Please shop Sonora."

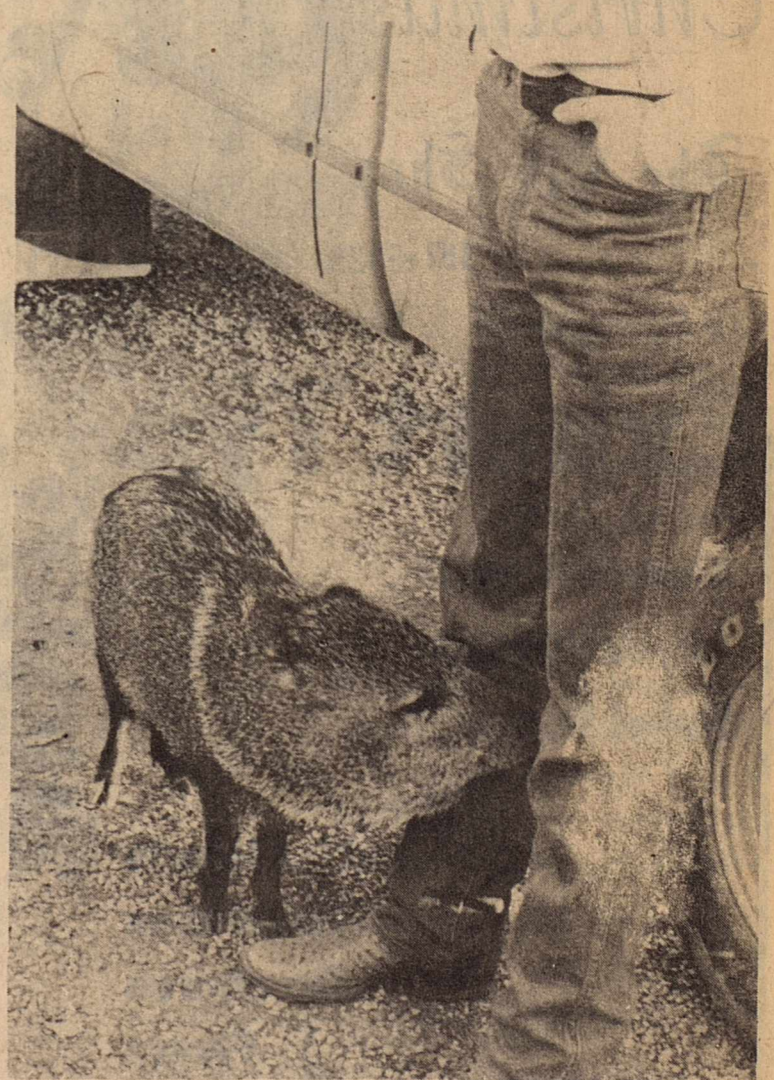

## DPS hoping estimates too high

Texas Department of Public Safety officials have estimated that as many as 29 persons will die as a result of traffic accidents during the Christmas and New Year's holidays. The DPS expects 12 fatalities during the 30-hour Christmas period and 17 deaths during the 54-hour New Year's period.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, asked motorists to maintain safe driving habits during the holidays to minimize the loss of life in vehicle crashes.

"We'd certainly like to see our fatality estimates prove to be too high," Adams said. "Unfortunately, there will be drivers who will ignore speed limits and attempt to operate vehicles after drinking. The best way to avoid becoming involved in an accident with a careless driver is to drive in a defensive manner. It also makes good sense to be sure everyone in the vehicle uses a safety belt."

Adams said he has authorized Highway Patrol captains to utilize troopers from other uniformed Traffic Law Enforcement services to augment the regular patrol.

Additional troopers will be assigned where large volumes of traffic or additional accidents are likely," Adams said.

During the 102-hour Christmas period in 1984, vehicle accidents caused 43 traffic deaths in Texas. A total of 42 deaths were attributed to crashes occurring during the 102-hour New Year's period last year.

The department of Public Safety will provide state traffic deaths updates as part of the "Operation Motorcade" program. The counting

period of Christmas begins at 6 p.m. Tuesday, December 24, and concludes at midnight on Wednesday, December 25. The New Year's counting period begins at 6 p.m. Monday, December 30 and ends at midnight on Wednesday, January 1.

## Workshop to be held for qualifying artists

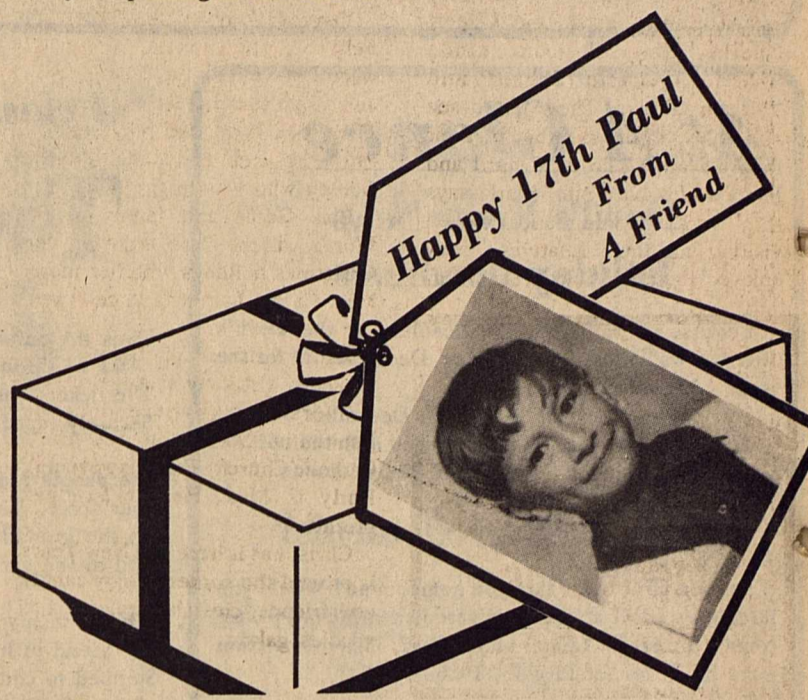

## Scholarships available

The Texas Association of Private Schools (TAPS) will award \$1,052,000 in scholarships to selected 1986 high school graduating seniors in Texas.

Scholarships will be offered in 102 separate vocational/technical career fields such as computer programming, cosmetology, accounting, air conditioning, acting, commercial art, automotive mechanics, secretarial, barber, court reporting, inset printing, travel and tourism, welding, word processing and many others. Over 315 scholarships are offered with values from \$350 to \$12,096.

Scholarship program information has been mailed to public and private school counselors, principals application requirements are (1) letters of recommendation, (2) academic record to date, and (3) an original 250-word essay. Notification of awards will be made to the scholarship winners in mid-April, 1986. Applications for the scholarships (awarded only by TAPS member schools) may be requested of high school counselors or by contacting the TAPS office at: P.O. Box 13481, Austin, Texas 78711, (512) 444-8463.

More students receive their career training in privately-owned schools than in any other vocational programs. Eighty percent of today's jobs require technical or vocational skills.

Privately-owned schools are able to provide those skills in a relatively short time so that a student who cannot afford or who does not choose to pursue a degree may obtain a well-paying position and be a productive member of society.

## SSS says register to avoid prosecution and loss of benefits

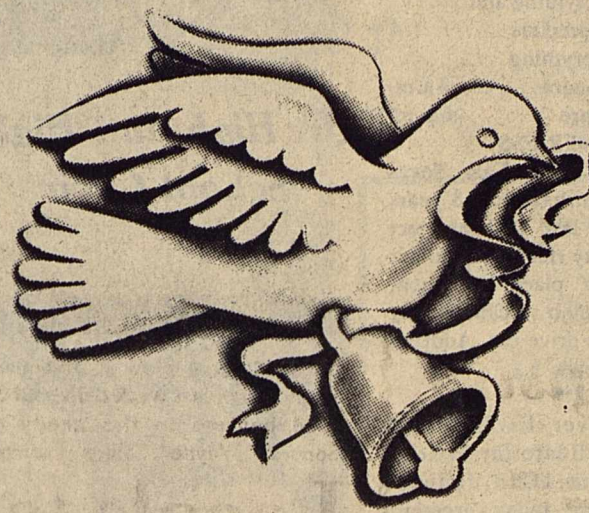
The Selective Service System reaches an important milestone in the registration of young men on January 1, 1986.

Beginning on this date, men who were required in 1980 to register with Selective Service will be turning 26. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept registrations of men after they turn 26. Men who failed to register will have permanently forfeited their right to certain Federal student aid and job training benefits as well as Federal employment. Additionally, registration with Selective Service is a requirement in some states for various employment opportunities, such as law enforcement agencies and permission to practice law.

Men born in 1960 who have registered, will reach age 26 in 1986 and, under present law, will no longer be eligible for selection for induction. Over 15 million men, age 18 through 25, have registered with Selective Service since President Carter initiated registration in 1980.

Many of the men who are non-registrants may be unaware of the requirement or do not understand the importance of the obligation to register. Some have served in the military but failed to register either before entering the Armed Forces or after leaving active duty. Others may have been incarcerated at the time of their 18th birthday and not realized they were required to register if released from custody prior to age 26.

Men age 18 to 25 who have not yet registered should register promptly to avoid prosecution and/or loss of benefits. Registration takes only five minutes at any post office. Failure to register is a felony, punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000 and/or up to 5 years imprisonment.

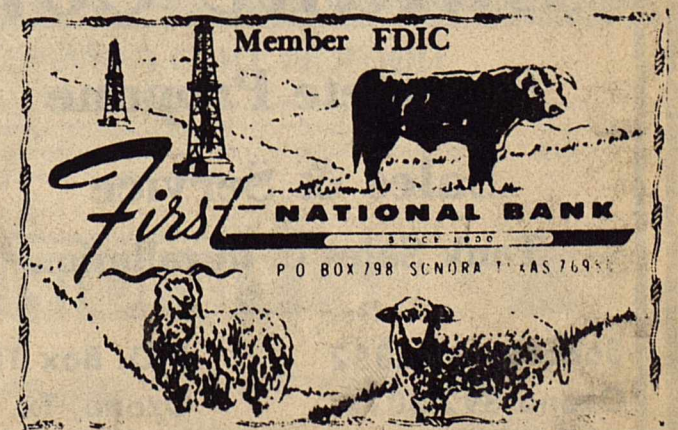

## Petitions to be filed by Silver Haired Legislature

Prospective members of the first Texas Silver Haired Legislature will begin filing petitions for candidacy January 1, 1986 in anticipation of this spring's election.

The filing process, which will continue until February 28, will take place through area agencies on aging throughout Texas. Balloting will be held in May.

Any Texan who is over 60 years of age prior to January 1, and is a registered voter living in the area from which he or she is applying for candidacy may run for the Silver Haired Legislature. Candidacy forms can be obtained at area agencies on aging.

The address of the area agency in this area is Concho valley Area Agency on Aging, 5002 Knickerbocker Road in San Angelo.

The Silver-Haired Legislature (SHL), which was authorized this year by the 69th Texas Legislature, is an elected, non-partisan body of seniors who will meet in Austin next year to draft and propose suggested legislation for consideration by the 70th Texas Legislature in 1987.

The concept of a senior legislature has been adopted by many other states, and has proven very successful in fulfilling its goals, which include:

- \* Providing seniors with a chance to gain understanding of the legislative process through direct involvement.

- \* Developing a forum for older citizens to discuss issues that are meaningful to them, transform them into legislation, and present these bills to the regular state legislature.

- \* Providing advocacy training that will allow senior legislators to offer informed assistance to policy makers.

Paula Johnson of the Texas Department on Aging, who helped develop the Texas SHL, observed

this week that "The Silver Haired Legislature has the potential to be a powerful ally of seniors in this state, but it can't succeed without participation by people who represent a true cross-section of political viewpoints.

"You don't have to be an experienced politician to be in the SHL—just a concerned citizen with the willingness to learn how the legislative process works. It's a unique challenge that I hope will be accepted by many people from this area."

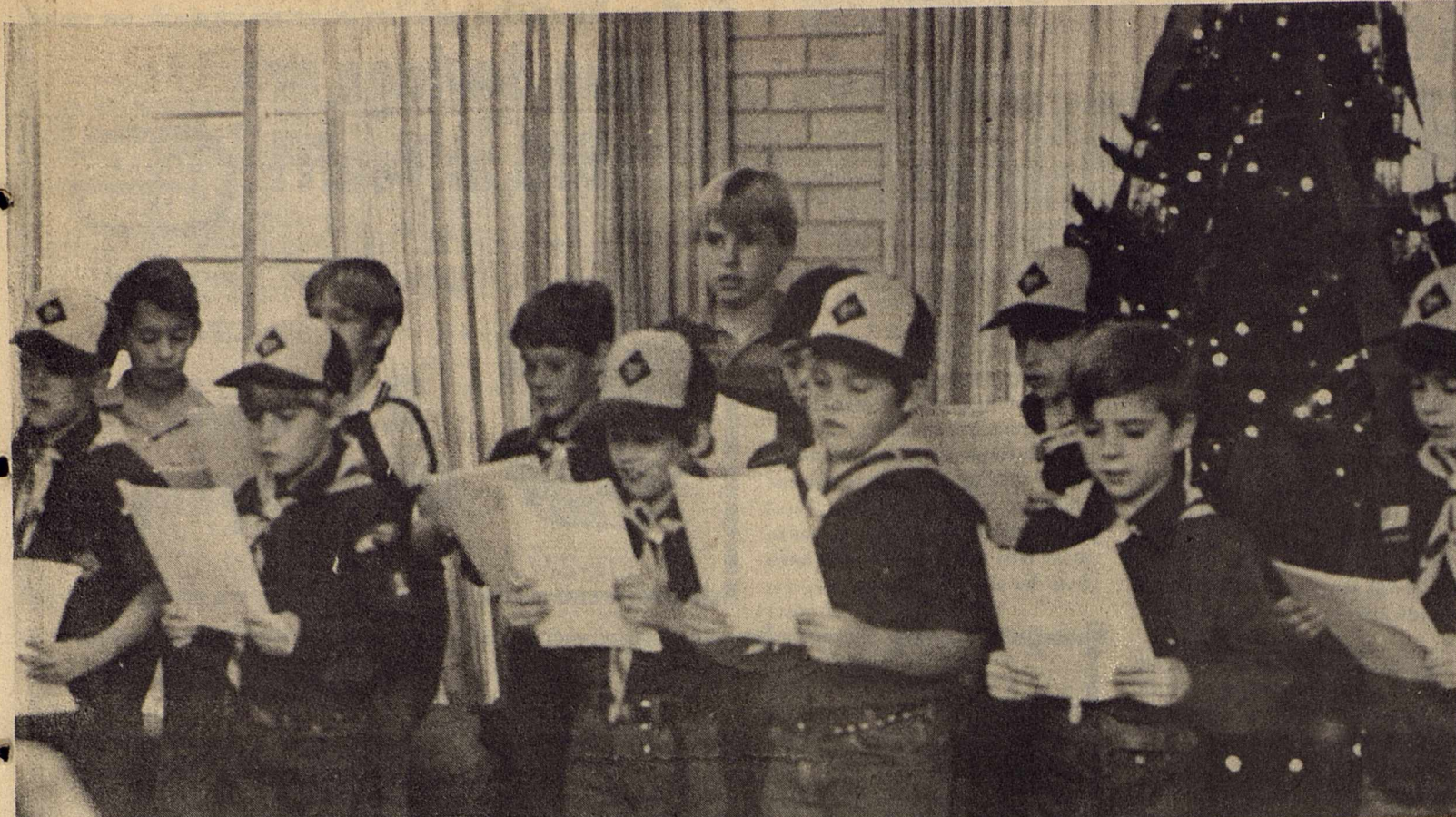

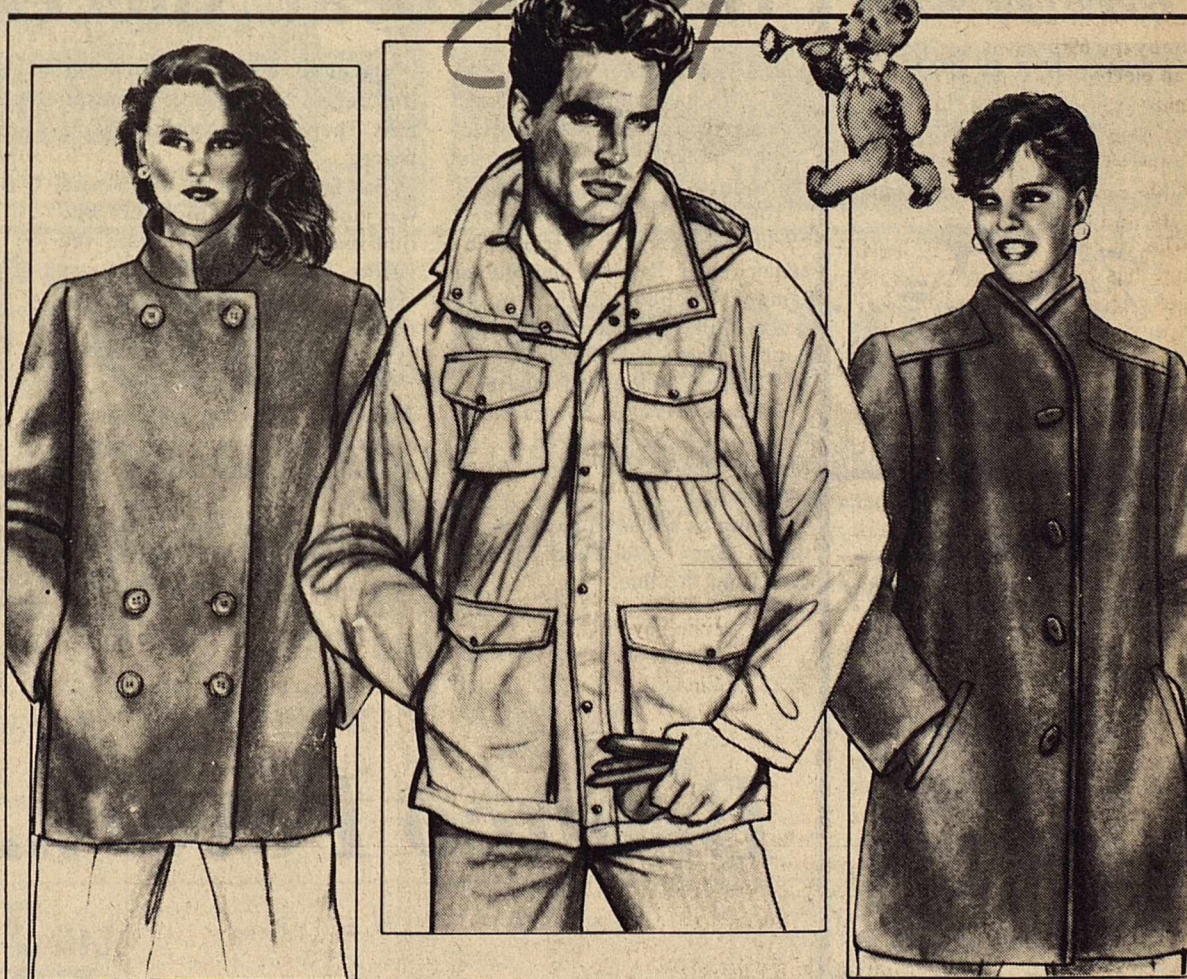

## December debts require January credit strategy

If you've piled up credit card debts to pay for Christmas expenses, now is the time to plan a first-of-the-year strategy for paying them off, says a family economics expert.

"Without a concerted effort to reduce credit use, consumers can easily find themselves still paying

for big-ticket Christmas gifts the following December," cautions Nancy Granovsky, a specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

If you take on \$800 in credit charges in December, and then charge more purchases on top of that original debt without ever paying it off, you'll owe \$945.27 by the end of the following December, notes Granovsky.

Your original debt of \$800 will have grown by \$147.27 due to the 1.5% interest charged on the debt balance each month. That adds up to 18% interest per year, she adds.

The specialist points out that some credit card companies charge more than 18% interest per year and that you would also be paying interest on the other unpaid charges in addition to those levied against the \$800 debt.

"There are two ways to reduce your credit card debt load," said Granovsky. "You can charge less than you pay off each month, which will reduce your debt over time. Or you can simply stop using credit cards and make payments until the debt is eliminated."

Planning to use one of these strategies beginning in January can help you become debt-free, she says.

Start by calculating your fixed expenses, such as rent or mortgage, utilities, and car payments. Then figure your living expenses, such as food, clothing and personal items. Subtract these two sets of expenses from the monthly income and you'll know how much money you have available for payments to reduce credit card debt, explains the specialist.

"It's most critical not to charge more purchases than you are paying off each month, otherwise you'll be unable to pay the debt off and it will actually rise because of interest charges," says the specialist.

She recommends leaving credit cards locked up at home to curb impulse buying that can ruin your debt repayment plans.

Planning how to reduce credit card debts and following through on you plans, can help you more effectively manage your money in the new year, advises Cranovsky.

## Time's running out for sign owners

Any owner of an off-premise advertising sign along a road or highway outside any incorporated city or town has until December 30, 1985 to register or remove the sign. An off-premise sign is a sign which advertised a service or product not principally sold on the premises where the sign is located.

The new state law assigns the responsibility for regulation of advertising signs to the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (DHT). The law also requires that all

signs both on-premise and off-premise erected after September 1, 1985 must have a permit issued by the Department.

Anyone who is in doubt about whether their sign is required to be registered should contact the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation Office before December 30, 1985. Registration forms are available in the San Angelo District Office located at Loop 306 and Knickerbocker Road. The telephone number is (915) 944-1501, Extension 244.

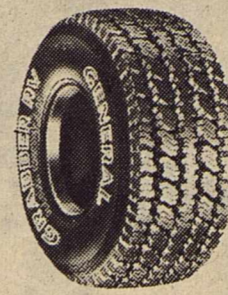

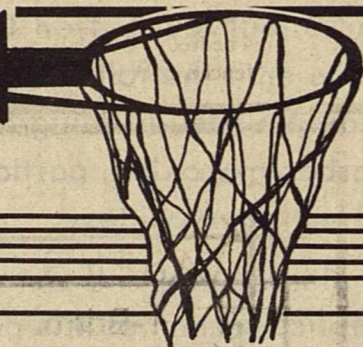

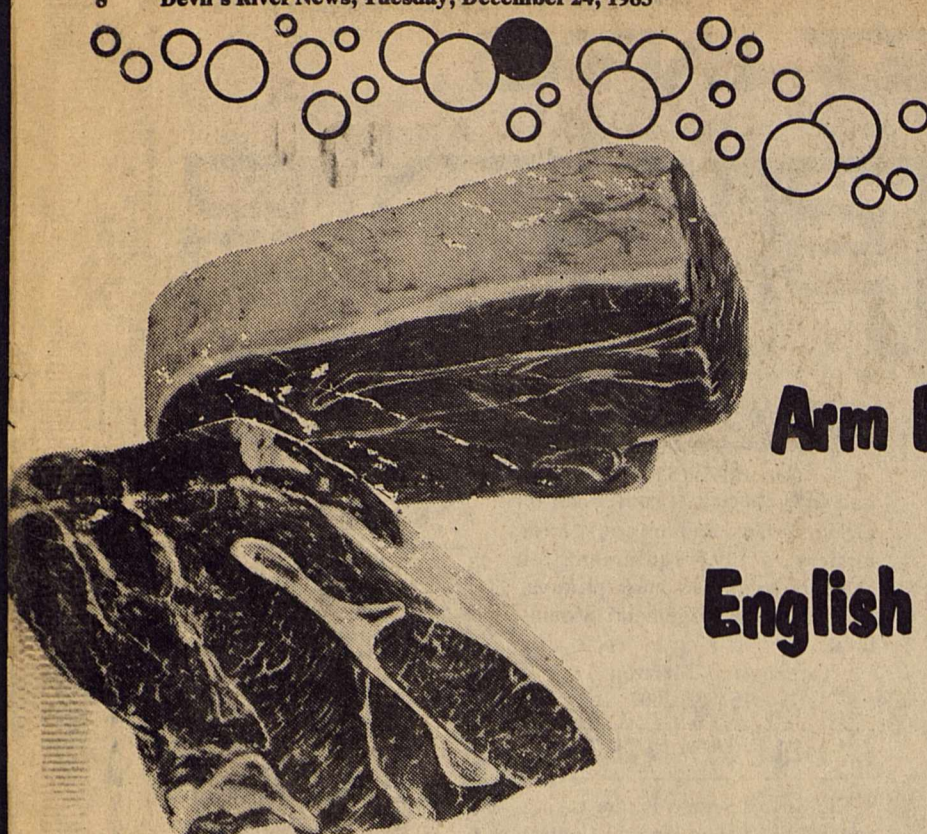
