Giants had been held scoreless only two other times. Outside of Redbird pitchers, only Murry Dickson and Harry Perkowshi have turned the trick.

The Cincinnati Redlegs are still the even-break champions of the majors. On the home stand they ended July 25, they broke even at seven and seven. And that gave them an even split on the season with 49 games won and 49 lost. It was the fourteenth time this season that their percentage was an even .500.

Something that has never happened in the major leagues, and perhaps never before in the minors, occurred recently in Welch, West Virginia, in the Appalachian League. Two triple plays were pulled in consecutive innings. In the seventh inning of a game between Welch and Johnson City, men were on first and second when Welch Third Baseman Lee Heffner grabbed a grounder, stepped on third and threw to

Second Baseman Ed Redmond who then relayed the ball to first Baseman Bob Brown. In the very next inning, Heffner scared a line dove with two men on base and once more teamed up with Redmond and Brown to erase the side.

The Boston Red Sox have drawn more than one million fans annually since 1946. To preserve that record against a possible August and September slump, they have scheduled two more night games. Their games with Detroit, August 20, and with Chicago, August 31, originally

cheduled for daytime, will be played under the lights. That will make 16 night games this season, a radical departure from the Red Sox' policy of only 14 night games at home.

A new record for home runs hit by pinch hitters has been set in the National League. When Sid Gordon of the Pirates rapped one against the Redlegs at Crosley Field July 23, it was pinch home run Number 21. The old record of 20 was set nearly a quarter of

a century ago—in 1930. Gordon, Preston Word of the Pirates and Joe Frazier of the Cardinals have each hit two pinch home runs this year. But Bobby H. Fmann of the Giants is ahead of them. He has hit three.

There's quite a race on between Paul Cavarretta of the White Sox and Mickey Vernon of the Senators. They are both aiming at the 2,000-hit mark. As of July 25, both men had the same number of hits, 1,952.

It is this week to Larry Doby of the Cleveland Indians. Any time a rival batsman can hit 500 in Yankee Stadium, it says, he's deserving of a special tribute. During the Indians' recent visit to New York, Doby kept his average at .500 by hitting three homers. These blows helped the Indians beat the Yankees two games out of three. Doby is the only Indian who has played in every game this year. Tris Speaker, the all-time center fielder, says there's no better center fielder than Doby in today's crop.

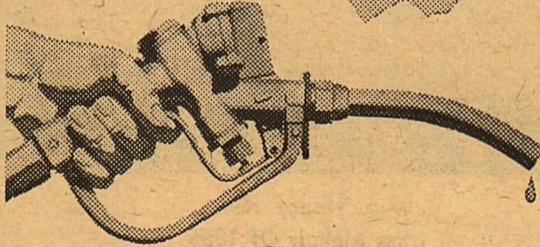

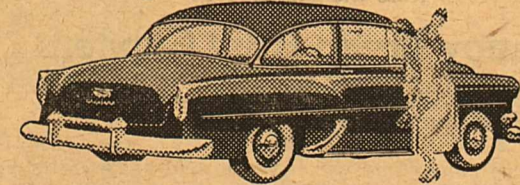

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new section, to be numbered 63; providing for crediting to members of either the Teacher Retirement System or the Employees Retirement System of Texas all services rendered, as either a teacher, or person employed in the public schools, colleges, and universities of the State, or as an appointive officer or employee of the State, for retirement benefits under either of said Systems.

State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.000) Dollars per month.

Constitution of the State of Texas creating the State Building Commission and determining the membership thereof; creating the State Building Fund; providing for the surplus in the Confederate Pension Fund to be transferred annually to the State Building Fund; providing for the expenditure of such fund under the direction of the Legislature; providing for the expenditure of a limited amount of the building fund for the erection of memorials under certain conditions and limitations; providing for an election thereon, the proclamation of such election, and the form of ballot.

The foregoing amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of Texas as the general election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election those favoring such amendment shall have printed or written on their ballot the following: FOR the amendment transferring that portion of the Confederate Pension Fund not needed for the payment of Confederate pensions to the State Building Fund to be used for State building purposes as may be provided by law, and also permitting not more than six (6%) per cent of such fund to be used for memorials for Texans who served in the Texas Revolution and in the Armed Forces of the Confederate States.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14
proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section, to be known as Section 52-b, prohibiting the Legislature from ever lending the credit of the State, or granting any public money, or assuming or otherwise discharging indebtedness of any individual, person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, public agency or political subdivision of the State now authorized, or which may hereafter be authorized, to construct, maintain, or operate toll roads, or turnpikes within this State; and providing for the submission of the amendment to the voters of this State.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS FROM

VETERANS ADMINISTRATION

Q - To complete my Korean GI Bill training in dentistry, I am required to take an internship in my specialty. May I do this under the GI Bill?

A - Yes, provided the internship satisfies the educational requirements for certification by a Dental Specialty Board. The dental internship may not exceed one year.

Q - My GI insurance has lapsed and I have been told that I must take a physical examination in order to reinstate it. My brother is a doctor. Could he give me the examination?

A - No. Physical examinations for GI Insurance purposes may not be made by physicians who are related to the veteran, either by blood or by marriage.

Q - I am the widow of a World War I veteran and I am drawing a monthly VA pension. I have a small part-time job. Re-

cently, I was injured on the job and, as a result, I am receiving workmen's compensation pay. Do I have to include my workmen's compensation, in figuring my annual income for VA pension purposes?

A - Yes. Workmen's compensation payments are considered as income for VA pension purposes. However, you may deduct medical expenses that you have had to pay out because of your injury.

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY



Fort Worth—As the season progresses it is becoming more evident that the ideas of Corn Belt feeders and the opinions of Southwestern cattle producers as to the prices of stockers and feeders this year are almost poles apart.

Theories of slaughter buyers as to what grass cattle and slaughter calves should bring and the opinions of the people who own the cattle and calves, are equally far apart.

The immediate result of these differences of opinion is smaller than seasonal numbers of cattle and calves moving to market during July and on the opening session for August. The long range results appear to be that the numbers of cattle and calves marketed late in the year and early next year will be larger than usual if the present trend in the Southwestern continues.

Many acres in the Midwest and in the Central and South Atlantic States into which large numbers of Southwestern stockers and feeders go each year are currently in varying degrees of drought. This serves to dull their desire to buy stockers and feeders since the grain and forage crops are in jeopardy.

Currently there are 20 to 40 counties of Texas in more or less critical drought conditions, and many of the sections that a year ago were in hard shape are this year doing very well despite some suffering from high temperatures.

One old-timer sized it up this way: "Looks like the folks with cattle to sell think they will be higher, and those with cattle to buy look for them to be lower. That's what makes trade, these differences of opinion and the eventual arrival at prices."

Brings to mind a favorite expression of an old-time grain market speculator. He said: "The market is never wrong. Some times people trying to figure the market are wrong."

This year our town decided to do something about its hay-fever sufferers. Hap Thomas is our health officer, so he was made ragged "inspector."

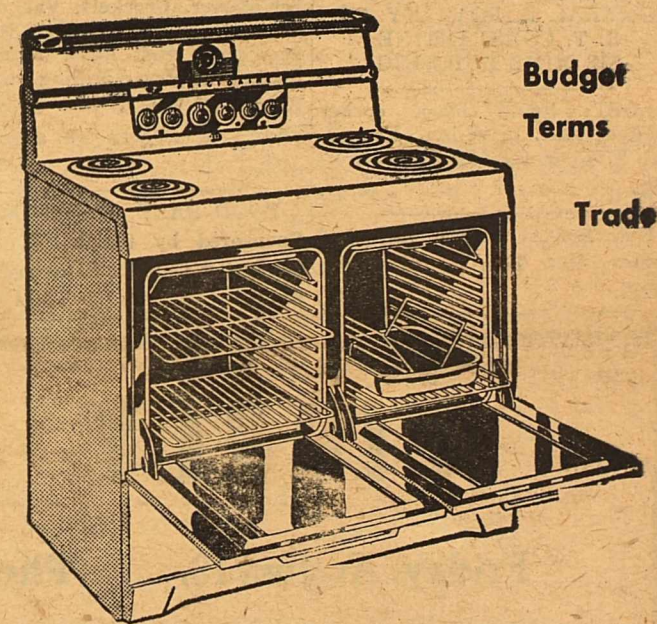
"Can't see why anybody should be bothered by a few weeds," he snorted. "I say it's all in their minds." But Hap went on out to do his job.
