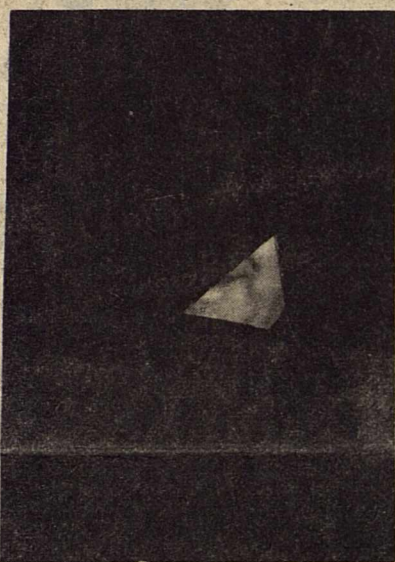

'No pass, no play' has not affected SISD students

Local results of the controversial 'No-pass, no play' rule mandated by the passage of House Bill 72, the 1984 education reform bill, show a surprisingly low percentage of students who will sit out the next six weeks, not able to take part in any extra-curricular activity at Sonora High School or Junior High.

Of the 355 students enrolled at the high school level, 54 received grades of below 70 in one or more subjects for the first six weeks grading period. Of the 54 ineligible, eight members of the band, three are tennis players, one is a girl's basketball player, and three are junior varsity football players. All members of the varsity football team passed all subjects. The remaining ineligible are not participating in University Interscholastic League activities.

According to Superintendent James Bible, the 15 per cent failure rate is well below the state average. Of the 212 students, who participate in UIL activities, only 15, or 17 per cent, failed a subject. Conversely, 39 or 27 per cent of the 143 students in high school who do not participate in any extra-curricular activity failed in one

or more subjects. Bible attributes the higher failing rate among non-participating students to several factors. For instance, the Bronco Band requires that any band students who is in grade trouble attend the twice weekly tutoring sessions. Varsity football players, whose coaches keep a close eye on grades, are encouraged to attend these tutoring sessions also. The same rule is in effect for basketball players.

Bible pointed out that the support of parents, faculty, and the students themselves was invaluable in maintaining the low failure rate among Sonora High School students. He added that without that positive attitude, most of our extra-curricular programs could be in serious trouble because of lack of participation through ineligible students.

While the 'no-pass, no-play' rule has not hurt as badly as it might have, Bible concluded his remarks with the observation that the rule of non-participation for the entire next six weeks seemed excessively strict and probably was unnecessary, but that we would have to learn to live with it for the time being.

but the list of adjectives would never include the words dull and boring.

It was with some foreknowledge of Mr. Lardie that approximately fifty persons braved the weather and flooding this past weekend to hear him play at Diertert Auditorium in Kerrville.

The concert was comprised solely of Mr. Lardie's own compositions. Each piece was prefaced with a brief narrative explaining the style of the piece and also it's conception.

Mr. Lardie, who explains his source of strength as being a firm reverence for the word of God, has based many of his compositions on stories from the Bible. As Mr. Lardie plays of the coronation of King David, you hear the trumpets, you see the ladies court as they are presented, you feel the pomp and circumstances of the event.

Indeed, as Mr. Lardie, also a teacher, interprets the concepts of classical music it becomes quite evident that though it is Mr. Lardie who is blind, we are often the ones who have no vision.

Speaking openly of his blindness, Mr. Lardie's wit comes into play. On one occasion, after asking a question of the audience, he quipped "Please don't nod your heads, it does me no good."

The concert lasted about ninety minutes which seemed like twenty. You had throughout that time the feeling that Mr. Lardie was entertaining only one person-you. He imparts of his knowledge and talent so easily and on a completely personal level.

And at the end of the concert, you left the auditorium feeling calm, relaxed, uplifted and with the knowledge that you've just spent the evening with a man who is both good and great.

HOMEMAKER UPDATE by Gail Rucker

Laundering your apparel investment

How do you save money, get your wash load clean and protect your apparel investment? According to the American Apparel Manufacturers Association, the answer is to launder clothing the right way. So what is the right way?

First, soil removal is affected by water temperature. Hot water is needed to remove body soil, which is often not visible, and to remove other visible particles and oily soils. As water temperature decreased from 130 F. (hot) to 100 F. (warm) to 70 F. (cool), soil removal is reduced - sometimes to unacceptable levels.

Soil is also more easily removed in soft water than in hard water.

The rate of mechanical action of the wash solution affects cleaning too. Regular agitation in an automatic washer provides better soil removal than gentle and gentle is better than hand washing.

With these factors in mind,

consider what you buy and will eventually need to launder. Sturdily made clothes with colorfast dyes and appropriate trim can withstand hot water washing with regular agitation - the best conditions for soil removal. Items with non-colorfast dyes require lower water temperatures to help reduce color loss, so cleaning is limited. Fragile items, such as those with unfinished seams or open fabric structure, need reduced wash action like gentle agitation which hinders soil removal.

With non-colorfast dyes, fragile apparel construction and medium to hard water, there are three strikes against getting maximum cleaning.

How do you know whether or not an item can ever be laundered to get best results? The manufacturers say it on the care label. With care labels recommending machine wash, hot water, regular agitation, you'll know the right washing condition can be used to achieve good cleaning. On the other hand, care labels recommending cool water or gentle agitation suggest the garment will fade, shrink, abrade, pill, wrinkle or ravel if washed under conditions right for good soil removal.

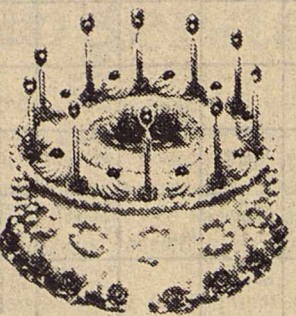

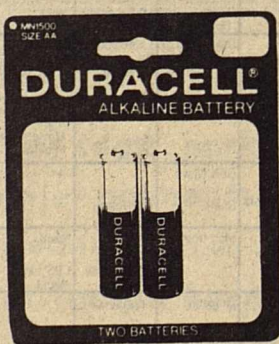

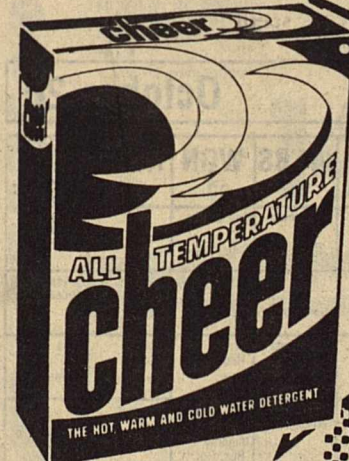

Understanding food additives

Understanding food labels today requires more than literacy.

The Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act was passed in 1938 to ensure that foods be honestly and informatively labeled and packaged.

However, due to continual advances in food technology, and increasing consumer demand for

more information about food products and the complexity of current food regulations, labels have become increasingly inscrutable to most of us.

An 80-page book published by the national non-profit Consumer Education Research Center offers a complete alphabetical list of additives, their sources, other names

for the same additives, why they are put in foods, whether they are toxic and any know interactions with other foods and chemicals.

Titled a Consumers Guide to Food Additives, the book also tells us what information is required to be on food labels and how to interpret it. There is also a glossary of label terminology.

The book demystifies additives by explaining, in every day terms, everything we ever wanted to know about those additives with long and short, familiar and strange-sounding names.

While many additives get a clean slate, such as Alpha Tocopherol, the most potent form of vitamin E, found in cottonseed oil and wheat germ oil, another early entry, Butylated Hydroxyanisole (BHA), receives a different rating.

BHA, the book tells us, has been on the market since 1947 and is a preservative and antioxidant used in almost every processed food containing fat or oil. It is known to be capable of causing allergic reactions and affecting liver and kidney functions.

At the same time, BHA is a good example of an unnecessary use of a synthetic food additive, as demonstrated by the fact that some companies have found that it provides no improvement in the stability of their product.

Consumers are advised that they can reduce their intake of BHA by buying oil, shortening, yeast and potato chips which are free of this ingredient easily determined by reading the label, since its use is required to be listed.

From Acacia (also called Gum Arabic) to Zinger on (artificial flavoring..is not toxic), this book is an eye opener that can help the concerned consumer reach a new level of label literacy and ultimately protect health and well-being.

Let Us Keep The Feast

Acts 18:21 says, "But bade them farewell, saying, I must by all means keep this feast that cometh in Jerusalem; but I will return again unto you, if God will. And he sailed from Ephesus."

Paul was returning to the feast of Pentecost.

In one of his epistles, he said, "I will tarry at Ephesus until Pentecost." (1st Cor. 16:8)

"For Paul had determined to sail by Ephesus, because he would not spend the time in Asia; for he hasted, if it were possible for him, to be at Jerusalem the day of Pentecost." (Acts 20:16)

Originally the festival of Pentecost was to celebrate the ingathering of the harvest. In later Jewish history it came to commemorate the giving of the Law at

Sinai and of the birth of the Jewish nation.

On the day of Pentecost the Holy Spirit was given and the church was inaugurated. We can find this in Acts 2:1-47. "And when the day of Pentecost was fully come...they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and begun to speak with other tongues, as the spirit gave them utterance... and the same day there were added unto them about three thousand souls...and the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved."

The church is a spiritual institution, and those that are born-again ought to be spirit-filled.

There is a parallel in creation. "And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and man became a living soul." (Genesis 2:7)

Similarly it took a breath from heaven to turn the original body of believers into a living church there in the upper room. (Acts 2:2)

That divine breath came as a rushing mighty wind and turned the believers into a dynamic organism. They began to preach Christ in the power of the Holy Spirit, and the word was confirmed with the mighty signs and wonders.

The transformation that takes place when men and women are baptized with the Holy Spirit is illustrated by Ezekiel's vision. In his vision the prophet saw an entire valley full of dead men's bones. (Ezekiel 37) The scripture says the bones were very dry.

The question was asked, "Can these bones live?" Only if the Lord would breathe upon them. By that divine breath the dry bones were

transformed into living beings, "an exceeding great army."

He who breathed into the 1st Adam and made him a living soul is able to breathe upon every descendant of Adam and give that person this abounding life in the spirit.

Wherever there may be churches or church members who seem to be "dead bones," God wants to breathe upon them and impart to them an abundance of spiritual life and power.

The greatest need in the church and in the lives of every individual is to receive the breath from heaven. We need it in everything that we do.

May God grant that as we "Keep the feast" it may be a spiritual experience marked by prayer, dedication, and a new ending with power from on high that will enable us to lead the lost to Christ! Let God breathe upon you....

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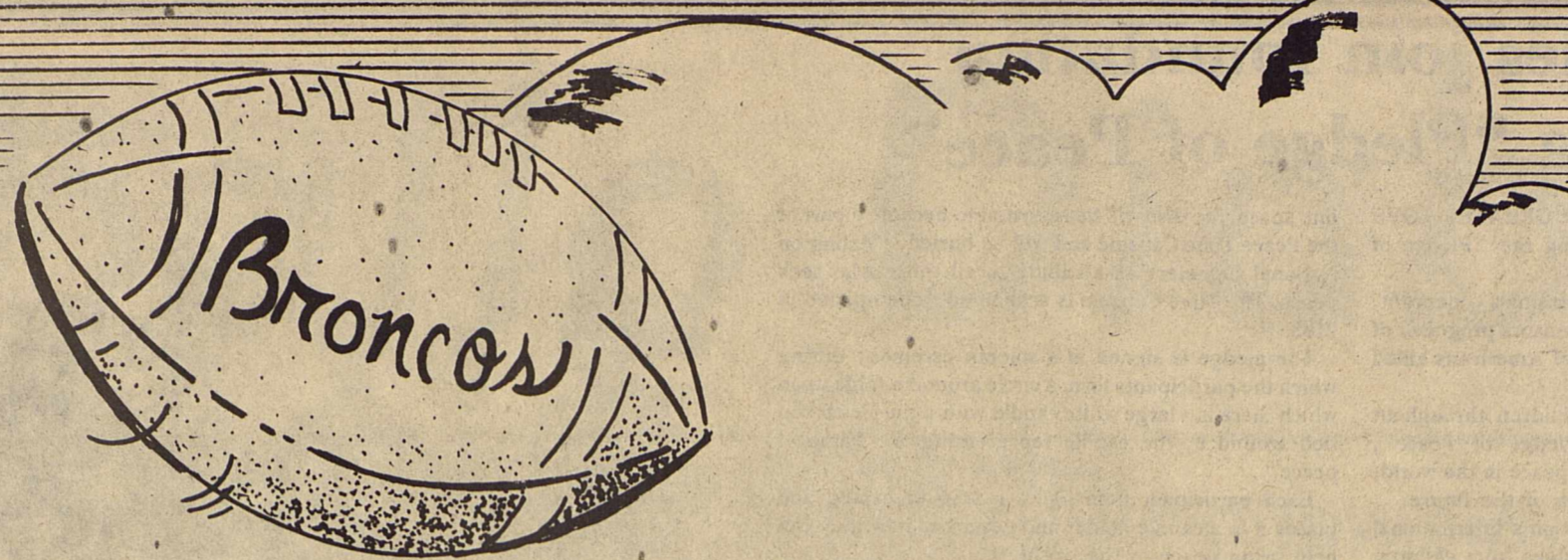

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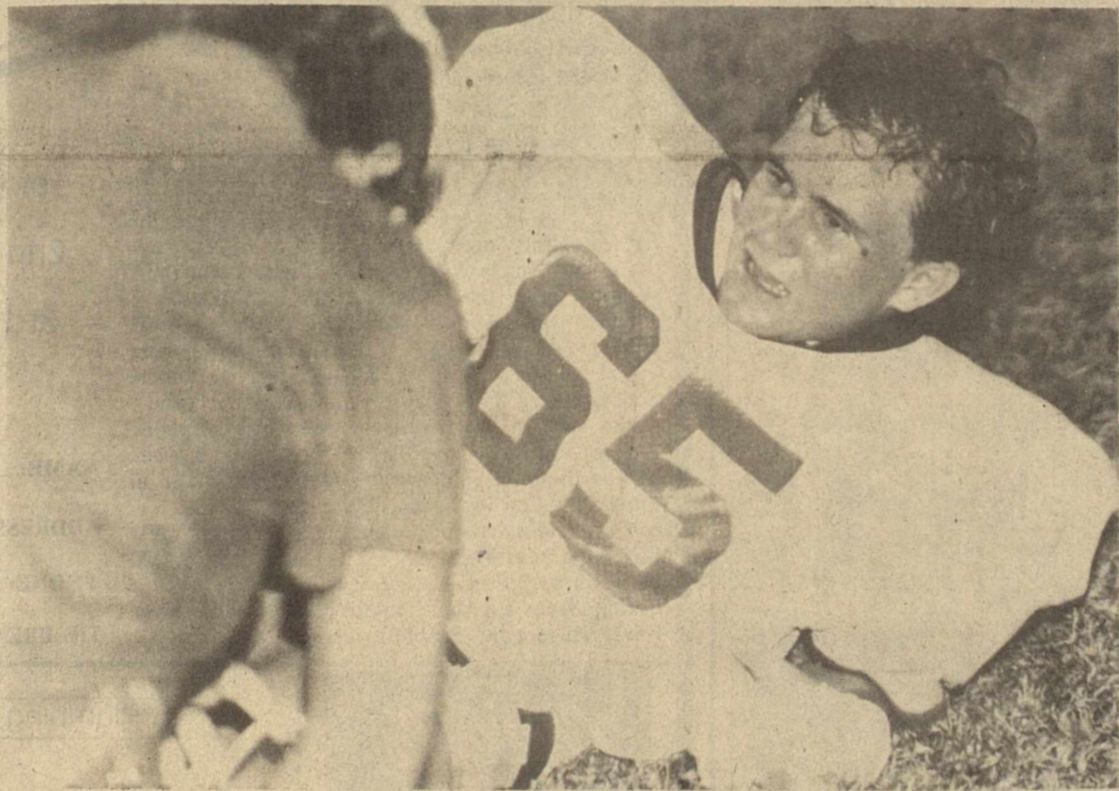
