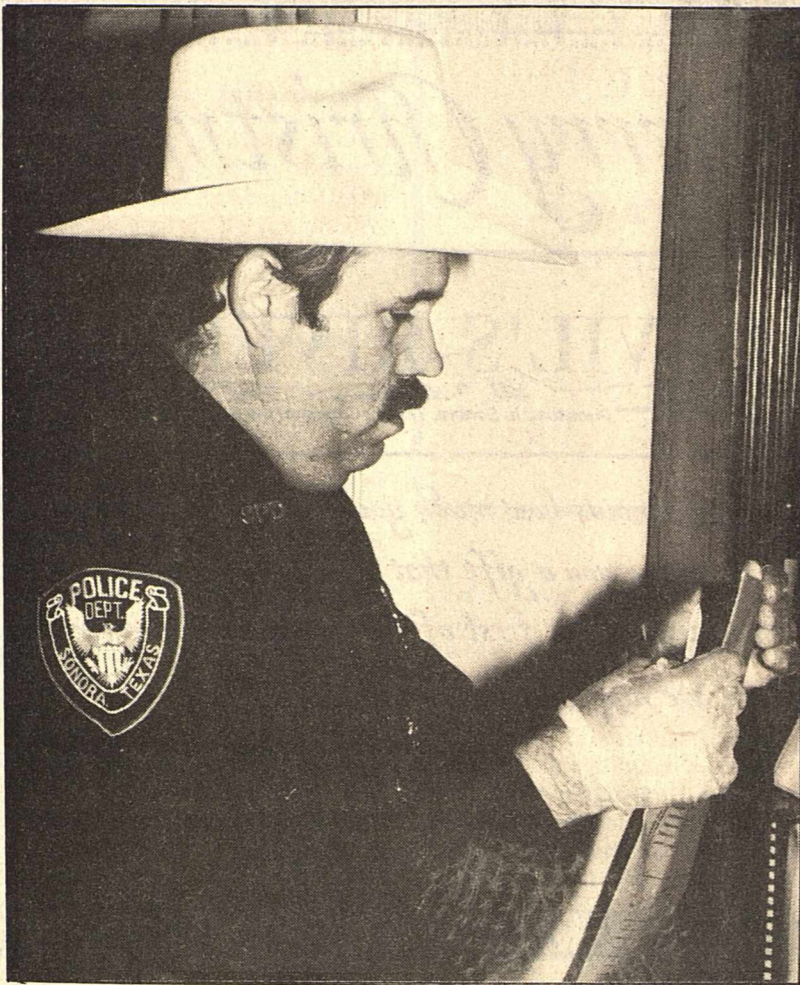

Two candidates file for March primaries

Two more filings have been made for the March, 1990 primary elections.

The first person to file was Sutton County Judge Carla Fields, who is making a bid for re-election.

Mrs. Bobbie Smith and Mrs. Adelita Smalling are the second and third persons to file for office. Mrs. Smith, the Sutton County Chief Deputy Clerk, will run on the Democratic ticket seeking the position currently held by Mrs. Erma Lee Turner. Mrs. Turner is retiring after nearly 26 years of service, and has endorsed Mrs. Smith.

Mrs. Smith was officially named by the Sutton County Commissioners Court Nov. 27 to maintain the position of clerk until the newly-elected clerk assumes office in January.

Mrs. Smalling, also a Democrat, is a candidate for Sutton County Justice of the Peace, currently held by retiring Judge Herman E. Moore.

Although Judge Moore is prohibited from endorsing a candidate, he has relied heavily upon Mrs. Smalling, his assistant, during the last two years.

Mrs. Smalling was acting Justice of the Peace for the periods

Judge Moore was recuperating from heart and back problems.

Mrs. Smith is a native of Sonora, and has worked - off and on - at the Sutton County Courthouse since she was 19 years old.

Her last "return" to the courthouse was in 1981, when Mrs. Turner asked her to replace the retiring chief deputy. Mrs. Smith has held the position ever since.

Mrs. Smalling was born in Sonora, but has lived and worked in Del Rio, San Antonio, Dallas, Houston and Austin. The mother of two teenage daughters, Mrs. Smalling lived in Germany for three years with her husband who was assigned to the Air Force.

Undercover agent William Lonnie Hood, the controversial figure in ongoing drug trials in Sonora, may be a marked man as a result of an incident here last weekend.

Thieves broke into the old Mercantile Building early Sunday morning, ignoring equipment, credit cards and cash, and stole only two things: weapons and the 112th District Attorney's file on Hood.

"Now they have his address," District Attorney J.W. Johnson said Monday, after an inventory of his office confirmed the file had been taken.

Hood, who conducted a successful undercover drug buying assignment in Sonora from November, 1988, to March, 1989, has been the state's star witness in prosecuting 14 people on drug dealing charges.

Defense lawyers, trying to discredit the state's star witness, at one point revealed that Hood was thrown out of the Army after deserting in 1972. Other attempts to discredit the free-lance, unlicensed undercover agent have been unsuccessful.

During the October trial of Tomas Favela, Hood testified that his life had been threatened by a local man who suspected the 38-year-old Hood of being an undercover agent.

According to police, at least two and possibly three men forced their way into the Mercantile office building and the Doyle Morgan Insurance Company offices early Sunday morning.

Authorities are investigating the possibility that the insurance office break-in may have been used by the burglars as a look-out.

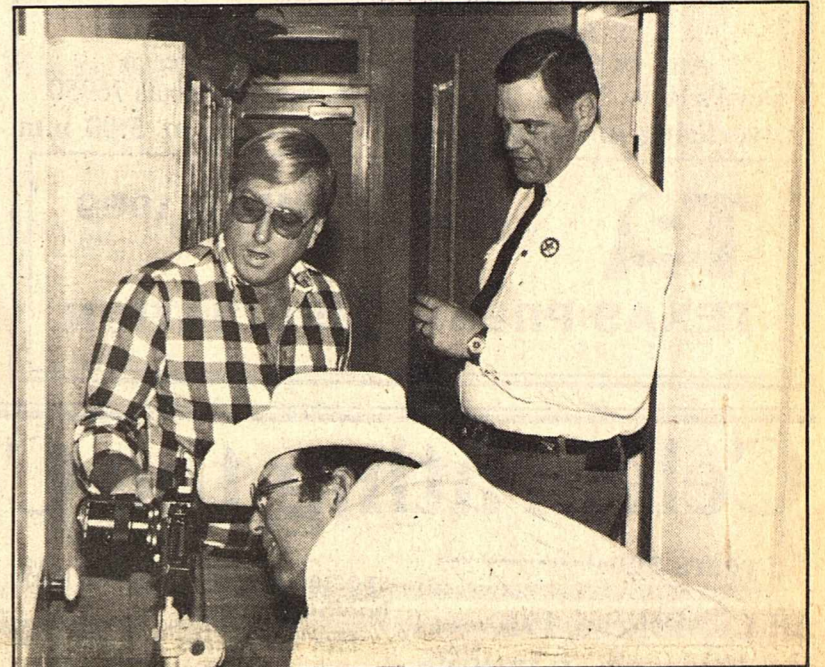
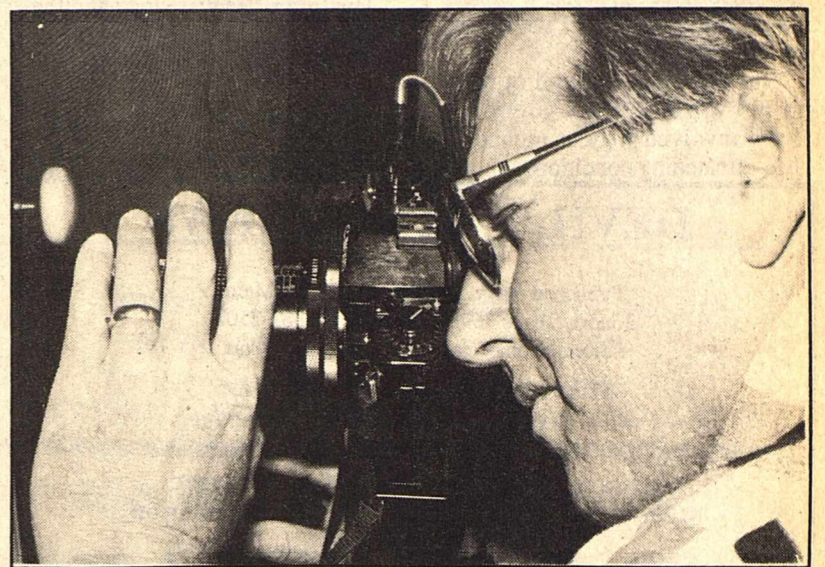
Police say upon entering the Mercantile the men forced open the door to Walter Pope's office, obtained keys, obtaining access to the other second floor rooms. Unable to find keys to the offices of Johnson and Attorney Mark Shurley, the burglars forced the doors with a metal bar.

Although the thieves took several guns, police say they apparently studied a large number of documents and stole one confidential file, while ignoring valuable office equipment, checks, credit cards and cash.

Mrs. Turner announced her early retirement at a County Commissioner's meeting three weeks ago, and Judge Moore confirmed Monday that he will not be a candidate for re-election.

"I want to express my gratitude to every citizen for letting me serve you through the years," Judge Moore said. "The main reason I am not seeking the position is due to my health and also my age."

"And besides," he said "After being involved in law enforcement for 40 years, I am just worn out."

The burglary has shocked citizens and angered law enforcement officials concerned with Hood's safety.

"Desperate people do desperate things," said Johnson, shaking his head as investigators pored over his office. He said Hood had been contacted, and "precautions" taken.

Of the 14 persons arrested in the round-up of Sonora drug dealers last March, one received 90 years in prison, and another received a life sentence. Two more defendants changed their minds and entered

"guilty" pleas Monday before a jury could be chosen for their trials.

The two men, Norman Laurence Barbee, 24, and David Pendleton, 32, will be sentenced by 112th District Judge Brock Jones following a presentence investigation.

The burglary investigation, headed by Sonora Police Chief Brent Gesch, is being aided by agents from the Texas Rangers, state criminal investigators, 112th District investigators, and local law enforcement personnel.

Pair enter guilty pleas at drug trial

Two Sonora men, arrested in a roundup of local drug dealers last March, waived trial by jury here Monday and entered guilty pleas before 112th District Judge Brock Jones.

Norman Laurence Barbee, 24, pleaded guilty to two counts of delivery of methamphetamine. He faces from five to 99 years imprisonment and up to \$20,000 fine on each count.

David Pendleton, 32, pleaded guilty to delivery of a simulated controlled substance.

He faces from two to 10 years imprisonment and a fine of up to \$5,000.

Both men waited until the last minute before deciding to enter guilty pleas.

The first two men tried as a result of 14 grand jury indictments stemming from an undercover operation received lengthy sentences.

The first, Tomas Favela, was found guilty and sentenced to 90 years in prison.

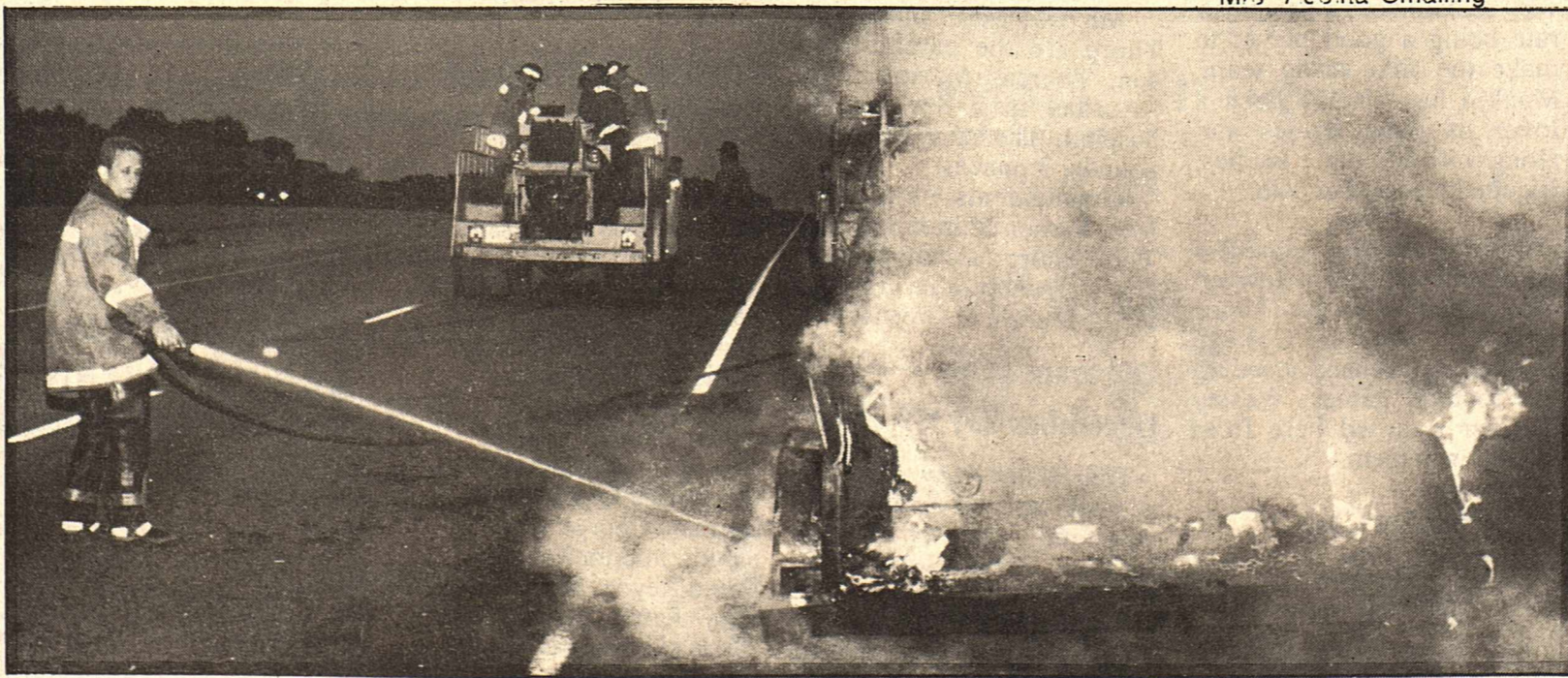
The second man, Jose Alfredo Galindo, was found guilty by a jury, but left his punishment up to Jones.

The judge sentenced Galindo to life in prison.

Trials for the remaining 10 defendants, including Sonora restaurateur Eriberto Bernal, will resume Jan. 16.

towing were destroyed by the blaze. The vehicles owner abandoned the fully loaded truck and apparently made no attempt to rescue its contents, which included several hunting rifles.

They never even said 'thanks'

It was a raw, miserable Wednesday.

Most working people were eyeing the clock, eager to get home and enjoy some warmth after a cold, wet day.

It was the kind of day mohair sweaters and fireplaces are made for, where a blanket and a cup of hot tea sound like the best ideas in the world.

Just before 5 p.m. the fire alarm went off. There was a report of a truck on fire 31 miles east of Sonora on Interstate 10.

Volunteers arrived at the station, and the fire trucks roared to life.

Before the first truck arrived, the dispatcher advised the fire involved a pickup truck towing a trailer.

"When are people going to learn the difference between a pickup and a truck," growled the driver, feigning disgust.

But there was a sound of relief in his voice. A truck fire might have involved a great number of life-threatening conditions.

This particular fire wasn't deadly, but the potential always exists.

A late-model pickup towing a hunter's jeep caught fire, and nothing was salvaged. The fire, hot enough to melt metal and blister the pavement, destroyed both vehicles.

Hunting rifles were lost, and the charred remains of two bucks offered silent testimony to the waste.

The firefighters extinguished the blaze, then soaked, pried and poked

around the wrecks, breathing the stench of charred destruction.

They were damp, cold and tired, but they didn't leave until the wrecker arrived so they could hose off the highway.

And the owners of the truck?

They hitched a ride into Junction, and then called San Antonio for a ride home. They probably were back at their warm abodes long before the firefighters were able to return the trucks and call it a day.

And just think: the men who abandoned the truck never even said "thanks." Knowing the truck was insured, they avoided any inconvenience by taking off.

Celebrating the Centennial--Sonora as it used to be

70 years ago-----

DECEMBER 6, 1919

SONORA ROAD FIRST

A mass meeting of business men and citizens held in Angelo Nov. 25th, decided to first build the Sonora road as the most important link in their good roads system. The road to Sonora is considered by Federal and State authorities the greatest commercial highway in the State and has made liberal allowances for assistance in its construction. Because of the character of the country it passes over on the Famous Lipan Flat, near Angelo, where the traffic is unusually heavy in supplying the trade territory 100 or more miles to the south of the Queen City of the Conchos, the State and Federal engineers require the construction of a "Pike" road across the Flat or for a distance of fifteen miles, at a cost of \$20,000 a mile. The meeting recommended that such a road be built and promised the support at a future time of a new bond issue with which to build the other roads of Tom Green county. On there recommendation of the meeting the Commissioners Court has let the contract for the building of the road and the work to commence at once.

The State Engineer at the meeting also called attention to the fact that Schleicher county would be required to build across the county in order to obtain Federal and State aid.

First Baptist Church celebrates 100 years

A company of brethren and sisters in the Lord, wishing to become an independent church, met in the school house in the town of Sonora, Sutton County, Texas for that purpose and after a sermon by Elder J.W. Cunningham at 11 o'clock a.m. Bro. J.W. Cunningham was chosen Moderator pro. tem and W.T. Covington Clerk pro. tem. The following persons then presented letters of dismission from their former churches: C.T. Covington and wife, S.R. Covington, W.T. Covington, R.E. Covington, D.H. Covington and wife, N.J. Covington, M.A. Covington, D.C. Covington, I.C. Lovelace, Ada Stewart and M.A. Moss. After the reading of these letters it was resolved by a solemn vote of the parties baring (sic) them to consider themselves an independent church. (The church adopted a church covenant and articles of faith.) The Church was then named, The 1st Baptist Church of Sonora, Texas. The church then proceeded to the election of officers, which resulted in the choice of Elder J.W. Cunningham as Missionary pastor and W.T. Covington as Clerk. Bro. D.H. Covington, being a regularly ordained Deacon, was elected to serve in that capacity.

So began the minutes of The First Baptist Church in Sonora. The church, recognizing it's 100th year of service to this community, will celebrate in several ways from December 10-13.

The church is currently experiencing some changes, one of which is a complete renovation of the auditorium. The work is in progress and will be completed in January.

Morning worship is being held in the church fellowship hall. On Sunday, December 10, at 2:30 p.m. a dedication ceremony will be held to name the J.C. Hancock Fellowship Hall in memory of former pastor J. Clifton Hancock. The community is cordially invited to attend the dedication service. Rev. Hancock served as pastor from 1968 until 1983.

An all-church fellowship meal will be served on Sunday evening, December 10, at 6:30 p.m. A celebration service will be held each evening Monday through Wednesday at 7 p.m. with a different speaker each night. That's when we got arrested. I know it isn't right what happened that night but I shouldn't be the only one in jail.

Time on task

Virtually every educational study in recent years equates the degree of quality instruction to the time spent on task in the various curriculum areas. It is an accepted fact that instruction suffers from distractions at any grade level.

The educational reform brought forth by H.B. 72 required that schools provide interruption-free class time. School districts across the state, by and large, were very conscientious in complying with this mandate, and attempted to schedule extra-curricular activities on Saturdays and after school. Recently, we have become more permissive in our scheduling and have allowed more interruptions in our school day.

The task of keeping students in class for the maximum amount of time requires the constant attention of our principals, especially at the junior high and high school levels. Our principals, are very aware of limiting disruptions caused by announcements, class meetings, telephone calls and assemblies. Also our coaches, to the extent possible, are asked to schedule activities in manner that provides the least interference with the school day. The various activity sponsors are asked not to schedule activities on the night of a six weeks or semester test.

Our students are extremely interested in the various activities that we offer and we have excellent participation. With this excellent participation, our students are exceedingly busy, especially in the spring when our sports activities are supplemented with UIL literary contests. It is mandatory that our principals continue to monitor, very carefully, the amount of classroom instruction time that is missed and see that it continues to be a minimum.

Our co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are a very important part of our school. However, it is vital that we always keep in mind that our first priority is to provide the maximum amount of time for quality classroom instruction.
