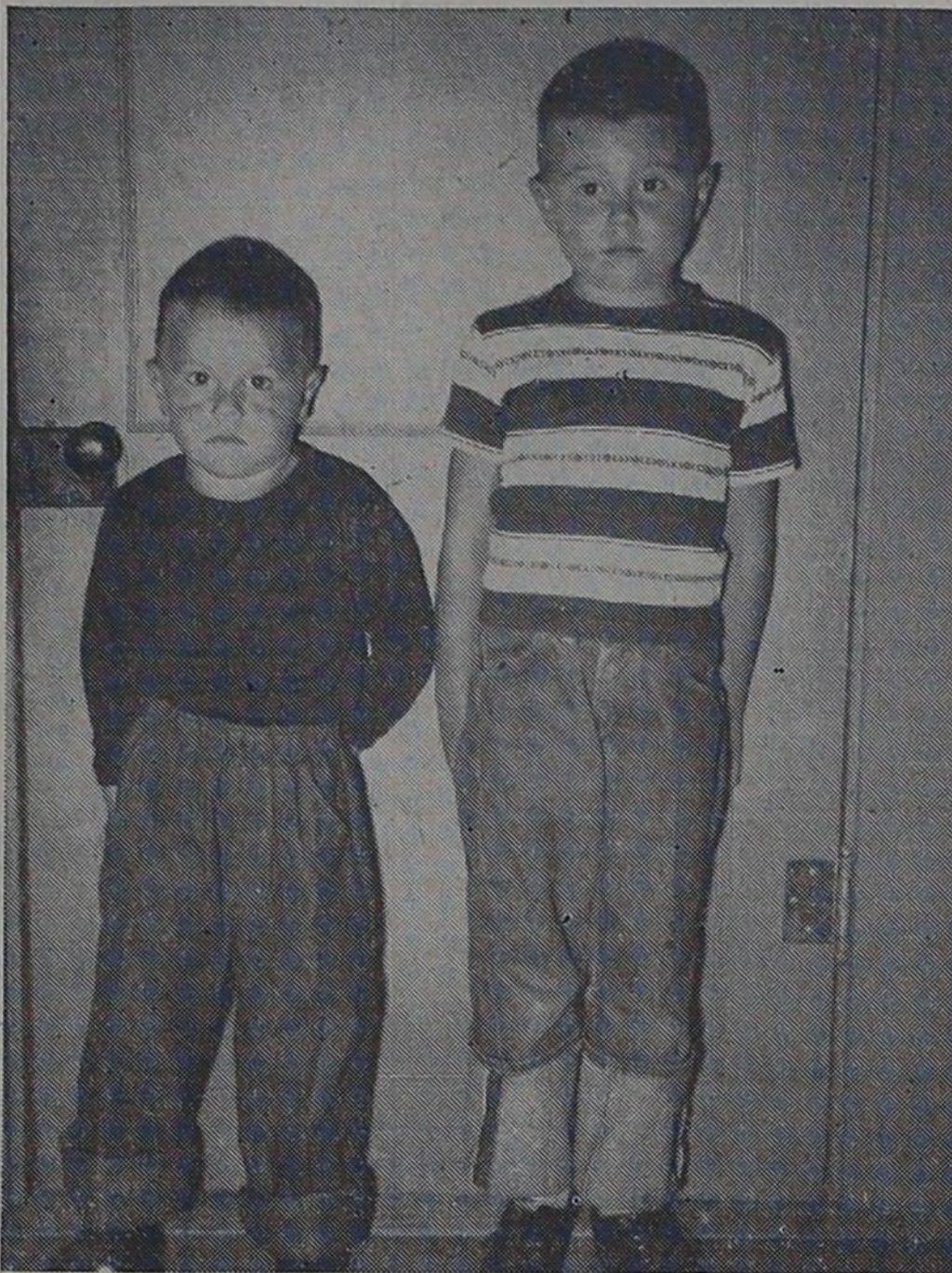
In the business session led by the president, Mrs. Vernon Estes, some of the points applied to correct rules of order as brought out in the preceding program were noted.

### Officials Discuss House Numbering

Bill paying was the main item on the schedule of events at the city commission's regular meeting Monday night at the City Hall.

The possibility of numbering the houses of Bovina was discussed but a decision on the matter was

## Some 75 Farmers Attend FB Meeting

Some 75 farmers, about 10 percent of the Farm Bureau members in Parmer County, attended the "open forum" type meeting conducted by county leaders of the bureau at the Bovina school auditorium Thursday night, October 6.

Problems that are of importance to local farmers as well as farmers all over the nation were discussed. President Gilbert Kaltwasser presided at the meeting. "There has never been a time in history when farmers were confronted with so many problems," Kaltwasser said at the beginning of the meeting.

The bureau will vote on its resolutions at its annual convention October 20. The convention will also be held in Bovina School Auditorium. The Thursday meeting was to "feel the pulse" of the farmers so that the resolutions committee might have a better idea of how to write the resolutions. Members of the group discussed and voted on the various questions but all the votes were, of course, unofficial.

Kaltwasser said the board of directors was "disappointed" because of the lack of attendance. The meeting and the questions that were discussed had been advertised in newspapers of the county and by direct mail.

A total of 15 questions that are considered of importance to farmers was discussed.

# Mustangs Lose First District Encounter, 13-7

## Amherst Bulldogs Upset Locals Friday

The Bovina Mustangs were upset in their opening District 3-B football game Friday night by the Amherst Bulldogs at Amherst. The underdog Bulldogs scored in the first and last quarters to master the local team by a 13-7 count.

Bovina's Larry Ezell kicked off to the winners to begin the game and they marched to their first quarter touchdown without ever losing the ball. Charles Schroeder took the kickoff on his own 10 and returned it to the 28. Sixteen plays later Amherst had racked up a first touchdown of the game on a one yard plunge by Schroeder. The Bulldogs didn't execute a single play that lost yardage in their initial march, several of the plays didn't make more than one or two

yards but none went for no gain or lost yardage. Fullback Enloe Lafford ran the extra point over standing up to make the score 7-0.

Read took the following kickoff, (the first time Bovina had been on the offensive), on his own 20 and returned to the 36. Smith picked up two to the 38 and then seven more to the 45. It looked at this point as if the Mustangs might duplicate the Bulldogs' scoring feat. Ezell made a first down on the mid-field stripe and Read added five more to the 45 in Amherst territory. Smith managed to the Amherst 40 and Ezell plowed to the 37 as the first quarter ended.

Smith made it down to the 34 but the following play cost five yards, back to the 39 because of a five-yard backfield in motion penalty. Read nullified the damage done by the penalty and added more yardage on a keeper down to the 22. Smith went to the 19,

Ezell to the 15, and Smith picked up the first down on the 10, where Bovina had a first down and goal to go. In two carries, Smith had moved the ball to the seven, with third down and seven yards needed for the tying touchdown, the Mustangs lost two back to the nine and on fourth down Read threw an incomplete pass and the Bulldogs had stopped Bovina's drive on the nine yard line.

Two plays later, Schroeder got loose for 41 yards to put the ball on Bovina's 49, a five yard penalty set Amherst back to its own 46. They couldn't manage for a first with 15 yards needed and the Mustangs took over on downs on their own 44.

The Mustangs, too, were held on downs and Smith left-footed the ball down to the Amherst 20 from where it was returned to the 35 on the runback. The Bulldogs moved the ball up to the 41, fumbled

on the Bovina 44 and Bovina recovered.

Ezell carried to mid-field, a Read pass slid off Smith's finger tips, Ezell added eight more to the 41. Read passed incomplete to Hawkins and then to Caldwell. On the next play, Amherst intercepted and kept possession of the ball until the half ended. They had, however, moved it down to the Bovina 30.

The Bulldogs returned the kicking off favors to begin the second half. Ezell took the kick on his 20, dropped it, but picked it up in time to carry to the 28. He carried on the first play from scrimmage to the 33 and Smith made a first down on the 40. Smith carried again to the 45, Ezell made two to the 47, Smith duplicated Ezell's two yard gain to the 49, but Ezell was stopped for no gain and Amherst took over on downs.

On Amherst's second play, Smith pounced on a fumble and Bovina

was again in possession on the mid-field stripe. In two carries Smith was down to the 34 and a first down. Ezell went to the 27, Smith made one and a five yard penalty moved the ball back to the 31, but then Smith got loose for seven yards and a first down on the 24. A pitchout to Smith netted no gain, and then Read stepped back and hit Ezell with a 24 yard pass on the goal. Read skirted around his own left end on a keeper to add the extra point and tie the ball game in a 7-7 knot.

However, the Bulldogs quickly went back in the lead without losing the ball. The kickoff was carried back to the 32 from the 22 and in eight plays the ball was on the Bovina 10 and it seemed that the Mustangs might take over on downs at that point but with fourth down and three yards needed, the winners managed for a first down

on the six yard line. Two line bucks and the ball was on the one, with third down and one to go, the Bovina line held and the third period ended. The change of ends of the field seemed to give the Bulldogs new life and Schroeder carried over from the one on the first play of the fourth quarter to make the score 13-7. The running attempt for the extra point was stopped.

The teams played between the 30 yard lines for the remainder of the game.

The Mustangs play their second district game of the season next Friday night against Plains at Friona. Coach Bob Willis said that the same lineup that started against Amherst would go against Plains.

No serious injuries were suffered in the Amherst game, "just the usual bruises," Willis said.
