Lions Club Auction nets \$13,550

A total of \$13,550 was raised by the Downtown Lions Club during the annual auction held Tuesday night September 20 in the 4-H Barn.

"I would like to thank everyone for participating in the auction," stated Mike Hale, president of the Lions Club. "This was one of the best years we've ever had," he added.

Lem Jones, auctioneer this year, donated a set of antique bronze bits imported from Nigeria in memory of Bob Halbert, a member of the Downtown Lions Club for 52 years. The bits sold for \$400 to Mrs. Billy Shurley of Marfa.

Another large money-making item was the hand-made quilt, donated by the Sonora Sewing Club. It was sold to George Brockman for \$800.

Of course the famous "Mystery Package" brought a large sum, being purchased for the third time by Lea Roy Aldwell for \$975. The package was donated to the auction in 1945 by Berry Duff who named it "Old Faithful". In the past 38 years Old Faithful has brought a total of \$11,092.50 for the Lions Club.

The mystery package is the size of a shoe box, wrapped in brown paper and tied with a cord. No one has ever opened the package so it remains... a mystery.

The Sonora Downtown Lions Club was formed May, 1928, 55 years ago, and three of the charter members are still living. They include Dan Cauthorn, Jack Neill, and John Eaton.

Regular projects supported by the Lions Club in Sonora include the Boy Scout Charter, Care Program, eye exams and glasses, Boys Ranch, 4-H Center, 4-H Livestock Show, Hunting Party, Lions International Foundation, Sonora Wool and Mohair Show, Sonora Speech Meet, Sonora/Sutton County Community Park, Chamber of Commerce, Concho Valley Home for Girls, Crippled Children's Camp, Firemen's Training School, 4-H Food Show and Dress Revue, Girl Scout Charter, Little League Baseball, Texas Re-Hab Center, Women's Club Library, Sutton County Senior Center, and the welfare council.

STAMPEDE BULLDOGS 13-3

Broncos keep winnin'

The Sonora Broncos rode the toe of placekicker, junior Scott Miller, to an extremely exciting victory over the Brady Bulldogs Friday night in Bronco Stadium.

The Broncos got the first break of the game as Brady fumbled on their second offensive play and defensive end Ruben Garza recovered for the Broncos inside the Brady 30 yard line.

The Broncos drove to the Brady eight yard line and Scott Miller came on to kick a 25 yard field goal to give the Broncos a 3-0 lead.

Brady took the kick off and drove down the field and kicked a 30 yard field goal to tie the score at 3-3.

The Broncos threatened again just before halftime as they drove inside the Bulldog 20 yard line but ran out of time.

The Broncos came out in high gear as they returned the second-half kick off deep into Bulldog territory. The Bulldog defense came up with some big plays and kept the Broncos from scoring.

The two defenses controlled the tempo for nearly the rest of the game. After several punt exchanges the Bulldogs got the ball at midfield and started moving toward the Bronco goal but were stopped by a great interception by defensive back Victor Lira at the Bronco 15 yard line.

The Bronco offense had its problems getting rolling

especially after quarterback Drew Wallace had to leave the game after halftime due to injury.

The Broncos were led by Jeff Brittain as he moved from tight end to quarterback.

The Bronco's offense finally got moving behind the running of Timo Martinez, Victor Lira and two big runs by Jeff Brittain.

Then the Broncos drove to the Bulldog 10 yard line where on fourth down entered kicker Scott Miller and he connected on another field goal of 30 yards to give the Broncos a 6-3 lead with a little over three minutes left in the game.

The Bulldogs took the kick off and mounted a big drive toward the Bronco goal. They drove to the Bronco 35 yard line where Jeff Brittain intercepted a Bulldog pass and returned it to the Bulldog 40 yard line.

This really put the momentum in the Bronco offense as they drove to the Bulldog goal and Jeff Brittain scored on a one yard run. Scott Miller kicked the extra point for a 13-3 Bronco victory, upping their season record to 3-1.

The offense rolled up 238 total yards. They had 230 yards rushing and 8 passing as Wallace and Brittain combined were 1 of 8 for 8 yards. That was a pass from Wallace to Brittain.

Drug awareness program started at High School

New-but soon to be familiar-faces around the Sonora I.S.D. are Daniel R. Brainard of Maximum Security Systems, Inc. and Chip, a three-year-old Labrador Retriever. The school board recently hired Mr. Brainard to implement his drug awareness program into the Sonora School System.

Brainard and Chip will visit Sonora numerous times during the year, and on Thursday, September 22, they presented introductory assemblies to the student bodies of the junior high and high school.

Brainard began his casual, relaxed presentation by stating that his program stressed two major points: altering attitudes and reversing peer pressure about drug and alcohol use.

He stated that he was not a moralist, but that "drugs and alcohol have no place in the educational system; and neither do students who are under the influence of these substances."

Brainard, an attorney and former F.B.I. agent, founded Maximum Security four years ago. He uses not the fierce German Shepherd but what he calls "kid dogs"-the giant, lovable Labrador Retrievers.

The Labs with their keen sense of smell are conditioned to find drugs and alcohol. If they are successful in their search, they are rewarded by getting to play with their favorite toy--a tennis ball.

As Brainard stated, "These dogs do what they are trained to do, but they live for two things--playing with tennis balls, and more important, human affection."

By using Labs, by implementing a non-threatening situation in which Labs are drug detection specialists but still gentle friends, Brainard says that his program offers students a viable alternative to drug and alcohol use: now students can refuse to give in to peer pressure because they love the dog and wouldn't want to disappoint him.

Brainard's philosophy must work. Maximum Security serves 60,000 students in 20 districts, and uses 17 dogs who are capable of sniffing out both narcotics and alcohol.

And the dogs? Well, Chip became an immediate crowd pleaser when he bounded onto the stage wearing bright red and white "Beat Brady" ribbons. Although Chip gave a short presentation on his ability to detect the presence of drugs, he spent the majority of his day getting acquainted: visiting classrooms; traveling around campus with office aides who collect attendance slips; lying around the office eating tons of soft red candy (known as "Bronco Power"); and receiving lots of his life's blood--human affection.

James Bible, principal of Sonora High School, said that he was "excited and enthusiastic" about Brainard's program. Brainard said that the success of his program could be measured by Chip's impact on the students: by how many drugs are not found on campus.

And Chip? Well--for the new kid on the block--he certainly made a lot of friends who are looking forward to seeing him again.

Mobile home ordinance cited

Jay Simpler, owner of J. and V. Trailer Park, appeared before the Sonora City Council Thursday, September 22 to point out that there are problems with the city ordinances for mobile home electrical and blocking standards.

It was also noted by Simpler that several dealers in the area are not setting up the mobile homes in the city limits in compliance with the standards set by the city and that several fire hazards have been noted.

The council agreed that something had to be done and that when a mobile home is moved into the area, the party should be informed of the city's ordinances. Members of the council also agreed to try to do a better job of enforcing the present ordinances.

In other action council members passed ordinance No. 257 for the closing of Poplar Street between Menard Avenue and Taylor Avenue and agreed to accept a quick-claim deed from Sonora Townsite.

Councilmen voted to pass a resolution accepting a plan for the annex building for the Sutton County Appraisal District but decided to meet with county officials to discuss the intentions of the county concerning the city's police station.

The council also passed an ordinance to increase sewer rates for customers in the city limits and out of the city limits.

At the present time, residents in the city limits are paying \$5.30 for one bath and \$6.30 for two. Outside of the city limits, citizens are currently paying \$6.30 for one bath and an additional \$1 for all other bathrooms.

As of October 1 the rates will all increase \$2 per month.

Councilmen also passed a resolution to close a portion of East First Street between Orient Street and Railroad Street.

Members of the council voted to change the city employee health insurance to Blue Cross/Blue Shield in order to get a reduced rate. In the past the city has used Prudential Insurance.

All claims will be taken over by Blue Cross and some improvements in coverage will be beneficial to city employees according to the council members.

The council opted not to pay for the dependents' insurance because of the additional cost of \$7739.29 since all employees of the city do not have dependents. The extra money will be used to benefit all employees but the exact plan will be decided later.

In other action the council voted to pay all non-salary employees two and one-half times his or her hourly rate for working on observed holidays.

Seniors of Sonora High School will begin magazine sales and renewals the first week of October, according to a school official.

The success of the senior trip depends on the magazine sales and the community's response since the only money making projects for the seniors will be that and the Halloween carnival October 31.

The magazine sales will also include renewals and magazines may be renewed no matter when the subscriptions expire.

People wanting renewals may get discount prices with their subscriptions as long as they keep the discount renewal slip.

Popular titles of the magazines include "McCalls", "Ladies' Home Journal", and "Readers' Digest", in English and Spanish.

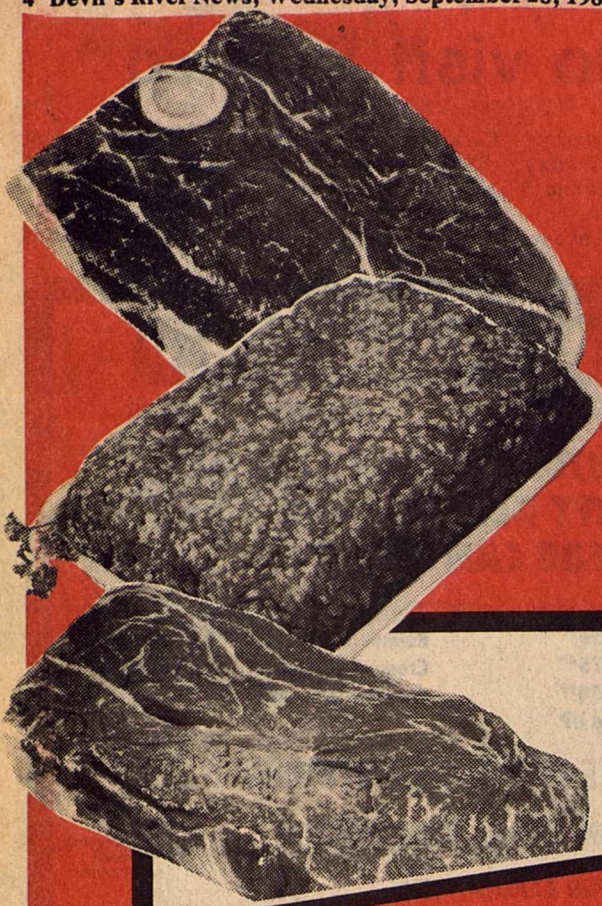

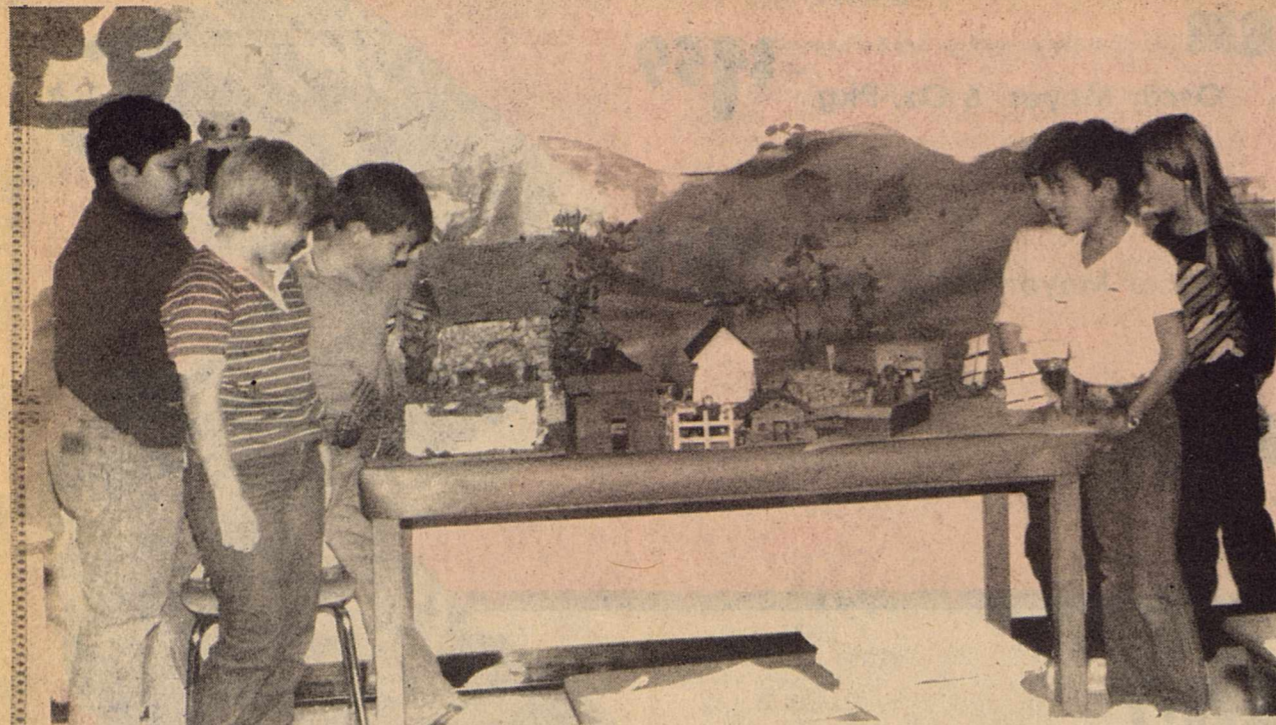

We are often thought of as a "Bandaid Station", says Dennis Robertson, "but in actuality we are serving a very vital link in the community. While there are some services we are not equipped to handle, we do, many times, serve as a stabilization station for accident victims. Often the chance of survival is contingent on a patient being stabilized before being transported to a specialized facility. We save many lives here."

Having dealt with some larger facilities, many people can fully appreciate several things about Hudspeth Memorial. The most important, perhaps, is the personalized care and caring, given by a truly dedicated staff. "We have a family type atmosphere", says Mr. Robertson, "in most cases, we know the patients when they enter the hospital. "Secondary to care, is the cost per day, \$125 for a private room, \$100 for semi-private. This compares to the Texas average of \$141.50 for private and \$126.50 for semi, and the national average of \$171.50 for private and \$167.50 for semi.

The interest rate for eligible victims under the EIDL Program is eight percent. The SBA, as mandated by Congress, provides financial assistance to victims of disasters. An Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) is made by SBA to small businesses which have sustained substantial economic injury as a direct result of the physical disaster, whether or not the business had actual physical damage.

Agriculture related businesses who sustained losses due to drought occurring January 1, 1983, and continuing, may be eligible for the loans under SBA's EIDL program. Only business loan applicants who are determined unable to obtain credit elsewhere are eligible for assistance.

O'Jibway said, "Applicants who file for Economic Injury Disaster Loans must be able to show their losses are directly attributable to the disaster as declared for their county's physical losses, and further that their efforts to secure financing elsewhere have failed."

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 8, 1983

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 91 proposes a constitutional amendment which requires a county with a population of 30,000 or more to be divided into not less than four nor more than eight justice of the peace precincts. A county with a population of 18,000 or more but less than 30,000 shall be divided into not less than two nor more than five justice of the peace precincts. A county with a population of less than 18,000 shall be designated as a single justice of the peace precinct or, upon a finding of necessity by the commissioners court, shall be divided into more than one justice of the peace precinct but not more than four. The amendment provides further, that in any precinct in which there is a city with a population of 18,000 or more, two justices of the peace shall be elected. The amendment allows a justice of the peace, constable or commissioner to continue in office until the expiration of his term, although a change in precinct boundaries results in the officer no longer being a resident of the precinct for which he was elected or appointed and allows a justice of the peace or constable to continue in office until the expiration of his term even though a change in precinct boundaries results in the abolishment of the precinct or more than one justice of the peace or constable serving the precinct. Vacancies in the office of justice of the peace or constable that result from a precinct boundary change shall be filled by the commissioners court until the next general election. The amendment would take effect on January 1, 1984, and counties with populations of less than 30,000 and with more than four justice of the peace and constable precincts would have until January 1, 1987 to comply with the amendment.

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 105 proposes a constitutional amendment which would limit a homestead in a city, town or village to a lot or lots amounting to not more than one acre of land, together with any improvements on the land. The constitutional requirement that, at the time of

designation, an urban homestead not exceed ten thousand dollars in value without reference to the value of any improvements on the land would be eliminated.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment replacing the limitation on the value of an urban homestead with a limitation based on size."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact legislation that permits representative associations of agricultural producers to collect refundable assessments on their product sales to be used solely to finance programs of marketing, promotion, research and education relating to those products. It provides, further, that adoption of the proposed constitutional amendment will bring into effect Senate Bill 607, Acts of the 68th Legislature, Regular Session, 1983, with rejection of the amendment resulting in Senate Bill 607 having no effect.

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 30 proposes a constitutional amendment which authorizes the Legislature to enact laws to provide for the succession of members of the Legislature in the event of enemy attack and allows the suspension of procedural rules imposed by the Constitution in the event of, or immediate threat of, enemy attack. The amendment empowers the Governor, after consultation with the Speaker of the House and the Lieutenant Governor, to suspend the constitutional requirement that the Legislature hold its sessions in Austin and allows the suspension of procedural rules by the Governor issuing a proclamation in which the House of Representatives and Senate concur by resolution approved by a majority of the members present. Suspension of the constitutional rules may not exceed a period of two years under a single proclamation; however, the Governor may renew the suspension by issuing a new proclamation concurred in by the House of Representatives and the Senate through a resolution approved by a major-

ity of the members present.

The amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing statutory provisions for succession of public office during disasters caused by enemy attack, and authorizing the suspension of certain constitutional rules relating to legislative procedure during those disasters or during immediate threat of enemy attack."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 12 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact legislation providing for the use of the permanent school fund and income from the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts. The amendment provides, further, that the Legislature may appropriate part of the available school fund for administration of the permanent school fund or of a bond guarantee program established pursuant to the amendment.

The constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing use of the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment which would permit the Legislature to provide for the garnishment of wages to enforce court-ordered child support payments. The garnishment remedy would not be available for other purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing the Legislature to provide for additional remedies to enforce court-ordered child support payments."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 14 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Veterans' Land Board to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed \$800 million to provide financing to veterans of the state. The amendment requires that three hundred million dollars of the state bonds be dedicated to the Veterans' Land Fund. The Fund is to be used to purchase land to be sold to veterans under such terms, rules and regulations as may be authorized by law. The amendment creates the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund and requires that \$500 million of the state bonds authorized by the amendment be dedicated to the Fund. The Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund will be utilized by the Veterans' Land Board for the purpose of making home mortgage loans to veterans for housing within the state and for the administrative

costs of administering the fund and issuing the bonds. The amendment provides, further, that if there is not money in either the Veterans' Land Fund or the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund available for payment of principal and interest on the general obligation bonds issued pursuant to the amendment, then money coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year is appropriated in an amount sufficient for payment of principal and interest due in that fiscal year.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment for financial assistance to veterans and to authorize the issuance of \$800 million in bonds of the state to finance the Veterans' Land Program and the Veterans' Housing Assistance Program."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes political subdivisions to exempt veterans' organizations from ad valorem taxation on their property. The amendment requires that the veterans' organizations be chartered by the United States Congress, be composed of members or former members of the United States Armed Forces, and be organized for patriotic and public service purposes. The amendment provides, further, that political subdivisions may exempt fraternal organizations from ad valorem taxation on their property. The amendment requires that the fraternal organizations be organized to perform and be primarily engaged in charitable or benevolent functions. The Legislature would be authorized to enact laws that prescribe eligibility requirements for fraternal organizations to benefit from the exemption and to pass legislation limiting the types or amount of property owned by a fraternal organization which may be exempted from ad valorem taxation.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize taxing units to exempt from taxation property of certain veterans' and fraternal organizations."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 70 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide, by local or general law, a method by which judges of statutory courts with probate jurisdiction may be assigned to any other statutory court with probate jurisdiction and to any constitutional county court in any county in the state.

jurisdiction and to county courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 17 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact laws which would allow a city or town to expend public funds to relocate or replace sanitation sewerage laterals on private property if done in conjunction with the replacement or relocation of sanitation sewer mains serving the property. The amendment requires that the law authorize the city or town to affix a lien on the private property, with the consent of the owner, to cover the costs of the replacement or relocation of the sewer laterals on the property. The lien may not be enforced until five years have expired since the date the lien was affixed. The amendment provides, further, that the law require that the costs of the replacement or relocation of the sewer laterals on the private property be assessed against the property with repayment to be amortized over a period not to exceed five years and at an interest rate provided by law.

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes a constitutional amendment that would change the Board of Pardons and Paroles from a constitutional agency to a statutory agency and would eliminate the Governor's power to revoke paroles. The Legislature would be authorized to establish the Board of Pardons and Paroles and to require it to maintain records of its actions and the reasons for its actions. The amendment would empower the Legislature to enact parole laws. Constitutional language specifying the qualifications and terms of office for members of the Board of Pardons and Paroles is eliminated. The constitutional language governing the composition of the Board of Pardons and Paroles and the manner of filling vacancies on the Board is eliminated.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to change the Board of Pardons and Paroles from a constitutional agency to a statutory agency and to give the board power to revoke paroles."

ORDINANCE NO. 225

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE SEWER COLLECTION MINIMUM FEE IN SECTION 21-51, ORDINANCE NO. 228, OF THE SONORA CITY CODE BY MODIFYING THE PROVISIONS THEREOF WITH MINIMUM CHARGE INCREASE OF THE SEWER RATES AND DESCRIBING AN EMERGENCY.

Section 21-51 of the Sonora City Code, which was originally enacted as Section 4 of Ordinance No. 144, adopted on August 2, 1976, is hereby repealed in minimum rate only and the following new part of Section 21-51 is hereby enacted, as follows:

Section 21-51: The following schedules of rates are hereby adopted and fixed as the minimum rate which may and/or be charged for sewer service following the September 20, 1983 date, and such rate increase shall appear on the October 1, 1983 billing. These charges hereby to be furnished by the City of Sonora, Texas or any public utility, for sewer service furnished to the inhabitants of said City of Sonora, Texas.

- (b) The sewer collection fee schedule shall be as follows:
 - (1) Residence
 - Inside City Limits
 - 1 bath \$7.30
 - Each additional bath or partial \$1.00
 - Outside City Limits
 - 1 bath \$8.30
 - Each additional bath or partial \$1.00
 - (2) Business place:
 - a. 1 complete set, lavatory and commode or lavatory and urinal \$6.30
 - b. Each additional set or part \$1.00
 - (3) Hotels and motels \$4.30
 - (4) Laundry room for motel
 - (4) Laundry room for motel \$4.80
 - (5) Wash rack minimum \$10.30
- (6) Grease rack minimum \$6.30
- (7) Individual trailer space:
 - a. Same as resident \$7.30
 - b. Each additional bath or partial \$1.00
- (8) Trailer parks, same as trailer spaces
- (9) Court house, jail, schools and churches, per commode \$1.50
- (10) All residences, commercial and industrial customers outside the city limits; additional one dollar (\$1.00) for the first bath or set.

The fact that the present charges for the use of the sewer system are greatly inadequate for the operation of the sewer system creates an emergency requiring this ordinance put upon its final reading

and passed and this ordinance shall be effective upon passage, approval and publication as required by law.
