"Selfish" Oil Titan Gives Millions Away

Hardly anybody blinked an eye when Hugh Roy Cullen gave two and a quarter million dollars to the University of Houston last winter. Hardly anybody in Texas, anyway.

This big-hearted, impulsive, outspoken, ruggedly individualistic pil millionaire has given away over \$160,000,660. In one 48-hour period he gave over a million dollars to each of four separate hospitals, setting an all-time record in generosity. And in 1947 he set up the Cullen Foundation to dispense his wealth in systematic if somewhat overwhelm-

"My wife and I are pretty selfish about our giving," he explained recently. "We want to see our money spent while we're still alive, so we can enjoy the spending." The story of what one newspaperman called "the biggest heart in Texas" is told in a new book, "Hugh Roy Cullen, A Story of American Opportunity."

Cullen acquired his wealth as a wildcatter in oil, starting from scratch, with little more than courage, faith, obstinacy and uncanny instinct. His philanthropies started early in life. "Tve always wanted to help people," he says. "I guess I was as eager to help people when I was poor as I am now. It is my conviction that unless a man is generous to begin with, the richer he gets the tighter he gets."

Years of hard work and determination made Cullen the uncrowned king of the wildcatters, a legend in his own time. By his middle years, still drilling vigorously, his unbounded wealth was matched by his unstinting phi-





Camera Topics Peis Are "Naturals" for Camera Portraits

PETS are "naturals" for camera portraits. Like children, however, they are temperamental and easily bored with the whole thing. It's up to the photographer to keep them interested in the job at hand.

The first rule in photographing any pet, says T. T. Holden, photo director for Graflex, Inc., Rochester, N. Y., is to be patient and considerate. Don't keep fido posing too long and don't expect miracles. Then, use a few tricks to help him help you.

For instance, place him on a small stool, so that he has to remain in focus. It will also keep him from fidgeting. Put him to work when he's fresh. Don't expect him to look animated when he's all worn out from chasing neighbor's cat or sleepy from too much lean red meat.

Then use the same portrait technique you would use on a human subject. Place fido against a plain background that

Press Photographers' Tricks Are Handy in Action Shots

AT the moment photographer for Graflex, Inc., Rochester, Hill tripped his shutter and caught this motorbike rider on his way to the ground, the other photographers around him had already scattered.

Tirst of all, when photographing a cycle hill climb, try prefocusing your camera on the point on the hillside where most of the cyclists have been getting spilled. By pre-determining your shooting position and focus you can work faster when the climactic moment comes.

Second, use as fast a shutter

Second, use as fast a shutter speed as you can, considering the available light and the film being used. Blurs are not neces-sary to indicate motion in this kind of photo — the positions of bike and rider are evidence enough of the action taking place. Very often flash will not be allowed because of the distraction to the contestants. Usually it is not necessary.

Be sure to use an open "press-type" finder, if your camera is equipped with one. You may not have time to use an optical finder accurately. Even more important, the press finder is much safer, because it gives you a greater field of vision. You can seen an accident coming, and get out of the way before it happens.

Finally, be a diplomat. Remember, that when you shoot pictures of a sports event, you do so by courtesy of the organization sponsoring the show. Check in with the judges or other officials for permission before unpacking your camera and firing away. Then follow up this courtesy by later sending complimentary with the form of the state o



America's Best-Lighted Church



CATASAUQUA, PA.—What is believed will be the best-lighted church in America this Christmas is the Presbyterian church here, founded 100 years ago. Ingenious floodlighting on the

spire and on a 15-inch gilt ball on top of it (180 feet from the ground), make them visible four miles away. The effect has been described as a "finger pointing to Heaven." Nine precious stained-glass windows are also lighted, inviting passersby to meditate

upon the sacred significance of the scenes which they depict.

The elaborate lighting system was developed and given to the church by Frank M. Tait, a native of Catasauqua, who is now chairman of the board of the Dayton (Ohio) Power and Light Co. and the Dayton Pump & Mfg. Co. Tait also has provided a fund which will enable the church to be floodlighted every night as long as it shall exist.


