Locklin Lights Up Sonora

In a world where self interest and self concern seem to run rampant, it is a privilege to know a person like Maxine Locklin.

She was born Maxine Lang, in Texhoma, Oklahoma on February 25, 1917. Maxine was the third of four children born to Carry and Floyd Lang. Her father died in 1919 during the great influenza epidemic. Carrie was pregnant when Floyd died and times were rough for the young widow. But according to Maxine, her mother always taught the children to "hold their heads up and not their hands out." Her mother later remarried and had five more children. Seven of these nine children are still living.

Maxine moved to Sonora on September 7, 1940, just three months before the attack on Pearl Harbor. She went to work at the Corner Drug Store (presently Westerman Drug), where she worked until 1953. She then went to work for Sonora High School until 1956, and later worked for the San Angelo Surgical Clinic and the Standard-Times.

In 1960, she married Dave Locklin, returned to Sonora and went to work for West Texas Utilities. She organized the Merle Norman Studio and managed it for seventeen years.

On November 3, 1976, she went to work for the Sonora Police Department. She became Sonora's Municipal Judge in 1984.

Maxine is a member of the First Christian Church, but attends the First United

Methodist Church of Sonora.

She has one son, William Robert (Billy Bob) Ellingson. He has been with the Bureau of Indian Affairs since 1960. She has three grand-children and one great grand-child.

Said Maxine, "Young people in Sonora are my main interest. They are my real priority. I enjoy doing anything that will help the

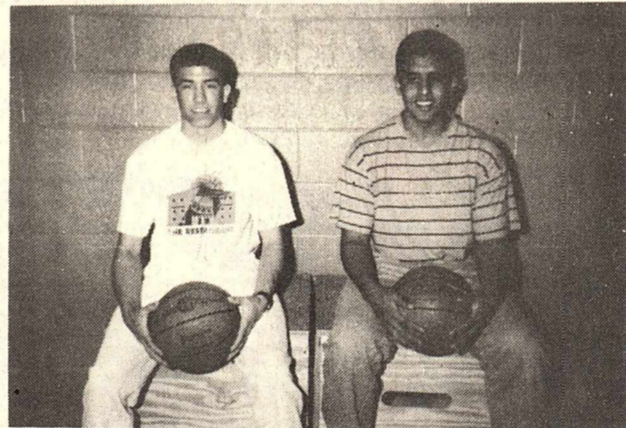
youth of Sonora"

She has been a school volunteer for many years and started Sonora's Angel Tree program. She was on the board of the Sonora Senior Center for nine years. She led the music at the Center for nine years. She is also a hearing officer for the school district.

Maxine's great-grandfather, George H. Lillie, was a signer of the Constitution

of Kansas, founded Eureka, Kansas and was the first probate judge of the county in which he lived. He was a member of the secret service. Mr. and Mrs. Lillie were known as being a man and woman of God.

Maxine Locklin is also known as being a woman of God. She is a caring, loving and giving person. Sonora is a better place because of her.

Sutton County Library - A Rich History, A Bright Future

On September 23rd, 1993, with the firm belief that a library is the "heart" of the community, an entirely representative cross-section of concerned citizens banded together, in a committee, to develop a "Program of Requirements" or "Specific Needs" for a new Sutton County Public Library that would serve our community for the next fifty to seventy-five years.

At no cost to the county or the taxpayers, this "Fact-Finding Committee" determined to develop an objective "Program of Requirements".

The Sutton County Library had its inception in 1926 as the Sonora Woman's Club Library. The first 275 books, so painstakingly gathered by house to house canvass, will be remembered as a testimony to their determination to fulfill the basic needs of the entire community. The Woman's Club was united in the dual concept of Service to the Community and the Importance of a Library. The Sonora Woman's Club continually supported and

maintained the library operation in its own Clubhouse until 1970 when the Clubhouse was sold and the library was moved to the second floor of the City Hall. The volume collection experienced steady growth through the years. In 1982, through a generous donation by the Aldwell family, the Library was moved into an older home which seemed to be a permanent answer to its physical needs. At this time, the Sonora Woman's Club gave the library to Sutton County. The community enthusiastically welcomed the formation of the Sutton County Public Library which became the newest member of both the Texas Library Association and the Big Country Library System with the expanded responsibilities and attendant privileges. All went well until 1992 when the building began to experience foundation settlement and concurrent stress in the wood framing system. The Structural Engineering Firm of McClanahan and Associates (601 S. Irving, San Angelo,

Texas 76903) was retained to evaluate the building and its component parts. The results indicated cost-prohibitive corrective measures with the added cost to renovate the building to meet A.D.A. (American Disability Act) standards for health and code-related items.

Once again the Sutton County Public Library is faced with providing the physical space to house its existing 13,000+ Volume Collection that is expanding to fulfill the needs of the entire community. It was anticipated in this program of Requirements that the Volume Collection would approach, if not exceed, 25,000+ Volumes in the next twenty years. Citizens of Sutton County made 10,097 visits to the Library during the year ending September 1993 and 12,053 books were checked out.

A public library should be a vital place for self-education and learning in Sutton County. The library has always taken a leadership role in the community by striving to meet the cultural, educational and recreational needs of its users.

The following individuals were authorized by the Sutton County Commissioner's Court on November 8th, 1993 as a Fact-Finding Committee for a new Sutton County Public Library. The three-fold

responsibilities of this fact-finding committee being to develop a Program of Requirements for a new library in Sutton County; to aid in finding sources for major funding; and to oversee the construction and/or renovation of a new Sutton County Library to completion.

Navy Petty Officer 3rd Class Karl E. Owings, son of Carolyn M. Owings of 1305 Mesquite St., Sonora, TX recently departed for a six-month deployment aboard the guided missile cruiser USS Vicksburg, homeported in Mayport, Fla to the Mediterranean.

The 7,500 Atlantic Fleet sailors who comprise elements of a joint task group (JTG) which includes units of the aircraft carrier USS Saratoga Battle Group and the USS Inchon Amphibious Ready Group, relieved the USS America JTG. Joining the JTG, are 2,000 Marines from the 24th

Marine Expeditionary Unit from North Carolina.

Owings is one of more than 350 crewmembers aboard USS Vicksburg. The 567-foot-long cruiser is armed with missiles, torpedoes and guns.

Designed to operate overseas and to respond swiftly, the Navy and Marine Corps "sea-air-land" team is capable of a full range of action -- from humanitarian relief to major offensive operations, from the sea.

Kelly's Kolumn



Do you want to learn about the relationship between good nutrition and getting or staying fit? It is easy if you find out about this year's National Nutrition Month EAT RIGHT AMERICA™ campaign sponsored by the American Dietetic Association.

The theme for the campaign is "Nutrition Fuels Fitness". The first step in promoting fitness is having a balanced diet which includes many different foods. Being physically fit is more than just engaging in regular aerobic exercise three times a week. It is working activity into daily life, such as taking the stairs instead of the elevator.

Exercise should be a part of a healthy lifestyle at any age, but most Americans, young and old, aren't getting enough. If exercise has not been a part of your daily routine, now is the time to start. If you do exercise regularly, keep it up!

Regular physical activity can make your heart and lungs stronger, increase your muscle strength and flexibility, and help you feel good. You can improve your shape and decrease your body fat. If you are a physically inactive adult, before you start a vigorous

exercise or sports program check with your doctor to help decide what activity is best for your general physical condition.

The number of calories you need depends on how much energy your body uses. People have different basal metabolic rates (level of energy required to support involuntary body processes such as breathing and heartbeat, levels of physical activity, body sizes, and body compositions.) Your genes are unchangeable, but you can change eating habits and activity patterns. In the battle of the bulge, two weapons are needed -- diet and exercise. Whatever body structure you have, you can be fit and not fat.

No one plan for losing weight is best for everyone. If you are not physically active, regular exercise may help you lose fat and keep it off. If you eat too much, decreasing your calorie intake may help. Long-term success usually depends upon new and better lifelong habits of both physical activity and eating.

For a good start, try a brisk half-hour walk three times a week - make it a habit!

EMS'ing Around

EMS Coordinator Lenora Pool and Tamsac Member Carla Garner attended the 33rd annual Emergency Management Conference for State and Local Officials in Austin, Texas February 21st through the 24th. Topics of discussion were Hurricane Andrew, Texas and California Wildfires, Earthquakes, Midwest Floods, and the Family Protection Program. Workshops consisted of Community Preparedness. Many of the workshops were scheduled twice a day to assure everyone could attend. By attending this conference Lenora and Carla were able to help our organization by sharing what they learned.

On February 28, President Pascal Allison opened the training meeting at the Hudspeth Hospital Emergency Room. With no new business to take care of, he then turned the meeting over to Training Officer Eddie McReynolds and Assistant Training Officer Keith Butler. Eddie asked that we be given a tour of the Emergency Room to observe the new equipment that was donated. Dr. Pajestka was present to explain procedures of how he would like to see Emergency situations handled by the EMT's and Emergency Room Personnel. Nurse T.J. Jones explained about the

emergency supplies, where they are located, how they are used. In the absence of Secretary Leslie Thorp, Donna Keese took roll call and the meeting was adjourned.

Many times we as EMT's arrive at an accident scene where the patient has either fallen or been in a motor vehicle wreck, involving an injury to the neck and spine. Our first concern to this patient is the ABC's, Airway, Breathing, and Circulation, and the spine. No matter how serious the accident our training teaches us to always immobilize the patient to prevent further injury to the spine or neck. A cervical collar (C-collar) is placed around the neck to prevent compression, and the patient is placed on a rigid backboard to prevent movement to the spine. 17% of the people involved in an accident in which a spinal injury has occurred is found to be walking around the scene. They later find they have to have further treatment due to the injury they were unaware of. Signs of spinal injuries are pain upon movement, dislocation of the injured area, paralysis, weakness, numbness, and tingling felt throughout the body.

The Sutton County EMS would like to take this time to introduce EMT Rosie Joseph

Butler. Rosie obtained her ECA License with the Sutton County EMS in May of 1987. It was at that time she saw the need for more volunteers on the EMS Service so she joined the Sutton County Emergency Management Volunteer Service. Rosie went on to obtain her EMT license to further her career in March of 1988 in San Angelo, Texas. Rosie has held the offices of Reporter in 1987 to 1988, Historian in 1992 to 1993, and presently holds the same office of Historian for 1993 to 1994. Rosie volunteers much of her weekend time with the EMS Service as she lives in San Angelo, Texas. Rosie is married to Keith Butler, EMT-Paramedic and the Administrator of the Medi-Centers in San Angelo. They have 2 children, Emmilly, and Amelia. The Sutton County EMS is proud to have Rosie as a member of their team.

Mosaics Re-Created By Students

The study of the arts of 6th century Byzantium was the catalyst for the magnificent paper mosaics that are now on display in the windows of the Sonora High Library. Humanities students spent part of each class period for the past three months in designing, cutting and gluing the thousands of squares of paper that were used to imitate the colored glass of the original mosaics. Under the direction of the class instructors, Mr.

A New Library In Sutton County's Future?

The Fact - Finding Committee for a new Sutton County Public Library applied the following criteria to all structures and sites:

- A. Square footage / Structural Soundness
- B. Cost Effectiveness of Renovation or Construction
- C. American Disabilities Act Accessibility / Ample parking
- D. Visibility
- E. Purchase Price
- F. Possibility of State Library Construction Grant Funding
- G. Maintenance and Utilities Cost

The following possibilities were considered.

Neville Building

1. 5100 Square Feet
2. Exterior Walls need structural review.
3. Wooden Floors - wooden framing (pilings) in sub-basement. Requires filling basement with sand and pouring new concrete floor to meet 125 to 150 lbs. live load requirements for books.
4. Load-bearing walls dividing street level flooring (actually 2 buildings), has arched openings between rooms. (Would require double staffing.)
5. Cost of Demolition and Renovation approximately \$45 sq. ft.
6. No Designated Parking in lot behind building - ADA or otherwise. (Parking now shared with 3 other entities)
7. Purchase price - \$45,000
8,5100 sq. ft. x \$45 = \$229,000 + \$45,000 purchase price = \$274,000
9. No designated parking - A.D.A. or otherwise in lot behind building. Parking now shared by three other entities.

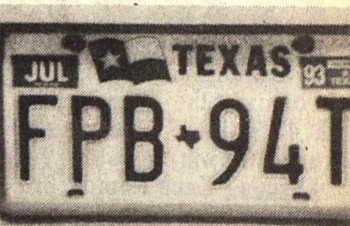

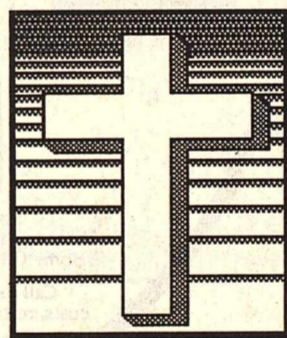

Q. Who are the officers of the Sutton County Historical Society?

A. The current officers are: Eddie Sawyer, President; Virginia Epps, Vice-President; Al Elliott, Treasurer and Jo-Ann Palmer, Secretary.

Q. What are the dues of the Sutton County Historical Society and the requirements for membership?

A. Anyone interested in helping to preserve the history of Sutton County may join the society by paying annual dues of \$10 renewable each August.

Q. Where do we send mail or how do we call the society?

A. Mail is addressed to the Sutton County Historical Society, P.O. Box 885, Sonora, Texas 76950-0885. The telephone number is 915-387-5144. We do have an answering machine. If we are not in the office, please leave your name and number so we may get back to you.

Q. Can articles be donated to the society or cash donations and memorials be made?

A. Cash donations, dues, memorial donations and honorariums should be sent attention to the treasurer. Please be sure to include the name of the person being honored or memorialized and the person and address the acknowledgement is to be sent to.

Photographs and written history are always needed for our files. Articles for the museum must be viewed and a determination made by the officers, due to current space restrictions, if the article can be accepted at this time.

If the article to be donated has a value of over \$500 and you wish to use it as a tax deduction, we must have a copy of an appraisal slip to verify values to the IRS. We are a non-profit organization.

The officers of the Sutton County Historical Society are the only persons authorized to accept donations on behalf of the society.

Q. Can anyone attend a society meeting?

A. YES!! Notice of meetings are sent to current members and we will publish the date, time and place of our future meetings in the newspaper.

Q. How can we buy books published by the society?

A. "The Sutton County History 1887-1977" and "The Story of Sutton County, TX 1889-1990" are sold out and we have no plans to reprint them at this moment. "Bad Old Days In And Around Sutton County 1889-1939" (cost \$25.00) and "Sutton County Marriage Records 1890-1940" (cost \$15.00) may be obtained by sending a request for same and check made out to Sutton County Historical Society to P.O. Q. Does the Sutton County Historical Society give any tours or do lectures on the history of Sutton County?

lectures to school students on Sutton County history, conducted tours of "The Depot," the Old Jail Building, Miers Home Museum and the Sonora Burial Park. Also when requested we will go to the schools and give presentations.

Q. What is the main function of the Sutton County Historical Society?

A. To preserve the history of Sutton County.

Q. What questions will you answer in the "Ask the Historical Society" column?

A. Any questions dealing with events or people in and around Sutton County. Most of our answers are found in back editions of the Devil's River News, Sutton County Court Records, back issues of the San Angelo newspaper, cemetery records and from people in Sutton County. There is no charge for questions answered in the

column.

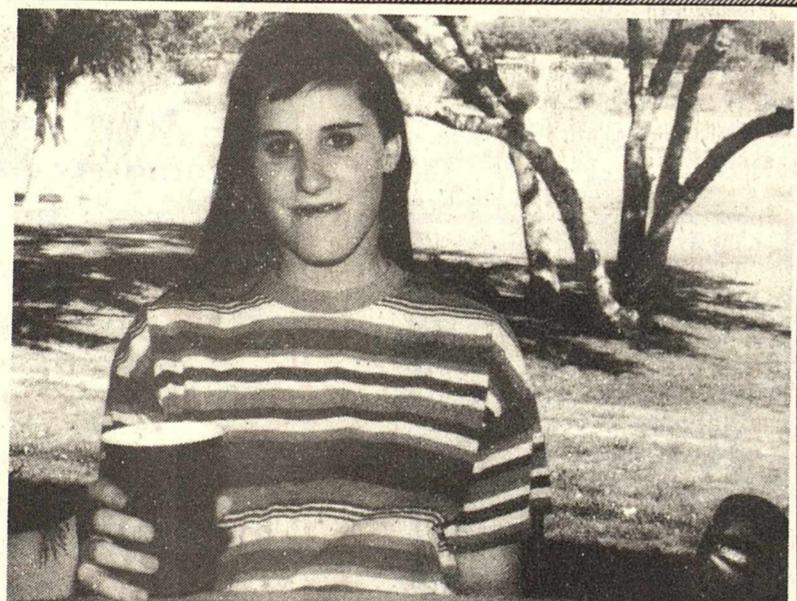

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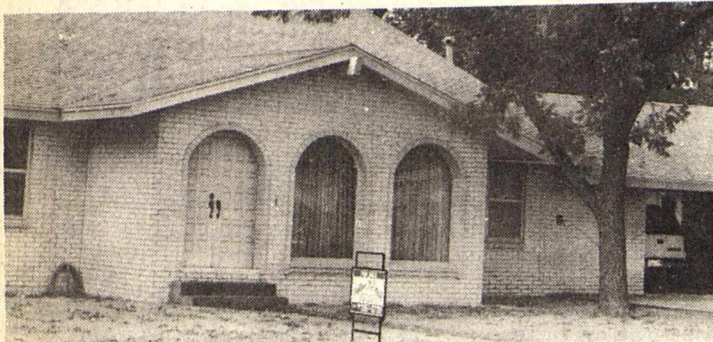
