**NEW SPANISH CABINET**  
 To Be Formed. Will Probably Be Made Liberal (after Cuban Policy).  
 Madrid, Sept. 29.—The Spanish cabinet has resigned. The queen accepted the resignation, and has asked General Azarraga to continue in office until a solution of the crisis is found.

Her majesty will summon the leaders of the various parties and the presidents of the chambers tomorrow to consult as to the situation.  
 It is said that Segasta is in favor of a new cabinet, and that the resignation of the present cabinet is a necessary step.

On August 27 last it was announced that Segasta, the liberal leader, had made a fresh declaration on the political situation. He said that a liberal ministry would be ready to appoint autonomy to Cuba. Again, on Sept. 14, Senor Segasta, referring to the Cuban question, said that the present cabinet was not to be trusted.

The railroad commission was called in to hear the case of the company's suit in the federal court here, but there will be no hearing until February. The attorney general has not yet prepared an answer so the temporary injunction holds in the interval.

The McMillan publishing house, New York, was advised by the text book board in reply to questions by wire that it had supplied the books for the year 1900, but that it had not yet received the order for the year 1901.

**Scissors Cuts.**  
 Huntsville, Oct. 3.—Huntsville has been greatly stirred up by the arrest of Barth H. Hartly on the charge of incest and rape on his own daughter, under twelve years of age. He was at once removed without bail and landed in the penitentiary before the crime was generally known.

Hartley was an ex-convict, coming from Burket county for ten years for a similar crime, for which the penitentiary records show that the plea of guilty was entered. He was released in January, 1896, and since that time married in Houston. The little child is said to have been the product of a former wife. The grand jury will take up the case at once, and it is probable that the case will be tried on an early date.

The little girl was put on the stand by the defendant and point blank accused him of being guilty. He is about 35 years of age. He has a clear record as a convict.

**THE LIBERAL POLICY.**

As Outlined by the New Spanish Ministry.  
 New York, Oct. 3.—A dispatch to the World from Madrid says: The World correspondent called to-day on Premier Sagasta, who said, in response to queries: "You ask me if the liberal party would assent to mediation by the United States with a view to hastening the pacification of Cuba and the resumption of the peace and the exiles to accept autonomy."

"Why should we need mediation, when our intention—long and often expressed by the liberal party—aim at realizing all that America could suggest?"  
 "No Spanish party, certainly not the liberals, could assent to foreign interference in our domestic affairs, and we believe that no government could hope to induce the nation to accept such interference."

"If America, as we firmly believe and hope, is disposed to be sincerely friendly with us, let her enforce the rules of international law and stop the flow of moral and material aid, without which the reconstruction could not last at all."

"We shall reverse completely the policy of the United States and Cuba, beginning, naturally, with the recall of Weyler."  
 "I informed the queen yesterday that the liberal party would accept the responsibilities of office most willingly if her majesty honored the party with her confidence. The liberal party had plans for all the pending questions of the day, but Spain and certainly not Cuba autonomy along the lines traced in the programme of the Cuban autonomists themselves. I said so in my manifesto in June and had repeated the same promise during the government."

"The liberal party is prepared to grant to Cuba all possible self-government, a broad tariff and every other concession consistent with inflexible defense of Spanish rule and sovereignty in the West Indies. We believe we can satisfy the majority of the Cubans and we will act thus spontaneously."  
 The new prime minister spoke with much warmth and an unusual flow of words, though the statement was generally reserved.
