Two Die At Oil Well Site

Two young Sonora men were pronounced dead at the scene by Peace Justice Mat Adams shortly before noon Tuesday.

Dead are 18-year-old Jackie Lynn Kirby and 25-year-old Joseph Robert Necessary. Both are be-

lieved to have died as the result of being overcome by oil fumes.

The accident occurred on the Stanley B. Mayfield Ranch Amoco Lease #4, 1 1/4 miles south of Sonora on U.S. 290, off Station B Road.

Mearl Harding, a representative of Lerondo Well Servicing Company, with which the men were employed, said both had arrived at the site at 7:30 a.m., Tuesday morning and he had spoken to them by radio at 9 a.m. When Harding arrived at the site at approximately

9:45 he was unable to locate either until he went to a large oil storage tank where he found both bodies. The tank contained 13 inches of water and approximately 1/2 inch of oil.

Company personnel and Sutton County Sheriff's Department officials believe one of the men went to the tank to take a sample of the tank contents and lost the can in which he was using for a sample container, entered the tank to retrieve it and was overcome by the fumes, causing his

working companion to attempt rescue.

Funeral services for both men were pending at Kerbow Funeral Home Tuesday afternoon at newstime.

Election Called

School trustees have called an election for Saturday, April 2, 1977 for the purpose of electing three trustees. The terms of Sammie Stewart, Mary Adele Balch and Dorothy Pope are expiring. Jerry Johnson was appointed election judge and the courthouse was designated as the polling site. The deadline for filing is March 2 and candidates must file for position with the secretary of the board of trustees.

Permission was granted for the student council to remove the Bronco mascot from the school premises. The statue has been broken and no longer represents the Bronco spirit.

A contract for the collection of delinquent taxes was approved and David Robinson and Ray Peveler were appointed property appraisers for 1977.

The board approved a budget amendment, an application to develop guidance, counseling and testing services and assistance to the teachers in relocating their mobile homes.

The school calendar was amended to show January 10 as an in-service day and January 21 as a day of instruction. Since January 21 is the date of the 4-H show, all students participating in the show will be excused from school. The county agent will furnish the school with the names of the participants to be excused.

Resignations were accepted from Rebecca Garrett, elementary school teachers aide, and from high school English teacher, Susan Livingston.

Barbara Jennings was elected as junior high secretary and Elizabeth Sutton and Priscilla Gutierrez were named teachers aides. New contracts

were offered to Smith Neal, Harold Miller, Bill Fort, Bill Bundy, and Ed Martinez. Dr. Elroy Otte, high school principal, indicated that he planned to seek employment elsewhere.

Speedy Aircraft Makes Short Stop In Sonora

A national hero of sorts stopped in Sonora last week, enroute to delivering a famous aircraft to the Smithsonian Institute.

Darrel Greenamyer from Mission Hills, California, flew the world's fastest propeller driven aircraft to Sonora's Joe Berger Field, waited for the weather to clear, refueled and headed east.

Greenamyer and Bearcat F-8F captured the world speed record in 1969 at Edwards AFB, California with a top speed of 483 miles-per-hour. The previous record had stood for 30 years, established by the German Luftwaffe in 1939.

"The Smithsonian expressed some interest in the aircraft," he explained, "and when I decided to put this one away I thought it would be better to donate it to the Smithsonian than to sell it to someone who might not take good care of it."

The well-polished and magnificent looking aircraft drew a number of local sightseers at the airport during its short stay.

Greenamyer purchased the aircraft in 1964, removed military equipment, trimmed the wings and installed a Pratt and Whitney R2800 engine, which has developed as much as 3,100 horse power.

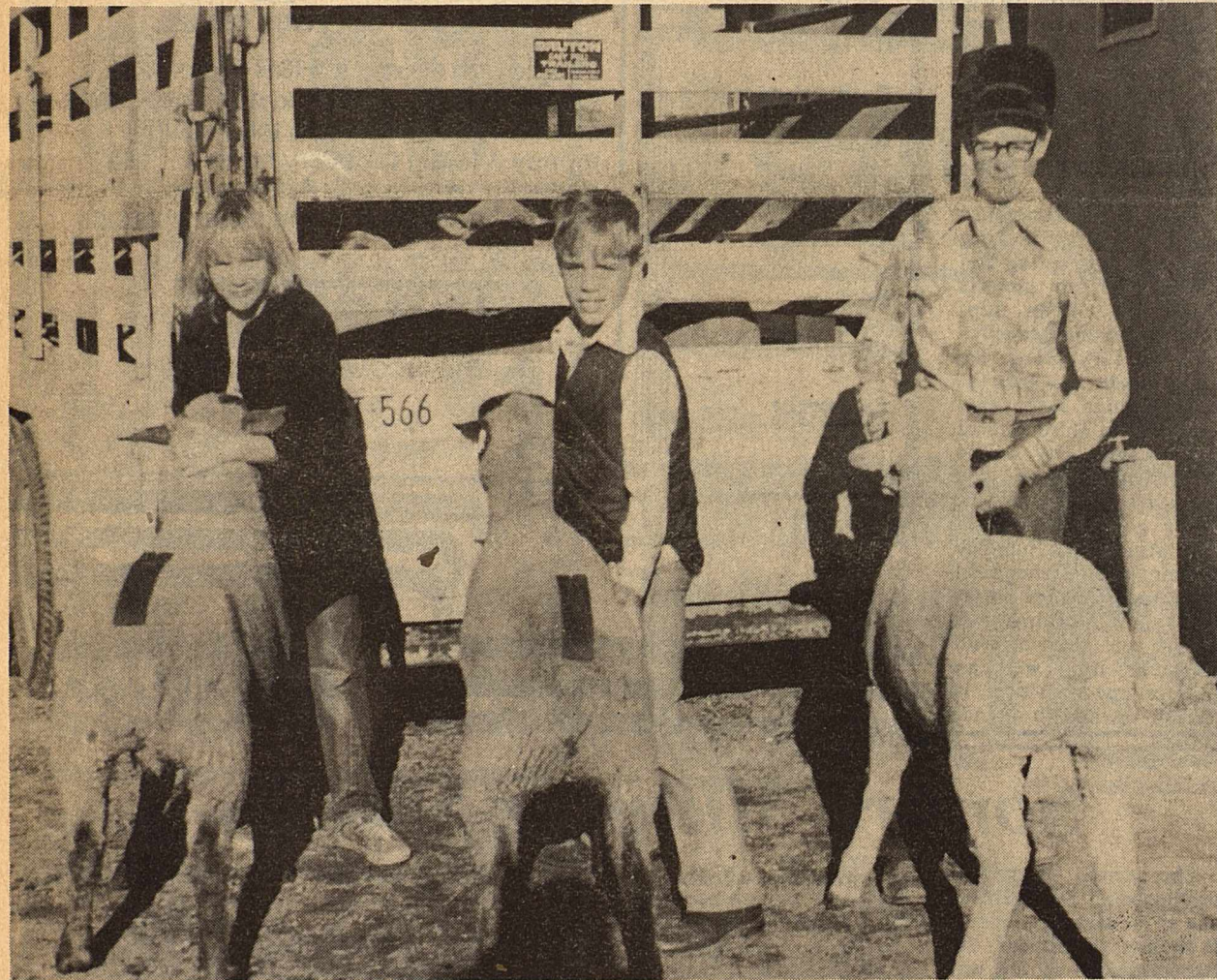
He holds six Reno National Air Race first place titles, the most recent in 1971.

The quiet spoken pilot started flying in 1954, finished flight training at Laughlin AFB, Texas (Del Rio) in 1957 and served in the Air National Guard flying F-86s and F-100s until 1961.

A side-note to the story: Airport Manager Bill Chapman, now retired, performed maintenance work on the Bearcat F-8F during his Navy career.

"This was the last propeller driven aircraft built specifically for the Navy," Chapman explained, "and it served us well until the early '50s, when the Navy phased in the jets."

What's Greenamyer up to next? Word has it that he is planning to build another aircraft for air racing...

Weight classes for the market lamb show which will begin at 9 a.m., Friday will be as follows: light finewool, 80-102 pounds; medium finewool, 103-113 pounds; heavy finewool, 114 pounds and up; light crossbred, 80-97 pounds, and heavy crossbred, 98 pounds and up.

High gaining lambs in the 4-H market lamb feeding program were determined at the official weigh-in of lambs Saturday.

Finewool high gaining lambs included Cades Pope, 58 pounds; Cades Pope, 56 pounds; Cades Pope, 51 pounds; Amanda Carlson, 50 pounds; Shelli Whalen, 49 pounds; Laura Preston, 49 pounds.

Yearbooks On Sale

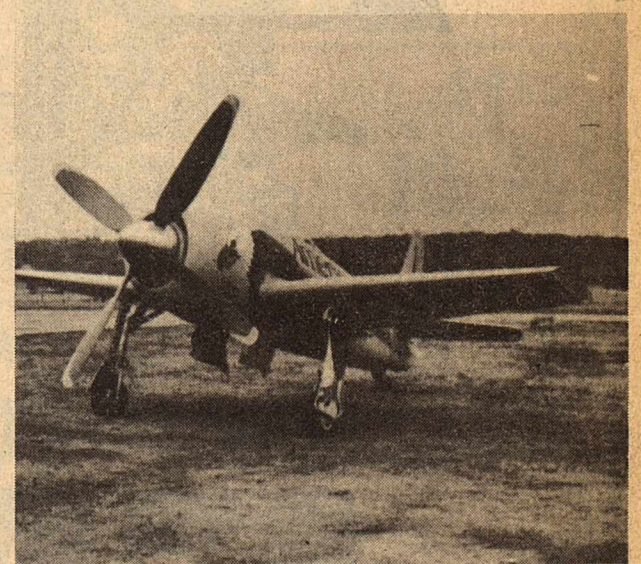

Sonora Elementary News

Most third grade groups are finishing up social studies for the year and getting ready to begin science studies. The first unit in science will be the study of the sun and its planets.

Some of the rooms have been learning to cut block letters to use on booklet covers or bulletin boards. This is a quite detailed skill for third graders and success has been varied. Along with the block letter cutting has come six-sided snowflake cutting with detailed folding instructions but freedom of expression in cutting.

Third graders enjoy using the listening centers. These are set up with individual head phones for two to eight pupils. Some tapes are used for enjoyment; some are used for instructional purposes and have activities listed to accompany each tape. In most instances the pupils are encouraged to operate tape players for themselves.

We have been working hard setting up a central library which is located in the hall in the fourth grade building. All of the boys and girls are enjoying using the library. There

are more books available to the boys and girls by having one library.

All of the fourth grade classes are working on their Safety Ranger Kit in which they draw pictures illustrating safety captions. These will be sent to Austin to be filmed and the captions are taped and sent back for the boys and girls to view.

In fifth grade Social Studies, we are studying families and homes of the first colonists who came to places like Jamestown. The differences between the kind of life the colonists left behind them and the kind of life they found here in America; preserving food, mealtime customs, food from plants, clothes, use of land, churches and schools, amusement and recreation.

The math classes are studying long division and fractions.

Some of the students are discussing personal values using film, charts, posters and playing values voting games.

In science, we have started on studying and discussing astronomy. Students have given reports on different planets.

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Sonora Minister Speaks

The second chapter of the Gospel of John records one of the strangest events in the new Testament, the transformation of the water into wine at the wedding at Cana, a small village in Galilee. Often we simply refer to this passage as a miracle and move on, as we are

uncomfortable with a passage that seemingly has Jesus functioning as the after hours bootlegger for a party. We also tend to become involved in peripheral arguments concerning the alcoholic content of the wine. In doing so, we miss much of the significance of the passage. There are several theologically salient points. First, these were

no ordinary stone jars, but were special containers (holding about 20 - 30 gallons) used for the Jewish purification rites. This passage indicates a change, a new chapter in the story of God with his people, a meaningless ritual was to become gospel. Then, there is a further allusion to Judaism. The water was changed to wine (the blood of the grape, as it was commonly known in those days) and just as this was to be poured out for all at the feast, so was his blood, as it had been prophesied, to be poured out for all persons.

The changing of water into wine (reminiscent of Moses' changing of the water into blood) indicates that something special - far beyond the scope of this event, was to happen. God was at work in the world, through his Son... whose hour would come at the time of the crucifixion and the resurrection.

Finally, we read that the disciples saw this sign, and believed. That is our point of contact. We too, in today's society, are to look about us, to see where Christ is at work in the world, and to join him there. We are to see, and to believe. We are to respond in obedience.
